#### SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL

The latest council meeting was held on Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> March, at the People's Hall. Full minutes can be read at the Community Office in Sedbergh.

The following is a summary of matters discussed:

- It was reported that we had had no further contact with SLDC regarding the proposed purchase of the Tennis Courts from them. However we remain optimistic that a deal can be done.
- An application for listing of the War Memorial has been submitted to English Heritage.
- Further meetings of the Local Area Partnership have been postponed until June in view of the forthcoming elections.

#### Planning

The meeting discussed a number of planning applications and there were

no objections to any. **Finance** 

Draft accounts for the year 2009-10 were presented which show a small deficit after providing a further £16,667 towards the Peoples Hall grant.

The budget for 2010-2011 was accepted and can be viewed with the minutes at the council offices at 72 Main Street

#### **Town Centre Initiative**

The first project board meeting has now taken place. The draft terms of reference and consultants brief were accepted and we are now looking to all our partner organisations to make a contribution towards the costs.

#### **TIC/Community Office**

Since the last meeting we have received confirmation from YDNPA that they will give time for the user group to look for funding to purchase the building. However at this stage there is no compromise on the asking price of £130,000. We are continuing to look for funding sources.

#### Grants

A grant of £500 was agreed towards the costs of Christmas lights.

#### **Queens Gardens**

It was agreed to accept a quote for improvement works which will be carried out shortly.

It was reported that English Heritage are to inspect the garden with a view to placing it on the historic gardens register.

#### **Football Field**

There was a discussion on the need to keep maintenance costs under control at the football field where

#### **CARLISLE - SETTLE RAILWAY**

Final phase of £100m Settle -Carlisle track renewal gets underway.

The Friends of the Settle Carlisle Line have welcomed the start of this year's track renewal campaign. This is now underway, with, 23 miles of old jointed track being replaced by new, continuously-welded track. This is the final stage of a 5-year programme by Network Rail costing £100m, and which will mean that the whole of the route will have been upgraded to modern standards.

This year almost all of the work is being done overnight, without disruption to the passenger service. A new track-replacement train is being used, operated by Balfour Beatty, which relays track in front of itself and can replace up to 600 yards of track per night. A total of 22 different sites, mainly but not exclusively north of Appleby, will be dealt with. The programme overall has included not just trackwork but also waterproofing viaducts and installing new signals to halve the headway between trains (effectively meaning twice as many trains can be run).

**COUNCILLOR KEVIN SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL:** As you will see elsewhere in this Lookaround at close of nominations there were twelve duly nominated candidates for the eleven seats on Sedbergh Parish Council. One candidate, Carole Nelson subsequently withdrew her nomination. Whilst I am extremely

sorry that she will not be joining us on the parish I think Carole acted for the greater good by obviating a fairly pointless election for 11 out of 12. If there had been say 16 or 18 candidates that would have been different. Sooner or later a casual vacancy will arise and I for one will bearing Carole's current selfless act in mind.

There will of course be changes of membership on the three parish councils in the Lookaround area. I look forward to working with all councillors both new and "re-elected". To those who have chosen not to stand again, I thank them for their service. In some cases that has involved hundreds if not thousands of hours acting for the greater good of our community.

**CUMBRIA COUNTY COUNCIL:** I don't think I mentioned the leader of council, Conservative Jim Buchanan since his appointment last June. He performed the role quietly with dignity and determination out of the media spotlight. That everyone agrees that Cumbria CC has had a renaissance is in no small part due to Jim's tenacity. He was recently diagnosed with a serious illness and sadly died

within the month. The Conservative Group has selected Eddie Martin as its new group leader and my close friend James Airey as his deputy. If everything goes as expected by the time you read this Eddie will be confirmed as leader of the county. He knows that he has a hard act to follow.

SHARED SERVICE DELIVERY -SOUTH LAKELAND AND EDEN: It is the nature of the controlling group on South Lakeland that major setbacks tend not to feature in many press releases. I have always believed that councils should work together on service delivery where that can reduce costs. The front page promotion of joint working with Eden gave me no problems and everyone on South Lakeland voted for the proposal. However, there was a nagging doubt at the back of many minds that the intention was not just joint working but an eventual backdoor merger. This seems to have been more strongly voiced in Eden where a majority of members voted against the proposal. So, the current proposal is dead - expect a

resurrection in a more emaciated form.

