TIM FARRON MP

Thank you to everybody who came along to see us as our travelling surgery rolled into Sedbergh, Dent and Garsdale. It makes such a difference to our visits if there are people waiting to talk to us when we arrive. One of the major issues raised was the standard of the roads in the area. In fact we did not really need to be told about this. When we drive over from Dent to Garsdale on the Coal Road we had seen for ourselves for farmers in the Sedbergh area who that the word "road" was a bit of an over claim. It is in an appalling state, what with subsidence and potholes it is barely a track. Many people also mentioned the state of the road from Sedbergh to Kendal which seems to

be in a serious state of decline. We will be writing to the County Council to draw these issues to their attention and put some pressure on to get it sorted out as quickly as possible; certainly before things get any worse. Another issue people raised was the ongoing saga of blue tongue vaccination. Defra have now extended their protection zone up to the Cumbrian borders. This is has the potential to be a particular problem use Hawes Auction to buy and sell stock. They can take their animals to Hawes to sell them, as that is within the new protection zone, but if they do not achieve the price they are looking for they will not be able to

bring them from the protection zone back into unprotected Cumbria. It also means that they will not be able to buy any livestock from Hawes or Lancaster Auctions. I have been pressing the ministers responsible for some time now to get a move on with vaccinating Cumbrian animals and I will continue to do this. I can see their geographical argument for rolling out but there is a certain moral argument to protect an area that has been so badly affected by foot and mouth in the past that they must take notice of. Farming around here can only handle a certain number of blows, particularly government caused blows before we start to see it collapsing. If they don't move fast the consequences for the County Show are frightening.

Finally, we rounded off the visit with a meeting at Dent School to look at the plans for the new play area. For reasons that don't seem sensible to me, the National Park is failing to approve them. Given the emphasis that Ofsted rightly places on the provision of outdoor play areas this seems to be mad, threatening the

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quality of education that the school can provide. This will be the subject of another letter asking them to take a sensible view on the matter.

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All in all a rather lovely day. Even the weather stayed fine for us which, given how appalling it has been over the past few weeks, was a real blessing.

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COMMUNITY OFFICE

Sedbergh and District Community
Office and Community Fund

The Community Office, which is located above Sedbergh Tourist Information Centre, is supported by the parish councils of Sedbergh, Dent and Garsdale. To help pay our way, we undertake a number of duties on behalf of the parish councils and South Lakeland District Council. Such duties include the issue of parking permits and discretionary travel concession cards. We provide advice on access to local authority and voluntary services and if requested, contact the appropriate authority to report problems. Planning

applications can be viewed here, with National Park planning surgeries being held at the Office on Wednesday afternoons (by appointment) and the wonderful History Society archive is available for information and research. There are ecologically friendly cleaning products, artworks and of course books for sale.

However, our main function is to encourage and support residents and groups who are seeking to undertake projects that they believe will sustain or improve the quality of the local environment and/or aspects of community life. To do this we need you to tell us what it is about our

community and environment that you value and want to preserve: what causes you concern and what changes you would like to help bring about. We would like to hear of your plans and projects and we would like you to share your concerns, in a constructive solution focused way. telling us what you feel can be done and how you are willing to help achieve a positive outcome. In return we will do our best to provide encouragement and support, to put you in touch with like minded people, to help you access advice and to seek funding.

Sedbergh and District Community Fund is a small fund, with charitable status, set up some years ago to help maximise the funds that can be made support small scale projects being undertaken for the benefit of the community. Most recently for example, it has supported the setting up of the Flicks in the Fells community cinema and the community allotment project. Sedbergh and District Community Charity Shop.

It is proposed that a community charity shop be opened, managed, at icontact David Ramsbottom at the first, by the Community Office, with profits being used to replenish the Community Fund. In this way many good causes could benefit from the sale of donated goods. It is planned to open the shop as soon as possible : probably towards the end of September. Suitable Main Street premises, with a good sized sales floor and cellar, have been earmarked for the project. It is intended that the shop be staffed by volunteers to



available to local causes. Can you help? Donations of goods will be welcomed in due course.

CAR PARKING PERMITS

On 1st September ALL parking permits for use in Joss Lane Car Park and Loftus Hill Car Park will require renewing.

The Parish Council have kept the same rates as in previous years as follows:-

£35-00 per year for a daily permit or £52-00 per year for each permit for those who require to 'garage' their vehicle on the car parks (You will notice that one of the conditions on the car park is that you must remove your vehicle after 24 hours) BUT if you hold a £52-00 permit this does not apply.

Those who require a permit for a holiday let must pay £52-00 and the holiday let must be used only as a holiday let and not as someone's permanent place of residence (proof may be required to show it is a holiday let)

The Parish Council appreciate that

people move into the area at different times of the year and accordingly should someone wish to purchase a permit after the 1st of March in each year then the price of the permits will be reduced to :-

£20-00 for a daily permit or £30-00 for those who wish to 'garage' their car on the car parks.

The permits can be purchased as usual at the Community Office (above the Tourist Information/Book Town centre at 72a Main Street. If you have any queries regarding the permits which the staff in the Community Office cannot deal with please leave a message with them for the attention of the Parish Council and we will get back to you as soon as possible. Please remember the Community Office staff are there to sell you the permits not to solve queries/problems with regard to the car parks. That is the responsibility of the Parish Council. SEDBERGH SCHOOL

Archive and Heritage

I've been really delighted with how many visitors the Archive has had over the summer. During six weeks in July and August over two hundred people visited the archive both from Sedbergh

and further afield. At the moment we have a temporary display about the Queens visit to Sedbergh but also have permanent displays about various aspects of the history of the school since 1525. By the time this article is published we will have had a display case fitted and so will be able to display many of the more valuable and interesting documents

and artefacts.

