

SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL

The latest council meeting was held on Thursday 24th September at the People's Hall.

The following matters arising from the minutes were discussed:

Tennis Courts – No real progress here. The council will take professional advice before a formal response is given to SLDC. However it has been confirmed that the site is no longer being considered by YDNPA for housing.

The following planning issues were discussed:

Applications:-

Re-occupation of former dwelling to

provide one local occupancy dwellinghouse at Howgill Head, Howgill – Recommend that, if approved, consideration be given to severely restricting subsequent development within the curtilage of the dwelling by means of a Section 106 Agreement/conditions.

Erection of rear conservatory at 24 Woodside Avenue, Sedbergh – No

Woodside Avenue, Sedbergh – No objections, in view of similar conservatories that have been built in close proximity.

Erection of first floor balcony to rear elevation at 12a Queens Drive, Sedbergh – *No objections*.

Re-roofing and extensions at Brier

Field, Howgill Lane, Sedbergh – No objections, but note the decreasing number of smaller dwellings within the local housing stock as a result of such developments.

COUNCILLORS CORNER

I am typing this on my notebook computer in a hotel room in Aghios Nicholaos on Crete – a last minute holiday after our third less than perfect summer in South Cumbria. By the way, thank you to everyone for for Phillip and Edwin, the applicants. their kind regards concerning my recent birthday.

WEST BANKS IN DENT - At the most recent Planning Committee meeting members agreed to grant permission for the re-occupation of a former house at West Banks. This is excellent news and as many of you know I have spent many tens if not hundreds of hours producing the historical analysis which proved absolutely the history of the property back to the marriage of Timothy Thistlethwaite in 1724 and his subsequent untimely death. The analysis was exceptionally complex but the result was certain. It has long been a concern of mine when

applicants were asked to prove the self-evident. On this occasion even when this was done the officers continued as if it had not been. This was truly shocking to me and extremely frustrating and expensive The property in question was substantially rebuilt with a sandstone flag roof by or for Timothy and his new bride at the time of their marriage. It contains many significant features from that date such as four openings for two and three light mullioned windows. The mullions have long gone. However the south wall is the most interesting and is a clear survival from the earlier cruck frame structure on the site. There are the remains of the open hearth fire with adjoining bread oven cavity and corbelled chimney with firehood supports. You can just about see the earlier masonry line associated with the earlier building. What was

particularly important for me was how the site related to dating information from prior to the rebuild such as two entries in the Court Roll for Dent for 1668, two very basic properties which did not feature on the subsequent Hearth Tax Returns. Were they semidetached and were they on this site? That is what historic research ought to be about. The property is well worth a visit, next year's History Society Summer Programme perhaps?

CHAPEL HOUSE CASTERTON – Just before I came on holiday we had another very important planning verdict in Casterton parish. This has clear implications for agricultural holdings within the SLDC planning

area and might conceivably be useful in the national park as well. I have been supporting the Wilman family in their appeal for an agricultural building on the site of their present polytunnel. I was surprised and disappointed by the original refusal and always advised that there was good reason to suppose that permission would be granted on appeal. After a site visit by the Inspector on the Monday his decision overturning SLDC's refusal came through on Thursday. I was genuinely surprised by the speed of this decision: I was also surprised by the completeness of the Inspector's rejection of the case provided by the council. It is clear that members of

It affects the credibility of the council and therefore it affects its ability to bring in public money from grant giving bodies at national and hopefully, soon to be abolished, regional level. Affordable Housing

At the October meeting, the parish council discussed the latest developments over affordable housing in Dentdale. Some time ago, YDNPA asked landowners if they had any land which they would be prepared to release as sites for affordable and local occupancy housing. A number of landowners in Dentdale responded to this call, and the National Park has now decided which ones should be looked at in more detail. Although it recommended that three sites in Dent, including the field above Ghyllside, should be investigated further, it did not do so for the field adjacent to Glebe Fold. As earlier this year both the Bradford diocese and Two Castles Housing Association were proposing to apply for outline planning permission on this site, the parish council is very concerned about this, and unanimously agreed to press for it to be given further consideration.

