#### ALGAL BLOOMS

Algal blooms are caused predominantly by blue-green algae and have been hitting which may be due to the natural the headlines for quite a number of years but their cause and, to some extent, their effects are less clear. At their worst they can cause unsightly, smelly and dangerous conditions that may impact not cyanobacteria (blue green algae) bloom only on wildlife, but also on farm animals depends upon local conditions and site and human exploitation of that water body. Both our Environment Agency and the World Health Organisation have published guidelines concerning safe use of and access to waters affected by blooms but a key issue is whether or not the bloom is producing toxins or not. At their worst algal toxins can cause illnesses such as dermatitis, gastroenteritis, atypical pneumonia and hepatoenteritis in humans. Symptoms of these include skin rashes, eye irritation, vomiting, diarrhoea, fever and pains in muscles and joints in those that swallow or swim through the concentrated scums. The toxins can also cause severe illness and death to wild, farm and domestic animals. However, from personal experience, you can wade around in "bloom water" while launching and sailing boats with no harm at all. Simple : take action to slow down or reverse the advice would be to not keep cuts covered, inutrient build up eg Windermere wash after immersion and not to drink the introduced "phosphorus stripping" to the water!

Blooms that have occasioned the posting of precautionary notices by the Environment Agency have affected Killington Lake in recent years. In its catchment there have been improvements to the drainage of surrounding fields. The motorway service area discharges treated wastes into the lake. The large population of birds that nest and roost on the lake also introduce a large amount of wastes gleaned not only from within the catchment but further afield. unsurprisingly, both parties are lost for words, and the book ends on an ambivalent note. Are Alix's attempts to reconnect her mother and the would-be killer for the purposes of reconciliation and 'serenity' well-judged, or is the lack of communication between the two revealing that this initiative is well-meaning, but only at best fruitless and at worst confirming in public an unbridgeable gap, thus perpetuating Roddy's status as outsider. Both of these events proved enormously successful and it was a delight to watch young people grow in confidence and maturity before our eyes.

Particular mention must be made of the astonishing achievement of Caroline Lamb, who wrote the script for *Sweeney Todd* (out of interest, in her spare time!), wrote all the song lyrics to accompany



Mr Graham's inspired music, designed the poster and tickets, designed, compiled and typed the programme, designed the set and, finally, acted the all-singing, alldancing role of Mrs Lovett. In the whole of my career I have never known the equal of this achievement combining drama, art and English skills. Caroline was undoubtedly the star of the show. The ethos among the cast for this performance was also exceptional. They worked together so well, supporting each other and always positive, cheerful and brimming with enthusiasm. A big thank you to Mr Graham and Mr Banks for making it such a success, but especially to Caroline.

Having spent a week in Slovenia with thirty of our students I was also cheered by their tremendous spirit and goodwill towards one another and towards everyone they came into conatact with. This was hopefully a very significant event, not only for Settlebeck, but also for the town. Perhaps in 2055 staff and students will be able to look back over fifty years of Zrece/Sedbergh visits to this first link that laid the foundation for our friendship, and students will be able to ask their grandparents what it was like for them when they visited the Zrece secondary school, the Postojna caves, Ljubliana and the Gorenje centre.

These programmes were extremely effective at highlighting the link between diet and behaviour, between good nutrition and healthy bodies and minds. I watched with interest at the solutions offered by these programmes and felt a good deal of satisfaction that Settlebeck could have shown them the way from the start. We are proud of our kitchen staff and their rigorous standards. At Settlebeck we source all of our vegetables and meat locally. Maureen, Linda and Joan prepare nearly all meals from scratch, and they are made to a high nutritional standard. Every day there is a good choice of healthy wholesome meals (I know because I eat them!) and fizzy sugary canned drinks are not sold in the school.

I believe there is a direct link between the high standards of behaviour and attention to learning at Settlebeck and the quality of school meals. Jamie Oliver's dinner ladies should have paid Maureen a visit to see how it's done.

Sedbergh beekeepers held their 9<sup>th</sup> Annual General Meeting on 21<sup>st</sup> March, nineteen members and guests attending. The formal business was quickly covered; the Chairman's, Treasurer's, and Secretary's reports for 2004/5 were all very encouraging, highlighting that the club had gained a lot of new members, had achieved a very full and successful programme of meets through the year, and that the club's finances were even stronger! All hoped and expected that the 2006 season would be even better. The out-going Chairman, John Tallon, was presented with our superb new club trophy - a beautifully crafted wooden model beehive made and given to the club by Bill & Mary Eglin - for his outstanding contribution to the club. The new committee was then elected: Vic Hopkins, Chairman; Mike Hart, Treasurer; Malcolm F-U, Secretary, and

Tommy Brooks, John Rogers, and Bill Eglin, Ordinary Members.

