


And Lisa Carr, Emma Watten, and Dr. Clare Mingins who helped with the concert and workshops, Pat Walker who



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# ACUPUNCTURE - AS SEEN ON TV

A few weeks ago there was an hour-long programme devoted to acupuncture, part of the BBC2 series "Alternative Medicine: the Evidence". It was very wide ranging, both geographically and in terms of the variety of situations in which acupuncture was shown.

For me, as an acupuncturist, it was very moving to see an acupuncturist in China, using the same acupuncture points in the same way I would use them myself. It gave me a sense of the purity of transmission of this knowledge down the ages in China and from China to the West.

An American trial was reported, which showed acupuncture to be effective in giving pain relief from osteoarthritis of the knee. One woman was featured who was obviously extremely happy with the pain relief she was experiencing. It would have been useful to know who many treatments had been given and how frequently. In China, a course of

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treatment often consists of one treatment a day for ten consecutive days. Here we more often treat once or twice a week.

The big drama of the programme was a young woman undergoing open heart surgery using acupuncture alongside local anaesthetic to numb the chest, but without general anaesthetic. She was conscious throughout the operation and she was well enough to leave the hospital two days later. We saw her queuing up to pay her bill, which was one third of the cost of an operation using general anaesthetic.

It was very interesting to see the acupuncturist massaging the "third eye" point between the patient's eyebrows during the operation. This point is called Yintang in Chinese and it is used to "calm the spirit". Many acupuncture points have this indication and most patients find the effect of acupuncture to be very relaxing. It is not unusual for people to fall asleep with the needles in place and only to wake up when I disturb them by coming to take the needles out.

The final part of the programme was about a research project, which had been conducted at York. This investigated the effect of acupuncture on the brain using a

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powerful MRI scanner. This was of particular personal interest for me, because the acupuncturist involved in the research, Hugh McPherson, was instrumental in getting me started on my acupuncture training. When I first met him he was principal of the Northern College of Acupuncture. I had called in to just pricking yourself with a sewing the college to enquire about courses and I met Hugh in the hallway. He, like me, started off as a mathematician, so we had a lot in common. The result of our conversation was that shortly afterwards I found myself on the pavement outside the reaches parts of the brain (including the college in the sunshine, holding a letter of limbic system), which mere needle acceptance onto the acupuncture course in my hand.

In traditional Chinese acupuncture, after recordings of this programme, which I the needle has been put in place, it is lightly manipulated to obtain a special sensation known as "deqi" (pronounced "day-chee") or the arrival of the qi. This is typically a feeling of heaviness or a dull ache (some patients call it a "thud").

This can be perceptible to the acupuncturist as well and is sometimes described as the needle feeling heavy or like a fish taking the bait.

The degi sensation is the signal that the body has noticed the presence of the needle in a way which is different from needle. It is thought to be important for initiating the body's healing processes. On the programme, Hugh was visibly thrilled by the results of the research, which showed that the degi sensation insertion cannot reach.

# MARCH GARDENING

Years ago, when I worked at Harlow Car Arboretum I would take in the glossy Gardens at Harrogate, I developed a route which I would take around the garden which took in various plants, not for their flowers or for their shape, but for the fragrance of their leaves. First on the route was the strangely named "Headache Tree" (Umbellularia californica), a rather unassuming evergreen with mid green oval leaves. The crushed foliage is richly aromatic but has to be sniffed with caution - in some folks it induces a sharp headache. Interestingly it makes a traditional remedy for headaches either as rotundifolia) whose tiny round dark green an infusion, or bound to the forehead. (I think I would hide in a darkened room if I when rubbed between the fingers. tried this method).

