



In a nutshell the easy questions are: Is there housing need in the Sedbergh area? (Yes) Should we do something about it? (Yes) Does that mean we need to build A LOT more affordable houses for local people? (Yes) The harder

questions and the main focus of the evening: How many should we be building? and Where? PLEASE COME ALONG. There are some papers for the evening and you might find it useful to read them before hand. In that case please ring Peter Stockton on the Yorkshire Dales number 0870 1 666 333 and he will send you a set. But you don't need to have seen them before the meeting so please come along either way.

Again I have received complaints about the cycleway signs on Back Lane and in Gawthrop etc. Cumbria hasn't the slightest intention of listening to the widespread dissatisfaction. Their argument is that they are for cyclists and so they send people by our more picturesque routes. The problem is that

many casual visitors mistake them for ordinary road signs for cars. They are just not different enough. After all, footpath signs are easy to distinguish and don't cause a problem.

The policing of the gypsies and the Appleby Fair will be one of the main subjects at the Neighbourhood Forum next week. Craig and I intend to have a more Sedbergh specific meeting as well so we can deal with the issues which caused so much trouble this time. More about this next month.

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FIRBANK PARISH MEETING

On Friday 26th June Tim Farron MP and Peter Thornton, Local Councillor attended Firbank Parish Meeting in the Church Hall for a Question and Answer session.

Issues raised included Closure of Hospital facilities, Delays in Single Farm Payments, Closure of Toilets and Rural Post Offices, Car Parking and Reducing Speeding along Firbank road. The energetic action by our MP on local issues was praised.

Problems of funding for the NHS, Defence and Farming was compared with the £100 billion per year stated to be the true cost of EU membership, whilst the current move towards political union in the absence of a referendum is undemocratic and not what the majority of the electorate want

A vote on EU exit would allow the reinstatement of the Milk Marketing Board so as to balance the pricing power of the supermarkets whose profits on milk were now over 14p per litre, with farmers making two pence loss per litre.

One speaker challenged the MP to do something as UK MP's were to blame for giving away UK power to the EU. The Lib Dems, Mr. Farrons party, are supposed to be part of HM Opposition vet have never opposed the other parties. on a loss of sovereignty to Brussels. Mr Farron said that membership of the EU is "a good thing" and did not think a referendum would be allowed as Government would like to keep UK in the EU and might lose a vote an EU exit.

Returning to the Milk Question, another speaker pointed out that our politicians have agreed to the rule that 15 % of UK

dairy products must come from the rest of the EU. He sighted the EU directive EC97/67 of 2003 which forced competition on the Post Office resulting in losing business to German parcel firms and in turn leading to the possible closure of 2500 rural post offices. Thus giving away our power to make our own laws could, in due course, result in major reductions in postal deliveries in our own area. Already the Post Office had lost the payment of pensions, much of its TV licence trade and there is an attempt to take away vehicle relicensing.

Peter Thornton had said that toilet closures had now stopped but car park charges had to proceed as the council needed the money. Further signage on Firbank road might help to reduce speeding.

The Chairman Mr Alan Tattersall thanked Mr Farron and Mr Thornton for attending. Edwin Bateman

DENT PARISH COUNCIL

The July Parish Council meeting was a busy one, and dealt with a number of topics. Full details can be found in the minutes, which are published on the Dentdale website www.dentdale.com. Grant to Dent Show

The organisers of Dent Show were awarded a grant of £500 towards the costs of this year's event over the August Bank Holiday weekend, which the Parish Council are keen to support. Street Parking

Concern has been expressed again recently about street parking in the village, particularly on the cobbles and around the Green. The Parish Council is investigating whether the small areas of

land opposite the Sun Inn and Dent Stores could be used to help the situation. In the light of this, the Parish Council felt and will also be writing to householders and businesses in the village that are most advance, in case Dent is one of the affected to ask for their views.

Car Park Takings

The car park income for the first three months of the financial year was £7,836, compared with £7,911 last year. As might be expected, the amount taken does for the Saturday bus, there have been seem to depend on the weather, so it is possible that takings may be down this year unless the weather picks up.

Planning application

According to the National Park's planning policy, new houses can only be built in Dent if they meet local needs criteria. A number of residents have expressed concern over the application from the owner of Church Cottage to convert his workshop into a house, because they do not feel that it meets these criteria. The Parish Council agreed, and decided to continue to oppose the application which will now be considered answer is straightforward – simply take by the Park's planning committee on August 14th.

Dent Post Office

Parish Council meetings now have a short Public Forum item, when anyone can raise a matter of concern. At this month's meeting, John Caygill informed the Parish Council that the Post office had now decided to close 2,500 post offices throughout the country, and only 500 of these would be replaced by a more appearing on the front of the bus shelter. limited service. On the current timetable, *Playing Field Footpath* specific proposals for closures in this region will be made by the Post Office from January next year, after which there will be a six-month period of consultation. The final decision will not

be made until June 2008 at the earliest. it was important to prepare a response in offices proposed for closure, and so further discussion will take place at the next meeting.

Saturday bus

Since Stagecoach took over the contract several occasions when the bus they have used has been too large to get through the village. The Parish Council have contacted the County Council to ask them to ensure the bus company keep to their contract. However, the service often has very few passengers, and this may make it difficult to find anyone to take on the contract when this one finishes in September.

Summary of the Minutes from 27th June.

Young People's Meeting Area - Cllr. Longlands and District Cllr Stephenson and some of the young people involved have formed a working group and are investigating possibilities of a site somewhere on the playing field.

Lighting in The Folly - Mrs J. Frankland has given her permission for a lamp to be placed on her property.

