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#### **DENT PARISH COUNCIL**

The June Parish Council meeting was a relatively short one, but the issue of noise in the village at weekends was raised in the regular Public Forum item. This agenda item takes place every meeting about 8pm and is an opportunity for anyone to raise any issue that they wish.

As usual, the full Parish Council minutes are published on the Dentdale website www.dentdale.com. Dent Post Office

Following the discussion at the Annual Parish Meeting in April, agreement has now been reached with Sedbergh Post Office for the Post Office outreach service on Tuesday and Thursday mornings to be sited in Dent Stores. A number of technical issues are now being investigated by the Post Office, and so it is unlikely that any change will take place before late August or early September at the earliest. When this outreach service is set up, its existence will only be guaranteed for twelve months. Beyond that, it will depend entirely on how much it is used, so it really will be a case of "use it or lose it".

When the small group of volunteers from the annual parish meeting met to consider the whole issue, Catherine Vinsen offered to coordinate support for the new scheme. If you would like to help with this, please contact her on 25815.



Highways Stewardship Scheme Joe Nicholson, the local County Councillor, reported that Cumbria Highways were introducing a Highways Stewardship scheme to cover the whole county which would be similar to the Lengthsman scheme proposed a year or so ago. In essence, all parts of the County will have locally-based workers responsible for the roads in their area. They will be able to carry out minor repairs themselves as well as maintaining verges, drains and culverts. More details will be released at a meeting in Sedbergh in early July, but the Parish Council felt that on the information received so far, the scheme had the potential to improve roads maintenance in the Dale.

#### Noise Nuisance

A member of the public raised the issue of noise in the street made at weekends in the early hours of the morning by customers of the George and Dragon. The Parish Council undertook to raise the matter with the pub's owner.

#### Ann Wilson

Thanks were expressed to Ann Wilson, who resigned from the Parish Council at the end of June. Ann has served on the Parish Council for a number of years, during which time she has been Chair and Vice-Chair as well being closely involved with the management of the car park and with planning issues. Her detailed knowledge of Dentdale and the people who live here will be considerably missed.



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Proposed Ghyllside development

The decision to give planning permission for the 12 affordable houses on the field above Ghyllside was reported last month. Those who have looked at the YDNPA's website will be aware that the plans that have been approved are for stone-faced houses, with only five elevations those facing the beck - to be finished in painted render.

#### **JULY GARDENING**

As I look out of the window and across to the birch and sycamore trees at the end of the garden, I can see that the fresh bright colours of the roses in it, but old names are hard to spring foliage have already darkened, and everything has become a uniform subjects: Weeping Silver-leaved Pear mid green. This makes a lovely backdrop for the various grey/blue leaved trees and shrubs which are dotted around the garden.

In pride of place in the middle of the lawn is the Atlantic Cedar (Cedrus atlantica glauca) with its graceful spreading boughs, bearing whorls of pale blue/green needles. The Cedar obviously likes it here. At 20 years old smaller, or pruned up to give space it is around 20ft high and 20ft wide. It will ultimately eat up the whole lawn,

but it is so beautiful that it is impossible to think of curtailing its growth.

In the "Rose Border" (it only has 2 change), are two more, grey leaved (Pyrus salicifolia 'Pendula') and Woolly Willow (Salix lanata). The former is an excellent small tree for small gardens. Mine is around 25 years old and is about 8ft high and 10ft wide with branches sweeping down to the ground. It grows here unchecked, but this tree can if needed, be pruned down to keep it for plants to grow underneath and although it always looks a little shocked and clipped after its annual September chop it recovers well and looks as good as new in the next growing season. The willow has furry soft grey leaves and makes a low spreading bush, perhaps 4ft high and 6ft wide in 20 years. It bears large catkins in late spring as the new leaves unfold.

Last, but by no means least is a shrub called Oleaster (Elaeagnus angustifolia 'Quicksilver'). This deciduous plant has very silvery leaves and stems and a graceful arching habit. Flowers which are born in summer are small and pale yellow and sweetly scented. The plant makes a lovely foil for blue Geranium 'Rozanne', pale pink Rose 'Stanwell Perpetual' dusky pink Oriental Poppy 'Patty's Plum' and lavender blue Viola cornuta.

It was great fun as we laid out our merino wool strands to form a dense pad. With plenty of water and some soap and with lots of pummelling and rolling, we managed to get the felt effect. We had decorated the squares with a freehand design or a flower as we had been shown. Everyone entered the competition this month as our finished squares were placed together on a table to form a display of which we were all justly proud of our efforts and Sophie declared Rita Corpe's square the winner.

