
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DENT PARISH COUNCIL

The March meeting heard a presentation on the plans for the Music and Beer Festival, to be held from 26th to 28th June this year, and allocated the remaining grants for 2008-09. The full minutes of the meeting are published as usual on the Dentdale website www.dentdale.

Grants for Rural Development Grants to stimulate rural development in this part of Cumbria, totalling £8 million over the next four years, have recently been announced in the press. The grants are for farms, forestry, rural businesses and community groups and there are two levels - above and below £20,000.

The local Development Officer, Dave Smith, has met members of the Parish Plan Committee and said he would be keen to support projects in Dentdale that apply for this funding. VAT on car park charges A ruling in the European Court seems likely to mean that local councils will be required to pay VAT on car park charges. For Dent, this will cost about £3,500 per year and will seriously reduce the Parish Council's income and the funding available for distributing in grants to



local bodies. We are currently investigating whether there is any way in which this charge can legally be avoided.

Links with the Police

It has now been agreed that Karen Dakin, the Police Community Support Officer, will attend parish council meetings every three months, starting on the 6th April. If you have any issue you would like to raise with the police you will be able to do so at these sessions.

Following Karen's attendance at the last meeting, a speed indicator was placed in Dent, but not in the area where speeding is most dangerous. The police have agreed to look at resiting the equipment on a future occasion.

Campervans and Motorhomes

The Car Park Committee has looked again at the decision to ban campervans and motorhomes from using the car park overnight, and concluded that the policy which had been adopted was transparent, fair and easy to understand and to operate. It recommended that no change should be made to this policy and this was agreed by the parish council.

Car Park Permits for B&Bs and Holiday Cottages

The meeting also agreed that bed and breakfast businesses, and holiday cottage and second home owners, should be allowed multiple permits for their visitors in return for the payment of one annual fee. To obtain a permit, please contact John

Grants awarded

The council awarded two grants at the March meeting: £250 towards the funding of the Music and Beer Festival, and £264 to the new table tennis club to help in the purchase of equipment. These grants bring the total awarded this year to £4,564, and means that we are not allowed to award any more until the new financial year starts in April. For that

Street Lights

As residents will be aware, we have not yet managed to repair the defective street lights in Dent. This is partly because many of the lights and their controls are now obsolete, and the first contractor we employed took a long time before admitting that he was not able to do the job. We have now asked a second contractor to carry out the work, and so we hope that progress will be made shortly. Music and Beer Festival

Matthew Clayton came to the March meeting to give an update on the organisation of the Music and Beer Festival. He informed the council that there have been many expressions of interest from artists wishing to perform in and around Dent and to soak up the atmosphere. The music at the festival will be free and performed at a number of venues around the village, including the grass

area below the car park where beer and food will be sold. Up to date information can be found on the dentmusicandbeer.com. Local Authority changes

> After the proposal to form a single unitary local authority in Cumbria was rejected by the government last year, all local councils in Cumbria have been required to work more closely together. In the part of the County that includes Dent, a scheme is currently being developed to get all parish councils to form a local group with the district and the county councils, in order to control some services. The parish council thought that this could be an improvement on the present arrangements, provided that sufficient funding and support is available, and so Dent PC has set up a meeting of the ten councils and parish meetings in this area to discuss what we will need to work together effectively.

Housing Needs Survey

As reported last month, there will be a new survey carried out in the Dale in April to obtain an up-to-date picture





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of local housing need. If you receive a form, please take the time to complete and return it – we need an accurate picture of the current demand for housing before a housing association will build houses here. Land for Affordable Housing

Looking further ahead, there has been some progress on identifying possible housing sites. Partly as a result of the parish council's encouragement, the recent call from the National Park for landowners to nominate sites for future housing development resulted in at least six being put forward in and around Dent and Gawthrop. It will be some time before we know whether any have

been accepted by the Park, but if any are they will be available for development for the next fifteen years, and thus enable affordable and local needs homes to be built in the Dale in the future.



