It was such a shame that picnic and walking areas were inaccessible, through closure of lay-bys, for both locals and tourists enjoyment during such a long awaited and beautiful spring. How ridiculous that a tempting new picnic area was, and still is, closed to everyone. We are disgusted and appalled by the blockades and barriers and could never have imagined that the road where we live would be turned into a virtual war zone. This antagonistic approach to policing can only harm relationships with both tourists and gypsies in the

long run.

We are incensed every time we drive into Sedbergh from Cautley, as are many of our neighbours, who are not necessarily fit enough or able to attend meetings to voice opinion.

county services: One of the roles of a county councillor is to take part in short pieces of work on specific aspects of the council's work. I am involved with two at the moment one concerned with the recruitment and retention of "retained fire-fighters". The other is about the delivery of the animal health agenda. On the latter, I have been surprised as to the superficial nature of reports to councillors. I firmly believe there are better ways of dealing with animal movements than the present bureaucracy.

PUBLIC TOILETS: At the district council the controlling group has

continued with its programme of either closing public toilets or else handing them to parishes. I have tried as hard as possible to work with the parishes affected, namely Kirkby Lonsdale and Sedbergh to achieve the best that can be done from a very unhappy situation. At the moment there are five public toilets in this ward – five more than in the whole of Kendal.

One of the problems with both Jingling Lane in Kirkby Lonsdale and Joss Lane in Sedbergh is that they are far too big! It doesn't seem that long ago, (was it about 1980?) when the old toilets on Joss Lane were replaced by the present "superloos". Independently, both parishes have

identified a need to downsize back to something nearer the earlier dimensions in order to make them more manageable. What a pity the earlier change ever occurred.

APPLEBY HORSE FAIR: At the two consultations on the preparations for the fair only two members of the public turned up, or so I am told, I couldn't be there myself. As I write this, 21/2 weeks before the fair I have had no phone calls, not even complaining about the posts. I do think the posts and rocks have been placed with much more sensitivity this time than last. I hope this means that we are on top of the task of returning the fair to what it should be. By the time you read this we will all know

recently had a major refurbishment, with cable being replaced and repairs to the light fittings, so hopefully, this will result in more reliable lighting. The system is an unusual one, in that several lights are connected to the electrical supply at adjacent houses, but the contractor has confirmed that the supply for all of them is independent of the domestic supply and doesn't go through the domestic meter. The lights are all controlled by photocells, which will sometimes activate the light in the daytime if the natural light level is low, but the electricity for the lights is not metered. Charges are calculated from the size and consumption of the light bulbs, so even if a light stays on for longer than it should, although wasteful of energy, there is no extra charge to the parish council.

Library Review

Cumbria County Council is undertaking a review of its library services, and one result of it is that both the mobile library service and Sedbergh Library are under threat of closure. At the May meeting, Dorothy Vernon and Laura Mottershead kindly agreed to collect the views of library users, including the school, so that the council can hold a full discussion of the matter at its June meeting. You can contribute to the debate by going

to www.cumbria.gov.uk and following the links to the libraries consultation, and if you have a view on what you would like the service to provide in Dentdale, please contact Laura, Dorothy or me.

Annual Audit

The end of year financial statement for 2010-11 was approved by the May meeting, as part of the council's annual audit. The statement is available online at www.dentdale.com and a hard copy can be obtained from the parish clerk.

Car Park Ticket Machine

One cost of running the car park that may not be immediately apparent is the maintenance of the ticket machine, without which there would

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be no revenue. New 5p and 10p coins are being introduced in 2012, and the alterations to the machine needed for it to accept them will cost nearly £400.

Saturday Bus

As has been reported in the Westmorland Gazette, the parish council has been instrumental in ensuring that the Saturday bus service between Dent Station and Sedbergh and Kendal not only keeps going until at least the middle of October, but also has an extra journey to meet the 17.32 train to Settle. This has been achieved by increasing the fares on the Sedbergh to Dent Station section of the route. and by contributions from a number of sources: Dentdale Show (£500), Dent Music & Beer Festival (£500). Yorkshire Dales National Park (£1,000), Sedbergh Parish Council

(£250), Dales & Bowland CIC (£250) and the Friends of the Settle-Carlisle Line (£1,500). Three further sources of funding are also being approached, and at the May meeting, the council agreed to make a grant of £500 from its own funds. In the longer term, it is hoped to include this service in a new community transport initiative that is being developed so that its future is secured.

