

DENT PARISH COUNCIL

The September meeting discussed the Neighbourhood Watch scheme and the proposed affordable housing development in the village. These and other topics are summarised below, and the full minutes are published on the Dentdale website. www.dentdale.com.

Proposed housing development above Ghyllside

Two Castles Housing Association are currently finalising their plans for six three-bedroom and six two bedroom houses in the field above Ghyllside. By the time this article is published, these plans should have been submitted to the National Park for planning permission and be available for inspection by the public on the YPNDA website.

The Parish Council is concerned about the following issues, and has written to the planning authority accordingly:

 both the existing road at Ghyllside and the new section should be brought up to standard so they can be adopted by the highways authority

 the development should include two car parking spaces per household

 any stone used for facing should be local

 the high cost of stone facing does not result in a poorer internal finish

• the development does not worsen the rainwater run-off from the site

South Lakeland District Council has set aside money from council tax on second homes in order to enhance affordable housing projects, and the Parish Council is pressing them to release some of this money for this project

Written applications should indicate how the project will meet the above criteria and be sent to The Parish Council, c/o West Banks, Dent by 15 October 2007. They will be considered at the Parish Council meeting in November.

Deliveries to Railway Workings A lorry delivering ballast for repairs to the railway has caused damage to roadside walls on its way through the dale. The Parish Council have written to Network Rail to complain, and to suggest that the railway is used for future deliveries. Neighbourhood Watch

Andrea Bell, the Neighbourhood Watch Officer for South Lakeland, gave a short presentation on the Neighbourhood Watch scheme at the last meeting. She is intending to meet with all those in the scheme in Dent in the near future to evaluate its current effectiveness.

Street Parking in Dent

Thirty-six households responded to the letter sent to residents about street parking in the village. A large number of people disapproved of parking on the cobbles, and there was support for an approach based on persuasion rather than coercion. Opinion on what to do with the pieces of land opposite The Sun and Dent Stores was fairly evenly divided, with twelve households wanting this land freely available for any parking, and nine wanting parking on it restricted to adjacent householders. Parking by the playing field was not perceived to be a major problem, but ten households identified a parking problem on the roads around The Green.

The response also produced a large number of useful ideas to improve things, and based on these a number of recommendations will be put to the next Parish Council meeting. It is likely, however, that any proposals will need to be discussed with Cumbria Highways before they can be implemented.

Bonfire Night

Last year a number of people – some from outside Dentdale – took advantage of the Dent bonfire night to tip rubbish on to the bonfire site. This required a lot of work to clear up after the event, as some of it was not suitable for burning. So this year, please do not tip rubbish on the bonfire unless you have been asked to do so by the Football Club. *Next Meeting*

The October meeting will be at 7.30pm on October 8th in the Sportsman's Inn. The public is welcome to attend as always, and to raise matters of concern in the Public Forum item which takes place about 8pm.

P.C. Orr emphasised that Karen's role is strictly 'non-confrontational' and that it has limited powers.

National Park. Mr Petyt introduced himself as recently appointed to this position for one year.

The mains power supply has been connected to new lamp stand on the footpath between Bainbridge Road and Main Street.

Speeding cars – Cllr Hirst informed the Council that Sedbergh School has tried to get Cumbria Highways to install 'speed bumps' on Loftus Hill, but without success. In response to a suggestion by P.C. Orr, Cllr Hirst will pursue the possibility of installing flashing orange lamps where the pupils cross by Winder Drive.

The new town signs will be put in place this week.





Mr. T. Moffat, secretary of Sedbergh Wanderers had written giving an outline of the maintenance to the pitch which the club had undertaken. The club has agreed to maintain the pitch in lieu of rent, and the club was asked to provide a copy of its maintenance plans for this 07/08 season.

Mrs J. Duckworth has drawn the Council's attention to a hazard on Main Street in the form of a loose flagstone outside of Powell's which caused her to trip and hurt herself recently. The Parish Council will refer the matter to Cumbria Highways

Cumbria Rural Infrastructure Support Programme. - There are various grants available to maintain, develop and enhance rural communities. These were noted and that they might be relevant to the proposed Young People's shelter.