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#### **MAY WEATHER**

May was certainly a month of extremes! We had an official drought with the lowest monthly rainfall I have ever recorded with only 0.63 inches and that was the result of two showers. It was also the longest period I have recorded winds from an easterly direction hence our dry warm spell. On only 2 days did we have winds briefly from a westerly quarter towards the end of the month. The easterlies were quite keen with gusts reaching double figures on all but 3 days. The maximum wind speed I recorded was 27.1mph but there were times when it was difficult to walk against the wind suggesting that the wind was much stronger. During the second week we had maximum temperatures in the 70sF with a high of 78.8F! A week later we had night time temperatures down in the 30sF on 3 nights with a ground frost on 2 nights and a low 34.2F twice.



I think May is my favourite month with all the fresh greens on the trees and hedgerows, the blossom on shrubs and an increase of garden and hedgerow flowers. It is also the best month for bird song, if you want to be up at 4- 4.30am!! The birds are busy feeding young and the migrants are either nest building or sorting out their old ones. The blackbird and robin have got their first clutches away in our shippon. Our "resident" swallows have obviously gone elsewhere this year. The house martin came and looked at last year's nest, which had been commandeered by a house sparrow, and promptly left not to be seen again! In fact I have seen very few hirudines this year, certainly around us. Also for yet another year I have not heard a cuckoo. I have heard a green woodpecker fairly regularly but have seen it yet. I was pleased to see a couple of pipisterelle bats flying around again after quite a period without them. The only downside for me with this month is that with the longer evenings come the midges. The pesky things make it impossible to work outside after tea. Another mishap, due the strong winds, was the blowing down of a goldcrest's nest. These gorgeous little structures of moss and hair are just perched on a branch in a conifer without much in the way of attachment hence it came to grief. I saw another nest which had suffered the same fate so let's hope these tiny birds managed to rebuild and raise a brood. Ah well you can't win them all!!

Baroness Shirley Williams, the well-respected politician will be the festival's special guest this year and she will be talking about 'The Age of Ideas' that we live in. Other quests include Mark Lynas whose film for National Geographic earned him the title of 'Emerging Explorer' in 2006, and Richard Holloway, former Bishop of Edinburgh proud of this festival. It has huge and founding member of the Human Fertilisation & Embryology Authority. A variety of other speakers will be addressing issues such as eco-living, diversity & equality in Cumbria, belief and science. The Mail on Sunday's Peter Hitchens will close the festival with a fiery speech about the future of British politics as he sees it.

An important new development this year is that there will be opportunities for children and their families to be involved in the festival. For example there will be a thoughtful session presented by Philosophy 4 Children at which children can present and debate views on a wide range of important subjects that concern all of us. #### **DAME MARY PETERS**

The report in the June Lookaround concerning the presentation of the Metcalfe Trophy mentioned that Dame Mary Peters had a grandmother who lived in Sedbergh.

Her grandmother was Mary Metcalfe, of Nether House, Garsdale and later of Liverpool. Mary Metcalfe was one of the 12 children, (3 boys and 9 girls) of Christopher and Jane (Dinsdale) Metcalfe. Mary, and another sister, went to Liverpool to help her brother Edmond Metcalfe. who had a milk house in Woolton, when he became ill. Sadly, he died when only 27 and is remembered on his parents' gravestone at Low Smithy Garsdale. Mary Metcalfe met and married Robert Henry Peters and they lived at Langstane House, a reminder of 'home'. Their family, like many others who moved away, retained links with Garsdale and the children visited their grandparents for

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This Metcalfe family can be traced back in the parish registers for several generations, for much of the time living in Lower Garsdale. Christopher and Jane moved into Nether House in the 1860s. In the census and trade directories Christopher (died 1916) is recorded as a farmer and quarry foreman. When Jane died in 1928, another local family, who stayed until the 1970s, took on the farm.

Moving further back in time, Christopher was the son of John (born 1809) and Isabella (Wightman) Metcalfe. John and his older siblings were baptised in Sedbergh, so they don't feature in the Garsdale Baptisms. His younger siblings appear in the Garsdale baptisms, children of William and Mary Metcalfe of Giles.

John and Isabella became strong Methodists and their son, John, was a Lay Preacher living at West Mostards, Garsdale in 1901. John and Isabella lived at Hind Keld and then moved to Ratten Row and John developed the quarries there. John, Isabella and a son, Christopher or a brother, feature in pictures taken by the Brunskills in their Sedbergh studio in 1866. Interestingly copies were preserved in a Bible owned by one of their granddaughters.

The connections between local families are strong and so this Metcalfe family have links with others that moved to Liverpool, including the wartime comedian Tommy Handley. But that's another story!

#### SEDBERGH TOWN BAND **GALA 2008**

The Town Band again led the parade from the fire station to the Lupton fields, Back Lane, providing a rousing start to 2008's most successful event.

#### **BAND TRIP TO DUMFRIES**

This enabled some eighteen items to be recorded to the combined satisfaction of Director of Music Alan Lewis and recording technician Malcolm.. The finished article is scheduled to be Band's first ten years. ready to coincide with the Anniversary Concert in Powell Hall on Saturday 27th September.

