



I have now got more detail on costs etc. for this trip.

The 4 star Hotel Smogavc in Zreče has offered us heavily discounted prices for Bed and Breakfast as follows; Double Room 27€ per person, Triple Room 23€ per person, Children under 14 20€ each. Dinner 10.00€ Tourist Tax 1.50€ per person per night. Swimming pools in Terme Spa (150m away) 7.50€. All sorts of treatments, saunas etc. are also available there. (Ask Garth!) At the moment return flights with Jet2 from Manchester to Venice (Marco Polo) are £176 each inclusive at group rate at the time of writing.

On top of this we would need transfer either way Venice/Zreče. At the moment Tadeja at the TIC there has priced it at around 64€ return. I haven't priced transport at this end yet.

DENT PARISH COUNCIL

The March meeting started with the three-monthly visit from the police, and discussed the council's liability for VAT on the car park charges as well as two draft reports from the National Park about conservation areas. As usual, the council's minutes are published on www. dentdale.com (follow the parish council link) and a paper copy can be obtained on request for a nominal fee.

Dent Conservation Area

The meeting agreed the council's response to the final version of the appraisal of the Dent Conservation Area, which the National Park had

parish council supported the proposed boundary changes to the conservation area and was encouraged by the expressed view that conservation is about helping to manage change rather than trying to prevent it. However, the council also felt that the report was vague about which agency should take the lead in implementing its recommendations, and asked the National Park to clarify this. The council also received the draft appraisal of the Settle Carlisle Railway Conservation Area, which published for public consultation. The makes some recommendations that



Dent's street lights are getting increasingly unreliable as they get older, and so the March meeting agreed to obtain estimates for gradually replacing the existing stock with better quality fittings more in keeping with the village. VAT on Car Park Charges

Like everywhere else, Dent is affected by events beyond its boundaries. Over the last few years, a parish council on the Isle of Wight has been in dispute with HMRC over whether it should pay VAT on the income from its car park. Having gone through the courts in this country, the case then went to the European court, and though the matter is not finally resolved, it looks extremely likely that HMRC will win. This has implications for Dent, because if the Isle of Wight parish council loses, all car parks run by parish councils will be liable for VAT. In order to avoid having to pay penalties, most councils are now paying the VAT but at the same time registering a claim for repayment should the court case be resolved in their favour. At the March meeting. members decided to adopt the same approach for the Dent car park takings.

Suspicious Visitors CSO Karen Dakin and PC John Orr came to the March meeting to report



on recent police matters. In addition to thefts of farm gates and a farm trailer, two men had entered a couple of properties in Dent and tried unsuccessfully to do so at others. The police appealed for anyone to report any suspicious behaviour to them – they can be contacted on 0845 33 00 247.

SETTLEBECK HIGH SCHOOL

Chair of Governors' letter

There have been many changes at Settlebeck this year as the school continues to improve the quality of education for our young students.

The introduction of vertical teaching allows students to learn at just the right pace for them. They are telling us that they are finding lessons much more interesting and challenging as a result. This change has been successfully introduced by the head and senior staff and supported by all teachers, who have had to adapt and change to maximise the opportunities this has created.

The recent report by the School Improvement Inspector

acknowledged that to implement this change alongside many other improvements has been a monumental task and reflects a complete change to traditional practices and existing structures for both staff and students. He also acknowledged that the concept is both excellent and forward thinking.

The same Inspector who visited the school recently to discuss the School Self-Evaluation form, which gives OfSTED grades to different aspects of the school's work, recommended that the school should be graded as'outstanding' for curriculum, care and guidance, and behaviour and 'good-to-outstanding' for leadership and management, and understanding




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and using data. This was a real affirmation of what the school has achieved recently, especially since the new OfSTED framework is even more challenging than in previous years.

The school continues to deliver very good GCSE result year on year and helps students across the whole ability range make very good progress. These results are well documented and available for anyone to see at the school. We don't often boast about academic results as these are often taken for granted. However, we were very proud of the awarding of High Performing School status last year, as recognition of the quality of our academic achievement. This is a national award, which is only available to schools who achieve a certain standard of GCSE results we are one of only a few schools locally who hold this.