Faster Broadband

Residents in Dentdale and Garsdale are being circulated with a leaflet which gives full details of **fibre Garden**, the Dentdale and Garsdale community broadband initiative.

Although existing broadband speeds in and around Dent village may seem

adequate at present, the project's aim for Dentdale is to provide a broadband network for the whole dale that will cope with demands for much the faster speeds we will all need in the near future. An additional benefit is that it could enable mobile phone companies to offer much better coverage in the two dales.

Highlights

Those who went to the hilarious performance by the Rope String Band in Dent Memorial Hall last month may not have been aware that Highlights, the rural arts organisation who organised it, has lost its Arts Council grant in the recent spending cuts. Highlights has been responsible for a series of plays and exhibitions in



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Dent this season, and several of them have involved the artists and performers working with Dent Primary schoolchildren. This has given them and adults in an isolated rural community – opportunities to experience art and drama which they might otherwise not have. In response to a request from Highlights, the parish council agreed at the May meeting to give a grant of £100 to help it continue with its work.

Early Morning Train

After numerous requests by the council and many other bodies, an early morning train from Carlisle to Leeds is being introduced for a trial period of six months. This is not the good news that it seems, however, as the service will not stop at Dent, so the council will ask Northern Rail to allow the train to do so if the service continues beyond that.

The matter has now been referred to a tribunal, at which the council will be represented by Graham Dalton and, if successful, the council will avoid having to pay a £400 penalty.

If you recycle cardboard in Dent Car Park, it would be very helpful if you could flatten any boxes before putting them in the skip. It's also important that other materials such as plastic are not included, as the whole skip load of paper and cardboard is likely to be sent to landfill if it is contaminated in this way.

Tourist Information

Thanks to the efforts of the new Dentdale Business & Tourism Group. a tourist information point has been set up in the bus shelter. We are fortunate in Dent that the community is a very supportive one, so any problems with minor vandalism in the bus shelter have always been resolved very quickly. The new information point has created new temptations, so the Business and Tourism Group would be grateful for any further support you can give to prevent it being damaged.

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

Holme Through History

The first summer visit of 2011 was a trip to Holme where Geoff Pegg introduced us to some interesting features of the village. His account was punctuated with anecdotes about the doings of local characters from the past. Holme is two miles north of Burton-in-Kendal and three miles south of Milnthorpe. In the nineteenth century the Kendal - Lancaster canal on the outskirts of the village provided transport for passengers and goods. The Lancaster to Keswick bus route traverses the village which is also quite near the West Coast Railway Line and the M6.

As we stood in the peaceful gravevard we were surprised to hear from Geoff that most of the village buildings date from the nineteenth century. In the twelfth century Richard the Lionheart had been the local landowner and the area was used for hunting. Apart from scattered farmhouses there was no building until the erection of a flax mill in 1819 and at about the same time the canal was constructed. Thereafter the village grew rapidly as several hundred people came to work in the mill. Holme was part of Burton-in-Kendal parish and for some years a chapel of ease served the religious needs of the villagers. Eventually a church and a school were built in an


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
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attempt to combat the local growth of Methodism and the village, like so many others became self sufficient with a number of shops and craftsmen.

Geoff pointed out the tombstones of some notable Holme inhabitants. including that of Edward Shepherd, a former prison governor who had bought the mill in 1864 and initiated the production of coco matting. Nearby was the grave of his son, Francis, who had contributed greatly to village activities by providing the working men's club reading room and setting up cricket and rugby teams. Holme seems to have experienced more than its fair share of violent and untimely deaths, including those of Matthew Brinnald who died in an acetylene explosion and Henry Halliwell who was killed by a train. In the 1920s a vicar of Holme, William Ernest Mahon achieved some notoriety because his brother had

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murdered a woman and disposed of her body by throwing it from a train. Mahon had tried to shield his parishioners from the gory details of the case by confiscating the newspapers which carried the story when they arrived on the train.

A walk along the canal provided another side to life in the village. Geoff drew our attention to the site of a nineteenth-century coal yard where Wigan Coal Company and others produced coke which was then transported by barges. From the canal side there was a good view of the mill site and the boarding houses which housed a number of workers. In 1916, the mill was taken over by Goodacre Carpets and from then on plastic matting was produced. Geoff also recounted some tales of tragic drownings in the canal and of lives being saved by brave rescuers.

