DENT PARISH COUNCIL

Sedbergh Health Centre

The council discussed the planning application for a new Spar and health centre on the auction mart site in Sedbergh. Although the parish council is not part of the formal consultation process, it was felt that its views should be passed on to Sedbergh Parish Council and to the YDNPA planning department, as health facilities in Sedbergh are of concern to most Dent residents.

The joint nature of the application made it difficult to reach agreement, as the council supported the new health centre but was divided on the impact of a convenience store on the edge of the town. As a result, while the proposal to support the health centre was passed without opposition, the vote to support the joint application was less clear cut, with two in favour, one against and four abstentions.

Meet the Police

The meeting was attended by PCSO with the out-of-hours service. Karen Dakin, as part of her regular visits to discuss matters of concern. these comments on to the Cumbria Primary Care Trust, and he has now received the following response:

- The Sedbergh GP surgery now offers evening appointments each Monday which can be booked in advance
- Since last summer Westmorland General Hospital has been running an integrated health and social care service which includes GP-led community beds and urgent assessment services, rapid response nurses, and a specialist community respiratory
- The PCT has procured additional NHS dentistry capacity in Sedbergh and Kendal which will be available in summer 2009. Anyone wishing to be allocated an NHS dentist should contact Lisa Wrigley on 01539 797855

The Trust has also offered to follow up specific problems with the out-of-hours service, and so if you have recently had a bad experience with it please contact Mike Lawton on 25122 or mdlawton@btinternet.com and he will pass your concerns on to the Trust. He would also be happy to pass on your views on other current health service issues, such as the new facilities at Westmorland General or the ambulance provision. Local Authorities working Together

Dent PC recently convened a meeting in Barbon of ten local Parish Councils to discuss a joint response to proposals for the county, district and parish councils in this area to work together more closely. The seven councils who were able to attend, and the other three who were contacted afterwards, felt that the real problem at the moment is the lack of co-operation between the county and the district, and that a group that included the parishes could only make a difference if it had funding and the power to make decisions. These views were passed on to SLDC who had asked for comments on the proposals.

The next council meeting will be at 7.30pm on May 11th in the Sedgwick Room. The public is welcome to attend as always, and to raise matters of concern in the public forum item which takes place about 8pm.

CRUMBLIER HIGHWAYS

If you read my letter at the top of the Opinions page of the Westmorland Gazette at Easter weekend, you will understand why I am annoyed. My original letter to the editor had the headline above which he saw fit to change to an awkward "Report holes to highways boss". He then went on to take all of the sting out of the letter, clearly afraid of upsetting anyone. Andrew Moss, head of Cumbria Highways, badly needs to read plainspeaking letters and so I have sent him a copy of my original (below), plus some photographs of the state of the Dent road at Rash and at the top of Black Horse to ponder about.

"Botch" is the best word in the English language I could find to describe the current state of road repairs in Cumbria, or around Sedbergh at least. From the Concise English Dictionary: "botch make a clumsy patch - bungled work - repair badly".

Both instances of "botch" were

removed from my letter, as was "bad" (repair work), "inadequate" (Andrew Moss's own word to describe road repairs in Staveley he was shown) and "poor quality". The reference I made to local repair work which literally lasted less than a week before having to be remedied, was also cut out. Can you believe that a gang of sub-contractors would resurface a lane without filling in deep pot-holes first. They simply shovelled some more surfacing gravel in which, of course, came

in that catastrophe and went directly to Cumbria County Council for an answer. They responded by saying that the road-mending policy was going to be amended and immediately sent another team out who spent two days repairing the bungled work.

I wrote to Andrew Thomas of the Gazette to complain about his watering down of my letter and his only excuse was: "I did have to edit your letter, partly for space reasons." Rubbish! Has everything we read in the Gazette been whitewashed and nasty, offensive words like 'botch' taken out? The one Gazette reporter I know agrees that he suffers the

same problem.

Full text of my uncensored letter to the Gazette of 10th April:

Dear Sir

"I could not believe the surprised response of Cumbria Highways Chief, I'm sure he would have more than Andrew Moss, when shown photographs of the state of the road in Staveley after some bad repair work, as reported in last week's Gazette. He must know only too well that botched road repairs like this are now the order of the day throughout Cumbria. "Indefensible" and "inadequate" (his words, quoted last week) are a perfect description of the general standard of road repairs we have to put up with now, certainly here in south Lakeland. Perhaps Mr Moss doesn't venture out onto the roads himself for fear of damaging his own car.