I mentioned in my last article that as a result of the economic downturn SLDC was having to make some small cut-backs in its services so as to remain within budget for the coming financial year notwithstanding having kept the Council Tax increase down to 2.9%. the lowest increase in the thirty six year history of the Authority. One proposal made was the withdrawal of the annual grant of £5000 to the Sedbergh Book Town with a consequent risk to the ongoing provision of tourist services through the TIC. I had no hesitation in writing to the SLDC Cabinet saying that I was astonished to hear of this proposal and pointing out that Sedbergh, as a leader in the field of this kind of partnership working, provided exceptional value for money for a relatively small outlay. My District Councillor colleagues made

As well as an extremely well-informed introduction to the digital switch-over (now imminent), the Chief Executive of Eden District Council, Kevin Douglas, was also there to provide an Committee on the 26th March. At the moment supporters both for and against are engaged in

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an active lobbying process. The appeal against the Old Hutton decision, by the way, is beginning on the 28th April at Kendal Town Hall and is open to members of the public. Peter and I will also be present and we are hoping that Tim Farron will be able to pop in as well. Do come along to meet us all for a chat and to air any matters of local concern which you may have. Next year will see a radical redesign of the curriculum at Settlebeck. Our aim is to offer a personalised

curriculum tailored to the individual student. GCSEs will now start in Year 9 instead of Year 10. This opens up a whole range of opportunities. Most students will complete their GCSE courses in Year 10, our most able students can then opt to take A/S modules in preparation for sixth form, some students may choose to take 1 year GCSE courses, other students may wish to take GCSEs over 3 years instead of 2 to ensure they get the best grades possible.

years ago where we filled a gap in the history of church music.

Many authorities on church music claim that between 1700 and 1850 nothing of any note was written at all the very period of music which our choir sings. This was the era celebrated by Thomas Hardy in Under the Greenwood Tree. Music which was mostly written by gifted amateurs and sung by enthusiastic country singers, most notable for its country singers, most notable for its strident rhythms, baroque counterpoint and fugueing choruses where one part comes in after another. 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

Our campaign to get a new cancer unit at Westmorland General Hospital idea into a reality but it is still is moving ahead in a very positive fashion. We have received nearly 6000 signatures (either on paper or electronically) and I had a very encouraging meeting with the Chief Executive of NHS Cumbria who would be responsible for commissioning and importantly paying for the new unit. They are planning to start drawing up the specifications for the new unit in the next few weeks in consultation with clinical experts and a few other key individuals. I think they are planning to invite my views on the plans so if you want me to feed in any thoughts

then please get in touch. This is a significant step towards turning the important to get as much support for the plans as possible, particularly in this current economic climate when Government money can disappear very suddenly. If you have not yet signed the petition but do feel it is important that cancer sufferers in our area do not have the additional pain of long journeys to Preston or Carlisle please do give us your support. I have been putting a lot of pressure on the Government to help young people in this area by introducing a

national concessionary bus scheme for people aged between 17 and 25. They have introduced a very successful scheme for pensioners so it seems to be only right that they introduce a similar scheme for people Government's enquiry into the needs at the other end of the age scale. So far I have been met by the Government's usual urban short sightedness; their objection is that many young people either walk or cycle and offering concessions on bus fares may make them stop taking this healthy option. If anyone in this age group is currently walking between Sedbergh and Kendal and feels that this is the preferable option to taking the bus I would be delighted to hear from them otherwise I will do



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what I can to help the Government realise that the world outside the cities where they operate is rather different.

I am extremely pleased that the of hill farmers is kicking off. The key thing that needs to be realised is that hill farmers are simply not paid enough for all the work that they put in to their farms. Not simply in producing food but in maintaining the landscape, looking after wildlife and generally keeping our area as beautiful as it is. This is a very skilled area of farming and one that should be rewarded much much better than it is currently. I am sure that the enquiry will hear this message many times but that does not meant I shall not take every opportunity to communicate it to Dr Burgess and his team as they take on board the evidence for their enquiry.

Finally, I was really pleased that South Lakeland District Council is continuing to recognise the benefits of Sedbergh's Book Town event and investing in it yet again this year. As you probably know the Council is facing considerable financial hardships at the moment and so it is great that they are continuing to understand what their priorities in funding should be. I wish all councils could be as sensible.

Motifs, Monuments and Mountains. 'Passage Grave Style' is more Prehistoric rock art in Cumbria. By Dr. angular, often comprising chevrons Kate Sharpe. and patterns like those on prehistor

Rock Art is any mark or pattern carved, or painted on the surface of rock, whether representational or abstract. Most British rock art is abstract.- patterns of rings, spirals etc., carved on outcrops, boulders, and cliffs, or on standing stones and chambered tombs. It is difficult to date but most is thought to be Neolithic or bronze age.