YDNP Consultation Meetings on Housing and Minerals and Waste. - Four meetings to be held in the area. The first on Housing was in Sedbergh on 20 June, :• but due to poor advertising it was only attended by four people. Another meeting will be arranged for 7 August.

Community Office – Proposals to reduce the amount of plastic bag usage in :• the town. It was agreed that the Parish Council would support in principle the proposal that all plastic bags issued by shops should be bio-degradable.

Cumbria C.C. – Community Waste Prevention Fund. It was agreed to pass this on to the Community Office with the Appeals offer of support on making an application :• if required.

Community Office – Invitation to a meeting on 26 June to discuss a proposed : • Outdoor Festival in 2008.

- single story extension for extra living space – 16 Guldrey Terrace. – *Noted*. Complaint - Unauthorised access, Howgill Lane – The accompanied map

had insufficient detail to allow identification of the site or comment.

The following councillors agreed to serve on a newly established Planning Committee: Cllrs Blair, Allan and Longlands. This committee will have delegated powers to comment upon planning applications and other planning issues in cases which require an early response.

Councillors were provided with a supporting paper listing income received, and requests for payment received since the last Council meeting. The Council agreed to all requests for payments to be paid.

It was resolved that the Audit Committee should be given delegated powers to authorise the payment of regular, periodic invoices.

It was agreed to pay an honourarium to Mrs J Benson in respect of the work done for the Council as Internal Auditor of the year-end accounts.

There will be no increase in the cost of permits for the car parks from August for 2007-8. The sign stating free overnight parking will be removed. Concern was expressed about the flooding on Joss Lane Car Park and it was resolved to write again to SLDC asking for remedial works.

The pedestal of the ticket machine in Loftus Hill car park has to be installed and connected to the mains supply before the main machine can be installed and made operational.

The Council agreed to cooperate with Mr Atkins of the Community Office in the development of proposals for the provision of allotments.

The Parish Council decided to fund the

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purchase and erection of two signs which advertise and promote Sedbergh Booktown and Town Twinning.

The Parish Council has received several expressions of concern regarding the antisocial behaviour of some of the Travellers camping along the Cautley road prior to the Appleby Horse Fair. District Cllrs. Lancaster and Stephenson are arranging meetings to discuss the issue with the police and District Councils. Cllr Blair will also attend these meetings.

Some town residents have expressed opposition to the proposed move of the Health Centre to the Auction Mart site. A market stall holder has expressed concerns about the future survival of the Wednesday market. It was agreed that the

concerns about the future survival of the Wednesday market. It was agreed that the Car Park committee would meet him to discuss the issue.

A local resident has been refused an application for District Council housing because of living away whilst attending university. District Cllrs Lancaster and Stephenson agreed to take this issue up with SLDC.

Concern has been expressed about speeding cars along Loftus Hill and Busk Lane.

EATING WELL

Traditional Chinese medicine gives a framework for understanding how the body uses food and how it is affected by different types of food. In this model the Stomach receives the food and moves it downwards into the intestines, so that the nutrients can be separated from the waste.:• The Spleen transforms the pure essence extracted from food into Qi (energy) and transports this to wherever it is needed in the body. The functions of the Spleen include aspects of digestion, absorption and metabolism. The names of the organs are capitalised to indicate that the meaning is different from our usual understanding of these words. The word Qi (pronounced "chee") is used to denote the energy, which motivates all

movement and transformation within the body.

In our society much attention is paid to the chemical make up of food. We often neglect simple measures which would help the body process food more effectively:

The Stomach's function is facilitated by eating warm, moist, cooked food as then less energy is required for digestion. Over consumption of cold raw food taxes the Stomach and depletes Qi. In the long term this can adversely affect all systems of the body. One of the most commonly cited causes of disease is over consumption of cold, raw food. This means all food and drink cooled by refrigeration and all raw fruit and



vegetables.

- Good posture while eating facilitates the downward movement of Stomach Qi. Prefer to eat sitting upright at a table, rather than slumped in an armchair.
- between 7 and 9 in the morning and the Spleen between 9 and 11 in the morning. Twelve hours later, in the evening these organs are at their weakest. A good meal eaten at breakfast time is efficiently processed and provides Qi for the rest of the day. The same meal eaten in the evening is much more likely to produce bi-products such as phlegm or overweight.
- Regular mealtimes support the good function of the Stomach and Spleen.
 Eating well early in the day can help avoid the need to snack on less nutritious food later on.
- Over consumption of certain types of food gives rise to bi-products of the digestive process which can impede the efficient working of the Spleen. For example, over consumption of dairy produce or greasy food can cause internal Damp (so called because its effect on the body heaviness, bloating, swelling of joints, aching muscles, muzzy headedness is similar to the effect of damp weather). Over consumption of meat or spicy food can cause internal Heat.
- The best dietary strategy is to eat as great a variety of food as possible, while avoiding all processed and junk foods. This both ensures a wide

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range of nutrients and avoids overtaxing the body with too much food of one type. A varied and nourishing breakfast is especially important. Escape from the tyranny of breakfast cereals and toast.

- The Spleen raises Qi to the head to ensure clear thinking. For this reason eating while working or reading diverts energy from the digestive process. Eating at ones desk, and working breakfasts or lunches deplete Spleen Qi.
- Worry adversely affects the Spleen.
 Try to eat in a calm and stress free environment. Avoid serious discussions and especially arguments at mealtimes.

