DENT PARISH COUNCIL


At the September meeting, we were very pleased to appoint Colin Robertshaw as the new Parish Clerk. Some of the other items that were discussed are outlined below, and the full council minutes are published as usual on the Dentdale website, www. dentdale.com.

New Parish Clerk

Colin Robertshaw is joining us as parish clerk from the beginning of October. Colin lives in New Hutton, and became clerk to Sedbergh parish council just under a year ago. He will be continuing with this role in addition to his new responsibilities as Dent parish clerk. It is increasingly

common these days for clerks to be responsible for more than one parish, and one of the benefits this brings is a closer working relationship between the parishes involved. When we did the parish plan survey in Dent, one thing that people wanted us to do was to work more closely with other parishes, and so we are hoping that this appointment will help us to do

Farm and Neighbourhood Watch CSO Karen Dakin announced that she would be arranging a meeting of Neighbourhood Watch and Farm Watch co-ordinators in the near future. In the discussion that followed it was suggested that all information



from the police should be passed to members of both schemes in Dentdale, in order to obtain the widest coverage among members of the community.

Dent Play Area

One of the targets of the Parish Plan was to improve the children's playground equipment in Dent. Since the project will meet the above the plan was published ten months ago, a committee has been formed with a formal constitution to bring this about. They have set themselves the target of raising £35,000 to refurbish the play area and so far, they have obtained £10,000 from South Lakeland District Council and have applied for a number of other grants. At the September meeting, the parish council granted them a further £5,000 from the money that the car park profits have produced.

Gravel Extraction

A member of the public reported that high response rate is necessary to now that the barrier has been erected in Flood Lane, the extraction of gravel: from the river seems to have increased at other points in the Dale. It was agreed that a representative of the Environment Agency should be invited to a future meeting so that the issue of gravel extraction could be discussed more fully.

Grants

Applications are currently invited for Parish Council Grants for projects that meet one or more of the following criteria:

- Address local social needs
- Contribute to the local economy

- Promote the quality of the environment
- Contribute towards maintaining local culture
- Involve or benefit the local community

Written applications should state the amount requested and indicate how criteria. They should be sent to Dent Parish Council, c/o West Banks, Dent by 16th October 2009. They will be considered at the Parish Council meeting in November.

Housing Needs Survey

By now all households in the Dale should have received a copy of the housing needs survey from Cumbria Rural Housing Trust. The purpose of this survey is to establish the Dale's current need for affordable housing, and its results will determine the willingness of Two Castles Housing Association to build houses here. A ensure the survey's accuracy, so if you haven't done so already, please take a few minutes to fill it in and return it. Additional forms can be obtained from Dent Stores, and any information you give will be kept strictly confidential.

Next Meeting

The next meeting will be at 7.30pm on October 5th in the Sedgwick Room. It is open to everyone, and members of the public will be able to raise any issue that concerns them in the public forum which usually takes place about 8 o'clock.

SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL

The latest council meeting was held on Wednesday 26th August at the People's Hall.

The meeting was addressed by Peter Marshall the Bursar from Sedbergh School, who covered a range of subjects including the setting Decisions by YDNP up of a joint steering group with the School, Parish Council and police to look at ways of alleviating poor behaviour amongst the youth of Sedbergh. It was agreed that the issues raised could be further considered at the forthcoming Parish Council Workshop.

The following matters arising from the minutes were discussed:

- a) Tennis Courts NPS have written offering a 999 year lease for a premium of £28,000. It was agreed that an informal valuation would be obtained to compare and that the clerk would write a holding reply indicating that the Council was taking advice.
- b) Parish Plan- It was agreed that a workshop be set up for Tue 13th Oct. The Council expressed its thanks to Dennis Whicker for his help in getting the Plan published.
- c) Cllr Jameson reported that the problems of litter in the alleys around Kings Yard are the responsibility of SLDC and action is to be taken

The following planning issues were discussed:

Applications

Dales View, Guldrey Lane, Sedbergh. – Full planning permission for loft conversion, erection of rear extension and front porch. -Retrospective

The Workshop, Howgill Lane, Sedbergh. – Full planning permission for the renewal of barn roof with change of roofing materials from stone flags to Burlington Slates and the insertion of two roof lights.

No objections

The Paddock, Long Lane, Sedbergh – Installation of integrated reception system Granted Garths, Marthwaite, Sedbergh -Listed building consent for the removal of existing flagstones roof covering and replaced with reclaimed Westmorland Slate. Granted

Further details of planning applications can be found on the Yorkshire Dales National Park website.

Finance

The financial report was presented to the meeting. It was agreed that an interim review of the budget be carried out in October Parish Plan

A workshop for councillors is to be held on 13th Oct to produce action plans to go with the parish plan. Requests for Grants

- a) It was agreed that the Council would commit up to £2,000 towards the cost of the proposed Play Fencing project providing the Playground Committee were able to raise £2,000 and the expected grant from Cumbria County Council of £7000 was forthcoming. The fencing will provide an attractive safety barrier between the playground and football field and will incorporate about twelve interactive play panels
- No objections : b) Following a request from Sedbergh

United Reformed Church it was agreed that the council would commit £1,000 to assist with the project to refurbish and modernise their community facilities.

c) It was agreed to contribute £250 towards the cost of plants for Cumbria in Bloom.

Car Parks

Joss Lane Car Park was discussed and it was agreed that the council would press the landlords SLDC for action to resolve the problem before the onset of winter.