There are two styles of abstract rock art: 'Cup and Ring or Atlantic Style', comprises circular motifs and fluid designs of cups, rings, or spirals,

found mainly from Derbyshire northwards and in Ireland & Scotland. 'Passage Grave Style' is more angular, often comprising chevrons and patterns like those on prehistoric pottery. This style is prevalent in Wales, Orkney, & Ireland.

In Northumberland and Durham and the east of Cumbria, rock art is usually found on glacially smoothed outcrops of sandstone on elevated moors, below the summit. But in the rest of Cumbria it is found in valleys. In the Eden valley, there are carved monuments, mostly of sandstone. It is not known whether Long Meg was carved before or after the stone was erected - it could have come from the Eden river cliffs, perhaps already

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carved.

In the central lakes, the rock art tends to be on outcrops or large boulders of volcanic rocks & skiddaw slates, near water, especially lake shores. The sites can be plotted to suggest a connection with nodal points on natural and ancient routeways, possibly the routes to the Langdale Axe factories.

Dr Sharpe considered whether particular rocks were chosen for their shape or surface features or for their location in the landscape? Could the strata and weathering on the surface have been seen to represent a landscape, perhaps visible from the boulder? Sometimes natural fissures seem to be incorporated into the design, with cup marks round them. Did the natural features inspire the design? Or did the patterns represent mountain shapes?

She also considered the choice of location. As all Cumbrian sites are low lying, they do not command extensive views, and it is difficult to relate them to mountains as there are mountains in every direction. But the site at Copt Howe is different - it is

higher, with carvings on vertical panels of two natural boulders forming an entrance, pointing towards the Langdale Pikes. Mountains were sacred in early cultures. The axemakers did not use the most accessible stone but took it from dangerous parts of the Pikes. At Copt Howe, the boulders' astronomical alignment is such that, at the midsummer solstice, the sun sets behind the Pikes and appears, from this point only, to roll down the mountain. A similar phenomenon is seen at a rock art site in County Mavo.

Dr Sharpe described the work of the Northumberland and Durham Rock Art Pilot Project and the use of photometry for recording. Project volunteers have found many new examples of rock art recently. About 2500 panels have now been recorded in England.

Annual Spring Concert

Wednesday 18th March saw a large audience in the People's Hall for the Band's Spring Concert. Although the structure of the evening was familiar a number of changes in detail were apparent and warmly welcomed.

The growing size of the Band means via the Youth Band and Michael that when all players are available the Roberts, baritone horn, has emerged People's Hall stage is too small to accommodate comfortably all the players. Only two options for a solution existed - drop a few players or site the Band on the floor and use the stage for audience. There was no question that the second option was the only acceptable one. In fact the placing of the Band in the auditorium was a return to the very first Band Concert in 1998, though the reasoning behind that was an anticipation of a small audience and thus an attempt to minimise the distance between players and audience. As it transpired the size of the audience in 1998 exceeded wildest anticipations and set the standard of support that has been enjoyed by the Band in every

Before the musical commencement of the Concert compère. Carl Storer. introduced the Band drawing particular attention to two players appearing in a concert for the first time. Young cornet player Patrick Bannister had made rapid progress from the Monday evening adult classes.

Seven of the numbers in the programme were new to the Band's repertoire, though it could be regarded as eight if Alan Lewis's completely original arrangement of 'Any Dream Will Do' is counted. This popular Andrew Lloyd Webber piece provided Stuart Shields with a second opportunity in the evening to demonstrate his fine singing voice which complements his all round excellence on a number of brass instruments.

A particularly welcome innovation was the interval slot given to the Saturday young learners class, the Sedbergh Youth Band. Although they made an appearance in the

Christmas Concert last December this was the first time they have featured in a conventional concert. Those volunteer members of the Band who have instructed them over the recent weeks are to be congratulated for raising their standard of playing so significantly which was more than apparent in their presentation of 'Blue Shift' and the ever popular and familiar 'When the Saints Go Marching In'. They exhibited an impressive musicality and confidence and we look forward to their contributions on a regular basis in the future.

As usual the programme got off to a rousing start with Alan Lewis's 'Tarka 1,2,3,', a march that has become virtually the Band's signature tune. There then followed a sequence of five numbers new to the Band: 'Summer Light', 'Do You Know', 'Unchained Melody' (a song that dominated the charts in the fifties for

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weeks and sung here by Stuart Shields), 'Tuxedo Junction' (bringing back nostalgic memories of the Glenn Miller big band sound) and 'She's the One'. The first half concluded on a high note with a most accomplished performance of the demanding and evocative 'Born Free' of cinema fame.

