


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KILLINGTON W.I.

Our next venture will be a stall on the annual Sedbergh Street Market when we will hope to repeat the pleasing success of last year. *G. B.*




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The following piece was written by Amy Ferguson and was completed a few days before the discovery of the illness that was to take her life. Amy was born in the West Riding, was proud to be part of the Town Band and loved Sedbergh.

The Origins of The First Sedbergh Town Band The Sedbergh Volunteer Company of the Border Regiment which had been formed around 1892 was in decline having only 16 members in 1897. A public meeting was called on December 18th with notices posted around the town inviting all those interested in the Volunteers to attend at the National School. Over 60 people attended and 16 men came forward making a detachment of 32 Volunteers to start the New Year.

Mr. Len Baxter, Lieutenant to the Battalion said he would like to see a revival of the military spirit in the Town and it was his intention to have a band and if twelve instrumentalists could be found in the first year, that would do very well. They had with them that night a Mr G.W. Beardsell, late Bandmaster of the Holmfirth Volunteer Band who was residing in Sedbergh and his services were at their disposal. Mr. Beardsell said that more interest was taken in a Company which had music to march to and strongly urged those interested in joining a band to contact him at the earliest opportunity. The meeting closed and it was agreed that it had been a very successful one.

A SEDBERGH TOWN BAND was



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formed and the following reports show that it was a successful one for the town. *February 3rd 1900*

Three Sedbergh Volunteers joined an active service unit with the Border Regiment to fight in the Boer War in South Africa. The day they left Sedbergh the Town Band, under the Leadership of Mr. J. Davidson played "Soldiers of the Oueen" in the Market Place before starting off to the Station. At the station "Rule Britannia" was vigorously sung by a huge crowd. When the train arrived, the Sedbergh men joined the Volunteers from Kirkby Lonsdale and after hearty cheers the train steamed off to the accompaniment of the Town Band and loud reports from lineside fog signals. February 9th 1901

The death of Queen Victoria. The Sedbergh Volunteers commanded by Sergeant Punch marched to the Parish Church playing the "Dead March to Saul". At the end of the service the Band led the Volunteers to the National School where they were given a brief talk by Mr. Lowry, Headmaster of Sedbergh School on the honour of serving the late Queen and he hoped the local Corps would prosper.

April 4th 1901

The three men who had served in South Africa with the Border Regiment were to return home. At 7 pm the Sedbergh half of "A" Company 2nd Volunteer Battalion, Border Regiment under Sgt. Punch formed up in the Market Place and headed by the Town Band under Bandmaster Davidson marched off to the Station followed by hundreds of enthusiastic and patriotic civilians. The three men were met by local dignitaries and all three took their seats on a gaily

decorated hand cart which was pulled by men from Millthrop Mill. The band struck up "Auld Lang Syne" and headed the procession back to town. On reaching the Market Place the band played "The Conquering Heroes" and the applause was deafening. A circuit of the Town was made and then everyone made their way to the Parish Church for a Service of Thanksgiving. There were many festivities the following week including a Grand Concert which included among others the Sedbergh Town Band who played "Soldiers of the Queen" and "God Save the King". So far I have no information for the next thirteen years but I know that the Band seems to have disbanded at the beginning of the 1914-1918 War and at the end of the War only six members of the original Town Band remained. They were willing to help form a new band if money could be raised but this seems not to have Amy Ferguson happened. 4th August 2002

Super 4 British kart championship 2003 Round 1

This is the first round of the British Championship held at Shennington, Sam has come on in leaps and bounds, as he is at this moment in time leading the ICC championship, and that has helped to move him up in the pecking order and receive respected from the top drivers. Any way this helps with his confidence but does not make it any easier to win. Now the main rule to do well in a championship is to finish all three heats and that should get you in to the 'A' final, if you are in the 'B' final you then have to finish in the first 4 places to join the back of the 'A' final.

