

DENT PARISH COUNCIL

Last December's council meeting heard about the ongoing efforts to improve broadband coverage in Dentdale, discussed a pilot project with the National Park and allocated grants to a number of local bodies. A full account of the meeting is contained in the minutes, published on www.dentdale.com (follow the parish council link) and obtainable as a hard copy on request from the parish clerk.

Faster Broadband

In only a few years, the internet has become an increasingly important part of people's lives, to such an extent that it is now being talked of as the fourth utility. In the future, households without fast broadband access will have restricted access to many facilities and services, and this is likely to affect property values as well. The government has recognised the seriousness of this by committing to provide superfast broadband by fibre optic cable in "geographically challenging areas" such as Dentdale, and we are

fortunate that Cumbria has been chosen for an initial pilot project.

Trying to improve broadband coverage was one of the actions in the Dentdale parish plan, and so the parish council, through the parish plan committee, asked Anne Fleck to coordinate and lead our response to this national development. With colleagues in Garsdale, Anne has set up the Dentdale & Garsdale Superfast Broadband Steering Group to:

- demonstrate we are keen to have improved broadband
- ensure that our area is properly represented
- work out how to plan and implement a fibre optic network to all homes that want it.

The steering group has already met with Tim Farron MP, and as a result he has arranged for it to present the needs of local residents to the organisers of the Cumbrian pilot project. At the same time, Anne has been finding out residents' opinions and encouraging everyone to sign up



on the Broadband Cumbria website to show the level of local support.

Super fast broadband in a rural area like ours seems a long way off, but other places in Cumbria have already done it. To achieve the same here would not be easy and would need community involvement as well as government funding, but the rewards - economically as well as socially – would be great. Thanks to everyone who has responded so far, we have made an excellent start, but we now need more people to become involved in the project. The December council meeting considered applications for grants made by local organisations, and decided to award the sums below. Both Jock Cairns and Jenny Pilgrim left the room when the matter was discussed, as they had declared an

interest because they belonged to one of the organisations applying.

- Dentdale Choir £150

The parish plan survey in 2008 revealed a lot of strong feelings about the relationship between the Dentdale community and the National Park. As a result, one of the plan's actions was to "develop with the National Park a proactive approach to supporting Dentdale as a vibrant and sustainable community". Following discussions with the parish council, the National Park allocated a budget of £10,000 as well as officer time for a unique 18-month pilot project. National Park officers will work with members of the Dentdale community on issues that meet the aims of both the National Park and Dentdale's parish plan.



The project has now started and a steering group has been meeting to organise it, consisting of the local Park Ranger Paul Wilkinson and his manager Alan Hulme, together with David Butterworth, YDNPA Chief Executive, and Jock Cairns, Matt Clayton, John Sibley and Ken Smith from Dentdale. It includes the following strands, among others:

- Promoting the visitor economy by devising an overall marketing strategy for Dentdale that includes the Dentdale Show, the Music and Beer Festival and the Walking Festival
- Supporting the parish council in its attempts to get affordable housing built in Dent
- Working with pupils at Dent School on wildlife projects
- Promoting, and supporting with grants, the use of renewable technologies on farms
- Supporting and promoting sustainable tourism businesses
- Clearing litter from the river and from near Ibbeth Peril
- Creating a conservation group to

help manage a section of roadside verge and to survey the dale's trees

Nearly 20 people from Dentdale have already joined the project and there are plenty of opportunities for others as well. If you would like to become involved, please contact Jock Cairns (details below). New Parish Clerk

What I have been reading this month: 'A Thousand Years of Good Prayers' by Yiyun Li (Collection of contemporary fictional short stories)

These modern narratives are drawn from different parts if this vast country. Li tackles in sparse prose China's complex history of repression and its influence on different generations and ordinary lives. I found them a mixed bag of alternate weird, boring, thought provoking and interesting tales.

'The Orchestra' by Richard Morrison (music/history)

This is a behind - the -scenes of the London Symphony Orchestra from 1904 to 2004 written by a Times

journalist. Rebellions and triumphs provide the backcloth for showing how the LSO developed and currently operates. It is a fascinating glimpse into musicians' working lives and the uniqueness of the LSO.

'The Photograph' by Penelope Lively (fiction)

A photograph in an envelope labelled 'destroy' is the opening scene. What would you do? Widowed professor Glyn Peters decides to open it and unravel his memories of his wife and reconstruct an unreliable version of the past. He becomes obsessed with the a quest and people are hurt along the way. this is an intense multi layered and intriguing book that can be read in 1 sitting! *RM*

COUNCILLORS CORNER

Well, so much for me wishing for a frost and snow free New Year in the last Lookaround!

Perhaps with last winter and this we can now look forward to a few years with very mild weather. Because the snow came so soon we had to put our cattle in a fortnight earlier than usual, quite a job in itself. We have had them in at the end of November before but it has always been because of the rain, not snow.

As a county we got our act together better this year. Yes, there are still places without salt-bins which should have been in place last September, but by and large there was more that was right than wrong. I am sure that after last winter people are more resilient, and more understanding than formerly. They now seem to understand that the main priorities are keeping the A684 open at Scotch Jeans and that sometimes involves spreaders going through the town without salting the road there.

I am very pleased with the parish salt supplies and we should all be grateful to those who were prepared to go out and use it on the footways and car parks. As far as I am concerned this will continue year on year. There was a ridiculous fight in mid-November as to when the parish salt should be delivered, resulting in little being in place when the cold weather began. I think there is a strong majority now for having some salt in the hands of parishes before winter begins.

However, this last week the problem has been flooding on the roads. My own exploration at Scroggbank showed the actual drains by the roadside were good and with a little shovel work I was easily able to clear the water off one side of the road. With the new better highways way of working I hope that this time next year blocked drains will be a thing of the past.

The district, county and police authority are all well on with their budget setting process and the rules are such that it is inconceivable that any of them will set anything other that a zero increase. The parishes by contrast had to have their budgets ready by mid December and most, if not all have set a significant increase. And, that is dead right. Because there is less being done by county and district each parish has a choice. Either they take over some of the functions themselves or else they cease to be done.

This year the district has forced the choice on to parishes for every public loo. I am pleased that both Kirkby Lonsdale and Sedbergh are minded to take theirs over. Sedbergh and

Dent showed loos could be run by parishes years ago. One sadness I have is that we might have to install "Pay as you enter" systems. If that was just to raise revenue I would be against it. But, regrettably we have some in our midst who delight in wrecking public property. Experience elsewhere shows they are less than willing to pay for their entertainment.