#### SETTLEBECK CROSSING

Mrs Kirby's article in last month's Lookaround is a very good summary of the dangers, concerns and penalties concerning the Settlebeck Zebra Crossing. Many of you will be aware that I am on duty at the crossing most weeks and of course when I am there, nearly all the drivers adhere to the speed limit. I intend to vary my duty day each week whenever possible so that my presence is not so predictable! The Constabulary's Traffic Manager, Roger Mallett, visited the crossing at my request and it was he who proposed the repainting. I spoke to CCC Highways department in early June and they have this in hand. You will also know now that the flashing amber lights have just been installed on new lamp standards so the crossing's presence will be much more visible than in the past. The question of adding a 20 mph speed limit has been raised with me but it is very rare for such a limit to be added to an A road unless it is part of a much wider traffic calming scheme. It would seem that many of the offenders who drive carelessly or even dangerously in the vicinity of the crossing are local people. There is no excuse for this behaviour, careless driving put lives at risk unnecessarily so I would urge all motorists to adhere to the 30 mph limit, do not overtake anywhere near the crossing and make sure to stop for everybody waiting to cross.

Kennel Club Good Dog Citizen Awards

On Thursday 12<sup>th</sup> June 2008 Sedbergh Dog Training held their Bronze and Silver awards at the Peoples Hall .

The Kennel Club Good Citizen Dog Scheme Bronze Awards aims to produce a dog that will walk and behave in a controlled manner on a lead, will stay in one position on command, will allow its owner to clean, groom, and inspect it. The dog must also be able to positioned by its handler for inspection ie, stand, sit or lie down on either side or on its back, all on a lead. The dog must come to hand when called .The Bronze award aims to provide the handlers with basic knowledge and understanding and training their canine companion. The test is non competitive but the examiner should be satisfied that dogs are worthy of passing.

Sixteen dogs and owners took part in the Bronze Award and one in the Silver Award.

The examiner Walter Edmondson is retired Police Dog handler and force dog trainer from the West Yorkshire Constabulary.

He commented that of all the Bronze examinations he has carried out over the last five years this was the most impressive he had seen.

#### **CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST**

A new heyday for hay meadows?
It is estimated that less than 500 hectares of upland hay meadows still exist today in Cumbria. Conservation organisations, Cumbria Wildlife Trust and Cumbria FWAG, are joining forces to halt the loss of both upland and lowland hay meadows and to restore them to their former beauty.

Hay is the traditional winter food for livestock in the Lake District and only a few years ago our valley bottoms would have been filled with the distinctive sight and smell of meadow flowers such as globeflower, wood cranesbill and melancholy thistle. A combination of ploughing, drainage, reseeding and fertiliser have destroyed many of these gems.

Hay meadows have been identified as an endangered habitat in the Cumbria Biodiversity Action Plan. The Cumbria Hay Meadows Project is a three-year project that aims to identify and maintain hay meadows in the Lake District National Park and the wider Orton area, and to restore them where possible. Hay Meadow Ecologist, Claire Cornish, will survey 250 sites for their variety of flowers over the course of the project.

Ms Cornish said: "The data collected from each site will be used to create a management plan for the meadow, which the landowner will use as a guide. The data will also provide the basis for future conservation work on hay meadows in the area, creating a guideline for site quality and a list of flower seed donor sites, which can be

used in restoration projects."

As well as finding and assessing sites, the project will also work with farmers, Natural England and environmental consultants to turn management plans in to practical action on the ground. Bunty Wright, Hay Meadows Project Adviser, will visit farms to discuss the potential for upgrading any Tier 1 land within the Environmentally Sensitive Area (ESA) which meets the criteria for Tier 2 meadows and will also draw up Environmental Stewardship Higher Level Scheme applications on behalf of farmers.

Ms Wright said: "As well as getting out and visiting farms I will be holding some demonstration days on hay

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meadow restoration for farmers who would like to know more. There will also be a newsletter, a hay meadow plant identification guide and we will be offering other related events over the duration of the project."

The first year of the project will target the Orton area where the twite, a small brown finch, is still thought to be breeding. It is one of the last known sites in Cumbria. The decrease in numbers, thought to be 80% since 1990, has been attributed to the reduction in the number of hay meadows. These are vital as they provide seeds, especially those of dandelion and sorrel for twite chicks. The project is particularly interested

to include hay meadows within 3km of the moorlands around Sunbiggin Tarn and Ash Fell.

#### **FARFIELD MILL**

Waterloo School Visit – Thursday 5<sup>th</sup> June

Farfield Mill opened its doors to a party of schoolchildren from Waterloo School in Blackpool on the 5<sup>th</sup> June as the group came to participate in workshops including spinning and weaving wool and experience poetry reading from children's author John Rice.

The group of 90 children, aged between 9 and 10, enjoyed an eventful day which also involved a tour of the Mill and a chance to watch Farfields resident artists at work.