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT BEEKEEPERS' ASSOCIATION

The badly unsettled weather seems to have had less effect on our bees than we might have feared. Bees are supreme opportunists as well as better weather forecasters than the Met Office!! These constantly changing heavy downpours of rain and hot sunny intervals are more reminiscent of the tropical rain forests than a typical English summer! However our bees combine hard work and excellent timing to take full advantage of the sunny intervals to continue to gather large quantities of nectar and pollen, racing back to the hive as the next dark clouds approach. The result is that having gathered a near-record spring honey crop for us to remove, extract, and bottle, they are now successfully building up their honey stores again for the main summer crop. To manage this, two things are needed; healthy, strong colonies, and large quantities of summer flowering plants giving lots of nectar. Sedbergh beekeepers are particularly fortunate that most of our area has so many fine flowering trees, fields of clover, and gardens full of the flowers that our bees can work. Other parts of the county are less fortunate in this respect however, and the story can be very different for their bees experiencing such weather. With insufficient 'forage' to enable the bees quickly to replace the honey that the beekeeper has removed, there is a risk of the colony actually starving. We have had to issue a warning to members in such areas to check carefully that their hives still have adequate stores, and if necessary to feed them with sugar syrup! The weather has been kinder for our



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club meetings however. It didn't matter that the weather was awful on the day of our 5th Annual Summer Beekeepers' Convention - we were inside, too - and enjoyed four excellent talks from our speakers. And after a morning of downpours, the afternoon was almost perfect for our apiary visit to our members in Burrow. We were able to inspect all of their hives and carry out all the planned actions on each. One colony had swarmed during the previous week and had been set up to be united with and strengthen another colony. We were able to complete this process that consisted of persuading the worker bees of the swarm to join the main colony below a screen that the queen could not pass using

very good training for our new and novice members.

Our next apiary visit is at 2.30pm on Saturday 4th August at my own apiary at Lingarth.



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SQUIRRELS

The excellent article in last month's Lookaround described the damage caused by grey squirrels to trees, plants, crops, houses, other wildlife and, in particular, the red squirrel.

For many years Ingram Cleasby has been organising the Sedbergh Red Squirrel Group which now has a network of more than 50 people. It is probably their work which has successfully preserved our delightful little native red squirrel in the Sedbergh area and, as a consequence, the Garsdale/Mallerstang area has been classified as one of the sixteen national Red Squirrel Reserves. Surrounding these reserves are 'buffer zones' where it is imperative to 'control' the greys and prevent them entering and breeding in the protected areas where they could spread the parapox virus and starve out the reds. Sedbergh, Cautley, Ravenstonedale, Marthwaite and Dent are the reserves go to: all in the buffer zone for Garsdale and

Mallerstang.

At the moment there seems to be a population explosion of grey squirrels and the Sedbergh Group needs your help. Most of all we need reports of any sightings of greys and reds, particularly if they are regularly coming to your garden or bird feeder so that we can determine where and how large the populations are. In addition we always need trappers or shooters who can help to reduce the number of greys. If you are doing 'grey control' on your own property please let us know so that your information can be added to the computerised data.

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

Visit to Aysgarth Mill

16 members of the Society went on a 'behind the scenes' tour of this famous mill in June. The first sight which greeted them was the magnificent spectacle of the River Ure in full spate thundering over the falls. Walking along the narrow slippery path to inspect the point at which mill race drew water from the top of the falls certainly focused the mind!

Yore Mill was built as a cotton mill in 1784 alongside what was then the old packhorse bridge built in 1539 in the reign of Henry V111. The bridge had to be widened for the building of the mill.

In common with most mills in the region Yore Mill has had a chequered history.

Destroyed by fire in 1852 it was greatly enlarged on rebuilding with an extra storey added. The worsted then produced was given out to the knitters in the dale. When machine goods came in 1870 this finished and 7,000 jerseys were left in the needed cash for further renovation. hands of the knitters for several years until they were eventually dyed red and surprisingly sent to Italy as redcoats for Garibaldi's army.

In the early 1900's a portion of the mill became a school under John Drummond. a noted mathematical scholar.

The mill converted to flour milling in 1912 until this ceased in 1958.

On walking round inside members could see that the internal structure and roof were in need of total renovation. That is except for the imposing 60ft roof beams which spanned the ceilings on all 4 floors and somehow found their way into the mill from Malmo in Sweden when it was rebuilt in 1853, long before our road network.

The mill race, however, was most impressive, being in fine fettle and full working order. The original Gilks and Gilchrist water turbines, installed in 1939/41 to replace the water wheel, have been reconditioned to almost as good as new as part of a project, now complete, to generate electricity for use in the complex and to feed into the National Grid. This in turn should generate much

But as vet it was difficult to see what else the future holds for this ancient mill in today's modern world.

WENSLEYDALE RAILWAY A WHIFF OF STEAM!

Steam trains return to Wensleydale for a month in August

Steam operating dates: Aug 1-17 and Aug 21- Sept 2

Visiting steam locomotive No 80105 will haul the first train each day from Leeming Bar to Redmire and bring the last train back. During the day it will shuttle between Redmire and Leyburn, with extra passenger mileage between Leyburn and Constable Burton (no alighting or boarding there) for the loco to run round. Wensleydale Railway's DMU (diesel multiple unit) trains will provide a feeder service between Leeming Bar and Leyburn. (Please note that on the three days 18-20

August (Sat to Mon) DMU services only will operate while the steam loco undergoes routine maintenance).

No 80105 is one of only 14 of its class to have been preserved. It was built in Brighton in 1955, rescued from a scrapyard in Wales in 1973 and restored for service at Bo'ness and Kinneil Railway in Scotland. The steam services are expected to bring publicity and

JUNE WEATHER

Well what a month!!!!!!!! Officially it was the wettest June on record and although we had 4.89 inches of rain we escaped the worst. In South Yorkshire, where my sister lives, they had that amount in 24 hours!!!! When you consider we started the month with an official drought, i.e. 14 days without measurable rainfall, it was somewhat damp for the latter part of "flaming June". During the first 10 days we had some hot days with temperatures reaching a maximum of 82F. Minimum temperatures dropped to 45.5F and on 6 nights the minimum was actually when I took the readings at midnight. It was also a breezy month with only one day when the wind speed did not make double


figures. The maximum recorded was a speed of 21.5 mph and all but 3 days the winds were from the North West quarter. Pressure readings obviously reflected these wind speed with the latter part of the month being in the low 29 inches of mercury.