The Council's Planning Committee made comments and recommendations in respect of the



following planning applications: The Hill, Marthwaite.- Erection of a Conservatory It was felt that the proposed Conservatory was `in keeping` with the wonderful old house. The design fits in neatly with an ornate roof light. An extension which was undertaken by the present owners in 1997 blends in beautifully and we would expect that same standard of work and care to be undertaken should this application be granted by the Yorkshire Dales National Park. In Favour 19 Sycamore Avenue, Sedbergh.-Erection of a two storey extension to the side of the property to extend the master bedroom and to provide a shower room at first floor An improvement from the single storey extension on site at present. It was felt that a small window in the rear elevation at first floor would enhance No Objections 21Fairholme, Sedbergh - Erection of a two storey extension to the side elevation with a single storey extension to the full length of the rear elevation. We would like to see

sufficient space left at the side of the proposed extension for access to the rear garden. The proposed extension would balance with the adjoining property, but it would take the price of the property out of the purchasing reach of many local people.

No objections except as mentioned. Sedbergh Service Station - Erection of an illuminated sign on garage forecourt. We have not received any adverse comments regarding this sign being illuminated. Previous retrospective planning application for two signs refused. We had no objections to previous application. *No objections*

2 Bushby Yard, Sedbergh -Retrospective application for sub division to form two separate dwellings. A site visit was undertaken as the plans were very unclear. The area shown as the kitchen, which the application states has been re-tiled and fitted with new windows, detracts from what could be charming courtyard cottages.

No objections to the sub-division Crosedale Beck Farmhouse, Howgill Lane, Sedbergh - Retrospective application to replace `lean to building` and erect new potting shed? We object to this application as it is totally out of keeping with the simple barn to which it is attached. Is there anyway in which this application could be `tied` to be a potting shed only.



Finance - Councillors were provided with a supporting paper listing income received, and requests for payment received since the last Council meeting. Some of the invoices were deferred to the Audit Committee for consideration in line with the policy decision made at the last Council meeting. The Council agreed to the other requests for payments to be paid to L. Barker Ltd (£91.89) for connecting mains supply to the ticket machine in Loftus Hill car park and to Rycrofts (£61.88) for bird boxes for Queens Gardens, but not for the £25 p.a. rental arrears for the last ten years in respect of the fishing rights on the Clewes claimed by SLDC. Cllr. • Lancaster informed the Parish Council that SLDC had no legal authority to reclaim arrears of more than six years outstanding. It was agreed that the Parish Council would only pay £150.

Joss Lane Car Park

The new signs are now in place.

- The Car Parks Committee has distributed a letter to all of the market stall holders informing them of the revised rental rates, based on the number of bays taken up and the time of year, and the prohibition on them using the coach parking bays.
- A joint letter from the Parish Council and the Chamber of Trade, will be sent to stall holders attending the monthly Farmers Markets encouraging them to use the weekly market.
- The re-cycling skips have begun to encroach upon the parking



bays again.

- The Car Parks Committee will consider the possibility of allocating dedicated parking space for motor bikes.
- Preliminary investigation of the drainage system would appear to indicate a blockage under Joss Lane. If so this would be a County Council responsibility. It is understood that further investigations will be undertaken.

Loftus Hill Car Park

- The ticket machine will be made operational for 1 September.
- The Car Parks Committee suggested that the parking bay by the toilet block be dedicated to motor bikes providing access from the school library be blocked off at that point. Cllr Hirst offered to explore the feasibility of this option.
- The next job is to install new doors in the public toilet block.


Cllr. Hodge expressed appreciation for the considerable work undertaken by Cllr Blair in respect of both car parks.

Revised Code of Conduct – The Council adopted the new Model Code of Conduct as it applies to Parish Councils.

