

Current issues

- Purchase of Tennis Courts/
 Fishing Rights We are delighted

 outcome.
- Acquisition of 72 Main Street –
 The National Park Authority have
 agreed to allow until the end of
 March 2011 for a Community bid
 to be made. The users of the
 building have all pledged funds to
 support the purchase and a
 number of grant applications are
 being made. We are no therefore
 cautiously optimistic that an

- agreement can be reached and the building successfully acquired for the community.
- Ghyllas Layby Everything is now in place and the project to create a picnic area is expected to commence shortly.
- Toilets in Joss Lane The Parish Council have agreed to save these SLDC toilets from closure and will take over the running them from April 2011
- Highways Thanks to the volunteers who helped spread grit during the recent bad weather.

Planning Committee

- There have been a large number of planning applications. None have been opposed by the Council with a request for further clarification in one case.

DENT PARISH COUNCIL

There was no council meeting in January, so the February meeting was a busy one. The council agreed to spend money on refurbishing Dent's street lights, heard about progress on the YDNPA/Dent community initiative and discussed the state of the dale's roads. A full account of the meeting is contained in the minutes, published on www. dentdale.com (follow the parish council link) and obtainable as a hard copy on request from the parish clerk. .

Street Lights

Some of Dent's street lights are now at the end of their useful life, and they have become increasingly unreliable

of late. In some cases the wiring needs to be replaced and photocells and other fittings renewed. Councillors have now given approval for a thorough overhaul and refurbishment of all the lights, and when this is completed it is hoped that Dent will have a more reliable street light system.

Potholes and Cobbles

The state of the dale's roads after the winter weather was raised by a member of the public at the last council meeting. Particular concern was expressed about cobbles which were starting to lift in the village and the number of potholes where recent repairs had been washed out by heavy rain. It was agreed to report

Playing Field Flooding

Last month's article reported on the YDNPA/Dent community initiative in which the National Park is working with the local community on matters of mutual interest. As part of this, a meeting took place recently between representatives of the football and cricket clubs, the parish council and National Park officers to try and find a solution to the increasing amount of flooding on the playing field. In addition to the practical solutions that were identified, the Park's officers offered to calculate the volume of flood water that needs to be removed, Welcome to Dent in order to work out if the existing

drains are adequate.
Renewable Energy for Farms

work by Margaret Taylor to obtain approval from Cumbria Highways and the National Park, a welcome sign will shortly be placed at each end of the dale. One of the conditions imposed by Highways was that the parish council accepted responsibility for the signs, and so the council has agreed to add them to its public liability insurance. The signs will be paid for out of the funds that were left when the Business Forum was wound up, and which were allocated for tourist signs.

Affordable Housing Developments
At the end of last year the National
Park included both the Ghyllside and
Glebe Fold sites in Dent in its
proposed list of sites for affordable

and local needs housing. The sites now need to be approved by a planning inspector before they are finally included in YDNPA's housing strategy, but in the meantime the Park has produced design briefs for the type of housing it would allow to be built on them. When the parish council considered these at its last meeting it felt they were broadly acceptable, and this view has been relayed to the Park. The next stage will be for the landowners to find developers who are prepared to build on the sites, though in the present economic climate, with cuts to the amount of government money available for housing, this may not be easy.

Car Park Repairs

Work will start soon on repairs to the tarmac at the entrance to the car park. One edge is beginning to break up, and so at its last meeting the council agreed to pay for the necessary repairs.

Parking round The Green

Cumbria Highways have recently altered some of the "Resident Parking" signs around The Green so that they relate more closely to the parking bays. The next stage, which is due to happen shortly, will be to alter the road markings so that they indicate more clearly where cars should be parked.

Muck Spreading

The council has received a number of complaints from residents recently about the amount of manure dropped by some farm vehicles when travelling through Dent village, and these were discussed at the last meeting. It was felt that most farmers were very conscientious about clearing up any accidental spillages, and that the recent spills were unusual. Councillors agreed to monitor the situation and hoped that by drawing attention to the problem,

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those responsible would be encouraged to prevent it happening in future.

Next Meeting

The next council meeting will be held at 7.30pm on March 7th in the Sedgwick Room. The public are welcome to attend all meetings and to raise any matter that concerns them during the public forum which usually takes place at about 8pm.

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COUNCILLORS CORNER

There is no doubt that one of the biggest issues facing rural areas over the next few years is the extent to which they can gain access to the Superfast Broadband network. There is clear evidence to show that those areas where this can happen not only have an economic advantage in terms of local businesses and the promotion of tourism but even the value of houses in the area increases too! Like it or not. Broadband is here to stay and is a key element in the "white hot" technology revolution currently sweeping the country. It was with this in mind that our MP Tim Farron organised a Broadband conference in Kendal on Saturday

29th January to which representatives from across South Lakeland were invited. There were a number of people from Sedbergh and District present including David Collier from Sedbergh, Jock Cairns the Chair of Dent Parish Council and myself. The afternoon comprised presentations from delegates knowledgeable in this field (the air was thick with references to kilobytes, megabytes, gigabytes and even terabytes) and particularly from officers from Cumbria County Council who are charged with putting a scheme in place to enable the ten million pounds made available through government grant to be spent effectively. Following the presentations, small groups were

formed to discuss the proposals in more detail followed again by more presentations to explain specific proposals which were already under consideration and in some cases up and running. The practical outcome as far as the Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale Ward was concerned was a decision that each Parish would appoint a facilitator or Champion to oversee and report on developments and notify them to a co-ordinator who in turn would pass them up the line via Tim Farron to the County Council. Jock Cairns was appointed coordinator for our Ward and David Collier agreed to take on responsibility for Sedbergh. Other parishes will be appointing, or have

already appointed, their own Champions. There is a great deal of will and enthusiasm to carry forward this project and we are lucky to have so many committed local people willing to take part in making it happen. Technical decisions need to be made, of course, over such things as to how Broadband will actually be carried to the more remote areas around here but at least we are in at the beginning of all this and can make a real difference to the final outcome. The Big Society in action in fact!

Closely following the conference was a meeting of the Local Area Partnership in Sedbergh at which the proposals coming out from the conference were welcomed and a

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decision made to support what had been decided.

