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


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#### PHOTO CALL

#### DISTINGUISHED OCTOGENARIANS

(The fourth in the occasional series about some of Sedbergh's Senior Citizens who are over the age of eighty and who have led interesting and exemplary lives.)

Approaching his house you may hear sweet melodies issuing from the garage where this month's distinguished octogenarian is playing his organ something he can still do, with not a note of music and despite his failing eyesight. Jack Dawson is sometimes called "Mr Sedbergh" - he is so much a part of this place. He was born in 1922 (just a stone's throw away from where he now lives) at 2, Woodburn Terrace, a row of five stonebuilt houses to the west of the snicket leading from Bainbridge Road to the Main Street, no longer known by that name. He lived there until he was eight and then moved up the hill to 58 Bainbridge Road, a house more suitable for a couple with three growing children, only a few doors away from his grandparents, William and Elizabeth Dawson.

A few steps took him to the British School, the non-conformist establishment set up by the free churches of Sedbergh in 1843. There were entrances both from Bainbridge Road and from Joss Lane. Jack was there till the age of 13 under headteacher, William Downhill, whom many Sedbergh people will remember. At that time, all pupils left school at 14 unless they could afford to transfer to one of the local senior schools. Jack's older brother, William, had moved to Sedbergh School, and, at the age of 11, Jack began Latin lessons with a view to following in his footsteps. For these he went to Major



Wilkins, a master at the School who lived in what was known as Footer View, overlooking the Lupton field on Back Lane. Latin was an important part of the entrance exam, taken in Powell Hall by local boys, and Jack was successful in gaining a Local Exhibition to what was known as "the big school". There were around 15 day-boys at the time; Jack was in Evans House on Main Street.

By the time he was 18, the Second World War had begun and Jack joined the RAF. This keen and capable young man was sent, under the Empire Training Scheme, to train for a year as a pilot in Canada. Leaving Britain for Canada meant a long boat trip across the Atlantic from Glasgow to Halifax, Nova Scotia no flights in those days. Jack trained first in Alberta, then in Saskatchewan where he was awarded his "WINGS". He could fly any multi-engined aircraft and flew Lancasters, Wellingtons and others during his RAF years. The journey back to Glasgow was from New York on board the first Queen Elizabeth with no fewer than 19000 servicemen on board. Clearly this would have been a prime target for the German U-boats, at that time sinking up to sixteen ships a day. The journey,

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Jack says, was a scarey one, made to seem longer than its four days by the necessity for the boat to take a zig-zag course across the Atlantic to avoid being torpedoed and sunk.

Following his return to England, Jack worked for about three years as an Instructor, training pilots and navigators in using new techniques like the Lorenz Beam for getting bomber pilots back from raids over Germany and also for getting bombs to hit their targets with greater accuracy. He moved into Transport Command. The War ended in 1945, and a year later Jack had to decide whether to take the job he was offered as a civilian pilot with the Dutch airline KLM or to return to Sedbergh to play his part in the family business, started in the station yard by his grandfather in 1895. He opted for the latter because his older brother William, a navigator on Lancasters, had been shot down in 1943 over Belgium. So he came back to his native Sedbergh to became a business man - and soon after to marry Jenny at Sedbergh Methodist Church in 1947.

But Jack had interests outside the family business - many of them - all linked to his he finds our small town full of them. manual and artistic skills and to his social

concern. He loved painting in oils and, with the late Harry Bracken, was a founder member of the local Art Society. He has written quite a bit of poetry. His interest in engineering led him to become a member of the Kendal Engineering Society. He was a Justice of the Peace for 14 years. Central to his life was his Christian faith: he taught in the Methodist Sunday School for thirty years, sang in the choir and was a local preacher in this circuit for 50 years. He learned calligraphy from Dorothy Hansford at night school and was also a passionate wood-turner, making "objets d'art" from many kinds of local timber.

He has always loved Sedbergh and served it for many years on the Rural District Council, taking over as Chairman when Arthur L Gladstone died suddenly. The RDC, which had real powers, was "closer to the people" than present-day councils can be. When Sedbergh became part of Cumbria in 1974, Jack was appointed first Chairman of South Lakeland with the cumbersome job of bringing together diverse areas such as Ulverston, Kendal and the South Lakes towns. His portrait hangs in Kendal Town Hall.

He and Jenny celebrated their Golden Wedding the same year as The Queen and Prince Philip. Had they been able to make the trip to Buckingham Palace, it would have been their tenth visit. Jack has enjoyed each one of these Garden Parties because of "all the interesting people you meet". But then he has always enjoyed meeting interesting people - and

#### **QI CULTIVATION**

I have mentioned Qi (pronounced "chee") in the Lookaround many times and this article is an attempt to make clearer its role in good (and bad) health.

Qi can be thought of more widely as the a motivation of all movement, change and transformation in the universe. In the body, the Qi that motivates the normal processes of growth, regeneration, digestion, blood circulation, defence against disease and so forth is called upright Qi. On the other hand, pathogenic Qi is Qi which motivates disease processes. In serious illness, the prognosis is still good, even in the presence of serious pathogenic factors, if

Treatment of disease often concentrates on getting rid of pathogenic material of one sort or another, often at the expense of the upright Qi. Good examples of this are radiotherapy and chemotherapy for cancer, and antibiotics. Alongside these treatments, efforts should be made to strengthen the upright Qi.

So, for a long and healthy life, cultivate your Qi. There are various aspects to consider.