YORKSHIRE DALES LOCAL **DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK:** At a very long authority meeting at the end of March Yorkshire Dales NPA members agreed to go out for consultation on the Local Development Framework as drafted by the Housing Working Group. There were some objections to some sites in the Craven area but little objection from either South Lakeland or Richmondshire. It might be argued that the Working Party had excluded too many sites in South Lakeland that is certainly the view of some of Dent Parish Council. Please take the trouble to look at the draft if you have any interest in housing within Yorkshire Dales. It will be the basis for planning decisions for some time, even if there is a change of government.

**RESPECT GROUP:** The most recent meeting was moved from a time when I could be there to one where I had to be elsewhere so in my absence it was chaired by lan McPherson. There were one or two significant bombshells which emerged and had they been remotely expected I would have attended myself. Everyone is working as hard as possible to make sure that the preparations are all in order. I have spent a lot of today with county officers and have involved both the proposed new Leader and the chairman of the Police Authority. I have taken every opportunity to highlight the issues over the last ten months as we MUST NOT have a repeat of the failures of recent years.



that the last Cautley Residents Action last year and will bring extra officers Group (CRAG) meeting had been well attended, with presentations from policing with Eden. Councillors and the County, the District and the Police. 






#### THE SIX STAGNATIONS

Good health depends upon continuous movement and transformation in the body, both obvious (as in the heartbeat or the digestive system) and subtle (as in the cells). Lack of such movement, particularly as we get older, is a primary cause of disease. An important function of activities such as yoga, tai chi, acupuncture and massage is to maintain and restore the vital movements of the body.

Lack of movement manifests in various forms and Chinese medicine summarises these as the "six stagnations".

Stagnation of food: this is when food remains in the stomach for longer than it should and thus has the opportunity to fester and ferment. The emotionally upset, eating irregularly causes of this are often obvious: overeating, excessive consumption of particular types of food (meat, for





example), eating too guickly, eating while working, eating while or late at night.

Stagnation of Qi: the word "Qi" can roughly be translated in this context as "energy" and it represents all movement and transformation in the body. Stagnation of Qi can occur in the digestive system in the form of gurgling, gas and irregular stools. In women, the pre-menstrual phase can be a time of Qi stagnation with breast tenderness, abdominal bloating and sometimes mood changes. Tight muscles are a form of Qi stagnation and the tension can creep up the neck, causing headaches. Qi stagnation is insubstantial, in the sense that it comes and goes and tends to move around. It is therefore relatively easily treated by exercise, massage or acupuncture. However if

it persists it can lead to more serious forms of stagnation.

<u>Blood stagnation:</u> this can be the result of an accident (like a bruise or a head injury) or it can occur in the internal organs as a progression from Qi stagnation. It is characterised by pain in a fixed location and in more severe cases the tongue, lips and nails may have a purplish hue. This can occur in a variety of diseases, obvious examples being stomach ulcers and certain heart conditions.

<u>Heat:</u> this can be a progression from food stagnation (when it might manifest as acid reflux) or from Qi stagnation (when it often causes bad temper, irritability or frustration). Heat will be present, either as an actual raised body temperature or as a subjective feeling of heat, such as a hot flush or being red in the face. The pulse will tend to be faster and the tongue red. It can be caused by hot types of food: curries, garlic, cinnamon, ginger, by alcohol and by certain drugs.


Damp: in our climate we are particularly prone to internal Damp in the body. This may also be caused by certain types of food, notably dairy produce and wheat flour. Internal Damp manifests as abdominal bloating, either after eating, or getting worse as the day goes on. Other signs include oedema (swollen ankles, for example) unclear thinking and heavy headaches, as if the head were wrapped in a damp cloth.

<u>Phlegm:</u> this is any type of unhealthy mucous – in the nose,

lungs, stomach or intestines. It also includes soft lumps (often fatty tissue) and, in the head, it can cause dizziness and vertigo. This, like internal Damp is due to a failure of the fluid metabolism and the causes are similar.

- To avoid the six stagnations:
- Keep the Qi moving with regular exercise
- Eat sensibly at regular times, preferring warm, cooked food to cold, raw food. Avoid eating any type of food to excess and if you are susceptible to internal Damp or Phlegm, limit dairy produce and wheat flour.
- If you feel any of the six stagnations arising, address the problem at an early stage before it progresses to actual disease.

there was time for a quick coffee from my flask in a sheltered hollow just to the east of the summit.