Visitors are always welcome to ask about items held in the archive that are not on display. Over the summer

> a collection list has been developed so that it will be easier for visitors to find out about artefacts hidden away in storage.

The archive is open to the public and entry is free of charge. The opening times can vary slightly from week to

week depending on other activities within the school but are usually Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday morning and all day on Thursdays. This sometimes changes so visitors are welcome to ring 015396 22275 or email kli@sedbergh.school.org before visiting to make sure the archive will be open at the time of their visit. The archive has a range of activity sheets for children of primary school age to enjoy giving parents the freedom to look around the centre at the exhibits.

One of the on-going jobs that archive volunteers have been doing over the summer is listing new donations and re-packing them in preservation materials. Other tasks volunteers can undertake include digitising photos, helping visitors with family history enquiries and cataloguing the collection.

Enrolment Evening 9th and 11th September from 6.30pm.



DENTDALE WI

The August open meeting was held in the Methodist Chapel as repairs were still going on at the Memorial Hall. We were slightly down on numbers however, for what was a really interesting meeting. More about that later.

One of our members, Connie Chambers, had celebrated her 90th birthday earlier in the week and most of us had taken up her son and daughter-in-law's kind invitation to join them and family for drinks and cake cutting to mark the occasion. Dentdale WI presented Connie with an orchid during the meeting.

The fashion show held in late July had gone well and made over a £100 for a much needed boost to our funds.

Members were reminded that our contribution to the Dent Gala this year was to be a cake stall and it was hoped that we would do well to contribute towards the considerable costs of running the hall.

The Guest speaker was Nick Anderson of Corio Rapter Care from High Bentham. This is a small and highly specialist rehab unit for injured birds of prey. Nick works with the RSPB and the police and rescued 115 Birds last year. He used to be a warden at Minsmere looking after Marsh Harriers.

The Centre has a bird hospital and if necessary, birds with broken wings etc. are examined by a vet. The primary intention is to get them back into the wild. Usually it take 2-3 days for the birds to respond and more

birds die of shock than injury. They are then moved to a secluded aviary and stay for a further week in a more open area before being released. This year 23 Tawny Owls have been brought to the Care Centre. When they are released they have a 50% chance of survival.

During the evening we were introduced to various patients from the centre including an Asian Eagle owl being the largest bird in care.

Nick believes in homeopathic treatments giving SA37 vitamins tee tree oil and lemon grass.

The charity is in its eleventh year of operation and relies on donations to provide care and treatment for the owls and is run by volunteers and is a non profit making organisation.

Travelling & Settled Community Respect in South Lakeland

An evaluation meeting of the impact of the Appleby Horse Fair in the Sedbergh & Kirkby Lonsdale area was held on 4th July at Barbon Village Hall. The meeting for elected representatives and officers was attended by representatives of Kirkby Lonsdale, Casterton, Barbon and Sedbergh Parish Councils, District Councillors Kevin Lancaster and Ian McPherson, representatives of Lake District Estates, officers from SLDC, CCC and the police. The aims of the meeting were to feedback on management arrangements for this years event and to hear concerns

about the impact on the local community of the gypsies and travellers who pass through and stay in the area around the time of the Appleby Horse Fair. There was also some discussion of ways to improve the management of issues by the various agencies involved.

The main concerns reported by the Parish Councils were

- Problems on the highway parking, camping in lay-bys, lack of signage and the number of slow moving vehicles
- Animal welfare concerns
- Health/Environment concerns toilets, litter, dumping of rubbish
- anagement arrangements for this ars event and to hear concerns timing and enforcement

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The police reported on the number of incidents they logged and the actions taken. Communication between agencies and the public and the reporting of incidents was seen as key to ensuring that a 'joined up' approach was achieved and that public concerns were addressed.

The meeting heard about the specific arrangements that had been introduced in and around Appleby and the multi-agency approach being used there. The group agreed that it would like to meet again to continue discussions and develop improvements. It was suggested that a directory of contacts and contact procedures was needed along with a summary of 'dos and don'ts' for Parish Councils to share with residents. Other areas have developed some effective ways of dealing directly with local issues and it was agreed that it would be useful to hear from them about what they did and how they did it!

The group will meet again in September to share ideas and good practice and to develop ways of working together and communicating with residents.

DENT PARISH COUNCIL

The August meeting was held in the Methodist School Room as the Sedgwick Room was not available owing to the building work currently taking place. As the Clerk's post had not been filled, Margaret Harrison took the minutes.

As usual, the full minutes are published on the Dentdale website www.dentdale. com.

Marguee

It was agreed that the Parish Council would buy the marquee that had been ordered by the Dentdale Show Committee for this year's show, subject to funds being transferred from the Show committee. It was felt it would be a useful community asset, which could be offered for hire to anyone in the community, either in conjunction with the playing field or separately from it. The Playing Field Committee would be responsible for bookings, and also for storing, erecting and dismantling it. YDNPA Housing Plan

The National Park Authority is reviewing the places in Dentdale where it will allow affordable or local needs housing to be built in future. At present, the only places where this is permitted

are in Dent village and in Gawthrop. The Parish Council has discussed this issue on several occasions, and has concluded that the best option would be to follow the ancient pattern of settlements in the dale, where dwellings have been built at regular intervals along the spring lines.