Mr. G. Ayling had drawn the Council's attention (from his personal experience) to the danger of injury to the little children using the play area from youths kicking footballs in that direction. It was agreed that a physical barrier which protected the children accordingly should be erected, although it was also agreed that the play area should not be totally fenced off from the rest of the playing field. The Clerk will seek guidance as to the most appropriate and durable form of fencing for this purpose.

Cllr Scarr passed on concerns of some parishioners about road safety of children crossing from Fairholme to the playing field. However, the Parish Council considered that the two warning signs currently in place were sufficient.



DENTDALE METHODIST CHAPEL

Back in the 1970's a Youth Fellowship was formed in the village, meeting first in a Cellar in Main Street and then moving into a barn in Vicarage Lane, it attracted a large number of young people and a spinoff was a series of Specials when Christian youth groups would come and lead an eve in the Memorial Hall or the Chapel, groups like "White Shadows" and "John 3;16". In the 1980's a weeknight group for primary school children was started called Hunters and this met after school, then some years later a group called "Jungle Club" was started and met straight after school at the chapel. COUNCILLORS CORNER

I should complain about the weather more often. No sooner had I submitted my article for last month's Lookaround than the weather took up. This completely altered the situation for us and our farming colleagues. It is extraordinary how the ground has changed. Patches of land which were like jelly a month ago are now baked hard in the ruts which the haytime machinery left. It just shows how complicated our weather and climate are. For us variation is the norm and probably always has been.

I certainly would not class myself as a climate change "denier" but I am sceptical about the claims of some of the wilder prophets of doom. As a local historian I know it is self-evident that the climate around here was warmer in summer in the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries. How otherwise would the hedges have grown at 800 and 900 ft - hedges now replaced by walls. evidence that change and variation are normal.

There was no nonsense this time about leaving footpaths open within the restricted zone thank goodness. I would be far from surprised if that was not the cause of this new flare-up. Locally the restrictions are hurting a lot more this time because of the time of year. As I write this the new cases seem to be under control, let us hope that continues to be the case.

Good news on affordable housing in Dent with plans for the twelve new houses likely to be submitted this week. It was interesting to work out that nowadays a development of this size involves at least ten different "partners". I have had long talks with



different people and am very hopeful of a successful outcome.

Thank you to Dr Lumb for his letter to the gazette concerning the future of Westmorland General Hospital. The site and location of the hospital make it essential for the health and well-being of our area. Clearly it is always going to cost more to provide this service in areas such as the Morecambe Bay than in inner cities. Curiously I note that other services which cost more to deliver in cities than rural areas are readily given more grants to provide that inner city service. This is why SLDC has lost so much of its support grant since 2001 and still remains below the

technical grant floor. The simple truth is that some services do cost more to deliver in rural areas and other do cost more in urban ones.

Lincoln's Inn Bridge remains closed to traffic at the moment, lets hope they make a good job of the repairs and that no-one knocks either of the parapets out of line for a while. Experience shows that these major, planned operations are more effective than the minor "make do and mend" repairs. This has been well demonstrated in Garsdale where the work done last March has now bedded in and looks really good. Meanwhile many other sections are breaking out. There does seem to be a recurring problem with the road surface breaking away from the layers underneath as can be seen by the horrendous holes at Potgill and Badgerdub.

Since my last article, Peter Ridgway has been appointed as Chief Executive of South Lakeland and Lawrence Conway has been promoted to Peter's former position – congratulations to both. I would hope for a period of stability in the senior management team now. At least the ins and outs of SLDC's senior officers are no longer filling the front page of the Westmorland Gazette, that must be good.

The nights appear to be drawing in with remarkable speed and Parliament will be back at work within a week or so.



NEW TECHNOLOGY

Satellite tracking for Dales cows Cows in the Yorkshire Dales are being fitted with electronic collars so they can be tracked by satellite – to help conserve the National Park.