Neighbourhood Watch

In the last month, a meeting of Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators identified who would cover which areas in the dale. CSO Karen Dakin, who called the meeting, is hoping that now received £2,000 in grants and additional volunteers will come forward to cover the gaps. Hawes Medical Practice

While most residents in Dentdale are registered with the GP practice in Sedbergh, a number of people use the Hawes medical practice instead. Each practice runs a regular forum to discuss issues with its local community, and Dent parish council is represented on both groups.

A meeting of the Hawes group at the end of September heard that Alpha Dental Services has been awarded the NHS Dentistry contract for Hawes, Leyburn & Bedale, though out of hours dentistry remains an issue. It also heard that the Friarage Hospital in Northallerton is likely to receive reduced funding in the near future as a result of the economic climate. However, there are no plans to cut services, and paediatric and obstetric services will be resumed at the hospital at the end of October.





the mildest mention of the EU prompts a response. So mentioning that the town twinners were applying for an EU grant got a full page feature about how we are net contributors to the EU. And a short piece about the European day of Languages (not The day of European languages John) prompted John Nile's 6 page diatribe.

Next month's Lookaround might well carry a story about Sandra Golding's recent poetry evening in St Andrews church: "There were excellent performances of poems by some of Sedbergh's best loved actors and several eulogies for the poets who wrote them." To which we can expect a response: "Does Mrs Golding and her EU-logists not realise that there is nothing logical about the EU...net contributors....England not on the map of Europe....etc. etc."

It is possible John that you believe that by using Sun newspaper stories





you will gain the populist vote. But if you want a really large following you should launch a campaign for independence from bankers. 

I attended guite a number of significant meetings this month. On the 9th October Sedbergh School hosted a meeting at Queens Hall to start the ball rolling on the brand new Sedbergh Parish Council Town Centre Initiative. Present were members of the great and the good including Tim Farron, MP, Sedbergh School Headmaster, and representatives from YDNPA, **Cumbria County Council Highways** Department, not to mention Parish Councillors and yours truly as an elected member of SLDC. The whole being ably chaired by the Parish Clerk, Colin Robertshaw. The impetus for this initiative arose from

The property next to the council depot on Guldrey Lane was given permission for change of use to residential after the developer wrote in the Lookaround that there was a desperate need amongst his own workforce for affordable housing. This permission was given some time before the downturn in the economy yet building work never started. This casts some doubt on the claim that there is a desperate need for housing for local people.

Young people are finding it very difficult to find work, particularly at the moment, and once employment land is lost, it is lost forever. It is short-sighted of both councils to consider residential use for this site. It would be better to encourage development of work-live units and create more enterprise in the town. 'Affordable' is still not affordable if you have no job and cannot afford a mortgage or the rent.

Without local employment opportunities Sedbergh will become a commuter town. That will have adverse consequences for the environment and the community.

MEN'S HEALTH

A study of over 40,000 Danish men over 40 years found that men with high sperm quality tend to live longer. On the support of danger to pedestrians from drivers, we come to the subject of the zebra crossings.


On Thursday 17th September we were standing at the zebra crossing as there was a white van coming and it drove straight across the crossing



The first of our winter meetings was rather thinly attended, but the advantage was that we were able to gather round and pay close attention to Diane Gainey, who demonstrated her way with skies and water in watercolour.

It's always interesting to see the different ways artists approach their work. Diane uses pans of colour, never tubes; she uses 300gm rough paper which won't crinkle when thoroughly wetted (expensive!), and she keeps to a limited palette of three "Country-side Feelgood Factor", on colours. So, having painted her sky, she used the same three colours to

paint whatever detail was needed --a castle, for example.

Diane had a special way of colourmixing ---- not too much mixing. This meant that during the actual painting process, on to wet paper, the colours began to disperse and separate. helped by the roughness of the paper. Since she worked flat on a board which she could lift and tilt, the total effect of all the fluidity was magical.

Diane also showed that ,after complete drying --in this case with a hairdryer--- she could rewet the picture to add another layer of paint. Her main brushes were a wide hake and a size 14 with a good point.

