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SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL

From the minutes of the Meeting held on 30th October.

PLANNING:

Mr. G. Dalton, representative on the YDNP Planning Committee advised us that the application for Dales Park Works was due to be discussed at the next planning meeting and he asked for the Councils view on this application. Mr. Dalton was advised that the Council had always supported this application and continued to do so. The site was well hidden and continued to provide employment for local people.

A site visit was scheduled for Farfield Mill on 22^{nd} November.

A local group is trying to set up an affordable housing project. The idea is for a self build project in association with SLDC and a housing association. The project is at a very early stage and at present 6 families are involved but this may be increased. Ownership would be 50/50 with the housing association. No land has yet been acquired but this would be outside the development boundary as is permitted for low cost housing.

HIGHWAYS:

Parking on the double lines round the junction of Finkle St. and Main St. is still a problem and the new access ramp for the Library is difficult for prams, which have to approach from across the road. The traffic wardens have been asked to enforce the double yellow lines but this has not deterred people from illegally stopping in this area. The fence by St. Gregory's has been damaged and is sticking out into the road. **PLAYING FIELDS**

The grass is growing well and has now been cut by Sedbergh School groundsmen. Sedbergh School was thanked for their assistance. They are also to produce a maintenance plan for future management of the pitch.

The Playground group are in the process of submitting applications for funds for new play equipment. It was agreed that the Parish Council should issue letters of support as required and that we should also consider a donation when preparing the precept for next year. An amount of £1,000 was suggested.

CUMBRIA IN BLOOM

A walnut tree has been planted on Thornsbank estate and daffodil bulbs have been donated by SLDC which will soon be planted. Mr. Paul Wilkinson, The Park Ranger, has agreed to get a working party to do some work in Queen's gardens in November/December. **CORRESPONDENCE**

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



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EUROPEAN WRONGS

First the Metric Martyrs now the Oueen. You have probably read or heard about the Metric Martyrs. These were tradesmen who were prosecuted for selling a pound of bananas etc. Trading standards enforcing EU legislation took these traders to court. As a result they were found guilty and now have a CRIMINAL RECORD just because they sold fruit in Imperial units, which their customers understood and hence preferred. These men also have a hefty bill for legal fees etc. The crux of the case hinged around whether UK law was paramount. As it turns out the Law Lords ruled that as our government had signed the Treaty of Rome, the European Act and later the Maastrict, Amsterdam and

Nice Treaties European Law over ruled UK law so the men were found guilty. They have not given up yet. They are challenging the verdict on the grounds that it infringes their personal rights. Guess where? In the European Courts! Now where does this leave every one else? Clearly our courts can be over ruled at any time. What about the Queen you might ask? Well after many attempts the Lord Chancellors Department finally gave an answer. It is hardly surprising they were loath to give one. Now as we have just seen this court over ruled our courts in the case of the Metric Martyrs. When



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pressed the Lord Chancellors department had to say that EU law over rules UK law and that the Queen is subject to foreign law IN HER OWN COURTS! In other words she is subject to a foreign power just like the rest of us!! The latest scheme is an EU constitution which is well on the way. Now if, as we were originally told, we were joining a common market why do we need a constitution? The answer is of course obvious to everyone, except our government it seems, that the EU is not about common markets but a super state, the United States of Europe, by any other name. One can only surmise that our government, and the other main parties, will do anything to curry favour with Brussels that they hope we won't notice until its too late. Tony Blair in his infamous Cardiff speech made it very clear that he has done an about turn using phrases such as "power to the European centre", "The future of Europe is strong, imperial, bureaucratic", " We need more Europe, not less". As this speech was not made in Parliament MPs, unless they read about it elsewhere are unaware of this dramatic change of emphasis. On the



matter of the EU constitution when ask if the British people would have a chance to vote in a referendum Peter Hain, the current minister for Europe, replied that it was the right of Parliament to decide. So there will be no referendum on the Constitution which will set up the United States of Europe at the cost of British sovereignty. Our Parliament will be left to control some matters dealing with education and health with the rest coming direct from Brussels. So wake up folks unless you want our Westminster Parliament to be a regional council of a wider state run from Brussels and a system that you cannot influence the Brussels machine must be challenged now!

DENTDALE ELECTRICS

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YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

The YDNP Authority has agreed to phase out advertising of holiday accommodation that has not been inspected and accredited by the English Tourist Board.

By November 2003, the Authority's National Park Centres will remove information on non-inspected holiday accommodation from its shelves and by the 2005 edition the Authority's 'The Visitor' newspaper will only advertise inspected accommodation as well.

The decision will bring the Authority inline with Craven and Richmondshire District Councils, who both have inspected-only policies.