I realise that the Highways Department will only have limited funds to spend on road repairs but it is obvious (and indefensible) that this money is being wasted when repairs, usually carried out by subcontractors, are too often of such poor quality that they only last weeks (or even days, in one instance I have personal experience of). More money has then to be spent in order to make good the original botch. In addition, the longer road surface damage is left to deteriorate, the more expensive and extensive the repair work needed in the end.

Every single Gazette reader who uses Cumbrian roads will be able quote their own examples of inadequate road repair-work,

potholes, broken surfaces and the resulting damage to vehicles. Perhaps all those who feel strongly about this matter should send their photographic evidence to Mr Moss. enough to cover his entire office walls. Perhaps the Gazette could run a competition for a photograph of the worst road repair, then the entire entry could be sent to the Highways Department."

Perhaps the Lookaround should run a competition instead. I'm sure there's more than enough material to photograph just in the Sedbergh area alone, to give Mr Moss something to think about.

I am now living in Kendal and I have to say that every day I pinch myself at how fortunate I am to be living in what is undoubtedly one of the most beautiful parts of our country.

I have now visited Sedbergh on guite a few occasions and if I have not met you yet I hope that I soon will. Indeed, my contact details are at the end of this article and I would welcome the opportunity to stop by and say hello.

Health Centre

I realise that this is one of the most important issues facing the Sedbergh area at the moment. I am determined that Sedbergh has a first rate Health Centre and Kevin Lancaster and I are meeting senior Yorkshire Dales officials to discuss the present application. Once in a Generation

Sedbergh Medical Practice is appealing for community support once again in our campaign to achieve planning consent enabling the continued existence of independent General Practice in Sedbergh and provision of 21st Century Health Care Premises serving the population of the Western : all standpoints and have Yorkshire Dales. We have a final public meeting booked for the evening of Tuesday 19th May in the Peoples Hall, Sedbergh in the hope that we can involve the local population in a final push before the next YDNPA Planning Meeting in June. This is also designed to be a listening event where any honest feedback will be taken and acted upon in making sure no stone is unturned or opinion ignored. We cannot afford for this application to fail as there would be no possibility of maintaining the status quo.

maintaining the status quo.

Since rejection of our previous plans in December 2008 much time and effort has gone into discussing the issue with the local population and community representatives, looking at the alternative sites suggested, reworking designs of the proposed buildings and altering some principles of the application. It is our sincere belief that all issues/objections have been either resolved or proven to be of minimal impact. We understand that the local Chamber of Trade is supportive of the joint Spar/Health Centre development on the old

Auction Mart Site, as are the Dent and Garsdale Parish Councils. Cumbria County Council and South Lakes District Council have no objections and that the YDNPA planning officials are satisfied with our amendments. There to date has been overwhelming public support, with very little opposition voiced.

We have tried very hard to listen to endeavoured to keep the debate about principles and not personalities. Consideration has also been given to the fact that any mention of a loss or reduction in health care provision naturally causes concern to many and perhaps we have been quilty of not being clear enough about the health consequences of the no change option. There was also a deliberate decision not to push for a local referendum on the proposed new build as the last thing we wanted

This is likely to mean merger with one of the Kendal GP practices to ensure standards are maintained. Consequentially there will be a reduction in the scope and volume of health care and increased travel to Kendal. More importantly Sedbergh would become a small cog in a much larger machine with limited control over decision making. Reversing this process is essentially

Spring Flowers

Everyone is pleased to see Spring Flowers, but to naturalists, they are particularly welcome as evidence of renewal of life after the apparently dead winter months. Where then should we go to find the earliest flowers? I suggest a wooded river bank, such as the east bank of the Lune at Killington Bridge, an area made available to the public by the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

The survival of relatively natural vegetation in strips along steep river banks is primarily due to the need to protect farm stock from dangerously precipitous ground and the greater ease of constructing field boundaries, whether they be walls hedges or fences, along level ground at the top of the bank. This means that the river bank is not grazed, hence the persistence of trees and shrubs which can regenerate freely. But why should woodland produce the earliest flowers?

the needs of different species, honed to perfection over eons of natural selection, deciduous trees and spring flowers have come to be associated. During early spring, when increasing warmth and day length trigger growth, the ground flora of a wood can take advantage of full daylight, which will be denied it once the tree leaf-canopy burgeons. The shade provided by this canopy will by then be an advantage to the spring flora, which lapses into a vegetative state, or dies back completely, throughout the summer.