The Sedbergh Townscape Initiative is proceeding apace and a further very well attended meeting was held on the 25th January at which the consultants reported on the outcome of the public consultation which I am pleased to say was unanimously positive. At this same meeting Parish Councillor Jim Atkins was appointed Chair of the STI and I am sure that he will proactively steer it forward in a way which we have come to expect from the initiator of the allotments project. You will find in this issue a more detailed report from him as to what was actually discussed and decided at the meeting. Suffice for me to say, keep a look out for the new street signs which should be appearing shortly!

I have mentioned in a previous article that I am a member of the SLDC Task Group currently preparing a Report on the provision of affordable housing throughout the District. We have had many meetings, interviewed a large number of people and the Report is currently being finalised with a view to its

shortly being presented to its parent Overview and Scrutiny Committee and ultimately Cabinet. SLDC takes the lack of affordable housing in the District very seriously indeed and is organising a major housing conference in Kendal on the 18th March. For myself I can only reiterate that I place the provision of affordable homes very high on my personal agenda and I was somewhat surprised to receive feedback from my earlier article that this view is not universally shared. The over-riding problem is that in Cumbria the differential between income and house prices or house rental is greater than almost anywhere else in the country and this is an issue that

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must be addressed if we are not to have local people leaving because they cannot afford to buy or rent a home in the area where they were brought up or have strong personal connections. If wages cannot go up then house prices must come down and this can only happen by a mixture of reducing development costs, innovative forms of sustainable development and building materials, and finance being available to all those wishing to buy or rent. We have recently celebrated the completion of the 500th affordable home in the District since the introduction of the Cumbria Housing Strategy in 2006 and I can only hope that we can continue to improve on this success over the coming years.



COUNCILLORS CORNER

As a county we set our budget two days before I write this. The district will be doing the same next week. Yorkshire Dales has agreed a "draft" budget which is now in the public domain. All three authorities are making significant reductions in services but as I said last month, not the county, nor the police nor the district will be making any increase in their share of the council tax bill. Of the three authorities I sit on the National Park is taking the most immediate hit in terms of budget, but over the longer period the county will

suffer most. South Lakeland will not be affected quite so much because it was very badly hit by the changes John Prescott made back in 2001, totally disproportionately to the other two.

The two most direct changes we will see in Sedbergh will be the parish, hopefully, taking over Joss Lane toilets and the community, hopefully, taking over the Community Office Building. At the moment, Sedbergh Library is safe. There could be changes in the medium term as to how it is run but the county has invested a lot of money in Sedbergh Library building. Because of the nature of the lease with the owners, Sedbergh United Charities, this



means that the service will continue for the foreseeable future, in some form or another. The same cannot be said for the Travelling Library currently received in Dent. I have been told that it has been costing £70 per book issued to run the service in Cumbria. Sorry, but that is a cost we can no longer justify.

Several people have written concerning disabled parking in Kendal. Some have been round robin letters, others have clearly been written by the sender. I do not accept the general premise that Kendal is the most disabled person unfriendly town in England but I have long expressed concerns about the whole

Dems continue to control South Lakeland after May then they are hell bent on removing free parking from New Road – not that you will see that in their voluminous leaflets. That will surely make Kendal the most parking unfriendly town in England for disabled and able bodied alike.

Just at the very time that local authorities are having to make large budget reductions the county is also having to go through the whole Job Evaluation process. Job Evaluation, hereafter JE was a commitment for local government first made in 1997 encapsulating the concept of equal pay for equal work – in theory. As a very small organisation YDNP was issue of parking in the town. If the Lib able to implement JE before 2000,



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one of the first to do it. There it went well with only a handful of problems. For South Lakeland the process was much less happy, contributing to the departure of a Chief Executive and two senior officers.

Not having JE in place has already cost the county £40M in Employment Tribunal awards and if it is not in place by next September the costs will rocket, month by month. It was inevitable that JE would throw up some problems. I am very aware of the issues concerning Teaching Assistants in this area and hope we can have some rational resolution.

Since my last article the national government has announced and then retracted a proposal to sell off publicly

owned woodland in England. Personally, I think the forests could have been better managed and made more accessible by being in private hands. There has been a lot of noise about public access to forests, as if that was a timeless quality. In fact, in my youth, not that long ago, all Forestry Commission woods were decidedly "out of bounds" with draconian penalties for trespassers. I believe they were opened up in about 1980, but whether that was when Margaret Thatcher was PM or Jim Callaghan, my memory escapes me.

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BREAKS FOR CARERS OF DISABLED CHILDREN

Breaks for those who care for disabled children are to come into force as of 1st April 2011. Draft regulations have been published, placing obligations on local authorities to provide short breaks for carers of disabled children.

According to the legislation, drafted last November, local authorities must 'have regard to the needs of those carers who would be unable to continue to provide care unless breaks from caring were given to them.' They will also be expected to have regard to the requirements of carers who would be able to more effectively care for their disabled child

if they were given breaks from caring that enabled them to -

- undertake education, training or any regular leisure activity,
- meet the needs of other children in the family more effectively, or
- carry out day to day tasks which they must perform in order to run their household.

In particular, local authorities will be instructed to provide a range of:

- day-time care in the homes of disabled children or elsewhere,
- overnight care in the homes of disabled children or elsewhere,
- educational or leisure activities for disabled children outside their homes, and
- services available to assist carers

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in the evenings, at weekends and during the school holidays.

Local authorities will be given until

1st October 2011 to prepare a statement outlining details of the range of services that will be made available to carers of disabled children, the criteria by which those eligible will be assessed and how these services will meet the needs of carers in the area. They will be expected to take into consideration the views of carers whilst preparing and revising the statement.

South Lakeland Carers, a Cumbria based charity which aims to enable carers to manage their caring roles more effectively, welcome the regulations which will allow parents of disabled children to carry out day to day tasks that many other parents may take for granted. The legislation will give disabled children the opportunity to participate in positive activities independently of their family and outside of school.