John Rice led the workshops with renditions of some of his favourite poems from his vast collection and had the children joining in and reciting with him. Rice isn't a stranger to working with kids, after visiting some 2000 schools, libraries and festivals in his career. He has also had 13 books published including a book of Scottish Poems, of which he edited. He has also worked in radio and television, on shows such as BBC Radio 2 Arts Programme and children's TV show Jackanory.

Dilys McCaffery also showed the group how to use wool to make clothing items such as skirts or trousers using an old spinning wheel. The demonstration interested the children who asked questions and were keen to watch the experienced weaver at work. McCaffery, a resident artist at Farfield, was happy to answer questions and the kids enjoyed being able to watch how clothes were made in years gone by.

The group also got an opportunity to

tour the Mill, look at the work produced by the resident artists at Farfield, and find out about the Mills history, including how it was run, what it produced and how it was restored. They also got to look at the sites original mill and Dobcross looms.

The visit gave the youngsters a wonderful insight into Farfields past and also how the tradition of hand making products is being carried out to this day in this old historic building.

Our students learn to use stop-watches to record each other's timings to improve on week by week.

5 more voluntary life guards have just taken their RLSS Bronze Medallion awards which mean they are qualified for 24 months - without this no swimming would be possible so thank you to all the volunteers. Thanks also to Sedbergh School for allowing us to continue using the pool, and ensure that members can swim locally.

#### **DENT CHURCH APPEAL NEWS**

We are very grateful to David O'Brien for providing a very clear overview with regard to the Appeal and the St Andrews Church restoration project:

At the end of 2007 it was learnt that the application to the National Heritage Lottery Fund to repair the north aisle roof had been successful. In the first four months of 2008 our architect John Barnes has driven forward detailed investigations into the structure and weatherproofing of the whole building.

To our surprise the Victorian top water drains to the south and north of pointing from exterior walls, chipping the church are in good order. It was no surprise that other aspects of the building are in a worse condition. More dry rot was found to be starting in the laths of the north aisle roof. The whole of that ceiling has to be taken out and replaced (with ventilation to the underside of the outer covering). The structural frame at the top of the bell tower is seriously rotten. Some of the timbers appear sound at the surface but are rotted from the wall side to within 2" of the outer surface. The whole frame and the woodwork in which the six bells are hung have to be stripped out and replaced. The tower walls will have to be tied to prevent any outward spread: flurry of support and events. In the of the walls and ultimate collapse of the tower.

To replace the north aisle roof the organ will have to be dismantled, parts stored, and completely rebuilt when the major works are finished. In still a long way over the horizon. the tower the bells will have to be

# SEDBERGH AND DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

Eleven members of the Society made the long trek to Whitehaven on 28th May and were rewarded by fascinating glimpses into the history of this town which was once among the leading ports in the country. Mr Ralph Lewthwaite, who was born in Whitehaven, was a very knowledgeable and amusing guide. The Society is most grateful to him. The starting point of the guided walk was where Captain John Paul Jones, who had grown up in Whitehaven, made landing during his raid on Whitehaven in 1778, a raid which caused consternation in the country.

We were told about the forts and many cannon which guarded the town and saw the earliest pier, dating from 1634. Also, we learned about the coal mines, particularly Wellington Pit, which ran out under the sea for five miles. The last to close was the Haig Pit in the late 1980s. Among the industries which Whitehaven boasted were: salt (salt from the Whitehaven saltpans was exported as far as Chester by the monks of St Bees), rope making, a foundry, mineral extraction and linen making - the latter spawning an estate of over 100 houses with its own school and church in the mid

Sugar, rum and tobacco were imported and, until 1926, a mineral railway ran through the centre of the town to the guay. There are some fine connected with Whitehaven including buildings and the town was laid out according to the plan of Sir John Lowther who was able to look, from his 'castle', all the way down Lowther Street to the quay. His castle was 1980s. The town has boasted a bath house (built 1813), a customs house, several fine churches, a refuge school, a water treatment works, assembly rooms (1736), market halls, and theatres, the last of which lasted from 1736-1930. Also, there were many fine mansions and a beautiful square, named Washington Square,

after its connections with George Washington.

Several famous people were Mathias Read, the father of Cumberland painting and William Brownrigg, a physician whose work to make pits safer saved many lives.

The local heritage and civic Whitehaven Hospital from 1921 to the societies have done much good work on putting up informative plaques and in trying to preserve and renovate the fine old buildings. A big redevelopment scheme is underway at the old Wellington Pit.

Where SDHS goes her Majesty follows as she visited Whitehaven in early June.

# **DRIVING TIPS**

Emergency Vehicles

Deciding what to do when you hear an emergency vehicle approaching can be a dilemma. Do you stay where you are and potentially block the progress of an emergency vehicle? Or do you move into a position that may put you or other road users at risk?


Unfortunately, some drivers overreact to emergency service vehicles travelling on "blues and twos" (blue lights and two-tone horns). This is often because they don't hear or see the emergency vehicle until it's too close, and then take drastic action to get out of the way.