Saturday practice

Sam went well, and was only 0.3 of a second of the pace, but as Sam has found out that isn't the true pace, as on the Sunday race day you need to be able to overtake and that bring the lap times down a little.

Sunday Race Day

To give you some idea what the day is like the day starts at 9.30 am with the three lap practice, Sam's first heat is the first race of the day at 10.30 am, then his next heat is at 12.50 pm which is race 15, His last heat is at 1.30 pm and that is race 19 the last heat of the day, there's a break for half hour and then the finals start with the 'B' finals at 2.15 pm the last final race is 3.45 pm, when that is finished there's another half hour wait for the last results to be finalised, and if you're lucky. There's a trophy presentation, that's it then, you then head home which is about three and a half hour drive. *So here goes;*

Heat one

Sam starts on grid position 10. This is his mid grid heat and the idea is to finish in the same place or further up the field in the three heats or you end up in the 'B' final, A good start off the line, and as he tries to get into position for the second corner he spins out and staled the engine he quickly jumped out restarted and was away after the others, he was a quarter of a lap behind the last driver and about half a lap behind the leader. But by the time the flag came out on lap 8 Sam was 14th out of 21, 13.99 seconds behind the winner this is impressive as the last driver was 48.47 second behind the winner.

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Heat Two

Sam starts on grid 21. This is his turn from the back of the field, and there is only one-way to go. That is forwards unless of course you break down and don't finish. He made a lightening start and on the first lap he was up to 8th. By the last lap he was 2nd and with just a few corners left he made a bid for the lead but failed to make it stick so second place was his in this heat. This had the entire top drivers gob smacked and me as well, some race I hope the cameraman saw it. **Heat Three**

Grid 4 for Sam. This heat is his turn at the front, the start was not as good this time, and he was going no were fast, and he was struggling to keep up with the front drivers by lap three he was out of the race with a broken carburettor. **'B' Final**

Sam started 7^{th} on the grid. Again his start was not as good as he would have liked, he was 8^{th} for a short time then he made his move, and as the drivers got spread out then he move through to 2^{nd} place and qualified for the 'A' final.

'A' Final

22nd position on the grid. His start was good this time and he was setting the fourth quickest times in the race consistently this meant he worked his way through to 9th place at the flag. This was a brilliant recovery, and Sam won the driver of the day trophy. He is 12th overall in the super 4 championship. *Sam's dad*

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THE WISDOM OF THE BODY

On Sunday 1st June the Dent Meditation Centre presented a day on Traditional Chinese Medicine, led by Dr Guo Bisong, who is a specialist in acupuncture and Qi Gong. (Qi Gong means "energy work" and consists of movements and breathing techniques designed to improve the flow of energy through the body.) I felt as if I already had a connection with Guo Bisong because part of my morning Qi Gong routine is a set of movements I learned from my teacher, who had learned it from her.

The day began with a very amusing demonstration by a mechanical cat, which made us all laugh. This was followed by a short meditation and rubbing the palms together before massaging the face. It was slightly disappointing that this was the only Qi Gong we did all day.

Guo Bisong talked about the laws of nature as symbolised by the familiar black and white yin-yang symbol. Yang, the white part of the symbol, represents light, warm, expansive, moving qualities. Yin, the black part, represents dark, stillness, moisture and coolness. So, day is yang, compared to night which is yin. However the dynamic balance changes from moment to moment. When, around midnight, vin is at its height, the yang for the new day is reborn. It is important to nourish this "baby yang" which means that 11 pm to 1 am is an ideal time for meditation or sleeping but a bad time for excessive consumption of alcohol,

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partying, dancing or other frenetic activity. Similarly at midday yang is at its peak and at the same time "baby yin" is born in preparation for the coming evening and night. Yin deficiency is often characterised by inability to sleep at night and people are sometimes reluctant to sleep during the day (however tired they are) because they are afraid this will make the insomnia worse. However a short nap somewhere between 11 am and 1 pm will nourish the new yin and may actually help insomnia.