Academic results are important and provide a relatively simple way to monitor progress and measure achievement. And our teachers are very good at teaching students and helping them to meet these targets. However I believe a truer measure of how a school performs and one that is harder to measure are things like student aspirations, confidence, motivation, self reliance, taking responsibility for learning and self esteem. This is where students at Settlebeck perform extremely well.

There is plenty of evidence that individual students, whatever their aptitude whether academic, creative, social or physical, have been given



the confidence, encouragement and support at Settlebeck to achieve and maximise their potential. There are many factors which make this difference but one important one is that Settlebeck students are encouraged to be individuals and respect that individuality in others. This self affirming quality, which is fostered by the culture at Settlebeck, has a huge impact on student personal development and ultimately their journey to lead successful lives and become valuable members of the wider community. This school culture is led by staff and supported by students. This is also supported by teachers providing truly individual

THE MOVEMENT OF QI

The concept of Qi is central to the practice of traditional acupuncture and the Chinese word Qi (pronounced "chee") can have several different translations into English, depending on context. In a medical context, you could think of it as being all movement and change in the body. Its functions are movement, transformation and defence against disease. Qi is said to flow in channels, sometimes called meridians, to all parts of the body. The flow of Qi can be influenced by stimulating certain points on these channels and these are the points used in acupuncture.

Modern research into these points have certain conductivity properties and stimulation of these points can cause changes in muscles, in blood chemistry and in the nervous system. No physical

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structure corresponding to the concepts has shown that acupuncture meridians has been found. However, every acupuncturist knows that stimulating points on the leg on a channel passing through the stomach can produce gurgling in that area. Needling points on channels passing through the nose can produce immediate clearing of the sinuses. The body responds to acupuncture stimulus in a way which is consistent with the map of the channels and acupuncture points.

> Perhaps the most relevant question is not whether Qi and the channel pathways exist, but whether the concepts of Qi and channels are useful in practice.

> A direct application can be found in the treatment of painful muscle and joint problems. Take, for example, sciatica: typically pain runs from the buttocks and down either the side or the back of the leg. In this model, the

pain is a result of obstruction of the flow of Qi in one or more channels (back channel or side channel according to the line of the pain). The first line of treatment would be to move the Qi and stimulate the circulation along the relevant channel. This would be followed down to the lower leg and the ankle to restore proper circulation in the whole of the leg.

A useful feature of the channels is that sensitive organs can be treated by using points on the relevant channels on the arms and legs. the heart, points on the leg and foot may treat the eyes, for example.

The concept of Qi can be useful in diagnosis. For example, if someone is can be addressed by the same often tired, we may say that there is insufficient Qi. This could be due, for example to poor digestion and absorption of nutrients or it could be

due to overtaxing the Qi by overworking. Alternatively, flow of Qi may be sluggish from insufficient exercise. In this way, an investigation of the cause of tiredness can point the way to a solution.

The scope of Chinese medicine is much wider than these few concepts. It takes into account how the organs of the body function and interact, how the body reacts to external conditions and to various types of food and drink. In my view, its greatest strength is the integration of the emotional and physical attributes of the body in a Points on the arm and hand may treat single model. It provides a description of the ways in which emotions arise in disease patterns so that emotional and physical aspects of a problem treatment method.

Not too much has changed since I last updated the good people of Sedbergh on how life is for our little man, and believe me that is a good thing.

We have had a few little ups and downs over the past year, but mostly we have managed to maintain Zak's version of normal.

I thank my lucky stars every single

day for having the good fortune to live in such a close knit community. Zak status, and I adore the fact that my wish for him to be recognised as 'just Zak' and not 'the poor little boy in the wheelchair' has been made a reality.

I'd like to take this opportunity to say the biggest, warmest, most heartfelt thank you, to all of the locals who went out of their way to help us raise the much needed funds for his wheelchair. It is amazing what people can do purely out of sheer kindness. From anonymous donations following a brief conversation on the bus from Kendal, to the mind blowing acts of, well quite possibly madness, where Luke Mellard and Thomas Gardner



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cycled the ridiculous distance from Lands end to John-o-Groats.... Jonathon Moore attempting to defeat the coast to coast route (hats off to that man for his persistence)....and the students of Settlebeck High School putting on a very successful junior disco .. all for a little boy who has so obviously touched the hearts of so many.