Arrangements are in hand for a camera survey to try and resolve the problems we are having with the drains at Loftus Hill Car Park. It was also reported that YDNPA are to supply new cycle racks to go with the proposed tree planting scheme at the car park in Loftus Hill.

The public are asked to note that once again it has been necessary to close the public toilets each night due to problems with vandalism.

Cllrs Longlands. Blair and Jameson were thanked for their efforts in cleaning up the car park.

Football Field

A problem has arisen with groups which have hired the hall assuming that the they can use the football pitch. Groups booking the People's Hall wishing to use the field as well should contact Cllr Longlands separately.

Highways

A discussion about the many unresolved highways issues culminated in an agreement that the

Council would contact Cumbria Highways and other interested groups with a view to drawing up an integrated town centre plan. An initial meeting with interested parties has now been arranged for early in October.

COUNCILLORS CORNER

Before I was elected to the District Council I said that one of my priorities would be let out at affordable rates. during my term of office was to see the provision of more affordable housing within the Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale Ward. It is essential that such accommodation be provided either by way of sale or let otherwise we run the risk of local people (especially young ones) having to leave the area because they can no longer afford to live here. I am very pleased therefore to welcome two possible new initiatives likely to address this problem. The first is the imminent closure of Baliol School by North Yorkshire County Council and the subsequent placing of the property on the market for sale. We appreciate the anxiety being caused to staff and pupils whilst awaiting a final decision but in anticipation of this decision to close being made, Peter Woof and I have already asked SLDC officers to contact NYCC and to work with them to see whether or not the site can be

made available for a housing scheme. Of course, the site might well also attract the attention of institutional purchasers including other schools, and at the moment we shall have to wait and see how the situation develops. The second initiative is the proposed sale by Cumbria County Council to SLDC of the old Depot Site on Guldrey Lane. SLDC would then sell on the land to a Housing Association (at a subsidised sale price) with conditions that the subsequently built accommodation The difficulty we always face in Sedbergh, of course, is that whilst SLDC is the Housing Authority, Yorkshire Dales National Park is the Planning Authority, and any development of the kind outlined above would need the approval of Yorkshire Dales planners. Local people will, of course, have the opportunity to support (or object to) the proposals once a formal application for Planning Permission has been submitted. Again it is a matter of watching this space. Still on the subject of housing, in mid-September District Councillor Peter Woof (a member of the South Lakes Housing Board), together with Parish Councillor Dorothy Blair and two Representatives from South Lakes Housing, did a tour of Marvfell to examine the condition of the houses and flats and also to meet

with local residents. Peter reports

that the visit was a successful one

and that the various concerns raised by tenants will be pursued by him both through SLH and SLDC. Structurally the condition of most properties is good and maintenance continues regularly through an ongoing rolling programme.

My District Council colleague Kevin Lancaster raised the issue of New Road, Kendal in his last Lookaround Article particularly the effect that the banning of parking might have on the residents of the Ward who travel regularly to, or work in, Kendal. The results of SLDC's consultation process has recently been published and this soon will form the basis of a Report to Cabinet and then a decision also the vision of the town for the by Cabinet as to how to proceed. For future. It occurred to me that maybe myself I have to say that at this point I Sedbergh could consider doing have no strong feelings either for or against parking (except to say that the area definitely needs a good tidy up) but being a democrat, I do think it : Garsdale but it calls itself a Town is vital that the final decision, once made, reflects the views of the majority as expressed either through the consultation process or the petition which has been signed and presented to the Council by concerned Council Tax payers. There to myself. Would we want to make are also quite complicated legal matters which need to be factored into the final decision.

Wearing another of my hats (a Quaker one this time!) I recently had the privilege and pleasure of leading a morning Assembly at Dent Primary School. I was enormously impressed : by the quality of the facilities at the

school (not least the outdoor play and activity areas) and by the dedication and commitment of all the staff. It brought home to me again how essential small local schools are to the health of our community and that any attempts to restrict their operations or to close them down altogether should be strongly resisted. They deserve all the support we can give them.

At the last meeting I attended of Kirkby Lonsdale Town Council the Council adopted a crest and motto which will be used on all their official publications and also around the town to publicise not only their history but something similar. Kirkby Lonsdale has the legal status of a Parish Council just like Sedbergh, Dent and Council. Quite right too in my view it is a town after all. Why I wonder does Sedbergh not do the same? Perhaps a local historian might like to furnish me with the answer to this either through these columns or direct the change if we were legally entitled to do so? Your views please....?

SEDBERGH & KIRKBY LONSDALE **NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUM**

Summary of meeting held at Barbon : Village Hall on Tuesday 8th September. County Councillor Kevin Lancaster welcomed everyone to the Forum.

APPLEBY FAIR UPDATE

Councillor Lancaster explained that follow-up meetings are in hand following the drop in sessions at Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale and the Forum at Dent and various legal issues are being considered. Cautley residents have also met to consider legal issues arising from the Fair. Councillor Lancaster also mentioned some concerns over gypsies parking irecently established between that

within the county division since the 30th June.

John Challoner confirmed that a Neighbourhood Group for people living between Sedbergh and Cross Hall, had formed since the last Fair. The Chief Constable and Member of Parliament have offered to meet with the group on 30th September.

He added that the general opinion of the group is that too little/too late preparation caused a terrible 'log jam' in Cautley, causing misery for travellers who did not want to be pushed into convenient areas, and a very difficult time for residents. He reiterated that 50 caravans in three miles is not a problem, 50 caravans in 100 yards is!