- Taking in or gathering Qi. In the body Qi comes from breathing air and consuming food and drink.
   Breathing properly and eating in such a way that the food is "burned cleanly" are very important. Breathe slowly and deeply. Eat in a calm environment and consume a wide variety of freshly prepared food.
- Resolving blockages. Sufficient exercise keeps the Qi flowing. This should include both aerobic exercise and a type which opens the joints and massages the internal organs (such as yoga or Tai Chi).
- e Energise the body. Bring Qi to all parts of the body with good posture and intent. Good posture is quite subtle and there is no substitute for proper instruction. However as a simple example, imagine the fingers and toes are like hose pipes: the Qi flows better if there are no kinks, that is, the digits are held straight (but not rigid).
- Circulate the Qi with appropriate exercise. There are many such exercises in the Tai Chi system.
- Conserve Qi. Many everyday

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activities such as eating, drinking red wine, watching television, walking, running and using a computer can be beneficial in judicious doses but dissipate the Qi if overdone. Moderation is the key. It is important not to overwork. Try to work within your available reserves and learn to say, "No!" if you need to. Much energy is devoted to daily routines, so breaking routines (including emotional patterns and habits such as smoking) can conserve Oi. For women, sensitivity to the cyclical waxing and waning of energy is essential to avoid dissipating Qi.

Qi cultivation is taught and practised in Tai Chi classes (Ian McPherson 015396 20648). Yoga classes are held in Sedbergh (Deyna Hirst 015396 21556) and Dent (Laura Clare 015396 25572). My number is 015396 20972.

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#### **AUGUST GARDENING**

I was thinking this afternoon, as I battled with 7 ft high goosegrass in a very, very hot herbaceous border, of how lovely it would be to sit beside a pool not one of those turquoise tiled, chlorine smelling types, but the kind with water lilies and iris and damsel flies and frogs. There is something so cooling and soothing about clear still water on a hot day.

In the last few years there has been some interesting development on the Continent in the construction and use of "Swimming Ponds" -large deep pools with substantial planting ledges around their margins which support marginal and deep water filtering aquatic plants. The ponds take a while to get into balance but once that is achieved the result is a clean, clear, eco-friendly pool. The idea sounds lovely to me, although all the ponds I have ever created seem to become the home of a variety of invertebrate life (Dragonfly larvae with those big jaws, pond skaters, leeches and, of course, tadpoles) and as I'm not a very tidy swimmer and tend to drink and/or snort a lot of wherever it is I'm swimming in, I'm just not sure whether it would really work. Still, it would be nice to sit at the poolside admiring the plants and I would definitely hope to make room in the open water section for my favourite waterlily, Nymphaea marliacea 'Chromatella' a superb plant with sulhur yellow flowers born over rafts of maroon mottled, smooth green leaves, and for "Watersoldiers", Stratiotes aloides with their jagged rosettes of floating leaves and pure white flowers which do the

water surface like escaped confetti. At the edges of the pond I need *Iris ensata*, "Japanese Flag" and *Iris laevigata* in a variety of colours alongside "Purple loosestrife", *Lythrum salicaria* with tall spikes of pink flowers and "Pickerel Weed", *Pontederia cordata* whose flowers are blue. The only think missing then would be a deck chair and a nice cool drink. *Elaine Horne*

#### SOMME MEMORIAL SERVICE



On Saturday 1st July morning at 8.15am 400 pupils at Sedbergh School stood in silence by the School's Memorial Cloisters whilst the names of the 32 boys and 1 member of staff who had been killed in the battle of the Somme 90 years ago were read out.

The memorial service held on a beautiful sunny day was a far cry from the mud and carnage of the battlefield. The CCF band played the hymns for the service before departing on their tour of Slovenia and Italy. Headmaster Christopher Hirst read out the names of the boys who died and History teacher Guy Ayling read out an extract of a diary from a soldier who survived the battle but recounted the appalling sensation of stepping on the bodies of his dead friends who were laying in the trenches and on the battlefield with the over powering smell.

The School had celebrated the 60th Anniversary of VE day on Remembrance Sunday on November 13th 2005 also by the Memorial Cloisters where the names of 455 Old Sedberghians and Staff who were killed in both World Wars are remembered.

#### **COUNCILLOR K LANCASTER**

I welcome this opportunity to write a little about my work as your elected representative. It is ten years this month since I was first appointed to the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority and nine years since I was elected to South Lakeland District Council. The last ten years have been a period of great improvements to YDNPA. I was not surprised when at the end of last year it was recognised as one of the three best performing NPAs in England. What a change over ten years!

There have also been major changes on South Lakeland. The introduction of a cabinet was not popular with all members but it has produced a focus and I was proud to serve as a member of cabinet until the elections last May. South Lakeland's problems all stem from its very limited funding from central government. The former joint administration always ran a very tight ship and I am already concerned that new spending commitments from the new regime will lead to difficulties balancing the budget next February.

The biggest change over the years on YDNPA has been over housing policy.

For three years I was chairman of the Planning Committee and during that time, against the odds, we managed to push through a new Local Plan with housing provision for local people at its core. I am particularly pleased with the policy for the re-occupation of former houses, much of which I drafted myself. It is good to see applications coming through and being recommended for approval.

It will come as no surprise that the recent Housing Needs Survey states that "properties across South Lakeland are particularly sought after, resulting from the District having good access, rail and road and fantastic scenery: it is a place people want to move to. Prices are therefore high, restricting choice amongst first-time buyers and lower income households severely".