**FROSTROW W. I.** Oops! Nearly forgot to write this nonth's report. Too busy helping

#### MARCH WEATHER

• St Mark's, Cautley; Judith Bush and Linda Hopkins,


• St John the Baptist's, Garsdale; Mary Grant and Bill Mawdsley,

# A celebration of the Sedbergh & Dent district





#### **MAY GARDENING**

When is the best time to plant vegetables? There seem to be different theories and guidelines laid down by different people, the most confusing being "plant potatoes on Good Friday". As Good Friday moves every year and is independent of the weather this has never seemed a to invent my own idea as to the right time to put in seeds. My theory is that Organic Gardens, Coventry, the plants already in the ground have a far better idea of the air and soil temperature than I do, so now I wait until a particular thing happens in a particular garden before getting out the veg seeds. One of my main

markers is a beech hedge which, as soon as it comes into leaf, says "get out there and put in the peas and broad beans". I seem to have excellent germination when I plant at this time and assuming that the voles and/or the bluetits don't eat the pea shoots, a very good crop.

During my time spent at Harlow Carr Gardens at Harrogate, we grew a variety of peas and beans, some of which were included in our "Vegetable Sanctuary" The two which interested me most were drying varieties: the Carlin Pea and the Martock bean, and I wonder if, in these times of impending world food shortages, and concerns over the air miles involved in importing soya and other dried legumes we should try to resurrect these English varieties and grow them at home. The Carlin pea was cultivated in Elizabethan times and was eaten in Lent on Carlin Sunday, (and hopefully at other times as well) and the Martock bean, a small seeded type of broad bean named after the village of Martock in Somerset, was used as a dried food throughout the year in stews and soups. Our historic veg varieties were all supplied by the Henry Doubleday good plan to follow, so I have decided Research Association - now Garden Organic - who are based at Ryton Warwickshire. CV8 3LG. Seeds for some old varieties are also available from W Robinson and Son (of giant onion fame), Forton, nr Preston, PR3 ONB.



#### **KIDZONE**

The Orphanage and the Schools Programme

The Kidzone Project in Nairobi includes an Orphanage for 20 girls within a school, and a Schools Programme. Sponsors in the UK pay for the education of these orphans and for others living in the slums. They now have 80 children, including those in the home, in full time education. Some go to day schools, the poorest go to boarding schools, as their homes are too deprived for them to benefit from day school.

At the end of March, Simon Wood, the UK fundraiser and BA pilot, and Eli Njeri, a Kenyan volunteer on the project, gave two presentations in Sedbergh. One to Settlebeck students and one to supporters.

They showed pictures of children living in the Nairobi slums. This is where the orphans in the Kidzone home come from, and the children in the Schools Programme who of girl called Emily in the Schools Programme who was once turned away from a Sunday Club for bad

behaviour. Now 14 and at boarding school she recently gained the highest marks in all Kenya for her end of year exams.

They spoke of the problems at the start of getting money for the home, which is at last properly funded with a full time Manager and Assistant as well as a Housemother. Without British Airways' help both with fundraising and donations it could not have survived.

We always hear the bad things about British Airways but few know that through their staff they support 104 charitable projects worldwide. They employ a Community Relations Staff of 12 and set aside a budget of £2 million each year for this purpose, as well as carrying goods free of charge for their charities.

Simon and Eli were delighted with the support they received from Sedbergh. They left with £200 in donations, a new sponsor for a child's education, and a pledge of support course still live there. 

#### **CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST**

Cumbria's Amphibians and Reptiles. Ecologist Tony Marshall spoke at the humans. It can feel the vibrations of February meeting of the local support approaching feet and moves away. It group to a small but enthusiastic audience. Perhaps the subject matter drew only the discerning. However those present reaped the benefit of his many years experience studying the subject, inspired initially by a "superb" biology teacher at school.

Our reptile species have been depleted and are still threatened by the disappearance of ponds and wetland habitats. Various oddities have appeared notably the green frog found in the south of England.

We have three snake and three lizard species. Not many people are

fond of snakes. The adder is poisonous but very nervous of has distinctive zig zag markings and is about eighteen inches long. It hibernates in the winter and this past long cold winter should have ensured a good session. Mild spells wake it up when food sources are few making survival precarious. Adders emerge around late March from old rabbit holes or wherever they have found refuge. Being cold blooded they need the sun's rays to warm them. They eat every few days and are about more in the spring when the warmth of the sun is weaker. Adders prefer drier habitats whereas the grass

snake thrives in wetter areas, wet ditches for example. They can grow to three feet long and can be found in more common than the snakes and Rusland, Sawrey and around the edges of Windermere. Sometimes they can be found basking on warm tarmac. They have various charming characteristics. If alarmed they excrete putrid excrement and, needing warm incubation for their eggs, the female grass snake lays them in middens or compost, the steamier the better. The eggs are about  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch long with a leathery shell.