Steve Macaré, chairman of the

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Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, said: "Today's decision will bring us inline with Tourist Board guidelines. However, rather than putting the new policy in place straight away, we have agreed a transition period that will allow accommodation providers sufficient time to become inspected or to find alternative

marketing methods." Annie Galloway, head of external affairs at the Yorkshire Dales



National Park Authority, explained: "In recent years the tourism industry has become much more geared towards inspection, for both quality and safety, which today means that inspected accommodation is more the norm rather than the exception.

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SOUTH LAKELAND USER AND CARER EVENTS

Have your say on services in..... In November a local public meeting, organised by a partnership of health, social services and voluntary organisations, was held in the area, to ask for local people's views on services that support older people who live at home.

Local Health and social services professionals were involved in the discussions at the meeting, which attracted local residents who were keen to give their views of services.

A number of topics were discussed including: access to services, especially transport; finding the right information on services when it was needed; housing,; dental services; benefits; social

opportunities and pressures on staff in rural areas with long travelling distances between patients and clients.

A report on the topics raised and the consultation process will be produced in due course. As part

of this, a mechanism for ongoing local consultation and feedback will be developed. Anyone who was

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BALANCE SUGAR, EAT SOYA

My Christmas reading included two new and very interesting books: "The Treatment of Diabetes Mellitus with Chinese Medicine" by Bob Flaws, Lynn Kuchinski and Robert Casñas (Blue Poppy Press 2002) and "New Natural Alternatives to HRT" by Marilyn Glenville (Kyle Cathie 2002). The dietary advice in the two books was strikingly similar, and I have summarised it in the title.

The primary aim of a diabetic diet is to keep blood sugar glucose as close to normal as possible. It is actually important for everybody to avoid rollercoaster blood sugar levels. If you eat, for example, a Mars bar you will get an instant but short-lived boost to your blood sugar, followed by a sharp fall. At this point you will feel tired, need to eat something to buck you up and the cycle will start again. According to Marilyn Glenville, long term symptoms of low blood sugar can mimic menopausal





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symptoms: mood swings, irritability, crying, anxiety, night sweats, tiredness, forgetfulness. Several of my patients have reported feeling tired over Christmas. Could this partly be due to all the sweet things which are traditionally eaten at this time?

In my view, the only way to rebalance blood sugar levels, once there are already signs of trouble, is to cut out all dietary sugar, except that naturally present in fruits and vegetables, and all refined flour products. The two books recommend the following:

- avoid added sugar
- avoid refined carbohydrate
- avoid artificial sweeteners
- don't smoke

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- eat unrefined carbohydrates especially oats
- eat good quality protein from fish, eggs, nuts, seeds, beans
- eat fruit and vegetables
- have small frequent meals.

Fats and oils are another area where both books agree. They warn about the health risks of trans fatty acids which are present in margarine, commercial baked goods and fast foods. Most commercially processed foods contain either added sugar or trans fats and it is best to eliminate them altogether.

Many more menopausal women in the West suffer from hot flushes than Asian women. Research has shown that women who have a high dietary intake of soya products are likely to have fewer hot flushes. Soya is recommended for those with type 2 (maturity onset) diabetes as studies have found that it helps maintain healthy cholesterol levels and may lower the risk of kidney disease (this does not only apply to diabetics).

Soya can be eaten as tofu (the nicest, I think, is made by Clearspot and can be bought from the wholefood shop in Allhallows Lane in Kendal) or as tempeh (from Kan Foods in Kendal or drunk as miso (the one I like best is barley miso made by Danival, which I have also bought from Kan Foods). Soya milk is available in Sedbergh at Powells; I recommend the red pack from Provamel. It would seem best to avoid GM soya (also often present in processed foods) and the surest way to do this is to buy organic. All the products recommended here are organic. Soya is thought to be beneficial because it contains isoflavones,

which are also present in other beans and in lentils.

The book on diabetes quoted an interesting study in which diabetics were assigned to follow one of three types of diet (high carbohydrate/high fibre, low fat or weight management). All groups were recorded with lower blood sugar and lower cholesterol levels and the researchers concluded that the positive benefits derived not from the specific regimens but from being attentive and focussed about diet. In other words, find a healthy diet which makes you feel good and stick to it!

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BUILDING OF DEVIL'S BRIDGE

Although it must be one of the best stone bridges in England, the age of Kirkby Lonsdale's Devil's Bridge is a subject rarely touched upon by experts in architecture. Learned Historians have examined the records at length, but all that has been found is a grant of "portage" in 1376. Even the discovery of this fact does not explain whether this was for a grant made for repairs to the bridge we see today, or was it for an earlier, wooden structure. The recent talk given to Sedbergh History Society by Mr David Smail attempted to consider all aspects of the bridge with an open mind. Not only the type of architecture, but the methods used in it's construction. As

well as taking into account the opinions of those who have been prepared to express a view, it was an attempt to consider the location of the bridge, not only in a geographical sense, but also in a historical sense and to try to establish a likely window of opportunity for those at the time who had both the interest and financial resources to embark on an expensive project such as building a bridge.