Zak, despite his ever growing list of diagnoses, had managed to remain a very healthy little boy. Christmas 2009 brought with it his very first chest infection (which, for nearly 3, is for so long). His consultant recently plotted his developmental age at 'sub we have left, so make sure it's not 3 months', but for those who know him, that's nothing we didn't already know.

His biggest battle, as always, is his epilepsy. It is proving to be a particularly troublesome.

He continues to have in the region of 20 to 30 seizures every day, most of which present as silly jumps and jerks, some, a little more worrying. They prevent him from learning anything new, and we have even seen him regress slightly as a result.

But we do not want to dwell on what he can not do. To live in the shadows of what should have been will only cloud what is becoming a very happy and hopeful future.

We look forward to having our house extended in the near future so that Zak will then have his own bed room and bath room down stairs, and I will be able to stop living in fear of dropping him on the stairs in the event of an unforeseen seizure or spasm. My back will certainly be grateful.

After 34 years of never wanting to be a driver, I am now learning to drive. It is something I have thought long and hard about, and feel that it's a case of now or never. I hope that this will open up many more doors for Zak and for all of us.

So 2010 is going to be a memorable year. Our aim as far as Zak is concerned is to make the most of every day, give him the same opportunities as every other 3 year old out there, and to make sure our amazing for any child to have avoided yesterdays are full of great memories. No one knows when yesterday is all MH wasted.

DISTRICT / GENERAL ELECTION CAMPAIGN:

By the time you read this we could be at the beginning of the General Election campaign – certainly the district election will be in full swing. including Sedbergh there was a significant number of new sites offered. A number of electors took fairly strong views on some of these. I had to keep a certain distance in order not to put myself in a position of pre-determination whilst at the same time putting forward the views of residents. It is now in the public domain that the sites offered adjoining Vicarage Lane were not supported by the working group but that on the corner opposite Rawthey Gardens was, as was the site to the west of the town. The site behind Long Lane and Maryfell was upon further consideration also removed from the list. The present list for all the towns and villages can be seen Starters

on the YDNP website and will be considered at the March meeting of the authority. The sites will then go out to public consultation - everything so far has been pre-consultation ! HARD CASES MAKE BAD LAWS:

One of the perversities of the possible extension to the Yorkshire Dales to include the Lune Valley parishes is that the places which are proposed probably do not want to be in but Kirkby Lonsdale possibly does. This is no surprise to me because I have seen that the difficulties with being in a National Park begin outwith the development boundary. I get very little casework from people living in Sedbergh Town but outside the town planning and other NPA matters are




much more to the fore. Dent PC currently has four disputes with YDNP and that is far from atypical.

The main problem is housing outside the development line. Usually this concerns a rural worker or else the re-occupation of a former dwelling house. Recently, there has been the case of a local person in Artengarthdale wanting to convert a barn into a dwelling with a local occupancy condition. This is simply not allowed by the YDNP Local Development Plan and it is exactly the situation which leads to the parroted phrase "hard cases make bad laws". The reality of course is exactly the converse - it is bad laws which lead to hard cases. The system of limiting housing to existing villages within existing development lines is one which is based upon the nucleated settlements of the south of England. It is quite inappropriate for dispersed valleys like Artengarthdale, upper Dentdale, Garsdale or Howgill. This is a matter which YDNP still And it is one of the reasons why I think places like Orton and Ravenstonedale should wake up and

APRIL GARDENING

Springtime, in deciduous woodlands, is a great time of growth and flowering. Plants which have been held back by cold winter air and soil temperatures have only a short time in which to bloom, before the leaves open on the trees, cutting out most of the light and making photosynthesis (the process using chlorophyll by which plants make their food) too inefficient to sustain growth. Some plants such as our native bluebell have extra chlorophyll, colouring their leaves a rich, bright green. Many have a bulb or rhizome in which food can be stored to provide for speedy growth in subsequent years.

