



SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL

Summary of the Minutes of Sedbergh Parish Council Meeting- 6 December, 2007

Before the Meeting started, all those present stood in thought and prayer for the Chairman, Cllr Alan Pratt, who is seriously ill.

P.C. John Orr and Police
Community Support Officer Karen
Dakin attended in response to the
Council's concerns about public
order. PC Orr informed the Council
that the recent crime rate was around
the average, with the main cause for
concern being the anti-social
behaviour of local youths
congregating in the bus shelter on
Main Street in the evenings. The

Police are following up complaints by residents by writing to the parents of persistent trouble makers, although it was emphasised that no damage has been caused and no offences committed. Councillors took the opportunity to raise the issue of cars creating a hazard by parking on the corners of Long Lane and Castle Haw. PC Orr informed the Council that the Police did have the power to charge offending motorists with obstruction.

Dr Phillip Batty gave an update on plans for and progress of the proposed new Health Centre. Dr Batty and Dr Lumb are to amalgamate into a single primary care practice for Sedbergh at the

The existing Health Centre on Loftus Hill was built in 1986, but 20 years later it is proving 'not fit for purpose', i.e. too small, and that is even before the planned amalgamation. In the future the need for a larger Health Centre will be even greater because of Sedbergh's increasingly ageing population and the high level of illnesses and diseases associated with this section of the population (already higher than the County average). It will also be driven by the NHS policy of decentralising many primary care diagnostic and treatment services away from the hospitals and into local communities so as to better facilitate people's access to them.

Doctors Batty and Lumb have considered a range of possible options for an improved health centre over the last three years, from enlarging the present facility, to refurbishing disused buildings, to new build on empty sites, but most of these options proved to be either impracticable or impossible. However, the owners of the auction mart site, James Hall & Co., have made an offer to release part of that site for a new Health Centre alongside the development of a new Spar retail store (along the same lines as the 'Booths' situation in Kirkby Lonsdale). The condition of this offer is that it is defined as a single development as far as applying for planning permission is concerned. Therefore, if this is refused, the proposed development will not proceed. Dr

Batty explained that negotiations and planning are still at a very early stage and that there are various key details which have yet to be settled before any such application is made.

It is estimated that such a new health centre will cost £1.8 million. It is hoped that the Ambulance service will be relocated to this site as well, although no agreement on this option has been reached. Doctors Batty and Lumb intend to place articles in the Lookaround and hold public meetings to explain to the public the reasons for the need to relocate the health centre and their plans for a new health centre. They also intend to set up a Progress Committee which

Council.

Councillors raised the concern of many elderly people who live at the far end of town and who would experience difficulty in getting to the Auction Mart site. Dr Batty replied that he appreciated that it was an issue which needed to be addressed and that one solution would be the establishment of a voluntary car service. Several Councillors felt that this was something which the Parish Council, together with other public and voluntary organisations, could and should support. The Council thanked Dr Batty for this comprehensive briefing.

that meetings with the Police regarding problems caused by Travellers had made some progress. He has also arranged another meeting with the Police on the same issue and to include Cllrs Blair and Lancaster for 19 December.

The minutes of the Audit Committee meeting of November 27 were accepted by the Council. Councillors were provided with a copy of the risk assessment (incorporating a formal procedure) for handling car park money and the key points were brought to their attention. A job description for a part time assistant to assist with the car park money was also discussed and agreed upon.

The Council then authorised the payment of the invoices from:

- SLDC lease of Joss Lane car park and market rental - £3141.75
- Sedbergh School use of rooms for 2 meetings £47.63

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Councillors considered a report detailing the circumstances of the loss of £40 of car park receipts in September. They were unable to conclude how it was lost, and the Council decided to note the matter and to take no further action. This incident reinforced the need for formal procedures now in place for handling car park money.

The Council decided not to make a formal response to the letter from Mr C. Cowperthwaite published in the Lookaround.

The Council decided to write a second time to SLDC raising the issue of responsibility should accidents and injuries occur as a result of the potential hazards of surface water, ice, damaged tarmac which could occur during the coming winter months.

A 'Have-You-Paid-and Displayed' sign will be placed at the entrance/ exit of Loftus Hill car park. It has been agreed with SLDC that the rubbish that is left for collection at Loftus Hill car park will now be stored out of

- £75.25 : public view behind the toilet block.

The Council will seek permission from YDNP to use their logo on the town signs in an attempt to improve their visual impact.

The Council held a second workshop on 26 November about identifying projects which will enhance and improve the town over the next few years. A range of issues were considered, and there was broad agreement upon how to proceed and to develop a Parish Plan. A public consultation document will be written during December and another workshop will be held in January.

Illustrations of play panels which could be erected in front of the children's play area as a guard against footballs were met with general approval, although some concern was expressed about the possible cost. It was agreed to look into the possibility of getting grant aid towards the cost.

In the centre of this *Lookaround*, you will find a Questionnaire regarding the Parish Plan. Please take time to fill it in and submit it.

DENT PARISH COUNCIL

The December meeting approved the comments submitted to the National Park on the proposed affordable housing development above Ghyllside. It also agreed the 2008-09 budget and set the precept for 2008-09. There was no meeting in January, but as usual the full minutes are published on the Dentdale website www.dentdale.com. 2008-09 Budget, Precept and Car Park Charges

The December meeting discussed the draft Parish Council budget for 2008-09 which projected an expenditure of £12,680 (excluding car i (equivalent to an extra 4.5 pence per park costs). If the precept remained unchanged at £5,875 the total income : £2,000 the reserves held for

would be £7,725 leaving a deficit of £4,955. If the projected surplus from the car park was added and parking charges remained unchanged, this would reduce to £3,295.