With the snow coming so soon my Neighbourhood Forum had to be postponed from November to yesterday. That resulted in a marathon session going on long after 10 pm. But, it was good to see such a large turn-out: I think almost every community in the Forum area was represented. Because of the changed boundaries I have been joined by my county colleague, Roger Bingham at the last two meetings.

Among many issues we heard about the latest developments concerning the Community Office and the potential purchase from YDNP. I have too many interests, Sedbergh parish and History Society to be allowed to vote when the matter comes up on the park so I am free to say and write what I think least anyone has any doubt. As it is almost certain the property will be sold then I support its being bought. Whether by a trust, or any other mechanism I am not too fussed, as long as it remains available for its present and future expanded uses of the people of the Sedbergh area. My objection is to it being on the market in the first place. For what it is worth it will contribute virtually nothing to the finances of the

park. In a few years the sale of Sedbergh NPA Building and the running away from Hudson House in Reeth will be seen as acts of great folly.

Towards the end of the meeting we had a rundown as to the preparations for the 2011 Appleby Horse Fair. I suspect there will be a fairly full briefing in these pages next month so I won't say too much. However, in spite of projected cuts the police, the district and the county have given undertakings that they will strive to deliver as strong a response this year as they did in 2010. The minutes of the Respect Working Group, which met earlier the same day are available on request (from me). Last year not everyone liked everything. But those who objected most strongly were least affected. In 2009 a Cautley resident put up a sign "Appleby UNFair". In 2010 they did not and it is my intention is that they will have no cause to do so in 2011. 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COUNCILLORS CORNER

After a relatively quiet spell over Christmas everything now seems to be happening at once! I attended three meetings yesterday (18th January) for example, two of which had as their principle concern Appleby Fair, which once again will be on us before we know it. Following the success of last year's policing we are all determined that this year's Fair will be equally trouble free. In the morning I attended the so-called Travellers and Settled Community Respect Group which has been meeting regularly for some years now and which brings together all the local agencies as well as representatives from the Travelling community. It was an extremely positive meeting and the intention is essentially to repeat last year's operation with a few tweaks to make it even more effective. There is absolutely no doubt that the making available of the field at Scrogg Bank Farm for the period immediately leading up to the Fair and for a short time afterwards made the biggest difference in keeping the Travellers off the lay-byes and grass verges and

out of fields for which permission had not been granted to enter. I am very pleased to say that the owner of the field is once again making it available for this purpose. Apparently last year there was a genuine fear amongst Travellers that the authorities wanted to close the Fair altogether. They have been re-assured that this is not the case and in turn they are now talking about reducing the size of the Fair and returning it to its original purpose and away from the glorified car boot sale which it has tended to become over the last few years. You might also be pleased to know that the Respect Group, which has so far operated as a semi-official working forum, is now to become a subcommittee of the Local Area Partnership (LAP), making it much more accountable to locally elected representatives both at Parish, District and County levels. This can only be for the good.

The Neighbourhood Forum meeting in the evening also had the Fair at the heart of its Agenda. The local police team turned out in force, together with a number of officers from SLDC, to brief the sizeable number of people attending (including representatives from the Cautley Residents Action Group). Very relevant questions were asked by members of the public and again they seemed to be reassured by everything that was said. There is absolutely no doubt that the Police and all local agencies are taking the proper policing and management of the event *very* seriously indeed. Sgt. John Stephens, the recently appointed new Sergeant-in-charge for

our area, gave an update on the latest criminal activity and assured us that we live in one of the safest parts of the country. Crime of any sort is minimal. I did, however, take the opportunity of asking him to comment on the press reports about a reduction of policing and the replacement of static by mobile units. He explained that the cover would be no less than it is at the moment although there would be more flexibility in the way that individual officers would be deployed. As before Pc John Orr would continue to be primarily responsible for Sedbergh and District and Pc Alan Bullock for Kirkby Lonsdale. They can continue to be contacted via the call centre at Penrith on 0845 3300247 or via the police website.

The Neighbourhood Forum also received an update from the Community Officer manager David Ramsbottom on the latest state of play regarding the hoped for acquisition of 72 Main Street from YDNPA. This was very helpful. I have reported on this myself a number of times in the past and will be returning to it in future articles.

We also had a very interesting presentation from CCC's Adult Social Care department on their newly introduced "reablement" programme which works with people to help them gain or regain skills needed for daily living following a period of illness or onset of disability, enabling people to live as independently as possible and gain confidence in their own abilities. Anyone wishing to know more should in the first instance telephone the



County Council's communication centre on 01228 606060.

Another presentation came from Lakes Leisure Kendal explaining the plans to bring more sporting opportunities out into the local community. So all in all a very full and informative evening.

If you haven't been to a Neighbourhood Forum before I suggest you give it a try – it would be good to see some new faces! The next one is on Thursday 10th March at 7.30 pm at The Institute, Kirkby Lonsdale.

For those of you who are curious, my afternoon meeting was the Sedbergh and District Tourism Initiative Project Board which I have been chairing and which again I shall be reporting on in future issues. So there you have it – "a day in the life of...."

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
LA10 residents enjoy FREE entry on Mondays



I know it seems like a while ago but this is my first chance to wish you a Happy New Year. As I wrote in the last *Lookaround*, 2010 was certainly an eventful one for me. My wishes for 2011 are much more focused upon using the support you have shown me to make things happen. I will be working as hard as I can to use the opportunity that being a member of one of the parties in the Coalition Government presents to help improve the lives of those of us lucky enough to live in this area.

On this front I am feeling fairly positive at the moment. To start with we have had the announcement by

Danny Alexander, the Chief Secretary to the Treasury, that the Government is looking at the possibility of offering discounts on fuel costs to people who live in rural areas. Added to which they are also considering introducing a "fuel stabiliser", this is a scheme where the rate of duty on fuel is tied to the price of oil. So if the price of oil goes up the amount of duty the Government levies will go down, stabilising prices. Now clearly saying that they are "considering" these schemes is a long way from actually introducing them. However, to be "considering" is such a giant leap from the situation we found ourselves in with the previous Government



where the needs of people who lived in rural areas were simply ignored.