Among the best known of spring flowers are, of course, Primroses and Bluebells, the former persisting as leaves through the summer, while the strap-shaped leaves and flower stalks of the latter decay into that slimy mess which make steep woodland slopes so treacherous. Appearing much earlier is the less obvious fragile, whitish flowers on stalks. Look more closely, and you will see that delicate, pollen-producing, male flowers and more robust, seedproducing female flowers. Moreover, male and female flowers occur on separate plants – a relatively uncommon condition. One can scarcely fail to notice Ramsons because of the strong, oniony smell of the crushed leaves, even if you do not immediately see the white, starshaped flowers. Down near the river itself, on wet, and sometimes stony

ground, Coltsfoot pushes up its yellow, Dandelion-like flower heads. Nearby, there may be Marsh Marigolds, bigger, more richlycoloured versions of Buttercups. Delicate little plants, like miniature, fragile Cow Parsley, appear in slightly more open places. These are pignuts, able to grow and flower early because they have a winter store of food in a bulbil at the base of the plant. A little later come the wellknown and singularly attractive flowers of Wood Anemone and Wood Sorrel. The earliest-flowering grass is the Sweet Vernal Grass, by no means confined to woodland, but certainly occurring there. Its presence is often revealed to hay fever sufferers, who may find themselves sneezing long before they spot the plant.

Do not keep your eyes glued to the ground during your spring outings; look also for the flowers of trees and shrubs. Hazel catkins, the male flowers, and the less obvious, but beautiful little precursors of the Hazel nut (in this case, both on the same plant) are one of the earliest signs of

spring and rely on wind dispersal of pollen, thus avoiding the necessity of insects, not yet a-wing, for pollination. Birch trees from a distance, show a purple haze, created by the individually inconspicuous flowers, before the leaves open. Similarly, blackthorn produces a blaze of white flowers on bare, black branches. Hawthorn, on the other hand, does not flower until the leaves are well-developed.

There are many other spring flowers to be found. Do not take my word for it – go and look for yourselves and enjoy the bird song while you are about it! Helga Frankland. ©

I am writing this on behalf of the 'Travelling and Settled Community Respect Group' in South Lakeland. You may have seen references to the work of this group in last month's Lookaround

The group was established in 2008 to co-ordinate transit arrangements in South Lakeland for people travelling to the Appleby New Fair. It involves Officers from Cumbria County Council (Highways, Community Unit), South Lakeland District Council (Environment and Planning) and Cumbria Constabulary and the Fire & Rescue Service as well as elected representatives from Parish, District and County Councils.

Traditionally arrangements for transit in this area have been managed by individual organisations. With the establishment of the South Lakeland Group the aim has been to coordinate our activities by identifying and promoting preferred sites for caravans in transit and by agreeing advisory dates of arrival and departure for vehicles.

We are currently working with the Eden based Multi-Agency Strategic Co-ordinating Group (MASCG) which has assumed responsibility for managing the arrangements for the Fair in Appleby and surrounding villages. 

Easter was good, me weather, people milling about, I was in our bottom garden and a chap came along with two small boys, they had seen the decorated Cross by the road:



the farming community.

NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUM

Summary of the meeting held in the People's Hall on 17th March.

Digital Switchover

Sarah-Jane Gray explained that Digital UK is taking the whole of the UK through the process of turning off the old analogue signal and on to the new digital signal. Most people in the Sedbergh area watch Border TV which starts to changeover on 24th June and completes a month later. Granada starts the changeover on 4th November and completes on the 4th December.

Sarah-Jane explained there are several ways in which people can receive digital TV:

via satellite (Sky)

- BBC Freesat or Sky freesat useful if you do not want on-costs (about 200 channels)
- Through a digital box/freeview box (from £15)
- Through a digital TV with a built in box.

Sarah-Jane stressed there is no need for people to buy a new TV virtually everyone can convert the TV they already have. Nor do the majority of people need a new aerial. Teletext, page 284, offers a home diagnosis for your aerial - if all the blocks are there it means your aerial is doing the best it can to pull a picture down. If four or more blocks are missing, it means that it is not pulling in a perfect signal. Ofcom

suggest less than 10% of the nation will need to buy a new aerial. Recording does, however, change with the digital switchover as you will no longer be able to watch one channel whilst recording another – to do this you will need to get a digital TV recorder with two tuners. A VHS recorder will only record the channel you are watching as it only has one tuner.