The IAM (Institute of Advanced

Motorists) says that good driving practice will alert you early to emergency vehicles: regular mirror checks (side and rear) for example, and keeping the windows slightly down around town, so you can hear sirens approaching.

Don't panic and just brake. It's natural to want to react. But instinctively putting your brakes on immediately in front of an emergency vehicle doesn't help: it slows the progress of the emergency vehicle and jeopardises other road users.

Think about where you are on the road. You should deal with the problem in the same way that you deal with any other potentially hazardous driving situation. What is



the safest option available to you?

Don't cross red traffic lights or speed: to get out of the way. The emergency driver has training and legal exemptions that you don't have. Bus lanes and box junctions can be problems too, but let them resolve the problem of breaking the rules – not you.

If you are moving it may well be that you can continue at a reasonable pace and the emergency vehicle can follow you out of a pocket of congestion (such as a blocked one way system). In that scenario, attempting to pull over too soon, or slow down, might just cause a needless obstruction and so hamper the progress of the emergency

vehicle.

Indicate your intentions clearly Don't pull in opposite other obstructions, such as centre bollards. If you are thinking about pulling over across an entrance to a school or factory, you may be unwittingly preventing the emergency vehicle reaching its destination. And do think about where you are asking the emergency driver to overtake you – on the brow of a hill or a blind bend can be placing him or her in a very difficult position.

Get out of the way as soon as you can do so in safety.



# **COUNCILLORS CORNER** APPLEBY HORSE FAIR:

had the annual Appleby New Fair and have a zero-tolerance policing policy. words cannot express how disappointed I have been in the general lack of improvement. Many people worked hard during the last year to try to reduce the impact this year and I had real hopes that there would be progress. Initially things looked guite promising. Certainly the travellers did not arrive as soon as they did last year and the small numbers there were at first seemed to be on their best behaviour. And then on Wednesday 28 May all hell broke out.

The stories of intimidation which

have been related to me directly and indirectly are unbelievable. I remain Since I wrote my last article we have of the view that it is essential that we Once it is seen that no action is taken when horses are put into fields then they all do it. Yes, some had permission but most did not. At all times we have been telling people to ring the police 0845 number. It is unfortunate that a response was given that the horses were better in the fields than on the roadside. This is not acceptable. The idea that this is just a civil matter between the grazier and the horse-owner is perverse – the grass is being stolen just as surely as if they took chocolate from a shop counter.



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For the first time, the Chief Constable has been involved and I would like to thank everyone who has : all. written to him. He made promises back in February and I know that he is keen to see that they are upheld. I do think that the SLDC Officers under John Barwise and the local police have done everything that they could be expected to do under the circumstances but they were simply overwhelmed by the numbers when they all came through. Those of us who have been involved during this last year intend to have another meeting as soon as possible in order to prepare for next year. However, if we can't see any realistic chance of improvement in behaviour then I wonder why we have to put up with this annual gathering at all.

I received complaints on a daily basis about the behaviour of the Travellers and how the residents of our community have been treated. I just hope that all the calls made to the provision of health services. Police & SLDC were recorded to reflect the true problem that existed. Yes, there were plenty of Officials in

Appleby but the lack of their presence in our area was very much noted by Ed.

# **AUCTION MART SITE:**

Plans for a joint use of the auction mart site incorporating a new Health Centre and a Spar Supermarket were finally submitted towards the end of last month. The plans themselves do not differ much from what was expected. They are publicly available for all to see both in the Community Office and on the Yorkshire Dales website. I think that apart from the new estate this is the largest redevelopment there has been within Sedbergh parish for well over ten years. Please take the trouble to respond to the consultation. There will eventually be a site visit of the National Park Planning Committee. Parish Council are in consultation with SLDC and its property arm, Norfolk Property Services over the future of the Tennis Courts on Guldrey Lane and the associated car parking. In the past they have been held on a short lease for SLDC. The problem with that is that it prevents the Tennis Club from pursuing Lottery funding. They require a long lease to ensure their money is not wasted. I think we are all eager to see a new arrangement which will allow Lottery funding so the premises can be improved. I would oppose any suggested change of use for housing on this site and am confident that YDNP would do the same.

# **BIKE SAFE CAMPAIGN:**

A number of people have asked me about the orange signs which have proliferated on the A65, A683 and A684. "Think Bike" and "To Die for?". Kevin Tea from Cumbria Road Safety has emailed me to say that "Although Cumbria's killed and serious injury (KSI) total is falling – In 2007 we were below our Government target for 2010 – we have major concerns over two driver groups - young drivers and motorcyclists. The latter account for approximately 25 per cent of all KSI's in Cumbria. Because we have a substantial influx of riders from outside of the area we need to go beyond local TV, radio and newspaper coverage to get a safety message across, not only to motorcyclists but also other road users.