The weather obviously affected what happened in the natural world. We lost a clutch of blue tits in a nest box. I can only assume that the parents met with an accident or because of the wet weather could not feed the young properly. Hedgehogs are few and far between and I have only seen two as RTA's. A few bats have been around in the warm evenings but they must struggle on these wet nights. Bam owls certainly have trouble feeding their young when it's wet so it

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will have probably be a poor season for them. Has anyone heard a cuckoo this year? I have heard one for a couple years now. I used to hear one working its way up the River Rawthey. Blackbirds are doing better since they started using our shippon. There are 2 nests on ledges and one on a dinghy mast up on the beams. The wet weather has meant plenty of worms for food. The magpies reared 4 young again and have stopped the collared doves and wood pigeons from raising their broods and no doubt other birds which nest around the garden. The swallows have finally decided on using their old nest in the kennels and have started laying. Blue tits were obviously successful somewhere, as were house sparrows, as hordes reappeared in the

middle of the month and proceeded to eat us out of house and home. Greater spotted woodpeckers have also been successful and we regularly see young on the peanuts. I understand there are a good number of mink around the area. These pests will decimate the local wildlife. Most of them came from fur farms which were released by the animal rights brigade. In Lincolnshire, where we used to live, ones released there totally wiped out every moorhen, coot and mallard in parts of the county. The only bonus of the warm "damp" weather has been the vast growth of plant life. It will be good for hay and silage, if they can ever get it in, but nettles, goose grass and other weeds have erupted. After something like 35 years the Tulip tree in our garden has finally flowered.



THE DOYENS OF DANCE

from Skomarje to Sedbergh. You've heard them sing - now, see them dance!

I first went to the Skomarje village hall high in the mountains above Zrece on Christmas Eve a couple of years ago. We had walked down the mountain through the snow from Rogla with a group of Slovene carol singers, stopping to drink blueberry brandy in the woods, our songs echoing out towards the stars over our toasts. We arrived at the hall just before midnight, the windows all misted over, the air thick with laughter and the tables full of singers in full flight getting ready for the midnight mass.

Summer is a different scene in the village as the Folklorna Skupina Jurij Vodovnik Skomarje (pronounced Folk-

lorna Skoo-peena Yur-ee Vod-ow-neek Skor-mar-yay) dancers from all over the Pohorje mountains gather to celebrate their national dances. They are particularly diligent as they prepare for their visit to England, and their first visit to their twin town.

ACROBATIC DANCES

Their dances reflect the varied nature of their country, which although being small shares with Britain the characteristic of having a wide variety of different customs and traditions. They include Balkan dances from Croatia and further south, as well as dances from all regions of Slovenia. They present a very lively spectacle with some dances approaching the acrobatic as the men leap up onto the shoulders of their comrades for some of

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the more robust circle dances. Other dances include partner dances and polkas.

THE SINGING NEWSPAPER

The dance group is named after a famous local poet, Jurij Vodovnik, who was sometimes referred to as "the singing newspaper" because he would travel from farm to farm during the mid-19th century just bring some cakes to share for



collecting news and turning it into songs which were sung at the next farm he visited. Naturally he was very well treated wherever he went as everyone wanted to be presented in a good light. He is today revered as one of Slovenia's most celebrated folk artists.

WORKSHOPS AND CONCERT

You can learn and join in with some of these Slovene dances at workshops at Baliol School on Saturday August 11 between 10.30am and 4.30pm (please bring a packed lunch.) Or if you prefer a more leisurely appreciation of dance - you are welcome to come to the performance in the People's Hall at 7.30pm.

And on Sunday, there is a walk with dancing in some of Sedbergh's beauty spots, and an afternoon where Lesley Alban and her dance class have kindly offered to teach our Slovene friends some of the Scottish Country Dances which they learnt through the winter at Sedbergh School. Our instrumentalists are busy practicing Scottish dance tunes and if you would like to join them please get in touch. Everyone is welcome to this class - especially if you have some experience of Scottish country dancing - just bring some cakes to share for afternoon tea on the terrace. We'll dance outside on the lawns if it is fine - inside if wet.

Just give a ring if you want to book - or pop into the TIC. And don't worry if you'll miss them over the weekend - they are also performing in various places nearby - get in touch if you would like to join them on any of these trips.

OPPORTUNITIES TO HELP

As always, there are many opportunities to help with the visit and let the dancers know that they can experience the same warmth and hospitality as all the many Slovene singing groups have experienced from their visits to Sedbergh (and as many people from Sedbergh have experienced when visiting Zrece.)

If you're the sort of person who only helps when someone has called you up and twisted your arm, now is your opportunity to try a different approach by giving a call (Sedbergh 21166) and asking if you can be part of the fun. Helping out could help you learn how to cook Slovene exotic dishes, learn some new phrases (or even a song) and make new friends from across the seas as you help with driving - or even shake out the odd stiff limb or two to the catchy beat of Slovene dance tunes.

SEDBERGH TOWN BAND Italian Trip 2007

Thursday 5th July

rehearsal commenced at seven. The rehearsal room in itself was fine but the Bandmaster was not happy with the echo - a problem subsequently solved by the judicious hanging of blankets from the walls.

Friday 6th July

Two items that could be played as the evening saw the Band joining the by the combined bands were identified and as promised the music (completely new to the Sedbergh Band) was delivered Eextraordinary, consisting of a huge, well to the hotel in time to feature in the morning rehearsal.