Moving to our own area, "The **Dales** area is accessible and there is a strong commuter/relocation market. Prices are relatively high and second home ownership an issue". Although our problems are less severe than the central Lakes we still have a great need for local and affordable housing.

The biggest local issue recently has

#### Dear Editor

I was saddened to read Brian Wright's letter in the last issue of Lookaround. It seemed rather like a bad case of sour grapes, especially when compared with Craig Stephenson's account of his activities as our District Councillor.

Paul Winn is to be congratulated on his honesty in standing down as Councillor because he felt he could not give sufficient time to the job due to the demands of his business. This does not mean that all Councillors who also have a "day job" will automatically find it impossible to do both well. Some years ago I was a District Councillor (in another area) and worked alongside many colleagues, of all parties and none, who were effective Councillors as well as holding down full-time jobs. At the same time there were also Councillors who were, frankly, a waste of space despite the fact that they had no other significant calls on their time.

Let's give Craig Stephenson a chance to show what he can achieve. After all, he is only two months into the job! If he falls short of the mark, then the voters of Sedbergh can turn him out when he comes up for re-election.

Taken to its logical conclusion, Brian Wright's argument would lead to the creation of professional local Councillors. which would be extremely undesirable as it would result inevitably in the sort of disconnect we are already seeing between but we need to know numbers for too many national politicians and the people. This has, among other things, caused chronic voter apathy and a level of cynicism that is bad for our democracy.

Finally, Brian Wright has thrown into

his mix a number of observations relating to national political issues. These are irrelevant when voters are considering who to vote for in a local election, when they are in fact looking to elect the best person to represent them and take action on their behalf in relation to local issues. #### **RECYCLING NEWS**

Paper is one of the easiest waste products to recycle in South Lakeland. There are paper banks at 37 of the Recycling Centres and over 31,000 houses have a blue box to recycle paper at the kerbside. Each month in South

Lakeland we recycle the equivalent of over 850,000 newspapers.

There are two main uses for the paper collected, it can be used to make more newsprint or recycled as household paper products such as kitchen roll or tissues. Both products have quality control guidelines that affect the types of recycled paper that can be used. This means that some paper products such as envelopes and non-paper products such as cereal boxes cannot be accepted in the South Lakeland collections.

Envelopes are a particular problem as the window sections are made of a nonrecyclable material and the glue used is oil-based and can cause the paper to split during processing, a major problem if it happens during newspaper production. The manufacturers of household paper products also require their products to be strong enough for the jobs they are used for

If you would like to make some use of your envelopes you can tear off the window and glue sections before using them in your home compost bin. You can also reduce the amount of junk mail you receive by registering with the Mail Preference Service, telephone 0845-703-4599. Many aspects of safety was given. One was to stop at the Zebra Crossing, look and listen before you crossed the road then keep looking and listening. I was very forceful in explaining to the children about the wearing of seatbelts in cars and said that their parents should never move off unless they were strapped in. A number of parents have spoken to me about this since to say that their children are insisting that they are strapped in before moving. At least it has worked on the children, I must now work on the adults!! Of the Seat Belt legislation, ALL PERSONS IN **VEHICLES MUST WEAR SEAT** 

BELTS unless there is an exemption. All Children must wear seat belts suitable for their size and the driver is responsible for those under 14 years of age and liable to be fined. However, the Law is changing



#### TIM FARRON MP

Were your ears were burning when I brought up the issue of the Auction Mart in Parliament the other day? I took the opportunity of a debate on land banking to draw the issue of the proposed sale of the Auction Mart to MP's attention. I am doing all that I can to try to ensure that the site is bought by the co-operative set up by a group of farmers expressly to ensure that there continues to be an auction in Sedbergh.

However, the Sedbergh issue that has been taking most of my time in recent weeks is the proposed closure of Baliol School. North Yorkshire County Council's plans to consolidate their special needs provision with the resultant proposal to close Baliol cannot be

allowed to go ahead. I have been to visit the school several times, most recently to launch a petition to keep the school open which should, by the time you read this, be available for you to sign in most of the shops in Sedbergh. If you can't find a copy or would like to have a copy vourself to collect signature you can get one from my office in Kendal (address at the end of this article). In addition I have been working with the other MP's affected by this decision to put pressure on North Yorkshire County Council to change their minds. It is so much better for children in need of the special schooling that Baliol provides to be as near their homes as possible. The Council's plan to move them to Scarborough is giving the needs of a

#### NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUM

The Voice Community Trust

Peter Gregson explained that the Trust was awarded a 5 year license by OFCOM to run a community radio station in Kirkby Lonsdale, which will be delivered by volunteers and local interest groups from the community broadcasting to Sedbergh, Ingleton, Hornby and Crooklands. He added that OFCOM had to be satisfied that there was a community need for a Radio station. They have a 2 year 'window' to get up and running and will be financed primarily through sponsorship from local businesses and grants and after that should be self-supporting. At present the group are negotiating for a lease on premises in the centre of Kirkby

Lonsdale, and are also having discussions with SLDC for the TIC to be in the same building.

The station will broadcast with local programmes 7 days a week from 7am to 11pm. For more information call Peter on 015242 72843.

Highways Department

Nick Raymond, Highways Engineer for South Lakeland, explained that Cumbria County Council have overall responsibility for the management and improvement of the highway network including support to members. Capita Symonds is responsible to the county council for the delivery of the service including design, planning and day to day management of the highway network. Amey Infrastructure Services are

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
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responsible to the County Council for the delivery of all highway works on the ground.