Two special tips----there's nothing like water to depict water, and plenty of ultramarine to mix with other colours.

Some of us who haven't yet come to terms with water-colour may be tempted to have a go at our Wednesday morning art group! We look forward to our next demonstration-----Frances Winder. 13th November.

SEDBERGH &DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

The society met on the 7th October for its first meeting of the new season. The talk was given by Katv Illife, the Archivist of Sedbergh School, on "Researching Family History". She said that there are three main places where information can be accessed by individuals. These are at record offices, local history societies and on-line.

There are also three main sources of information which are certificates. censuses and parish registers. Birth, marriage and death certificates were first issued in 1837 and give many details apart from the date of the

event. However, they may not exist for certain events in their early years. This was because of an initial opposition to what was seen as government intrusion in personal affairs, rather like the current opposition to ID cards. Censuses giving personal information date from 1841 and again give much useful information such as occupation, age, place of birth, other members of the family and anyone else living at the same address. Parish registers started in the mid sixteenth century but few still exist from that time. They record the dates of events the church was interested in which were baptism, burial and marriage.

Certificates, censuses and registers were compiled by someone who wrote down what they thought your ancestor had told them and if the latter were illiterate they had no way of checking that the entry was correct. Other useful sources of information are Post Office directories, business records, wills, gravestones and newspapers although reading through the latter is a very time consuming method.

Those that are able to research online have many web-sites available. It is best to start with official sites which give details of where information can be found and then go for a most interesting and informative on to other sites some of which are

free and others which require payment. Ordering copies of certificates through the pay sites is an expensive way of obtaining them as they can be bought much cheaper elsewhere. Because of their religious beliefs the Mormons research their ancestors and have published their findings on a web-site. These family trees and others produced by individuals can give much useful information but cannot be relied on to be correct. They must be checked out with the information you are able to obtain.



EU - BE HAPPY

Some have been vociferous in the pages of Lookaround recently, about the EU. People are divided on this, some see opportunity and others obviously regard it very much as a threat. But I thought it might help anyone who feels generally anti if I give some ideas as to how you can avoid contributing your own personal taxes to the EU.

Money paid into the EU pot comes from VAT, so if you minimise the purchase of things that are VATable, then lo! It won't be your money that's being used. Here are some suggestions:

- 1. Uncooked, unprocessed food is not subject to VAT. So do lots of home baking.
- 2. Books, newspapers and to France and buy your clothes there magazines can be read without worry, and you can watch the telly, but avoid being tempted by the ads. to France and buy your clothes there that way you'll have a nice day out, the clothes will almost certainly have been made in the Far East wherever
- 3. Almost everything about a car will you buy them, and the VAT on the attract VAT, so use public transport clothes will be paid to the EU by the there's no VAT on bus and train fares. French government not the British,
- 4. When you are away, stay in a B&B instead of a big hotel as the B&B is unlikely to be making enough money to be VAT-registered.
- 5. There's not really any way of avoiding paying VAT on cleaning amount paid by the UK to the EU, materials, so use them very sparingly.
- 6. Furniture and consumer goods (fridges etc) all have VAT on new, but if they are recycled, ie second hand, the amount of VAT will be zero or at most quite small.
- 7. Adult clothes have VAT on when new and you don't want to be

dressed all in hand-me-downs, so here's a trick: take an occasional trip to France and buy your clothes there; that way you'll have a nice day out, the clothes will almost certainly have been made in the Far East wherever you buy them, and the VAT on the clothes will be paid to the EU by the French government not the British, then you can come home singing: na na, na na na!

And before you say: there you are then, if we had no EU we wouldn't be burdened with VAT; not a hope, the amount paid by the UK to the EU, before we receive anything back in the way of rebate or subsidy, is round about just a fifth of the total money collected in VAT.

The PC is aware of a number of concerns relating to issues of vehicle speeds, the flow of through traffic, pedestrian safety and convenience, the condition of paths and pavements, residents' parking and access for disabled persons etc.