On the subject of oil (and non-mains gas) prices, many people have written to me to complain about the way that the cost of both of these fuels has risen over the past year. making it harder and harder for people to afford to heat their homes. I had the chance to speak in a debate in Parliament the other day on the subject of "Fuel Poverty". Fuel poverty is officially defined as being when people are spending more than ten per cent of their income on heating their homes. The number of people suffering fuel poverty has risen dramatically recently. particularly in areas like ours and I think it is important that the Government does all that it can to help the situation. For a start I have asked them to look at introducing a regulator like Ofgem who monitors



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pricing for people on mains gas. It seems wrong that just because you are not on mains gas you don't have any protection. I wait to see what the Government thinks about this idea but in the meantime they have asked the Office of Fair Trading to look at pricing in non-mains gas. Again, it is a positive start.

These are only a couple of the things I have been working on, to these you can add to these bank loans to businesses, making more affordable homes available to local people, payments to farmers, the negative coverage of this area by national media and a number of other issues and it is only January. I have every hope that this will be the best year ever for delivering changes that benefit people in this area.

SEDBERGH ALLOTMENTS ASSOCIATION

The Sedbergh Allotments Association held its second annual general meeting at the Sedbergh URC on 7 December.

The AGM provides an opportunity to reflect on the past 12 months and we were able to look back on 2010 with considerable satisfaction. All plots are continuing to produce a good variety of fruit, flowers and vegetables (prizewinning in one instance!). We have also re-roofed the communal shed which has ensured that tools remain reasonably dry and, importantly, we are able to collect rainwater in barrels to help reduce water charges. We are very grateful for the grant assistance

for this work which was provided by the National Park's Sustainable Development Fund, managed by the Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust.

The new boundary hedges planted in January 2009 are now well established and are beginning to develop as landscape features. As the hedges mature they will provide a habitat for native flora and fauna (and, hopefully, some protection from those cold easterly winds). The establishment of the allotments has resulted in a noticeable increase in the wildlife value of the area, particularly bees and butterflies attracted by fruit and flowers. A number of frogs (or toads?) have been spotted around compost bins

SEDBERGH ANGLERS

Sedbergh and District Angling Association, more usually known as Sedbergh Anglers, is during the winter months quietly contemplating the forthcoming season and reflecting on the last.

In 2010, 3 salmon, 24 sea trout and 91 trout were reported caught. This is significantly down on previous years but there are a couple of reasons for this. The weather in 2010 was very variable with low water levels for considerable periods of the season resulting in poor fishing. More importantly less than half those buying fishing permits sent in their return. This is a much lower rate of return than previous years. This makes it very difficult to manage the fishing and to plan future stocking. What was encouraging, however, is that some 40% of the fish caught were wild fish with some over 2 pounds. This is a clear sign of the improving quality of the native fish.

Those who failed to send in returns may well not want to reveal that they have failed to catch any fish. However, even this information is important as it provides information

about the 3 rivers fished by members. The Environment Agency requires that all introduced fish are non-breeding sterile fish. Over time this should further improve the quality of native fish as there is no longer interbreeding between the native and stock fish.

Restocking will take place again this year in the early part of the season.

During the winter months there have been encouraging sightings of spawning salmon in the upper reaches of the Rawthey, Dee and Lune.

With demise of 3 Peaks, formerly Lowis's, fishing permits will be available from the Tourist Information Centre from early March in time for the start of the season on 15 March 2011. Outline maps will also be available as in previous years and are also available on the website, seberghanglers.org.uk.

New members are always welcome and all are welcome at the Annual General Meeting which will take place on 25 February 2011 at 1930 hours at the White Hart Sports and Social

Club.

NEW HEALTH COURSE AT THE CDC

I first approached the CDC with the idea of teaching a short course about health in the autumn of last year. We debated about what to call it – it could have been called "You and your health", because that is what it is about, but we decided in the end to call it "The Chinese way to better health" because it is based on the concepts of traditional Chinese medicine.

I first began to study Chinese medicine in 1997, the first year of my acupuncture training course in York. I was drawn to it immediately because of the way it explains many common health patterns. The example which first struck me related to my grandmother, who was a village postmistress. Her work methods were somewhat haphazard (one year, the Christmas communion wine, which arrived by post, got lost and was discovered behind the piano some months later). Each month, my grandfather would do the accounts and my grandmother would be in a

great state of agitation in case she had made mistakes. It was a great family joke that she had to dash for the earth closet (there was no indoor plumbing) shortly before the final figures were produced. Chinese medicine provides a complete description of the processes of the internal organs which produced this reaction. It is a very good system for describing and dealing with our common everyday health concerns.

I shall be tailoring the course to the interests and needs of the participants so that they can gain a new perspective on their own state of health. It might be that some of the following topics would be of interest:

- Exercise for health: why too much exercise is as harmful as too little
- Why toast for breakfast, sandwich for lunch and the main meal in the evening can be a recipe for long term weight gain

- How stress affects the different systems of the body and can lead to symptoms as varied as irritable bowels and migraines
- How habitual thought patterns such as anxiety or worry can cause and be caused by changes in physical condition
- How to look for the causes of a disease, rather than simply addressing the symptoms
- How to interpret common symptoms such as bruising easily, or a persistent tickly cough
- How small lifestyle changes can have a significant effect on health and well-being
- Why there is no "one-size-fits-all" recipe for feeling well – what is good for one person may be harmful for another. Even seemingly innocuous substances such as cinnamon have their medical characteristics and are not good for everyone.

SEDBERGH SCHOOL

"How are you doing Headmaster?"
Since becoming the Headmaster of
Sedbergh School in September, I
have been asked two questions
repeatedly; "How are you settling
in?", and "How is the School doing?"

The first is easy to answer. Anne and I are delighted to be here and in many ways it feels as though we have come home. Anne has family in the area and connections with the school, I have known the school for much of my life and am entirely familiar with the boarding environment. Both of us enjoy the rural nature of the area and our own home is close by. Like most parents, our prime concern is for our children, and they too have settled well.


Which leads to the second question, much harder to answer than the first and which begs the question, "How should we measure schools?"
Reflecting on this, it struck me that Sedbergh, Dentdale and Garsdale have an extraordinarily diverse range of schools: Dent Primary, Settlebeck, Balliol and Sedbergh School. They range across the entire spectrum of educational provision, each offering something different and equally important. It is quite clear that no single measure can properly reflect or compare our schools.

So how are we doing? Sedbergh School is flourishing both as a school and a business. The two aspects are inextricably linked. Sedbergh Junior School has grown in numbers and has just received a glowing inspection report which has graded Governance

and leadership, boarding, extracurricular pursuits and welfare of pupils as excellent. Teaching and pupils' academic progress was identified as good with excellent features.