With the Sunday concert taking place in the morning, rehearsal time was clearly going to be at a premium, so after a short break for lunch the Band worked at the new music for a further couple of hours.

The remnant of the afternoon was spent by most of the party in the swimming pool of an hotel owned by a relative of our hosts. Situated in the beautiful grounds of the splendid hotel the swim was enjoyed enormously.

Friday was indeed a busy rehearsal day Fiuggi Band in their rehearsal centre. Their facilities proved to be quite equipped hall which was a substantial

section of what had previously been an enormous and elegant hotel catering for the wealthy visitors to Fiuggi seeking cures from the spa water for which the town is famed.

The Fiuggi Band, although containing a number of brass players and a large timpani section was more slanted in the direction of woodwind instruments and its fifty plus players could more accurately be said to be constituting a wind band. The object of the exercise was to rehearse together the numbers selected for joint performance. As expected the combined efforts of some eighty players produced a most impressive sound. We departed hack to the hotel confident that the combined Sunday morning concert would go well. *Saturday 7th July*

The morning was again spent in intense rehearsal smoothing out the finer points of the numbers selected for our section of the Sunday concert. The three hours before lunch and afternoon activities siesta, sight-seeing, swimming etc., were insufficient to cover everything so an early supper and an additional evening rehearsal was decided upon. Sunday 8th July

In musical terms this was to be the day of the trip. Breakfast was taken early (7.00 - 8.00) to enable the Band to assemble at the venue, the Fonte Bonifacio VIII in the Spalacato, a huge, wooded area dominating Fiuggi, and tune up efficiently.

The day was carefully divided up into units. At 9.30 the Fiuggi Band were to march up the drive from the entrance of the park to the bandstand. There they were to play a few numbers standing and responsive chord in the national psych. In a different vein was 'A Moment for Moncorre', better known as a compilation of theme tunes featured in Clint Eastwood's spaghetti westerns -

surrounded by the audience. After introductory and welcoming speeches by a local dignatary the Sedbergh Town Band were to give their varied, forty minute programme. On completion the stage was to be yielded to the Fiuggi Band for a similar length of playing time. The entertainment was to climax with the two bands combining for the previously rehearsed items. Presentations and speeches were then to be made and the proceedings were to come to an end with the playing of the two national anthems by the respective bands.

In spite of the complexity of the arrangements and the large number of personnel involved the proceedings unrolled seamlessly and followed the projected arrangements perfectly. The Sedbergh Town Band's playing of their numbers was greeted with warm enthusiasm in a performance of consistent quality. As always 'Drummer's Delight' was particularly well received, as was the Corps of drums' 'Drumsticks'. Jim Dillo, dressed in full Scottish piper's uniform, was splendid in both appearance and performance in 'Highland Cathedral'.

The Fuiggi Band demonstrated the range of their mixed instruments in exciting pieces the most notable being a fine selection from 'West Side Story'.

The playing by the Combined bands of 'O Sole Mio' was extremely popular with the local audience: this romantically emotional tune clearly touches a responsive chord in the national psyche. In a different vein was 'A Moment for Moncorre', better known as a compilation of theme tunes featured in Clint Eastwood's spaghetti westerns -

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conducted by Alan Lewis it was a terrific concert to in excess of one thousand with performance and was rapturously received. The combined section ended with a playing of the 'Radetsky March' accompanied by the rhythmic clapping by medical advisers. the audience traditionally associated with the last night of the Proms.

Wednesday 11th July

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

SLOVENIEU

On January 1st 2008, Slovenia takes over the presidency of the Council of the European Union. The Sedbergh Town Twinning Group will be offering, to our friends in both Zreče and the Slovenian embassy in London, Sedbergh's best wishes and enthusiasm for this momentous event in Slovenia's history.

Slovenia is the first of the 2004 EU-accession countries to take on the EU Council presidency, and the first Slavic country to do so, so this is indeed a significant event for Slovenia.

The presidency of the Council of the EU falls to a different EU country every six months. From this year the system has changed somewhat. Up to now, each country brought a set of aims that they wanted to implement during their slot. A six-month timeframe is too short for these aims to be fulfilled entirely, though there should be some movement with the responsibility of presidency.

Britain took the presidency last in 2005 and the aims of the British government were especially ambitious: a review of the EU budget structure and reform of the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP). No chance achieving this entirely in six months, of course, though Britain got agreement for a review of EU spending including the CAP, and a report is due to be published in 2008/09.

Britain was followed in 2006 by Austria and then Finland, who worked jointly on broader and less contentious aims.

From 2007, the presidency cycle runs over an 18-month period, with a heavyweight country guiding the agenda and taking a six-month slot as president, and two economically smaller countries each taking six months, with help and



guidance from the bigger one. This gives a better chance of there being time to carry things through. Germany had the presidency for the first half of 2007, and then executing more-or-less the same programme as Germany come Portugal followed by Slovenia, these three forming a triple-share.

The main aims of the Germany/ Portugal/Slovenia presidency are somewhat technical; they are to try and take forward in some form the EU constitutional treaty that was rejected by referenda in France and the Netherlands in 2005; to encourage the development of an innovative, knowledge-based society (sometimes you'll see this referred to as the Lisbon Agenda); to develop an energy policy; and to emphasise a commitment to market efficiency, social cohesion and environmental protection.

Possibly the new triple-shared presidency will be less fun than when Britain in 2005 could be abrasive on spending and Italy in 2003, in the person of Silvio Berlusconi, could be making offensive off-the-cuff comments about Nazis during his speech, while Green MEPs held up banners proclaiming, "No godfather for Europe". (Though maybe

not, given the recent comments of the Polish prime minister, Jaroslaw Kaczynski about why he thinks Poland doesn't have a bigger population than it does, and who may have been a bit upset after a German newspaper said he looked like a potato).