There are three British lizard species. To date the sand lizard has not been found in Cumbria. The slow worm is a lizard 13 – 14 inches long and about finger thickness. They are help to keep the pests down in your garden. Living mostly underground they can move around quickly without being noticed. They can also regrow missing parts. Unlike the snakes they have evelids.

Round about March the common lizard starts to emerge from hibernation. They can be spotted in Smardale, flattening themselves against rock exposures to take in as much of the sun's warmth as possible. They all feed on small invertebrates.


Amphibians, are easier to spot. The

frog has longer legs than the toad and has ridges along its back. The frog leaps and the warty toad crawls. Frogs will populate any pond they can find, for example, those on the Enid Maples reserve. Even a water-filled roadside rut will do to lay their spawn. Shallow water warms up more quickly and is therefore more attractive. Frog spawn is found in irregular balls but that of the toad is laid in long streams. Toads like deeper, bigger ponds. They can also travel considerable distances from pond to pond. Too much dry weather can mean considerable losses for both species. Toads are partial to garden slugs and should be encouraged but unfortunately numbers have been

decreasing mainly as a result of habitat loss. However those who survive can live for 30 to 40 years. Half of all the comparatively rare natterjack toads are found in Cumbria. They can be recognised by a distinctive yellow stripe down their backs. They prefer to live in burrows in sandy areas and so the majority are found around our coasts. However they have been spotted on Kendal Fell. They can be over-run by the common toad and the spawn is often protected by mesh on the Trust coastal reserves. As they prefer shallow pools there is always the problem of drought.

We have three native newt species. The Great Crested newt, being rare

#### **APPLEBY NEW FAIR**

A very brief history of Appleby 'New' Fair, written on behalf of CRAG It is a confusing and chequered history and one not made easier to tell because of the different names used to describe it and its locations. For the purpose of this article it is simply named Appleby 'New' Fair.

There is no charter specifically making provision for a horse fair in Appleby although a charter of 1685 makes reference to a fair and market for purchase and sale of all manner of goods, including "cattle, horses, mares, geldings". This charter was never enrolled and was therefore of no effect and could not have authorised 'the new fair'.

It is known that the Mayor of Appleby approved a fair in 1750, in which year the Corporation agreed to a "show of horses and sheep and also of black cattle ... to be held on Gallow[s] Hill on 1st and 2nd June and 29th and 30th September". It should be noted that Gallows Hill was threatened with abolition in 1946 but, never within the boundaries of the Borough of Appleby. The first known advertisement of a fair appeared in an edition of the *Newcastle Chronicle* of 1776. Nineteenth century Trade Directories for Appleby mention this fair, along with others.

By 1885 there remained only the June Fair on Gallows Hill, which came to be known as Fair Hill. Use of this site continued until 1913 when it was enclosed by the land owners and by the fair being advertised as a later sold to the corporation.

From 1913 until 1966 the fair continued but with the encampments opted out of the informal

on the roadsides and the showing of horses on public roads. It was in May 1948, a newspaper reported that it was to be given new lease of life and campers would return to Fair Hill. However, it was not until 1966 that this happened and only after much debate and further threat of abolition - on 30th April 1965 an article entitled 'Last year of Appleby Fair?' appeared in the Westmorland Gazette. After the return, problems seem to have rumbled on, not helped tourist attraction. By late 1971, Westmorland County Council had

management structure of the fair, leaving it to North Westmorland Rural District Council and Appleby Borough Council. In 1975 a concerted attempt was made to manage it, which was largely successful. From then until last year there seems to have been a failure to repeat this with local authority interest in the fair declining almost entirely, leaving Appleby rather to fend for itself. In 2009. however, the fair was again managed with a degree of success in Appleby itself and this management now needs to be extended to surrounding districts in the run-up to the fair to make it a much happier experience for everybody.

Despite its lack of historical authorisation nobody can deny that the fair has a very firm place in custom and tradition which counts for so much in this country.

This was brought out in a very interesting, balanced and beautifully illustrated *National Geographic* article of June 1972 which, while allowing that "the mess they leave does not endear them to environmentconscious Britons" says, "it is at horse fairs like Appleby that the wandering people find mutual support for their traditional way of life. Each year the road is less open, the heath less free. Should Appleby Fair close down a corner stone would be knocked from the foundation of the gypsy year".

An interesting sidelight is the business it obviously brought to Appleby in the past for example in an application for extension of licences, reported in *the Kendal Mercury* of 28th May 1915 the "licensees in the neighbourhood of the fair considered those two days [June 8th and 9th], the occasion being Appleby New (or Brompton) Horse Fair to be their best two days in the year and travellers from a distance would be put to great inconveniences if the houses were closed."