The Senior School started with more pupils than last year. We gained good exam results with three pupils progressing to Cambridge and most others to their preferred choice in top universities. This was particularly pleasing in light of the increased competition for places. 56%% of A level exams were graded A*-B and 65% of exams taken by our Year 11 pupils were graded A*-B.

Good as these results may be, they do not present a clear picture of the



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school's performance. In the first instance, our pupils do not take GCSE exams, we have opted for the more demanding International GCSE and to compare these results with GCSE's is to compare apples with pears. Ironically, if the Government submitted school league tables as a piece of GCSE Statistics coursework. it would fail! Secondly, the advent of A* grades for both GCSE and A level can only devalue each lower grade in the eyes of universities and employers; 'A' is the new 'B' and 'B' the new 'C'. The traditional measure of school performance, the percentage of A-C grades, should be consigned to history.

One thing which unites



Headteachers is the knowledge that our schools are far more than the exam results they achieve. Sport continues to thrive and our teams have had a very successful season, the first XV winning the newly established Schools Super League. Five pupils have qualified to play in regional or national teams so far, sailors have won national titles, our runners have won the British Schools fell running championships in senior boys, girls and team competitions and we await news about four shooters who may compete against New Zealand. Away from the pitches, four pupils have gained places in national orchestras and choirs and the arts are flourishing in general. Whilst it is easy to measure the results on the sports field, it is harder to assess the quality of music and drama. Perhaps the best measure is the acknowledgement of one's peers, and here we find that Sedbergh musicians are in demand to play in schools all over the north of England.

It is easy to list the achievements, and there are many more. However, far more important than all of this, is the fact that our pupils are emerging as confident young men and women who balance competition with compassion, equipped to contribute to their communities and society at large. When David Cameron speaks of "Broken Britain", I can only reflect that Sedberghians have the skills and the attitude to mend it.

So, how are we doing? I'd say we're doing very well! Thank you for asking. *Andrew Fleck, Headmaster*

KIDZONE & NYUMBANI 2010

The children in the Kidzone Orphanage, Nairobi, are really happy and enjoy each other's company. They are just like a big family with the older ones helping the younger ones.

At last the Kidzone Orphanage has much needed support from a large charity, Hope for Children. They have seen how happy and well cared for the children are. They are going to pay the rent and a social worker's salary. They are sending a team to train the Manager and staff in charity admin and accounts.

Although the premises, two converted classrooms, are much too small, some improvements have been made this year. Each child has

a drawer to keep her clothes and things tidy, these are fitted under the bunk beds. There is a large mirror, a first aid kit and toilet seats!! There will soon be a library, started with money from the collection at Gloria Dawkins' funeral. There is plenty of evidence of Sedbergh people's interest in the project. The colourful blankets, the plastic chairs, the washing machine, Kath Winn's much treasured ski hats Some girls even sleep in them! They call her Cho Cho, which is Swahili for Grannie.

Plots of land for the new building are already being explored. Finchley Catholic High School, who have been sending volunteers from their Sixth Form each summer, have pledged to

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raise £150,000, a third of it this year. Considering that only a very few of the children are Catholics, though all are Christian, this seems a good ecumenical gesture. Of course, it must be said that the school is a Centre for Business Excellence!

The children always bring me their books, and I have persuaded the older ones to listen to the younger ones read. I'm sure they will. A volunteer hairdresser came to braid their hair. It takes a long time and they are very patient. Next day they were braiding each others' hair! The hairdresser kindly offered to do mine, but I declined!

They all enjoyed an outing to the Animal Orphanage. The monkeys are always favourite, but three little lion cubs came a close second. They were just like kittens, jumping up to the table where their food was being prepared. We also went to City Park where small monkeys are not caged and the children can feed them. At home there is only a small playground for the children outdoors so an outing is a real treat.

The Directors' daughter, Kendi, had a Birthday party at an outdoor restaurant. Half of her guests were friends and family, the other half were her Kidzone friends and nobody could tell the difference.

In this Newsletter (Page 53) there is an appeal for recorders for the children. They love music. They sing and dance but have no instruments. Helen Beare hopes to go out later this year with enough recorders and music to get them all started.

The Schools Programme is going very well. We still have 80 poor children, including the orphans, sponsored in full time education.





Emily, a very bright girl, got an excellent mark in the KCPE, the Kenyan equivalent of our GCSE. All are making good progress. This is a very worthwhile project because these children will be able to get good jobs and bring their families out of poverty. We still have a few more children needing sponsors.

Nyumbani, the home for HIV+ orphans, continues to grow. Some of the older ones have left the home now they can manage their medication, and live with relatives.





Some are at High School, others at College, studying, tourism, law, hotel management, catering. These girls I have known since 2003 are happy, capable young women. If it wasn't for Nyumbani, none of them would be alive today. I managed to time my visit when 12 of them were at home for the holidays and we all enjoyed a meal of chicken and chips at a local café. We encouraged two of them to place the order, just to give them experience of this social skill.

The Respite Centre on the home's site is a great success. Sick HIV+ children from the Outreach Programme in the slums can be cared for until they recover.

A new diagnostic laboratory is being built on the site to replace the older one. Much of Nairobi's HIV testing is carried out there and this of course brings the home useful income.

So each year both Kidzone and Nyumbani are making progress, and I feel very privileged to witness it.

Margaret Watson, a Pepperpot member who plays in the Westmorland Orchestra, spoke about it very movingly and Anne, Lady Kerr, our President, expressed thanks on behalf of the Pepperpot Club. Margaret has written the following paragraph to include here:

The Alison Armstrong Pepperpot Fund came into being on December 9th in memory of my late sister, thanks to a very generous donation from friends of Pepperpot, Alexe and Jonathan Roberts. Alison grew up in Cumbria and enjoyed the benefits of music lessons and orchestral experience through the Music Department of the Education Authority. Great enjoyment and lifelong friendships resulted from what was then provided free within the schools' music service. Fortunately Pepperpot now provides wonderful opportunities and support no longer available through the education service. The aim of the Alison Armstrong Pepperpot Fund is to help provide these learning experiences. It

will be used within the current philosophy of Pepperpot and will, hopefully, be augmented by fundraising and donations. Over £250 was raised at the Wine and Nibbles' evening, which was a fantastic and thoroughly enjoyable event. Many thanks to everyone who made the occasion such a success.