Geoff's enthusiasm for the history of Holme and its inhabitants provided an entertaining afternoon for History Society members and the walk concluded with tea and scones in the local hostelry.

TIM FARRON MP

There has been a lot of interesting agricultural research coming out recently. A report I found particularly interesting was a survey of Hill Farmers. The average income of a hill farmer was just £5,000 in 2009. that is so far below the poverty line as to be embarrassing for a country like ours. It is no wonder that young people are turning their backs on the industry and choosing other careers. Because of their low incomes but more because of the great good they do for the landscape in areas like the Dales and the Lakes, they are eligible for what is known as the "Uplands Entry Level Stewardship Scheme" which pays them so much a hectare to look after the landscape and their buildings. So far so good. However, the research reports I uncovered says that many farmers do not apply to the scheme and that one of the key reasons is the amount of red tape they feel is involved. This is heart breaking, all these farmers should be able to take advantage of these subsidies to help them to live and work on the fells. I will be looking into





what can be done to make applying easier. As a further shock, 10% of those who do not apply say this is because their landlord will not allow them to. This simply beggars belief in this day and age. Again I will be looking into this.

Another piece of research I have seen, scientific this time, has been looking into the spread of foot and mouth. Up until now the assumption has been that animals carrying foot and mouth could be infectious for 8 days. This was one of the primary reasons for the mass killing of animals we saw in the last out-break. However, this research suggests that the infectious period only lasts for two

days and that these days only occur when the animal is showing symptoms of the disease. This means that should we be unfortunate enough to suffer another outbreak we should be able to control it without the mass culls but by careful monitoring of all the animals involved. I pray this is the case as no-one wants to see again the horrific scenes of burning we witnessed 10 years ago.

Thanks to everyone who turned out to vote in the election and referendum at the beginning of May. 58% turnout in Sedbergh is phenomenal (only 45% turned out in Windermere) and you should feel really proud that you take democracy so seriously. Although the results around here were very positive for the Liberal Democrats. Clearly that was not the case in much of the rest of the country so there must be much that the Party can learn from what we do here and apply it elsewhere. I will be doing my best to ensure they take out the message that there is no alternative to working hard for the people you represent whether in Parliament or on the District Council.

Festival. Daniel also writes music and he recently composed a piece, based on Mussorgsky's 'Pictures from an Exhibition'. It was very well received when it was performed just before that work in the Westmorland Orchestra's concert in March. The final item will be a symphony by Arriaga. You may not have heard of him before, but do not be put off by that! The symphony, with its grand title of 'Sinfonia a Gran Orquesta' is most attractive and easy to listen to. Juan Crisóstomo Jacobo Antonio de Arriaga y Balzola was a Spanish composer who was born on January 27 1806, on what would have been Mozart's fiftieth birthday. He was nicknamed 'the Spanish Mozart' after he died, because, like Johannes Chrysostomus Wolfgangus Theophilus Mozart, usually known as Wolfgang Amadeus, he was a child prodigy and an accomplished composer who died young. By coincidence, or maybe design, they also shared the same first two baptismal names. His father and older brother first taught him music

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and he went on to study violin and composition at the Paris Conservatoire. He was so talented that he was asked to do some teaching there, but sadly he died in Paris when he was only nineteen of a lung ailment or exhaustion, perhaps both. His symphony is full of youthful exuberance. We played two youthful works in the Springtime Café Concert, a Mozart Divertimento and a Schubert symphony, both composers being only sixteen at the time they were writing.

It was my best lambing ever, weatherwise, and for ease of lambing and the shortest period. It was all over in 11 days! I wonder how much of this was down to the fact that this year the tup was alongside the ewes prior to lambing bringing them into season together? I will be trying it again. Futhermore I only had to assist a couple but we did finish with a 17lb Rough Fell single tup lamb. That one she wouldn't have got out without a bit of help! The swallows had 4 eggs by the end of the month. Perhaps it was good that it wasn't cold at nights as I left the top door of the kennel ajar so the adult swallows could get out at first light. April is the month of blossom and certainly this year it has been magnificent. Sat under one of our

crab apple trees, having a cup of tea, the noise of the bees humming was something to behold! The mallard still continue to drop in for breakfast, though in smaller numbers. One duck has found an "alien" mate. I suspect it is one from Oakdene's pond. Pipisterelle bats have been active but butterflies have been few in number inspite of the pleasant days. Perhaps many didn't survive hibernation this year. We've had a single orange tip fluttering around. Let's hope it finds a mate. Talking of mate we have a solitary garden warbler sing his heart out at the top of a huge Christmas tree so let's hope that produces a mate also. The blackbirds were feeding young by the end of the month safely in the shippon. Blue tits are visiting both nest boxes in the yard. The first bluebells are appearing in the hedgerow along with yellow dead nettle, greater stitchwort and lady's bedstraw.