There are many beautiful, hardy spring flowers which will thrive in our gardens in shade, under trees, and in many cases (due to our usually damp, cloudy summers)in open borders. Anemone nemerosa - the wood anemone - has various garden forms, A. nemerosa 'Robinsoniana' has large, pale lavender blue flowers and A.nemerosa 'Flore Pleno', double suggests they have 3 of everything white blooms. Anemone ranunculoides, from Europe has bright yellow flowers. *Hepatica nobilis* the easiest to grow. It has deep red, a close relative of these Anemones, bears rich blue blooms which usually appear before the kidney shaped, dark green leaves. For something more exotic, choose Uvularia grandiflora (Merrybells) which has nodding bell shaped pale yellow flowers on 10in stalks, or Jeffersonia dubia, a pale blue flowered beauty which has upward facing, cup-shaped beautiful, if transient spring show of flowers on slender stalks.



There are several species of Trillium which will do well in a moist leafmouldy soil. All as their name 3 leaves, 3 sepals and 3 petals to each flower. T. erectum is probably nodding flowers, whereas T. grandiflorum and T. ovatum are white, fading to pink. Add to these a few Trout Lilies. Pink Erythronium denscanis from Europe, E. revolutum and E. 'White Beauty' from N. America and E 'Pagoda' with pale lemon coloured petals and white marbled leaves and you have the recipe for a Elaine Horne colour.

We flew to South Africa early in December because Alan and Chris were returning to the UK for Christmas and we needed to 'overlap' for a few days. They showed us around – the sights of Cape Town, the shops in Hermanus where they have a home, how to avoid unwelcome visits from baboons, the Thandi Farm Kitchen (regular readers will remember that they have spent much time and energy there in the past), and the crèche in Lebanon Village.

When we arrived the outside had been painted by volunteers and the village children. Inside it was totally empty.

Keith and I set about planning the layout of the crèche, appointing a teacher, sorting through books, donated by people here in the UK crèche governors – oh and a bit of relaxing, reading and walking, enjoying the hot weather whilst watching snowploughs on Sky News as Great Britain experienced its worst weather for many years. We certainly picked the right year no to be here.

The pace stepped up when Alan and Chris returned. Services were connected – electricity, water and the septic tank were all connected. A friend built cots, baby changing facilities, storage units, and a work station. We went shopping for resources - tables and chairs, mattresses, plastic cups, plates, bowls, knives, forks and spoons, needed for 35 – 50 young children

including babies. The mattresses were so that the children, who are there from 6.45 am to 6.15 pm can have a sleep.

One Saturday in the middle of February we held an Open Day so the villagers could see what was on offer and register their children. By the end of the day we had signed up twenty six aged from three months to 5 years. Each parent was told by the teacher that they would be informed when their child could start since we had not yet been able to appoint Crèche Assistants.

Transport poses a real difficulty for many people in South Africa. There are few buses and no taxis. We were still working on ensuring that the teacher, who lives in the nearby town of Grabouw, could get to the crèche for 6.30 am. Alan pointed out that, despite the teacher's explanations, it was very possible that there would be Project is so important. These children brought to the crèche on the following Monday morning. And there were! The lift arranged for the teacher was late, so it was just as well that Alan and Chris had left



Hermanus before dawn to travel to the village to be there. At 6.30 a small boy, on his way to catch the bus to school, brought his even smaller sister to the crèche. Another child arrived a little later. Over the following few days there were five or six of them.

On Monday, 1st March – after we had returned to the UK and Pinfold Caravan Park - the Thandi Community Crèche, led by a teacher and three Crèche Assistants, opened its' doors to 35 small children and babies.

The aim is to provide the best possible care and learning environment for these children. encouraging the involvement of their parents and community. Their community has much to learn about the importance of their involvement and support. This is why the Crèche youngsters will learn that, working together, they can aspire to greater things.

Meanwhile it is true to say that the support of the many donors to the Thandi Friends Project has been absolutely crucial to the children of the Thandi Community Crèche.

I have already written to Cumbria Highways asking them to finish the job they have started.