We are most grateful to Margaret - and especially to Jonathan and Alexe for their generosity and for the lengths they went to to come to the party, via London and Wensleydale in the snow! We shall do our best to think of ways in which the fund can grow and be used to further the aims of the Pepperpot Club. We are

particularly grateful to have this new fund, since we have had no luck in obtaining external grants this year. But we are delighted and grateful to report that the Trott Musical Foundation

has been able to step in to help. We are promised funds to complement those provided by Pepperpot Sponsors, Members and Friends particularly to cover the Music Makers activities at the Primary School for this academic year. All of this enables Pepperpot to continue providing financial help in various other ways for young Sedbergh orchestral musicians.

If you are in sympathy with the aims of the Pepperpot Club, it is very easy and need not be expensive, to provide support. Friends simply

provide an annual sum of £5.00. To be a Member costs £6.00 or £10.00 for two people at the same address. Members receive lists of suggested events three or four times a year and those who attend contribute a £1 'peppercorn' over and above the cost of the event. The 'peppercorns' help, for instance, to subsidise music lessons on orchestral instruments or provide grants to attend music courses. The more expensive option is to become a Sponsor. Sponsors pay a minimum of £20.00 a year and their contributions go towards the considerable costs of running all the Music Makers activities at the Primary School - the ocarina and recorder

> groups, run by Carole Marsden, and the afterschool orchestra run by Elizabeth Dodd and Anthea Meuli. We are expecting that two adults, who have taken up instruments later in life, will also join this

orchestra shortly. In addition, we own and maintain a large bank of orchestral instruments, many donated, which we lend out merely for the cost of the annual insurance.

NOVEMBER WEATHER

A mixed month weather-wise starting with a mild spell and ending with a fall of snow. The first few days had maximum temperatures in the 50sF, with a high of 57.0F, to be followed by reducing temperatures until a minimum 17.8F was reached. The last few days we had temperatures at or just above freezing during the day coinciding with the first snow fall. A fairly breezy month with a maximum of 26.6 mph though only 4 days did not reach double figures. Atmospheric pressure reflected these winds with the second week having quite a depression registering a low of 28.23 inches of mercury. The windchill also reflected the changes through the month with the first mild week being the only period when the temperature stayed above freezing. Rainfall amounted to 4.61 inches but I suspect the rain gauge was frozen for the last few days of the month.

On the 18th a bat was flying at dusk when temperatures were starting to drop. On the list of "regulars" I

omitted the dunocks and also the crow invasion. Each morning when I feed the poultry a host of various crows drop in to feed with 20 to 30 jackdaws just waiting until my back is turned. The blackbirds have finished off the crab apples so have invaded the shippon eating the apples stored there if they can get the tops off the buckets! The long tailed tits are regular visitors but the goldfinch have obviously moved on. The rooks have visited their old nests nearby and the woodpecker is drumming round about but hasn't come to feed recently.

The Local Support Group invited John Mounsey to talk on his recent visit to this region of Borneo. His talk had been subtitled "Headhunters and Oil Palms". The native Dyak people, in past times, killed their enemies by blowpipe then boiled and cleaned the heads. This rite of passage entitled the young warrior to all over body tattooing. Fortunately no more really gory details were offered and John concentrated on the wildlife of the area and the threats that commercial crops are bringing to its indigenous people.

The loss of forest cover has resulted in the displacement of these people

into the interior and immigrant Arab and Chinese now live along the coast. The group's first expedition was into these forested areas, mostly secondary growth now. Anti-leech gaiters, made by local children, were worn in this wet and muddy terrain. All sorts of wildlife was discovered here. Pygmy squirrel, lantern bugs, bark borers and all sorts of millipedes were found, some poisonous. Surprisingly inland crabs were here too together with all lengths of stick insect and multi-coloured butterflies. Some moths and butterflies had transparent patches in their wings, an effective camouflage strategy. Most trees had wide buttress roots, more effective in gathering moisture. It was fortunate that the group had a sharpeyed and most knowledgeable leader. He was a native of the area, indeed his own grandfather had been a head-hunter. Hopefully this tendency had faded with time.

Coastal homes were built on stilts to cope with a combination of tides and wet seasons. The main roads in this area were very good in contrast to

those off the main routes. Huge areas metre wide and quick flowering. of oil palm plantations had followed forest clearance resulting in the enemy of bio-diversity – monoculture. Clearance also results in soil erosion after heavy rainfall, frequent in these latitudes. Global companies were profiting from these at the expense of food crops. Also here was the site of a former Japanese prisoner of war camp. 2,700 Australian and British captives were marched west from here. Only 6 survived by escaping en route.

One of the big attractions of this area is the orangutan rehabilitation centre. This proved to be disappointing. As it is politic to keep these endangered creatures from indiscriminate human contact, they could only be viewed at a distance. Fortunately John's camera had an impressive telephoto facility. They are eventually released into the wild. More species were discovered here, orchid epiphytes clinging to trees, all sizes of egret, monitor lizards, pigtailed, long-tailed or crab-eating macaques and sugar-leaf and proboscis monkeys. Many snakes exist here too. Pit vipers with infra-red vision in order to seek out warmblooded prey were spotted together with others snoozing (we hope!) in trees. Above all flew a crested serpent eagle.

After a longer than expected walk the group was shown the rare rafflesia flower. This sensitive plant folds shut if touched and thrives in the shade of the bamboos. It is about a

Insects are attracted by a smell of rotting flesh.

A cave visit followed. This hot, wet region is famous for some of the most extensive caves in the world. Ropes suspended from the roof enabled collectors of birds' nests to collect their crops. This "delicacy" is composed of mud, spider web and saliva and.....hmm! Bats and swifts are numerous here and collecting is suspended while the young are in the nests. Huge piles of dung accumulate covered with several species of cockroach. These provide food for poisonous centipedes.

Mount Kinabalu is the highest mountain in this region. This igneous

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

mass of granodiorite rises 4,095m (13,435ft). The mountain and its surroundings are among the most important biological sites in the world, with over 4500 species of plant, 326 species of birds, and 100 mammalian species identified. Among this rich collection of wildlife are famous species such as the gigantic rafflesia plants and the orangutan. Mount Kinabalu has been accorded UNESCO World Heritage status. The party spotted pitcher plants, orchids, fig trees flowering at their bases, and pollinated by snails, and wild ginger. A mountain whistler was seen with its striking yellow chest. Cicadas were numerous, a species once very common in southern Europe before

the proliferation of pesticides.