Sarah-Jane mentioned help is available for some people over 75 or with a significant disability to make the changeover to digital (information will be sent through the post to the people concerned), but stressed leaflets will be sent to everyone reminding of the switchover date and containing all the information needed to switch over.

Sarah-Jane responded to concerns about poor signals and transmitters. She mentioned that digital should boost the power on all transmitters to some extent, but suggested if people visit www.digital.uk, they can enter their postcode to check the quality of the signal they will receive. She also mentioned that boosters should not be needed after the changeover.

Sarah-Jane confirmed analogue radio will be turned off eventually, but there is no timetable yet. VHF aerials will not be affected.

Kevin Lancaster, District Councillor
and Chair of the Travelling and
Settled Community Respect Group in
South Lakeland, said the area has
experienced a variety of problems
with travellers over the years. Recent
issues at Sedbergh started when
parking at Devil's Bridge was taken
out and the area had some very

unpleasant experiences last year. Kevin suggested in the past Sedbergh had tried to address the issues as a small community, rather than as a whole. The Travelling and Settled Community Respect Group feel everyone is now working together and they are at the stage where they have a real chance to have a much more orderly event this year.

Plans for the New Fair included identifying appropriate sites for travellers to stay to prevent the Cautley Road being blocked (north of the Cross Keys to the River Rawthey and Middleton) Kevin admitted it was unlikely the Group would get everything right this year, but had confidence things would improve. He

confirmed signage would be up from the first week in May, but travellers will be discouraged from coming to the New Fair early. If they do, they will be moved on and there will be designated places to move people to. : travellers who caused the problems

Kevin was asked if the Group had liaised with agencies outside South Lakeland. He confirmed limitations at Ravenstonedale Common are in place and representatives from Lancashire County Council and Lancaster City had been invited to all meetings, but had not attended. Alan Day commented that their lack of cooperation was a long standing issue. He stressed no-one wants travellers staying on the A65 waiting to come

into South Lakeland and this is part of treating the problem as a whole. Kevin confirmed a lot of time had been spent trying to find solutions to problems since the last New Fair. The last year have been identified, and the Group is more 'clued up' on differences within the travelling community.

Kevin Douglas. Chief Executive of Eden District Council and Chair of the Multi-Agency Strategic Co-ordinating Group (MASCG) said on his first day in this role in 2007 he got a pile of complaints on Appleby New Fair and realised Eden needed to take action

to stem a major problem. As in South Lakeland, Kevin said everyone was acting individually and not to a plan, hence the creation of MASCG involving the Police, Fire & Rescue Service, Trading Standards, Eden District Council, Cumbria County Council and now South Lakeland District Council. Kevin acknowledged that MASCG is not going to roll back 50 years of unregulated activity overnight, but it has put together an improvement plan. Initially the plan was to control what happens in Appleby itself, but the parishes around Appleby were suffering the same problems as those around Sedbergh and the focus is now on Appleby during the Fair, and on the

transit sites outside the New Fair period.

Kevin said the Police are the biggest supporters of the initiative and are looking to increase their intelligence network. He suggested the command structure will extend into South Lakeland this year. A New Fair website www.applebyfair.org will operate from early April and all intelligence will be uploaded onto this. MASCG is starting to network with gypsies and traveller communities to show how it intends to run the Fair and take back control, without being confrontational. Kevin stressed that it is not possible to move people on without giving them somewhere to go. Ravenstonedale will open on the

Sunday – anyone arriving before then Eclean up afterwards. They will charge will be moved to Stainmore. MASCG is also trying to include Lancashire, as intelligence from there would be helpful. When information is uploaded to the website, MASCG will ensure gypsies and travellers are aware of it, mobile phones and the internet being the preferred means of communication.

As in South Lakeland, Kevin suggested it was unlikely they get it absolutely right in the first year, but promised it would be better. He confirmed the decision has been taken to get every site within Appleby licensed, which means landowners have to provide toilets, skips and

and may need planning permission. Once these facilities are in place, MASCG can take action if the gypsies and travellers do not use them. MASCG will work across boundaries – the Police already do so – and increase the number of officers both at the New Fair and in the lead-up.