"In Cumbria there are three regional



Casualty Reduction and Safer Highways (CRASH) groups comprising organisations such as the police, the County Council, Capita, motorcycle groups, Amey, Amey Mouchel, and others who have an interest in road safety. On the southern CRASH group there are two county councillors who contribute to the decision making process. Last year the Northern CRASH group ran a pilot scheme using nationally approved posters on its premier biker route the A686. One poster – Think Bike! – targeted other road users to make them aware that there were motorcycles in the area; the other – To Die For? – was aimed at the motorcyclists themselves.

"Following the success of the campaign, this year the Western and Southern CRASH groups decided to run the same type of campaign. Because the posters are temporary they do not legally qualify as signs and do not need planning permission. They were erected late April/May and should be removed at the end of the biker season in September."

What do you think? Motorcyclists

have been a perennial problem on the road through Middleton and Garsdale all the time that I have been your District Councillor. Several years ago Paul Winn and I were marked out by the biker community as troublemakers because of the concerns we were voicing. And yet, they still continue. There was one killed at Thwaitebridge minutes before I arrived on a journey to Bainbridge. Then two days later another wrote off his bike and nearly himself at Garsdale Head. He had the cheek to try to sue me and SLDC for not warning him the road was dangerous – maybe the orange signs aren't over the top after all.

No roads are dangerous if you drive

at the right speed for the conditions! You don't need signs to tell you this.

wish her every success in the future.


We have been very fortunate in being able to recruit some high quality colleagues to replace those who are leaving. We look forward to welcoming:



# **HEALTH CENTRE**

Update from the Health Centre Before we introduced the new appointment system a lot of time was taken up in preparing feedback forms and incident logs to deal with difficulties working with the new schedule, explaining the changes to patients and making sure that whenever possible we satisfy individual requirements. Thankfully the switch has gone smoothly with what feedback we have received being positive. We can now visit (if needed) earlier in the day, reduce waiting times in the open surgeries by having more than one clinician working and offer extended appointments from 8am and between 6.30 to 8.30pm on Mondays for those in full time employment.

There is a willingness on the part of Sedbergh Medical Practice to continue expanding the range and quality of services that we offer. The limiting factor is the current Health Centre which is too small and does not meet modern health care standards. The demand on the NHS (and provision of services) has changed dramatically over the past 20 years and will continue to do so in the future. We face a stark choice in that doing nothing is not an option. No development means that sometime soon the current building will cease to meet modern standards and the full compliment of services will have to be cut back. It is likely that in due course a GP service in



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Sedbergh would be run as a branch from one of the Kendal practices, with limited reception facilities and visiting Doctor's. Much of our current activity would have to be transferred to the larger practice meaning increased travel to Kendal

As everyone knows land within Sedbergh to build a new Health Centre fit for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century is nigh impossible to find. The Practice has to work with existing landowners who have a suitable site (the current location cannot be re-developed) and raise the £1.8 million required via a commercial loan (as the NHS authorities do not have the ability to fund the development). No one location can be ideal and we have a limited choice. The development is designed to meet the Health Care needs of all who live in Sedbergh and the surrounding areas now and for the foreseeable future. Everyone has a right to accessible health care and we undertake to provide that. however keeping a fully functioning GP practice in Sedbergh has got to be closer than moving most of our services to Kendal.

We understand that some people do not agree with the need for change or feel that the current Health Centre site is the only acceptable option. It seems sensible therefore to reconvene the public meeting we had at the People's Hall on Wednesday 23<sup>rd</sup> July at 7.30pm to present what we feel are the compelling reasons for change and answer any questions

from the general public. Achieving planning permission within a National Park is never easy and we will need the assistance of all our patients to persuade the relevant authorities. It is sincerely felt that all comments, queries and concerns can be resolved to the satisfaction of individuals so that everyone can support the provision of a high quality Health Centre in Sedbergh.

Finally some of you may have noticed that the Health Centre was closed on the afternoon of Wednesday 11<sup>th</sup> June. This is part of a Cumbria wide initiative to allow practices time to meet away from work and look at issues of quality and improved service. We would like to apologise for anyone inconvenienced however our time away was put to good use and there will be service improvements as a result. The next closure will be on the afternoon of Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> July. It is likely that we will be closing for 6-8 afternoons over the whole year. The Baycall service based in Kendal does cover the closure in case of medical emergencies.

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# A PLAN FOR DENTDALE

Survey Results

About 70 people met in Dent Memorial Hall towards the end of May to hear the results of the Dentdale Parish Plan surveys. Over the last six months, information and opinions have been gathered from a resident's questionnaire and from meetings and discussions with different sections of the Dentdale community.

Residents' Questionnaire In January, 387 residents' questionnaires were delivered to all households in Dentdale, and 212 were returned – a return rate of 55%, which is exceptionally high for a parish plan.

