SEDBERGH GALA 2006

It was quite a procession and took some time to get onto the field. There was a large entry for the fancy dress and floats competitions and the

and the egg-throwing competition proved popular. The Gala Group hope to have more of this type of event and possibly move them to a more central part of the afternoon.



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SEDBERGH GOES TO ITALY

Once again this year a party of twenty people form Sedbergh has been enjoying the area around Rome and Naples experiencing the language, culture and gastronomy of that wonderful country to which Europe owes so much. There were guided visits every day to both wellknown and hidden places of interest, under the expert leadership of Pierluigi Barberio who has visited Sedbergh many times. Our specially-arranged programme included the Pope's Palace in Anagni and the amazing castle in Fumone from whose high roof-garden smoke signals were sent in past centuries to warn neighbouring villages of approaching invaders. We also visited the ancient country villa built by the much-travelled Emperor Hadrian, he who built the famous Wall just to the north of us, marking the northern limit of the great Roman Empire in the second century AD.

The tour had many highlights, of which one was a return visit to the house at

Picinisco, on the edge of the beautiful Abruzzo National Park, where English writer D H Lawrence once stayed with an Italian friend and wrote part of one of his novels. This is still furnished as it was at the time of Lawrence's visit, but Loretto Pacitti, the farmer who now owns it, has diversified into agriturismo and, with the help of his family, cooks the most amazing meals, using only home-grown produce. Delicious course after delicious course is brought to the table while musicians in brightly-coloured traditional costume play for the guests on melodeons and bagpipes. Two Italian newspapers featured our visit to Lawrence's House on their front pages. It made us feel quite famous.

We had two city days - one in Rome and the other in Naples. The Rome day started with a memorable visit to the ancient Catacombs, deep underground, where the early Christians were buried on stone shelves lining some five hundred miles of narrow tunnels. Then we went to

the second largest church in Rome, St Paul's, built on the site where the apostle Paul was martyred for his faith. We followed this with a visit to The Colosseum, the enormous arena built in the first century to house great spectacles for the people of Rome - as seen in the famous film, "Gladiator". Our guide told us fabulous, and often gory, tales of events in those early times.

Our second city day was in Naples, home of the pizza now eaten all over the world. We were guided through Herculaneum, the smaller and less famous town that was buried at the same time as Pompeii when Vesuvius erupted in 79 A.D. We saw the way the people used to live nearly two thousand years ago in their homes so well-preserved under the mud and lava that flowed down the steep hillside. In the afternoon, we spent a couple of hours in the Naples Archaeological Museum where many of the treasures rescued from the buried cities can still be seen.

All this cultural input was supplemented by optional Italian lessons on three mornings from an attractive young Italian lady, and a short organ recital in the nearly church from Dent organist, Roger Bush. The food at the hotel was excellent as always, and in addition we were treated to a Medieval banquet in the castle at Fumone with the Baron and his friends to entertain us, and to a feast of typical regional specialities in the ancient hill-top town of Fiuggi. Ours was a cultural and gastronomic tour of the first order. The family at the hotel have come to regard us as friends and they are looking forward to another visit from Sedbergh next year. "Think safety before doing it yourself"
As spring is upon us and summer is approaching Cumbria Fire Service has issued timely advice to all would be Do It Yourself enthusiasts.

"Statistics and experience show that at this time of year there is an increase in calls, which are found to have been caused by activities associated with DIY" said. Fire Officer Tom Donnelly, "These range from fires ignited by blow torches involved in paint stripping, to electrical appliances and other equipment which may have been stored in a damp garage or shed over the winter period."

Highlighting important safety points to be remembered Mr Donnelly said,
"Always check that the task you are undertaking is within your capabilities.
Take expert advice. Many of the modern DIY Superstores from which materials and equipment are bought will offer such advice. Safety instructions should be read in full and complied with."

Always: -

- Check you have the correct tool for the job.
- Ensure children and pets are safe, with obstructions removed from your workplace.
- If you have to check or repair an electrical tool turn it off at the main. Don't be tempted to cut corners because you are some distance from the power switch.
- Always uncoil electrical extension cables fully, as these can overheat and cause a fire.
- Never use multi-way adapters when working with high amperage tools.
- Gas appliances should only be



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repaired by an approved contractor.

- Flammable liquids should be used in accordance with manufacturer's instructions, secured in containers and used in small quantities, well away from the house and other risks naked flames or cigarettes.
- Ventilate when using adhesives and flammable liquids by opening windows and door and always ensure that no naked flames or power tools are close by.
- If you spill a substance on your clothing or overalls remove them and clean them thoroughly.