David Congdon, Head of Policy and Campaigns, Mencap and Every Disabled Child Matters Board member said: "These regulations go a long way to strengthening disabled children and their families' rights to short breaks. Parents have told us that 'the lack of short breaks was the biggest single cause of unhappiness with service provision'. Giving carers this right is a huge step forward to families with disabled children living ordinary lives. We hope that the accompanying guidance on the Short

Breaks Duty is produced in a timely way allowing local authorities to prepare for the duty's

commencement on 1st April 2011. This guidance will help local authorities navigate the legal maze on short breaks thus ensuring that families get the breaks they are entitled to, and reducing local authorities risk of legal challenge."

The regulations will now be presented to Houses of Parliament for approval, with the Government writing guidelines to accompany the regulations. It is anticipated they will be published soon after the regulations have been approved.

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SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

The first meeting of the new year was well attended by members who had come to hear a talk by Trevor Avery who lives in Sedbergh. He had acted as an adviser to the BBC for their programme "The orphans who survived the concentration camps" and his talk was about these orphans and was entitled "From Auschwitz to Ambleside".

The talk attempted to answer three questions about the orphans; who were they, how did they come to be here and where did they stay? The answer to the first question was that they were Jewish and there were three hundred of them aged between 5 and 18, the vast majority of whom were boys. Most had originally lived in close knit communities in rural south-west Poland. In addition to the children there were a few adults to support them but several of these absconded when they reached Windermere.

The experiences of one boy, Mayer born in 1926, were used to illustrate how and why they had come to Windermere. He had been forcibly separated from his parents and along with other boys had been put into a slave labour gang laying railway lines to concentration camps that were being constructed. In all he was in nine such camps during the war. He arrived in Auschwitz Birkenau in June 1943 and managed to survive there by working as a tailor, a trade to which he had been apprenticed. His job was altering the uniform of the

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German soldiers. His job meant that he avoided the gas chambers but experienced hunger and starvation. In November 1944 along with the other inmates he was moved because the Russians were advancing towards the camp. They were subjected to forced marches without food and water and anyone who fell out was shot. Then they had a three week journey in open railway carriages during which many died. They eventually reached Theresienstadt. This had originally been set up as a camp for privileged Jews but had become a ghetto for Jews displaced from concentration camps. Mayer survived there until it was liberated by the Russians in May 1945 and then hospitals and food were provided.

After the war various individuals and organisations asked the British Government if it would allow some Jewish children survivors into the country to recuperate. About 300 orphaned children, including Mayer, were picked and moved to Prague from where the RAF flew them in Stirling bombers to near Carlisle in

August 1945. They were then transported to the Calgarth Estate near Windermere. This had been constructed in 1941 to house workers building Sunderland flying boats and the children were accommodated in huts that had been used by single unmarried workers. These huts were situated in what is now the grounds of the Lakes School. Each child had its own cubicle with a cupboard and a bed with clean linen, unimaginable luxuries after a concentration camp. Initially there were problems with them adjusting to the availability of food and realizing they did not have to hoard it to avoid starvation. Also, understandably, many had behavioural problems after their

experiences. There were the inevitable problems with local boys due to the influx of foreign teenage boys but the conflicts tended to be over local girls rather than racially motivated. However, despite problems the children were given a friendly greeting and welcomed by the locals. For the children themselves Windermere was paradise after what they had been through during the war. After a few months they left Windermere and many stayed in Britain making successful lives for themselves.

After his talk Trevor answered questions and then was thanked for his moving talk by the chairman.

What I have been reading this month:

- 1. 'The Lady and the Unicorn' by Tracy Chevalier (historical fiction)
 Based on tapestries woven about 1500 this is a readable lightweight historical novel. It does give good descriptions of the lives of weavers in Northern Europe at the time otherwise I found the substance disappointing. The tapestries now hang in a museum in Paris there are no photographs in the book but googling the images of them shows how beautiful and significant they were.
- 2. 'The Places in Between ' by Rory Stewart (travel)

The author (who now lives in Cumbria) walked from Herat to Kabul in an Afghan winter (2002) just after the Taliban had fallen. This is an extraordinary journey through remote villages, deep snow encountering

- (with an adopted wolf dog) the complex, varied cultures and groups in rural Afghanistan. Rory faced challenge, danger, little food and conflicts almost daily and is a knowledgeable and insightful narrator. I felt I had done the journey from my sofa!
- 3. 'The Complaints' by Ian Rankin (fiction)

Malcolm Fox works in the Police Complaints department in Edinburgh. Rising star Jamie Breck is now under investigation for an allegation that seems extremely secretive. Action packed, clever dialogue, believable characters, contemporary plot are all woven into a world of murder, property speculation and bribes. Facing the 'who can you trust in the police force?' question discounts quite a lot of managers, journalists and family connections on the way to unravelling this engrossing book. A winner!! RM

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SOUTH LAKELAND CARERS

Fear over Spending Cuts for Carers A South Lakeland Carers Charity is battling to continue its vital services in light of the recently proposed spending cuts, which could devastate carers in the county.

South Lakeland Carers say the 11,000 carers in the area are at risk of being hit with a 'double whammy' with potential cuts to services to the person they care for and cuts to services designed to support them.

Young carers are also facing uncertainty as children's services have not given any indication of future funding to support them.

Steve Pollard, Director of South Lakeland Carers, based in Kendal, said: "South Lakeland Carers offer a number of vital services for carers in the area, providing them with free one-to-one support and counselling as well as sitting services and carer's breaks, giving them the strength, confidence and ability to continue caring for longer.

"Without continued support from the government and from local people, services such as our Hospital Outreach, where Carer Support Workers visit the hospital to meet carers and offer information about support services to help them, may suffer."

The call for continued support for carers comes after the issue was brought to attention in the national media with the case of Rivan Vincent whose parents were forced to consider putting their child into full time care due to the demand of keeping up with financial and

emotional costs.

Mr Pollard said: "The case of Riven Vincent highlights the dangers of the economy failing to invest in care which supports families caring for relatives.

"It is not unusual for carers to feel under enormous pressure and to be pushed to breaking point. South Lakeland Carers is here to support carers in the local community, to help them to cope with their caring role.