Consequently, it has asked YDNPA that Cowgill, Stonehouse, Backstonegill, Gibbs Hall, Slack and Helmside be added to the list of places where such housing could be built. This does not mean that small estates would be built in these places, but that if a suitable site was available, one or two new houses or conversions should be allowed. Parish Plan

The Council heard that the Parish Plan Steering Group had been holding a series



of meetings to discuss the best ways of implementing some of the ideas brought up in the survey. So far, meetings have been held with Tim Farron MP, County Councillor Joe Nicholson and the three District Councillors, and further meetings are planned with other local Parish Councils and with the Chief Executive of the National Park Because the Parish Council has limited powers, it is important to work with these other bodies : Next Meeting to deal with issues that they are responsible for, and discussing them with them at this stage will help to produce a more realistic action plan.

In order to help the Parish Council to implement the Parish Plan when it is produced, the Council agreed to make the Steering Group a Parish Council



JULY WEATHER

Another wet month with a total of 6.11 inches falling in total but we had 3 spells without any measurable rainfall one of which was 6 days which saw a frenzy of activity cutting silage any even hay. The wettest 24 hours saw 1.3 inches fall. It was also quite breezy with only one day not getting into double figures for wind speed with a maximum of 17.7 mph. The winds were back to "normal" with only 2 days when the maximum did not blow from the northwest quarter. July was quite a warm month with 4 days actually reaching the low 80sF. The maximum temperature recorded was 84.7F. Only 4 nights dropped into the 40sF with a low of 41.5F.

Having used up my 600 gallons of stored water during dry spells it did not take long to fill up the tanks again. Foot problems seem to be fairly common due this year presumably to

the wet judging by the number of sheep that are limping. I have also seen more sheep casting their wool without apparently having scab. There has been only one hatching of swallows so far around us with 4 young being raised. The blackbirds raised a third clutch indoors away from the magpies. The jackdaws have got so cheeky they are raiding the nut feeder outside the kitchen window! The buddleias are starting to colour up so let's hope we shall see some butterflies as at present they are notable by their absence. The warm damp weather has been ideal for the midges making it nearly impossible to venture out after tea without some form of protection.

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CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

Murthwaite Park Wood.

Murthwaite Park Wood is clearly visible from the A 683 across the river face, to reach the footpath to the just before Rawthey Bridge. It is known for being semi-natural and was the location chosen for a visit by the local Cumbria Wildlife Trust support group on June 7th this year. This was the Appleby Fair weekend so we were surprised, and a little anxious that our intended car park might be full, when we found the roadside verges still packed with travellers both before and after Strait Bridge. However we were the only occupants of the large park, on the left just before Rawthey Bridge. After the obligatory health and safety

warning 12 of us set off across the bridge, noting the Roman sculpture of a head embedded in its downstream wood.

This footpath involves negotiating several stiles of different character. some of them becoming a little dodgy by now, following close to the river. There are some very fine trees along this stretch, not only native oak, rowan, holly and birch, but also a number of well grown larches, not native here but very picturesque and associated with edible boletus fungi later in the year. One of the oaks was noted to have a rowan and a holly growing in humus-filled hollows about 15 feet up it. Before we entered the

wood proper we crossed a pasture where a drier sunny slope held Bird's Foot Trefoil and a number of orchids. Most of these were Heath Spotted Orchids, showing that the soil was probably not alkaline, and yet just

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beside them was a Butterfly orchid, usually found in lime-rich soils. We were unable to decide whether this was a Greater, or the somewhat less common, Lesser Butterfly Orchid because it was still in tight bud.

Once in the wood it became apparent that although there were plenty of full grown trees it had largely been regularly coppiced in days gone by, with the hazels in particular having a number of stems arising from the ancient stools. From the diameter of these stems it would appear that the last coppicing might have been the best part of a century ago. It seems likely from the

proximity of lime kilns that the coppiced wood could have been burnt in them to help make quicklime. This in turn would have been slaked with water to make the lime used in mortar and for spreading on the fields. Lime kilns were in use from mediaeval times right through until the 20th century. Although the stems of these Hazels were only four to six inches in diameter it is quite possible that the stools and root systems are centuries old and could have been feeding lime kilns all that time. Under this canopy most of the spring flowers the purple flower instead of two. were over, but Primroses, Wood Sorrel and Bluebells were plentiful and still clearly identifiable. Honeysuckle climbed up many of the Primrose, quite a local speciality

Hazels, and where there was sufficient light it was in flower. We climbed up the deeply rutted track through the wood, where cattle had plodged and helped the winter rains to erode it, before turning off to the left into a damp clearing. Here, and in other places, we found Lousewort, which is semi-parasitic, latching onto the roots of other plants and stealing some of their nutrients. We used a hand lens to make sure it was not the very similar Marsh Lousewort which has four little teeth on the upper lip of Interestingly the Lousewort prefers damp acid soils, and yet very close to it was growing a colony of Bird's Eye

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which prefers a limy soil, so here was a second place which seemed to indicate a source of lime infiltrating an essentially acid soil. Two other species of plant were found which don't make all their own food:

Butterwort and Sundew, both with sticky leaves which catch insects so that they can be digested.

heard, but we were sorry not to hear or see Pied Flycatchers which are believed to be here. We did see several of the nest boxes which have been put up by members of the Wildlife Trust specifically for these immigrant Flycatchers, and many of these have been used by them this year in various locations around

The day was completely still and humid, (so there was an abundance of insects, nearly all midges!) but we heard relatively little bird song, probably because it was the wrong time of day and also because most of the birds had already established territories and built nests. Willow Warblers, Blackcaps, Chaffinches, Robins, Blue Tits and Wrens were



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or see Pied Flycatchers which are several of the nest boxes which have been put up by members of the Wildlife Trust specifically for these immigrant Flycatchers, and many of these have been used by them this year in various locations around Sedbergh and Dent. As we came down through the wood on a different route, we had to be careful because there isn't anything much more slippery than the juice of a squashed Bluebell plant, and these were abundant. We discovered that if we gave a sharp tap to a Birch branch, quite often a caterpillar was dislodged, which then hovered mysteriously in mid-air some distance below the branch on which it had been feeding. Careful inspection showed these belonged to one of the Thorn moths, probably the Canary-Shouldered Thorn, so called because of its bright yellow furry body. These caterpillars constantly keep a strand of silk anchored to their foodplant. and if they are alarmed or dislodged they can hurl themselves off to avoid being eaten by a predatory bird. Subsequently, as we saw, they can haul themselves hand over hand up their silken rope back to the right food plant. If they didn't do this they might trudge an awful lot of caterpillar miles up a tree, only to discover that they had picked the wrong sort.

As we drove home it came on to rain; very satisfying to have timed our outing so well.

DOUBLE GOLD WINNER

Following on from last years success, SarahM has done it again. This local producer has achieved two gold awards this year at The Great Taste Awards which is organised by the Guild of Fine Food and often referred to as the 'Oscars of the food industry'. SarahM has been awarded a two star gold for Red Gooseberry Jam and a one star gold for Beetroot Chutney. The award winning Courgette Chutney from last year has featured in the top ten chutneys in the Independent Newspaper in August.

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SEPTEMBER GARDENING

There are daisies for every season. The Autumn ones are the Asters (Michaelmas Daisies), and some of the late flowering *Helianthus* (Perennial Sunflowers).

Asters come in a variety of shades of blue, mauve, pink and white and in different heights and degrees of stiffness. The 'Novae-angliae' and Novae-Belgii groups which are the stiff, old fashioned cottage garden types have been around in British gardens since 1710. In a normal or dry summer they tend to succumb to

mildew which stunts their growth and reduces flowering, but they do make a fine show of colour at the back of a border. My favourite Aster is the long flowering hybrid A. x frikartii 'Monch'. This, along with the two other hybrids 'Eiger' and 'Jungfrau', was raised in Switzerland around 1920. 'Eiger' and 'Jungfrau' were obviously sadly lacking in their staying power, but the good old 'Monch' goes on from strength to strength. Having said that, he is inclined to flop about a bit, or lie down on top of other things, but being very free flowering, and not too heavily built, he's well worth including in any border.

If space allows then three or four other cultivars are worth including.

A ericoides has wiry stems bearing numerous small flowers of pink, blue or lemony cream. Similarly small flowered, but with bronze foliage, A. lateriflorus 'Prince' is a pale pink, choice variety. For a lower growing (2ft) variety, choose one of the A. amellus cultivars. A. 'Violet Queen' is a good deep indigo violet, and 'Pink Zenith' has clear pink daisies.

Other autumn daisies tend to have yellow or orange flowers. *Helianthus* 'Capenoch Star' has lemon yellow and *H. occidentalis* orange yellow blooms. Both of these plants are stiff and self supporting and will grow to 4-5ft in height so need to be at the back of a border. All are good for cutting, and their cheerful bright flowers make a welcome splash of colour in the garden as other flowers finish and fade.

DRIVING TIPS

A light right foot will do more to reduce CO2 than retrospective road tax, says the IAM

Proposed Vehicle Excise Duty (VED) changes intended to reduce CO₂ emissions from cars will have little impact unless driving behaviour changes as well, according to research from the IAM.

Although many manufacturers have highly efficient "eco" versions of their cars available, many drivers will unwittingly lose the benefit of the technology through poor driving habits.

The following examples of common errors by drivers increase fuel consumption significantly:

- a) Under inflated tyres tyres that are 20 per cent underinflated use three per cent more fuel
- b) Roof storage wind resistance causes use of up to 20 per cent more fuel at 70mph
- c) Air conditioning uses up to 10 per cent more fuel
- d) Aggressive driving uses 15 per cent more fuel
- e) Speeding travelling at 80mph uses up to 15 per cent more fuel than 70mph
- f) Short journeys the first two miles use up to 100 per cent more fuel

Taken together, all these items can increase fuel consumption, and CO_2 emissions, by up to 45 per cent. This level of increase would mean that even the most economical and ecofriendly car, such as Ford's new Focus ECOnetic, may emit as much CO_2 as a seven-seater people carrier like the Ford Galaxy, in spite of the Focus' class leading Band B VED

(road tax) rating.