He told us the amazing true story of Jacob, an American prisoner of war, who after the bombing of Pearl Harbour was so incensed with hatred for the Japanese people he was really glad when he was chosen to fly in the dangerous reprisal mission. It was a difficult operation due to the distances involved and the necessary re-fuelling stops. Because of these problems, after the bombings had occurred several airman had to make their landings in occupied territory. Hence Jacob was arrested and held by the Japanese. After months of solitary confinement and with a gnawing hatred for his captors he finally realised that he needed to change, or he would not survive. He even asked for a Bible which was duly found and after reading through it more than once, he found the answer. He realised the power of forgiveness and the fact that because of the sacrifice of Jesus, God forgave each one of us for all the wrong things we do. With God's help he forgave the Japanese and by the time of his release he had a desire to tell others of the important truths he had found. After some time at home he went back to Japan, and began by handing out Bible booklets at railway stations. Amazingly he handed out one to the very pilot who had been in the original Pearl Harbour attack force on USA! This man was eaten up by guilt of



what he had done that day to so many innocent victims. After reading the pamphlet he wanted also to find out more about forgiveness. What a surprise when he told his story to the man giving out the booklets! He also accepted the free gift of forgiveness and joined in the work with Jacob.

You can read more about this amazing story on the internet. (But only if we can remember his surname!) It was the 70th anniversary this April of the bombing and there has been a re-union held each year of those Americans involved since 1949.

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Plea to dog owners during birds' breeding season

Walkers exploring the Yorkshire Dales National Park are being urged to think about ground nesting birds over the next few months.

As the birds start to incubate eggs and raise their young, dog owners are asked to keep their pets on a lead to reduce the chances of disturbing them.

And to help visitors get to know the types of birds they may see, the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) has produced a free, pocket-sized leaflet showing the main five species, along with descriptions of their appearances, their calls and their favourite habitats.

The Authority's Ranger Services Manager, Alan Hulme, said the opening up of huge areas of the National Park under the Countryside and Rights of Way Act in 2005 meant that people no longer had to stay on paths and could walk on open countryside.

"This has meant that parts of the National Park that were previously no-go areas for visitors – including some used by ground nesting birds – are now seeing more humans," he said.

"We are trying to highlight the fact that these breeding areas are now vulnerable to disruption by passing walkers and their dogs. It is for this reason that access may be restricted to only using rights of way on some of

the moorland areas of the National Park.

"Disturbance can mean that adult birds flee the nest, leaving eggs to get cold or, later, leaving newly-born hatchlings exposed to the elements and to predators.

Malcolm Petyt, the YDNPA's Member Champion for Recreation Management, said: "The message is that dogs and birds don't mix and we hope the leaflet will help people to identify the birds and the places they are likely to be as they raise their chicks over the next few months."

Called 'Ground Nesting Birds – the Big Five in the Yorkshire Dales National Park', the leaflet gives details about skylarks, lapwings, red grouse, oystercatchers and curlews, as well as advice on ways of minimising contact with them. It is available at National Park Centres and Park Information Points.

But at last, some ten years after the foot and mouth outbreak which devastated the Dent economy, everyone hopes that these signs will herald a new and hopeful decade.

The signs were initially the inspiration of the Dent Forum Committee who worked tirelessly in the year 2001 to rejuvenate Dent's economy.

Latterly the project has seen many other individuals and organisations help to make the signs a reality. Sarah Gudgin and Sarah Nicholson





of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority helped with the planning rules and the sheep logo. The Parish Council took on responsibility for ownership and insurance of the signs, and John Bell of Capita spent hours helping us through all the complicated paper work.

Jim and Margaret Taylor provided not only constant enthusiasm but practical help in sourcing rocks and ordering the metal signs. Thank you to two local farmers Raymond Crawford and the Sutcliffe family providing the actual rocks also Donald Bentham moved them to their final location and to Steve Longlands and Jim fixing the welcome signs on to the rocks.