Next on the route was Wintergreen (Gaultheria procumbens). Its small dark green leathery leaves yield oil of wintergreen an anti septic, anti inflammatory substance which relieves aches and pains, is used in perfumes and as a toothpaste flavouring. Going on

down the Gardens to the end of the green foliage of the Western Red Cedar (Thuja plicata) a plant frequently used for hedging or shelterbelts. This one smells richly of pineapple. Its two cousins, American and Chinese Arborvitae, though less fragrant, are both used medicinally, the former in cancer therapy and eczema treatment, and the latter for coughs, arthritic pain and premature baldness.

Lastly in a sunny space on the rockery I would sniff the Mint bush (Prostanthera leaves give off a rich fruity minty smell Prostanthera leaves retain their fragrance long after they are dried - as do the leaves of the headache tree. I carry an odd one around in a pocket for weeks on end and unearth it for a surreptitious sniff from time to time whether I have a head ache



Their work is difficult and dangerous. Both sides accuse them of "getting in the way". They reply that it is time the conflicting parties tried the way of peace!

John Lynes is a Quaker member of the team working in Israel, and on Sunday March 12th, while on a short home-visit

to Britain, he is coming to Sedbergh to talk and answer questions about practical peacemaking in Israel and Iraq. This will be a wonderful opportunity to meet someone who puts his own life on the line every day. John is a friend and colleague of some of the hostages, and can take us behind the headlines and the TV pictures to help us understand the conflict better.

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# DENT STORES 'USE IT OR LOSE IT'

How many shops do you think there were in Dent one hundred years ago, in 1906? Twice as many as today? Ten times? Answer: there were 18 grocers and four butchers, making 22 food shops in all. Today only one of them is left: James Dinsdale's, now known as Dent Stores. And 2006 could be the year when that goes the way of all the others.

Two thousand village stores and corner shops close every year as the people they once served turn to the supermarkets in nearby towns. At a parish meeting on January 23rd, attended by more than a hundred Dentdale residents, it was announced that Dent Stores could close by the summer unless local folk switch a

little - just a little -of their supermarket spend back to their local shop. Use it, or lose it!

An Action Group was formed to see what can be done to keep the shop open. By the time you read this, every household in the dale should have received a pink questionnaire designed to find out what would bring more customers back to the shop more regularly. Different opening hours? More organic produce? Local specialities? The questionnaire is anonymous. We want everyone to feel free to say what they think, in complete confidence. And the Action Group is independent of the shop.

Given the level of concern expressed at the meeting, it would be easy to create a short-term surge in buying - but quite

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another matter to sustain it over the months and years ahead. We could all so easily slip back into old habits! So we are inviting residents to consider joining a more permanent Friends of Dent Stores group, to keep the campaign going. "Friends" would promise to support the shop in whatever way they find most convenient: a small commitment, but it could be a lifeline.

There is far more than the survival of one business at stake. If the shop goes, what next? The bus service? The Post Office? The school? Our visitor attractions? We *can* stop Dentdale from becoming one more dead community but only by *taking action now*. Losing the shop could be the first step towards Dent becoming no more than a residential outpost of Sedbergh! No disrespect to Sedbergh, but that's not what we want!

We don't have to go the way of other rural communities which have allowed "free market forces" or "big business" to roll over them and destroy their way of life. We don't have to do much: just speak our minds, tell the shop what we want, divert just a small part of our monthly spend from our favourite supermarket (we all have one!) to our

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# HISTORY SOCIETY

'A Year at Killington Hall' with Mrs Judith Robinson

Judith is a member of the Society and a large audience turned out for her presentation of 'The 1876 Diary of Agnes Ann Kendal' which is the title of a book she has recently published.

Agnes Ann was the 8<sup>th</sup> and youngest child of Robert and Elizabeth Kendal (nee Fawcett).

Robert was a tenant farmer at Killington Hall which is where Ann lived along with her unmarried older sister Sarah and brother John.

The diary gives a quite fascinating insight into life in Victorian England through the eyes of a 19 year old farmers daughter.

Judith was congratulated for bringing the diary to life in such a compelling way with old and new photographs interspersed with voice-overs reading extracts from the diary. What would Agnes have thought if she had known her most private diary had been made so public 130 years later?