"The good news is that around £900,000 per year for the next 4 years will be given to the NHS to provide breaks for carers. The NHS is being encouraged to work with social care services and carers organisations to ensure this money is spent on carers. We are working to ensure that this money is spent to support carers and that carers will continue to gain support in the tough economic times ahead."

The Government recognised the importance of social care in October's Comprehensive Spending Review. However, with local authorities facing cuts of up to 28% over the next four years, there is a risk that care and support services will suffer.

As local authorities are forced to make massive cuts, this is a crucial time for carers, the cared for and caring support charities like South Lakeland Carers. Steve Pollard

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JANUARY WEATHER

Another chilly month but not quite such a sustained cold spell as last month. Temperatures varied from a maximum of a balmy 50.5F to a chilly minimum of 12.3F (-11C). The wind chill on that night dropped the temperature to -13F (-25C!!!!). Not a night to be out and about! Atmospheric pressure, and hence wind speed, was interesting during this month. During the early part of the month pressure was low and the wind speed, as normal in these conditions, was brisk but temperatures were below freezing for a week which wasn't guite what we usually expect. During the third week we had a spell of high pressure and the winds were, as expected, lighter but the direction wasn't as expected. High pressure during the winter normally gives us light easterly winds. Low pressure generally pulls winds in from the west which tends to be warmer in winter. This month the high pressure produced winds, except for one day, from a westerly direction. The maximum wind speed recorded was 15.7 mph. This variable month

was quite a wet one with a rainfall total of 5.32 inches most of which fell in the second week. In fact the last fortnight only produce 0.04 inches, nearly an official drought!!

Once the snow had cleared the bulbs were through. Honeysuckle, one of the earliest shrubs to move, was showing green tips to its buds. Hazel and alder catkins suddenly seemed to have lengthened. By the end of the month some snowdrops were showing white. Cock birds are singing as they mark out their territories. Our "resident" owl has been calling even during the afternoon! Nearby rooks are back at their nest site inspecting the damage. Stock are shifting some food much of which will be to keep them warm. I am always surprised how much water they drink but I suppose dry hay and pellets need slecking down. The bird table visitors have increased again this month with even the odd goldfinch dropping in for its niger seed. The mallard are dropping in less frequently for breakfast at the moment. Perhaps they are busy on other duties!

NEW BELLS FOR DENT

The Bells of St Andrew's Dent to be "Christened"

Tuesday 1st March sees our bells return to Dent after their long restoration at the Bell Foundry at Whitechapel in London.

At 11am the bells will be officially named, or christened before they are lifted into the Tower. This will be an outdoor event, so wear a coat! No matter what the weather, it is a great day of celebration for Dentdale, because within a few days of their installation into the Tower, the bells will be ready for pealing. A lot of thought has gone into the naming of

the bells and we involved Dent School, who chose the name of the smallest bell.

Church Bells are evangelists, calling people to come and worship, so we give some of the bells the

names of famous evangelists from the past. Other bells have been named in honour of the patron saints of the United Kingdom:

- Big George for the largest bell and named after the patron saint of England
- Andrew for the patron saint of the church, an apostle and evangelist
- David for the patron saint of Wales, apostle and evangelist to the Welsh nation
- Patrick evangelist and the patron saint of Ireland, whose Celtic missionaries had a considerable

- influence on the Vikings who colonised Dentdale
- John for the apostle and evangelist and patron of our sister church in Cowgill
- Theresa (chosen by the children of Dent School) a modern saint who taught people to love God in a busy world.

The naming of bells is called the Service of Chrismation and is normally conducted by a bishop. I apologise for the short notice, but the nature of the project and timings of the contractors responsibilities make speed and flexibility of arrangements essential. However, following this

event, all the restoration work (including the bells and the clock) will be formally dedicated to the glory of God at a Dedication Service at 10.30am on Sunday 19th June at St Andrew's Dent, the service to be

conducted by Bishop David Hope. This will be the first formal occasion the bells are pealed (though you will of course hear them before then). This will also be an occasion of thanksgiving for all that has been achieved through the support of the local community and will mark the formal ending to all restoration appeals (Do you remember there have been four appeals? It has been a huge effort for the "Raise the Roof Appeal," the Dent Organ Appeal, the Bells Appeal and the Village Clock Appeal).

POTHOLES

The Guild of Experienced Motorists has issued the following advice with respect to Potholes which seem to be breeding on their own:

- **1.** Always be aware of dangerous potholes on your route home and in your area and, if necessary, find an alternative route.
- 2. Remember to keep your distance from the car in front. Motorists will often brake suddenly if they spot a pothole too late, so ensure you are far enough away to slow down safely. This applies even more to two-wheelers, for whom an encounter with a pothole can be lethal.
- 3. Make sure you stick to the speed limit and drive even more slowly than

normal on smaller roads and residential streets where potholes may be prevalent. Hitting a pothole at speed will cause much more damage to your vehicle.

- **4.** Never swerve to avoid a pothole; always slow down or stop completely if necessary checking that there are no vehicles close behind you drive over it slowly or manoeuvre around it when it is safe to do so.
- **5.** Remember to help your local authority by reporting any dangerous potholes that are causing problems in the area.

PASTURES NEW IN ITALY

Sedbergh lovers of Italy will be enjoying a new part of that amazing country this September. For several years we have stayed near Rome. This time we shall be based in a lovely spa town in the foothills of the Tuscan Appennines. We have a full week of interesting experiences: we begin by flying in over the Venetian Lagoon and, towards the end of the week, we shall be exploring the Renaissance palaces of Florence. Using our own coach, we shall visit three memorable cities - Bologna, Ravenna and Florence. Bologna, the seat of the oldest university in Europe and the gastronomic capital of Italy, is a city where shoppers are protected from heavy rain and burning sun by the historic arcades. Ravenna, at one time capital of the western Roman Empire, is famous for its unforgettable mosaics, the finest Byzantine ones outside Istanbul. Florence must surely be among the finest cities in the world. We shall have guided tours of each of these followed by a bit of free time to explore.