Exercise is a yang activity and best done in the morning. Many joggers take to the streets in the early evening after work, but this is a yin time of day and a bad time for strenuous activity. Similarly the main meals of the day should be breakfast and lunch when there is plenty of yang in the digestive system. Eating late at night damages the yin of the stomach. In her book, "Listen to your Body" (written with Andrew Powell, University of Hawii Press, 2001) Guo



Bisong says that according to Traditional Chinese Medicine, each time you overeat in the evening you reduce your life expectancy by one day. (And each time you get drunk you reduce it by one month!)

A body which has strong energy and is in tune with the cycles of nature can be trusted to make its needs known. If it needs food or water, hunger or thirst will arise, if it need rest it will feel tired. The trouble is that we do not honour these signals and so the connection gets lost. We feel tired but instead of sleeping we have a cup of coffee to keep going. To begin with, smoking (or certain drugs) make us feel nauseous, but we keep going until this natural response is suppressed. We don't have time for breakfast and eventually no longer feel hungry in the mornings. When the body is unbalanced it starts to give out signals, which undoubtly have a short term logic, but which can lead to long term damage. Cravings for a cigarette, chocolate, coffee, sugar arise. The question is, how do we get back to a more natural way of living?

It has to be said that even for people who make good health a priority it is difficult to "do everything right" in a work situation. Breakfast and exercise before work and a nap at lunchtime are beyond the possibilities of many people. In her book, Guo Bisong makes the interesting proposal that one day a week there should be no routine and that we should make it a priority to respond to the needs of the body as they arise.

Their action has resulted in a £1.2 million project for which we the tax-payer will ultimately pay! The beneficiaries, apart from the mill, include the Row, 4 of which are second homes, and Hall Bank and the cottages behind the Mill. Again in these areas there are several second homes. We who live elsewhere on the route of this new sewer. have not been connected and would have to pay to be connected to the system. Furthermore the licensed septic tank emptiers have been told they can no longer empty their tankers either at Sedbergh of Kendal but must go to Lancaster or Barrow in twelve months

time as the two local sewerage plants cannot cope with the extra demand. So where does that leave the rest of us who play by the rules and pay our council tax? Furthermore we have lived in the midst of a building site for over 6 months. The traffic fumes from vehicles waiting at the traffic lights and exhaust fumes from generators running night and day have been so bad, that it was impossible to work in the garden or to lay hedges. It was so bad that even my sheep were coughing. This miraculously vanished when the traffic lights were taken away. At times we had difficulties actually getting in and out of our property. 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THE FARFIELD SAGA

The story so far: when *Pennine Tweeds*, a Farfield, Garsdale Road closed down., a public meeting was held to see if the building and the looms could be saved. A steering committee was formed to look into it and to report back to another public meeting within three months. So far most people spoken to seemed to be in favour.

The second public meeting loomed. There was interest from all parts of the community in getting something done about the building, but the obstacles were enormous. Well meant advice from helpful experts who had already completed a restoration project was not always helpful. "Buy the whole site. You will regret it later if you don't". We had no idea of where the money would come from to buy the one building much less the whole site. "Have a president who is a national figure." How many national figures would want to know about Sedbergh? "Your business plan should look sexy". Now there's a challenge, if we can even find some-one to write a business plan.

We needed money. We needed influential support. We needed professionals to write a business plan and advise us on setting up an organisation. It was not obvious where all these would come from. So it was decided to have a dinner, to cheer ourselves up and canvas for the practical support that would be needed. Some solid progress would have to be made if the second public meeting was to be persuade the project was in a position to go ahead.

The Masonic Hall was booked. The menu was chosen; loin of pork (from Steadman's of course) with prune stuffing





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and spicy red cabbage. A table plan showed we could seat 100 people. Volunteer cooks and waitresses were recruited and all was ready. The much enjoyed meal was followed by a fascinating illustrated talk from Mike Davies-Shiel, Cumbria's leading expert on mills. Mike showed slides of David Douglas who had set up Pennine Tweeds and Bryan Hinton who followed him, working the looms, operating the warp mil and winding the cones.