Following the interval during which refreshments were available, the raffle was drawn and the young band entertained. The programme resumed with the march 'Time and Tide' succeeded by more new numbers: Karl Jenkins's 'Benedictus', Bobby Darin's 'Things' and Stuart's second vocal slot 'Any Dream Will Do'. 'Malaguena', 'Pavane in Blue' and the enormously popular and musically taxing 'Pirates of the Caribbean' completed the published programme with the audience unquenched thirst for music being partially satisfied with a fine encore rendition of Duke Ellington's 'Mood Indigo'.

The Band clearly enjoyed playing and look forward to providing the background music at this year's Spring Show.

I agree totally with his concerns with regard to the elderly and vulnerable being left without TV reception. Like many others, I do not understand the mentality of the switchover. The Granada region has had digital transmissions for years and thus have had time to change from analogue to digital. However, we are expected to convert within a month!



My advice to your readers is not to panic. It is not necessary to change your TV or indeed TV aerial. If you have

good analogue reception now, i.e. it is clear with no snowy or grainy pictures, you will not need a new aerial. Buying a Freeview + Digital box will convert both your video and TV at the same time. (A Freeview + recorder allows you to record one channel whilst watching another).

If you think you do need your TV aerial or equipment upgrading try to get someone that has been recommended by friends or

neighbours. Ask for a free estimate and judge the contractor by his manner and professionalism - not by fancy adverts.

I hope this helps. Regards.

Officer Cat Glendinning said, "North

The primary aim of the project is to increase numbers and expand the range of tree sparrows and other declining arable farmland birds. This will be achieved through providing advice to landowners to ensure that those participating in agrienvironment schemes are delivering the year-round conditions needed by these birds. Year-round requirements can be summarised into three main requirements: summer insect food for

chicks, winter seed food plus suitable nesting sites.

Part of the project will involve erecting 250 nest boxes at suitable sites to supplement the holes in old trees and farm buildings usually used by the birds. Volunteers will monitor these nest boxes for activity and help build a picture of the project's success over the forthcoming year.

John Bowman of Natural England said, "The project will help build on important work done by the farming community for seed eating birds. By focussing on areas where improvements can be made to provide all year round habitat and food supplies, the project will help to provide a brighter future for farmland birds in North Cumbria."

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FEBRUARY WEATHER

Fortunately February "fill dyke" did not live up to its usual promise. In fact it was probably one of the driest months I have ever recorded with only 0.28 inches of rain. Again this month we had a few days when, as the locals say, "the sky did not get off the ground". These are the days when we are enveloped in mist with a light drizzle. The electronic rain gauge cannot seem to cope with this so whatever precipitation falls isn't recorded as it does not trip the measure. In spite of this lack of rain everywhere is still very muddy with the water table being up to the surface. Temperature-wise it was a month of two halves with the first part having a frost every night whilst in the idisplay their territories, rooks back at second part we had only one frosty night and one ground frost. The minimum recorded temperature was 20.3F and the maximum at 50.2F. This latter was an isolated bright day with the remaining maxima being in the mid to low 40sF. During the cold spell at the start of the month we had a low pressure system which is quite unusual as cold spells in winter are often as a result of high pressure dragging in cold easterly winds from the continent. This time the centre of the low pressure system must have been situated slightly North of us to drag in colder Arctic air. Certainly the night time wind chill temperatures reflected this being well below freezing with a maximum wind recorded at 21.9 mph. Haven't we had a fabulous display

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of snowdrops this month? I think it has been the best I remember. The clump in our bank, which started out as one flower 13 years ago, had over 150 flowers this time!! With the days lengthening there has been much bird activity from cock birds singing to their nest sites to blue tits visiting nest boxes. Long tailed tits continue to visit our feeders so hopefully they will nest nearby. I understand the ravens have returned to their regular nesting site having been ousted by workmen last year. There are still some flowers on the winter jasmine and the hellebores are showing well as are the daffodils. Specie crocuses have added colour to a tired lawn area and the Iris reticulate have flowered well again. Once the temperature reached 42F grass started to grow even though the ground temperature must only just be at that temperature due to being waterlogged. So hopefully spring is around the corner with lambing well on the way for some. We still have 6 weeks to go before our first are due.