The extra fuel cost for the Focus would also wipe out the savings in road tax. If the Focus is driven efficiently for approximately 10,000 miles a year, the fuel bill will be around £865. Poor driving habits would increase this by more than £330 per year, far outweighing the proposed reduction of £90 in VED.

IAM Head of Technical Policy and Advice, Tim Shallcross, said: "If the government is serious about getting motorists to reduce CO₂ emissions, the IAM says more investment in driver education and information is needed, rather than extra taxes that motorists suspect are more about revenue-raising than improving the environment."

The £300 raised by the Rose Theatre Group will be spent on outings for the girls during the summer holidays and the £355 from the Bring and Buy will purchase a large washing machine.

The girls have a house mother, but they have to give her a lot of help. At present the girls spend an hour or more a day doing laundry, so it will make a big difference to their lives. They will still help with the daily chores as all African children do, and learn to help around the home.

Sponsors provide for the girls' education and British Airways now assists with support for visitors and delivery of goods. Little by little life is improving for these delightful, happy children who had such a poor start in life. Christine Wood

COUNCILLORS CORNER

Since my last article I have been elected chairman of Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority. Unlike the chairman of a district or county this is not a ceremonial post: it is more akin to the role of leader. I am the first councillor from the Cumbrian part of the Park to hold this position. It is an honour and I could never have achieved it without the support of so many people over so many years both here and now in Kirkby Lonsdale. As a member I have supported the authority when it is in the right but equally I have never been afraid of offering criticism when I thought that necessary: you need look no further than my article in the

last Lookaround to confirm this. I will do the same as chairman. I hope my success will do some good for the area and I will of course use the office to promote the three western dales to the government ministers and officials who visit on a regular basis.

Much to my surprise, the day before my election as chairman, the government Junior Minister Jonathan Shaw began consultation on Direct Elections to National Park Authorities. I do not know what the current members of YDNP will think but personally I am delighted with the proposal. The consultation document is almost identical to my own submission to a previous enquiry and various letters which I have had in the

local members should all be directly elected on multi-member wards following the internal district boundaries. There is only one serious issue which the consultation misses out and that is the method of appointment of national members. I have no objection to the present system with one amendment. It should be an open appointment from an OPEN list of nominees. At present believe that David Maclean thinks the even members never find out who the same. candidates were. This is outrageous, how can we have confidence that the best candidates were selected?

A couple of weeks ago, as your representative, I gate-crashed a meeting with the Eden police, the new Chief Executive of Eden and residents of Fell End at the Fat Lamb. The subject of course was the Gypsies and the encampment on Cote Moor. The more meetings I attend on this subject the more I realise that there can be no solution which does not deal with the problem from below the A65 all the way up the Lune. Rawthey and Eden valleys to the A66 and Appleby itself. There

three authorities are trying their best there are too few of them to contain the vast numbers who descend upon us let alone manage them. I am coming to the view that a private act of parliament will be needed to encompass all aspects of the New Fair and that there can be no solution until that happens. I am led to

Cumbria County Council have appointed twenty four highway stewards. This is very much a member led initiative and I hope the county will be able to build upon it in the future. There is one steward for the two county divisions of Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale and Burton and Holme. That means an awful lot of road for one man, Rob Windsor. Sedbergh will see him four weeks per vear, Dent and Garsdale, two weeks each. In this instance Sedbergh is the whole parish and includes Cautley, Howgill and Frostrow. The three parishes have each appointed

local representatives to liase with Mr Windsor, Roger Sedgwick for Sedbergh, Geoff Woof for Dent and Neil Haworth for Garsdale. Don't expect miracles: road repairs are chronically under-funded by national government. Curiously they calculate the spending assessment not from the length of highways but from the number of residents. Thus Cumbria receives rather less than Berkshire.

There are some very positive noises about the future of the Tennis Courts off Guldrey Lane. Everyone seems to there are a significant number of be looking in the same direction whether that is a longer lease or perhaps a sale by South Lakeland to Sedbergh Parish. There was a brief report from the Property Advisory

Group to the SLDC cabinet last week. This was the last cabinet which I will sit in on as shadow Finance Portfolioholder as I have resigned following my election as Chairman of the Park. My likely successor is neither a farmer nor a Yorkshireman but I am sure he will be just as careful in his dealings with public finances.

There is nothing to report concerning the Auction Mart site, certainly no papers have gone to members yet. However, as always planning issues arising. Alterations to the playground at Dent Primary School is the application of most obvious public interest and very necessary if the school is to meet its

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obligations to national government. There are of course many other issues which are equally important to individuals and smaller groups of people. One thing which has astonished me now I am councillor for Barbon, Casterton, Kirkby Lonsdale and Mansergh is how few of their planning applications ever lead to the involvement of members. Up here I expect to be involved in at least one per week.

Today I was at the Recycling Skips on Joss Lane – what a mess! There was wet cardboard everywhere and both the paper and can banks were full. I rang SLDC right away and they will be emptied. Normally we report them when they are about 80-90%

full from the Community Office. This should happen automatically but doesn't always. If they are nearly full can you please give me, or lan or Peter a ring or else drop in to the Community Office and tell them. It will save us all a lot of work in the long run if you do. Thanks.

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HOWGILLS HARMONY in SLOVENIA

Once again our singers were treated to extraordinary hospitality in Slovenia when our small band visited Zrece for a week of singing - with most of them saying they were so moved by the friendship they experienced that they would go back to Zrece again and again.