We learned that Farfield in some ways was unique and very precious. It had been in almost continuous production of cloth since 1837 (except for a short period during World War 2 and just after). Unlike most successful mills a town had not grown up around it to blot out the countryside. It still stood, a complex of buildings, almost exactly as it was over a hundred years before. The old stables have now been converted to houses, but if you stand in the mill yard there is not a building sight that was not built before the First World War.

The tall solid looking mills, three of which were worked by water power, are of a size and shape to accommodate both looms and spinning mules, with many large windows to make good use of

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natural light. Externally they have not changed. Still there are the houses, Farfield House and Oakdene built by the Dovers, a sign of the affluence of the owning family. Down by the Garsdale Bridge is the 'Row' built to house some of the workers.

Mike Davis-Shiel convinced his audience that Farfield was something special. It takes little imagination to see in the mind's eye how it must have been to travel as workers who by 6 in the morning had walked from Dent or Garsdale or Sedbergh in order to be at the mill before the bell, high on the building, warned that work was about to start. The many footpaths they used still converge on the mill buildings.

There were many people that evening who were inspired to work towards restoring Farfield Mill, giving it a modern purpose. Many of those people are still working on the project today as volunteers.

We were fired with enthusiasm but enthusiasm is not enough. What could we tell the public meeting? Yes, without doubt there was support, but would the owner sell Farfield Mill? Talks with the agent John Milton were positive and we learned that the owner John Entwistle was prepared to negotiate.

How about a national figure for a patron? To our great surprise, Lord Inglewpood and Michael Jopling MP both agreed to be patrons.

The professionals to draw up the business plan and give advice? Several came forward including a local solicitor, and John Whitehead, the Sedbergh Partnership Officer.

But the money? We found a book entitled. 'How to Rescue a Ruin'. It was most helpful where to find money but best of all it suggested that if a buildings preservation trust was set up it could join the Association of Preservation Trusts and qualify for advice, loans and grants from a national body called the Architectural Heritage Fund. This seemed a good start.

We were ready for the second public meeting. It was on 26th February 1993. The chairs in the Peoples' Hall were set out – not too many in case no-one came. The steering committee took their places at the front. The meeting was chaired by John Whitehead. To everyone's surprise, the chairs were soon filled. Reports were read out and from the audience came many warnings but also much helpful and constructive advice. There was no opposition. It was therefore duly agreed that a new Committee should be set up, to be called the Farfield Development Committee. Initially those prepared to serve on the Committee were Su and Tony Johnson, John Whitehead, David Booth, Winifred Howarth, Richard Thomas and Maureen Lamb.

The project was officially launched; but little did we know of the troubles that lay ahead.

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SEDBERGH TOWN BAND

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

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WOOF FAMILY

I am wondering if any of your readers would be prepared to help me? I am descended from a family by the name of "Woof" who as far as I know lived in Firbank, Westmoreland and Sedbergh. William, my great grandfather was born 16/03/1875, the son of Joseph Sagrott and Selina King. Joseph was my great great grandfather and he was born in London 26/12/1844. Joseph was the son of John Sagrott and Elizabeth Nowell.

John Sagrott was my great great great grandfather and was born in 1813 he married Elizabeth Nowell on 10/ 07/1841. Elizabeth was born on 7/03/1823 the daughter of John Nowell and Agnes Woof.


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HOW MUCH IS YOUR PHONE BILL?