The meeting of EU heads of state in Brussels in June this year agreed that there should be a permanent president of the Council of the EU, to replace the expensive six-month rotational system — this was the meeting where there were newspaper headlines in Britain over calls by some people for a referendum, it appears in the belief that the voters would say no, presumably not no to this particular element, but of course no is a blanket no. A referendum on such

complicated issues currently seems unlikely so it could be that a permanent president will be appointed and Slovenia's presidency will be among the last of the existing type.

Because of Sedbergh's town-twinning links with Slovenia we shall be taking especial notice of EU matters during their presidency in 2008 and demonstrating our interest to our friends and colleagues there.

As with everything relating to the EU, putting the whole story in a few paragraphs is impossible. In every statement made here, there could be pages written on the ins-and-outs of it. If you'd like to know more or comment, please email:

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NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUM

The Watches

Andrea Bell reported that there are 575 coordinators for Neighbourhood Watch in publicised through voice connect. South Lakeland - currently each with 15-20 households on average. In Dent and Sedbergh there are 28 coordinators (I was : and Bar Watch. not aware! Ed.). Andrea added that the main problem is fear of crime.

Andrea reported that South Lakeland Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership have paid for Neighbourhood : Neighbourhood Watch and the Crime Watch to have 'Voice Connect' which allows simultaneous transfer of information to all coordinators in the area in question. Intelligence coming back from rural Neighbourhood Watches are up 150 since the introduction of Voice Connect.

Andrea added that permission is needed from the householder and the officer working on the crime before it can be

Many Watch schemes operate including Boat Watch, Caravan Watch, Shop Watch

'Whistler' the Neighbourhood Watchdog is used to publicise schemes with school children.

Much work is done between Prevention Officer working with travelling people. There was trouble around the time of Appleby Fair with thefts from garages, outhouses etc (Not known where. Ed). The person arrested was from Bolton and admitted that he expected the travellers to take the blame.

Andrea reported that 34 farms in Sedbergh & Kirkby Lonsdale have had property marked with 'Smartwater'. *Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority*

Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority Paul Wilkinson the YDNPA Ranger explained that the main part of his role is public access, management and maintenance of the public right of way network. In recent times this has expanded to include managing Open Access Land were access has been made available, on foot, in the uplands under powers made available under the CRoW Act 2005. Paul works with the local communities of the three parishes of Dentdale, Sedbergh, Garsdale, individuals, schools and organisations on a wide ranging set of issues relating to National Park purposes. He added that the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act last May allows positive management of green lanes etc. The Police can now be involved and action has been taken against individuals abusing the Act. Paul also works with schools and parish councils.

Examples of recent works include looking into the possibility of creating a new area of managed woodland in Garsdale at the request of a landowner. Working with the YDNPA Archaeology department to manage a contract to repair a Lime Kiln in Dentdale and to improve a section of footpath in Dent village to allow for wheelchair access adjacent to the playing fields and Keld beck.

The YDNPA and Sedbergh Parish Council worked together to identify a potential candidate for the Open Spaces Hidden Places scheme. These proposals were not taken up in the first phase of the project but remain on file for future consideration.

Paul reported that part of the Yorkshire

Dales Local Plan 2004/06 includes a local occupancy policy which concentrates on those who will contribute socially and economically to the park. A meeting was to be held on June 19th in Sedbergh People's Hall on the Local Development Framework to discuss housing, waste and minerals (We were not aware. Ed).

In response to a question about the widening of the National Park boundaries, Paul agreed to bring an update to a future meeting.

It was reported that piles of stone have been laid across the gate and pipes just off the pavement at Sedbergh Auction Mart, presumably to prevent access to the site.



CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

A Visit to Sunbiggin Tarn.

The rain happily abated for this hugely enjoyable and informative visit to the Special Site of Scientific Interest (SSSI) which includes Sunbiggin Tarn and the CWT reserve of Tarn Syke.

This area was once a settled and comparatively prosperous farming region. There is ample evidence of human activity over several historical periods dating back to 8000years BC at least. Much folklore tells of murdered drovers, ghostly horsemen and the sinister "dowly" or melancholy tree. The skeletons of two fighting bulls were reputedly found at the eastern end of the Tarn. The whole area is based on carboniferous limestone and has many

special features including calcifying springs and the rare Gevers whorl snail.

Ably led by John Mounsey and Helga Frankland, the party first examined the wildlife species just north of the road. The soils are a mixture of acidic and alkaline here where glacial drift overlays the limestone. Almost immediately the six-spot burnet moth was spotted with vivid red spots on a metallic blue-black wing. Apparently the spots act as a warning to predators that this species is particularly distasteful. The caterpillar feeds on the bird's foot trefoil plant which was here in abundance. Wildlowers also spotted here included tormentil, ladies bedstraw, selfheal, mouse-ear chickweed and eyebright, socalled because the crushed plant produces

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an essence which soothes the eyes (but don't try this at home!). Further along the path more floral species were identified: white clover, bittervetch, heath bedstraw, yarrow, thyme, ladies mantle, salad burnet, violet, autumn and mouse-ear hawkbit and fairy flax.

Amongst the heathers (ling, cross-leaved and bell) were many varieties of grasses. We found quaking grass, yorkshire fog, crested dogstail, meadow fescue, purple moor grass and sweet vernal grass (which scents the hay). We observed the burnet moth emerging from its silken cocoon and saw several emperor moth

caterpillars nearby. A common blue damsel fly was also glimpsed amongst milkwort and vellow rattle with some early harebells beginning to flower.