A number of options were considered and rejected to cover this shortfall, including introducing a £5 annual charge for residents' parking permits, increasing the 2-hour car park charge, reducing the amount allocated in grants to local organisations and removing the amount set aside for contingencies. After discussion, it was decided to increase the precept by £1,295 week per household) and reduce by

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unforeseen major repairs in the car park and toilet block.

Proposed affordable housing development above Ghyllside

The Parish Council's formal response to this proposal was agreed at the December meeting, which incorporated issues raised by members of the public including the level of demand for hosing in the Dale, the external appearance of the houses, traffic issues and drainage. Since then, the National Park Planning Committee members have held a site meeting to familiarise themselves with the layout of the site, and at the time of writing, the application for planning permission is still being processed by the National Park.

Car parking in Dent

In last October's Lookaround, I explained that in order to take action on the street parking issues raised by residents in July's survey, the Parish Council would need to meet with Cumbria Highways as they were the body responsible for implementing any changes. That meeting has now taken place, and as a result Cumbria Highways have agreed to:

- arrange for the painting of entrance bars in the parking bays around The Green, to discourage parking across driveways
- draw up a scheme to restrict parking at the junction of The Green with Flintergill, for possible

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inclusion in the 2008-09 programme of works

- draw up and submit to central government a proposal for a no parking zone on the cobbles, marked by not by yellow lines but by signs at each entrance to the cobbled area
- work out how to give the Parish Council control of the land opposite the Sun Inn and Dent Stores so that we can use some of it for parking by holders of Residents' Car Park permits (parking on the rest of the land would remain unrestricted as at present).

Stonehouse Bridge

Following further discussions with Cumbria Highways, they are giving further thought to their proposal to put legally enforceable width restrictions and bollards at Stonehouse Bridge,

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as the matter is not easy to resolve. There is a legal restriction on vehicles Post Office on production of the old over 8' 3" wide on all roads, and so Cumbria Highways' will not put a width restriction on any road unless it is for 7' 6" or less. I hope you all have had an opportunity to spend quality time with friends and family over the Christmas period and have been able to take advantage of what our small, but highly active community has had to offer (arguably allot more than some areas five to ten times the size of our population!). We had the first of the two pantomimes that are being organised for this year, Puss in Boots, and what an incredibly professional production that was, drawing talent from across the area and engaging the audience throughout the evening. Equally impressive, was the launch of the

What is disappointing, is the constant eroding of local government funding that we are witnessing year after year, which in turn threatens our levels of funding for local activities and events, the heartbeat of our rural

communities. Early in January, a delegation from South Lakeland District Council met Local Government Minister, Iain Wright MP, and challenged the proposal to increase government funding by 1.8% staff, that Kevin, I and Parish this year and then by half a per cent the following two years. Inflation is currently running at 2.1 per cent. This not only represents a reduction of the SLDC grant in real terms but also, as the Delegation pointed out, fails to take account of the significant pressures on our district due to the lack of affordable housing and a low wage economy.

My co-Councillor, Kevin Lancaster, and I, will need to be constantly

vigilant of potential funding reductions on our community services and general provision. We have seen this already with Policing, as I noted in my last Lookaround article. The Police Councillor, Dorothy Blair, worked with just before Christmas, regarding preparations for the annual migration to Appleby Fair, were very supportive and committed to addressing the challenges we faced on that particular issue. But it doesn't detract from the point that Policing levels in our area are severely challenged. My letter to the Chief Constable of Cumbria, just before Christmas, drawing his attention to a strained infrastructure

and inviting him to visit our area, was supported by Dent Council and Tim Farron MP, both of which sent letters of support to the Chief Constable. I am still waiting a response, but I will share it with you, once I hear.. I live in hope!

Another aspect of community services, which Kevin and I have noticed has seen some cut backs, is with regard to refilling of the salt boxes. This no longer occurs automatically. NOVEMBER IN NAIROBI

In November there was already violence at some election rallies, and a Police Chief determined to crack down on it. The violence after the election was mainly in some country districts, leaving Nairobi itself reasonably calm contrary to our news reports. At least, this was the situation £11,000! I found the children well and happy, even Elizabeth, who had been very sick earlier in the year. The children over 15 have moved into their purpose built hostels which are light and airy, have a communal kitchen, dining and living area. They sleep in study bedrooms with only two sharing. What a change from the old corrugated iron accommodation where space was cramped and which ione hour's tuition each week. There were hot by day and so cold at night they had to wear woolly hats in bed! These new hostels will also free up space in the cottages for the younger children where they aim to have 12

instead of 15 with one housemother. There have been some interesting developments at Mary Happy School, whose pupils are half Christian, half Muslim, drawn from a poor area. Firstly, good progress has been made with the new computer courses, and with the teaching of French. They won a French Poetry Competition during the year, and produced a short play in French at the end of the year. Not a bad effort as they only have is also a flourishing French Club after school with a hundred members! Many thanks go to Settlebeck High School for their support.

and Mary Kinoti, have for many years looking after the elephants too! wanted to set up an orphanage for destitute children. Over time they have supported needy children at the school with food and accommodation and seen the need for yet more support. It would take a very long time to raise money for purpose built accommodation so last May they converted 2 classrooms into dormitories, and took in 20 girls aged between 2 and 10 under the care of a housemother, and with the help of a highly skilled social worker. The accommodation is basic, but much better than what the children had before.

They live at school all the time, but the Directors always take two at a time home with them for weekends and holidays, where they play with their six year old daughter. This scheme will be extended to other families in time. Every holiday the teachers give up time to run activities for them or take them out, and of course take them for any medical care needed. It is heartening to see

so many people willing to help these children on a regular basis.