One day we shall travel up the valley of the River Senio, calling at a farm for lunch, learning about farming in the area, and having the chance to walk and relax among the Tuscan hills. We shall be in the region at the time of the grape harvest and shall enjoy a "harvest supper" at a nearby vineyard, with wine-tasting and local music. We shall have a young visiting

lecturer with us who will provide us with expert historical introductions to the places we visit. There will be opportunities – for those who want to do so - to practise and improve their Italian language skills.

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YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Consultation continues on National Park cuts

Members of the public, local communities and organisations still have time to comment on draft budget plans to reduce Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) work programmes following Government cuts.

Consultation is underway on the draft document, which contains proposals to save money after the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs reduced the Authority's grant over the next four years by nearly £1.9m (or 31 per cent) including inflation.

Authority Chairman Carl Lis said: "We have already received a number of responses to the consultation document but we would like to hear as many views as possible on the draft budget before the closing date for comments on March 10."

The proposals include 15 voluntary and three compulsory redundancies, the scrapping of 12 work programmes and a reorganisation of the Authority's Country Har Further definition.

proposed arrangements

At the Neighbourhood Forum held in the People's Hall, Sedbergh on 18 January 2011, council officials and the police informed those present about the arrangements for the Appleby Fair 2011. Broadly these will follow those successfully used in 2010.

- The siting of signs, boulders and wooden stakes will be concentrated in smaller areas around Devils Bridge, Barbon, Straight Bridge, New Bridge and Cautley.
- Police patrols will start on 30 April until 11 June.
- The Traffic Regulation Order will become permanent in 2011.
- Bow tops and their horses are allowed on the grass verges, but no mechanical vehicles.

Despite what was said in "Big fat gypsy weddings" on Channel 4

recently, bow tops and their horses were allowed on the grass verges in 2010 and many travellers took advantage of the arrangement. DATES

Devils Bridge, Middleton Common and Rawthey Bridge stopping areas will be open 23 May – 2 June & 9 June – 16 June.

Scrogg Bank (by kind permission of the owner, with extra toilets and "bins") will be open 23 May – 2 June & 6 June – 13 June.

Cote Moor will be open 29 May – 9 June.

Appleby "Fair Hill" will be open 2 June – 6 June.

These arrangements may change. The Councils and Police will be holding "drop in" sessions in Sedbergh in April. The intention of both the gypsy and traveller community and the resident (settled) community is to restore the Fair to its traditional roots. *Dr Gina Barney*


Responding to a call to reply to Keith's speech Director of music Alan

Programme for 2011

The Band's programme for the year is largely settled and promises to be as busy as the year just gone. The first major engagement is the Annual Spring Concert on Tuesday 8th March. On Saturday 12th of March the Band are delighted to be giving a short concert at the *Lookaround's*

25th Anniversary Party in the People's Hall. A week later sees the Band playing in Kendal at the fundraising Sandylands/Lion's Concert in the Methodist Church, Windermere Road.

On April 2nd, for the sixth successive year, will be providing music at the Annual Sedbergh Spring Show. On the 23rd of the same month, following the success of last year's inaugural celebration of St. George's Day, the event will be repeated in the Bull Hotel Garden. The band will again be leading the parade on May 21st for the Sedbergh Gala and then playing in their marquee on the Lupton Field. At the end of the month the majority of the Band will be away in Belgium, staying in Ypres, giving a concert in the town square and touring the battle fields.

On June 4th the Band will help celebrate the opening of a new gate at the Sedbergh Bowling Club and on 9th of July they will provide music at the St. Andrew's Churchyard Party.

The final event before the Christmas season starts is the Annual Concert of Remembrance to be held on Friday 11th November in the United Reformed Church.

The pattern for the festive season is largely the same as last year starting with the Christmas Concert on Tuesday 6th December in the People's Hall, the day before Late Night Opening when the Band will again be playing. SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

On 2nd February Mr Ian Tyler gave a fascinating, lively and entertaining illustrated talk on the gunpowder mills of South Lakeland - a surprisingly extensive industry, yet now almost forgotten.

Mr Tyler, who is the founder and curator of the Keswick Mining Museum and has written a dozen books on the subject of mining in Cumbria, began by explaining the nature and origin of gunpowder. Invented by Roger Bacon in 1247, its formula consists of 70% saltpetre, 15% sulphur and 15% charcoal. In its milling, which involves crushing, mixing and refining through a series of drying processes but in a necessarily damp atmosphere to reduce the risk of explosions, it was finally packed in the form of pellets. into calico bags, or into barrels lined with linen bags ready for transportation by wagon, barge and ship. Amazingly, there were no fewer than 60 different types of gunpowder! This depended on whether its use was for various types and sizes of firearms or in mining, quarrying or other industrial processes.

South Lakeland was particularly suitable for its manufacture. A remote, sparsely populated area, it had plenty of water, rivers, the availability of charcoal, and several shallow-water ports ideal for trans-shipment in small sailing vessels: Lancaseter (Glasson Dock), Arnside, Grange, Greenodd and Milnthorpe among others.

The first gunpowder mill was

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established at Old Sedgwick in 1764. Others quickly followed, including Low Wood. Elterwater. New Sedgwick, Black Beck and Gatebeck. Clearly a dangerous trade to be involved in, yet commanding good wages for the time (£1 + bonuses per week in the 1820s and 1830s), several hundred workers were employed across the region, both men (mainly in building, processing and transportation) and women (mainly in packing). This lucrative industry needed considerable initial investment, and the bulk of this (from 1799) came from Mr Wakefield of Sedgwick Hall, the local entrepreneur who also had business interests in banking and brewing. As the industry expanded so the Huddleston family of the Elterwater works and the Wilsons of Rigmaden became involved.

Initially the barrels of gunpowder were transported by horse-drawn

wagons, later attached to rails, and by barge along the length of Windermere or via the Kendal-Lancaster canal which was constructed partly for this trade, being routed alongside the Sedgwick works and through the 150-yard Hincaster tunnel, a significant feat of engineering. From the local ports it was shipped to Liverpool and thence into larger vessels overseas, including West Africa where it became a key component in the triangular trade involving slaves to the in the industrial heritage of our Americas.