Garsdale Design submitted drawings and held everyone together at times when it seemed the project might fall apart.

Dent hopes that these signs will give people a warm welcome and help encourage them to return creating a steady flow of visitors to this stunning hidden corner of Cumbria tucked between the Lakes and the Dales and provide a helpful boost for the Dentdale economy.


FAMILY MUSINGS

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

Our AGM in April held at Killington Village Hall marked the end of the first stage (with many stages yet to come) in the development of a hydro scheme on the River Lune at Broad Raine

Spaans Babcock, the firm undertaking the Design Study presented the result of their work. They were able to confirm that it should be possible to install a 50 kW Archimedes screw turbine that would produce 316 Mw h/year, enough to power nearly all, but not quite all the houses in Killington - although the power will actually be fed straight into the grid.

The next stage is to move on to do further surveys and design work while we await the result of our preapplication for an abstraction licence. Later in the year we shall have to apply for planning permission and of course raise the funds.

Do come to our Barbecue on Saturday 18 June at Harprigg Hall, Killington (at the south end of Killington on the Middleton border). We would also welcome help with refreshments, or donations of things to sell at the Barbecue.

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CLUTTER BOOKS & CLOBBER?

There's a lot more to it that that!

Most readers will know that our local
Community Charity Shop is called
Clutterbooks and Clobber. Those of
who work there on a voluntary basis
know that this organisation is the
ultimate 'win – win'.

When the residents of Sedbergh (and their family and friends) have a spring clean – in the kitchen, of the bookshelves, the wardrobe perhaps, they are inevitably left with some perfectly serviceable items that they no longer need. They bundle them up and take them to the charity shop for a possible second life.

When they drop the bags off at the shop they will be invited to have a browse around. Often they spot a 'find' and emerge without their unwanted items, but also a few pennies poorer, spent on an item for which they have contributed a donation to the Community Fund. Some customers use the books section like a lending library, dropping off the last ones they read and seeking further reading.

Most items are taken downstairs to be sorted. This is somewhere between an Aladdin's cave and your worst nightmare about the items languishing in your loft. We try to hang up clothes quite quickly to avoid having to iron them later. We search for the size and make a decision on a sensible price for them. We get some beautiful clothes, and some less saleable. The latter go for recycling – often to other charities and charity

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shops. Those that make it back up to the sales floor have just four weeks to be 'recycled' locally (bought), after which they too go to be recycled. So there is always something new.

We are constantly surprised by the items that are donated to us. Some are brand new. Electrical items have by law to be tested before we can offer them for re-sale. We have rather a lot of foot spas waiting to be tested! Large items pose a bit of a difficulty in storage and display, but we have a notice board where details, often with a photo, can be displayed. Customers can also place 'wanted' notices, as long as all parties understand that the donation will go

to the Community Fund.

For me 'working' in Clutterbooks and Clobber is a welcome aspect of my retirement. Keith and I spend three happy hours a week hoping to add value to our community by serving customers and processing donations. I enjoy meeting members of the community and welcoming visitors to the town. I would urge anyone with a few hours to spare to join us. At present sometimes there is only one volunteer, who then needs to be available in the shop itself and is thus • limited in the amount of sorting and pricing that they can do. Working together is also more fun.

The beauty of the concept is the number of environmentally and

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socially acceptable 'boxes' we can tick:

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- Recycling
- Fundraising for local charities and organisations – any one can put their case to benefit from the funds raised to the Community
 Fund committee
- Providing a worthwhile voluntary activity for those who can spare the time
- Providing a friendly place for shoppers to browse and maybe find a treasure and to meet and talk with other people
- Often providing goods at a fraction of their value
- Benefitting other charities
 Are we alone in thinking that this sounds like the 'Big Society?

 So why not come and join us! Either:
- come and have a browse we have something for everyone
- bring us your good unwanted items or
- join us as a volunteer for a few hours a week. There are a number of opportunities – selling, sorting, pricing, cleaning, displays, recycling ...