The Cautley Residents' Action Group continue to impress me with their dedication, I was very pleased to 3 Chair their meeting to hear the plans of the police and the councils to prevent any repetition of the disgraceful behaviour we saw leading up to last year's Appleby Fair. This, together with the plans by the councils to introduce restrictions on parking on the verges and prevent encampments, should go a long way to sort out any problems this year but we will all have to remain vigilant to ensure that all of this works.

Finally, I had a lovely time at the Christian Aid Coffee morning at the URC Rooms. As is frequently the case at this type of events I enjoyed the chance to discuss an amazing range of issues, everything from Environmental Health to Afghanistan was brought up. Thanks to everyone






QUAKERS at BRIGFLATTS

FEBRUARY WEATHER

was a chilly month with half the nights which had pushed through before the below freezing and a minimum of to these minima every night was below freezing with a wind-chill low of 9F!! At the other end of the scale the cold spell showed in the maxima as again half the month the saw the highest temperature for the day only in the 30sF. The highest temperature was 47.1F at the end of the month. During the latter half of the month we had low pressure, below 29 inches of mercury, which is rather surprising as we normally have high pressure during cold spells in winter dragging winds from the continent in an easterly airstream. In fact we only had 5 days in which the maximum windspeed was from an easterly direction and a further 7 from a south westerly quarter. The snow fall resulted in a low precipitation being measured. At a total of 0.95 inches very dry for the time of year. No doubt we shall pay for it later.

With winter dragging on and low temperatures growth has been very

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limited. Sheep in particular have been Well winter seems loathe to let go! It keen to take all food offered. Daffodils turn of the year haven't progressed 19.8F. When you added the wind-chill imuch if at all. It wasn't until the end of the month that the snowdrops opened up significantly. In the latter half of the month there were signs of green on the honeysuckle and the earlier variety of hawthorn. Even the hazel catkins were in suspended development, no pun intended, due to the low temperatures. Whether the cold weather has driven our resident birds away, or many have succumbed to the cold, I am filling up the feeders less often. There have been some signs of activity. The rooks have visited their last year's nest site. I understand the ravens are back at their nest site locally with some extra company. Although the fox visits my chicken run regularly I haven't heard any barking displaying territory. Laying the hedges seems to have prevented the badgers getting into the field as the only signs I have seen have been in the lane. The owls are calling again so some must have managed to feed through the snow. During the few slightly warmer days during the last week a few specie crocus showed their colours. On the 27th of the month, the warmest day, the honeybees were licking up sap from a sycamore I had trimmed back. On a couple of the other warmer days they were out of the hives on cleansing flights. I understand that more colonies have been lost again, presumably due to the prolonged extreme low temperatures, as they all apparently had plenty of stores.

Women in a Man's World. 17th century villagers in the Upper Eden Valley

The Chairman of the Upper Eden History Society, Margaret Gowling gave the last talk of the season to the History Society. Her subject was about the lives of ordinary women who had very few legal rights but were expected to run the household, bring up the children, help on the farm, grow vegetables etc. They did not own the household equipment pots, pans, bedsteads, furniture and often their clothes. All belonged to their husbands including the dowry which they brought with them. Any property or land which a wife brought to the marriage could not revert to her on the death of her husband unless it was so willed. They had no financial control, were not able to hold positions in the church or manor or be appraisors but they could be executors.

Nevertheless they were able to calve out some sort of lives for themselves. Using wills and inventories Mrs Gowling drew a vivid picture of how women coped. She covered the area of Brough, Temple Sowerby and Kirkby Stephen and gave details of three women as examples- Agnes Stable who became a money lender, Elizabeth Storey and Agnes Sowerby who left a list of her clothes.

Women generally did not fare very well when their husbands died. They were allowed only a third of the value of removable goods and rarely got the house – if they were lucky they might get a room and a bedstead for their lifetimes. The lucky ones were better provided for and could be left livestock, produce from the farm, kitchen equipment including gridles, pans and kettles. In some cases wives could inherit customary tenancies.

Some widows managed to accumulate sufficient money to lend to their neighbours in need. Agnes Stable became a money lender and charged 3/6d in the £ per year interest!

Nevertheless everyone had to work hard and continually – it was a hard life!