Mr Tyler illustrated his talk with a series of impressive archive transparencies, mainly in sepia or

black-and-white. They depicted members of the workforce variously operating pressing machines (to squeeze moisture from the gunpowder), posing with their instruments in the works' brass band, loading barrels (dozens each day) onto the wagons, packing the powder-filled pellets on dust-filmed tables, etc. Above all, the slides reinforced the ever-present dangers: testing mortars with 80lb cannonballs; having to use copper nails and banding on the barrels to avoid sparks(many highly-skilled coopers were employed) as well as copper horseshoes and copper-coated rails; being issued with leather aprons as their only protection agaist explosions and burns; and a 'before and after' pair of photographs showing a powder mill house with its mill-wheel by a river becoming totally destroyed after an explosion... apart from the mill-wheel itself! In fact, 102 were killed during the period of the industry (perhaps a surprisingly small number) though countless others must have been injured by various degrees of burns.

The local gunpowder industry came to an abrupt halt in 1937 when I.C.I. bought up the mills and shifted the entire production to Ayrshire in Scotland, out of range of the looming threat of enemy bombers. So ended a remarkable and little-known chapter beautiful South Lakes - one very well documented by Ian Tyler in this talk, at his museum and in his books.

CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

Kilimanjaro – a Grandmother's Perspective.

It is not often that the audience at a local CWT talk is stunned into silence but when Jackie Foott showed her final picture of herself at the summit of Africa's highest mountain, the feeling of awe was palpable. Then came the question "Why?" Why put yourself through the miseries of altitude sickness just for starters. A long held ambition was the answer and inevitably, because it was there.

Jackie is not the only Sedbergh denizen to have scaled these heights nor indeed the only local grandparent, but what made her achievement all the more remarkable was her determination not to put plans on hold after undergoing major surgery only a few weeks before.

Kilimanjaro stands 19,341ft above the plains of Tanzania and is the highest freestanding mountain (ie not part of a mountain range) in the world. As you climb to the summit the environment changes from steamy forest to snowy peak and the climate from tropical rainforest to arctic taiga. It is not a technically difficult climb, more a very long trek (7-8 days) which has to be undertaken slowly to try and ameliorate the effects of altitude sickness. The fitter trekkers are often at a disadvantage as they stride off too quickly needing a greater intake of air, increasingly a problem with decreasing air pressure. "Pole pole" is the mantra, keep moving slowly slowly to adapt to changing conditions. It is therefore



very sensible to take your time, stopping to admire the spectacular vistas as you go. Many have died or been in need of rescue having disregarded this advice.

Jackie's African adventure had concluded with a visit to Zanzibar for some well deserved R & R but she showed us pictures of her time there first, no doubt to soften us up for what was to follow! Vivid photographs of markets, spices, fish, octopi, the cathedral on the site of the old slave market then boat ride to a small protected island for a stay in surreal eco dwellings constructed from driftwood and other local materials. More magnificent illustrations

followed of giant clams, reef egrets, nocturnal tree climbing coconut crabs and monarch fly catchers.

Thence to "Kilimanjaro International Airport". The journey began with rainforest tracks then areas of familiar bracken. Occasionally the distant peak could be spotted far away. Several other teams were climbing at the same time and campsites, tents, huts, latrines, were provided. Fortunately porters were also in attendance (27 for 7 climbers) carrying overnight gear, all the very necessary extra clothing layers and provisions for the trip. Washing was done in bowls, too small unfortunately to bathe one's increasingly fragile feet. Some familiar species were

heathers, redhot poker, cranesbill, scabious, and lobelia cacti appeared as height increased. Sunbirds appeared with white-necked raven and alpine chat and the dramatically black and white coats of the colobus monkeys. The latter swinging past in groups of at least 20.

spotted en route. Ancient cyclads,

As the summit was approached the volcanic nature of the uneven terrain made progress difficult. Kilimanjaro is a dormant volcano last active 200 years ago. The smell and toxicity of sulphur dioxide (several times more lethal than carbon monoxide) was an added hazard. Ash and scree made walking unstable and the steadying arm of a personal porter was invaluable. The final ascent was done at night with headtorches. Probably as well as one couldn't see the hazards ahead. At last dawn broke over the snow fields. The temperature was minus 10C, nausea kicked in, Kendal mint cake and Red Bull gave an energy boost but the mission was accomplished. Despite the camera malfunctioning because of the temperature, a compulsion to just lie down and some very sore feet,, Jackie had taken some awesome shots of the "roof of Africa". One can only assume some built in auto-pilot got her there plus a great deal of personal courage and determination.

The return journey was by a much speedier route, gravity assisted. Our heartfelt thanks were expressed to Jackie for a memorable evening of stunning photography and personal endeavour. SG

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PEOPLE'S HALL

We have divided the Redevelopment of the People's Hall into three phases. Basically Phase 1 is the front part. Phase 2 is the rear annexe and Phase 3 is refurbishment, car park and grounds. The plans are available to view on the boards in the Main Hall and the Committee Room. Phase 1 is divided into two stages. Phase 1A is to create a new extension to the north (up Howgill Lane) to provide new lobby. toilets, committee room bar and stores. Phase 1B is to draw the hall forward towards Howgill Lane to create a new small hall and technical gallery.

Our Architect, Barbara Hartley of Garsdale Design, is busy producing detailed plans of Phases 1A and 1B for Building Regulations approval. She has been able acquire the services of a trainee architect, Martha, to assist and we expect the plans to be drafted by Easter. In addition, Martha is to develop the interior aesthetic design for us. The latter aspect is very exciting as it involves the décor, glazing and finishes, including the placement of Jack McLean's donation bricks.

We have been in contact with the Big Lottery Fund (www.bit.ly/PH-Fund1) to check our eligibility for the "Reaching Communities Capital"

Strand" providing funding of between £100,000 and £500,000 for large capital projects. (Phases 1A and 1B are costed at £600,000.)

Their method of determining eligibility is to use the Hall's precise post code, eg: "LA10 5DQ". In their response we are told that the post code for the People's Hall is not in a deprived area. The anomaly is that my flower meadow is eligible, as are the bigger properties at the top of Howgill Lane!