You will be pleased to know that membership subscriptions are unchanged. It was reported to the meeting that Baliol School will be

closing in December 2011. However, your committee have resolved to continue the gym if at all possible and various options were discussed. The decision to support the redevelopment of the People's Hall and have a purpose built gym there is still the ultimate goal and to finance this project the committee will be applying for grants meanwhile they are actively engaged in fundraising. consider that we need numbers of registered members to increase for two reasons. One is, of course, to continue to provide funds to help pay for our new premises and facilities, and the other is to show grant awarding bodies that we are well supported by the community. Single membership is still only £175 per annum or £20 per month if you wish to pay monthly. This entitles the one person whose name is on the membership form to use the gym. If you have another member of your household who wishes to use the gym they cannot use your card. Couple's membership is £275 per annum or £30 per month. If you have

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a friend who wishes to use the gym, they have to take out a separate membership. Family membership is £350 per annum or£35 per month. We even run a scheme for students offering them a reduced rate of £12 per month if they are only at home during the holidays, then they only pay for each month or part month that they are here. There is a deposit of £10 for their swipe card which is refunded when the card is returned. We do allow visitors to use the gym for £3 per session. They will need to sign one of the disclaimer forms that are attached to the notice board, as they will not be covered by our insurance if they have not had one of

our inductions. They then leave the disclaimer form in the plastic bag with the money. As you can see the committee has tried to cover as many community needs as is possible. The gym is a fantastic facility, available at extremely reasonable rates. Please support us by getting more involved or at least by ensuring that everybody pays their way.

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CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

The Freshwaters of Cumbria
The Sedbergh Support Group was
very pleased to welcome Dr Anne
Powell, Chair of the Trust, to their
April meeting. Anne has had a long
and distinguished career as a
freshwater ecologist with a particular
interest in conservation and fisheries.
She is also a distinguished author on
aquatic biology.

There is an awful lot of water on our planet, 97% of it salt. Cumbria is characterised by small steep river catchments, eroding material. There are 12 lakes and more than 3.500 tarns and ponds. The Cumbria Wildlife Trust and the Freshwater

Biological Association are working together on the ecology of tarns. Their surveys have shown a wide range of flora and fauna. Besides a limited range of macrophytes, few rare, there are a great diversity of invertebrates and fish. Stone flies, mayflies and caddis are common with the threatened pearl mussel and crayfish less so. The insects grow from larvae in the water to adults in the air. The caddis spins its own fishing net, stoneflies can cope with rolling stones in turbulent waters and mayflies are flat bodied and short lived. All are important to fish for example arctic char, whitefish (vendace may be extinct now in

Bassenthwaite) with bullhead, lamprey and the minnow besides salmon and trout. There was concern that Windermere is already suffering from green algae at an unusually early date.

Crustacea live in water as both young and adults. Shrimps, snails, water fleas and crabs are present but moving north are the invasive mitten crab and the "killer" shrimp. Both could have disastrous effects on our native populations. Anglers and other water users must be on alert and report any sitings to alert_nonnative@ceh.ac.uk. Waders, especially with felt soles can pick up and transfer these unwelcome creatures from area to area.

The features of our freshwaters are due to several factors, geology, topography, weather and land use and people. The geology varies from the volcanic rocks of the Lake District core to the slates, limestones and

sandstones surrounding them. In general the waters are softer to the south with more calcium and magnesium in the north.

Land use in the Windermere catchment area includes agriculture, moorland, woodland, towns and villages. We use water for drinking, cooking, washing, transport, industry (power generation), leisure and sport, growing food with irrigation and disposal of waste. The issues of concern to our Cumbrian water quality are eutrophication (the excessive richness of nutrients resulting in dense growth of plant life), soil loss and erosion caused by over grazing perhaps, drainage and straightening, habitat loss, invasive species, population pressure, abstraction and flooding. Acidification seems to be reduced now with diminishing industrial pollution.

To put this in a European context, 20% of all surface water in the European Union is seriously threatened with pollution.
Groundwater supplies around 65% of all Europe's drinking water but in 60% of European cities these resources

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are exploited. 50% of wetlands have "endangered status" and irrigated land in southern Europe has increased by 20% since 1985.

To address this the Water Framework Directive has been established by law. River Basin Management Plans should be established every 6 years, the first set in 2009. Waters must achieve "good status" by 2015. Non compliance results in fines of 20.000 euros per day!!

Meanwhile, back at the water's edge, invasive species creep ever nearer. The skunk cabbage and New Zealand stonecrop head the plant list while the signal crayfish, mitten crab

and "killer" shrimp also pose an increasing threat.

The Environment Agency has listed priority species with char, vendace, eel, otter, water vole, white-clawed crayfish, pearl mussel and lampreys being of special concern. Pollution is probably a major contributor to their demise. Pearl mussels can live for 200 years and reproduce by sending out larvae which attach themselves to the gills or mouths of fish feeding off their hosts. This damages fish stocks.