The 'Respect' group will meet again shortly and Councillor Lancaster confirmed an update on this issue will form part of every Sedbergh & Kirkby Lonsdale Neighbourhood Forum agenda.

MACMILLAN COMMUNITY SOLUTIONS

Jonathan Ingram, Age Concern, explained an innovative service

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organisation, Macmillan Cancer, NHS over 50 living with cancer; caring for Cumbria and Cumbria County Council which, if successful if South Lakeland, may be taken forward nationally.

This three year initiative is community focused and would look to and that isolation is an issue which expand Macmillan's expertise in cancer support into community areas. The aims of the project are:-

- To link older people to existing support services
- To develop new services where there are gaps
- To improve the quality of life for cancer patients
- To enable people to remain living at home

The target group is people aged

someone with cancer: survivor of a cancer related illness or bereaved as a result of cancer.

Jonathan mentioned that the project will be consulting with other charities many older people face. He provided some examples of local needs and gaps, eg.

- Gentle exercise groups
- Intergenerational projects
- Prescription delivery service
- Other practical services which support groups could offer, eg. gardening, dog walking etc.

Jonathan highlighted the projects need for volunteers to undertake a wide variety of roles and mentioned



that a support group already exists in Kirkby Lonsdale where the Institute will host a Coffee Morning on 25th September as part of the 'World's biggest Coffee Morning' project. He also mentioned forthcoming events in Kendal – 23rd September – Colostomy Roadshow and 1st October – Conversations for Life (details from Jonathan on 01539) 728180.)

A request was made that Jonathan include Dent in both the Macmillan Community Solutions Scheme and Village Agents scheme. He confirmed it was unlikely the Macmillan Roadshow, recently in Kendal, would visit smaller rural settlements.

Age Concern will appoint a 'Village Agent' for Sedbergh later in the year. LOOK OUT, THERE'S A SCAM ABOUT!!!

Austin Shields explained that Trading Standards (formerly Weights and Measures) is part of Cumbria County Council and has two distinct roles - education and advice and enforcement. Austin explained Trading Standards continuing involvement with pub measures, counterfeit goods at car boot sales, animal negligence etc. pyramid selling schemes and working from home schemes before talking about current scams.

He warned people to beware of Cold Callers in unmarked vans offering to undertake work. He instanced occasions when householders had been driven to the bank to withdraw large amounts of money for such work, which was then never done or never finished, citing one scam when roof tiles were painted rather than being replaced. He urged people to always employ tradespeople who were recommended or known to them, rather than someone who 'turns up out of the blue'.

Austin also warned of the ease with which cold callers can acquire official looking ID cards. He explained that some Utility Companies now offer a password scheme whereby their representative has to confirm a chosen password.

He also warned of the danger of distraction burglaries when a householder is engaged by someone on the doorstep, and urged everyone to keep the Consumer Direct advice line number handy to report possible scams. 08454 04 05 06

available and Austin reported an 80% drop in Cold Calling in areas where these have been displayed (Ulverston: and Storth). He warned of junk mail offers which 'were too good to be true' (and usually are) and gave advice on how to stop the majority of junk mail by contacting the Mailing Preference Service on 0845 703 4599 or write to Mailing Preference Service, Freepost 29, Lon20771, London W1E 0ZT. Similarly, contact the Telephone Preference Service on 0845 070 0707 or email tps@dma. org.uk to prevent unwanted telephone sales calls and report any high pressure selling techniques to Consumer Direct. Most calls from automated calling services can also be stopped in this way.

Junk emails are another favourite scam and Austin advised to delete such e-mails without opening rather than respond. Unsolicited e-mails can be stopped by registering with the E-mail Preference Service via www. dma.org.uk

Jonathan Ingram, Age Concern, warned of 'health therapists' trying to

'wheedle' themselves into people's homes when they are purely sales people trying to sell mobility and disability aids. He warned that it is particularly older people who are targeted and advised people never to make appointments with cold callers. Age Concern Helpline – 01539 728180.


THREE COUNTRY LADS

Tom Sowerby Thomas Handley Donny Garnett

A new book has just been printed featuring the above Three Country Lads and written by Henry Sowerby. The foreword states:-

During a conversation with the late and much missed Jack Hill who was researching names on the War Memorial at the time, I remarked that they were just country lads like ourselves and because of them, we are able to enjoy a life of freedom amongst the Hills, Dales and Rivers of Sedbergh, which they were denied.

Continued form last month

I was introduced to my first pigkilling at Longholme. I can recall help coming from other farms, Mary Haygarth with set pot full of boiling water to shave all the hair off after the killing and catching the blood - the smell of the blood and guts was just too much for me and I was as sick as a dog for the rest of the day. The next day Mary came round with a dish of "chitterlins" and off I went again!

I continued my farming now with Jack Dinsdale and George his son and 'Mother' Dinsdale -I never did know her name, but she made the best bacon and duck egg pies I have ever had, made in the lib loaf tins and : the front' and arrived just in time. cut in large slices. Bob", he said and we went down to the bottom fields near New Bridge and we felled an ash tree, cut it into two large trunks, on to the horse and cart, down to Ernie Mason at Rash Mill where he cut it into planks, then we carted it all the way back to the joiner's shop up Garsdale Jack Handley 'Banks', who cut into the size strips of car inner tube - no hedge to make gates which is just the right size for a sledge, got some bed-lats off the tip on Langstone Fell and the sledge was ready for the next snowfall. This was the winter of 1944/45 and on the lots on top of the fell a lot of sheep died in drifts and I became quite an expert at picking up the smell of dead sheep.