Kevin was asked if there was a representative body for gypsies and travellers? He acknowledged the diverse groups within the Travelling community and confirmed the Group deals with Billy Welsh for the Romany, Irish and Scottish gypsies

but has no contact for the 'weekend' gypsies, adding the traditional Fair is shorter than previously, as many travellers disappear back to work on the Monday. District Councillor Ian McPherson commented that once travellers arrive, it is difficult to find who to talk to about concerns and stressed the lines of communication need to be very clear. Kevin acknowledged the ideal of a liaison committee involving both settled and traveller communities and said the Group is working towards this in the longer term. He explained the chain of command at Appleby; daily operational meetings to deal with issues and the need to provide clear

information.

Kevin explained the background to the traditional horse fair and commented that if it involved only the resident community, gypsies and travellers it would be a manageable affair, it is the influx of visitors and market traders which puts a strain on services. Details of the New Fair website and other information will be included in Sedbergh & District Lookaround.

The next Sedbergh & Kirkby Lonsdale Neighbourhood Forum will be held at Dent Memorial Hall, 7.30pm on Tuesday 30th June, 2009. All welcome.

Operation Neptune Invasion of Normandy

8-9/7/44 MTB 88, MTB 93, MTB 238 and MTB 245 encounter a force of armed trawlers off Scheveningen. MTB 88 and MTB 238 made a torpedo attack hitting and sinking one trawler. MTB 93 and MTB 245 made a torpedo attack achieving two hits. MTB 245 was hit by a shell on the waterline close to the bow and begins to settle. MTB 245 gets underway astern and is later towed stern first by MTB 93 at 5kts. An ML later took over the tow and a tug was dispatched from Felixstowe.

18/8/44 MTB 93 was returning from a night time patrol in the North Sea with when at approximately 05.00 she was in collision with MTB.729 off Harwich and she subsequently sank. Two ratings lost their lives.

22nd M.T.B. Flotilla

The boat was a member of the 22nd M.T.B. Flotilla and was originally based at H.M.S. Beehive, Felixstowe. From 15th November 1942 it was based at HMS Mylodon, Lowestoft from where it was engaged in operations against shipping off the Dutch and Belgian coasts and in anti-E-boat patrols in the southern North Sea. For a period prior to D-Day, the

H.M.S. BEEHIVE

Based at Boomer Hall the base was operating with MTB Flotillas in January 1940. Also call RN Depot Felixstowe. Paid off 18/10/1945. HMS Beehive, was a very large establishment that catered for about thirty two boats consisting of Motor Torpedo boats, Motor Gun boats and MLs, who were a pain in the neck for the German shipping. Many a night would see anything up to thirty boats out on operations over the Dutch Coast. The torpedo and gun boats were a nuisance to the residents of Felixstowe in the winter, as their engines water cooling system was fresh water. The fresh water being cooled by sea water, this meant that the boats engines had to be started up every so many hours to ensure that the fresh water did not freeze. This was not so bad during the daytime, but at night the starting up of went on board for routine many engines caused guite a din. LOOKING AFTER THE JOINTS

Healthy joints depend largely on the right amount of exercise. Too much exercise, particularly repetitive movements, can damage joints, tendons, ligaments and muscles. Not enough exercise leads to stiffness and loss of movement. In particular, if a joint is not allowed to experience its full range of movement regularly, its movement can become restricted. This balance is something that everyone must determine for him or herself.

All movement is initiated from the centre of the body and uses the pressure of the body (usually the feet) on the ground. Basically, when we walk we are translating the downward Shaking from the hips allows the force of gravity into a horizontal movement. Becoming more aware of this enables us to be more relaxed and to move more efficiently. This has particular benefits for the joints as they are less hampered by inappropriate tension in the muscles.

Specific exercises, such as shoulder rotations can benefit particular joints. but ideally these exercises should be thought of as being whole body movements. Motivate the rolling of the shoulders from the hips and the movement will become much easier. Pain in the knees can be helped by allowing the hip joints to relax and by allowing the whole body to fall down into the feet.

Firstly it strengthens the centre of the body so that less work is required of the knees when stepping and secondly it allows the synovial fluid to lubricate all the interior surfaces of the joint. The It is useful to have a small repertoire : principles of moving from the ground and motivating movement from the centre of the body should be maintained throughout.