We stayed, as we often do, with our old friend Joze Kovse at Medved high in the hills in the little village of Skomarje, and had a trememdnous time singing with a large chor made up of many smaller Slovene choirs from Trieste. The workshop was in the Therme in Ptuj, where the streets were almost deserted - almost the entire town appeared to be at the public swimming pool sheltering from the soaring summer termperatures (35 degrees.)

But our best day was with our friends the Pevke iz Brinjeve Gore and the Firemen's choir. The Pevke are a family of women singers who many people in Sedbergh will remember from when they visited last year and sang a concert with a male voice choir from Northumberland. We sang on the hilltop in the two spent the afternoon singing with everyone who had gathered for a picnic. As one picnic finished another stated as we were shown round the firestation and as the moon rose over the distant mountains, sat outside for an evening of singing with the Zrece Firemen's choir. These strong voices are a male voice choir singing

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Slovene folk songs and into the night our two groups took it in turns to sing first Slovene and then British folk songs - with more and more lively choruses as the Boronicevec and wine flowed freely.

We are so pleased that the Firemen's Choir will be visiting Sedbergh later in the autumn with their Mayor, Boris Podvrsnik so that everyone else in Sedbergh will get the chance to hear this wonderful singing.

We also had a very interesting time with the Veterans Society meeting the former soldiers who had helped Slovenia gain its independence, and watched a film made by our old friend Dravko. "Look, that's my shadow." he said at one point, as he had been churches overlooking Zrece, and then both a soldier defending the new born nation and the cameraman recording their heroism. I had heard many of the stories before, like how they stopped the Jugoslavian army from attaching Slovenia after it declared independence by blocking their barracks with rocks and timber - but it made more sense when we saw it on the film and were able to understand

how the Sloevenians won their independence with very little bloodshed by fighting with their brains.

We were also treated to great deal of hospitality by the new mayor Boris Podvrsnik who met us in the council chambers, at the old poet's house in Skomarje, and at the cafe at Rogla. We were delighted when we heard that he'll be joining the firemen on their visit to Sedbergh.

We also visited a couple of cities - Celje where we sang in the very centre of the town at lunchtime, and Ljubljana the capitol, where we sang under France Preseren's statue (the national poet) in the city square where he gazes over longingly towards his muse Julia - who as in life, scorns him by looking the other way.

While we were there the local newspaper ran a story about how the town twinning between Zrece and Sedbergh has been so successful that other towns are now using us as a blueprint for how to make a successful partnership. The article also mentioned our language classes



and our Potica competition. A cartoon combined the two together with a Zrece baker asking a Sedbergh baker who is just pulling his cake out of the oven, "Was it successful?" and the

Sedbergh baker replies: "Well, I know how to say Potica, I just don't know how to make it!"



As we reported last month, the Sedbergh Slovene language students all had a go at making the Slovene festive cake and it was tested by Bojan Skoda and his family from the Embassy who visited Sedbergh at the end of July. Our attempt at Smithy Cottage was a little like something you might mine out of a mountain and it is a surprise that Bojan's teeth survived. Russel's cake was not quite so heavy, but was still pretty solid. But Liz Clarke's cake looked and tasted like some Slovene potica I have eaten before - Bojan's wife Irena's only reservation was that perhaps it needed to be baked in a smaller pan to make it more compact.

We are now all back in Sedbergh preparing for the visit of the Slovene male voice choir Oktet who are with singers from Zrece. We're all very excited and determined to try and give as much hospitality as we have received from our Slovene friends - but then, by the time you are reading this, you will have already heard and met them.

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Have you seen the lifesize photograph of those who worked at Farfield in 1909? Your relative might be on that photo, now displayed on Level 2 of the Mill?

Are you one of those who keeps saying, "I will go and see Farfield one day"?

SUNDAY 14 SEPTEMBER IS THE DAY FOR YOU

As part of the English Heritage Open days Farfield will be open to the public free of charge (with free transport to and from Joss Lane car park) and there will be, in the presence of Queen Victoria, as well as local dignitaries, (Parish and District Councillors) a public unveiling of a wall plague which will be a permanent tribute to all those who have ever worked at the mills in Sedbergh. We cannot mention everyone by name of course but for a donation towards the cost of the Board, you will be able to sign your name on the back of it.

What does the Board say? An extract:-

"Toil and sweat were used to hew out : Weavers' cafe. of the earth the rough stone that allows this building to stand tall above COSTUME (not essential but it would the rocky banks of the River Clough. It is a testament to the skills, the imagination and the creativity of the men and women, such as the Dovers and their workers at the Farfield Mills, who in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries engineered today's industrial society

.... It celebrates men like Will Stainton, who lost the skin off his back while cleaning out the wheel-pit and the lining of his lungs from inhaling dust, but who laboured in this Stainton, who lost the skin off his mill for 85 years

.... it celebrates the women who here and all over Yorkshire and Lancashire worked twelve hours a day, six and a half days a week, on ear shattering looms and fast moving spinning frames

.... and it celebrates the children, such as the piecers who spent their childhood, not at school, but wearing the skin off their fingers twisting together ends of the cardings.