As winter moved into spring the

sheep were brought down off the fell for lambing and we had to go looking for strays and retrieve any who had wandered onto our 'lot'. The land directly in line with Dinsdales over in Dentdale was Hartleys' at Shoolbred Farm and you were always made very welcome there with tea and scones etc.

With the arrival of Sylvia we now had a pram, one of those with the false bottom, lift the baby out and the mattress, and you found that the panels underneath lifted out and in went all the shopping from Sedbergh. I can't remember how many times Mum and I, Phyllis and Keith walked down to Sedbergh, Sylvia in the pram, groceries underneath and off we went, a round trip of about 8 miles!

Jim Pratt and his brother had a mobile shop that called about once a week with certain 'vitals', but they didn't have the choice that Metcalfes and Edmondsons had, and Metcalfes did make nice bread!

I have continued to raise the profile of the issue in Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale. Last week I made what was in effect my maiden speech on the county council upon the subject. Though I say so myself my words were well received and we now have the good wishes of virtually all county councillors behind us in our campaign: to prevent a repeat of the last two years. This will be important because it is the county which appoints



members to the police authority and it is the county as Highways Authority which has the power to regulate traffic and control encampments. I remain of the view that a general injunction against breaking fields will be a key to preventing the worst excesses.

HIGHWAYS ISSUES – There have been many complaints about two sections of road. One is the road to Kendal from Scotch Jeans over to Lilymere and the other is that to Kirkby Lonsdale from Casterton to Devil's Bridge. Both are scheduled to be repaired in the next three or four weeks. Those who have been using the Garsdale Road will see that there have been major and very expensive repairs where the road is slipping into the Clough next to Low Smithy.

We are nearing the end of the ten year County/Capita arrangement. Our Conservative group is giving serious thought as to what will succeed it. Certainly it will be very different — none of us would vote to continue the present scheme. I do listen to your many views about highways provision and have strong ideas myself as to what we need down here. Confidentiality prevents too much public discussion as yet but I hope the new ways of working will provide a much more useful service.





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

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FIRE SAFETY

A clean chimney is a safe chimney The autumn months are nearly upon: us, with rising fuel costs many home owners are reopening old fireplaces and using wood or coal to heat their homes.

Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service have seen a resulting increase in chimney fires. Regular sweeping could prevent the majority of these. Sweeping also reduces the risk of dangerous fume emissions that may be present if there is a blockage in the, chimney or flue.

"To keep the risk of fire to a minimum, it is vital that all flues and chimneys are maintained in good as important for appliances that use gas, as those that burn coal, wood or oil." said Station Manager Brian Steadman.

Modern chimney sweeping is an efficient and clean process that removes the build-up of soot and clears any obstructions such as birds' nests and leaves.

It is not just chimneys which bring extra risks with open fire but also the dangers posed by the fires themselves. If people take a few simple precautions they can make sure that they and their homes are safe.

So before you light up, think about the following:

- Chimneys using smokeless fuel or bituminous coal/oil should be swept at least once a year.
- Chimneys using wood, should be swept quarterly when in use
- Ensure a fireguard is in front of the fire at all times, spark guards can prevent a serious property fire.
- Extinguish the fire before going to bed or leaving the house
- Do not light fires using flammable liquids such as petrol or paraffin.
- Do not burn paper or rubbish on fires in the grate
- Have your attic checked occasionally when the fire is alight, checking for smoke from cracks, defective brickwork or mortar joints.

"A fire in the home can be devastating, but ensuring that chimneys and flues are well working order at all times," This is just imaintained greatly reduces this risk, It is easy to forget about getting chimneys and flues swept because you can't see when it needs doing. but ensuring that this is done every year will help you to stay safe," said Station Manager Steadman.

The plan is for this group to have a distinct identity, thus allowing the Chamber of : officers for next year are to be voted Trade to focus on more general business developmental topics.

Plans for the Chamber for the coming year include producing a new leaflet to promote Sedbergh and

pulling together a database of businesses in Sedbergh and district, classified by business type, to better target information and sharing of ideas of interest. We intend to develop contacts with Cumbria Chamber of Commerce and the Economic Development team at Cumbria County Council, especially with regard to European Policy Development, and initial contacts are already underway.

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AUGUST WEATHER

The weather obviously had an effect on the natural world. The swifts having moved South the swallows started to follow them mid month though in the latter part of the month passed through especially

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

As usual we will be uniting for

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

OCTOBER GARDENING

This month is the time when I begin my garden tidying in earnest. The first task is to prune back fruited canes of Blackberries and train in this season's growth. There are various cultivars of blackberry, some with thornless stems which make them easy to handle and less painful to harvest, and some with extra vigour and enormous fruits which give a heavy crop. I find both to be lacking in flavour and much prefer to cultivate a wild bramble. Blackberries grow extremely well if trained up through a hedge, planting the root underneath the hedge and training new canes along the top of the hedge (assuming it isn't too tall) and down over the sides. Evergreen hedges such as Leylandii and Yew make very good supports as they provide a neat solid framework and when grown on the south or west side of the hedge the canes produce an excellent crop of early fruits and take up no more space than the hedge itself. Hedge cutting can be left until after fruiting has finished and the old canes cut down to the ground. New canes are then carefully pulled to one side and the hedge trimmed around them.