A herd of 50 Blue Grey and beef Shorthorns on Natural England's Ingleborough National Nature Reserve is being used in a unique experiment that will help landowners and farmers to improve

management of the wildlife on their land.

The collars contain a Global Positioning System (GPS) receiver to give an instant 'fix' on the animals' position at any time and a data logger which will record information so it can be downloaded onto a computer.

And the equipment will even be able to tell if, at any given time, the cow wearing the collar has its head down grazing or whether it is standing still or moving.

The pilot scheme is the latest phase of the Limestone Country Project (LCP) – a joint venture launched in the Yorkshire Dales National Park in 2002 involving the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA), Natural England, the EU LIFE-nature fund, the National Trust and other partners.

It aims to preserve rare plants and flowers by encouraging farmers to return to mixed livestock grazing using hardy, native cattle breeds. The five-year project has exceeded all its targets and has also managed to

save money – earning it a 12month extension earlier this year.

Paul Evans, who manages the Nature Reserve, said three collars are being used in the experiment on cattle grazing

on almost 200 hectares of hill land. "The cattle are free to roam over

pretty large areas so, at any one particular time, we don't always know exactly where they are or what they are doing," he said.

"I think this is one of the first projects of its kind to use GPS collars on livestock – normally they are put on wild animals like polar bears and tigers to track their movements.

"The idea is to find out where they

go and at what times of the day and the year. We can then analyse the vegetation and terrain in those areas – for example grassland, peat bog or scrub.

"That will tell us what they prefer to eat during the different seasons of the year and this will help us to asses their impact on the local ecology." has enabled us essential work. "The results w us to provide de

"This detailed information on animal behaviour will help us develop management techniques to direct the cattle away from certain areas and into others.

"We are hoping to expand the project to other upland areas of the Yorkshire Dales over the next couple of years to give hill farmers the information they need to manage those areas successfully in the future."

Louise Williams, the YDNPA's Limestone Country Project Officer, said: "Having the one-year extension has enabled us to carry out this essential work.

"The results will be vital in helping us to provide detailed information about animal behaviour and grazing patterns – both of which are important for the future of livestock farming in these upland areas."


auction was held in the Village Hall of a landscape by Henry (Harry) W Bracken, which had been donated by a kindly church member.



AUTUMN

The changing seasons play a big role in the traditional Chinese medicine view of human health. This time of year the change is from Yang (warmth, activity, expansiveness) to Yin (cold, hibernation, contraction), which can be can be particularly challenging.

The two main points to bear in mind are gearing down our level of physical activity and to strengthen ourselves to withstand the colds, flus and other infections which do the rounds over the winter. The respiratory system (nose, throat, lungs) is our first line of defence against airborne infections. This is the time of year when traditionally the lungs would be strengthened, to better resist infection. This can take the form of using particular acupuncture points, taking herbal medicine or doing exercises for the lungs. A simple



exercise is to breathe in while raising your hands above your head, stretching the ribcage, and to breathe out while gently lowering the arms. Both yoga and Tai Chi have many such exercises.

The lungs are supported by the good function of the digestion, absorption and metabolism. Conversely, if our food is not respiratory system. If you are prone to mucous, it is a good idea at this time of year and over the winter to limit your consumption of mucous producing foods such as milk, cheese and bread. Also be aware that the digestive system itself needs nutrients to function properly and a proper meal at breakfast time is the best way of providing this. I am often concerned that my acupuncture clients do not eat enough early in the day. A typical eating pattern would be toast or cereal (or nothing) at breakfast time, a sandwich or soup at lunchtime and snacks to fill the gap before the evening meal. This pattern deprives the body of the nutrients it needs to function during the day and predisposes to mucous production and weight gain because too much is eaten in the evening. (I know I am repeating myself here, but evidence suggests that the message has not yet got through.) If you can, eat a substantial breakfast, a good lunch and a smaller meal in the evening. As we come in to winter, the focus

should be on rest, recuperation and storage of energy for the coming year. It is important to eat warm, cooked food with little or no raw or cold food. Avoid overwork and excessive physical activity.