British Airways Community Relations Team have seen the project and agreed to support it. They have given money to buy bedding, and regularly send clothes. They even send regular deliveries of dried baby milk for the children. Richard, the Director has agreed to take the whole consignment each time and transport any tins that are out of date The Directors of the school, Richard to the Elephant Orphanage! So he's

> There is a much initial expense before anyone will support such a project. It has to be seen to be viable and properly run. So funds are needed to pay for the children's keep and sponsors are needed for each child's education. Eventually the aim is for the project to become self sustaining like Nyumbani Village. It is not yet clear how this will be done, a lot depends on the initial donations to set up a scheme. One idea is to obtain property and use the rent as income.

at present due to lack of personnel, but the education programme continues. They now have 2 nursery, 19 primary, 7 secondary and 3 college students, 31 in all. Each student's fees are sponsored. The college students are mothers training in catering, hairdressing or tailoring so they can support their families. In fact it is now a condition of sponsoring a child's education that the mother agrees to undertake training. The aim is to empower families to support themselves. This programme will eventually be amalgamated with Kidzone to become one registered charity, and the Directors of Mary Happy School, Richard and Mary, will oversee the programme, check on the schools and students' progress..

I had the privilege of visiting a home in the slum area of Mathare. I find it hard to believe people have to live like this. Our cattle are better housed. The shacks are made of single corrugated iron sheets, too hot by day, too cold at night. Rain comes in through joints in the roof. There is

one room, a charcoal stove, water that has to be fetched from a tap a quarter of a mile away, and no sanitation. The only lighting is from kerosene lamps as small as a single candle. No close work can be done in the 12 hours of darkness. Yet this home was spotless, the people are resourceful and resilient. I am full of admiration for them.

Great progress is being made to combat poverty, illiteracy and AIDS. Let us hope that Kenya's political troubles will soon be resolved with all working together for progress in this wonderful country. *Christine Wood*



Excess weight, wind resistance and rolling resistance all guzzle precious much as 10 per cent. A trim and fit car fuel. To achieve optimum weight loss, take out everything that is unnecessary for your journey. Remove roof racks or storage boxes to cut wind resistance and check tyre pressures regularly to minimise rolling resistance.

Members' Evening.

The annual Members' Evening is always an eagerly anticipated occasion and as usual we weren't disappointed. Judith Robinson began the proceedings with her fascinating talk entitled 'Researching John Atkinson's Copy Book'. She showed slides of the beautifully handwritten pages of John Atkinson's arithmetic book. He was thirteen and a half in 1863 when he tackled a variety of problems, many of which would have been guite beyond some of the audience! The actual content of the problems gave an interesting insight into nineteenth-century life. For example, one question concerned the was helped by Diane Elphick, who calculation of a servant's wages, and another showed that the rate of death duties depended on the relationship between the deceased and the beneficiaries of his will. Judith

suggested that references to places like Middlesex and Sydenham indicated that the author of the textbook from which the questions had been copied probably lived in the south of the country.

Using censuses and parish registers. Judith had spent some time researching John Atkinson's family, and she discovered that he had spent most of his short life at Cragg Stones in Cautley, where his father was a farmer and butter dealer. Although the book was unmarked and there was nothing to show whether John Atkinson had worked on the problems at home or at school, Judith was curious to find out about his education. In this investigation she has researched local education in the nineteenth century. Judith could find no record of him on a school roll, but she concluded that since his family were nonconformists he was most

probably a pupil at the Sedbergh British School. Furthermore as an 1868 newspaper mentioned his two younger brothers, James and William as prize winners at the Sedbergh British School, it seemed likely that James had also attended there.

Joyce Scobie's presentation about Liverpool cow keepers was equally enthralling. Until Joyce became engrossed in this study she had had no idea that such a large number of local families had started dairies in the city. An economic depression was responsible for this migration, which began in 1818. Joyce described how hard life was for the dairymen. Milking they began to dwindle, until in the started at 5am and was followed by the first round of the day. This procedure was repeated in the afternoon and sometimes there were even three milk rounds. The women of the family made butter which was sold in the shop with milk, eggs and preserves. Care of the animals and

cleanliness were priorities, and some fine specimens won prizes at local shows.

Communication with home was kept alive in a number of ways. Some women came back to have their babies, and children often returned for a spell of fresh air. Many people came home to retire, but Joyce said that dairying was such hard work that some men did not reach retirement age. Although stricter rules and regulations made life more difficult for the cow keepers, they numbered 900 by the turn of the century. However, during and after the First World War 1970s there were only 4 left. Interestingly, the Wilson family provided a link between these two excellent talks. Peter Wilson, who had inherited John Atkinson's diary, is a descendant of Robert Wilson who had written a diary about his time in Liverpool as a cow keeper.



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A RECIPE FOR SEDBERGH, DENT, GARSDALE & KILLINGTON

Many towns, villages and regions are famous for a local dish — Yorkshire Pudding and Cumberland Rum Nicky, Bakewell Tart and Grasmere Gingerbread to name a familiar few. So far as we know the Sedbergh area has not got a **Signature Dish** although we do have some very fine food producers and preparers.

The Chamber of Trade is expanding the annual Charter Market, which will be on 16th August this year, into a much more 'foodie' event. There will be a very big farmer and producer market and several demonstration kitchens placed around the town,

themed cafes, celebrity chefs and the usual entertainment. It would be great if we had a newly launched Sedbergh Recipe Book to sell at the Charter Market and we hope that researching, inventing, photographing and generally having a really good time with food will be something individuals, businesses and groups will want to do this Spring. We suggest four categories of entrant:

<u>Businesses</u>, these could be any producer of food on the farm, any café, any non-food type of business whose employees might want to join together to invent something, any pub or hotel etc.

Groups, adult and under 18s, e.g.

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WI's and church groups, school classes or the youth club but groups that do not have a business link Individuals, adults and under 18s. (hey - we do want some men and boys here not just all females!!) What would you have to do?