A more relaxed time followed on one of the offshore islands. Mangroves with their oxygen seeking roots visible at low water were populated by crabs and otters, butcher birds swooped overhead. The mangrove fruit drops into the water and germinates where it lands. Here a turtle rescue project collects the eggs after they are laid in the warm sand and keeps them till safely hatched when they are returned to the sea. A remarkable photo of a mound of newly laid eggs and their mother concluded a fascinating and most informative talk. We were transported to the warmth of Sabah, a welcome antidote to January in Sedbergh! SG

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FEBRUARY GARDENING

In the short days of February, when nothing much is happening in the garden (except, of course for our wonderful displays of snowdrops), any plant showing colour is always welcome. I notice these plants as I drive or walk through towns and villages. A beautiful *Acer* beside the road in Casterton catches my eye and a fine birch in Kirkby Lonsdale churchyard makes a very pleasing picture.

Many Maples (Acers) come into their own in the winter months. One group - the "Snake- bark" Maples have young twigs and branches which are striated with white, red and green markings. Acer capillipes, the Red Snake-bark maple is one of my favourites along with A. pensylvanicum (Moosebark) and A. rufinerve (Grey-budded Snake-bark Maple). A. davidii (Pere David's Maple) and A. crataegifolium (Hawthorn-leaved Maple) are two other worthy species. All of these are classed as small trees but given time and a good position, they can reach 20 – 30ft in height. I have seen A. capillipes and A. pensylvanicum grown as coppiced trees (cut back to the ground every 4-5 years) or kept as multi-stemmed shrubs (by pruning back one third of the stems to ground level each year, in rotation). These systems produce lots of new twigs and stems and hence lots of winter colour. Most Snake-bark Maples have rather rounded, un-maple-ish shaped leaves but they do generally show

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very good Autumn colour and often have attractive pendulous bunches of very decorative keys.

Attractive bark is the other eyecatching feature of some winter trees. My favourites are Tibetan Cherry (Prunus serrula) which has the most amazing, polished mahogany coloured bark, on trunk and branches, Paper-bark Maple (Acer griseum) with cinnamon brown, peeling bark, and Himalayan Birch (Betula jaquemontii) with glowing white bark. This, and other beautiful specimens of ornamental birch can be seen at Holehird Gardens - the Lake District Horticultural Society's garden in Troutbeck. Elaine Horne

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Path Repairs

Both local people and visitors enjoy the path beside the Rawthey from Straight Bridge to Garsdale Bridge near Settlebeck. Recently YDNPA has been replacing stiles with gates to make this route more accessible to a wider range of walkers.

The most difficult place for many people used to be just behind Scroggs Farm, where a steep ladder stile was followed by an uphill struggle to another large stile into the field. Some weeks ago a fine big oak tree adjacent to the path collapsed and brought down retaining walls and the ladder stile, resulting in the path becoming subject to a Temporary Closure Order.

Since then the YDNPA Rangers with the help of two teams of Dales Volunteers have held three day-long work-parties to restore the route. Easy-catch gates at the bottom and the top of the slope will provide stock-proof barriers for the farmer. The retaining walls have been rebuilt, but the ladder-stile is no longer there: instead the path zig-zags at an easy gradient and with steps.

The Closure Order has been lifted and the route is now much more convenient for everybody to use. Thanks are due to the landowner and his tenant who quickly removed the fallen tree, and particularly to the Dales Volunteers, some of whom come from as far as Leeds to give their time to improving the National Park in this area. *Malcolm Petyt*

Our meetings in December 2010 and January 2011 gave us a taste of two artists, both painting street scenes both starting from drawings,

but using different media and with individual approaches.

He was not afraid to experiment, and began by going over his outlines with blue pastel, using a darker hue for the foreground lines. He also demonstrated a scene of rocks, and both paintings left space for the viewer to supply details. He finished by giving a useful list of what to mix to produce a wide variety of greys.

What these artists had in common was a great joy in the mixing and use of colours.

A2B NOW TRAVEL

A new exciting initiative has been launched by Cumbria County Council for the benefit of young people across South Lakeland.

The A2BNoW concessionary bus fare scheme will provide discounted travel for young people between the ages of 5 and 18, living in South Lakeland. By introducing an upper 'cap' of £1 single and £1.80 return fare for young people, it will make it cheaper for them to access leisure activities by bus.

The scheme will work via a 'smartcard' which can be applied for at a cost of £5. The A2BNoW Card will allow the holder to travel on any journey in South Lakeland at the reduced rate. A2BNoW card holders will also be entitled to use their card to travel to Penrith, Keswick, Barrow, Kirkby Stephen and Lancaster taking advantage of the reduced rates as long as their journey starts in South Lakeland.

The scheme will be available every day on existing scheduled bus services except before 9:30am and between the hours of 3pm and 5pm during school term times.

This new initiative will run from to 31st March 2012 and will be reviewed throughout. As a listening council we want to be sure that it delivers a good service as well as providing good value for money.

In order to take advantage of the scheme young people will need to complete an application form that is available now from Sedbergh library, online at www.cumbria.gov.uk/ a2bnow or by calling 01539 713180.

Once completed, the form should be taken to Sedbergh library along with a passport style photo, £5 fee and proof of age and address of the applicant. Library staff will check over the application, take the payment and then send off for the card which will be issued direct to the applicant's home address. *Geoff Cook*

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The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) today (Monday) announced that, as part of the Government's Spending Review, the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's annual grant for 2011/12 will be £5.1m, falling to £4.2m by 2014/15.

This compares to a grant of £5.4m for the current financial year (2010/11), and represents a cut of 28.5%, taking into account inflation, over the four-year period.

Carl Lis, the Authority's Chairman, said: "It is impossible to pretend this is anything other than bad news and it clearly represents a major challenge over the four years. However, we are where we are so there is no point bleating about it. We have a responsibility to the National Park, its communities and the country, so we will face up to the difficulties of putting together a budget that takes into account these cuts."

David Butterworth, the Authority's Chief Executive, said:" There is little



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
point in beating about the bush. The size of the cut will obviously mean a reduction in services and a reduction in the number of staff employed by the Authority; both immediately and over the four-year period, although

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the exact numbers are not yet confirmed. We will now be producing our detailed budget and working out exactly how we are going to

cope in each financial year and what it will mean in terms of levels of services we can provide to the public."