#### **TOM STEADMAN 1914 - 2006**

Continued from last month.

The next move in 1961 came suddenly. Mum's Dad gave them £40.00 to buy stock. We had 13 cows but no sheep. They bought the 2nd prize milk cow at Penrith Auction which turned out to be a disaster as after a couple of months it was found to be infected with the contagious Johnnes disease. The vet advised immediate slaughter. The other cows got it and went the same way. With no compensation in those days I don't know what we lived on with no milk cheque coming in each month until the quarantine time elapsed.

The drugs administered to Dad when he had Meningitis left him with slightly brittle bones. The leg he had

broken for the second time at Claylands was plastered up and while Mum Garth and I were hand planting 1/2 acre of potatoes, Dad was supposed to be resting but, as we know, he was the worlds worst patient and took no notice of any body in those circumstances. His theory was that on crutches he could dib the holes with his crutch. This almost sounded plausible except once pushed into the stitch he couldn't: get it out again. After digging him out several times it was unanimous that we leave him stuck till we had finished the lob. Another time saw Dad with a broken hand. Dr. Cranston plastered it up forming a loop of plaster reinforced with a bent 6" nail from 1st finger to thumb so that a hay fork would fit through. Dad could now carry on

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building hay pikes that stood out for weeks to sweat out before being swept down and forked into the sink mow. After the Johnes disease disaster, Dad came to Sedbergh to buy some straw from Stan Bracken ready for starting again. Mable Woof who owned the butchers shop in Finkle Street was at Stan's and wanted to sell it. I can remember Mum and Dad talking into the early hours about the pluses and minuses of such a move.

They sold the farm, bought the little shop in Finkle Street and Mounsey's shop with the flats above to live in where the shop is today.

1966 Dad was in hospital leaving Mum to run the shop with me (just left school) and Garth on the van rounds. With galIstones, galIbladder, two ulcers and appendix removed, Dad returned home well to make a full recovery.

Another of Dads favourite pastimes was driving. 1969 was their Silver Wedding Anniversary. The first real holiday. They toured round Norway. A couple more trips to Norway followed.


Other holidays throughout the UK followed. Always just Mum and Dad together enjoying each others company. 1975 and Dad was back in Newcastle Hospital having a brain tumour removed. We nearly lost him that time but, Dad being Dad, he landed back home again with Mum nursing him back to a full

recovery once again. Dad always made a joke about such things like this brain operation so we always returned the banter by suggesting to him, that they had not put it all back.

After this ordeal partial retirement was always on the cards. Full retirement was not in Dads vocabulary. In Sedbergh they had moved from the flat in Finkle Street to Underfell, Joss lane to 2 Queens drive and then to their last home Jim and Florence Pickthal's Flat at Highfield in 1987.

1991 and a new water main was dug down Howgill Lane. The new tarmac was poor and sunk. Dad walking down, stepped back to let a car past and broke his ankle in the ensuing fall in the sunken





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place following the operation to put his ankle back together. Dad made yet another recovery but often said the ankle felt cold. We used to cheer him up by telling him that he was now of some value as scrap metal was making a good price at the time.

For several years up to 1991 Dad ran the over 60's club. Wednesday was tea, coffee, biscuits, dominoes and cards. Funds raised went. towards regular coach t rips. On one trip, afternoon tea was to be taken at the Tan Hill Inn. Once inside his busload of old girls as he called them. (who were nearly all younger than him) forgot about tea and scones. Sherries and Mackeson Stout, was the order with cards and dominoes. By the time he got them all out and loaded back on the bus they were all three sheets to the wind. Singing and joking like never before, they arrived back in Sedbergh. It was declared the best trip ever.

When Dad retired from running the over

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60's, the club closed. The remaining funds bought a new bed at the hospice in Kendal

Dad spent many hours in the shed making clocks and latterly in the house, wooden models. -All just out of his head or from a picture. After Mum passed away, this helped to keep his very active mind occupied.. It also kept him still while the shingles he had, and the hernia operation last year, healed up.

Dad spent many hours going down to the shop to see what Garth was up to, then on to find me to see what I was pulling down or building up. He always left saying the same words. "Right, I can't stop. I've got too much to do" and off he would go to glue another couple of bits of wood to his latest model.

Dad still continued to play the songs he loved on a keyboard in the hall and a Hammond organ, in the bedroom. Glen Miller's Moonlight Serenade was on the music stand when he went into hospital.

It was played at the church.

He made so many friends in his life, it is impossible to thank you all for the priceless kindness you have shown to Dad and Mum over the years. We thank you so much. We have been proud to witness it.

On the many occasions when the happy memories with Mum would not go away, Dad would take a picture of Mum and go back to the local spots where they used to picnic. Killington Lake, Tarn Hows, Uldale, Sunbiggin Tarn, Hartley and many more. He missed Mum so much. When he went into hospital 2 weeks before he died, it was just to get a bit of a top up and give his legs a rest. Having been there a few days, he wanted to be with Mum and he used that same dogged, sometimes exasperating, determination of his to wish himself to be with his beloved wife Primrose, and he did just that. They are back together again now

forever.