You would have to invent a dish which was typical of Sedbergh and district, it does not necessarily need to use local produce but it could do.

The dish would need to have a really good NAME e.g. Dent Doughnuts, or Garsdale Lamb Garland, Rawthey River Roll or Howgill Hotpot, Steadman Steak etc but it must be a recipe with a twist. you cannot just copy something out of a book and put your own name to it, but it could be an old family recipe of Granny's. Judges will be looking for originality.

The dish can be absolutely anything: a pudding, or main course, sweets (like Kendal Mint cake), a sandwich, chutney or jam or other type of preserve, something fit for a banquet or for the kid's supper.



DAY CARE CENTRE

The Parish Council were informed just before Christmas that the People's Hall Committee had received a letter from Age Concern saying that they no longer required the room (at the People's Hall) for use as a Day Care Centre.

This news came 'out of the blue' to the Parish Council and on receiving it the Sedbergh Day Care Centre I contacted Social Services for an explanation. Their explanation was that the People's Hall did not provide the facilities i.e- ramp access and disabled toilet, I assured them that the People's Hall did in fact have these. They also said that numbers had been dropping and that as they

gave monies to Age Concern to run the Day Care Centre it was up to them how they used it. They (Social Services) informed me that Age Concern have decided to move the Day Care Centre to Barbon where it was 'hoped' that it may attract people from Kirkby Lonsdale to attend (at present there is only the people from attending). Social Services also said that they may take people from Dent to Barbon (I did point out the problems over Barbondale in winter or should a car transporting these people to Barbon break down and how difficult it would be to get help on a road which is not a well used road.)

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I also asked the question had they (Age Concern) looked at other possible sites in Sedbergh and Social Services where not aware that they had (the gentleman I spoke to at Social Services (who did speak to me at length about the situation) did admit to me that he had never stopped off in Sedbergh -just passed through, and seemed unaware with regard to facilities such as Gladstone House.

I am concerned that few people in Sedbergh were unaware that ANOTHER service was been taken from us. After all we never know whether or not we may need those services in the future (we all age whether we want to or not) I would be pleased to hear your views on this matter - however old you, or even if you were aware that we had a Day Care Centre in Sedbergh when you or a relative or friend or neighbour could have made use of it had they known of the facility.

Your views are important on this matter. You may leave any messages for me at the Community Office (which is situated above the Tourist Information Centre on Main Street)

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has turned it into a single track road. You can see up the length of the road, about 300 yards, and if nothing is coming, go for it; then three blind corners, right and left and right again and hey presto! you descend onto Joss Lane car park on your left." "Sounds interesting. Aren't there any other car parks, easier to get to?" "Well, there's Loftus Hill, but that's usually full. I used to sneak into the Health Clinic car park next door, but now they have put up intimidating notices about that." "How do the locals manage?"

"They are a patient lot!"

COUNCILLOR'S CORNER

Following on from my last article before Christmas, members of the Yorkshire Dales National Park are going to be briefed on the review of the boundaries of the park at a special Policy Development Forum to be held in Barbon; next week as I write this, last week when you read it. Graham Dalton, Roger Bird, Malcolm Petyt and I, the four Cumbrian members had hoped to precede this briefing with a tour around the areas being considered. Very few members discuss this next month when we will showed any interest in this proposition. Surprisingly, one member even objected to holding the briefing in Barbon, he didn't want to travel further from his home that

Bainbridge. There will be more to say on this next month after the briefing has been held.

A planning application for all or a part of Sedbergh Auction Mart site is imminent, or so I am told as a member of Sedbergh Parish Council. Until the application is in, it is difficult to speculate as to its exact nature although it is widely expected that it will include plans for a new Health Surgery on part of the site. Again, there will be more opportunity to know what exactly is being proposed. Once again I would like to reassure everyone that there is no question of members of the Planning Committee entertaining development of all or part





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of this site without a thorough and detailed site visit where everyone with a view can express their opinion. public authorities do this. In this, SLDC and YDNP are as a view can express their opinion.

Few items produce a greater collective groan than the supposedly free glossy newspapers which public bodies produce on a depressingly regular basis. Ken Livingston came in for a lot of criticism last week for distributing his version of this, "The Londoner" to MPs, MEPs and council leaders throughout the United Kingdom. By all accounts the format is the traditional one with a picture of "Our Ken" on every page in a typically unconvincing photo-opportunity. Responses back to the story in the broadsheets pointed out that most

public authorities do this. guilty as any. YDNP actually produces two, one aimed at informing residents, the other at informing visitors. I think there is some merit in the second, a regular publication which is given freely to visitors from pubs, questhouses, shops and the like. It would be difficult to justify the main SLDC Newssheet or the special one intended solely for council tenants. What the criticism of Ken Livingston in the press failed to point out was that public bodies are put under a lot of pressure from national government to produce and distribute

this drivel. They might not cost a lot to produce, probably about 0.5% on the council tax for the SLDC versions but should there be a change of administration after May. I for one will be putting these publications in the recycling bin, permanently.

This is the first dry day we have had in guite a while and the land reflects this. Thankfully South Lakeland no longer has to worry about the effects of flooding on the Sedbergh Road and Sandylands areas of Kendal because of the massive Stockbeck flood alleviation scheme. I remember this. very well the difficulties the local councillor Simon Butterfield and the then MP Tim Collins had with the funding for the scheme. One month

we were going be given the money to do it, next month we weren't. I don't think there are any schemes the size of Stockbeck still needed in South Lakeland but there are many small areas subject to localised flash flooding, two in this ward. I hope Defra are serious in providing money to solve these issues in the future. There was one occasion where a threatened withdrawal of funding from Stockbeck could actually have bankrupted South Lakeland - no council should ever be put through

My first meeting of the new year was a Licensing Sub-committee to consider three taxi driver licences. ¹These sub-committees are special

meetings where three members of the Licensing Committee sit as a panel to look at a particular application, whether a taxi matter, a gambling matter or liquor licensing. We sit in what is called a "quasijudicial" capacity with one of the council's solicitors present and copious support staff. In truth, the most surprising aspect of these meetings is just how few of them there are. To my mind this supports the view that by and large the alterations made to licensing laws three or four years ago have worked, at least in South Lakeland. I write this, well aware of one alleged incident locally over the Christmas period which would lend support to a contrary view.