Although 42% of respondents remained anonymous, most gave some personal details which enabled the following comparisons to be made between the respondents and the whole of the Dale's population:

- Both the gender balance of respondents, and the proportion of those under and over 60, were broadly the same as in the 2001 census
- Whilst working people were well represented at 49% of respondents, this is fewer than the 67% who were economically active in the 2001 census

Note: Figures in these results are percentages of the total number of respondents. In some cases totals will add up to more than 100% where respondents gave more than one answer.

What people like about Dentdale: Overwhelmingly, the most liked features were the landscape and the environment (75%) and the community (70%).

Attitudes to Change: 37% expressed concerns about change.
Of these, 13% saw the establishment



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of a sustainable, thriving community as a priority, 11% were concerned about the effect of an ageing population and 6% were concerned about the effect of incomers. 7% wanted no change at all.

Housing: As might be expected, there was also a lot of concern about the housing situation in the Dale. 32% expressed concern about lack of affordable housing and 29% were worried about the effect of second homes and holiday cottages.

Tourism: 21% made comments about tourism, and the overwhelming view was that tourism needed to be managed. People were keen to ensure it did not destroy the dale by turning it into a museum for visitors. and whilst they felt more visitors should be encouraged to come, they wanted this to be throughout the year and not just at bank holidays. From the point of view of the Dale's economy, they saw a need for visitors to spend more money, but appreciated that they could only do this if there were enough quality services to attract them.

Environment: 93% made comments on environmental issues. Major concerns were speeding, particularly in The Laning (32%), parking on the cobbles and around The Green (29%), litter, including farm plastic, (20%) and dog fouling (20%). But the matter mentioned most frequently was the state of the roads, with 72% expressing concern.

**Community Facilities:** 74% commented on one or more community facilities. The 58% who

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commented on the shop and the post office were mainly concerned about whether they would stay open. Whilst the 30% who commented on the cafes thought they should open for longer, those who wrote about the pubs (21%) felt that the quality of some of them was an issue. Improving the facilities in the Memorial Hall was a popular suggestion among the 12% who referred to it.

**Refuse and Recycling:** 73% said the refuse and recycling services were good, whereas 16% said they were not. 74% made comments – the bin men were generally praised,

but some felt there had been a recent lowering of standards. Recycling was generally approved of, and 40% wanted it extending in Dent to plastic and cardboard.

YDNPA: 73% made comments about the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority. Whilst people approved of the work of the Ranger Service and the Sedbergh planning clinic, there were many negative perceptions, particularly of the planning department. People wanted the National Park to be more proactive, and work with the Parish Council and other bodies to maintain the viability of the local community. Actively discouraging second homes

and allowing barn conversions for local occupancy were suggested as ways in which this might happen.

Transport: 76% made comments about transport. Suggestions included changing the bus timetables to give less time in Sedbergh and more in Kendal and providing early and late trains to Leeds and Carlisle for commuting. The voluntary car scheme was supported but not widely known about, and it was suggested that the possibility of a community minibus should be explored.

**Services:** 59% commented on one or more local services.

- Dent Primary School was highly regarded by most of the 24% who commented on it, though some were concerned about its future. Child care and nursery services were also seen as very good
- Strong satisfaction was expressed with Westmorland General Hospital (19%) and the Fire Service.
- 18% expressed strong satisfaction with local GP's surgeries, though 13% were unhappy with the out-of hours arrangements.
- 10% were concerned about poor mobile phone coverage and internet access.
- Existing home care services were approved of, though there were concerns about their availability.

**Parish Council:** 58% made comments about the Parish Council and there were five times more positive comments than negative ones about it. Some felt it should

provide more information about its role and responsibilities and strengthen links with YDNPA, SLDC, CCC.

Leisure and Recreation: 54% commented on leisure and recreation. and satisfaction was expressed with the general level of facilities. Suggestions included improvements on the playing field, more adult education, the provision of allotments :e) 13% wanted more opportunities and easier access to swimming.

#### **Meetings and Discussions**

Many of the views gathered through meetings and discussions reflected the views expressed in the survey, but in addition:

- **Businesses** in the dale felt there was a need:
- a) for a thriving economy to support farming and provide jobs to retain young people
- b) to actively attract businesses to come here

Some wanted local businesses to cooperate more closely to achieve this.

- The farming community, with its knowledge of the Dale going back many generations, felt that its work was central to preserving both the landscape and a traditional rural way of life. Nevertheless, in the face of low prices and changing subsidies. many farmers expressed uncertainty and worry about the future, both for farming and for their families. Some felt isolated and misunderstood, and unsupported by authorities such as Defra and the National Park.
- Schoolchildren were clear about

- what they wanted. Of the 52 under-18s who gave their views:
- a) 65% wanted easier access to activities outside the Dale
- b) 37% wanted a wider choice of sports
- 26% wanted an improved playground
- d) 25% wanted an indoor meeting place with internet access
- for wildlife-related activities

Having collected residents' views and concerns through these surveys, the next stage of process is to draw up a plan of action to tackle the issues raised. A number of people volunteered at the May meeting to help with individual community projects, and the Steering Group has started discussions with other responsible bodies. Whilst some issues can be dealt with relatively quickly, the more complex ones will take time to resolve and so the overall timetable for the full action plan is likely to be about five years. More details about this part of the process will be given in next month's Lookaround.