Redevelopment News Well the plans are in! We sit back with our fingers crossed that they will be well received by the YDNP planners. They now have to be "validated". After which we will receive a big bill to pay.

One of the problems we have had to face in planning the redevelopment is that the People's Hall is built on the side of a hill. The "fall" of the land from the top entrance by Highfield Villas to the bottom corner of the car park alongside the football pitch is some 5 metres (17 feet). This is about half the distance Stirling Moss fell in his lift shaft, but quite far enough. This large change in height causes us problems in order to maintain suitable slopes for wheelchair users and to allow older people safe access to the Hall. Other problems are the vehicular access to the rear, where we will have a 2 metre change in level from the car park to the side doors. A hefty fifteen to one incline.

The change in elevation does have its advantages though, as it allows us to build a two storey annexe at the rear of the present building without intruding on the skyline. This should please the planners.

The fund raising group continues to ferret for funding bodies and it is quite surprising how additional ones emerge from the 'mist'. It may not seem like it, but much is quietly happening behind the scenes to prepare for the launch of our fundraising.

For our annual Chapel Anniversary service this year the right thing to do seemed to be to invite people to take part in a "Homespun" service and quite a number joined in with great enthusiasm choosing hymns and themselves, we sang along to a hymn on CD and listened to snippets read from the Minute Book. 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YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Breeding season appeal to dog owners

Dog owners are being asked to walk in the Yorkshire Dales National Park over the next five months.

The breeding season for wildlife and Park Centre staff are only too happy for farm animals is underway during this period and dogs can cause longterm damage if they are allowed to roam free, according to Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority Ranger Services Manager Alan Hulme. "The breeding season lasts until July 31 and it's a very sensitive time for domestic and wild animals, especially ground-nesting birds - for which the Dales are renowned," he said. "We hear dog owners say all the time that my dog never chases or attacks sheep and lambs - which unfortunately does happen – but what a lot of owners don't appreciate is that dogs can cause just as much harm unintentionally by keeping parents away from their young, which leaves eggs, fledglings and lambs

vulnerable.

"Dog owners are entitled to keep their pets off the lead on public paths but they must be under close control. However, to be on the safe side, we would urge them to keep their pets on a lead in an effort to reduce the risk of wildlife and farm animals being unintentionally disturbed at this crucial time.

'There are some simple rules under the Countryside Code that pet owners must remember, the most important being that, in most areas of open country and common land – known as 'access land' - you must keep your dog on a short lead between 1 keep their pets on the lead when they March and 31 July, and all year round near farm animals."

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT ART SOCIETY

On 12th March, the talk and demonstration by Frank Gordon was titled 'Picturing the Dales'. He began by introducing himself as a traditional painter who had enjoyed a thoroughgoing training in all the basics of drawing and painting, many of which are ignored these days.

He uses canvas for oil painting, and gave us the tip that if canvas gets dented, water spread on the back over the dent will remove it. To help the relationship of colours, he uses a coloured ground -- on this case, a 'dirty pink'.

He believes that the artist's job is to capture the essence of the scene by looking for rhythm and shape, exaggerate them, and focus on one particular aspect of the scene --- an enrichment of it through the artist's eyes.

His first rough undercoat establishes the main shapes and colours, which can then be worked on, preferably at the same level all over, to maintain a unity, rather than concentrating on one bit at a time.

It was pointed out that oil dries out very slowly, and should not be varnished for a year.

Last bit not least, we were advised not to put on every detail, to use suggestion, and leave some work for the viewer to do.

Our next meeting will be on 16th April in St. Andrew's church room at 7.30pm, when John Campbell's subject will be 'Mountains'. This is the meeting which had to be cancelled in January, and will be the last Friday one until the Autumn.

BOOKWORM

What I have been reading this month?

1. 'Lost voices from the Titanic - the definitive oral history' by Nick Barratt (history)

Everyone seems to have heard of the Titanic. It's loss on the 15 April 1912 in the North Atlantic became one of the most examined tragedies. Over 1500 people died after the ship, allegedly unsinkable, hit an iceberg on its maiden voyage. This account of

the disaster is told using mainly primary sources - letters , documents etc written by the people who designed, built, worked or travelled on the Titanic plus extracts from the subsequent inquiries. The last survivor (Millvina Dean) died in May 2009. I found it a balanced account of an event which still holds fascination today.