I first became involved in public life a dozen years ago because of my concern over the lack of housing in the Sedbergh Dales. The application for the second stage of Ghyllside in Dent, twelve units is being considered at the moment. Committee members have been on site, on a very cold day just before Christmas. I hope there will be more news next month.


Suddenly everyone is talking about MUGAs, Multi-Use Games Areas. Two are planned or constructed in Kendal and another near Ulverston. Within the national park one is being proposed at Reeth – I was an observer at a surprisingly confrontational site visit. Clearly these things attract markedly differing viewpoints. Depending upon how the proposal goes for Reeth I wonder if it would be possible to establish one

somewhere in our area? Of course, within Sedbergh, access to the wider public was a condition when the school was given permission for the all-weather hockey pitch.

I am pleased to see the plans to alter the shelter on the playing area to make a youth shelter. Already this has attracted grants of £1,000 each from the Neighbourhood Forum and Sedbergh United Charities. It was good at the Neighbourhood Forum to see a representative from Garsdale and one from the Spellbound Theatre thanking the forum for grants awarded at previous meeting. A nice touch which reflected well on the Sedbergh area.

Meetings took place before Christmas: • with members of the farming community and local businesses to collect their views, and school children at Dent Primary school as well as secondary school students were also involved in giving their opinions. In January, a questionnaire was delivered to every household and last few months, including: these are due back shortly (please return yours as soon as possible if you haven't already done so).

It will take a few weeks to analyse all this information and produce a clear view of what all the different sections of the community want for Dentdale's future. In the meantime, here are some of the things that people have said:

- Farming is the key to Dentdale's attractiveness, character and identity
- Farming needs other job opportunities to subsidise it. especially after 2012 when government subsidies end
- More visitors to help the pubs and cafes, particularly at off-peak times
- Fewer visitors are needed at peak times.
- More play equipment including a see-saw and a skate park
- More amenities for teenagers and somewhere for them to meet up with Internet / computer access
- Minibus to take groups of people

to things

- A better train service with earlier and later trains to make the Dale attractive to commuters
- Support from YDNPA for houses for farm workers and young families
- Promote more low cost housing
- Market the Dale as a whole

Putting together a plan for the future like this takes time to do thoroughly, and a lot of work has gone on in the

I would like to say New Year - new set of challenges for us to take on. However, sadly this is not the case. The hospital continues to be the focus of much of my time.

When the plans to close the acute services at Westmorland General Hospital were announced we were told that this would lead to the provision of better, more modern health care for the people of South Lakeland. Increasingly, it is becoming evident that this is not the case.

There were not enough beds to provide the acute cover needed over the Christmas period even with three hospitals working. The idea that closing the beds at the Westmorland General Hospital would improve this state of affairs is clearly just fantasy. Similarly we were promised a state of the art ambulance service that could provide patients travelling to hospital with similar coronary health care to that they would receive when they arrived at hospital. Again this is far from being the case. In fact nothing much appears to have changed at all and if anything we have a more dated idoing in fighting for our needs on service.

Many people from Sedbergh and Dent and the area around signed the petition against the planned changes to the hospital, joining us as we marched through Kendal and linked arms around the hospital. The Hospitals Trust cannot simply ignore this and plough ahead with plans that seem certain to result in poorer health; continual efforts that you put in to service provision for the all of us who keep the community vibrant through

live around here. I have taken the evidence we have collected over the situation to the Health Minister, Alan Johnson, and he has promised to have a look at it and consider the situation.

The proposed Post Office changes are also continuing. We are starting to hear of "Field Change Advisers", as the people charged with recommending which offices will close are called, appearing around the area. We have had over 3000 signatures to our petition to keep Post Offices open and more impressively over 500 letters in support of individual Post Offices – Allithwaite is at the moment with over 150 letters in support and some lovely posters from local school children.

One thing that has changed is that I now sit in my party's Shadow Cabinet with responsibility for The Countryside. I have always been a bit wary of taking on tasks that might distract me from working for the people of this area. However, having responsibility for The Countryside seemed so close to what I am already issues like health, rural services and agriculture that it felt a good thing to take it on. It will give me much better access to Government Ministers and so our case should get an even better hearing.

I use Sedbergh as an example of much that is good in the Countryside in many of these discussions. The

COUNTING THE CALORIES

There has been a lot of material on calorie counting in the post-Christmas press. Today one daily paper has devoted a double page spread to "20 ways to lose your blubber". Most of these involve substituting one item of junk food for another. For example, replace Big Mac (493 calories) with Filet-o-Fish (385 calories) and Twix (275 calories) KitKat (110 calories). In my view, it would be best to cut out these items entirely and favour unprocessed food, both for weight loss and for good health.

In another article in the same paper a "personal trainer" deliberates on the best time of day to exercise – the sole criterion being to burn as many calories as possible. His conclusion is, that 9 am after breakfast is a good time.

It seems obvious that this is an overly simplistic approach. How you eat, when you eat and what you eat (not only how many calories) play a big part in whether Equally, exercise can be beneficial or harmful depending on the person's health and fitness, the time of year, the weather conditions and the time of day.