As the People's Hall serves the needs of all of the people of Sedbergh we contacted our MP, Tim Farron, and received the following reply:

Thank you very much for your recent email with regard to the ridiculous reason for the rejection of your application for Big Lottery funding.

I am pleased to confirm that I have written to their Chief Executive to give my full endorsement to your argument for exemption from the routine restriction of the postcode. I have also stressed the added importance of the hall facilities on





grounds of the lack of public transport to enable local residents and the outlying community to get to alternative venues. I sincerely hope that our case will be accepted, although this will depend upon the letter of the law. I will write again, when I have received his response.

So we wait in anticipation that our "Big Society" can be supported.

On the question of support it was disappointing that so few people turned out to our two February fundraising events: "Blackheart Band" and "Brassed Up!". Although we did not make a loss we do need to get funds together. You can see what you missed for the Brassed Up event at: www.bit.ly/brassedup

Here is another chance to support our efforts as the Pepperpot Club is to hold a performance of the new Sedbergh Orchestra on 31 March 2011 in the People's Hall. The proceeds, of which, are to be divided between the Pepperpot's Alison Armstrong Fund and the Hall's Redevelopment Fund.

TIM FARRON MP

Well, the great Forestry Sell Off debate certainly saw a first for me this month. Over the years that I have been working as your MP we have seen lots of consultations and been frustrated by the majority of them which, as far as I could see, simply ignored the views of most people involved. Causing us all to wonder what the point of "consulting" was in the first place, if the parties involved are going to do what they always planned. Recent "consultations" about the future of services at Westmorland General Hospital and the introduction of democracy into the running of the YDNP spring quickly to mind but there are other examples.

Which is why the Forestry Sell Off Debate was so unusual. Here was a consultation that not only recognised what people wanted to happen before it had even started but acted upon everyone's wishes and cancelled the plans for the sell-off before the formal process had even begun. However, we will need to be vigilant as all that the Government has promised to do is reconsider the safeguards that it is

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putting in place to protect the forests. This is not the same as cancelling the plans which is what most people I speak to actually want but it is a step in the right direction and everyone who has signed a petition or attended a protest can feel proud that they have done their bit to save our forests.

Another example of the Government listening in the past month was the announcement by Danny Alexander, the Chief Secretary to the Treasury, that money has been put aside to cover the VAT that Mountain Rescue Teams have to pay on their equipment. I have been campaigning for years to have Mountain Rescue Teams brought in to line with other emergency services, who can claim back any VAT they pay out. This was why it was brilliant to hear Danny say, in answer to my question in Parliament, that, at long last, we are

getting what we wanted.

Finally, this month sees the tenth anniversary of the dreadful 2001 Foot and Mouth outbreak that brought farming in this country and in particular Cumbria to a standstill and devastated our local tourist industry. There are still many visible reminders around of how much Cumbria suffered during that time. My drive to Oxenholme station, when I am heading off to London, takes me past the places where disinfected mats were placed in the road to help reduce the spread of the outbreak. We really must ensure that we never see an outbreak like that ever again. However, there are still many invisible hangovers from that time still in place

that are do nothing other than add to farmers' costs. I am thinking in particular of the unnecessary 6 day movement restriction and electronic tagging of sheep. I have put down a motion in Parliament asking the Government to consider removing these measures. Let's see if they listen.

As I write, half term is upon us. The evenings are getting lighter, with the sight of snowdrops brightening our days whilst the promise of more colours around us in the gardens and hedgerows is exciting. Spring is on its way and each one of us is looking ahead to something. It may be just a change in the weather, a change of scene, an improvement in health; everyone has a special wish for the

Here at St Andrew's we have something to consider concerning our future. The news broke in December 2010 that plans were afoot to abolish the Diocese of Bradford to which we belong. Containing 160 churches the Diocese is the smallest in England, numerically speaking and reaches from its southern borders with Wakefield to us here in the far west of the diocese, some 48 miles from the cathedral in Bradford. The proposal is that we join the Diocese of Carlisle.

Carlisle Diocese, once part of the Diocese of Durham was founded in 1133 by King Henry 1st. Dioceses are separated into smaller areas called Deaneries and it could be that should



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we move we would be introduced into the Deanery of Kendal, which has borders on the Dioceses of Bradford and Blackburn. Carlisle Diocese, with The Right Reverend James Newcome as its Bishop has in its care 351 churches and 109 schools.

It has to be said that here in Sedbergh we have familiarity with Kendal and the journey to Carlisle although hardly closer in mileage than Bradford is a journey we would find easier to consider and execute should we want to participate in events at the cathedral. It would even be possible to let the train take the strain.

Bishop James suggested he should introduce himself to us, at the same time speak about his diocese and let us ask questions that may be concerning us about the change. I am happy to report that the evening he spent with us in St Andrew's was

The acquisition of 72 Main Street
As many of you are aware, the
Yorkshire Dales National Park
Authority has decided to sell 72 Main
Street, which for the past fifteen years
has been the home of the Community
Office, the Tourist Information Centre
and the History Society Archive.

The Sedbergh and District
Community and Heritage Trust
believe that the services and
resources provided at number 72 play
an important part in supporting the
social, cultural and economic
development of our town and are
seeking to acquire the building to
safeguard the future of the
organisations therein.

Apart from being a prominent and historically significant building in its own right, number 72 is the only town centre building to enjoy adjacent parking and easy access, making it

an ideal location for community based services. Furthermore, along with its small garden, number 72 holds the key to a number of the proposed developments within the Sedbergh Townscape Initiative.

Initially, encouraged by the loud fanfare heralding the coming of the Big Society, we had hoped to acquire the building for no cost under what are known as asset transfer arrangements, or to negotiate a nominal purchase price.

Unfortunately, but perhaps understandably in the light of the recent significant cuts to its funding, the National Park Authority feels unable to agree to this course of

However, the Park Authority does recognise the importance of number 72 to the town and has agreed that the Community and Heritage Trust should be given the first option to purchase, subject to securing the necessary funding within a reasonable time scale. The Trust is presently endeavouring to secure grant funding from a number of

action.

sources.