Currently I am running a Qigong class (exercise for health), in which we are developing a sequence of exercises appropriate to autumn and winter, to benefit the digestion, to strengthen the lungs and the immune system, clear out mucous and to gather energy. In addition we are studying Wild Goose Qigong, which is over the autumn. Should you wish to a sequence of movements for health and is alleged to come from Daoist monks in the mountains of China. I

have been practising it regularly myself for the last 5 years and I know it is very effective for health maintenance. It can have a marked effect on minor ailments such as stiffness and headaches and generally produces a sense of well being. The class takes place every other Friday morning, from 9.30 to 11, in the garden of the Bull Hotel, weather permitting, otherwise in the URC hall. 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MISSING LINK

His Majesty's Motor Torpedo Boat 93 World War Two was going badly for the Allies in early 1942. Hitler had conquered the western part of Europe treasurer with the aim of raising and had invaded deep into Russia. Japan had destroyed a large part of the American fleet in the Pacific at Pearl Harbour in December 1941 and Britain was to lose Singapore in February 1942. It was against that background that the government decided to hold Warship Week to raise money for building ships for the navy. During the week ending 14th March all the country tried to raise money from individuals, firms, schools, etc, and by organising special events.

The Sedbergh rural district formed a committee with Mr J. F. Trotter as chairman, Mr W. Downhill as secretary and Mr M. D. Goodwin as £25000. A public meeting was organised for 2nd February in the British School at 8pm. Prior to that the secretary had written to various people asking them to attend the meeting and to support the cause. For example the minutes of the Sedbergh Rural District Council for 28th January record the secretary's appeal for help from its members. In addition to requesting donations the Warship's Week Committee organised a series of events in the town to take place during the week.



These events were recorded in the Westmorland Gazette. On the Tuesday evening a variety entertainment was given by members of the Forces in Powell Hall. At the same venue on the Thursday evening a concert was given by members of the staff of Sedbergh School. Two dances were held in the Masonic Hall, one by the Warship Week's Entertainment Committee and the other by the Milnthorpe (sic) and Farfield Social and Athletic Club. A whist drive was held at Cowgill. People also made things to be sold to raise money. The schoolchildren made models of warships, Miss Joyce Sowerby made a table cloth and Masters Len Nelson, Harold Bell and Billie Conchie collected, chopped and sold firewood. The result of all the efforts and donations was that the Sedbergh rural district raised £60,381 which was over twice its aim.

The end product of the money raised was H.M.M.T.B. 93. The boat was given the motto "INTO BATTLE FOR SEDBERGH & DISTRICT" plus a metal plate with the following words inscribed on it. "Presented by the people of the Sedbergh Rural District to H.M.M.T.B. 93. to commemorate its adoption during Warships Week March 14th 1942". In return the district received a shield and a message inscribed on a brass plate. "Presented by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to Sedbergh District to commemorate the adoption of H.M.M.T.B. 93.during Warship Week March 14th 1942".

The boat was a member of the 22nd M.T.B. Flotilla and was originally based at Felixstowe. From 15th November 1942 it was based at Lowestoft from where it was engaged in operations against shipping off the Dutch and Belgian coasts and in anti-E-boat patrols in the southern North Sea. For a period prior to D-Day, the Flotilla, with torpedo tubes removed, ioined the 21st Flotilla on a series of mine-laying sorties off the main Dutch and Belgian ports. Unfortunately on 18th August 1944, when returning from a patrol, No 93 was involved in a collision with another vessel and was sunk. By Richard Cann