Concluding Mr Donnelly said: "DIY is a pleasant pastime from which many people gain a great deal of pleasure.

By following these simple rules, accidents, fires and tragedies will hopefully be kept to a minimum."

APPROACHES TO FERTILITY

There are two very interesting books on the market at the moment describing how a scientific approach can be combined with traditional Chinese medicine (acupuncture and herbs) to help couples with fertility problems.

Some women have difficulty becoming pregnant after a long stretch of taking a contraceptive pill. Very often oral contraceptives lead to blood deficiency (this can be felt in the pulse). In young women, particularly if there is excessive can lead to anxiety and panic attacks. Lowered energy is another side effect and spend some months building up their the effect of stopping taking oral contraceptives can be, as one woman described it, like "putting down a heavy rucksack".

"Treatment of Infertility with Chinese Medicine" by Jane Lyttleton (Churchill Livingstone, 2004) approaches women's infertility through basal body temperature charts. The woman records her body temperature each day on waking and records the results on squared paper. giving a graph of the body temperature throughout each monthly cycle. Typically the graph dips slightly around day 14 (the first day of the period is day 1) and this is followed by a sharp rise over the next few days. This change in temperature indicates that ovulation has taken place and the temperature remains at the higher level until the start of the next period. These charts are used, both in China and in the west, as a costeffective way of making a detailed analysis of a woman's cycle.

Scientific diagnostic methods give information which would not have been

formerly available to Chinese medicine practitioners. The book discusses how treatment with acupuncture and herbs can help when modern methods have uncovered such irregularities as endometriosis and polycystic ovaries.

Lifang Liang, the author of the second book, "Acupuncture and IVF" (Blue Poppy 2002), trained in gynaecology and acupuncture in China, some thirty years ago, and then moved to the USA, where she now teaches gynaecology at the American College of Traditional Chinese external pressure from work or study, this Medicine in San Francisco. Ideally before attempting to conceive, a couple would state of health with good diet, exercise and, if necessary regulating the menstrual cycle. Lifang Liang describes a procedure whereby three months is devoted to health improvement, including acupuncture and herbal treatment, before IVF (in-vitro fertilisation) is attempted. She says that some couples conceive during this period and for the others, this

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offers an increased chance of success with IVF.

During this health improvement period acupuncture treatments are given using standard points for increasing energy, nourishing the blood, calming and relaxing, to regulate the menstrual cycle and improve the function of the ovaries. Men have treatment to improve the quality and quantity of sperm. Special treatments are given in the course of the IVF procedure to support the body's function at each stage, in particular to help the woman relax at the time of implantation. One German study showed that having acupuncture before and after implantation can significantly increase the chances of pregnancy.

Once pregnancy is established, acupuncture can be used to hold and nourish the foetus and to treat problems such as morning sickness and backache. Of course care must be taken and certain acupuncture points (the ones which could induce uterine contractions) are counterindicated.

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JULY GARDENING

Does your garden have a July gap? After the first flush of flowers are over the Peaonies, the oriental poppies and the old fashioned blue Geranium x magnificum there is always a bit of a lull in the bright colours of flowers and things look rather green for a time. I have been trying over the last few years to introduce more plants which bloom now and one of my favourites is Cirsium rivulare 'Atropurpureum', a spine free thistle, about 4 ft in height which bears lovely deep wine red flowers. Matching it for flower colour, but shorter in height is a beautiful form of scabious Knautia macedonica which flowers from late June in my garden and foes on well into the Autumn. I have this underplanted with free flowering, low growing Viola cornuta in its blue and white forms. This seems to love the free draining (horribly stony) soil in the borders of my garden and seeds itself freely around.

A few years ago I bought three Alstromaria plants from a specialist grower. All named after royal princesses and queens, they have spread slowly to form neat clumps bearing salmon pink, rose pink and rich deep red flowers. Alstromerias are often available by mail order from non specialist nursery catalogues but this is one plant that I always like to see before I buy it. The yellow and orange flowered forms are often those supplied by mail order catalogues and they will quickly become thugs which rampage around the borders. squashing all in their wake and flowering for only a very short time.