"We intend to consult the public on the draft budget following a special Authority meeting in February."

BROADBAND

More Haste, More Speed

High-speed broadband. It's what everyone wants. Well, not everyone of course, some people will not be fussed about it, some will be suspicious, and some businesses don't need it – yet. But they will. Like a lot of things, that which at one time seemed a luxury or a plaything becomes practically a necessity, like a telephone or a fridge.

High-speed broadband will come to be seen as a must-have once everyone else can see and talk with their relatives in Australia in 3D, that's except for me of course, I don't want to talk to my relatives wherever they are – but that's only one of a myriad of uses.

The Government has pledged money in Cumbria for a pilot scheme to see how faster internet connections can be brought to 'virtually' everyone ('virtually' is their word) by 2015. Each parish has a representative who can keep the community informed about what is happening and feed back people's and businesses' wants and wishes. That person is me for Sedbergh, Tony Roberts in Garsdale, and Anne Fleck in Dent.

In rural areas it is not worth commercial companies' while to invest in the infrastructure (the cabling etc) and make profits from customers' subscriptions, like it is in densely populated parts, the money has to come, in one way or another, from the collective purse – this naturally causes a bit of head

scratching by those politicians who are firmly committed to the principle of free enterprise.

In December 2010 the Government published a document setting out their strategy for Britain having the best broadband provision in Europe by 2015. The idea is noble, though there is quite a bit in the document that is hard to get a firm grip on.

At the moment no one knows what will happen or how. Pressure groups across the county are busy polishing up their metaphorical banners that say, 'What do we want? High-speed Broadband! When do we want it? Now!'. Not perhaps quite the community spirit that David Cameron has in mind, though understandable given the current lack of clarity, I hope that things might become a little clearer over the coming weeks.

Incidentally, the *Race to Infinity* initiative from BT, where people in different areas cast their vote via a website – the initiative that there has been articles in Lookaround and distributed emails about – this is separate from the Government strategy funding. In any case no town in Cumbria has come top in this competition.

VISITING ROCK BAND - AND THE SEDBERGH NIGHTINGALES

I was delighted to read in the December Lookaround Andrew Allan's account of how he befriended the visiting Slovenian rock band 500m (Pet Sto Metrov) - a wonderful example of the kind of hospitality for which Sedbergh is famous. They clearly had a lot in common, and it's great that our exchanges in this instance included a different genre from our usual folk harmony singing groups allowing more people to meet and befriend each other. I heard they also joined in with other local activities including a game of football and their company was enjoyed by several other people.

However I did feel it was a shame that his warm hearted humanity towards these lads didn't extend to the Sedbergh residents who were disturbed by this band's singing under their windows late on a Sunday evening.

I have now organised over 30 exchanges of music groups between Sedbergh and towns in Slovenia and other countries. I believe all of them have enriched the cultural life of this town - as well as helped many of us with some of the challenges involved in being human. However there have been occasions - usually when there are unaccompanied youth groups drinking to excess - when residents have complained to me about late

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night noise which has ranged from smokers singing and talking loudly outside their accommodation, to a piano accordion being played down Sedbergh high street at 3am. The argument which Andrew Allan uses about English youths behaving much worse has been put by other well-wishers in the past, but I imagine this is of little comfort to those whose sleep is disturbed.

Being responsible for bringing these groups here, I have of course apologised to those concerned, and also tried to make sure it wouldn't happen again. Accommodating many of our groups now at the Howgills Bunk barn has been a great help as it is far enough away from other houses the band to park their camper was a perfect alternative as it is than a mile from the town, but enough away not to disturb neighbours. not to cause problems.

This rock band wanted me to arrange for them to park their camper van in the middle of Sedbergh, preferably next to the pub. Quite apart from breaking several by laws, I knew this would not be popular with residents and at the same time would be unpleasant for the rock band who might not want to go to bed early. Ernie Hailwood offering his farm for the band to park their camper van on was a perfect alternative as it is less than a mile from the town, but also far enough away not to disturb neighbours. The band left on the Friday night without incident and I breathed a sigh of relief that no one



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returned a couple of days later to join Andrew Allan at the Dalesman. It is very possible that the residents who Andrew Allan refers to in his article were fearing another night of music stretching late into the night and decided to nip it in the bud. But also, while there are certain existential certainties which include death and taxes - enjoying people singing outside your window at night when you need to rise early for work is unfortunately not one of them. I believe the residents who were disturbed had every right to voice their objection whether it was 10.30pm. 1am or both - as conflicting claims have it. But while needing an

early night on a Sunday means that some residents are quite understandably unable to enjoy singing under their windows, there are several homes nearby who would have loved to have Slovenian serenaders pay them a visit (though I suspect this number would diminish as the night wore on.) Confusing licence with hospitality always leads to problems - in this instance, assuming they had a licence to sing wherever they pleased meant that the band met with a very firm request for silence. A quiet word in the ear from their friends to sing elsewhere would have ensured that they continued to enjoy the hospitality

of everyone in the town.

The Cautley Carollers who I sing with have had over a dozen years experience of singing outside people's homes and we have found that while most of those we visit say Christmas doesn't start until they hear our festive harmonies, there are one or two homes who don't want us there at all. I now put leaflets round all the houses we will be visiting asking them to get in touch if they would rather we didn't sing there, which ensures that we only receive a welcome when our voices are heard singing in the night.

I have also sung outside homes in Slovenia - though again it has either been on the night of the Three Kings just after Christmas (which is similar to our carolling tradition only the singers dress as the Three Wise Men), or on people's birthdays when we were expected. Houses in the Zrece area also tend to have more space between them and are better insulated than Sedbergh's terraced homes, but even there I would not have been welcomed singing outside a stranger's house in the middle of the night when they had to get up early to work.

Some leaders of visiting groups have felt it necessary to have an induction into British mores. For instance Larry Gordan, leader of the wonderful Vermont folk choir Northern Harmony who stayed with Dentdale families a

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few years ago, after receiving complaints from residents in other towns, warned his teenage singers that when entering someone's home for the first time it may cause offence if the youngster straightaway helps themselves to the contents of the fridge. Similarly I shall now inform visiting musicians when - and when not - it is appropriate to serenade or play accordions.