2. 'Wordsworth : a life in letters' by Juliet Barker (literature/biography)

This is the story of Wordsworth's life told in his own words(letters and diary entries) supplemented by extracts from those family and friends who knew him well. All stages of W's life are covered and his intense love of the Lake District shines throughout as does his love of his own family. I found it an excellent read over several weeks, uncluttered by author conjecture and a direct insight into an almost local man who is one of our greatest poets.

3.' Can any mother help me? ' by Jenna Bailey (non- fiction)

This book began life as a student

thesis based on an archived collection of magazines called the Cooperative Correspondence Club (CCC). This was a private magazine originating in 1930s by home based women attempting to alleviate boredom, loneliness and limitations in their roles as wives and mothers. The book gives glimpses into the personal lives of several of the contributors via their articles over a 50 year period in a pre internet/mobile phone world that is now quite hard to imagine.

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SEDBERGH & DISTRICT **HISTORY SOCIETY**

At the Society's penultimate meeting was organised. Twelve divisions of of the 1909-1910 season Dr Mike Winstanley gave a very interesting talk on a subject which deserves more publicity in local history circles, commonly known as the 'Edwardian' or 'New Domesday'. This was a huge property survey of the whole country which resulted from the Finance Act passed by Lloyd George's Government in 1910. Faced with critical problems of poverty in overcrowded cities and the depopulation and decay of much of the countryside, the Government saw this survey as a means of raising money by taxing landowners on the The new tax was to be known as the 'increment value duty' and was to be paid when a property was sold, or when a new lease was granted, or at the death of the owner. Mike pointed out that no other comparable national survey of land ownership or occupation had been conducted in recent centuries.



He proceeded to show us the extent of the survey by describing how it the country were identified and these were subdivided into districts. Sedbergh was in the West Yorkshire District. Hundreds of valuation officers were appointed and trained to carry out the survey. In each parish a description of every property, with its rateable value was entered into a book along with the name of the owner and, where relevant, the occupier. In addition, landowners had to complete a form and by the end of 1910, 10,500,000 of these had been issued. Properties were also identified on a large scale ordnance survey map by the number which appreciation of the value of their land. they had been given in the field book. Although there are some gaps, most of the material which accumulated during the survey has been deposited in County Record Offices and the National Archives at Kew.

The importance of all these records for local communities was then demonstrated by Mike as he gave examples of the kinds of information

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that they contained. He read entries about Blackwell House and Ingmire Hall from the valuation books to show how the interiors of some properties were recorded in considerable detail by the valuation officers. He also showed a map section of the Dent area with various properties identified by their allocated numbers and another of the centre of Sedbergh where the shops and their owners were named. He concluded by stressing that these resources provide a very useful tool for local historians by providing opportunities for local historians to reconstruct towns and villages. Findings about the patterns of ownership and tenancies that they reveal can be added can be linked with other sources such as directories, censuses, newspapers and council records. In his talk Mike clearly communicated his own interest in the subject and stimulated his audience to think about how the information that he had given might be followed up in the Society's own research. CHURCHES TOGETHER As we celebrate **Holy Week and Easter** this month, Churches Together are arranging a series of ecumenical events in Sedbergh to which all are invited to join to mark the significance of the season.

On **Maundy Thursday** evening [1 April] a united communion service will be held in Sedbergh Methodist Church at 7.30pm. This reminds us of the last supper eaten by Jesus and his disciples before he was betrayed and taken for trial, the meal which forms the basis for the tradition of communion services that have been an important element of most of the Christian church for nearly 2000 years.

Good Friday [2 April] is marked by a silent walk from New Street [10.00 am] to the United Reformed Church [URC] via Back Lane and the lych gate, following a carried cross. This reminds us that the Roman authorities used to make condemned prisoners, including Jesus, carry their own cross-pieces to the place of execution, rather like more recent stories of guards forcing prisoners to dig their own graves before they were shot. This is to be followed by a short act of worship in the open air, outside the URC [10.30 am] representing the crowds, and the disciples, standing at a distance and watching the death of Jesus.