Today we regard Killington Hall as somewhat isolated. In 1876 we hear of a constant stream of social visitors and frequent outings to Kendal, Orton, Sedbergh and occasionally to Cautley. The 'Red Lion Inn' was only across the yard but the family were tee-total.

The diary reveals Agnes to be a committed Christian and although the Anglican Church was only yards away it was to the Vale of Lune Chapel, then



non-conformist and now known as St Gregory's, that Agnes went to worship and teach at Sunday School. Making 2 trips on Sunday would have meant walking about 16 miles.

She rather surprisingly made no reference to shopping of having any money other than pocket money.

She enjoyed baking and there are references to sewing, dress-making, mangling, cleaning and churning butter. She only seemed to help on the farm with milking cows and bringing in the hay; 116 carts and 47 sleds in 1876.

The highlight of the year was the visit to Orton Pot Fair in June where the previous year she had met her future husband Jim Wharton and to whom she was secretly betrothed.

Her courtship and Jim's visits

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

would often catch the train to Tebay from Sedbergh, even hitch a lift on a goods train and frequently walk the 13 miles back home.

It was 5 years later on February 9th. the day before her 25<sup>th</sup> birthday, that they were married. Sadly they did not live happily ever after. On Dec. 5<sup>th</sup> she gave birth to a son but 3 days later she was dead as was her son 10 days later.

Jim remarried, moved to Kendal and had 9 children. No photos were kept of Agnes and there is no gravestone for her and her son in Orton Churchyard.

Happily the diary survives and having been handed down through Jim's family to Judith's aunt and now the book is a fitting memorial.

Judith was warmly thanked for sharing this in such a delightful way.

Kirkby Lonsdale Embroiderers meet on the second Thursday in the month from 2 to 4pm at Cowan Bridge Village Hall. We have a varied programme of talks and 'hands on' activities with a textiles focus.

We began the New Year with a fascinating talk on 'Ruskin Lace' by the leading exponent and teacher of this technique, Elizabeth Prickett. She gave us the history of the revival of the linen industry in the Lake District by John Ruskin, and the introduction of lace making there. Her talk was amusing, as well as informative, and the samples of work she brought were an inspiration.

Another inspirational teacher is Anne Burrow and we were lucky enough to have a workshop run by her at the end of January, which involved preparing and decorating bands of fabric, which were then woven together and further embellished. The finished pieces of "new" fabric were then made into bags, purses, cushions etc.

On February 9th we were again looking to the crafts of the past as Eileen Scholes entertained us with a talk about the history of rag rug making, which many will remember fondly from their childhoods. She is a great enthusiast of this craft and has produced some very eve catching designs in both hooked and 'prodded' mats. She demonstrated both techniques and explained when each would be used. She also showed us how this is a very useful technique for recycling, as all the wool used in her rugs is second hand, mainly obtained from jumble sales.



On 9th March we are very privileged to have a speaker of national renown – Daphne Ashby – who is most famous for her best selling book (well best selling

amongst embroiderers!) 'Colour through Gold'. She has had a long career as an embroiderer and teacher, producing a range of different techniques in her finished pieces, which have

been widely exhibited.

The speaker at our April meeting, June Corner, has chosen an intriguing subject 'Naughty but Nice – Knickers!' and we are looking forward to an entertaining afternoon. If you would like to join us for this or any of our other meetings, we would make you very welcome.

# SEDBERGH SCHOOL GIRLS FUND

The Committee of Management will meet shortly to consider applications for grants for educational tuition and/or educational facilities from girls resident in the parishes of SEDBERGH, GARSDALE and DENT. - b) The provision of financial assistance, outfits, clothing, tools, instruments or books to enable beneficiaries on leaving school, a University or any other educational establishment, to prepare for, or to assist their entry into, a profession, trade or calling;
- c) The award of Scholarships or Maintenance Allowances to enable beneficiaries to travel abroad to

pursue their education;

- d) The provision, or assistance towards the provision, of facilities, of any kind not normally provided by the Local Education Authority, for recreation and social and physical training, including the provision of coaching in athletics, sports and games, for beneficiaries who are receiving primary, secondary or further education;
- e) The provision of financial assistance to enable beneficiaries to study music or other arts; and
- f) In otherwise promoting the education of beneficiaries.