I am giving my Autumn raspberries (cultivar 'Autumn Bliss') a last chance at fruiting under the normal pruning regime but if the two previous years are anything to go by I will not expect a crop of any size. The canes came from a garden in Silverdale where they fruited very successfully. Our



Sedbergh growing season is a good 2 – 3 weeks later than that balmy corner of Lancashire, and so far it hasn't been warm for long enough to allow the canes to mature and fruit. It seems a shame to dig the whole lot out so I may see how they perform if pruned conventionally - in mid or perhaps late summer. Gardening always gives plenty of scope for experimenting and if I have a bad year for a particular crop this year, I always look forward to trying again with a new method in the next growing season. Who knows. It may actually work next time.

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EXIT THE EU NOW!

The French 'founding father' of the EU said "The nations of Europe should be led towards union without their people understanding what is happening; each stop disguised as having an economic purpose, but which will inevitably and irrevocably lead to federation".

Former French President Mitterand told his confidant Magoudi "I will take

my revenge on the English upstarts. I will destroy their beloved island by linking it with Europe" Magoudi let the cat out of the bag.

By agreement with the Lib-Lab-Con UK politicians, none of whom will allow a vote on EU exit, Britain is being taken over step by stealthy step. Under the pretence of trade advantages, UK politicians have agreed to the UK to be taken over.

National governments of EU member countries will be abolished. In England's case, Westminster parliament and government will be replaced by John Prescott's Regional Assemblies which will take instructions from Brussels. On the latest EU maps England has disappeared!

The latest estimate on the cost of EU membership to the UK is over £100 billion per year, an average of over £1,768 for each citizen; money form the EU is only a fraction of the total cost to the UK. The trade deficit with the EU is over £40 billion a year.

Apart from the UK independence party none of the British politicians will allow a vote on EU exit. The agreements they have made with the EU are illegal and treason. Only the UK electorate hold power to assign sovereignty and independence to a foreign entity.

St ANDREW'S PARISH CHURCH **DENT**

The displaced congregation of St. Andrew's, Dent, are back in their own : church.

We are grateful to our neighbouring churches of Sedbergh, Howgill, Killington, Thornton-in-Lonsdale, and our fellow parishioners at St. John's, Cowaill, for inviting us to worship with them while our church has been undergoing major restoration and repairs. We held our first Sunday service in our newly weather-proofed church at the end of July.

The scaffolding came down in the second week of August revealing a pristine-looking church dominating the village. The main contractor cleared the site in the third week of August. The locals and especially Dent Stores miss the diligent and

skilful workmen who always had a cheerful greeting, - at least at ground level, even in the worst weather that Dent could throw at them.

The floor has yet to be scoured and waxed, better lighting over the choir stalls and the sanctuary to be installed, and soon, we hope, the organ has to be rebuilt. Harrison & Harrison of Durham have had parts of the instrument at their workshops for renovation. They have the patronage of grant-giving bodies. advised us they require six weeks to rebuild the organ as atmospheric sensitive parts have to become acclimatised again to their old home before the organ can be re-tuned. Grants and donations allowing, we expect the organ to be in place and in :

fine tune before Christmas.

Phase 2 of the restoration project will not be started until well into 2010. All the rotten timbers have been taken out of the tower. For the time being the tower is void of any fittings. Before the bells can be hung and the chiming tower clock re-installed an internal staircase has to be built to the top of tower, a new bell ringers' floor and clock floor built, and a new metal bell frame fixed. In addition some works specified in Phase 1 had to be postponed to Phase 2 to meet the costs of taking down and rebuilding the top crenelated section of the tower. This was in a dangerous condition but it had not been apparent until the scaffolding had been erected to the top of the tower. The postponed works comprise renewing the bier room

> roof, re-pointing the south wall, and re-roofing and fitting gutters and downspouts to the porch. It is as well that Whitechapel Bell Foundry cannot work on our bells

until next year. It gives the PCC's Appeals Committee a breathing space to raise the funds for Phase 2.

Completing all the works in Phase 2 depends entirely on the generosity of worshippers, supporters, visitors, and On completion of Phase 2 we will celebrate by ringing a full peel of bells. Will we be able to do this by Christmastide next year?

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Progress on missing link of the Pennine Bridleway

Work is progressing on the latest phase of improvements to the

Pennine Bridleway National Trail in the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

The Pennine Bridleway is a new National Trail in the north of England, designed specifically for horse riders, mountain bikers and walkers to enjoy.

This latest phase of work by the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) and Natural England will contribute to the 200 miles of bridleway running from Derbyshire through Yorkshire to Cumbria.

During this major work at Garsdale Station towards the northern border of the National Park, about 3.5 miles of track will be developed along existing and newly created public rights of way, drainage will be installed with minimal disturbance to the surrounding vegetation and landscape. This new section will be finished to recognised National Trail standards and suitable for horse riders, mountain bikers and walkers.

By March 2010 the National Park Authority hopes to have 97 per cent of the route completed, with the remaining three per cent to be finished in 2011.

The Pennine Bridleway project is now actively seeking new accommodation providers along its route for humans and horses. There will be a Business Workshop in November to provide more detailed information.