The party then moved to the wetter areas adjacent to the Tarn. Birds at Sunbiggin (sunny

building) are most prolific in autumn but we could see tufted duck, grebe, coot,



moorhen and swans with nearly grown cygnets. In these wet flushes were fragrant and northern fen orchid in

> abundance with ragged robin, wood anemone, ladies mantle and birds eye primrose.

The Tarn Syke reserve was well wetted but those with suitable footwear were able to enjoy the rich biodiversity conserved here.

Snipe, curlew, tree pipit and windchat were soon spotted with meadow brown, large skipper and small heath butterflies. The early marsh orchid, sneezewort, marsh marigold, marsh cinquefoil, pignut and angelica were found with a spread of cotton grass beyond.

This is a rich area and well worth a visit at most times of the year. We are all very grateful indeed for the expertise of our leaders on a splendid afternoon out. Our next outing will be a Family Riverside Walk in Dent on 12th August.

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COUNCILLOR'S CORNER

August 7th not a date to be missed! .. That's if you want your say in influencing youth, now on a monthly basis to; scope, Yorkshire Dales housing policies and action plans and help to address a very immediate need of 55 homes in our area alone. And I don't say this flippantly – I attended the first of these consultative sessions held in Sedbergh where Dales Planning Officials hosted and structured the event to ensure that residents were able to break into small group with Planning staff and Dales Representatives and discuss housing issues from their point of view and have their say. Discussions were wide and varied and no housing subject taboo, from airing thoughts about whether we need to review the policy on barn conversions to considering the use of brown field sites for affordable, local occupancy homes. This meeting starts at 7pm on August 7th in the People's Hall in Sedbergh. I very much hope to see you there!

Another key local issue on my agenda, as you may have read previously, is provision and services for our young people in Sedbergh. I'm meeting with Parish Councillor, Steve Longlands, and District and County Council Officials, and most importantly of all – Sedbergh's develop and deliver a youth shelter. We have meetings in the People's Hall at 6.30 on the last Wednesday of the month, prior to the Parish Council meeting, though the date maybe a little different this month, given the holiday season. We are now at the stage of identifying a specific location for the shelter and preparing some initial drafts of what it may look like and determing whether or not it can have dual use. This is not new territory for the region, a number of Parishes have ventured down this path. which will be helpful to us as we move forward and seek external advice. Most importantly, however, we need to tailor the shelter to meet local need, so the local voice, your voice, and practical input, your input, is critical and warmly welcomed!

On the matter of updates – I have been in conversation with Senior District Council Officers at South Lakeland. reviewing the annual migration to Appleby Fair and your phone calls on this subject this past month have also been

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very welcomed. Your calls have helped me generate a full understanding of the situation and will inform my thinking when I join a region wide meeting working alongside County Officials, the Police and leaders of the traveller community to provide a workable solution to some of these issues.

Traffic calming constitutes another update, but for me, rather frustratingly, county council bureaucracy moves slower than I would like and given traffic calming is not strictly a District but a County issue, its more difficult to get the progress I would like. Nonetheless, many of you in person amend through my do something a little different! survey work, have highlighted time and time gain, the problems of speeding

through the centres of built up areas, and so I feel duty bound to press for this to be addressed as effectively as I can.. Which would be through the installation of a speed indicator sign. I appreciate this will only address one area of our ward where speeding is excessive and a concern, but if we get the right location, it raises awareness for a much larger area and sending out the right messages to drivers that speeding is a concern to us.

Website survey launched – with a free prize draw

Internet users who click on to the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's (YDNPA) website are being given the chance to say what they think about it.

And everyone who provides feedback will have the chance to be entered into a free prize draw.

The survey aims to establish whether the site is easy to use and contains the information people want.

The site – at www.yorkshiredales.org. uk – was a key communications tool that the YDNPA uses to promote its work and the National Park,

Authority Communications Manager Kath Taylor said: "We are adding new sections to the website all the time in an effort to provide an even greater service to the public. "At the same time, we are constantly trying to improve the accessibility and usability of the site.

"For that reason, we need to know if we have got it right and if we are providing the information people want in the format they want.

"We ran this survey last year and it generated some useful feedback and ideas about the site.

"We have taken on board many of these ideas – for example, we have included information on car parks, toilets and access for all and there is a lot more about activities, with a whole new Getting Active section.

"We have also made a lot of improvements to our planning services – allowing people to check planning applications and appeals online and to look at the Local Plan and other policy documents.

"And we're about to have the website tested by some users with particular

disabilities and special requirements and this should also throw up some interesting comments.

"This year, as an added incentive to website visitors to complete the survey, we will ask them if they would like to be entered into a prize draw with the chance to win a National Park branded reversible jacket worth £35 and £25 in cash."

Last year's survey showed:

- 69 per cent of respondents thought the website was either good, very good or excellent.
- 64 per cent said the website information/ content was




either good, very good or excellent.

- 55 per cent rated its user-friendliness as good, very good or excellent.
- 61 per cent said the design as good, very good or excellent
- 67 per cent of respondents said they would either revisit the site or recommend it to a friend
- The most common reasons for visiting the website were either to plan a visit (33.3 per cent) or for research/education purposes (30.6 per cent).





HOUSING DEVELOPMENT MEETING

The planning process, which leads to a blueprint of policies dealing with various subjects, which guide how decisions on particular applications are made, has undergone changes in recent times.

Instead of a sheaf of topics being considered together and, an A-Z of policies being published every 5-10 years, a continuous programme of reconsideration is being followed, topic by topic, such as employment, farming development and community services.

The YDNP, after the present local plan was adopted in 2006, has embarked on a subject review, starting with the major one of housing and the provision of affordable accommodation.