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APRIL GARDENING

I have been finding, as I look around worth waiting a few weeks before various gardens, that the unexpectedly cold winter has finished off a few plants which had survived previous years. Late March and early April are good times to reassess garden inhabitants, and to cut back the more tender perennials and shrubs in our borders. Many Penstemons are looking brown and bedraggled, but there is still hope of new growth if they are cut right down to ground level. Similarly some herbs - Sage, Rosemary, Rue and Lavender and Cotton Lavender have gone rather crisp. In cold damp soil it is likely that the root of the plant will have frozen to death, and you will probably find that the bark at the base rising and the latter should be past of the stems has split away from the wood leaving the leaves with no food supply. If this is the case, the top half of the plant may look quite lively until late spring, when it will quickly wither ; so take the saw to thick stems if the



and die. With all these plants it is cutting the stems back by about 2/3 and hoping for new shoots to sprout. Other, more tender shrubs such as Ceanothus, Cistus and Daphne may appear to have come through the cold unscathed but I have found on several occasions that a frosty snap in late April or May can brown and kill them almost overnight. They seem to most vulnerable when the sap is rising.

For those who need to do pruning work on cherries, plums or Eucalyptus, April is a good month to choose. The first two are less likely to succumb to canker and Fungal diseases if pruned when the sap is the dangers of serious frosts and also have plenty of time for regrowth through the summer if attacked now. Eucalyptus will stand heavy pruning plant is getting out of hand. You must then be prepared to leave to plant to its own devices for at least 2 months before you expect new buds to sprout . I remember going on a visit to Newby Hall one May, with a party of Kew Gardens staff, and being shown the "pruned" Eucalyptus grove. We all stood around and stared is disbelief at a collection of 2ft high, sawn off stumps as the arboriculturalist told us with great confidence that they would all burst into growth. Sure enough, when I visited at the end of the year there were healthy new stems covered with attractive rounded juvenile foliage. Elaine Horne

disappointed but Alison Brown, our party leader and organiser, determined to make this trip happen and immediately set about negotiating alternative dates, accommodation and travel arrangements. Luckily our aborted attempt cost us nothing with a complete refund from Ryanair (not a common occurrence) and our travel insurance coming up trumps for the other costs. There were to be no further cheap airline seats for a party of 40, however, and Alison organised instead for us to travel by coach.

This was the way in which the last group of Slovenian children, who visited us in October, travelled and I must confess that their journey sounded to me like a nightmare so I wasn't exactly looking forward to the route down to Dover, across on the ferry to Calais, then through Belgium, briefly into Holland, through Germany via Dusselldorf, Frankfurt, Numberg and Regensburg, across Austria via Graz and into NE Slovenia. We had two drivers who took turns at sleeping and driving, and we too slept overnight on the coach as it sped through northern Europe. We set off at 2 pm on Sunday 1st March and arrived the next day at 7 pm - a 28 hour journey (having gained an hour with the change of time zone). We had a leg stretch on the one and a half hour ferry crossing and about five

20 – 30 minute stops at motorway services. Yes we were tired on arrival but an early and good night's sleep soon put that to right and on reflection the journey was fine. Luckily the thirty-five 14-year-olds were impeccably behaved and, in fact, a pleasure to be with. We watched 6 DVDs, chatted and joked our way through Europe and with the lights out managed to get a few hours valuable kip on the bus. The return journey proved even better with much of interest to look at as we crossed the Alps.

All in all we would certainly choose coach over air travel in the future, with less stress, more convenience, no baggage restrictions and with the

added convenience of having your own coach and drivers always on hand during the rest of the visit. For those of you who haven't yet had the pleasure of visiting Slovenia we continue to find it a wonderful experience. Slovenia is almost as large as Wales, bounded by Italy, Austria, Hungary and Croatia. In the northeast it is dominated by the alpine mountain region adjacent to Austria, in which Zrece is situated with excellent skiing at Rogla, and wonderful warm spa waters for bathing even in the dead of winter. Apart from Sweden and Finland it is the most forested country in Europe (nearly 60 per cent of the land area). The population is only just over 2

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million, and the population of Ljubljana, the beautiful capital city, is about 300,000 (the second and third largest towns, Maribor and Celje are about 100 and 50 thousand respectively). The history is rich and interesting and the country boasts many beautiful buildings, castles, areas for walking and a varied wildlife. The Karst is a thickly forested ifinishing with a 3 mile and 1000 foot limestone area (from which the geological term karst derives) famed for its amazing subterranean world of rivers and the most stunning caves. Best of all though are the people who are warm, generous and friendly. Currently the cost of food and accommodation is a little less than in Britain.