#### SETTLEBECK HIGH SCHOOL

Summer News

The last few weeks of the summer term at Settlebeck were, as usual, frantic with activity. There was the sponsored walk from Appersett (via Stone House and Dent) to Sedbergh the trips to Lancaster, Manchester and Carlisle for years 7, 8, and 10, a Learn to Earn Enterprise day for year 9, Art, Music, Drama, Sport and ICT/Business days and team building activities for our year 8 and 9 students as part of the Alternative Curriculum Week. The excitement among the group of students preparing for their Norway **Expedition** rose exponentially in the last few weeks and the wonderful buzz of Sports Day on a sunny, blue skies summer day was the perfect tonic for all those students who were involved in exams during the summer term.

Exams were, of course, a major feature for year 9 with their national tests (SATs) and year 11 with their GCSEs, but modular GCSE courses in maths and science mean that GCSE exams now crop up in the autumn, spring and summer term for year 10 and 11 students.

Year 9 students maths and science SATs results were very good once again

Settlebeck students performed very well with 88% gaining level 5 or above in maths (79% level 6 or above) and 83% in science (57% level 6+). These compare very well with the level 5+ national figures for last year of 74% in maths and 70% in science. Congratulations to the seven year 7/8 students who gained certificates in the demanding UK Junior Maths Challenge and particularly to Harry Porter for gaining the prestigious gold certificate.

Thank you to all those students and families who hosted our Zrecian visitors in May. It was, in spite of some very wet weather, a great success and we continue to deepen the relationship with the local school, its teachers and their students.

Well done to all those year 8 students who took part in the experimental film making with the Cumbria Film Collective this term. The director and the cameramen were knocked out by the enthusiasm, maturity and skill of our students and, after previously working in a number of schools in the county, they are now actively seeking funding to return to Settlebeck, where they felt the quality of our students' work was exceptional. The film which year 8 made 

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is due for a special screening on Border TV in the near future.

This film project, sponsored by Aim Higher and Creative Partnerships, has brought over £4,000 worth of new digital video cameras, Apple computers and software into the school and nearly all staff have been given training in their use. It is an example of the many benefits which have accrued to Settlebeck Lakes Federation of schools. It is from from the technology college status we gained 2 years ago as part of the Rural Academy of Cumbria, which will soon be reflected on our new school sign.

Over the last 2 years the use of ICT across the school has greatly increased, particularly in the technology college official subjects - Science, Design Technology and Maths, where the rooms have been largely refurbished to accommodate more computers. However, over the next 12 months new state-of-the art computers are being fitted into our ICT suite, and banks of computers will appear in History, Geography, MFL and English. In addition, digital projectors and sound facilities are being extended to every area in the school. Thanks to the Rural

Academy and our technology status, our student computer ratio will be at least 2:1 far outstripping the national target of 4:1.

The Rural Academy has clearly been a tremendous support to our small school, providing the benefits of collaboration across a group of similar schools, but we must also recognise that Settlebeck gains too from its membership of the South the Federation that much of our 14-19 curriculum development arises and enables access to a wide range of courses at Kendal College, including catering, childcare, hair & beauty, vehicle mechanics and construction have been greatly enhanced recently by the addition of young apprenticeships in catering and the performing arts as well as more opportunities for work-related learning.

Through our membership of both the Rural Academy and the South Lakes Federation our potential isolation is greatly reduced and our students' opportunities enhanced.

As always, we say some sad farewells at this time of year to staff who move on to new challenges in other places. Kath

Listen up y'all ... The Jamaicans are coming!

"Steel" yourself, to listen to the beat of a different Drum ... for the Jamaicans are coming with their Pans!!!!! to Sedbergh.

We had never heard of Sedbergh before 2003 when someone suggested to us that "it is a very forward little town on the edge of the beautiful Yorkshire Dales, close to the Lake District and not very far from the M6". We were hoping to find a suitable bungalow that would accommodate our four Jamaican dogs and us. When we asked for directions, we were told "Sedbergh is only a small town, you can't get lost". On our way, an interview was being conducted on the car radio with a well known Jamaican Musician, it was quite uncanny, that this interview should be taking place at that time, since I am a Jamaican. I felt fate was playing a major role! The bungalow seemed right for us, and within three months we were able to move from Windermere.

We soon settled in dogs and all, and if we were a bit apprehensive about moving to a "small town", those fears were soon put to rest when we had a visit from one of the local vicars, on the day after we arrived. Most of our neighbours welcomed us, and it wasn't long before we realised that there was much more to Sedbergh than meets the eye. There are a few similarities between Sedbergh and Jamaica. The friendliness of the people tops the list, and there are people from varying countries and cultures. There is a love of foreign travel, but people are happy to settle in Sedbergh. When it rains it pours, but when the rain stops, the sun

comes out. One may think that a strange similarity, but that doesn't normally happen in other parts of England. There are rivers and waterfalls and I like to pretend that Winder is a towering mountain that could be a miniature version of our lofty Blue Mountains, famous for the world's best coffee, and where we had our home prior to moving to the Lake District. 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#### **DENT PARISH COUNCIL**

Dent Parish Council meets on the first Monday of each month in the Sedgwick Room.

Since the local elections in May, two new Councillors have been co-opted to the Council: Margaret Fothergill has joined Graham Dalton, Peter Knapton, Ken McClurg, Ann Wilson and Geoff Woof for the Dent ward, and Jenny Pilgrim has joined Jock Cairns and David Hartley for the Cowgill Ward. At the May meeting, Jock Cairns was elected Chair and Ann Wilson became the Vice Chair.