In this Scheme, the expression of "beneficiaries" means girls who were born, or who have for not less than three years been resident in the Parishes of Sedbergh, Garsdale and Dent, and who in the opinion of the Committee, are in need of financial assistance.

# **SEDBERGH & DISTRICT** BEEKEEPERS' ASSOCIATION

March is the time that caring beekeepers start to worry, and wish that the spring warmth and the spring flowers would get a move on! It is the dangerous month, when any mistakes made at the close of last season when the bees were put to bed show up, and new mistakes can be made that will adversely affect both the colony and the honey crop in the season just starting!

This is because the colony is getting back into gear, the queen has started to lay eggs to produce new workers to replace the old 'winter' worker bees that are dying off. A healthy colony in June may have 50,000 workers buzzing away, but at the end of February/start of March the total will have fallen to 15,000 or less. These 'old ladies' have to get out and find sufficient fresh pollen to feed the hungry new grubs, even if there is still sufficient honey left in the hive from last summer, or the beekeeper has fed



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additional sugar syrup or sugar fondant at a time when they could reach it from their tight cluster around the queen.

If the beekeeper or the weather, or both, have been mean to the bees, this is the time that a colony can die from starvation - a tragic sight indeed. Which is why we carefully feed them in September, and keep checking the weight of the hives through the winter by 'hefting' them, to re-assure ourselves they will not go short of food for themselves or the new brood.

Beekeepers' spirits rise on the occasional lovely warmish, windless, sunny winter day, when the sun shines on the front of the hives and warms them, and the bees pour out in large numbers to relieve themselves. All is well. They don't stay out long, but for a few minutes the sound of buzzing makes spring seem a little nearer! Then the beekeeper must resist the temptation to take a little look inside, or start to 'spring feed' too soon, or the hive could become congested with the queen short of room to lay - a wellknown reason for the colony to decide to swarm, although they won't do so until May. You see why this is the time of the year for worrying. It is easy to do too little or too much!

Sedbergh beekeepers will be at the 10<sup>th</sup> Sedbergh Spring Show on April 1<sup>st</sup>, with our organisation stand in the St John Ambulance rooms in Bainbridge Road, and our mead, honey, and beeswax products competing in the Home Produce Section in the People's Hall. If you would like to learn more about bees and honey, come along and ask as many questions as you like!

# TIM FARRON MP

As I wrote in my last column parking appears to becoming a bit of an issue in Sedbergh at the moment. The new resident's parking scheme does not appear to be particularly geared towards making life for the people in Sedbergh any easier and certainly at lot more expensive.

However, the District Council at the moment do not appear to share the belief that there is a parking problem in Sedbergh. The letter I have received from them basically denies that there is any problem with parking in the town and says that if people do have an issue then they are most welcome to purchase a year this conflict brings very clearly in their long parking voucher from South Lakeland District Council at the cost of

£270 just like anyone else in the district. One of the problems is that parking is a major source of revenue for the District Council (in fact it is their largest source of revenue after the money that they receive from us as council tax and inland revenue tax payers). This means that they have to balance two competing objectives. On the one hand they want to support businesses in the area, to do this they need to provide easy access to parking so that businesses can attract the customers that they need. On the other hand they want to generate as much money as possible from this parking. I fear that we are seeing the challenges that response to my letter. They say that,

whilst not ruling out the possibility of

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providing more parking, they doubt that it regime means that the movement is in will happen because it is unlikely to generate a reasonable return on the council's investment. Particularly if the parking that is being provided is free or low cost as people who have contacted me seem to want.