Do you like paying that much? Well, if you are still paying BT for your telephone calls, you can make substantial savings. Because of government deregulation you now have a large choice of alternative line carriers and switching over couldn't be simpler. You remain a BT customer (continuing to pay for any extra services like Call Minder you may use) and continue paying your quarterly line rental (which covers the cost of repairs and maintenance) but the charges for your calls will be substantially reduced by having them all automatically re-routed to another company who will bill you for them. Since alternative

companies are competing for your custom, the cost of phone calls is nearly always cheaper, particularly on national, international and peak-time calls. For instance, BT charge 7.9p per minute for a national call at peak-time. It is possible to reduce this to 3.5p per minute. Also, BT charge by the minute so that for a call lasting 61 seconds you end up paying for 2 full minutes, whereas many alternative line carriers charge, pro-rata, by the second, so reducing costs further.

The only reason that BT can continue to charge such high rates is simply a reluctance we have for making the change. Only a small minority of people in the UK are currently enjoying reduced telephone charges, but as soon as



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consumers wise up on a large scale to the savings which are possible, BT will have to reduce in order to stay in competition.

And it isn't only your telephone bill which you can save on. It is four years since everyone in Britain has been able to choose their own gas and electricity supplier. But nearly two out of three of us have not changed even though it's nearly always cheaper than staying with the local company. You don't get any benefits for staying loyal to TXU Energi or British Gas and you are almost certainly paying far more than you need to as recent news coverage has highlighted. Edward Leigh MP, chairman of the House of Commons Public Accounts Committee, stated that "people

are getting ripped off" by staying with their local energy suppliers and the National Audit Office said one explanation for the failure of people to take advantage of cheaper alternative suppliers was "customer inertia". Callum McCarthy, chief executive of the energy regulator Ofgem said: "Domestic customers can benefit from the fall in wholesale prices by switching suppliers and cutting their electricity bills by up to 22%." (Ofgem estimate that around 167,000 people are switching electricity and gas suppliers every week.)

So, don't sit back and continue throwing away good money. Do something about it.

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

The YDNP Authority has published the Second Deposit Local Plan for public consultation, providing everyone with an opportunity to comment on proposed changes to local planning policy.

The publication of the Second Deposit Local Plan is a key milestone on the route to replacing the current Local Plan for the Yorkshire Dales National Park, which was adopted in 1996. The Local Plan sets out the National Park Authority's planning policies for new buildings and land use in the National Park and is used as the basis for determining all planning decisions.

The review of the current Local Plan began with the publication of the First

Deposit Local Plan in June 2002; at this time public consultation generated over 1,500 objections and letters of support relating to proposed policies from 248 organisations and individuals.

As a result of these objections and letters of support, the Second Deposit Local Plan contains a number of policy changes, including the proposed introduction of a policy where farm buildings may be permitted for conversion into local housing for rent; and up to 40 additional settlements, including Hanlith, Simonstone and Thorlby, to be included as areas where barn conversions will be allowed for local housing.

At the Second Deposit stage in the review process of the Local Plan, the



Authority is only able to accept objections or letters of support on policies that have been changed since the First Deposit Local Plan was circulated.

The Second Deposit Local Plan consists of written statements and proposed policies along with maps of towns and villages in the National Park that show, amongst other things, the proposed development boundaries.

All objections or letters of support must be received at the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's office in Bainbridge by post, fax or e-mail by noon Tuesday 29th July, 2003.

Copies of the Second Deposit Local Plan are now available for reference in local libraries, National Park Authority offices and National Park Centres. Copies

have also been sent to parish councils and a wide range of other local groups and organisations, which have an interest in the area. A copy of the text can be viewed on the Authority's website at www. yorkshiredales.org.uk. Further copies can be obtained by calling the Authority on (01969) 650456 or by emailing planning@yorkshiredales.org.uk.

Once the six-week consultation period is completed, all outstanding objections to the First and Second Deposit Local Plan will be referred to a Local Plan Inquiry, this will be followed by the publication of the Inspector's Report. The Local Plan will be modified again and placed on deposit for further consultation before the final Yorkshire Dales Local Plan is adopted in 2004.

Freud and Jung. Where Freud investigated the lower unconscious, Assagioli was also interested in the 'superconscious' or spiritual level of the personality. Thus he included in his healing work the development of a transpersonal self, through which we are in touch with purpose and meaning in our lives.