One of the best exercises for

improving stability is simply standing.

After a few minutes awareness of imbalance and tight muscles increases, enabling the body to find a more natural stance, which is then automatically more stable. This can be combined with various arm positions to increase awareness of how the arms are supported by the lower body.

It was through listening to hill farmers in a similar fashion that I learned about the issue of what happens to the farms when the current generation of farmers retire from the hills. I estimate that about 85% of hill farmers have no one to pass their farm on to. This is worrying because of the number of roles we all appreciate these skilled people perform, not simply in breeding sheep but in maintaining the look of the fells that we enjoy. As a result I have been pushing the Government to introduce a Hill farm apprenticeship scheme to train up young farmers in the skills involved in farming on hills. I appear to be making some progress with this plan, the next stage in the campaign is a meeting I have with Hilary Benn MP, the Defra minister, in the next couple of weeks. I will let you know how I get on.

Finally. just before Parliament broke up (sounds more like school than the body that runs this country doesn't it?) there was a meeting of the Parliamentary National Parks Group. This gave me the chance to challenge the Minister responsible for

National Parks, Huw Irranca-Davies MP, to introduce a formal system of accountability to the Park authorities, giving people who live within their boundaries the power to elect people to represent them on the authority. As I have said in this column before I was extremely disappointed, but not really surprised, when the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority decided to support continuing with the current system with no-one formally elected to their group with the result that noone is formally accountable to people who live within the park. How can this be right? Surely there has to be some people on the body formally accountable to the people who actually live and work within the Park, so these people can be sure that their views are being heard?

MAY GARDENING

Now that the wonderful uninterrupted displays of flowers produced by spring bulbs – snowdrops, crocus, daffodils and tulips – are coming towards the end of their reign, my thoughts begin to turn to those lush colourful blooms which make up a typical English Herbaceous border.

The first signs of buds on the peony plants start to show in mid daffodil season. Peonies have been in cultivation in gardens in this country since the 16th century. Originally used in herbal medicine the seeds were used to cure epilepsy or worn as necklaces to aid teething in young children. In Western medicine the

only current use is in the treatment of eczema in children.

Peonies in cultivation are divided into two groups – the herbaceous type, which die right back to their underground tubers each winter, and those known as Tree Peonies which grow into deciduous shrubs, 4 – 6 ft high.

At Firbank we have the easiest and hardiest of plants – the herbaceous, old fashioned double, dark red flowered *Paeonia officinalis* which flowers well regardless of the winter cold and wet. *P. officinailis* 'Alba Plena' is similarly robust and double white. Other wonderful cultivars include 'Sarah Bernhart' with fragrant double rose pink flowers and 'Bowl of

Other hardy species worth growing include the challengingly named P. mlokosewitschii (affectionately known as "Mollie-the-Witch) which has single, pale lemon yellow, chocolate scented flowers. This one grows well from seed - but it does take 5 or 6 years to reach flowering size. In one of "my " gardens we have had three attempts at producing a flowering sized plant. The first specimen was slugged in its second year, the second produced three flower buds last year which with much anticipation itend to look lost amongst the red opened up to be pale pink. (very pretty tinted stems and foliage, so if you though, so we decided that it could stay,) and the third, in its third season is almost ready to be planted out into the border with hopes that it might produce flowers of the correct shape and colour in another 2 years

has rich dark red, single flowers with yellow stamens. The flowers which are relatively small, as peonies go, grow this one you have to be prepared to make a special effort to search them out. P. lutea, the yellow flowered peony is similarly robust and bears single pale yellow blooms. Neither of these can compare with the cultivated forms of tree peonies which were introduced from China in the 18th century. Amongst these *P.* suffruticosa 'Joseph Rock' is my favourite with its enormous, white, crepe paper blooms with their central maroon blotch. P. suffruticosa 'Reine Elisabeth' produces double flowers with ruffled shell pink petals. Chinese Tree Peonies grow most successfully where they experience a long uninterrupted dormant season in the winter. Our rather damp winters with their mild spells seem to lead to leafy growth, rather than flower bud formation so the most successful plants that I know around this area are those growing in sunny well

PINFOLD


I write as one of the original "twelve month residents" of Pinfold - in fact, twelve months x 10 years.

Pinfold was built in the early 1940's for the war workers who came to work at Farfield Mill. Many of them married and stayed on after the war.