Yet out of the toil, the tedium and the sorrow came a sense of comradeship and purpose and artefacts of value and of beauty. "

Come and see this tribute mounted permanently on the wall of the mill at 2.30 in the afternoon. Come also from 10.30 onwards to join in the workshops and demonstrations on weaving, spinning, beadwork, tatting, making textile collages and other skills. Take part in the Treasure Hunt, plant a bulb for spring and enjoy a Victorian afternoon tea in the

Come DRESSED IN VICTORIAN be fun). You can then have the photograph of you and your family taken against a Victorian background. Make this a day when you help your children realise that a history lesson in school about the Victorians is not just something in a book in a school curriculum, but it is here in Sedbergh.

SEDBERGH WAR MEMORIAL

As mentioned in the July issue the town's memorial is being renovated, thanks to generosity of the Parish Council and the efforts of Margaret Gorst. For some time the memorial has needed cleaning and the names of those who died in the Second World War have shown signs of deterioration, as have some of the First World War ones.

The first recorded public meeting about a memorial was held at the National School on 31st March 1919 at which several suggestions were made about what form it should take and where it should be located. For example, Major Upton offered a field in front of Guldrey Cottages as a

playground, laying down conditions including that it should be of such a character as to beautify the approach to the town and that it should incorporate a suitable memorial for the fallen.

At the meeting convened on 16th
June 1919 to make a final decision,
St Andrew's churchyard was chosen
as the site for a memorial and Mr
Worthington was to be consulted as
to the most suitable area in it. John
Hubert Worthington, an Old
Sedberghian, was the architect who
designed the school cloisters. He was
wounded in the Great War and one of
his brothers was killed. He later
became an architect with the
Commonwealth War Graves

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Commission. The visitors' book for the Vicarage records that he stayed there in 1919. The eventual cost of the war memorial was £304 5s 9d, of which £198 was raised by public subscription and just over £20 from church collections; there were also donations from various organisations such as the RDC, Winder Lodge, the Tradesmen's Association and the Tennis Club. One of the individual contributors was Lord Douro. Worthington's fee as architect was £23 and Greenbank & Son, workers in marble, were paid £161 11s 6d for the work itself. The service of dedication and unveiling ceremony took place on Sunday December 12th 1920. Brigadier General North, CB, MVO, unveiled the memorial. The wording on the cross itself is: Laus Deo and on the plinth below: REMEMBER THE MEN OF

SEDBERGH TOWN
WHO COUNTING
NOT THEIR LIVES
DEAR UNTO
THEMSELVES DIED
FOR FREEDOM AND
COUNTRY IN THE
GREAT WAR 19141919

So far, no record has been found about the adding of the names of those who gave their lives in the Second World War but Jack Dawson remembers that slabs were placed over the First World War names at the time the names of those who fell in the Second World War were added to the memorial. On these tablets the names of the First World War

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casualties were carved again. His memory, as ever, was proved right when the tablets were removed recently, revealing the original carvings on the sandstone faces of the memorial itself. There were 39 names on the original memorial and, for the Second World War, 19 were added.

One new name is to be added to those of the First World War, that of

Thomas Ellwood
Dakres whose
headstone in
Sedbergh Cemetery is
a 'Commonwealth War
Graves' one. He was
the son of Moses and
Margaret Dakres of 4
Guldrey Terrace.

The untiring and dedicated work of the late Jack Hill in recording and researching the names on the Sedbergh War Memorial was the spur to setting about its renovation in recognition of the sacrifice made by those 'Men of Honour'.

It is hoped to publish details of the service for Remembrance Day in a later edition.

MOVEMENT AS MEDICINE

The first few weeks after the end of the summer holidays often set a pattern for the rest of the year. We sign up for evening (or day) classes and make efforts to carry over that beneficial rest, relaxation and increased exercise of the summer into our working lives. If you are thinking along these lines, I would like to encourage you to sign up for a movement-for-health class in Sedbergh. For yoga contact Deyna Hirst (015396 21556), for Tai Chi on Tuesday evenings contact lan McPherson (15396 20648). Or you might like to try my Wild Goose Qigong class on Monday mornings.

The Journal of Chinese medicine publishes a summary of current health related research, which always enhance immune reaction to the flu includes several items on the benefit of exercise. Recent items include: exercise boosts good cholesterol, exercise reduces osteoporosis in men, exercise reduces risk of Parkinson's, exercise is beneficial for fibromyalgia. More specifically Tai Chi raises heart rate variability, Qigong reduces chronic neck pain, Tai Chi

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improves balance in the over sixties and even Tai Chi and Qigong vaccine.

Of course, other forms of movement, such as walking, running, cycling, playing football and swimming are also beneficial. Ideally one would combine some form of cardiovascular exercise with an "internal" form of exercise such as yoga, Tai Chi or Qigong. Here the focus is on balance, awareness and conscious movement designed to align the body and stimulate the good functioning of the internal organs. It is recognised that such forms of exercise both invigorate the body and help to reduce stress.