I work locally as a Psychosynthesis Therapist. Sessions are normally weekly for one hour. In the initial consultation I would take details, ask you to outline the problem, answer any queries and make practical arrangements. During subsequent sessions the client may bring any issues s/he wants to talk about, and together we explore it in different ways,

often simply talking.

The length of time necessary for therapy varies greatly according to the individual. Because Psychosynthesis can go deeply to the heart and soul of a person, it is not a 'quick fix', and the process usually takes six months to a year or longer. However it suits some clients to have only a few sessions at less depth, in order to gain a new perspective on a problem, or talk through a particular situation.



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pedestrian controlled lights on both crossings would greatly improve their safety'.

The role of the Parking Attendant Dick Base, Enforcement Officer, SLDC, is in charge of 12 staff which cover Ulverston, South Lakes and Kendal (Kendal covers Sedbergh & Kirkby Lonsdale). Dick explained that since decriminalised parking came into force 14,000 parking tickets have been issued. Capita/CCC are responsible for traffic regulation orders.

He agreed that the Devil's bridge area was a continuing problem, although the situation was improving since the reinstatement of the traffic regulation orders.

A tow-away system may be introduced as some tourists do not see the £25 fixed


penalty as a deterrent for illegal parking.

Regarding the problem of people parking on chevrons outside schools in the area, Dick explained that his team have no powers in this situation except in Ulverston which has the necessary traffic regulation order in place. Elsewhere it remains a police issue.

MAX NICHOLSON CB VCO

Someone who owned much to Sedbergh was Max Nicholson who died recently aged 98. His connection with the school is so far in the past that his name is hardly known here, and yet he was one of its most distinguished Old Boys during the last century. Partly that was because his name was not one to hit the headlines or make his mark on television, but his contribution to the life of our times was of enormous importance as a pioneer among those who raised our sights to the nature of the world in which we live and its fragile state.

Max came to Sedbergh in 1919 and quickly set about reviving the School Ornithology Society of which he became Secretary. In that capacity he gave a

lecture to members of the society on "British Warblers", it indicated his already considerable knowledge and interest in bird life which led to the publication of his first book on "Birds in England" in 1926 before going up to Oxford. It was followed by another: "How Birds Live" the following year. As a senior civil servant during the war years, and later as secretary to Herbert Morrison, Lord President of the Council, Max was given many opportunities for his fertile and critical mind to range over many aspects of government and the political scene with shrewd discernment. In 1950 he was appointed secretary to the organisation committee of the Festival of Britain, including the building of the Festival Hall. But his most far-

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reaching concern was the formation of the Nature Conservancy Council of which he became the first Director General from 1952 to 1966. In this capacity he had a major hand in founding the British Trust for Ornithology and the World Wild Life Fund, of which the Duke of Edinburgh and Prince Bernhardt of the Netherlands were persuaded to be patrons.

As Morrison's right hand man he had also the responsibility, in 1947, for seeing through parliament the Town and County Act which reflected the growing public interest in and concern for the environment. Indeed it is not too much to claim that it was largely due to Max that words like habitat, environment and biodiversity have become commonplace. In



1948 he was deservedly appointed C.B, and C.V.O in 1971.

Max's time at Sedbergh undoubtedly aroused and nourished his life long interest in wildlife, as he himself acknowledged. We should be proud to claim his as a Sedberghian.

He won many best of breeds and although only attending around nine championship shows he won four Champion certificates, together with Best of Breed each time, thus becoming a Show Champion. Shortly after this Alda was thrilled when Peter entered him in a field trial and he was awarded his qualifying certificate which allowed him to drop the 'Show' part and become a full Champion.