YI JIN JING

On Tuesday, 6th October at 7.30 pm at the URC Hall, Joss Lane I shall be holding my first T'ai Chi Qigong class of the Autumn Term. I look forward to welcoming back those students who have been training with me for some time (in some cases several years) as well as those who would like to begin learning and practising the Chinese Internal Arts. Everyone is most welcome whatever your level of expertise. The classes last for 90 minutes and the cost is £24 for four weeks. An initial taster session will cost £5.

Over the years we have covered and learned many different Qigong sets (including the Yang Style 18 part : This was taught to me by Master

Set, the B.K.Frantzis Energy Gates Set, the Ten Phases of Qi Cultivation, the Eight Brocades, the basics of the Yiquan system as taught by Wang Xiang Zhai, and different parts of the Cheng Man Ch'ing T'ai Chi Form). I have also taught to some students elements of the Xingviguan and Baguazhang systems. Throughout this I have been ably assisted by Andi Chapple who has been training with me now for seven years and who is developing into a very skilled teacher in his own right.

This term I shall be concentrating on teaching the Yi Jin Jing which roughly means: The Classical Routine for Stretching the Muscles and Tendons.

Faye Yip who is the daughter of Professor Li Deyin (designated by the Chinese government as one of the one hundred "martial arts treasures of China"). It contains twelve different Forms and is relatively quick and easy to learn and very deep-reaching in its effects. It is one of the oldest sets in the Qigong canon and traces its origins to the Indian Buddhist monk Bodhidharma (Ta Mo) who is reputed to have introduced it to the



Shaolin Temple in China in 526 CE. The Yi Jin Jing features extended, soft and even movements of the body, and places emphasis on the turning and flexing of the spine, thus invigorating the limbs and internal organs, and developing flexibility, balance, muscular strength and Qi (energy). Personally I find it very beneficial and one of the most effective sets I have ever practised. If you would like to begin to learn



these Chinese Martial and Healing Arts but can't make Tuesday evenings then please give me a call (Sedbergh 20648) to discuss other possibilities. Alternatively you might care to attend June Parker's Wild Goose Qigong class on a Monday morning (see her advert in the September issue). As well as being an Acupuncturist, June is an extremely accomplished Qigong teacher who specialises in the Wild Goose Form.


and there were less visitors than we had hoped might enjoy the wonderful creations, we nevertheless raised £3,000 from the sale of programmes and refreshments.

Society continues to collect the memories of folk in our area, a precious record for years to come. These recordings are transcribed and put on computer disc, so people can listen to the voices while reading the interviews on screen. We owe Mark and Evelyn Westwood grateful thanks for finding space for it at their ever-expanding businesses over the past two years. Now the Sedbergh and District History Society have kindly offered to share their room at the Community Offices, where people can enjoy the archive at their leisure. We have also been able to purchase new up-todate equipment as the result of a generous grant from Cumbria County Council Community Unity, for which

we are most grateful.

This month's excerpt comes from an interview with the late Mr Jack Middleton. Jack farmed in Dentdale but by the time I met him he was long retired, and living in Sedbergh. He and his wife Eva recalled their farming days. When October came round, it was time to say goodbye to the family pig.

Interviewer: Did you keep pigs?

Jack: Only two for bacon you know,
no we didn't breed any pigs, we used
to buy 'em in the spring, usually at
Dent Fair Day we bought two pigs
and we'd bring 'em back. There was
a lad used to come with pigs in a
motor, we used to buy them off him,
fatten 'em and kill 'em.

The Dent and Sedbergh Oral History Interviewer: What time of year would Society continues to collect the vou kill them?

Jack: Oh you'd always to kill 'em with an 'r' in the month, hadn't you? October you could start, I reckon it was a bit early, September. If you didn't kill 'em with 'r' in the month there was bluebottles about and they'd strike yer maggots....And you used to kill 'em yourself, like, you know. Aye he was a butcher, mi Father, he used to go round killing pigs. He just used to do pigs, and Matt Haygarth at Rivelin, he used to do it, oh and Jack Akrigg as well. Interviewer: Everybody kept a pig so I suppose there was quite a demand for butching them? Jack: Oh yes everybody had pigs.

You couldn't do without a pig. They said if you'd a dead pig in t'house and a wick wife you were alright for winter (laughter).

CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

Local Reserves

Burns Beck Moss Nature Reserve is WSW of Killington Village. It is the site of an infilled tarn dating from the ice age, and has been noted for its nature conservation interest since the 1950s when it was first designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest. It is situated in a shallow valley formed by Burns Beck, a minor tributary of the Lune, which flows north through the middle of the reserve, The moss comprises three raised mire bodies that are dependent on rainfall for moisture, and two valley mire bodies that are influenced by the ground water flowing into them. Raised and valley mires rarely occur together on the same site and only a small number of Cumbrian sites, near Torver and Winster, are similar to Burns Beck Moss in this way. Between the raised mires are mineral rich flushes where water enters the site and modifies the vegetation present. Other habitats are also present including unimproved grassland, and patches of willow carr and reed bed.

A range of conditions was created on the moss surface by peat cutting. This has led to the development of a chequerboard of 32 vegetation communities, an uncommon diversity for a mire site.

Sixteen species of bog moss (Sphagnum) have been found here: possibly a record number for a Cumbrian mire.

Bog plants which can be found at Burns Beck Moss include ling, cross

leaved heath, bog myrtle, bog asphodel, cranberry, crowberry, bog rosemary, cotton grass and sundew.

The undisturbed wild nature of Burns Beck Moss provides a habitat for many animal species. Fox, hare, roe deer, tawny owl, snipe, reed bunting and heron are frequently seen.