Grateful acknowledgment is due to Richard Hall of the Kendal Record Office for his help and to the excellent articles researched and written by Graham Coles Chairman of the Appleby-in-Westmorland Society; also to Diane Elphick for producing the National Geographic article.

#### DOGS

There are many dogs in Sedbergh and we are said to be a nation of dog lovers. Why shouldn't we be?

However, there is a duty of care to look after the pets and on a regular basis, I am complained to by residents to the amount of dog faeces still being left around on the ground all round the town. This also extends to school grounds which are obviously extensive.

By leaving the faeces everywhere, especially where children play, there is a very strong chance of the children contracting Toxicariasis which leads to blindness. Surely there survive for up to three years in soil. is a duty of care to children too.

Toxocariasis: is an infection of the round worm Toxocara canis. It is a zoonotic disease that is spread via unwashed vegetables and dog faeces. Young children in particular are at risk due to their weaker immune systems and because they are more likely to expose themselves by ingesting the eggs. A puppy can pass as many as 15,000 eggs per gram of faeces, and they are a major source of environmental contamination.

Each T. canis female can lay up to 700 eggs a day. These are passed out when the dog defecates and can After two to three weeks of warm



weather the eggs develop into an embryo state, containing larva - this is when they become infective to dogs and people.

The larvae try to migrate through the human body as they would in a dog's, but the human body treats them as foreign material, which causes a reaction and tissue damage.

There are two types of toxocariasis: visceral larva migrans (VLM) and ocular larva migrans (OLM).

In VLM, the larvae reach the liver, causing inflammation and symptoms such as abdominal pain and pyrexia. Most people recover spontaneously.

OLM occurs when a migrating larva reaches the eye. It causes a granuloma to form on the retina, causing significant visual impairment and in severe cases even blindness.

Dog fouling is covered by several legislations:

The Dog (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 in England and Wales. Litter (Animal Droppings) Order

1991 - Made under section 84 (14) of the Environmental Protection Act 1990

Statutory Instruments No.s 2762 and 2763

These Acts require the owner to clear up immediately after his or her dog, should it foul 'designated land'. Individual local authorities use them as a basis to create bylaws (which allow for instant fixed-penalty fines) and nominate the designated areas in the appropriate borough. The fines start at around £40, rising to £1,000 -

#### **CARLISLE - SETTLE RAILWAY**

Final phase of £100m Settle -Carlisle track renewal gets underway.

The Friends of the Settle Carlisle Line have welcomed the start of this year's track renewal campaign. This is now underway, with, 23 miles of old jointed track being replaced by new, continuously-welded track. This is the final stage of a 5-year programme by Network Rail costing £100m, and which will mean that the whole of the route will have been upgraded to modern standards.

This year almost all of the work is being done overnight, without disruption to the passenger service. A new track-replacement train is being used, operated by Balfour Beatty, which relays track in front of itself and can replace up to 600 yards of track per night. A total of 22 different sites, mainly but not exclusively north of Appleby, will be dealt with. The programme overall has included not just trackwork but also waterproofing viaducts and installing new signals to halve the headway between trains (effectively meaning twice as many trains can be run).

#### SEDBERGH & DISTRICT ART SOCIETY

At our last meeting until the autumn, John Campell, mountain painter, gave a demonstration of water-colour painting postponed from January, ( remember the snow! ) which was well worth waiting for.

Using a rather ordinary photo photograph of hills and water, John said his aim was to add







#### **APPLEBY FAIR**

Some of you may have seen the advertisements placed in 8<sup>th</sup> April edition of the Westmorland Gazette (pages 70/71) announcing the Temporary Traffic Regulation Orders to come into force on 1st May 2010.


The announcements covered two pages are rumoured to have cost £10,000 plus VAT (a bit more expensive than two pages in our own *Lookaround*!). The orders cover both SLDC and Eden DC areas.

They comprise, firstly, some road closures, particularly those pieces of 'orphaned' roads used as lay bys along the A683 from Burnt Mill up to Cross Haw. Secondly "no waiting at any time" is ordered from Devils Bridge (Kirkby Lonsdale) to Kirkby Stephen along the A683/ 685 on both sides of the road. To back this up all minor and side roads leading off the main roads are also included in this order. These are particularly important on the A683 from Baliol School up to Cross Haw, the scene of considerable congestion last year.

We understand that 500 or so posts are to be erected to enforce these orders.

It is likely that regular travellers will be able to use their traditional stopping places provided they do so in reasonable numbers. The intention of the orders is to stop residents with homes in other places arriving four weeks early, creating havoc and spoiling the event for the genuine travelling community Now we wait and see.