Local Reserves

The local support group summer programme includes a visit to one of our local reserves

Burns Beck Moss Nature Reserve is 2km WSW of Killington Village. It is the site of an infilled tarn dating from the ice age, and has been noted for its nature conservation interest since the 1950s when it was first designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest. It is situated in a shallow valley formed by Burns Beck, a Beck Moss include ling, cross leaved minor tributary of the Lune, which flows north through the middle of the reserve, The moss comprises three raised mire bodies that are dependent on rainfall for moisture, and two valley mire bodies that Beck Moss provides a habitat for many are influenced by the ground water flowing into them. Raised and valley mires rarely occur together on the same site and only a small number of Cumbrian sites, near Torver and Winster, are similar to Burns Beck Moss in this way. Between the raised mires are mineral rich

flushes where water enters the site and modifies the vegetation present. Other habitats are also present including unimproved CUMBRIA grassland, and patches of willow carr and reed bed.

A range of conditions was created on the the ringlet butterfly and dark green moss surface by peat cutting. This has led : fritilary to the development of a chequerboard of 32 vegetation communities, an uncommon diversity for a mire site.

Sixteen species of bog moss (Sphagnum) have been found here: possibly a record number for a Cumbrian i a guided walk, look out for posters or mire

Bog plants which can be found at Burns



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heath, bog myrtle, bog asphodel, cranberry, crowberry, bog rosemary, cotton grass and sundew.

The undisturbed wild nature of Burns animal species. Fox, hare, roe deer, tawny owl, snipe, reed bunting and heron are frequently seen.

In summer, migrant or breeding birds

such as curlew, sedge warbler, willow warbler, grasshopper warbler, meadow pipit and whinchat may also be encountered, as well as common lizard, frogs and drinker moths. Green hairstreak, small pearlbordered fritillary and small heath are a few of the butterflies

to be seen. Rare visitors have included

Recent management work has included insertion of weirs to retain the necessary level of water and subsequent improvements to the boardwalks.

Year 11 Arrive Alive Course

As part of our Citizenship programme, Year 11 have completed 3 sessions with **Driving Standards Agency Test** Instructor, Maxwell Max and Micky Gander from Kendal Fire Service on Learning to Drive, Safety and Responsibility as a Driver and Road-user.

The course gave students advice on learning to drive, preparing to take the tests and the value of the Pass Plus Scheme which is highly recommended. Students were taught about the New Drivers Act and how the 2-year probation period operates once you have passed your test. The main messages from the presentations have been to stress the importance of driver attitude, regard for safety and other people, the national message - SPEED KILLS, and to point out that having a driving licence is a privilege not a right. All too often things go wrong and people are left to pick up the tragic pieces. This was graphically shown in the scenarios used by the Fire Service Team who worked with small groups of students in the classroom using videos of local accidents in Cumbria. Students were asked to look at the effects



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of accidents and consider how many people are affected and the human and economic costs. They also learnt about the types of injuries usually sustained in collisions. The message from the Fire Service was that, as drivers, there are two key things you must use: Concentration and Common Sense.

Students showed interest and keenness to learn in the all the sessions. Many are just starting to think about learning to drive and some students have already taken Tractor Tests. We hope the images and messages so positively and wellpresented by Max and Micky will influence our students into becoming safe, sensible young drivers.

We are grateful to Max and the Fire Service Team; Micky Gander, Philip Gardner, Ian Moorehouse, Jayne Moorehouse and Pete Packham for their work and time. Many thanks to you all. J Walsh

Unfortunately copy deadlines for the last edition of Lookaround did not allow me to say how much my family and I enjoyed the Sedbergh Gala. One of the many great joys of this job is being invited along to the local fairs and galas that occur across the constituency during the summer. Yours was one of the more civilized ones, another I went to a few weeks ago involved me being put in the stocks and having wet sponges thrown at me by disgruntled constituents! Actually, I must be doing something right because people did not seem to throw them with quite the venom that I have seen on previous occasions.

Also, I did not get the chance to congratulate Sedbergh on becoming

England's first "Book Town". This is a singular honour and one that I hope brings many visitors to Sedbergh. I tried to make up for my omission in *Lookaround* by proposing a motion of congratulations to Sedbergh in the House of Commons. So you can read all about how successful you are in Hansard if you should so desire.

Sadly, my job is not all fun and congratulations. I have spent quite a bit of time over the past month contacting Cumbria County Council about the closure of the road from Sedbergh to Garsdale Head. It almost goes without saying that it is unacceptable for the council to close roads with no warning to local residents. Especially in 'out of the way areas' like Garsdale Head where

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there are not that many roads to go around and closure creates massive problems for local residents. The fact that the council was not even able to find the fund a compromise solution of diverting cars over adjacent farm land given that they have created the problem is even more disappointing.