Pinfold was a wonderful place to live, like a little village full of lovely families. I was one of a family of six, the Turners - Mum, Dad, Bob, Phyllis, Keith and Sylvia, oh and Glen the Welsh Border Collie (given to us by Simon Harper the auctioneer). Next door to us were the Wilson family - Mr and Mrs Wilson, Pam, Michael and lan. Opposite us were the Bowmans, then the Kevans (Dick Kevan the

teacher), then the Aireys, Walters, Oughtons, Scotts, Majors, Abbots, Jacksons, Kempins, Dinsdales, Billy and Annie Burton, Holmes and the Chappies. The Home family were at the entrance to the estate next to Mrs. Coxon, Gibsons (Kelly), Shutts and Miss Stead were near the White bar, then the Snowdons and the Hendersons. I may have forgotten some of the others, but it was sixty four years ago!

We moved into No. 1 just after V.E. Day 1945 when rationing was still in force and there were coupons for everything. Pinfold had its own sewerage farm looked after by Jim Holmes, next to the town tennis courts where many a Wimbledon final

was played, whilst someone on the "round thing" (our name for the Pinfold) kept watch for the members coming to play football matches or cricket test matches, these games took place on the grass at the side of No. 1 where the estate bonfire also took place and everyone came along bringing Parkin, "Plot" toffee and Mintoes made with dried milk powder, peppermint essence and sugar and water.

I think we all learnt to swim in the river, Handley's Dub and the Clews were favourites. I particularly remember the summer of 1946 when we practically lived in the beck-edge. The Hollybush was the den where we ate, cooked trout, smokey boiled potatoes and peas. My dad thought his peas never did very well at Pinfold -1 wonder why?

Does anyone else remember Eric Major fetching coke from the gas works on Saturday mornings? He used to manage about four sacks on a bike! Tot Harper came early morning with his milk float - the horses' hooves used to waken everyone, shortly followed by Irene and Phyllis Fenwick clicking down the road on their way to work. You didn't need an alarm clock on Pinfold!

From memory, none of us lads had bikes until we started work. I think Jim Airey was the first with his 'Wearwell'. I used to borrow one from anywhere. Mr and Mrs Beetham from Frostrow Lane used to ride past, and one day I had to repair her 3 speed gears and she said I could borrow the bike any time. It had huge 28 inch wheels and

balloon tyres and a device of string from the mud guard to the axle to keep coats and dresses out of the spokes - very handy for a 14 year old lad! However, beggars can't be choosers and it got me to Ingleton at Easter and Bowness at Whit. We sometimes went swimming to Killington Bridge, five of us on four bikes, one standing on the pedals and the other sitting on the seat!

My son and his wife now have a beautiful lodge on Pinfold, about 25 yards from where No. 1 was. I know they will be very happy there as "ten month residents", but I bet they don't have half the fun!

KNITTED SQUARES



MARCH WEATHER

March certainly lived up to its "March many weathers" title. Although it didn't quite come in like a "lamb" it certainly went out like a "lion". In fact it was a typical windy March with only 3 days when the wind speed did not reach double figures in mph. Over half the month had wind speeds which reached the upper teens or above with a maximum of 24.8mph being recorded. Again the atmospheric pressure reflected the wind speeds with low pressure, below 29 inches of mercury, on the windier days. Temperatures had improved sufficiently that only on 2 days did the maximum not reach 42F, the temperature at which growth occurs, so a general greening of the fields was seen. It actually reached 60sF on 2 days with a maximum of 60.6F but at the opposite end we had temperatures down to a minimum of 23.5F. Rainfall was moderate with a total of 2.84 inches which included 12 dry days and a couple of snow flurries, the latter one only on the high tops.

Many birds seem to be nesting and we have certainly seen blackbirds and house sparrows building. I haven't found the blackbird's nest yet but they are in the shippon every time you go in. The sparrows have chosen to use the lamp post top in the garden. The rooks have certainly been vociferous in their activities with a couple of nests nearby. Oystercatchers and curlew were making themselves evident by their calling. The call of the curlew as it does its "circuits and bumps" is one of the pleasures of summer. Isn't March a golden month with daffodils, forsythia and celandines giving a gorgeous display? Some of the earlier cherries made an appearance later in the month with a touch of pink. On one of the pleasanter days towards the end of the month we had

It was a condition of membership that you had to be a member of the Armed Services but this has been changed and any person can be a member.