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COUNCILLOR'S CORNER

I hope you will indulge me for a moment... for I wonder if many of you recall the Harrison Ford film, which first came out in 1985 called *Witness*? It was about a young Amish boy, visiting Philadelphia who witnesses a murder and who is then returned to and protected in, his own rural community. A lot of the movie focuses upon that rural community, and I always remember being struck when I watched that, not by Harrison Ford (although he is a strong actor) or devised and delivered by the indeed the action scenes, but by the scene where the community gather together to build a barn... and I can't help but draw similarities to Garsdale and the rebuilding of the Garsdale

village hall roof. This has been a real community effort from start to finish. A great deal has been done by the Garsdale community to secure the funding, materials and volunteer labour to rebuild the hall roof, and albeit for a brief time. I was proud to be doing my bit and helping with this project. This for me sums up our community... and we see the same community spirit appearing again and again throughout our ward, in many different guises, be it the Dent Show, community in Dentdale, or the Sedbergh Gala, the Fesitival of Books and Drama, or the Sedbergh Spring street clean up... the list is endless and the strength of community

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involvement very humbling. It makes my job all the more rewarding for it brings home to me how so many of you are so invested in giving back to the area in so many different ways and how each of us have our small part to play...

So you can imagine how incensed I was to hear that bureaucracy has won the day and in the interest of statistical equivalency and electoral parity, Kirby Londsdale and its neighbouring parishes will now be part of the same SLDC ward as Dent, Garsdale, Sedbergh, Middleton and the Howaills. The two District Council wards will be joined into one and you will from May 2008, have access to

three councillors and there could well be voting every year, for one of these council positions, and in the fourth year, voting for the County Councillor. Not only will that mean more elections and all that entails, but the election of Councillors who couldn't possibly know the lay of the land for the whole ward and its people within.

What you will get, if any one party has all three councillors in post (as was the case when the idea was first hatched) is the carving up of the ward between the councillors, which is convenient to them, but makes a mockery of democracy, for the ward is just too big for an independent

the cost and time of travelling between homes and meetings in an area that is now bigger than many parlimentary constituencies. Indeed, it takes a Kendal Councillor ten to twenty minutes to cross their ward by foot... I could not drive to Kirby Lonsdale in that time and people get involved because of their affinity to the area, to Kirby Lonsdale, or to Sedbergh and Dent and so on... but this is just too big and diverse an area to have an affinity and a strong sense of involvement with all the constituent parts and to conscientiously attend all parish council meetings, town functions and case work throughout the area and to do the job justice. For some Councillors currently in power this may have appeal, but unlike the re-building of Garsdale roof, and the running of Dent Show and Parish council work in general, it will not draw many people to come forward and stand for the District Council in our area, unless they have private and substantial funds and plenty of time on their hands... which cuts a large part of the population out.

On one issue, however, with which I have worked closely with colleagues in the Kirby Lonsdale area, is with the Appleby Fair migration. You recall in a previous article that I said I would be attending a meeting at Milnthorpe Police station about the travellers. I have attended that meeting and made strong representations about the management of traveller flow, particularly on the east side of

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
SEDBERGH SCOUTS

A SEDBERGH VIEWPOINT

My calendar for October is headed "Autumn" – so autumn it is. Daylight is getting less each day and at the end of the month we get our lost hour back and we are once again plunged into darkness at tea time. Ah well, it happens every year but it always comes hard and is SAD for some people.

I doubt whether we will get many holidaymakers from now on into winter, so we won't be observed as we really are! I recently heard the tale of some visitors walking down Main Street blocked by delivery vehicles asking if this happened in the winter too! Sadly, probably every shop in Main Street has to receive supplies from the street which then becomes blocked by delivery vehicles which seem to be getting bigger year by year. One recently was not only a large lorry but it was hauling an equally large trailer unit too. These large lorries often seek to turn right out of Main Street into Back Lane and find it impossible without shunting and slewing over the footpath which is threatening to pedestrians, especially young children on their way to school as happens occasionally.

Now that there is no free car parking in either car park there is a noticeable increase in on-street parking; and on the footpath too. I've heard many people from the locality complaining that it is now impossible to park for a few minutes to pop into a shop for a newspaper, cigarettes etc. or post a letter when passing through town. If

Unfortunately they each charge different fares and so their return tickets are not valid on the other operator's bus! The other





SLDC RECYCLING NEWS

Last month, we announced that more plastic and cardboard banks were being installed, and we have now added banks at Arnside and Cartmel. The plastic banks at our busiest sites are already emptied daily and the new banks introduced this year have also proved popular; we are now collecting over 100,000 bottles each month from the banks at both Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale.