However, the issue that concerns me is a much broader one. Garsdale Parish Council have been telling Cumbria Council for some time that the road was in a very poor state of repair but nothing was done until the road collapsed. This is frankly unacceptable, roads cannot be allowed to get into such a poor state of repair that they collapse. That this happened despite warnings over its likelihood does leave me wondering

exactly how the council is prioritising its road repair programme. I worry that the council thinks that because a road is not that busy it is not very important, they need to consider the importance of the road to the people who use it. They also need to take more seriously reports from Parish Councils telling them about the poor state of repair of roads in their area. I will be taking this up with the County Council the next time that I speak to them.

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By common consent among beekeepers throughout Britain, this has been the most of it - swarms! We have had many of unusual season that most can remember for many years! The weather for the last three weeks to mid-June has been the best possible for the bees; it's as if spring and summer have been telescoped into one, long, very warm, dry, spell, bringing out so many blossoms, both late and early, full of honey-making nectar - just what the bees love! Suddenly our fears for this year's honey crop have vanished as the honey supers have swiftly filled with honey (we call them supers because they sit above the main brood chamber where the queen is doing her stuff!). You will see most of our hives looking very tall

now, as more empty supers are added. But along with all this sudden wealth comes nature's answer to take advantage them, and been able to give all of our new members at least two colonies, most of which will go on to collect a lot more honey for them during July and August (unless this 'feast' becomes a summer 'famine'!)

Even our monthly visits to members' apiaries have seemed extreme - washed out by the cold, wind, and rain at The Long House in Garsdale, and later, in lovely weather, enjoyed an excellent apiary visit at Beck House in Barbon. We were just about to set about our hostess' tea and cakes when we received word that there was a swarm of bees on the

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windows outside the NatWest bank in Main Street, Kirkby Lonsdale, and would : hive is making with its honey crop. For we please come and take it away!! We did, of course, to the great interest and some amusement, but little fear, of the local residents and visitors. In the old days, when swarms were very valuable, a beekeeper that followed his lost swarm could claim its ownership by banging a metal pan; today, as there was no known beekeeper anywhere near, nor anyone claiming it, we took the swarm back to Barbon and hived it there!!

Our next apiary visit is to another of our novice beekeepers' apiaries at Field Maple in Holme. This will be at 2.30pm on Saturday 15th July. Normally this would be in the middle of the season when the 'mid-season inspection' is

carried out to check on the progress each any hive that has swarmed, we check that the new queen has taken over the rest of the colony that remained in the hive, that she has mated (she emerges from her special cell in the hive as a virgin queen soon after her mother, the old queen, has left with the swarm) and is safely laying lots of eggs to rebuild the colony's strength. All will then be well for both the honey crop and the colony next winter! If you would like to learn more, you would be made most welcome at any of our meets; just call for more details. 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TOM STEADMAN 1914 - 2006

Dad's parent, .a policeman and a nurse at. Kirkby Stephen, moved South in theearly 1900's to Bexlyheath, Kent just South of the Thames in East London. Dad was born there on 11th February 1914, followed by 2 sisters, Jennie and Belle. Dad went to school there until the age of 13, before leaving and going to work in the local slaughter house - the start of his butchering career.

teachers pet. His Mum bought him a piano when he was 7 but he "fell out" with his music teacher. He did however persevere with his music and by the beginning of WW2 he was leading his own 10 piece band playing accordion called "Tommy Steadman and the rhythmic rascals". Dad always said with a wry smile that the highlight of his long musical career was when his exasperated music teacher joined Dad's band playing saxophone.

For some reason though even having been born in the South he always wanted to come North. His parents used. to "Post him" on his own in the guards van at Kings Cross Station giving instructions to the guard to throw him out at Darlington. From what we learn, he was not exactly Auntie Poly who lived, at Darlington



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would, put him on the train to Kirkby Stephen. He stayed with Grandma or other relatives and on one occasion made it to his Uncle Tom's farm Claylands at Ravenstonedale. The very same farm he bought 35 years later.

While still living down South rumours were rife that WW2 was about to erupt and so Dad, along many others went to join up. The queue he joined was for the Navy but, at the last moment they'd got enough for now so, he moved on to the RAF. Just as well as he said he could feel sea sick on Windermere Ferry. Training was everywhere but. Chipping Norton in Oxfordshire stands out as this is where he Wallace and Antony Eden. met Mum who had joined the WRAF's.