In summer, migrant or breeding birds such as curlew, sedge warbler, willow warbler, grasshopper warbler, meadow pipit and whinchat may also be encountered, as well as common lizard, frogs and drinker moths.

Green hairstreak, small pearlbordered fritillary and small heath are a few of the butterflies to be seen. Rare visitors have included the ringlet butterfly and dark green fritilary

Recent management work has included insertion of weirs to retain the necessary level of water and subsequent improvements to the boardwalks.

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SLOVENIAN PUPPET THEATRE IN SEDBERGH

The American folk singer Woody Guthrie once said: "Anyone can be complicated but it takes a genius to achieve simplicity."

I couldn't help but think about this when watching the Slovenian puppet theatre which visited Sedbergh in late August with a compact fusion of stories about the fingers on your hand, a walk down a fairytale lane to the sea, and a mouse who was given a nose so she could be become better acquainted with her audience. And audience participation with some of the kids doing a small performance for the first time in their lives.

Beautifully presented by two of Slovenia's leading puppeteers - Igor and Jelena Cvetko (Jelena is the director of the National Slovenian Puppet theatre in Ljubljana) the show captivated children in Sedbergh and several other parts of Britain with it's mixture of children's theatre and puppetry.

A common question when introducing them to friends was: "Are your puppets glove puppets or marionettes?" To which their reply was: "neither." They use hand held models resembling the fingers and a ball which grows into a mouse when ears and a nose are found. I didn't hear any complaints but I did feel relieved they didn't do the excellent but somewhat avant garde show we saw in Ljubljana which involved only buttons.

Earlier in the year we arranged that we would pay their expenses

including flights - then set about setting up shows which might help pay the bills. As they were flying to Stansted it made sense to include the nearby Huntingdonshire village of St Ives (twinned with Medvode in Slovenia) and this included an evening with the twinners exchanging ideas for future joint projects - and them singing the praises of Sedbergh's legendary twinning efforts.

Other shows between Stansted and Sedbergh included Cambridge near where they stayed with my brother (which included a punting expedition), Newark near Nottingham twinned with Ljubljana, Robin Hoods Bay and the Whitby folk festival, Borrowdale,

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e-mail: admin@cumbriacomputersystems.co.uk www.cumbriacomputersystems.co.uk Ambleside, the Sick Children's hospital in Edinburgh (where we stayed at the Slovenian consulate,) the Kendal Mintfest street festival (with many thanks to my neighbour Mick Hoff for lending us his small marquee to use in the pouring rain), and after a trip across on the Ullswater steamer: Martindale.

Most of our venues had less to do with where we might profitably raise some funds and more to do with showing off some of my favourite places and events in Britain.

Jelena told us how they had been to England several times before though mostly to visit the permanent puppet theatre in London - where they had been told it was the only one in the country. After explaining to them that most people in the south of England view anywhere north of Watford as a kind of cultural desert, I took them to meet the puppeteers at the Upfront Puppet Theatre near Penrith where we talked about future tours of Northern puppeteers to Sedbergh and Slovenia. And then later to see the very lavish and Victorian theatre in Biggar just over the border into Scotland.

Saturday was of course the highlight of our tour with a show in Sedbergh Library for which we are indebted to Doone and the library staff for their help. The room was packed with parents and grandparents and a floor full of pre-school children and babies, with my 2½ year old Anika opening the door for the audience as they arrived.

It was a packed tour with many excellent performances and visits to some of Britain's more beautiful corners - but for me what I liked most was when they met people by chance who already knew them from other twinning events: like George Handley who Igor had stayed with five years ago when he came with the Zrece singing farmers. Or singers like Emma Aylette and Jan Harrison who had met him at our concert in Rogla when our group had toured Slovenia in 2006. Or the Quakers at Brigflatts where Igor's translation into Slovenian is still the mostly widely used introduction.

I love that sense of a world made smaller by friendship and cooperation. David Burbidge

help with the issue of the planned closure of Baliol School. There are few communities that would be as welcoming to a school like Baliol as Sedbergh has been and losing this connection would be tragic for the boys who attend the school. To say nothing of the 30 odd jobs that the school provides to the town. I have written to both North Yorkshire and Cumbria County Councils to suggest a way through. Cumbria currently has no provision for children with behavioural or emotional difficulties and has indeed sent a few boys to Baliol over the years, so it seems sensible for them to see North Yorkshire's plans as an opportunity to take over the facilities in Sedbergh and open their own school. Especially given that specialist state schools appear to be able to provide education at half the cost of private schools. I await their response.

My meeting with the Chief Constable of Cumbria to discuss the policing of events around the Appleby Fair has been moved back at his request. We were offered the option of meeting with his deputy but decided that the best idea was to wait until we could meet with the top man.

Even though Parliament is, still, in recess I am keeping up the pressure on Hilary Benn, the Defra Minister, over a

number of issues. The most recent I remain determined to do all I can to has been his department's review of the Rural Payments Agency. Clearly in these times when we are all having to watch our spending, to have a Government Agency that has cost us £75 million in fines to the EU because of the chaotic way it has handled making payments to farmers is unacceptable. I have called on the Minister to ensure that every aspect of how the agency works is examined to ensure that we are all getting much better value for money than we have received to date.

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AGE CONCERN

launches the Big Response!