We have had many requests during the last month to repeat the information about the materials that can be recycled.

The cardboard banks can be used for all types of clean household cardboard from cereal boxes to corrugated card. The banks cannot be used to recycle drink cartons or cardboard from trade premises. Please remember to flatten cardboard to ensure the best use is made of the

Please remember to flatten cardboard ^{GO} to ensure the best use is made of the ^{go} banks. T

The plastic banks have two sections, one for bottles and one for bags. The bottle section can be used for household plastics such as milk and drink bottles, yoghurt pots, food trays, shampoo and washing-up liquid bottles. The bag compartment can be used for plastic carrier bags, polythene food bags and plastic covers. Please wash and squash bottles and containers wherever possible, squashing a bottle reduces the amount of space it takes in the bank by up to half. The banks should not be used for hard plastics such as toys or plant pots.


Dear Editor,

Whilst Sedbergh Parish Council is undoubtedly celebrating its success at having taken over the running of both of Sedbergh's car parks, many of the town's residents are suffering as a result from no longer being able to park outside their own homes.

Imposing the current pay and display charges on both Joss Lane and Loftus Hill car parks, closely following the removal of YDNP resident permits, has only resulted in both car parks being seriously under used, to the disadvantage of the town's residents. I realise that I could choose to pay an annual fee of £35 for the privilege of using either car park during the day, rising to £52 per annum for overnight parking. However, surely (according to the notices displayed) one does not need to pay between the hours of 6pm and 8am ? I strongly object to paying an extra £17 to enable me to park my car during the hours when no charge is necessary.

For the first time in 35 years of commuting daily to my place of work, I frequently find myself dreading the thought of returning home some 10 hours later, having to fight for a parking space anywhere near my home. I refer specifically to Back Lane, but I am sure there are many residents living elsewhere in the town, for example Bainbridge Road, Highfield Road, Long Lane etc, who are experiencing similar problems.

Living on Back Lane, we frequently encounter visitors parking up for free in the morning, donning their walking,



cycling gear, rucksacks etc, only to return later in the day having contributed little or nothing to the town's economy. Whilst one cannot necessarily blame them, nor Sedbergh's tradesman, second home owners and residents who have forsaken the pay and display car parks in favour of free on-street parking, this disadvantages others who have lost the right to park their car outside their own homes. Moreover, the predicament does not appear to be abating now that we have almost reached the end of the tourist season.

Surely I am not alone in my opinion that the Parish Council should have paid more consideration to its council tax paying residents before imposing a charge on both of the town's car parks ?

JULY WEATHER

Well the wet continues with another 6.46 inches added to the year's total. In fact there were only 4 days on which rain wasn't recorded! All that can be said is that it was warm rain! On the 27th the temperature dropped below 60F for the maximum of the day. On a handful of days the maximum temperatures struggled into breeding in spite of the weather if the the 70sF with a maximum of 74.3F. Minimum temperatures were generally in the 50sF with a low falling to 46.2F. Quite often the late night temperature was in the high 50sF and actually was 61.2F on the 13th of the month at nearly midnight. With the inclement weather the pressure was, as expected, on the low side. Similarly it was a fairly breezy month with the maximum wind speed recorded being in the teens mph though the highest was only

15.4 mph. Yet again the wind direction was generally from the North West with only 8 days from another quarter.