This is just another example of what I mean when I talk about joined up Government, or the absence of it in this case. There are so many examples of different parts of Government working to different objectives and as a result nothing ever really happening. The current issues with the Westmorland General Hospital is another case in point, on the one hand the Secretary of State for Health says that she wants to bring health care closer to the people who need it and yet on the other, the current budgetary

exactly the opposite direction as the drive for efficiency leads to bigger and more centralised hospitals.

I could come up with a dozen similar examples on issues ranging from Post Offices to housing.

One of my roles in recent months on several issues has been to get everyone from the different sides to sit down and work out what they want to happen. So far we have been fairly successful, let's see if we can achieve something good in Sedbergh.

**Swifts** 

How swift is a swift? People make all kinds of guesses. The only certain answer is that they are very very swift. As they go screaming round the housetops on a long summer evening you can only gasp in wonder. These are the real masters of the air, always in a hurry to get here in the early summer; the last of the summer migrants; in too much of a hurry to make a proper nest, just content with a small scrape under the eaves of a tall building, the Bull or White Hart, or Lupton House; in a hurry to lay their one white egg; in a hurry to get back to their beloved Africa.

Meanwhile, on a hot summer's day you will be just as likely to find them on top of Calf circling round and round catching all kinds of high flying insects; so restless that they have no time to land anywhere except to feed their young. In any case their legs are so short that it is difficult for them to take off from the ground., believe it or not, off they go again. The young will spend the next twelve months on the wing, sleeping, courting and even mating in the air.

How lucky we are to have swifts nesting in both Sedbergh and Dent, but how many are there? I fancy that there were



more in my school-boy days, but I may be wrong. It would be interesting to find out by carrying out a survey which would then give us a database that would tell us whether swifts are increasing or decreasing locally. That should not be difficult because there are not many three storey buildings in either Sedbergh or Dent. All that is needed is to stand on the pavement, say in Back Lane, for an hour or so in mid-July and to count the number of swifts flying up to the eaves. 
#### YOUNG BUTCHER STRIKES GOLD



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#### **JANUARY WEATHER**

It has apparently been the driest January on record in many parts of the country. Here it was certainly drier than an average January with only 2.84inches. Most of this fell in the second week, 0.83 inches on the 9<sup>th</sup>/10<sup>th</sup>, with a near official drought for the last 12 days. We shall have to see what next month brings here. There has been much talk about droughts, lower than average reservoir levels etc. Here there was more than enough to keep the mud going. It wasn't many years ago that these small islands of ours were dug up from one end to the other laying North Sea gas pipes. Wouldn't it have been simple to lay a water pipe at the same time and then everywhere could share in the bounty? Temperatures were more seasonal, though the maximum reached 50.9F; minima were generally in the 30sF with a minimum on two nights of 20.1F. Pressure was fairly steady throughout the month with only one day dropping out of the 29inches of mercury and two into the 30inches. Wind was variable in both strength and direction with maxima from 0mph to 22.4mph and the direction, for once, only came from the north-westerly

direction on half the days in the month.

The winter jasmine has had another flush of flowers, it has been in flower since October. Some mini daffs have flowered, snowdrops have pushed up and by the end of the month a few had flowered in sheltered spots. Hazel catkins have lengthened further. It is always interesting to look for the tiny female catkins with their red styles soon. Owls continue to hoot to mark their territories. blackbirds, thrushes and great tits are all singing to mark theirs. I trust you all sent in your garden bird survey to the RSPB for the last weekend of the month.

#### CHRISTMAS SINGING IN SLOVENIA

We met many of those who came to the Sedbergh carol weekend at the beginning of December a few weeks later when our Lakeland Voice singers stayed in Zrece for a week over Christmas - definitely the best time to visit Slovenia not just for the festive lights and snowy mountains, but for all the wonderful singing events that take place at that time of year.