About 180 students from Settlebeck have now visited, and our latest group benefited from the best programme to date.

The first day was spent with our hosts, Zrece Primary School (ages 7 - 15), which included activities on the Slovenian language (not for the faint-hearted), sport and a town-trail, climb back to the Gorenje centre. That evening we used the centre climbing wall.

The second day we spent skiing on Rogla followed by swimming in the spa – this was great fun and every single student and staff member rose to the challenge of swimming in the

cold outdoor pool immediately after swimming in the hot pool (even less for the faint-hearted), you could say this was a scream.

The third day we'd set aside as a rest day for reflective journals and relaxation. We were invited to a 40minute school play based on an old folk tale, in Slovenian! The evening was spent doing a quiz with our Slovenian hosts.

On the fourth day, after early morning gymnastics we set out to visit first a wonderful castle perched high above the town of Celje, second, the Velenje coal mine and finally the Frankolovo museum. This turned out to be an amazingly rich experience. The coal mine was a revelation since

we actually descended over 500 feet using the miners' tiny cages in pitch black shafts at 12 feet per second, followed by a tour of the old workings which had been kitted ouy with a wide range of exhibitions and simulations to provide an emotional experience of what it felt like to live and work in that environment. We were all greatly impacted by the hardship experienced by the traditional miner, and the simulated explosion and disaster will live in the memory for ever. Even more impacting, however, was the Frankolovo remembrance site where 100 civillians were hanged by the Nazis during their occupation in 1945, from the apple trees which still border the road through the

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valley. Their misfortune was to be political prisoners, in the local prison, at the time when a high-ranking Nazi soldier was killed by partisans. This atrocity, committed near to Zrece, is still remembered every year by the whole country and is movingly commemorated by the beautiful memorial and museum at the site. This event provides an important symbol for the European awareness we seek to engender in our students and the dreadful historical events which led to the European Union and its subsequent focus on peace and harmony between our nations.

On the fifth day we went with our host students to Postonja in the Karst region to view first of all the stunning Predjama Castle built into the face of a huge limestone cliff and cavern. Then we moved on to the Posonja cave, always a high point of our visit and a sort of real life Disney Land. We travelled by train 3 kms into the cave and then walked 2-3 kms through the most astonishing collection of thousands of stalactites and stalagmites, many over 20 feet long. A visit to Slovenia must include these caves. On then to Ljubljana, which, in the centre, resembles a small version of Prague. Our students: were guided around the city by their Slovenian hosts and we witnessed twilight descend on the beautiful Presener Square next to the triple bridge over the Ljubljanica river. That evening we walked in the woods by the light of 6 or 7 paraffin lamps looking after each other, enjoying the beautiful full moon and starlight over

the valleys and mountains and hoping that we wouldn't get too close to the bears and wild boar which occasionally pay a visit to the district. Bingo, the centre's St Bernard's dog, accompanied us for extra reassurance.

Day six was our final day and our second on the ski slopes. Every student had a day of down-hill tuition and a day of cross-country skiing and it was amazing how well the great majority, over these two sessions, developed the skills to ski reasonably competently thanks to the excellent tuition of the centre staff. We were very luck with the weather during this second session, with bright sunshine and blue skies from horizon to horizon. We finished our visit to the mountain with a high speed toboggan on rails – a perfectly safe but serious thrill as you hurtle at 30 mph down the mountain with hairpin bends and once again the chance to let rip with some heartfelt screaming! The final evening was spent with our hosts watching their fine performances of music and dance and a presentation of their trip to Sedbergh last October. The students came together for the last time with their Slovenian hosts at a disco and there were many sad goodbyes as our programme came to an end.

It was a trip to remember, a reaching out across 1000 miles of Europe to the new Europe, our twin town, their young people and the close relationships and hand of friendship that will hopefully always bind us in peace and prosperity. Dave Smith

APPLEBY HORSE FAIR

Who are the Gypsies?

Appleby Fair has been held for certain since 1750, and probably for very much longer. The date is fixed so that the last day of the Fair was the second Wednesday in June, though in recent years the fair is busiest on the weekend before that date. The dates are significant because the right to hold a fair was a valuable privilege, and while the Fair was in progress certain 'normal' rules were suspended. For example, the right for the public to assemble for a fair, and the right to cause a temporary obstruction to the highway during a fair, only apply while the fair is in progress.