Comparisons with other bridges of the same style firmly place our bridge prereformation, when Kirkby Lonsdale Manor and Parish belonged to the Abbey of St Mary at York. Its location was key to the transport of goods between York and the many granges the Abbey owned

The above Act is expected to come into force in 2004/2005. It provides for the general public to have rights on "access land" for walking, picnicking, running, sight-seeing, bird-watching, etc.

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in South Westmorland When the talk was first put together, the Speaker deliberately avoided coming to a conclusion about its age until he, like his audience at Sedbergh, had seen the whole picture. Perhaps the most convincing evidence

was when the income of St Mary's Abbey from it's granges at Kirkby Lonsdale was examined.

The time of greatest prosperity was at the end of the 13th Century when

England was the granary of Europe. A time before invasions from Scotland wrought such havoc following the battles of Stirling Bridge and Bannockburn. This was a time when tythes of grain and so on were exported via York and Hull to the countries of Europe, making the provision of a bridge across the Lune at Kirkby Lonsdale vital to this trade.

Fortunately for us, when these great



religious houses embarked on such a project they saw an opportunity to create something not just functional, but beautiful. Instructions to the Master Masons in charge of such projects were usually that

they should build something "of beauty, of convenience, and of durability", in which three arts the builders succeeded to perfection.

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FEBRUARY GARDENING

I always spend a rather anxious time at the end of January and the beginning of February, going around the garden, looking for Winter Aconites as they start to push their way up out of the soil and open up their beautiful clear yellow flowers. I am anxious because, for some reason, I can never remember where I have planted the things and consequently can't decide whether anything else might have engulfed them in the previous season.

Winter Aconites - Eranthis hyemails are always best when planted "in the green" i.e. as growing plants rather than as dry bulbs. You might find them available in pots at a garden centre this month but I

always tend to send away to a specialist bulb nursery for mine, and I buy them in forties or fifties rather than tens because bulb sizes tend to be rather mixed and some of the smaller ones will take a year or two to bulk up to flowering size. Bulbs bought "in the green" from a nursery arrive by post, in early April, swathed in damp newspaper.

Aconites prefer shade and are ideal for planting underneath deciduous trees. Most soil types are suitable but waterlogged soil should be avoided and fertiliser should never be applied. Plant bulbs shallowly at $1\frac{1}{2}$ " depth, then make a note of where you have put them!

FLUORIDE

I feel I must write in reply to the misleading article entitled 'Water' in the last issue of Lookaround which contained some wild inaccuracies concerning the toxicity and efficacy of fluoride.

Fluoride, the ion of the element Fluorine, is a naturally occurring substance. The Earth's crust consists of some 900 parts per million (ppm) whilst seawater has a concentration of 1-2 ppm. Well over 100 million people drink naturally fluoridated water worldwide.

Since the 1940's, following America's lead, many countries added fluoride at the optimal concentration of 1ppm. Now some 300 million people drink fluoridated water, with only 5.5million in the UK. Dental decay, one of the

commonest diseases on the planet has halved in these populations. As for the safety of fluoride the World Health Organisation states "The question of possible secondary effects caused by fluorides taken in optimal concentrations throughout life has been the object of thorough medical investigations which have failed to show any impairment of general health. Community water fluoridation is safe and cost-effective"

Some 100 studies in 20 countries have supported the above. These are all scientific studies, involving large population samples; the findings are open to public and scientific scrutiny. The incidence of bone fractures at the optimal fluoride level is in fact less than non-

SETTLEBECK HIGH SCHOOL *Parking at Settlebeck*



even on the wintriest of days, the very youngest can play happily.


A good bussing programme run by the Junior School operates daily from a wide range of villages and towns, including a service from Sedbergh.


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DENT PARISH COUNCIL

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NOVEMBER WEATHER

November's Weather. The month was characterised by blustery, showery weather. 4.26 inches of rain were recorded along with plenty of wind. The calmest day recorded a wind speed of 6.7mph from the North west. We then had 6 days with over 20mph recorded and every other day had wind speeds in the teens. Temperatures started in the 50'sF but then cooled slightly into upper and mid 40's. We did not have a minimum actually below freezing but got very close with 32.7F on two nights. On these nights and a few others we had ground frosts. With the wind we did not see the usual fogs of November. With all the wind it was to be expected that the atmospheric pressure would be on the low side in fact



it varied between a low of 28.44" and a high of 29.56" of mercury.