We hired a mini bus and car at Venice airport and, on driving into Ljubljana, were greeted by the students in the main thoroughfare each holding a letter which spelt out a welcome to our singers. After an excellent party with both English and Slovene singing, we drove on to our accommodation at the tourist farm Urksa, on a hilltop overlooking Zrece - but returned to the capitol the following day to sing under the Christmas trees and a dazzling display of lights in this beautiful city.

On Christmas Eve we joined the party walking from Rogla down to Skomarje - although the route changed because of the deep snow. We were also joined by an English TV company whose professional cynicism provided quite a contrast to the romance of snowy mountain top churches, carols and the hospitality of the Slovenes

They were filming an English couple on holiday in the Rogla Hotel and I overheard their camerawoman telling the producer: "Yeah, I got some great shots of Natasha falling over on the ice, and then sobbing into her mobile phone that she wanted to go home!"

After singing with our friends at the midnight mass in Skomarje church we

joined a party for more singing at Jose Kovse's guesthouse, Medved - where the Cautley Carollers stayed last Easter. It was a surprise to walk into this beautiful mountaintop home and find a photo showing Roger and Judith Bush, Dorcas Thomas, Penny Carruthers and myself proudly displayed on the wall.

At Urska we ate like royalty - despite most of the group being vegetarians we enjoyed a splendid variety of dishes. So after an enormous Christmas lunch we appreciated being able to work off some of the fat by joining a lamp-lit procession from the church in Zrece (where we sang at a special service blessing the children) to the Sveta Neza church on another hilltop overlooking the town. We were very honoured by again being invited to sing during the service - our Slovene carols being especially appreciated (we had practiced some of them on Alan Pratt's doorstep while carol singing up Dowbiggin Lane before leaving Sedbergh.)

But what we enjoyed most was meeting - and being welcomed by - many of our Slovene friends who had visited Sedbergh over the year: Dusan, Ivan, Jose and Anthon from the Ljudski Pevci iz Stranice; Marjan Hren who came with Odmev for the carol weekend; Samo Ivacic and the singers from the choir who came in August; and of course Zdenka and the Mayor who gave us a special welcome at the Mayor's Office.

Some of our singers wanted to demonstrate the English carol singing tradition which they did outside Edvard and Dagma's house by the hilltop church - after which we were invited in for more singing and refreshments. What I enjoyed most was joining a group of five men from Zrece singing the harmonies for some of the Slovene folk songs we had learnt earlier in the year.

Our Boxing Day is their Independence Day, and like last year we joined the concert in the main church for a fabulous display of singing from about 20 different groups and soloists (even the firemen have their own choir) - all from the Zrece area. Although this year we also sang a couple of songs, and were surprised when the entire audience started clapping along with one of our wassailing songs. Afterwards we spilled out into the blizzard for mulled wine and a party out in the snow.

If the Slovene's are impressed by an English nonchalance for walking in the rain, we were all amazed by the apparent unconcern shown by the Zrece locals for driving in deep snow. With good winter tyres, they leap into their cars and drive off without a thought in conditions that would have our schools and offices closed and most of the roads closed for traffic. But by the end of the week we had developed the skills necessary for putting chains on and off in the snow, though not without a lot of help from passing motorists who would stop to give us a hand.

Another thing we noticed was that many drivers were tooting their horns and making rude gestures at us until someone explained that because we had Venice number plates it was assumed we were all Italians. There was a very noticeable difference in the attitude of other drivers when we put a large GB sign in the back window!

Our final concert was in the ancient



town of Ptuj where we sang with another 20 local choirs as well as their town band, a 30 piece wind ensemble who amongst other music played several movie theme tunes - including Bridge over the River Kwai and the Good, the Bad and the Ugly, reminding us all of another town band close to our hearts. Afterwards we joined a huge banquet in the hall were many of the singers would break into spontaneous singing - some of which we were able to join.