Appleby Fair has grown very significantly recently, and the minor inconvenience caused by a gathering of a few hundred gypsies, travellers and their horses has turned into a major national event with up to 60,000 people converging on a small Cumbrian town. This expansion has changed the character of the Fair, so that the Gypsies and Travellers are now outnumbered by non-gypsies, traders and visitors. There is however a strong desire among the Gypsy and Traveller people to retain the essential traditional horse fair and annual family gathering.

There are at least 7 different groups of people who visit the Fair (not counting residents.) 5 of the 7 groups



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can be broadly described as 'Gypsies and who is not. For example, skin and Travellers' which is their 'official' designation. (By the way, it used to be politically incorrect to use the term 'Gypsies' and some people preferred the more respectful term of 'Romany,' but in the last 10 years or so this is no hair. In practice the different groups longer the case. Many Gypsies refer to themselves as Gypsies with pride. and anyone who has been amongst Gypsies will know that Gypsy pride is a powerful force!)

Although the bloodlines and genetic inheritance of each Gypsy family will be taught and known within the family, it has seldom been written down, and it is said that only a Romani knows who is a true Romani

colour and hair colour are not necessarily accurate guides. Although many believe that a true Gypsy has black hair and very dark skin, there are many 'blood' gypsies with fair can be most easily defined by their languages. Most speak English, many speak Romany and you might also hear English cant, Irish Cant, Shelta, Welsh Romani, Scots, besides French and German, since the families are widely spread over Europe.

So, back to these 5 groups: First are the Romany gypsies, or the

Romanichal. The Romanichal is a brotherhood, based on ethnic origin, marriage, and the extended family. There are a number of different extended families making up the Romanichal, each with its own Head Gypsy or Sheara Rom. The Sheara Rom who represents the Romanichal in matters relating to Appleby Fair is Billy Welch, who took over that position on the death of his father, old Billy Welch. Billy Welch is not in fact a Rom Gypsy, but a Sinti. (The Sinti settled in Northern Europe and are distinct from the Eastern European Rom of Hungary, Romania and the Danube.) The Welsh gypsies, (who call themselves Kale, and who have

very close to the Romani.

The second major group is the Travellers. Their ethnic origins are unclear, but it is widely thought that they were in Britain before 1506, when the first Romani arrived in Scotland. It has been suggested that the ancestors of the Travellers brought ironworking and blacksmithing into Britain. The Travellers share a very similar culture to the Romani. However, their ethnic origin is different, and therefore they belong to different families. There is some intermarrying between Traveller families and Gypsy families, and they share a number of common characteristics – for example skill with been in Britain since about 1400.) are horses, strong moral values regarding

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
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courtship and the sanctity of marriage, strongly defined gender roles, and loyalty and honour of a type which has become unfashionable in sections of 'Gorgio' (i.e. non-gypsy) society. The Gypsies and Travellers consider Appleby Fair to be their own. They regard the Fair as an essential annual Romani history is not good enough to pilgrimage.

The third group is neither Romany nor Traveller, but who nevertheless for one reason or another have adopted Gypsy ways. They are not 'blood' gypsies, but 'new' travellers, (new being at least 100 years old, in this case!) For many years were known to 'pure' Romanichal as

Didikai, (pronounced didicoi, also 'diddy' or 'kai' for short) because these 'new' travellers pronounced the Romany words 'dik akai' (meaning 'look here') as 'did akai'. (This origin of the word Didikai is widely believed, but may or may not be true – my knowledge of say for sure.) These days however, even being part Romani is one step up from being Gorgio, in the eyes of the Gypsies, and the word Didikai is not widely used. This group are nevertheless officially 'Gypsies and Travellers' even though they may not have Romani blood.

The fourth and fifth groups are the Irish and Scottish travellers, both of whom share with the Gypsies the nomadic habit of life and the strong association with horses. The 'official' government definition of Gypsies is this:

Persons of nomadic habit of life whatever their race or origin, including such persons who on grounds only of their own or their family's or dependants' educational or health needs or old age have ceased to travel temporarily or permanently, and all other persons with a cultural tradition of nomadism and/or caravan dwelling.

The remaining two groups who attend the Fair are the traders and the visitors. There are hundred of traders, selling everything from horses to hot-dogs, candy floss to canaries, and literally thousands of tourists and visitors – up to 30,000 per day at the last count.