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CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

At the December meeting of the local branch of the Cumbria Wildlife Trust, Peter Mawby spoke about his detailed study of dippers in the Sedbergh area.

If you walk along the banks of any of our local rivers you will probably pass by a small brown bird with a white bib, perching on a stone above the water. This is the local breed of dipper. The birds hunt for their food under water, walking or swimming and moving pebbles to dislodge insect larvae, their favourite prey. They are fiercely territorial birds, and can be seen at any time of the year. We have a particularly strong population in our area.

Dippers nest under river banks, or on bridge supports, building a small domed nest. The same nest site is often used year after year, and they may start breeding from February onwards. Although numbers have decreased a little over the past 40 years, there are still about 50 nesting pairs on local rivers and streams. Numbers may have fallen as a result of lower water quality. Attention to the spreading of slurry, and care over the disposal of agricultural chemicals will help to maintain pure water. Also, changes to river banks and structures have resulted in the loss of some nest sites. For instance, birds like to nest on bridge supports where stones or bricks are missing. Careful restoration can leave suitable niches where nests might be built.

It would be a pity to lose these attractive birds, which are so characteristic of hilly western Britain. By attending to water quality, and by ensuring availability of suitable nesting sites, we should be able to keep the population steady.

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YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Dr Karen Griffiths has taken up a new post at the YDNP Authority, as the Authority's 'Out of Oblivion' project officer.

Karen will be seconded for two years from her current post as the Authority's interpretation officer. Her appointment follows last year's news that the Authority by 2004. had been awarded a £90,000 grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund to fund the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's 'Out of Oblivion' project. Over the next two years, the 'Out of Oblivion' project will revolutionise access to information about the historic environment of the Yorkshire Dales National Park. At the cutting edge of archaeological interpretation, it will provide full public access to the Authority's Sites and Monument Record (SMR), which is the most comprehensive record of the historic environment of the National Park.

When complete, the public will be able to access information at the touch of a button: via the internet; through new workstations at the Authority's National Park Centres; or by using a portable computer that will be available throughout the area.

Karen graduated with a degree in Archaeology from Durham University, before completing a PhD in the Roman Market Economy at Newcastle University in 1986.

The Authority's SMR currently contains over 25,000 records supported by a range of historic maps, aerial and ground based photographs and comprehensive details of field surveys and reports of excavation projects. The SMR includes information about historic sites, ranging from prehistoric caves to structures built in the cold war. It also holds information on historic buildings, both listed and unlisted, as well as information about features of the historic landscape, such as sheepfolds and dry stone walls.

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YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

The YDNP Authority has welcomed the Government's decision to increase its core grant by almost 10%, the largest increase of all the English National Parks, as exceptional news for the area.

The announcement by the Rural Affairs Minister, The Rt Hon Alun Michael MP, came with an extra bonus for the area's communities, with a Government commitment to the continued funding of the recently launched Sustainable Development Fund for a further year. Come April 2003, the Fund will increase from £125,000 to £200,000 a year for the National Park Authority to distribute for sustainable development projects.

The increase in the grant, which will come into effect from 1 April, will fund the Authority's current conservation, recreation, interpretation and community work. The funding will pay for a range of initiatives to address social exclusion and prepare for access to the open countryside. The Authority also received a further £500,000 towards its new northern office in Bainbridge.

In total, the Authority's core grant will rise from £3,958,616 for the current financial year to £4,337,283 come April. Alongside the additional £200,000 for the Sustainable Development Fund and £500,000 for the new northern office this amounts to an extra £1,078,667 for the National Park.

In addition to paying for the Authority's responsibilities under the Countryside and Rights of Way Act, the additional

money will pay for the Authority's joint Limestone Country Project and amongst other projects, finance initiatives to tackle social exclusion, informing nontraditional audiences about the National Park.

S&D HISTORY SOCIETY

Mark Newman one of the three Territorial Archaeology Officers of the National Trust gave the first talk of the new year to the History Society. To start, he outlined the function and work of the National Trust and gave various statistics relating to the number and size of the various properties it owns and manages. 590,000 acres of countryside is in its care including one third of the unspoilt coastline in Britain. Many of the properties and much of the land is in the care of tenants.

Mr Newman's brief is to visit and examine archaeological features owned by the Trust and advise on their preservation with possible access by the public where feasible. Using new computer technology he was able to show us digital pictures of a varied selection of sites in the area including Hadswell Woods, East Scar Top (Addleborough) and Upper Wharfedale including the settlement at Yockenthwaite where recent archaeological work has revealed manmade terraces and earlier buildings. An ancient barn called the Huntsman's Lodge could well be an old bastle house.