Alda remained very interested in her dogs even after suffering her first stroke, which prevented her walking and therefore showing. She recovered remarkably well and with Joan's

assistance, was able to lead a good life. After several years, another stroke made it difficult for her to live at Ellerthwaite so the decision was made for her to live in a nursing home in Somerset, near to her sister-in-law and niece and nephew. Her friend Joan left Ellerthwaite in August last year to move into a flat on Maryfell. However, having never lived by herself, felt very lonely and a few weeks ago moved to live with her brother near London. 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YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK


The YDNP Authority has been praised by the Audit Commission for its efforts to ensure the public have an enjoyable and interesting experience when visiting the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

The independent report graded the Authority's promoting understanding service as good and states that the current services have promising prospects for improvement.

The Review which took place throughout the last six months of 2002, looked at the Authority's Promoting Understanding service which seeks to enhance public access to the National Park, implement the Countryside & Rights of Way Act on behalf of the Countryside Agency and promote the public's understanding of the National Park and its role, beyond its boundaries.

The Authority's promoting understanding service was given two stars out of a possible three and the report concluded that visitors are highly satisfied - in particular with the range of leaflets and guided walk programme. The inspectors were also impressed with the Authority's efforts to engage new audiences in the care and conservation of the Yorkshire Dales.

The inspectors noted many positive points in the provision of the service including: the award-winning website, which was found to be both clear and easy to use; the education service and ranger team that provide activities and educational materials for a large number of students and school groups; and a survey from 2001 that showed 98 per



cent of those taking part in events thought they were excellent or very good.

However, the inspectors also pointed to a few areas where the Authority should seek to improve including: encouraging wider audiences to use the National Park, in particular helping individuals experiencing physical or sensory impairment; looking at why sections of the local community have a negative perception of the National Park and the need to improve communications to overcome this; and linking the work of the Authority with the world-wide environmental work.

The Audit Commission is an independent body responsible for ensuring that public money is spent economically, efficiently and effectively, to achieve high-quality local and national services for the public. Their work covers local government, housing, and health and criminal justice services.




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SEDBERGH & DISTRICT BEEKEEPERS ASSOCIATION



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SETTLEBECK HIGH SCHOOL WORKING WITH THE RSC

Visits to Kendal Leisure Centre, 21st and 22nd May 2003

Being involved with teaching Drama, sometimes marvellous opportunities come your way. One such opportunity presented itself when the Royal Shakespeare Company visited Kendal Leisure Centre at the end of May, some months back. I had booked sixteen tickets for one afternoon performance of Coriolanus and thought no more of this. Subsequently sixteen invitations to a morning "insight session" arrived. A week later the RSC's Education Director, Virginia Grainger, rang to offer Settlebeck their own drama workshop during the visit.

It's extraordinary what goes into an RSC tour. During the morning before the performance we saw a time-lapse video of the construction of a stage and seating area and marvelled at how a common sports hall becomes a theatre. Lighting and sound experts demonstrated their parts in the overall production. Actors and actresses demonstrated fight scenes and how to deliver Shakespeare's language for maximum effect. Finally, question and answer section allowed students to ask about careers in the theatre. This was before we'd seen the play, which was a fine example of RSC at really did excel herself this year! its best.

The next day it was back in the minibus and away for our very own workshop. GCSE Drama students in Year 9 and 10 were treated to a fast moving activitybased session run by the RSC's

MAY WEATHER

Well this month was rather damp, certainly compared to the earlier months of the year. In fact had it finished as it had started it could well have been as wet as the rest put together. We ended up with 4.26". Although the pressure did not leave the 29" mark it was usually at the lower end and as a result it was a breezy month again. A maximum wind speed recorded of 27.1 mph from a NNE direction. Only one day did not record a maximum in double figures with 7.8 mph from the west. Temperatures, as you would expect, climbed so the lowest maximum was 52.7F. Several nights dropped into the 30s with a minimum of 36.9F. The last week returned to the