The club was also well represented at the Sedbergh Spring Show on 2<sup>nd</sup> April. Vic Hopkins, our new Chairman, is to be congratulated for winning a Highly Commended award for the club's organisation stand that he set up in the Masonic Hall at very short notice indeed due to sudden illness of the usual presenter. Richard Nankivell, the Show celebrity, was most complimentary both at the time and on air afterwards on Radio Cumbria! Also to be congratulated are the winners of the honey and wine classes in the Produce Section of the show

From mid-April, if the weather is favourable and the bees can find sufficient fresh pollen and nectar to feed the many new bee larvae that the nurse bees are raising from the tens of thousands of eggs that the queen lays, the beekeeper can expect some of the

stronger colonies to decide to swarm, i.e. reproduce the colony by dividing into two. This process usually affects the amount of honey that the bees can make and beekeepers therefore have ways to deal with the problem. Our last evening meeting of the pre-season before the start of the apiary visits was on Monday 18th April, when Bill Smith presented to eighteen members his own approach to managing the natural instinct of the bees to swarm. He described and demonstrated his own variation of the well-known Snelgrove method of moving the queen from a colony that has indicated its intention to swarm into an extra 'hive' placed above the hive that would otherwise swarm, which tricks the colony into believing that it has indeed swarmed. Both of the new colonies continue to collect honey while a new queen is born in the lower hive, so that neither bees nor honey is lost. After the honey season is over, the two colonies are united again!



#### SETTLEBECK HIGH SCHOOL

New Recreation Area

Anyone visiting Settlebeck through the rear of the building (from the tennis court : Thanks to Mike Tebay for his tireless area) cannot fail to notice an impressive transformation to the rear garden area. What was very overgrown, dark, damp, and muddy lawn unusable for nine months of the year has now been given a total face-lift. Thanks to Jeff Cresswell and M K Conversions the tulip tree has been cut back, the yew tree lower branches and various overgrown shrubs removed to let in the light and air. #### A SEDBERGH VIEWPOINT

I was expecting to have to eat humble pie this month; but thankfully I don't have to. Last month I wrote that I believed there was a £1,000 fine liable for allowing your dog to foul in the street and you not poop scooping up the deposit. Someone drew to my attention the fact that there are little round signs on make you liable for an initial fixed several street light columns (an appropriate place no doubt) indicating that the maximum fine is only £100. I've not previously noticed these signs. No wonder, they are quite small (about 4 inches across - like a small ash tray), many have faded in the Sedbergh weather, and many of them have been broken into two pieces still on the lamp column. signs (some are just stickers on lamp posts) which do give the maximum fine as £1,000. Inspector Hound thought he had better investigate and I've discovered that under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996, "if you allow your dog to foul, you must clean it up or scoop the poop straight away. Failing to do this will penalty of £50. and persistent offenders will (?) be taken to a Magistrates Court and face a fine of up to £1,000." The regulations are enforced by South Lakeland District Council and apply to "all land within/on the District Council's boundary which is in the open air to which the public are entitled or permitted to have access with or without payment including all roads with a speed limit of





## NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

The Neighbourhood Watch office in Kendal is now under new management and, with their new Voice Connect system, your area and local Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators will have already witnessed on increase in the number of crime alerts being sent out by the Kendal Office. If these alerts relate to your area, you should have heard about them from your local co-ordinator.

At a meeting of area co-ordinators in Kendal in early April, the Neighbourhood Watch officers stressed the importance of two-way communication between the police and the public. The new Voice Connect system will keep us in the community better informed but we must do our bit too. Notifying the police of

suspicious activity is absolutely vital in the fight against crime and the officers were at pains to emphasise the following points.

- You will never be criticised for giving information that proves to be of no value.
- The most trivial suspicious events can be significant. Even if you have the most minor concern, notify the police. Computerised data collection systems used by the police bring all these little items of information together and your observation may provide the missing link.
- If you see a crime being committed, telephone 999.
- If you wish to report suspicious activity, then phone the police on



- 01539 722611 and say you are a Neighbourhood Watch member.
- In reporting suspicious activity, give good descriptions of people, their clothing and any vehicles involved with vehicle registration number if possible.

Neighbourhood Watch staff also voiced their concerns about "doorstep crime". Be alert to unknown callers. Do not let them into your home without convincing evidence of their good intentions. Be alert to distractions which cause you to leave callers unsupervised in your home. Be aware they may have an accomplice entering your property by another door while you are distracted by the caller. Do not agree to work being done to your house or garden by uninvited workmen.