We are fortunate that the upper floor of number 72 has recently been granted a lawful use certificate in respect of its varied but continuous community use. This means that any other materially different use of the upper floor would require application for planning permission, and it is the policy of the Park Authority to resist developments that would result in the loss of community facilities where those facilities continue to have the support of the community.

The Sedbergh and District Community and Heritage Fund is the new name for the charity previously known as the Sedbergh and District Community Fund. Whilst the aims

and purposes of the charity remain the same, the name has been changed to better reflect the range of activities the Trust will undertake in future.

Whether or not we are successful in purchasing the freehold of number 72 it is anticipated that the Community Office and Tourist Information Centre will combine, under the auspices of the Trust, to form a more efficient and sustainable community enterprise.

We hope that we can count on your support in this venture which we believe will protect services and bring benefit to the community.

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- A property and affairs LPA (for decisions about finances, such as selling the donor's house or managing their bank account).
- A personal welfare LPA (for decisions about both health and personal welfare, such as where to live, day-to-day care or having medical treatment)

The Donor must make it while he has the mental capacity to do so, in anticipation of perhaps losing mental or physical capacity at a later stage. An ordinary power of attorney is not sufficient because it becomes invalid if the Donor becomes mentally incapable. If an individual who has not made an LPA becomes mentally incapable, time-consuming and costly applications to the Court of Protection may have to be made. This can take over a year to complete and can cost thousands of pounds.

An Attorney can make decisions about selling property, operating any bank or building society account, claiming benefits, pensions, receiving any income, inheritance or other

entitlement on behalf of the donor.


The Attorney can deal with the Donor's tax affairs, insuring, maintaining and repairing the Donor's property, investing the Donor's savings and paying rent, care home fees and other expenses. A Donor can give guidance to their Attorney and also restrict their powers.

A Lasting Power of Attorney cannot be used until it is registered at the Office of the Public Guardian, however, it need not be registered immediately if not required. If it is required however, then we can deal with this registration process for you.

Registering the LPA does not preclude the Donor from making their own decisions but allows their

Attorney to action them. If registration is delayed, there is a risk that if the attorneys need to act urgently on behalf of the Donor they will be unable to do so until the registration process has been completed, which can take between 12 and 14 weeks at the present time and does incur a registration fee.

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SEDBERGH TOWNSHIP INITIATIVE

'Thank you' to all those who came along to the Community Office in December to look at the draft proposals for the town. The comments received will help the consultants appointed by the Project Board* to develop the various schemes for improving the appearance of the town centre and dealing with those traffic issues of concern to residents. The consultants' final report and recommendations are expected in early March. Some of the more ambitious proposals are likely to hopefully, will be followed by further be long term and will require substantial funding but the Initiative is also concerned with smaller scale projects that can be implemented almost straight away.

One such project, approved by the Parish Council, is to erect good quality cast aluminum street name plates in the town centre to replace the existing embossed signs which are generally in poor condition. This also provides the opportunity to erect name plates for those streets which

presently have no sign – streets such as Joss Lane, Loftus Hill and Howgill Lane. Wherever possible (and subject to property owners' consent where needed) the new name plates will be affixed directly to walls to enable the removal of existing posts, many of which are rusted and unsightly. The project will be entirely funded by grants from the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority and South Lakeland District Council.

Small improvements such as this can have a significant impact on the overall appearance of the town and, enhancement schemes in the near future.

SNOW CLEARANCE & GRITTING

The prolonged period of snow which began in November caused major problems once again. Whilst the responsibility for snow clearance and gritting lies with Cumbria Highways, the system of priorities means that only main roads are cleared and most minor roads, estate roads and footpaths are not. Sedbergh Parish Council had managed to negotiate with Cumbria Highways for a small supply of gritting salt which some of the Parish Councillors did their best to use to clear the car parks and some pavements. However, the Parish Council feels that with an increased supply of gritting salt and the help of willing volunteers the situation in Sedbergh could be improved in the future.

After a heavy fall the snow needs to be cleared before any application of grit salt can be effective. If everyone, who is physically capable, cleared the footpath outside their house or business, as used to be the case, the situation would immediately be improved. It has been made clear, by both the Government and Cumbria County Council, that no-one would be liable for slips and falls etc on areas cleared of snow.

The Parish Council would like to hear from anyone who would be willing to volunteer for snow clearance and gritting, either to be part of a small team or who would be willing to look after a particular area where they live. Grit salt would be supplied by the Parish Council but only for use on public areas –

Cumbria Highways have made it clear the stocks will not be replenished if they are not used appropriately.

If we all work together then hopefully we can ensure that people can get about the town even when the weather is bad. We need to plan now so that when inclement weather strikes again we can immediately put the plan into action. MARCH GARDENING

There may seem to be few advantages in living in a place which is frequently damp, but we do have the advantage over the warmer, drier parts of the country in that we can grow splendid *Pulmonaria* plants.

The most common *Pulmonaria* of gardens is *P. officinalis*, an old fashioned cottage garden plant otherwise known as "Lungwort" (from its supposed resemblance of its leaves to, and consequent treatment of, diseases of the lung), "Soldiers and Sailors (for its red and blue flowers)" or "Virgin Mary Primrose".

Various named hybrids of this species are well worth seeking out. Amongst my favourites are 'Sissinghurst White' with pure white flowers, 'Silverado' with silvery leaves and blue, pink and white flowers, and 'Opal', with pale blue flowers opening from pale pink buds.

The richest brightest blue flowers are born on plants from two other species of *Pulmonaria – P. angustifolia* and *P. longifolia*. I grow the cultivars 'Azurea' and 'Mawson's Variety' and they are both stunningly bright and beautiful with deep Gentian blue flowers.

Lastly we have *Pulmonaria rubra* which, as its name suggests has red flowers, born very early in the year over its plain mid green leaves.

All Pulmonarias like to grow in a soil which stays fairly moist throughout the growing season and most appreciate a bit of shade. In a dry season or a very sunny spot they tend to succumb to powdery mildew

which covers the leaves and makes plants look scruffy. However a good hard trim – removing all of the leaves and spent flower stems after flowering always results in a fresh growth of attractive new foliage which is usually disease free.



RAYMOR MORRISON TIN