In response, the Council is considering the commissioning of a short report by an independent traffic consultancy which would examine opportunities for specific improvement schemes within the town. Such a report would be used to influence decisions on Highway Authority budgeting and to lobby for additional

Talks at Brigflatts

As part of Quaker Week in October Sybil Oldfield, Research Reader in English at the University of Sussex, gave two lively and erudite talks at Brigflatts. It was a privilege to have had the opportunity to hear them. The through two revolutions, Mrs Oldfield first was about the Kinder Transport through which thousands of Jewish children were brought out of Germany influenced by a Quaker background and Austria between Kristallnacht and and Quaker teachings. It was a the declaration of the Second World War. The Quakers were responsible for organising this and for finding homes for the children in this country. It is a story of deep compassion and of a tremendous feat of organisation. One of those children, Rita Winkler, found a home with Miss Bowman, the Warden at Brigflatts, from 1st September until 20th December 1939. She has written an account of her stay there, of being sent to the

National School and of making friends locally.

The second talk was about Thomas Paine, author of the Rights of Man. After a brief account of his extraordinary life and works, from Norfolk and several failed trades concentrated on whether, or how much, his thought and writings were compelling argument backed by interesting examples from Paine's own writings.

NOVEMBER GARDENING

As "British Summer Time" fades rapidly into the past and the days become markedly shorter and the gardens markedly scruffier, I begin to look forward to spring, and particularly to snowdrop time, and then daffodil and tulip time. Although snowdrop bulbs are still available for sale they are never very successful when planted from dry bulbs, so wait until spring to get them "in the green" and concentrate this month on shopping for bargain tulip bulbs instead.

November is the recommended month for tulip planting as the bulbs tend to wake up much later than snowdrop and Narcissus bulbs and planting at this time gives them less opportunity to rot in our damp soil before they begin to grow roots. There is something so attractive about the silkiness and vibrant colours of tulip flowers that I find them the most difficult type of spring bulb to resist. It is fortunate then, that I shop for tulip bulbs in the 21st and not the mid 17th century. At the height of their popularity some of the most popular bulbs fetched enormous sums of money or things. One, "The Viceroy" was sold for 1000lb cheese, 4 oxen, 8 pigs, 12 sheep, a bed and a suit of clothes. Many of the most popular tulips at the height of Tulipamania were those with "broken" flowers with petals of yellow, red or white, flamed or feathered with maroon or red markings. These markings are caused by virus infection, so it is quite 015396 20104

possible that the very special varieties had a very short life. I have certainly never come across "The Viceroy" in a modern catalogue. As it is, just about any other colour or species of tulip will suit me, although my all time favourites are 'Queen of the Night', (very dark maroon, almost black tulip) 'White Triumphator' (white "lily" flowered) and 'Abu Hassan' (deep mahogany with flame edge).

This month I have a photo kindly loaned by Gordon Braithwaite, brother of the infamous Sid. It shows a group of St John's Ambulance Brigade officers and cadets possibly en route for the annual inspection at Keswick.

It brought back fond memories for me of my time in the cadets. The trips : to Keswick - on the year before I went, Princess Margaret had inspected the cadets but for us it was Mr Johns the owner of Sedbergh Laundry. I expect he was a very nice man but not quite the same as royalty! The stops on Dunmail Raise where we were each given a bag of sandwiches and cakes and a bottle of pop to eat in the open air; one year it was so hot cadets were fainting everywhere and we were told we could sit down on the grass, I sat in a cow pat and had to stand with my

dress folded behind me, oh the shame! And the annual camps at Silloth where me met up with cadets from other towns and were looked after by Uncil Cyril Stephenson and Aunty Rose - they were later to get married. Uncle Cyril usually wore shorts with a tartan blanket wrapped around them which he said was a kilt. He was a very versatile man and entertained us with puppets and was also a skilled artist, I still have some of his water colours sent to me when he discovered my own love of painting. Sadly he died prematurely not long after his marriage.