They were married at West Wickham in Kent June 10th 1944. Heading North for the Honeymoon in the middle of a bombing raid they spent the first night in a train that was shunted a short distance out of the London station as the station was being bombed.

Mum was his inspiration, backup and love of his life and never left his side for the next 60 years. They never stopped holding hands and thinking of each other. He missed Mum so much when she passed away two years ago.

Part of Dad's career in the RAF was as tail gunner in the Lancaster Bomber. On returning from one mission, the crew were told to smarten up before leaving the plane. Just a well as they were presented to the King, the Queen and daughters. Dad gave the young teenage Elizabeth (now our Queen) a bunk up into the Lancaster for a look round. He was also involved in the development of the dam busting bouncing bomb. Returning from a drop with a practice bomb made out of wood that had ripped the bottom of the plane out the crew were presented to Winston Churchill, Barnes With the RAF, Dad was moved out to the South West of Russia , Now Kazakstan then over a period of time back to the French coast via Persia (now Iran) Iraq, Syria, Lebanon, Israel, Jordan, the Nile at Cairo and across into Sudan .He took a camera with him and we have an amazing collection of pilot photographs of the

local people and places of that time.

1948 Saw another move to a 20 acre small holding at Newby. Just a few weeks before Dad died, I took him back to look around and we spoke to the present owners.

1950 saw another move to a larger farm at Ireby. 24 acres and 14 cows. Dad scythed the meadows, the roadsides and the churchyard for hay. I arrived on the

Garth and I were very fortunate to be brought up where there were no locked doors and everybody was made welcome. True there were no carpets on the floor and no money to buy extras but the fire was always on and a bit of home baking in the pantry.

Dad still pursued his music and played for dances weddings funerals or anything. Out to make a few bob.

Along with Bob Cooper and Bill Vanstone they formed The Silver Stars. Two accordions and drums. Square bashing. Proper dancing as Dad called it not just wiggling your bums about. Typically the night out would be like the village hall at Mucker .No electric. Everybody brought a tilly lamp. As the dancing went on into the early hours the people gradually went home until it got too dark to play so they all went home. Dad would return home and start to Milk. Mum would tell him off because there was always a cow with a difficult calving when he was not there.

As they played the dance tunes they often used the song 'My grandfathers clock' as a link while one of them got the year. next sheet of music up. Well one day Dad! Continued next month.

and Mum were invited to a wedding as guests. On arriving an usher said "your a bit late Tom. Half the guests are in." Of course Dad was supposed to be playing the organ, not just being a guest. With not much music to hand Dad managed the Hymns but had a mental blank when it came to the Wedding March. 
AUTHORS APPEARING -



COUNCILLORS' CORNER

It is practically two months since I was elected to the South Lakeland District Council (SLDC) and I wanted to share with you from time to time, some of the issues I am working on, on your behalf.

The two big issues I have been apart of, have been the work on the Garsdale Road : residents informed. That same day, the and the transition of the Joss Lane Car Park to Sedbergh Parish Council.

The former, as many of you will be aware, has been an issue for sometime and the Garsdale Parish Council have persistently raised concerns about the state of the roads, with matters coming to ahead recently with the emergency road closure. This resulted in an emergency meeting arranged by the County Councilor, Jo Nicholson, between himself, the road engineers, myself and Parish Council members where the road was actually being repaired. At the meeting, local farmers were more than willing to disassemble wails and allow

vehicle access over fields to prevent a full road closure but the costs, according to the engineers, would have proved prohibitive. In the absence of any notification by the County Council to local residents of the situation, I was also concerned about keeping Garsdale Parish Council Chair, Neil Howarth and I, got together to produce an information sheet to all Garsdale residents alerting them to the closure and drawing their attention to a hot line number for regular updates on the status of repairs.

A whole number of issues have arisen from the way road repairs have been approached in general as well as in this particular instance, and via Tim Farron's Office, we are taking a number of matters up with the County Council who have responsibility for our highways.