Based purely on calories, it might seem a good idea to skip broakfeet, have colories.

you gain or lose weight. And, more importantly, in how healthy you are.

a good idea to skip breakfast, have celery, grated carrot and low fat yoghurt for lunch and just have one meal in the evening. According to traditional Chinese medicine this is likely to have just the opposite effect. The digestion and metabolism are strongest early in the day, so breakfast like a king. Cold raw food is hard for the body to process, so prefer warm cooked food. A warm soup or stew is a much better lunch for a slimmer than one based on salad. Food eaten in the evening is much more likely to contribute to weight gain, so eat sparingly in the evening and not too late. It is said that for every time we overeat in the evening, our life expectancy diminishes by one day. (And by one month for every time of getting drunk.)

Similarly there are good and bad times of day for exercising. The best time for vigorous exercise is the morning. This is the natural time of day for strenuous activity as the body's energy peaks around midday. The worst time of day is late afternoon and evening and it is said one should never exercise at sunset. At this time of day the body's energy is naturally declining and withdrawing in preparation for the night. Many people only have time for exercise after work in the evenings. While this is not a good time for vigorous exercise, it can be a good time for gentle exercise such as

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I am often asked if acupuncture can help with weight loss. I recently saw a website offering acupuncture treatments for weight loss in London for £100. For anyone with a railcard it could well be cheaper to come up for treatments in Cumbria. Acupuncture is more about good health. Part of this can be, that the digestion and metabolism work more efficiently and this may help with weight loss. But a reassessment of eating patterns, exercise and other lifestyle factors would still be necessary.

NOVEMBER WEATHER

The month looked like being a dry one as it was not until the second week we actually measured any rain. Even then half the month went with only ½ inch of rain. The second half made up for it with 2 ½ inches making a total for the month of 3.15 inches. Temperatures showed a similar pattern with the maxima being in the 50sF in the first part dropping to the 40sF later in the month. The maximum temperature recorded was 59.4F and a minimum a lowly 22.6F. The pressure too reflected this pattern being in the high 29inches of mercury at the start and ended with one of 28.61 on the last day. Winds were variable in strength but not in direction. Only 2 days did the wind not blow from the North Westerly quarter and the highest strength measured was 24.2mph. Wind chill was a significant factor and on only 9 days did the chill not drop the temperature below freezing. Mid month gave us a dusting of snow on the fells as often happens at this time of year.

There has been a marked increase in bird activity and I am filling up the feeders more often again. They must have read Lookaround when I asked where they had gone!! The woodpeckers have also put in an appearance again as have an army of long tailed tits. Small slugs keep coming out on the damp milder nights. Rabbits are still providing amusement for the dogs when let out first and last thing in the day. The winter jasmine continues to flower as do the green hellebores. One of my

jobs during the month was to clear flag iris and reed mace from one end of the pond so that the goldfish had an area to get down deep. The plants had spread that much that the affective depth was reduced to just over a foot of water. A trip to Leighton Moss provided plenty of shellduck, shovellors and greylag geese but only e few mute swans. The Bewicks and trumpeter wanss must have gone onto the marshes. We did see a red deer stag and 4 hinds.

FEBRUARY GARDENING

Many of the gardens in which I have been working over the last few weeks currently contain small lakes, and those which are supposed to have a well bounded pond or stream have turned into water meadows. Although some of the areas remain moist all through the year, I know that the majority will revert to their freedraining, relatively dry selves in the spring and summer, so it is no use to filling them with moisture requiring things such as Astilbe and Rodgersia as these will go crisp and brown at the edges during the first hint of a dry spell. Most ordinary herbaceous perennials – *Phlox, Geranium*, Helenium, asters and Japanese anemones are not phased by winter wet, but if you find that areas of garden are sitting under water for weeks on end then it may be best to chose things which thrive in wet and dry conditions.

One of the most striking plants in my winter floods, but seem to take to garden is the variegated form of our native "Flag" iris, Iris pseudacorus 'Variegata'. This plant has beautiful cream and green striped foliage and yellow flowers. It grows in two places in my garden; at the damp margin of a pond, and in the rubble soil up against the front wall of the house. It certainly makes a larger plant in the wet pond area, but it seems very happy away from water, and does well and grows steadily in spite of fairly frequent grazing by the local dairy herd. Many members of the buttercup plant family are at home with changing levels of moisture in he

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soil. (The botanical name for buttercup, Ranunculus, comes from the Latin, rana, a frog, because they grow in marshy ground where frogs are found.) I grow R. aconitifolius in its single and double, white flowered forms, and R.acris 'Flore Pleno' with squat, very double yellow blooms. Larger flowered "Globe Flowers", Trollius x cultorum and T. europaeus with their beautifully scented yellow or orange flowers grow on river banks which are regularly submerged in "normal" soil in my borders.

All of these plants flower in the first half of the year, so to extend the season add "Purple Loosestrife" (Lythrum salicaria) and "Hemp Agrimony", (Eupatorium cannabinum -no relation to cannabis but the leaves look similar) or one of its American cousins, E. maculatum and E. purpureum, ("Joe Pye Weed"), E. rugosum ("White Snakeroot") or E. perfoliatum ("Boneset") The first four have pink or purple flowers and the last two white, and all seem able to cope with floods or dry soils.

Recycling News

Towards the end of 2007, Defra released the national waste and recycling statistics confirming that in South Lakeland we recycled just over 30% of the domestic waste collected in 2006/07. That placed us in the top half of the league table of how much was recycled in each council area.

Most local authorities are continuing to expand the range of recycling facilities provided, and we were no exception to this during 2007. We added another 23,000 homes to the kerbside recycling service, and now provide paper, glass and can collections almost universally throughout the district. Around 12,000 of those homes also started using the green waste bins and the remainder are scheduled to start receiving those collections in April, again meaning the service will be almost universally provided.

of sites with plastic and cardboard banks, and have seen the quantity of these materials we collect each month more than double since November 2006.