With the rapid expansion of the fair came the familiar problems of large crowds – traffic congestion, sanitation, and public order problems fuelled by drink, for example.

Cumbria police have made it very clear that these problems at Appleby are proportionate to those experienced in the settled community when large numbers of people gather together, at a football match, for example, or a city centre on Saturday night.

However, it is recognised that local problems will occur, and that these can be a nuisance to local residents. It is for these reasons that there is Gypsy and Traveller representation

on the Eden committee which looks after statutory responsibilities, so that problems can if possible be addressed and sorted out within the Gypsy and Traveller community.

Because of the diverse nature of the Gypsy and Traveller population, these representatives on the committee do not wield absolute power or a magic wand, but because the Fair is such a vital and important part of their culture, they have a real interest is seeing it continue, and so will go to some lengths to help solve genuine problems where and when they arise. And one of the things that most Gypsies have in common with most Gorgios – they want a quiet life!

Obviously this is a controversial subject with very strong views held on North Yorkshire DL8 3EL. You might both sides. As I said last month, planning is a quasi-judicial process.

What is important is the quality rather than the quantity of submissions. Your formal planning department at YDNPA, Yoredale, Bainbridge, LEYBURN, wish to copy it to individual members as some of you did earlier this year, that is for you to decide. There are occasions when that can be useful the past. But, it is wise to do it sparingly, otherwise it can be counterproductive.



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APPLEBY NEW FAIR: Last night at the Neighbourhood Forum Kevin Douglas, Chief Executive of Eden spoke about preparations for this year's Appleby Fair. As chairman of the South Lakeland co-ordinating group I have some hope that we can reduce some of the problems we have had in previous years. We are making strong contacts with the communities themselves and are trying to reduce the numbers of "early" arrivers". We are also hoping to discourage travellers from over-using some of the more critical sites and persuading them to go to less sensitive ones. From past experience, some of this might seem

like wishful thinking. There will be more details in the May Lookaround, including a contact telephone number for ALL New fair related matters. Like Ian McPherson I want to see confrontation replaced by conciliation but that will take more than one year. PUBLIC HEALTH IN CUMBRIA: Before the last Full Council members of SLDC had an opportunity to view a presentation by a group of the key medical professionals in Cumbria. That by Dr John Ashton CBE, Director of Public Health and County Medical Officer was particularly interesting and yes, inspiring. One fact was presented in a striking

manner. The number of deaths per annum in Cumbria significantly exceeds the number of births and yet, increase means the money is lost the population of the county rises year by year. The reason is of course, in-migration of retired people. In former centuries there was a similar phenomenon in our major cities where young adults went out of the countryside to seek their fortunes. Malthus had a real fear that without them London's population would collapse.

COUNCIL TAX BILLS: At the budget meeting the controlling group proposed an increase in Council Tax for South Lakeland of 2.9%. As with last year my own group proposed a

edifying one and once again the Lib Dems used the argument that no every year. That is self-evidently true but begs the question as to why they don't go for the legal maximum 4.9%. In fact, the increase brings in such small amounts as to be barely worth the trouble. Ironically our own 0% increase last year would have produced less of a deficit than theirs as it was significantly less reliant on car parking income. The same would have been true this year. I notice in their Focus leaflets that any budget prior to 2006 is now called a Conservative budget even though there were more LD councillors than 0% increase. The debate was not an : Conservative ones. They express



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outrage at those former budgets which they themselves supported in council and sometimes even seconded.

CALL FOR HOUSING SITES: I am delighted that the call for housing sites within the National Park has been a resounding success with over 100 sites put forward for consideration. Very shortly the list, including those in Sedbergh and Dent will be published. At that point members of the public will be invited to make their responses to each of the proposed sites. In some ways it seems odd to be looking at this now, in the depths of a recession. But, it is intended to provide a supply of land for the next ten years and perhaps even more.

As I said last month. I am now the Conservative candidate for the forthcoming County Council elections to be held on 4 June. I believe I have a good track record both as councillor for the former Sedbergh District ward and now for the combined Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale ward. Because of the vagaries of election law I will not be submitting articles for the May and June Lookaround's as they will be circulating during the time of the campaign. I will be back in July, still as your District Councillor and should the electorate so decide as your County Councillor as well.



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

So it is right we do things together even when one church takes the lead in making it happen. An example of