weather of previous months with no measurable rainfall and temperatures reaching 73F and night time temperatures staying in the 50s most of the week. The warmth and wet brought a spurt in plant growth resulting in much grass cutting for gardeners but welcome feed for livestock. The warm humid conditions had a down-side with a crop of fly-strike cases in sheep. After the wonderful show from dandelions it was the month of the buttercup to show its gold. Certainly there has been sufficient nectar flow for some bees to load up their stores. Several beekeepers have had swarms probably due to the rapid build up earlier in the season followed by a drop in foraging during the wet part of the month. I have still only seen 2 house martins so far this season and 1 baby blackbird. Unless we get rid of some magpies we shall have fewer small birds and not so small. One of the local thieves has robbed out both woodpigeon and collared dove in our garden and I suspect been responsible for both thrush and blackbird leaving eggs.

As chair of Calderdale Healthcare NHS Trust from 2000-2001, she led a major reorganisation of healthcare within the district prior to the trust's merger.



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JULY GARDENING

The weeds in the vegetable garden seem to be having an exceptionally good year and so I had to spend a good length of time the other day weeding around the peas and beans in order to give them a fighting chance. While doing that I discovered that something had been having a quiet munch at some of the pea plants. I assume that the culprits are mice, or voles, as the plot is rabbit fenced. The damage was recent and half a dozen nice chopped offshoots were left on the ground, so I tested them for flavour and found them to be quite tasty. Eating pea shoots may seem a little strange but it is actually quite an old idea. In the Victorian era when large kitchen gardens were popular, peas were forced in glasshouses at temperatures of 75 degrees Fahrenheit, in January, in order to produce shoots for pea soup. The exact origin of the cultivated pea is unknown, although it is thought that it may have arisen from the crossing of two types of



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wild pea, one from Europe and the other from Russia, to form a large seeded hybrid. Peas have been cultivated in this country since the time of Henry VIII and by Elizabeth I reign a variety called the Carlin Pea was popularly grown as a drying pea, and eaten on Carlin Sunday in Lent. Nowadays peas are usually grown as a green vegetable, and they come in two forms" round and wrinkled seeded. Round seeded peas have a higher starch content and are consequently hardier than the sweeter wrinkled seeded peas. The former can be sown early in the year but the latter taste better and I think they are well worth waiting for. In this area the variety Hurst Green Shaft seems to produce a good reliable crop- that is, if the mice don't eat them first.

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YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

A report to the YDNP Authority's Planning Committee, meeting in Sedbergh, confirmed that permission had been granted for nearly 1,000 new homes over the last ten years in the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

Over 450 new homes have been granted planning permission, 432 conversions of traditional buildings have been permitted as well as 23 sub-divisions of existing homes.

The number of new homes is double the figure expected by the requirements set out in the North Yorkshire Joint Structure Plan (adopted 1995) - the overall policy document for building and development in the area - which suggested the need for up to 550 new homes throughout the ten year period.

In the South Lakeland District Council area, 63 conversions have been granted permission and 152 new buildings were allowed.

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There are over 10,000 houses in the Yorkshire Dales National Park, with a resident population of 20,000 people. ①

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SETTLEBECK HIGH SCHOL

The Settlebeck Well Uncovered During the preparation and excavation of the site of the new Settlebeck Learning Resource Centre we were astonished and delighted to uncover an early Victorian well in excellent condition. The well is six metres deep, beautifully lined in local stone, and when it was uncovered it still contained a little water. From the position of the well, some five metres from the old front porch of Settlebeck House, you can clearly see the house's date stone, 1836. It could be presumed that the well dates from the early years of the house, and may have been the original water supply.

The school has considered the options for the well. One obvious one – the cheapest in fact- is to simply fill it in with concrete and cap it, so that it will no longer be seen. Another is to back-fill the shaft to a certain depth, and place a glass cover and light within the remaining depth to create a feature. We would prefer the latter option, because, although this well is not considered archaeologically significant, it <u>is</u> unusual in Sedbergh. It is part of the community's history and we are keen to preserve it for the school and the community.

In order to undertake the necessary work to preserve the well we need expressions of interest and support from individuals and groups within the community.