All of the secondary schools in South Lakeland now have recycling banks for their paper and these have also been introduced at some of the larger primary schools. We have also given away over 5,000 re-usable shopping bags to help reduce the number of plastic bags used in the district.

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As a result of this there has been a big increase in the number of people that are recycling and we expect that We have also increased the number for 2007/08 the amount of waste that is recycled and composted will exceed 40% of the total collected. We'd like to thank everybody who has used the services that are provided and helped keep South Lakeland clean and green in 2007.

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shown every week. She remembers being very pleased with the £2 a week wages she received as a 15 year old.

One of the highlights of her time at Sedbergh was the visit of Her Royal Highness Queen Elizabeth and Prince Phillip who visited Sedbergh in May 1991. Florence and the other House cooks were introduced to Her Majesty who enquired whether the boys were fussy eaters! Florence said "We all replied no although of course the real answer was yes, very."

She also remembers the day of the famous Wilson Run in 1993. Florence had become the cook in School House and the winner that year and the record holder Charles Sykes, came to the kitchen to ask her for some cooking oil which he smeared on his legs and arms to keep the biting wind out!

Christopher Morgan said, "Florence retires after 38 years in School House and will be missed by all the boys and staff who she has known so well.
School House will not be the same without her, she has been an outstanding employee and really deserves her retirement. All the boys and staff in the House, wish her the very best for the future."

SEDBERGH PARISH PLAN

Why does Sedbergh and District need a Parish Plan?

Sedbergh Parish Council has decided to produce a Parish Plan which will provide the basis for future strategy within the town. The decision was reached following two parish councillors attending a recent Voluntary Action Cumbria seminar concerning Parish Plans.

It is Government policy to increase individual participation in public life and for public bodies to consult communities about the delivery of services. As part of this policy of active citizenship, the Government wants to give more power to Parish Councils to decide what's best for their own communities. A Parish Plan might increase the chance of getting local authority support to enhance a Parish's economic, social and environmental well-being.

It will give evidence to help inform policy-making by a range of organisations, from the local planning authority to police and health services. It will also help to develop and maintain effective working relationships with all those outside bodies who provide services to our community, now or in the future.

Organisations and funding bodies that work with rural communities often ask to see written evidence of need, community consultation and plans for implementing the project before they will consider offering funding. The Parish Plan could be used to provide this information and to accompany the funding bid. Local authorities are also required to draw up "community"

strategies" to promote or improve the economic, social and environmental well-being of their area.

The main aims of a community strategy are:

- To identify what sort of services, activities and support are needed
- To make links between services and organise them better to avoid overlaps
- To promote local people's involvement in planning and improving services in the
- areas where they live.

A Parish Plan can help feed into this process and give our community in Sedbergh and District a real voice and influence in the wider community.

In South Lakeland, 28 of the 71 Parish Councils have, or are developing Parish Plans, these include Barbon, Casterton and Dent.

As a first step the council is seeking the views of residents within the parish as to what they would like to see happen in Sedbergh and have included a pull-out questionnaire in this edition of Lookaround. Please let us know what you think by completing the questionnaire before 22 February. Councillor D Blair

SEDBERGH TOWN BAND Freda Trott

The death of Freda Trott on Friday 14th December was felt keenly by the inhabitants of Sedbergh. High amongst her multitude of interests and accomplishments was music, particularly the teaching and spreading of involvement and support of it as testified by her leaving her entire estate to pay for a musical education for children in Sedbergh.

The Town Band were privileged on two occasions to play works composed by Freda. In the Annual Christmas Concert 2004, her composition 'Lullabye' was given its public premiere in an arrangement by Alan Lewis. A few months later in the Band's Summer Concert held in May 2005, a piece that she entered in a competition for "a new harvest hymn or hymn on a rural theme", was played. The composition, 'Another Year on the Wane', won first prize in the competition organised by the Diocese of Bradford and judged by the Bradford Diocesan Rural Forum and Alan Horsley, the Bradford Cathedral Organist. The judges particularly commended the quality of the original words and music. 'Just before the clock struck six they lighted the lanterns and started. The moon, in her third quarter, had risen since the snowstorm: but the dense accumulation of snow-cloud weakened her power to a faint twilight. The breeze had gone down, and the rustle of their feet and tones of their speech echoed with an alert rebound from every post, boundarystone and ancient wall they passed. Beyond their own slight noises nothing was to be heard, save the occasional bark of foxes in the direction of the Frostrow Fell, or the brush of a rabbit among the grass, as it scampered out of their way.'

HEALTH CARE IN SEDBERGH

It is well known that the doctors in Sedbergh have been looking for land in the town for the past three years in order to build a new health centre. Naturally, along with other changes occurring in the NHS, this has caused concern, especially for those vulnerable and disabled patients who feel that moving slightly further away from their homes may cause additional difficulty.

There has been no investment in primary care premises in Sedbergh since 1986. Room utilisation surveys have confirmed that the existing health centre is not suitable for the services that are required in Sedbergh and there are several quality standards that can not be met.

The plan would be to centralise all existing services in one new purpose built health centre. The school practice would merge with the health centre and the combined team would have a wider range of clinical expertise for the population. Additional specialist services would be brought into the health centre, reducing travel to hospitals for key investigations and treatment.

Cumbria Primary Care Trust, in line with national policy, is commissioning services so that patients can be looked after closer to home. New premises in Sedbergh are vital for the delivery of a wider range of services, and to provide twenty first century medical care.

The doctors are holding a public meeting at People's Hall, Sedbergh on Friday 29th February 2008 at 7.30

p.m. in order to explain the need for new premises and to answer any questions or concerns. Your attendance would be very much appreciated.