Mike Duxbury, the Parish Clerk has reluctantly decided that he can no longer undertake the role, owing to pressure of his other commitments. The Council have been lucky to be able to appoint Kevin Price to take over from Mike in September. Kevin is Clerk to several Parish and Town Councils, including Kirkby Lonsdale, and so brings a considerable amount of experience to his new role with Dent.

#### **Finance**

The Council's financial statement for 2005/06 was approved at the June meeting, and showed an income of £26,544.64 for the year, of which £18,578.65 came from Dent Car Park. The expenditure was £17,472.24. Though this included the amount spent on running the car park in 2005/06, a number of items of expenditure for that year – such as rent to the Yorkshire Dales National Park, business rates, redecoration of the toilet block, tree maintenance and grass cutting, which will add up to a further £8 -9,000 – will not be payable until 2006/07.



#### **Stonehouse Bridge**

The damage caused recently to Stonehouse and Lea Yeat bridges by lorries and coaches trying to cross them or, most recently, reversing into the parapet and knocking it into the river, has caused a great deal of anger among residents, and the Council has been trying forward. for some time to put pressure on the County Council, who are the highway authority, to carry out repairs. So when the Council was asked what items it would like to have on the agenda of the recent Neighbourhood Forum meeting that was held in Dent, it asked if someone from the Highways Department could come and speak to residents about the situation. As a result, Nick Raymond, who has responsibility for Highways in this area, came to the meeting and stated that work was due to start on Stonehouse bridge at the end of July. It will unfortunately involve closing the road for about a week while the work is carried

out, but it may be possible to make special arrangements for local residents as was done in Garsdale recently. As Stonehouse Bridge is a listed structure, the work will aim to return it to the same state as it was before the damage occurred.

#### **Gibbs Hall Phone Box**

The Council has been concerned that the public phone box at Gibbs Hall is now behind a gate. After a meeting with the resident, it has now been agreed that a sign will shortly be placed on the gate to indicate that there is public access to the box. In addition, a corresponding sign will be erected at Ibeth Peril to show that the nearest phone is at Gibbs Hall.

At the June meeting, the Playing Field Committee was discussed and Jock Cairns and Geoff Woof then met with representatives of the Football and Cricket Clubs, who are the main users of the field. Discussions will be continuing over the Summer to explore the way

#### SETTLEBECK HIGH SCHOOL

New regulations governing the use of child seat and seatbelts and are due to come into force in September 2006. In terms of taking young people on trips the relevant section states:

What are the seat belt wearing rules in mini-buses and coaches?

Seat belt wearing is already compulsory in mini-buses. The driver is responsible for seat belt wearing by children under 14

> years. The new buses and coaches. is exempt from this

regulations will mean that seated passengers aged 3 years and above will have to use seat belts where they are fitting in the larger In vehicles with over 16 seats, the driver

responsibility because he cannot be expected to monitor seat belt wearing and drive safely at the same time.

The regulations for this will be laid in parliament at the same time as the child seat regulations. Subject to parliamentary approval, they are intended to come into force during September. If you carry young people aged under 14 in a private car then as the driver you are responsible for ensuring they wear a seat

belt. Above the age of 14, young people become responsible for themselves but it would be prudent to ensure they wear a seat belt.

The regulations are fairly complex but these two areas are very clear.

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#### A SEDBERGH VIEWPOINT

I drove through Kirkby Stephen recently two months, and the traffic lights kept and was surprised to see that the miniroundabout nearest to Brough (by the Coop) had been removed. I wonder why. Had there been accidents? I've noticed over the past few months that Sedbergh's spot on the road min-roundabout is witnessed a lot of near misses because traffic on Finkle Street / Loftus Hill have driven straight across without the hint of even a cursory look along Back Lane. It is only because visibility from Back Lane is so poor that drivers approaching from that direction do so cautiously and are ready to stop quickly even if they have the right of way. I do fear that there is an accident waiting to happen there. I think there might be merit in removing this roundabout too – but that's only my viewpoint.

I've heard much criticism these past few weeks about a large sign at Long Lane / Maryfell announcing modernisation of the "council houses" there. If you haven't seen it, it is worth a look. Talk about a blot on the landscape. It is bigger than many motorway signs fixed to poles that appear to be thicker than street light columns. Folk think it is totally unnecessary (I agree) and folk who have bought their houses are not too chuffed about a sign which might suggest that they too are benefiting from the scheme. I just wonder whether it has planning approval.

The gas main renewal work in Main Street has been proceeding at a pace for the last two months. And what a pace! No doubt a complicated job but it seems to be taking for ever. The Post Office and

the Dalesman were under siege for about everyone waiting too (except when they were working only at one end). Sometimes the workers were only there a couple of days a week and often packed up mid-afternoon. If the present rate of progress is maintained they might make wearing thin in more ways than one. I've New Street by April I guess. A job which has to be done, no doubt, but it is a shame for Sedbergh that it is taking so long.

> The Book Town project seems to be proceeding at a rather better pace. Congratulations to all who have worked hard to make it happen. Good publicity recently on TV and in the Dalesman magazine. Don't forget the Book and Drama Festival which starts on 20<sup>th</sup> August and no doubt is advertised elsewhere in this Lookaround.

As you know I like to keep the local politicians on their toes. I was delighted therefore to see reports in last month's Lookaround by our local MP and by our local Liberal SLDC Councillor (under the heading Councillors' Corner). Keep it up, please. We like to be informed of what you are doing for us.