I have been using Wild Goose Qigong as my basic health maintenance routine for about six vears now. It consists of pleasing sequences of movements, including

and fluttering. No special ability is necessary – I started practising as a complete beginner and felt the benefits immediately. Some of the movements are quite idiosyncratic pulling the toes or "looking through the window". Others such as "wild goose takes flight" are flowing and graceful and some are designed to stimulate particular acupuncture points. Each movement is repeated between one and nine times. Two things surprised me when I first started: that with so few repetitions a feel-good sensation was noticeable straight away and the stiffness in my knees was improved very quickly. Even now, when I have many more

bending, stretching, stepping, tapping routines available, Wild Goose is the first thing I choose to do if I feel a bit off colour. It was very helpful when I was suffering from the effects of altitude in Nepal earlier in the year. Wild Goose classes will take place on Monday mornings (10.00 to 11.30) in the URC Hall in Sedbergh, starting on Monday 22nd September. Ten weekly classes (with a break for half term) will cost £50. In addition I shall be teaching a day of Wild Goose Qigong at the Dent Meditation Centre on Saturday 20th September. 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HEALTH ISSUES

Flu jab season

Swallows leaving, harvest suppers, darker nights and flu jabs. We now have our delivery dates for the this year's flu jabs and are planning something a little different in how folks get immunised. At this point it is worth pointing out that despite what you may have seen in the media, flu jabs remain recommended (by Health Protection Experts) for those over 65 and others with reduced immunity. All those eligible will be receiving a letter this month from the practice explaining the planned clinics.

This year the surgery will open on Saturday 27th September and Saturday 11th October between 0900 and 1200 for flu jabs only. No appointment is needed, just walk in and wait. To avoid backlog we are asking that people with surnames ending in A-G attend between 0900-1000 both dates, surnames ending H- years left on the lease no-one will

Q between 1000 and 1100 both dates and surnames R through Z from 1100 to 1200 both dates. If you cannot make either of these dates we will be running a bookable clinic on Tuesday 14th October. This we believe to be a more efficient method of giving flu jabs with less impact on the day to day work here and offering a better choice for our patients.

Otherwise the main health issue we face currently is our planned move to new premises. Understandably may people have opinions on the subject but there remains a significant amount of mis-information. Of course the preferred site to build on would be our current location but this is technically and financially impossible. The current building cannot be expanded to the degree required and comply with building regulations. Given that the site is leased from Sedbergh School and only has 40

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spend (nor would a bank lend) the £1.6 million required for the building. There is also the not inconsiderable issue of where the service would operate from whilst re-building took place. For these reasons we have to look elsewhere.

The closest land to the town centre available to build on is the Auction Mart site. Sorry but there it is. If anyone is willing to sell us a piece of land closer to the centre than our current site-then please can we start negotiations? In the absence of any other opportunity then we have to proceed with our current proposal. We are charged with looking after the Health needs of the locality, which means both now and in the future.

Whilst much effort is expended in keeping the current premises running as efficiently as possible-what you see is the ongoing flogging of an almost dead horse. We have pretty much maximised functionality of the building. The reason that no-one waits very long to be seen is that unless we move people through the system very quickly, everything would grind to a halt.

Can we please ask that if people have concerns or object to our proposed build, come and talk to one of us to get the facts so that opinion and discussion is informed?

For the first time this year, a raffle was held--(in aid of Sight Savers International)---one of the prizes being a painting by Ruth Gamsby, which was the original of the design on the front of the brochure. The raffle was very well supported.

Thanks must go to Anne Beer for her efficient organisation of the exhibition, and to all the many people who helped her make this year such a success.

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YDNP

Organisations responsible for helping to care for the Yorkshire Dales National Park are on course to hit targets set to improve the area.

The National Park Management Plan – called The Yorkshire Dales: Today and Tomorrow – is a 32-page document mapping out key objectives for the National Park between 2007 and 2012.

It was updated in 2006 by a group comprising statutory agencies like the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA), English Heritage and Natural England, and the three local strategic partnerships for the South Lakeland, Richmondshire and Craven districts to try to ensure that it covers the key local and national issues that affect the area.

Those organisations – and others – have now formed a Steering Group which is monitoring progress in implementing the Management Plan.

The group's first report – presented • to today's (29/7/08) YDNPA meeting – shows that good progress is being made in meeting most of the plan's 70 objectives.

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Successes include:

- 70 per cent of the Park now being covered by agri-environment agreements, with more than 40,000 ha in the new **Environmental Stewardship** scheme
- the National Park Authority's Sustainable Development Fund funding 19 projects, worth over £950,000, which are bringing economic, social and environmental benefits
- 89 per cent of highly-sensitive 'green lanes' now having management plans in place
- 90 per cent of the Pennine Bridleway route through the Dales now completed
- the area of Sites of Special Scientific Interest land in 'favourable or recovering' condition has increased by 2,000 ha, and now stands at 80 per cent
- 166 hectares of native broadleaf woodland have been planted over the last two years;
- the number of Listed Buildings 'at risk' fell for the third year running – down to 72 (four per

cent of the total).

Carl Lis, chairman of the Steering Group and of the YDNPA, said: "The document is a management plan for the National Park and not just for the National Park Authority.

"Getting organisations to work together to achieve shared objectives understood." is vital to the future of this special place.

"We have made real progress in a significant number of the objectives but there is still more work to do before we can say we have met all the targets.

The National Park Management Plan is explained in full in a new section of the YDNPA website found at //www.yorkshiredales.org.uk/index/ looking_after/

yorkshire_dales_national_park_mana gement_plan.htm.

Visitors to the website can look at any of the objectives in the Plan and see the latest information on how much progress has been made.

Mr Lis said: "We think it is really important that anyone can find out easily what our organisations are doing to look after this beautiful part



of Yorkshire and how far we have progressed towards the targets we have all signed up to.

"The website information on the Management Plan has been designed to be straightforward so that it can be regularly updated and easily understood."

So, I set the remote back down on the table, get some towels and wipe up the spill.