A second change has been made in the formulation of policies and instead of the Authority drawing up what it considers should be in, and then seeking views from the public, the public has to be

consulted before pen is put to paper, and peoples responses and ideas are taken into account prior to renew schemes being worked up.

A series of open meetings have been taking place throughout the National Park. The inaugural one was held in Sedbergh, but it was felt that the advertising had been poor. (It did not appear in Lookaround and we were not aware. Ed) It was decided a second public meeting should be held, which will be on Tuesday 7th August at 7.00 p.m. in the Peoples Hall, Sedbergh. The events held to date have been lively with a lot of views being expressed. The formula for the evening is that Peter Stockton, the planning officer who deals with strategy, sets the scene with factual information and options to take housing into the future. What is discussed now will be seen in policies from 2010 onwards.

After Peter's presentation, people join discussion groups, led by planning officers, to give their views and find an agreed position, if possible, which is then recorded. Questions asked include what are peoples feelings about extending the present housing boundaries in settlements and allocating sites where houses may be built, should houses be limited in size, should new designs and modern cheaper construction methods be allowed, to encourage more affordable accommodation?

A detailed action plan for the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) in the coming year is now available on the internet.

The Best Value Performance Plan 2007-08 (BVPP) sets out the Authority's achievements over the last year and the projects and schemes it intends to complete in the next 12 months.

Authority Chairman Carl Lis said: "The last financial year was a successful one with the Authority's overall performance improving in a number of priority areas.

"For example, the total area of the National Park that is now in good conservation management has risen to 75 per cent and the number of footpaths in good condition has risen to 83 per cent – which equates to more than 1,700kms.

"Another success has been a dramatic improvement in the time it takes us to deal with 'household' planning applications – with 89 per cent now dealt with within eight weeks – the best of any National Park Authority.

"Obviously we are not complacent – there is always so much more we can do to improve our performance and to develop approaches, with our partners, to cope with the challenges of the future,

particularly with the predicted effects of climate change."

The BVPP also includes information about the Authority's funding and its performance against a number of nationally-set performance indicators.

A Special free guided walk is being staged to give more residents and visitors the chance to explore Open Access areas of the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

The Countryside and Rights of Way (CRoW) Act 2000 came into force in the Upper North West and North East England in 2005 and increased the area of open access in the National Park from four per cent to 62 per cent.

The new legislation meant that walkers could enjoy far more of the beautiful landscape than before – nearly 400 sq miles extra within the National Park alone.

To help people understand their new rights under the CRoW Act, the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) has organised walks in different parts of the National Park accompanied by the

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RECYCLING NEWS

We recently held a Feedback Meeting at Kendal Town Hall and have also been reviewing the comments you have sent us 100,000 plastic bottles a month. SLDC about the services you would like to see introduced in the future.

Currently our main priority is to extend the existing Kerbside Recycling Service to the parts of the district that have yet to be included. However we are always interested to hear your views on the services we provide and how you would like to see them improved.

Many householders have told us they would like to see plastic and cardboard collected from the kerbside. There are some problems that currently prevent us from introducing this service, for example householders would require some kind of container to collect the materials. This presents a particular problem at those properties that have a restricted amount of space to store bins or boxes.

However we intend to look at this problem, and the other problems associated with collecting cardboard and plastics, to see if there are ways in which they can be addressed.

AUGUST GARDENING

In the dim and distant past, when I studied Horticulture at College, I well remember a certain lecture on "Plant Pests and Diseases" in which we focussed on Rust. The lecture came to mind this week when I was looking at a sad specimen of Rambling rose 'The New Dawn' which is so rusty this year that many of the flower buds have failed to open and most of the leaves have already dropped off. My College lecturer would have been thrilled by the sight as rust was one of his favourite fungal diseases and he particularly liked describing the way the fungus spread, through what I think I remember him calling "Rumpent Pustules" (you have to roll the "R" to get the full effect).

Rose rust first shows itself in spring, when elongated patches of bright orange fungus appear on cracks in stems and leaf stalks. These patches grow from the fungus which has overwintered inside the stems and they produce spring spores which spread onto and infect the leaves and buds. The summer spores which are rusty orange, are produced from these pustules and spread to other leaves and adjacent plants. In late summer black pustules develop and produce overwintering spores and the whole cycle begins again.

Rose rust may weaken plants sufficiently to cause dieback and even death, and as it persists inside the plant from year to year it can be very hard to control. All infected leaves and stems should ideally be removed and burned and plants can be sprayed with fungicides such as mancozeb (Dithane), penconazole (Scotts Fungus Clear) and myclobutanil

(Systhane Fungus Fighter or Roseclear3). Failing this why not take a good long look and say to yourself "Ah! What a wonderful rash of rumpent pustules"

DIALECT DIGEST

We've all had good reason to be feeling a bit 'unner t'weather' lately. There are plenty of ways to describe the almost continuous rain many of us have been experiencing. Among the more printable ones is, 'It's fair chuckin' it daan!'

My mother, who came from Sheffield, used to say, "It's comin' daan i' stairrods," though this tends to lose its impact considering that stair-rods are probably rarely seen in homes these days.

The White Rose Garland, a wealth of dialect terms and expressions first published in 1949, contains the expression, 'Rain afooar seven, fair bi eleven.'

The explanatory notes expand on this: 'If it begins to rain an hour or two before sun-rising, it is likely to be fair before noon and so continue that day. But if the rain begins an hour or two after sun-rising, it is likely to rain all that day, except the rainbow be seen before it rains.'

This is attributed to 'Shepherd of Banbury' in a work called Notes and Queries, and dates from about 1853. And there's another highly descriptive

dialect expression, which I'm sure has

been heard throughout Northern counties many times in recent weeks: "Oh heck! It's silin' daan agin!"