Major Developments at Sedbergh CDC

Sedbergh Community Development Centre has now been running courses for adults for nearly 10 years. To start with we only offered a handful a copy of the Cumbria Adult of courses, but this academic year we Education Service county brochure have organised over 60, and had nearly 500 enrolments.

#### TIM FARRON MP

As we all know there is a desperate shortage of affordable housing in our area. Even if the "credit crunch" does reduce property prices there will still a massive gap between what many people can afford and the price of housing, particularly in areas like the Yorkshire Dales that attract people looking for second homes or for places to retire. If something is not done the slow drift of our young people away from the area to towns where they can afford somewhere to live will continue. The Yorkshire Dales National Park has been quite forward thinking on this issue, introducing initiatives like limiting the building of new housing that is not affordable and for local people.

For sometime I have believed that disused farm buildings can play an important role in addressing this problem. As farming changes the types of buildings farmers need are



also changing, as a result there are an increasing number of old barns around that serve no purpose beyond ! heard that our population profile is being over sized wood stores. Under current regulations it is very hard for farmers to get planning permission to convert these buildings into something useful. As a result we have: Framework is anticipating a a problem with the increasing decay of barns and buildings that farmers cannot justify the expense of maintaining. You only need to look at the way the roofs of many old barns are losing their slates and starting to sag. Some are even becoming rather dangerous.

It seemed to me that if the planning authorities could relax their rules on the development of these barns to allow them to be converted into housing that is affordable and for local people we have a "win win" situation. I have been presenting this idea to many different groups for over a year the NFU is very supportive, I am trying to persuade the Housing Minister, Caroline Flint, to support it but recently I have heard that South Lakeland District Council are actually thinking of putting the proposal into

practice. This is the great thing about having a Liberal Democrat run district council, it makes it so much easier for me to work with them to improve the lives of everyone who lives here. I am extremely hopeful that we will start to see action on this very soon and that it will be seen as a pioneering scheme to be rolled out across the country.

I hope you agree with me that this is really good news!

The battle over the future of the hospital carries on. We have recently aging rapidly, the number of people reaching their hundredth birthday is predicted to increase by 2500 percent and the Local Development population increase of 20,000 over the next couple of decades. This together with the growing number of tourists we are seeing, mean that the demand for emergency services at the hospital can only grow. It makes even less sense to plan to close the services in the face of these developments. I have written to the Chief Executives of both of the medical trusts involved to ask them to start again in drawing up their plans for health care in our area.

Let's hope we can get some good news in this area as well.

#### PHOTON THERAPY

Part Two

All modern technology uses light in some way or other. We are mastering the use of light and the magnetic fields it produces. But what is a photon ACTUALLY? Every scientist tells you it's a mass-less packet/wave of energy and as far as the sizes of things are in sub-atomic physics it's big. When electrons that cloud around atoms jump to a higher state of energy they gobble up a photon of light, and when they drop to a lower state of energy they emit a photon – but a photon is huge compared to an electron. How does such a huge thing fit inside such a small thing? Well, the energy in the light is absorbed to power up the electron, and it is released again as light when the electron powers down.

Funny thing is that no one has ever seen a photon under a microscope – for when you irradiate it with light so you can study it – it completely disappears! I asked a well-known physics professor to tell me what light ACTUALLY was – he said "I haven't got a clue!" Yes, light is funny stuff.

Because, at last, we have invented light emitting diodes (LED's) which are cold lasers, and they can be very bright but never get hot even if they are intensely pulsed (IP), huge possibilities are opening up for the future.

Suddenly medical science is discovering that not only can you use light for all kinds of diagnostic purposes, but you can use it to heal many different conditions. MRI is being tested because it might help bipolar disorder, full body infrared for MS, and irradiations of wrists and neck for carpal tunnel syndrome.

The colours (frequencies) of light commonly used are red, blue and green. Infrared is invisible – but a few visible light emitting diodes help you to know that the light is on and working. Very efficient and well designed healing lamps are being produced in China to a high standard that are used in hospitals and there are some that can be used at home.

NASA – the American Space Agency was one of the first groups to investigate hand held healing lamps because the wounds of astronauts in space are slow to heal. Red light was found to speed the process up.

Healing devices for animals and humans are available on the Internet. There are some people trying to make a lot of money out of something that could be very simple and inexpensive. If you are interested in the healing properties of light you can make your own photon therapy lamp that will work too.

The interesting thing about healing with light is that in many clinical trials it was found that it made no difference to the results as to whether the light was bright, nor if it was intensely pulsed – it also worked if it was simply shining. It's the frequency (colour) that's the thing...and fortunately, when it comes to visible light our eyes tell us what frequency it is. If we see blue – then it's BLUE!