Age Concern South Lakeland has welcomed the publication of *Shaping the Future of Care Together* – the Green Paper on the reform of adult care – and has organised its own 'Big : Response' which will take place in October. This will give local older people an opportunity to take part in a discussion of the care system and put: Will the proposals add to the dignity their views direct to local MP Tim Farron.

The Green Paper was published in July and contains the Government's proposals for reforming the care and support system for older people in England, including a new National Care Service. The Government argues that increasing numbers of people will need care as the population ages and this will mean rising costs. It sets out five funding options for the future, ranging from everyone paying for care themselves to having care fully funded from taxes.

Sonia Mangan, Chief Officer of Age Concern South Lakeland said:

"We're delighted the Green Paper

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has finally been produced. We know from talking to older people that the care system badly needs reform and that financial investment in care services is a big issue. Those on moderate incomes who can afford to pay something towards the cost of their care are heavily penalised by the current means-tested system.

"But this is not just about money. and independence of older people and increase the choice and control they have over their own care? Will the proposals create a care and support system that is understandable, transparent and easy to deal with?"

Hugh Tomlinson Deputy Director of Age Concern South Lakeland said:

"Sadly, many people assume that their care will be free in retirement. But in fact it is estimated that older people spend more in paying for care out of their own money than the net spend by public authorities.

"We would like to get feedback from older people on the suggestions in the Green Paper. For example, do you agree that Attendance Allowance should be scrapped and the money put instead into the care system? (Attendance Allowance is a non means tested benefit awarded to help meet the costs of care and allow you to remain independent for longer) If you would like to take part in the Big Response, or to get your views heard in some other way, please do not hesitate to contact us".

The five funding options that the Government is considering are as follows:

Option 1: Pay for care yourself

You pay for your own care. The Government doesn't pay anything – even for the poorest.

Option 2: Partnership

The Government pays for part of your care, with you paying the rest. The amount you pay will vary depending on how well off you are and how much care you need, with the poorest getting care for free.

Option 3: Insurance

The Government pays a part of your increase in taxes.

care and then you have the option to take out an insurance policy to cover the cost of the rest.

Option 4: Comprehensive

When you retire, everyone except the poorest will pay around £20,000. You could pay in different ways - a lump sum, in instalments or after you die by using the money from the sale of your house. This would cover the costs of any care you may need in the future, except for accommodation costs if you need to go into a care home.

Option 5: Tax funded

The Government would pay all the costs of your care using money from taxation. This would require an increase in taxes.

Yes, we are unashamedly Italophiles - so we were looking forward to another visit. Not without justification. This was the ninth visit from Sedbergh - a tenth is planned for next May. It was certainly not the first for several of our twenty-three group members. Going to the Hotel Elma feels like going home or visiting friends in a familiar and beautiful setting. The usual warm words of welcome, accompanied by a wine buffet, awaited us when we arrived. after dark on September 2nd, at the end of a smooth flight from Newcastle.

Our first day was restful, to get the feel of the lovely spa town of Fiuggi with its health-giving waters and to sample the glorious sunshine, so wonderful; after our very disappointing English summer. In the morning of the second day, our private coach took us through the

If some of us had been before, that did not matter at all. St Benedict's Abbey, clinging to the rock-face on the edge of the deep gorge of the Aniene river, is an amazingly romantic place, lavishly decorated with frescos depicting the life of the Patron Saint of Europe who lived for several years in a cave there. It's an enchanting place with a rose garden once visited by Saint Francis of Asisi who grafted roses on to mountain thorns in memory of Benedict centuries before.

On the Saturday we had our usual Rome Day, which, this time, included a trip to Ostia Antica, the ancient port of Rome near the mouth of the Tiber. Some say the excavated ruins here are "better than Pompeii". Certainly we spent a fascinating morning walking round the ancient gyms, baths, shops, villas, bars and offices of a town which was at its height when Christ Himself was walking around The Holy Land. After lunch we entered Rome along broad avenues built by Mussolini, looked at the stunning facade of the largest church in the world, St Peter's, and made a stop at The Colosseum where our guide told us something of its fascinating history. Before leaving the Eternal City, we each had the chance to throw a coin over the left shoulder to ensure a return to the Trevi Fountain.

One real highlight of the week was an open-air concert on the Sunday evening at which two young artists - a fine tenor and a soprano who had recently sung with Andrea Bocelli in

Rome - gave a recital of well-known operatic arias and lovely Neopolitan songs, specifically for us. It brought a tear to many an eye.

Monday evening's treat - following a morning visit to the hill-top City of the Popes, Anagni, and an early evening guided stroll through medieval Fiuggi - was the obligatory Pizza Margarita (preceded by salami and bruschetta and followed by tiramisu) at the Irish Pub in the town, by courtesy of Pierluigi's friend, Mauro.

As usual we had our morning sessions devoted to Italian Life and Literature. On Tuesday, a well-known Italian local historian, Daniele Baldessare, enthralled us with stories autumn and winter might bring. of primitive times in the wild area

where we were staying, and of the specially wonderful polygonal walls made of such large stones that Mythology claims they were built by one-eyed giants known as the Cyclopes. That afternoon we were walking beside these ancient walls.

Anyone looking for a holiday with a purpose would find it in this wonderful area of Italy. Our stay was not only cultural and educational; we also enjoyed superb Italian food accompanied by local wines made from sun-drenched grapes on nearby hillsides. We came back to England refreshed and invigorated, fired up with enthusiasm to face whatever



Always use the door bar when


- answering the door.

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