#### **CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST**

Our Local Reserves: Smardale Gill This unique reserve is situated about one mile south of Kirkby Stephen and can be reached via Newbiggin or the Smardale hamlet itself. It occupies a three and a half mile section of disused railway which once ran from Tebay to Darlington. At the northern end, the reserve also includes steep wooded slopes of the gill carved by Scandale Beck whilst south of the viaduct the character changes to open rolling countryside.

Because of the abundance of flora and fauna found here, the reserve has been designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest.

Evidence of man's activities in the area, long before the coming of the railway, is abundant. The remains of a Romano-British settlement can still be seen on the lower slopes of Crosby Garrett fell. Smardale Bridge was originally built for the pack horses of the 15<sup>th</sup> century. Old charcoal pitsteads are visible testimony to managed woodland and a metal-smelting industry.

The railway was started in 1857 to transport coke from the coalfields of Durham to the furnaces of Barrow and the west coast. This route required a splendid viaduct constructed in 1860 of local sandstone and using lime mortar produced from the nearby lime-kilns. The line closed in 1962. In 1990 the Northern Viaduct Trust carried out major repairs making it safe for visitors to the reserve.

Cumbria Wildlife Trust is managing the track-side areas where birch, willow and

Primroses, bluebells, ramsons and many

hazel have colonised the banks.

fern species can be seen in spring in the older more diverse woodland areas which are also frequented by roe deer and red squirrels. Bird species include redstart, wood warbler and pied flycatcher in the summer with buzzard, treecreeper and sparrowhawk in evidence all year round.

The grassland areas are dominated by blue moor grass, rare elsewhere in Britain. Amongst this grows a number of herb species such as bloody cranesbill, birds foot sedge, common rockrose and wild thyme. Common spotted orchid, fly and fragrant orchids also grow on the grassy slopes of the embankments and cuttings.

The grass attracts a rare butterfly, the Scotch Argus. Its eggs are laid on the leaves of the blue moor grass, a staple food of the caterpillars. Adults can be seen flying in late July to early September. Smardale is one of just two sites in England where the butterfly occurs. Others to look out for include common blue, northern brown argus and dingy skipper. The Trust is managing the grasslands by scrub removal and light sheep grazing to maintain the rich flora and invertebrate fauna.

Although the reserve is always open to visitors, why not take advantage of the Open Day scheduled for August 20<sup>th</sup>? Family activities and home-made teas are added attractions.

#### JUNE WEATHER

The month got off to a warm, dry start. In fact we didn't get any rain until the 10<sup>th</sup>. This was followed by 6 more dry days followed by 5 wet days, 3 more dry ones, and a further shower ending in 6 dry days. The total rainfall for the month was only 1.69 inches. Temperatures were a bit variable with some very hot days, a maximum of 81.2F and 18 days reaching the 70sF. The minima were also varied. The "highest" minimum temperature recorded was 60.3F at 11.45pm! The minimum for the month was 36.5F!!!!. A ground frost that night really knocked back delicate plants. Maximum wind speeds varied from a high of 19.5mph down to 6.7mph.

A few more bumble bees did appear but they seem a little late this year. Apparently our native bumble bees are being decimated by escaped imports brought in to pollinate greenhouses. Likewise their have been very few butterflies. I have seen the odd meadow brown, a rarity up here for me and some small tortoiseshell caterpillars on the nettles. Bats are still in short supply. Has anyone seen a hedgehog this season yet? I have just read a new piece of research that says unless badger numbers are reduced hedgehogs will be extinct by 2025!!!! Perhaps some of the badger brigade might start to listen. The swallows flew as did the blackbirds in the shippon. The single robin is starting to loose his freckles. This dry weather has made it difficult for the blackbirds etc to find suitable food for their young. The tits and sparrows have arrived back from domestic duties with an increased family judging by the speed at which my feeders

need filling! Apparently our changing seasons are catching out some migratory birds. As our springs have been a bit earlier by the time the grey plover gets back the leather jackets, on which they normally feed their young, have hatched so plover nesting success is suffering. Funny old world isn't it.

#### A MESSAGE FOR .....

Secret Poets

When we are children we are all poets, before self-consciousness takes over. Children love using poetry to record their impressions of the world clearly and simply just as they see it. And what brilliant images they create! ......... that gently noise ......... the bottle-bee ........ two phrases I remember from children's poems.

Many of us leave poetry behind. Do we come to believe it is too childish, or that we can't do it 'properly'? Even those of us who do continue to write poetry often keep it as a kind of secret, as though it were something to be ashamed of. Why should we?

Poetry is the oldest form of telling factual and fictional stories. Rhythm and rhyme made it easier for the storyteller to remember and to entertain the listeners round the fire. Far from being a childish occupation, it was the only way to learn history, mythology, and to understand

love, war and loss. Even now the War Poets still bring the experience of the trenches to us clearly. Poetry isn't always serious of course—Chaucer was both rude and funny and writers like Pam Ayres make us smile by putting their own slant on common experiences.

There can't be a right and a wrong way to write poetry. Look at the variety in any published anthology of the last 50 years! There seems no limit to what poetry is.

So, what is it that stops people who would really love to have a go? Can it be fear of being thought sentimental or pretentious? We humans are so strongly inclined to want to express very important events and feelings in a poetic way – just look at the verses in the cards we send each other. A published poem can bring a belly laugh, a rueful smile or tears to our eyes unexpectedly, as it touches a chord in our hearts.

However when we come to our own poetry, showing that to someone can feel as difficult as making a speech to a crowd

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who may not be listening, or even throw eggs at us!