And there were trips to the open days at Ghyllas when we helped serve ice cream and the older boys gave demonstrations of first aid around the pond, it was there I saw my first Meconopsis - huge sky blue poppies. Classes were held weekly in an upper room behind Bainbridge Road, we were taught by a lovely lady called Miss Sisson and after

each lesson we would all wait outside while she hid various coins, I can still recall the excitement of finding a threepenny bit. At the back of the room was a box of human bones known to us as Charlie. Lovely happy memories which I hope may bring back similar memories to some of our readers.

Back to the photo, the only person I recognised was Ruth Potter so I am hopeful that someone may be able to name them all, or at least some, I would imagine it was the late 1950s.

MICHAEL THORNELY

Michael Thornely was a man of extraordinary talent. He will be remembered in Sedbergh for his outstanding contribution to the life of Sedbergh School.

He was appointed in 1940 to the position of assistant master and soon began to make a name for himself as an inspiring teacher of French and brilliant musician who was able to pass on his passion for music and singing to generations of his pupils. During a teaching career of thirty five years many hundreds of boys benefited from his expertise and skill, developing a love of languages.

Michael was also a wonderful director of drama productions

particularly Shakespeare and his own speciality Gilbert and Sullivan operas. These performances are remembered by many of his former pupils with pride and affection. Michael's influence took the school's drama and music to new heights. In 1954 Michael was appointed Headmaster of Sedbergh in succession to J.H.Bruce-Lockhart at the astonishingly young age of thirty five. He and Jennifer, his young wife, were now responsible for the running of a large school with all the attendant problems. In those days the Headmaster was also Housemaster of School House with twenty four hour responsibility for sixty resident boys. The combination was a truly

prodigious task. Despite these additional responsibilities he presided. There was no better public speaker in over the affairs of the school as Headmaster for the next twenty one years.

During this period staff and boys were able to witness his extraordinary ability to guide the community through the changing educational scenes of the 60s and 70s. He showed outstanding judgment, wisdom, leadership and integrity. He had a masterful sense of humour and a penetrating wit. All decisions were made with compassion and were often tempered with an amusing conclusion. Michael possessed a remarkable ability to cut through the irrelevancies of 'educational jargon'

and get to the points that mattered. the land and even on his 90th birthday he delivered a witty and erudite speech packed with amusing anecdotes. He was a master raconteur who possessed the actor's skill in delivering the punch line to perfection.

During his tenure as Headmaster Michael ,with his wife Jennifer and their young family of four children, met and entertained numerous wellknown national figures including peers of the realm, archbishops, generals and leaders of industry and the professions ,many of whom became personal friends. He excelled at entertaining men and women

whose fame enhanced the status of the school. No headmaster has done more to enlist the support of such people in the work of the school. One excellent example of this was Michael's relationship with Brendan Bracken, a member of Churchill's cabinet, who was appointed chairman of the governors .As a result of this relationship Brendan Bracken became a major benefactor to the school.

To compensate for the long hours and the burdens of responsibility, Michael was able to relax and enjoy his interest in photography and passion for music and he was never happier than with a rod in his hand fly

an excellent knowledge of the Lake District and loved the countryside. In winter he would be one of the first to put on his skates and practice his skills on the ice.

After retirement in 1975 Michael was for three years Chairman of The Francis C Scott Charitable Trust and took over the management the Old Boys Society during which period he was able to catch up with many of the pupils who had passed through his hands and were now in positions of authority in many spheres, including the services, the judiciary and the world of commerce. He was held by all who knew him with respect and affection. He enjoyed a family life with fishing on some lake or river. He had is his devoted wife Jennifer and children

Richard, Charles, Elizabeth and Jacqueline. In later years too he took pride in the achievements of his grandchildren.

Michael was well-known in the community. He was an enthusiastic and talented performer in local amateur dramatic productions and played the organ in the parish church for many years. As an elder statesman he was revered and admired and his advice was regularly sought by those around him. He never lost that twinkle in his eye and the humorous turn of phrase. He had Headmasters. a real concern for courtesy in all human relationships and he had time Rugby School and was an organ for everyone. Michael Thornely was a scholar at Trinity Hall, Cambridge. towering figure in the long history of