Unfortunately it wasn't just late night noise which caused offence. I spent several weeks of unpaid work organising the UK tour of this rock band involving quite considerable expense to myself. The band were very keen to play in London so I travelled down to the city to meet with

promoters and venues and arranged 3 gigs for them in some of the best known rock venues. I also paid for advertising, and travelled several times to Lancaster and Kendal to arrange gigs and get a street performers' licence which along with fees earned them several hundred pounds. We had arranged beforehand by email that they would pay for the hire of the sound engineer and PA equipment, but they left me to pay this for them. When I told them I was withholding videos I had made of their tour until they paid this money and sent an apology for the late night disturbance, their leader said they had already done this - which turned

"The bad boys of rock and rock" has a certain ring to it and no doubt fuels the kind of raw energy which makes this music popular but may be short lived: just around the corner most players in youth bands are faced with children, mortgages, and jobs with a steady income - I wouldn't want to deny anyone those brief few years of rock and roll freedom.

But still, although I'm very pleased to read that Andrew Allan will now be looking after this band the next time they visit Sedbergh, when he quotes their leader as saying: "Does this mean we aren't welcome in Sedbergh any more?" I find it hard to answer without appearing a little rude. Far more poignant for me was a comment by a Sedbergh resident kept awake yet again by visiting musicians who rang me to say that while she used to like these Slovenian groups visiting she now hated them.

One highlight was a day visit to Bolzano and the Museum of Archaeology which houses Otzi the Ice Man born some 5,300 years ago and

After much thought Hilary Wilson has decided to join Appleby W.I. We

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
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will miss her and send her our best wishes. We understand her decision and hope to see her at Howgill as a visitor before too long.

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37-39 MAIN STREET FACT AND FICTION

I think most people have strong opinions about 37/39 Main Street which many can remember as a very good butcher's shop. I do not know all the facts but most of what follows are the facts that I do know and not my personal opinion. It is up to the reader to make up their own minds about what has happened and what should happen.

However I will start with one opinion, which I think will be universally shared even by the owners, and that is that the existence of a semi-derelict property in a prime position on Main Street is far from satisfactory. Something needs to be done.

The planning history goes back, believe it or not to 1982, when planning permission was received by Bob Udale for two shops, three dwellings and an office. For some reason, nothing was done. Does anyone know why? The planning permission lapsed.

In 1990 another planning application for five flats was approved but again, nothing happened.

In 1999 an application for six dwelling units was refused, the main reason being the lack of inadequate parking and that the development was 'too intensive'. That year the building became Listed Grade 2, for the first time.

In 2003 Udales tried again, this time

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reducing the number of flats to five. Parking was again a reason for refusal, particularly the congestion that would occur in Weaver's Yard as well as the lack of privacy for No 2 Weaver's Yard. This application required considerable demolition of buildings at the rear. Because the building was now a Listed Building and in a Conservation Area, extensive demolition was not acceptable. All of this would be contrary to the existing policies of the Yorkshire Dales Local Plan.

Now we come to 2004, an application which was not finally resolved until December 2009. It sat on the books, apparently at a standstill. Why? The new application differed from the previous in that it asked for three flats, two x two-storev dwelling houses and two retail units. The YDNPA Planning Committee recommended refusal for the same reasons it had refused the 2003 application. However they left the developer with the opportunity to make some design changes, undertake an archaeological assessment and to produce a financial justification for such an intensive development.

Two years later Udales' agent provided an initial archaeological assessment. After another year they provided a supplementary report and finally in March 2008 after four years from the initial application, Udales produced an amended development scheme. Although the number of residential units was not decreased, there were a number of changes to

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the internal layout and the yard at the rear was reduced in size. The valuation was checked by the District Valuer and because of the design changes there was a further consultation exercise with interested parties and the general public in December 2008.

The revised plans for 37/39 Main Street went to the Planning Committee in May 2009. I plead guilty in having had a part to play in getting a decision deferred until June. I spoke on behalf of the Cumbria Buildings Preservation Trust which was offering an alternative plan for the building. This resulted in the postponement.

In June 2009, the amended 2004 application was provisionally approved, pending the implementation of certain conditions by the owner - such as the removal of the pigeons and their mess. Although these conditions had not been met by December of that year, an assurance by the owner that they would be met within three months enabled the Committee finally to approve the application.

In his report to the Committee the Planning Officer concluded, "The proposed development remains less than satisfactory in terms of the Authority's normal presumption against allowing changes to listed buildings." The report also said, "Given any consent granted on the basis of the current proposal would represent a significant departure specifically in order to achieve early results, it is considered that it would be justifiable to approve conditions to ensure relatively rapid progress with this development."

Early results?
Rapid Progress?

I note that at the bottom of the letter written by Neil and Ian Udale and

posted on the windows of number 37/39 Main Street it says that, 'as there is currently a major downturn in the property market, development may be delayed".

Perhaps if the 2004 application had required a less intensive development, it could then have taken place before the present downturn in the property market. But that is easy to say after the event.

This has been rather long and tedious, so NEXT TIME I will show that there was and possibly still is an alternative.

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DECEMBER WEATHER

Depending on which report you have read this month's weather was either the coldest on record or the coldest for 80 or 120 years!! Whichever version is correct it was pretty chilly! For half the month it did not get above freezing all day. The lowest maximum temperature was 25F (-4C). The best maximum was 47.5F near the end of the month when a thaw had started. Minimum temperatures got down to 9.9F (-12.5C). Fortunately winds were light but the wind-chill got down to the low teens F on half the nights. In fact on only the last 3 nights did the wind-chill stay above freezing. It was a dry month due largely to everything being frozen, including the rain gauge no doubt. In fact we were only a couple of days short of an official drought! We ended the month with only 0.67 inches of rain.

The low temperatures and frozen conditions lead to problems both for livestock and wildlife. Getting water to them was the main problem. For most of the month I was taking 11 gallons a day from the kitchen sink to the poultry and sheep as everything beyond the inside door was frozen sold. Even the washing machine was out of action! Poultry and sheep were desperate to drink before the water froze over again. Stocks of hay are going down rapidly as well as bags of pellets. The sheep, especially the Rough Fell tup, are addicted to the molasses based lick bucket. His face is covered in it. Occasionally one of the ducks has laid an egg outside

which has frozen in the sub-zero temperatures resulting in it cracking. Thawing it out during cooking means you can't have a sensible boiled egg as the contents leak but they are ideal scrambled! The long tailed tits are continuing their visits to the feeders regularly at present along with blue, great and coal tits plus chaffinch and sparrows. The blackbirds continue to raid the apples stored in the shippon . As most of the food as gone from outside they are not so "friendly" to one another.