As well as all the singing, we also found time to ski, walk in the hills and swim in the spa (with the unusual sensation of being able to swim from the warm pool inside out into the falling snow outside.) But everyone agreed that what we all enjoyed most was meeting all these wonderful people and being invited into their homes to celebrate the common ground between our two towns.

(Howgills Harmony continue with the singing of Slovene folk songs on Tuesday evenings to which everyone is very welcome to join. We are also planning another performance project and cultural exchange to Slovenia in the first week of August, and weekends through the year.) David Burbidge

#### SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

The Members' Evening was held at Settlebeck on Wednesday 1st February. This year the members giving the talks were Kevin Lancaster and Roger Underwood.

Kevin's subject was "Inventories and Bonds". Soon after a person died an inventory was taken, of the possessions and debts that they had, to be used in conjunction with their will. This task was normally undertaken by four neighbours. For this area the earliest surviving record was from the first half of the sixteenth century. From then the number increased until the Commonwealth during which there was a steep decline. After that the number sharply rose and peaked around

1700. During the eighteenth century the practice declined and finally ended in the nineteenth century. Most of the inventories for this area are to be found in Preston and we are lucky that the society has transcripts of so many, the latter fact largely due to Kevin's efforts. In his lecture he compared some from a period in the seventeenth century with another sample taken a hundred years later. The comparison showed the effects of inflation and increasing wealth in the area. Particularly interesting was the much wider range of furniture in the houses. Also the terms used to describe some of the farm animals had changed with the later ones being the same as our contemporary ones. Finally Kevin stressed the importance of the

information provided by bonds, sureties required when loans were involved.

Roger Underwood's subject was "From Bristol to Sedbergh and back again, a journey of fifty years." This talk linked the fortunes of the Uptons of Ingmire Hall with the Smyth's of Ashton Court near Bristol. The latter were a much more important and wealthier family with the head being a baronet and Ashton Court being the centre of a very large estate. The family were leading figures in Bristol society. Florence, the sister of the baronet, became the second wife of John Upton of Ingmire Hall. His first wife had been the daughter of the Bishop of Bristol. Their son Thomas died in 1843 of acquired Ingmire Hall as Mrs Uptonpneumonia, caught from exposure on Kendal Fell, but not before he had produced two sons, Thomas and Greville. Back in Bristol Florence's brother Hugh had died and been succeeded as baronet by another brother, John. The latter was a confirmed bachelor and this meant the title would pass to Thomas. However, he was indulged by his grandmother and he

died in Bristol due to his excesses, leaving Greville as the heir.

At this stage a man suddenly appeared on the scene claiming to be the son of Hugh from a marriage contracted in Ireland. John accepted his claim to be the heir to the baronetcy and then conveniently died the next day. Naturally a court case, which was the talk of Bristol, was held to decide who had the right to succeed as baronet. The claimant was found to be an impostor and Greville became the baronet. Florence eventually died in 1852 having seen her grandson inherit the title. Another Florence, the daughter of Thomas born in 1837, later Cottrell-Dormer. Ashton Hall was eventually overwhelmed by death duties in the early nineteenth century and was bought by Bristol City Council.

The speakers were thanked by the chairman who remarked that the evenings such as this showed how lucky the society was in being able to draw on the skills of so many talented members.

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
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

#### **RECYCLING NEWS**

There have been articles in the media about the problems that the nation faces, as the landfill sites currently used reach capacity. SLDC uses two landfill sites;



waste from the south west of the district is sent to a site in Barrow, whilst waste from the rest of the district is sent to Lancaster. However these sites are nearing the end of their capacity and alternative arrangements will have to be made. This is likely to result in our waste travelling even greater distances, which will be both expensive and wasteful.

Many residents and visitors now recycle at least some of their waste, but most of us have some waste that cannot be recycled. We are asking everybody to think about the waste that they do not recycle and ask whether it is really necessary. 20% of the waste thrown away in this country is food waste, some of which could be composted.