Police statistics tell us that about 30 of burglaries occur in unlocked premises. 'Sneak in' theft is common. Keep your house locked at all times.

With the approach of the gardening season, car boot sales will be awash with gardening equipment. Make sure it isn't stolen from your garden shed. Lock it! And when the warm weather comes and you have that barbeque in the garden, just make sure that sneak-in thief can't get into your house. Lock the doors you cannot see.

We all want to live in a safe and secure environment. A watchful community is a major weapon in the fight against crime. Please do you bit. Be alert to crime and, above all, act if you are suspicious. Don't dismiss it. Report it!

## MAY GARDENING

Some plants have rather unprepossessing English names and if someone offered me a 'Buffalo currant' as an ornamental garden plant I might not be too enthusiastic about taking them up on the idea. It sounds so much more like an enormous, cow flavoured fruit than a beautiful flowering bush. In this case the botanical name, Ribes odorata is far more descriptive, although I would have preferred to call it *Ribes fragrantissima*, because the attractive racemes of yellow flowers have a beautiful clove scent, reminiscent of old fashioned pinks. R. *odorata* is one of the parents of another very beautiful currant, R. x gordonianum. Chris Wood This shrub has long racemes of flowers red outside and yellow within, produced in early summer. Both of the above plants are very hardy and produce strong growing shrubs, rather similar in habit to our more common, familiar "Flowering currant" (R.sanguineum). Much less hardy, and requiring a warm south facing wall in a sheltered spot is R. speciosum, the "Fuchsia flowered currant". This species has long, tubular flowers, bright red in colour, with long pendulous stamens.

Similar in growth and habit and leaf shape to the hardy currants but grown for their foliage rather than their flowers are two Physocarpus. One, "Dart's Gold" has bright golden yellow foliage in spring and the other "Diabolo" has dark red (almost black) leaves. Both make striking additions to the shrub border and are very easily grown.

daffodils. I didn't get over to see the "Wordsworth" daffodils this time but I understand they are becoming concerned that the small wild ones are hybridizing with cultivated ones. There has been a lot of bird activity this month with lots of tits at the bird table along with groups of finches and ubiquitous house sparrow. There does not seem to be a shortage around here. Each dawn and dusk the singing is punctuated by the alarm calls of blackbirds as they try to defend their nests from magpies. I regularly have 4 of these black and white bandits in the garden! Foxes, badgers and rabbits are about most nights with the latter running the gauntlet of the cats during the daytime. I finally put one of my clockers (broody hen) to use by putting some eggs under her. I have had clockers throughout December, January and February. Another first for me to have them so early, is this another sign of global warming? We had a frog hopping around the utility room but we haven't had any frog spawn in the pond. Newts have been active on the warmer days. They obviously bred there last year as there are some efts about (young newt). []

Sweeney comes to Sedbergh Sedbergh's Settlebeck High School entertained parents, students and friends with their end of term 'Sweeney Todd' in an atmospheric set, well-crafted text and lyrics written by Year 10 student, Caroline Lamb, produced and directed by Head of Drama, Nigel Banks, with Music Director David Graham, sensitively composing all the show's catchy tunes. Sweeney Todd himself was played with neurotic intensity by Laurence Hansen Diamond, while Caroline Lamb was excellent as the crafty, possessive Mrs Lovett, owner of the notorious Fleet Street pie shop. With strong performances from Ian Mitchell, as corrupt Judge Turpin, and a touchingly played and sung ward, Jenny Lamb's Johanna, the ardent and innocent lover Anthony, Joel Davies, and the slapstick duo of Ryan Iveson and Brad Dalzell as Signor Pirelli and his con-man sidekick Tobias, the show bounced along, revealing love tangles, clever nichemarketing techniques, wicked law officers - the chilling Beadle Bamford of Matthew Kirsch was notable here – some nice cameos – notably Cally Steadman - , and a cheery supporting chorus of singing and dancing streetgirls, madhouse inmates, ruled by the brazen, bullying Mrs Wadsworth of Hannah Fearnhead. The final hours of both Todd and Mrs Lovett were particularly dramatic – electric moments from both leads as the show reached a gripping climax. Costumes and make-up were handled with care for detail, Noel Bertram conducted a skilled band. Bill Longlands lit the show with calm authority and

concentration, and the alert and meticulous backstage team of Andrew Britton and Ian Bainbridge kept proceedings moving at an efficient pace.