If you are a person who would like to begin writing poetry, take it up again after a long gap, or if you already do write but would like to take it a little further, a poetry group or a night class could be the very thing to build your skill and confidence. In a supportive group your poetry can be polished up, and your constructive opinions on other people's efforts are very much appreciated.

Here in Sedbergh a small poetry group have been meeting regularly over the past year, expertly tutored by Jonathon (who is a poetry MA student at Lancaster University). Although we would have liked more members we have not advertised because the meeting dates have been a bit wobbly from time to time, reside within the LA10 postcode area and and we have had to change the venue occasionally (which has sometimes made it seem more like an underground resistance group than a poetry meeting!).

Fortunately, from September the CDC will be running an Adult Education Poetry class once a fortnight on a Wednesday and Jonathon will be the tutor for this. If you are interested, please look out for details in the CDC brochure, or contact Chris or Rosie on 21031. All are welcome, and no experience is necessary.

P.S. Over the past year we underground poets have been very busy and are publishing a short anthology of poetry we SLDC at just under £300 per year, which have written that will be on sale soon. CAR PARK - JOSS LANE AGREEMENT REACHED

At a meeting on the 20<sup>th</sup> July between the SLDC Chief Executive and Sedbergh Parish Councillors agreement in principle was reached for the takeover of Joss Lane car park by the Parish Council.

Provided that this is agreed by SLD Councillors on the 16<sup>th</sup> August, as from the 1<sup>st</sup> of September local people who at Middleton and Killington will be able to purchase an annual parking permit for their car from Sedbergh Community Office. The charges will be as follows:

A normal permit will cost £35 per year. THIS IS LESS THAN THE **EQUIVALENT OF 10P PER DAY** 

The cost of a permit for those who wish to park overnight will be £52 per year THIS IS EQUAL TO £1 per week

The money raised through the parking charges are to pay for the lease of the car park and for other overhead costs.

The charge for permits had been set by would have remained the cost had the Parish Council not been able to negotiate this deal to lease and run the car park.

#### **COUNCILLOR'S CORNER**

**STOP PRESS:** I am pleased to announce that the Parish Council and South Lakeland District Council (SLDC) have reached an agreement in principle, concerning Joss Lane Car Park, today, Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> July. This was the second of two meetings that I chaired between Parish Councillors and SLDC officials (namely the Chief Executive of SLDC, Mike Jones and the Cabinet Portfolio Holder for Car Parks, Graham Vincent). It was at this meeting that a new proposal was submitted by the District Council and accepted by the Parish Council, concerning the transition of the running of Joss Lane Car Park from SLDC to the Parish Council.

Sedbergh Parish Council, who will be leasing the Joss Lane Car Park from the District Council, will now begin the process of pricing and producing resident permits with a view to issuing permits from September 1<sup>st</sup>. I do hope you will join me in supporting this new endeavour, for this represents a significant step forward for the town and means the Parish Council now has complete control of parking rates for residents and local use, which during this past six months has been the cause of real frustration for many.

Many of you will have read in recent additions of the *Westmorland Gazette* about the proposal to close Baliol School in Sedbergh in 2010. A specialist school for 11 to 16 year olds with behavioural or emotional difficulties, it is run by North Yorkshire County Council who now proposes to close it and transfer all activity to Scarborough. Needless to say,

this would be a serious blow to our community and indeed Cumbria as a whole, for Cumbria County Council does not have any schools of its kind in the county and relies heavily on Baliol to accept referrals from within its county borders. The School is very much part of our social and economic fabric, employing upwards of 50 staff, sourcing allot of its supplies locally and regularly offering its sports facilities (including the new gym to be opened this Autumn) for community use. Consequently, The Headmaster of Baliol, Drew Anderson, myself and our MP, Tim Farron, are engaged in an intense campaign to help halt proposals to close Baliol and have launched a petition which I would encourage as many of you to sign as

- Has raised over £50,000 during the last 16 years including £12,000 of which came from gift aid (ie tax back)

possible. Petitions are currently available from the Sedbergh Library and the Community Office, Powell's, Steadman's and Sedbergh Outdoor Leisure and Dent Stores and Dent Post Office, to name but a few. We hope to present the petition to North Yorkshire County Council in early September.

The state of roads within the ward continues to be an issue, and both Garsdale and Dent Parish Councils have identified major hot spots, in need of immediate repair that they have, along with Tim Farron MP drawn to the County Council's attention. County Councillor, Jo Nicholson, had also invited Nick Raymond, Highways Engineer for South Lakeland, to a Neighbourhood Forum in Dent to take questions, explain the current situation and talk about ways of addressing local concerns. Whilst there are certainly on going issues to address and changes in the highways service that need to be made, there are some improvements underway, such as the repair work along Busk Lane and the Sedbergh - Kirkby Lonsdale Road.

These have been some of the more immediate issues of the day that I have been helping to address, but I am also eager now to explore some more long term issues, such as traffic calming and the recycling of plastic. I realise there is a need to rationalise our recycling points, as the recycling areas appear to mushroom, but there is a genuine need to start recycling plastic in the area, and I am working with the SLDC Cabinet Portfolio Holder for the Environment and Sustainability, Brenda Woof, and Parish Councils in Sedbergh and Dent, to scope

the possibilities of participating in a pilot programme for plastic recycling in the District.

The Summer Holidays are now upon us, and I wish you all safe travels wherever you visit!