On the natural front everything continues to be lush and green. The swallows decided to build another nest in the kennels just above the inside door. Whether they ran out of materials or time but it was only about an inch deep, rather than the usual two inches, before they started to lay on it. Time will tell if the young, should they hatch, are able to perch in the nest. The house martins have finished building for the first time for at least four years. Interestingly there were three birds involved in the construction. Eggs seem to have been laid as one bird seems to be sitting. Butterflies appear to be few and far between probably due to the rain. The ducklings we rescued from the magpies are outside and progressing, eating as ducks do like vacuum cleaners! Small rodents appear to have had a good season numbers of young ones the cats are bringing in are anything to go by. We are still knee deep in rabbits in the garden giving the dogs extra exercise as they chase them out. Our security light keeps coming on throughout the night switched on by the pesky rabbits as they come and go in the yard after the dogs have been shut up for the night!! There are regularly 40 house sparrows about on the drive or on the feeders so they have had a good breeding season.

GARDENING

Some years ago I was showing a friend around the garden in late summer. He happened to be a Head of Department at one of the country's top colleges for Landscape Architects so I was interested to hear his comments on the planting in the garden. Having wandered around for a good while looking at all the interesting shrubs and perennials we eventually got down to the end of the plot – a shaded area under large sycamore trees, where all the stones and rocks unearthed from the borders and vegetable plot had been dumped years before, and where I had planted some seed raised birch and hazel trees as a screen against a large farm building. Although several shade loving plants had been planted underneath the trees, they were even then being stealthily overtaken by a groundcover plant known as "Yellow Archangel" (Lamiastrum galeobdolon) cover an area of about 100 square which was introduced into the border as a single rooted cutting about 7 years previously. Battling it out with the Lamiastrum were two other shade equally rampant, Geranium loving plants, Trachystemon orientale procurrens. I wait with interest to see with big, bold, heart shaped leaves,

and Pachyphragma macrophyllum which has glossy apple green foliage. (Neither of these is common in cultivation and this is presumably why they do not have "common" names)

"Now this is really very lovely. I like this bit best" said my expert friend. "It is simple and restful and and I like that big drift of the plant with the silver variegation. May I have some cuttings from those two things with big leaves?"

Large areas of "groundcover" plants are certainly restful but I find them static and dull. I like plants and colour and vibrancy and variety. I like trying new things.

The *Lamiastrum* has now spread to metres and having eaten up most of the competition it is rapidly approaching a border awash with which one wins. Elaine Horne

U15 Cricketers are National Champions. Sedbergh's U15 cricket team capped a tremendous season by winning the Daily Telegraph National Schools' 20/20 competition at Headingley on Sunday 9th September.

In a repeat of last season's semifinal against Loughborough Grammar School, Sedbergh lost the toss and were put into bat. Sam Stuart gave the innings a fine start scoring a quick first head girl for the first time in its fire 30 off just 20 balls while Dean Bell rotated the strike brilliantly at the other end.

Once Stuart departed, Bell took over the senior role and shared a useful 50 of Sedbergh partnership with Captain Tom Benn. Bell finished with 76 not out as Sedbergh set Loughborough a tough target of 150. Tight opening spells from Jack Oughtred and Stuart meant that Loughborough were always behind the rate and the School ran out winners by 34 runs and went through to the final to face Felsted from Essex.

Once again Sedbergh lost the toss, this time were asked to bowl first. Oughtred and Stuart again bowled well at the start claiming an early wicket each to leave Felsted struggling at 6 for 2. A useful partnership for the 3rd wicket gave the opposition hope but once David McClements broke through wickets fell regularly to leave Sedbergh chasing 87 to win.

The innings got off to the worst possible start with Sam Stuart being

dismissed in the first over, but Dean Bell (38 not out) and Jack Oughtred (42 not out) steadied the ship and then batted brilliantly to steer Sedbergh to victory by 9 wickets in just the 10th over.

Director of cricket at Sedbergh School, Chris Mahon said, "The day was a fantastic experience for the boys and they thoroughly deserved their status as National Champions".

8 Guldrey



Questions Relevant to Today's World In a changing world, religious beliefs, and attitudes towards them, are seen to be important factors in society.



Very soon, I will be having another operation on my leg and hopefully, the screws will be taken out.