MARY DAWSON

Daughter of William Dawson Older Sedbergh people will recall the family of William and Elizabeth Dawson who in their later years lived on Bainbridge Road. It was William who, at the end of the nineteenth century, went to his employer John Handley at Sedbergh Railway Station, where new businesses had begun to distribute the coal that at last could be brought here from the Yorkshire Coalfield by train, to ask for a higher wage to support his growing family. The youngest member of that family, Mary, died on the very last day of 2007, within a couple of months of her 105th birthday.

She was born at Hawkrigg, two miles out of Sedbergh on the Kendal road, and would walk with her older sisters to the British School in Joss Lane. She was the youngest of six children, the oldest of whom, John, inherited the coal business which continues to this day under William's great-grandson.

After her marriage at Sedbergh Methodist Church, Mary moved to the London area, where she has lived ever since. She made her last visit here in 1990 when she was guest of honour at a gathering of the Dawson Family held at The Hylands. Her death marks the end of an era.

DECEMBER WEATHER

The falling pressure at the end of last month was continued into this month and was heralded by a blustery start. In fact the whole month was fairly windy even the mid period of high pressure. The maximum wind speed was 24.4mph and on only one day was that not blow from the North West. This was quite interesting in that during the middle of the month we had a period of high pressure with recording of over 30inches of mercury for 8 days. This is the longest period over ! lost 3 large fish and a small one when the 30 inches I recall since setting up this system. What I found interesting is that during these periods in winter the winds are usually from the East hence the very cold weather we associate with anticyclonic conditions. Certainly the temperatures reflected this as the maxima were in the 30sF or low 40sF during this period. We had 8 days with minima in the goldcrest around and a rarity, for us, in a 20sF (20.5F to 27.1F). The lowest temperature for the month was actually outside this period at 19.0F!! Wind chill was again notable when on only 1 night did the temperature not fall below freezing. During the anticyclonic period it fell to 9F!!!! We actually had a spell of 11 days without measurable rainfall in the able to hunt. We have a young male middle of the anticyclone. !4 days would have been an official drought! However it knobbled a rabbit with myxomatosis in soon made up for it with a total for the month of 6.07 inches! Our heaviest 24 hours collection was 1.5 inches, 2.45 in 36 hours. We were let off lightly when compared to places like Keswick which had 4 inches in the same period. Twice during the month Baugh Fell had a covering of snow.

TRAVELLERS

A meeting recently took place between Police Officers, our S.L.D.C. representative, Craig Stephenson., and Parish Councillors, Kevin Lancaster and myself to discuss the travellers which descend upon Sedbergh and the surrounding areas in May and June in connection with the Appleby Horse Fair.

In recent years the number of travellers has increased and become more mobile due to the use of horse boxes/wagons and not guite so many horse drawn vehicles- When it was mostly horse drawn vehicles they needed to stop at regular intervals in order to feed and rest the horses thereby using the verges/laybys whenever necessary. This need has now changed somewhat and to the east of Sedbergh it has now become a different scene at the May/June

time of the year.

The meeting took place in order that some form of plan may be made to cope with the ever increasing numbers of travellers. Part of the ongoing deliberations is to take into account the feelings of those mostly affected from the area of Settlebeck to the boundary of our Parish at the top of Cautley. We would ask those affected if they would be kind enough to put their concerns in writing (however briefer long) so that we may take these to our next meeting with the Police Officers and relevant members of South Lakeland District Council and if necessary the RSPCA, which will take place in the next few

We ourselves as Parish Council will also be putting our written concern and plans to the next meeting regarding the travellers.

The Police at the recent meeting did wish that in this article I did express to the people of Sedbergh and the Dales that if they had any problems not just with travellers but any other police related incidents that they should ALWAYS ring the police (telephone number 08453300247) NOT TO RELY ON SOME OTHER PERSON TO CALL THEM and in that way they can then assess just how serious the problems is. (i.e. the more calls they receive - the more serious they take the situation).

GARSDALE BROADBAND

Community Endeavour Brings Broadband to Garsdale and Grisedale

The high turnout of residents at an initial meeting in Garsdale Village Hall in March 2007 highlighted the very real need for a fast reliable broadband connection in our rural community. It was incredible to see just how many people felt disadvantaged by not being able to access broadband. Business development, farming, children's school work and keeping in touch with family and friends was being held back by the lack of an internet connection, even the slow dial-up connection was deteriorating and becoming non-existent in some cases. Having had no success with British Telecom there was a need to find an alternative solution to our lack of Internet access.

The meeting was the start of a real community effort to attempt to get a reliable broadband service in the dale. A committee was formed to try and solve the problem. We had the support of our MP, Tim Farron, the Parish Council, local schools and of course the local community. The North West Development Agency agreed to provide funding for the project and Kencomp, the local computer company, provided the technical expertise.

Over the next few months the committee worked closely with Kencomp, the North West

Development Agency and the community to bring broadband to the dale. The help and co-operation of residents who agreed to have equipment sited on their land or property was essential to success of the project.

The landscape of Garsdale and Grisedale means that is not the most easily accessible area. Eventually the technical problems were solved, funding was secured and any necessary planning permissions granted. The installation began in August and by the end of October most people were connected.

As with most innovative projects there have been some teething problems but Kencomp have been quick to respond and sort out difficulties, often at weekends.

It is a remarkable achievement in a small community to go from no broadband to having the ability to connect to a fast, reliable broadband service in six months.

Our success was only made possible by the grant from NWDA, the technical capability of Kencomp and the help, support and patience of Garsdale and Grisedale residents.

Thanks to everyone who has helped to get this project up and running. Hopefully we will all be able to enjoy the benefits of having fast, reliable Internet access for many years to come.