As mentioned elsewhere in the Lookaround, I have been working closely with Sedbergh Parish Council, fellow

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councillors and District Council officials to work through the issues surrounding the transition of Joss Lane car park from SLDC to the parish Council. It has been a real team effort here in Sedbergh between: myself and fellow Counsillor, Kevin Lancaster and the Parish Councilors, to move forward on the stalemate that John Stanton highlighted in last month's Lookaround. Following a meeting I chaired with Parish Councillors, the District Council's Chief Executive, Mike Jones and the Cabinet Portfolio Holder for Car Parks, Graham Vincent, we are pleased to say that we are now making headway. Mr Jones has taken on this matter personally and assures the Parish Council that he will present them with a new offer in July with the hope that a final decision will be reached by September. We are all very hopeful that a resolution is just around the corner.

Another issue than I am beginning to

explore is the future of Dent Store. A group has been formed, the Friends of Dent Store, and Eddie and Rita, the store owners are all working closely with residents and the Friends of Dent Store in attempt to stave off closure, which as most residents have argued, would be a great loss to Dentdale. They are engaged in a number of initiatives to promote the store, such as the sale of organic produce, but as Eddie points out, there is a need for more people to make basic purchases on a frequent basis if the store is to prove viable and survive.

Of course, there are also the day to day issues, I am reporting on your behalf, including the partial road flooding adjacent to the playground on Havera and various pot holes and loose cobbles. I'll keep a close eye on progress, but in the meantime, do let me know if there is anything I can do to assist!

That means the bank takes longer to fill and reduces the number of vehicle journeys on the roads of South Lakeland.

We'd also like to say a big thank you to everybody who helped to recycle over 1,000 tonnes of paper, glass, cans and green waste on the kerbside scheme in May, the first time that milestone has been achieved.

Summer blood donors needed to roll up their sleeves

In summer blood stocks can drop as regular blood donors jet off on holiday and can't keep their usual appointment to give blood. The holiday season can also have implications for blood stocks later in the year, as anyone visiting destinations which carry the risk of malaria cannot give blood for six months after returning to the UK.

Rachel Roberts, spokesperson for the National Blood Service, said, "At present, our blood stocks are healthy. However, red cells have a shelf life of thirty-five days, and platelets have a shelf life of just five days, so at this time of year it is particularly crucial that all our donors make a special effort to give blood. We are also appealing to anyone who has never given blood, or has not donated for a long time to consider coming forward and volunteering to save lives this summer."

New statistics released by the National Blood Service last month show that every day in the UK, 8,000 donations of blood are needed to save and improve the lives of patients. In Lancashire and Cumbria alone, over 250 donations a day are needed for treatments ranging from cancer treatment to open heart surgery.

Anyone aged between 17 and 60, weighing more than 50 kg (7st 12lb) and in general good health could start saving lives by becoming a blood donor. For

MAY WEATHER

It's official- it was the wettest May since 1983! So our 3.59 inches wasn't too bad I suppose. In spite of this rainfall we had 3 dry periods, 2 at the start of the month and one for the last few days. We had some pleasantly warm weather with 5 days in the 70sF and a maximum of 82.2F. At the other end of the scale 7 nights dipped into the 30sF with a minimum of 33.8F. The ground frost on that night caught quite a few new leaves on plants. An unsettled spell in the middle of the month saw the pressure drop below 29 inches of mercury for 4 days during which period the strongest wind was recorded of 19.9mph from the North West. Again only on three days did the maximum wind blow from any other quarter.

May I think is often the best month of the year weather-wise as we have increasing temperatures, shorter nights and often dry spells. These conditions usually bring about great changes in the natural world. The trees look at their best in a covering of fresh green leaves. Blossom on the fruit trees and in the hedgerow is at its best. It has been an exceptional year for blossom and if all the fruit set stays the trees will be pulled down. We shall have to see if the "June

drop" thins them out or we shall have to intervene. May is also probably the best month for bird song with the cock birds serenading their partners sat on their eggs. That is of course unless a cock blackbird uses your roof as his singing post a t 3.30am as we have! The blackbird in the clematis got to 4 eggs but they disappeared. Fortunately the pair in the shippon has young at present. There seems to have been a shortage of bumble bees with us this year. Our Rosa rugosa is all but over and it is usually full of bees but not this year. Apart from orange tips and the odd white butterflies have been scarce so far though there have been plenty of wasps chewing off strips of wood to make the paper for their nests. The starlings got a brood away but the magpies were straight after them with sadly one of the young drowning in the water butt. The swallows have hatched 3 young in the kennel again. I am sure they must have a second nest somewhere as they never brood the eggs during the day though perhaps it has been plenty warm enough. If I switched my incubators on and off as they do I would certainly never get anything to hatch. Bats have been noticeable by their absence. I have seen only one so far this year but that was not a pipistrelle.