Easter Day [4 April] will begin with a short 'Summit Sunrise Service' on the top of Winder beginning at 06.25am. Getting to the top is an individual responsibility. We suggest you allow

between 50 minutes and an hour and a half to make the ascent from Sedbergh, depending on your degree of fitness and choice of route. Please dress appropriately and wear walking boots or strong comfortable shoes. If you have any health problems please take them into account before committing yourself!!

APPLEBY FAIR 2010

A packed public meeting chaired by Tim Farron MP was held on Thursday 4 March 2010 in the People's Hall, Sedbergh with the Police, Cumbria County and SLDC officers making presentations of this year's proposed arrangements.

David Sheard (CCC) and Rob Kitchen (SLDC) said the councils would impose strict new highways controls along the length of Cautley Road to prevent a repeat of last year's inappropriate encampments while the travellers awaited permission to enter Eden. These would be published locally and throughout the traveller community. time windows for traveller arrivals and every community that is affected in departures are to be set out and enforced. These time windows would Fair. occupation of Cote Moor and Top Field, Appleby. The time windows would work back from the Fair dates, through the approved stopping sites, such as Cote Moor and outwards to regulated areas of Cautley, Sedbergh, Middleton, Barbon and Kirkby Lonsdale.

Very strict traffic regulation was envisaged with no waiting, no stopping Traffic Control Orders in place.

Assistant Chief Constable Jerry Graham, the designated Gold Commander, who will lead the policing operation for this year's fair. regretted the lack of control last year. He said: "In and around the fair last

year we got plaudits from local (Appleby) people saying it was a really good operation, but I think what we have done is pushed problems further south."

This year, he said, there would be "robust policing" in the areas south of the Fair as well.

"We have listened to the concerns of our communities following last year's event and from a policing perspective. Our approach to this year's fair will be different. Instead of planning for the event in the traditional north, south or west policing divisions, in the May/June period. Cumbria Constabulary will create a 'virtual' policing area to Mr Sheard further explained that strict ensure that we reach out to each and one way, shape or form by Appleby

be similar to those established for the : "This will mean we manage resources centrally so that our communities



receive the same high level of service – regardless of where you are in the county. Whether you live in South Lakeland or in Eden, you can expect to see a high-visibility policing presence and receive a proportionate policing response to concerns or issues surrounding the fair."

Chief Superintendent Sean Robinson, who had taken over Silver command of the area from CS Kennedy, said he would have eight designated officers to police from Devils Bridge to Rawthey Bridge working in shifts. He posed the question to the residents present whether they wished these officers to operate a temporary (stationary) police post, at say Straight Bridge, or

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be on mobile patrol.

An "on the ground" meeting was subsequently held on Thursday 11 March 2010, led by Rob Kitchen (SLDC) and PC Roly Earl (Appleby) with representatives from the local residents. A party of some nine people "toured" the route from Devils Bridge to Rawthey Bridge, allowing the representatives of the Police, CCC and SLDC to see the "ground" and to consider sensible and reasonable arrangements that would be possible and to understand residents concerns.

This group eventually ended up at Knott House for coffee to discuss the findings. These were that:

- Strict No Stopping, No Waiting Traffic Regulation Orders, from Devils Bridge to Rawthey Bridge, are to be issued.
- Any "mechanical" vehicles would not be permitted to be present in the area over night. This would mean horseboxes would have to return to their home base or move out of county.
- There was a hope that some landowners and farmers on the route will offer fields for rent under the management of the CCC/ SLDC.
- CCTV surveillance will be provided.

A "drop-in" meeting will be held in the People's Hall, Sedbergh at 5 - 8pm on Monday 26 April 2010. Police, Cumbria CC and SLDC officers will be present to answer your questions. Dr Gina Barney of CRAG

"Well, well, Tom and Bryan sitting supping, is farming getting easier? I've just popped in for a quick half, several calls to make yet".


"How's it going with you, Larry? See you've moved up on your wheels".