Dr Powell had raised some hot topics for further discussion and after this fascinating talk on a priceless resource we hope for an equally absorbing sequel. SG

CYCLING IN SOUTH AMERICA

It was perfect cycling – the surface was dead pan flat, the wind was behind us and the sun in the north cast a short shadow on the brilliant white surface. We had always dreamt of cycling across the Salar de Uyuni in Bolivia, the world's largest salt flat. Over 4000 square miles of pristine, tiled, salt crust cover the world's greatest lithium reserves, at a height of 12,000ft on the Altiplano of Bolivia. The first sight of the vast white plain was unforgettable.


We were heading for the tiny 'island' of Incahuasi where we believed we could get a meal and water. Invisible at first from the edge, it gradually came into view as a tiny blob floating

on the horizon. As we sped along at 30 kilometres per hour powered by the wind, it grew into a rocky hill covered in cacti, some centuries old, and over 10 meters high.

Our dream had come true.

In 2004 our son, Andrew, travelled the length of Chile by bike. He sent a series of CDs home and when I saw the amazing images I thought to myself – I want to do that. 18 years of cycling to Casterton School was great training for me, and Hugh – well he has always been super fit, so what could stop us? With our last child, Amy, into her first year working as a doctor we decided the time was right to give up work whilst we had the fitness and energy to pull it off.

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Living in Sedbergh for 30 years had given us plenty of hill climbing practice on the beautiful single track roads of the Dales.

We opted for a low tech approach to navigation – no GPS, just paper maps at the ridiculous scale of 1:1,500,000. Our various maps often marked roads and villages in different places, and with different names, so when we asked people how far it was to the next place we had to be prepared to multiply it by 3. Amazingly we only got lost a couple of times. When we couldn't find the road (rough dirt track) out of San Juan in Bolivia, we waited for help, which arrived unexpectedly in the form of a crazy and madly enthusiastic French cyclist. We followed him for 20km against a strong headwind only to find he was taking a different route from us. The wind blew us the 20km back and we

chanced upon the right road. A passing 4x4 driver told us it was 10km to the next village. 24km later as the sun was setting and the temperature was dropping rapidly, we decided to camp amongst the thorny bushes. The next morning another 6km of pushing through soft sand past the quinoa fields brought us to the village.

The high and dry landscapes gave way to green and wet as we moved south. The Carretera Austral in Chile, completed in 1996, was built by Pinochet. It is virtually the only road in Chilean Patagonia, linking together villages in a chaotic landscape of powerful rivers, steep craggy mountains, ice caps (the third biggest in the world after Greenland and Antarctica) glaciers and lush rainforests. Little did Pinochet realise that he was creating one of the world's most spectacular cycle

routes. Having met no other cyclists for the first 6 weeks of our trip, we travelled with cyclists from all over the world on the road down to Tierra del Fuego. The road meets its match in Villa O'Higgins where the narrow strip of Chile dissolves into a broken mass of islands and ice fields. Here the only way out is for those on foot or bike. A 3 hour boat ride across Lago O'Higgins followed by 15 km of very rough track, 6 km of boggy footpath and then a 45 minute boat ride across Lago Desierto takes you to the road to El Chalten in Argentina.

Our route from Arica in the north of Chile, to Ushuaia in Argentina covered nearly 6000 miles, with 10 border crossings. Our Roberts Roughstuff bikes were specially made Friday 2nd September. for the job in Croydon and were brilliant. We had no breakdowns and only 5 punctures each. We loved the way of life, simple with few chores, and we can't wait to go again. We



hope to miss another English winter next time in Australia and New Zealand.

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

Ah yes, but WHEN is 'the future' you might ask? Good question.

What is QE? - Quantitative easing. The equivalent name that was used recently with Zimbabwe and of course Germany in the early 1920's was called **Printing Money**.

When wages in the late 1970's doubled in the space of less than a decade it was to accommodate the loss in value of the £ note that halved in value in little more than the last 5 years of the 70's. Have we got inflation at the moment? Have we got authorities that pay lip service to this? Do they like 5% inflation? Yes, Yes and Yes. By 'allowing' our currencies to devalue over a period of time will allow even stagnant house prices to become more affordable and therefore reduce the risk of an all-out crash again. Therefore, house prices will 'rise' – but hopefully become more affordable as inflation comes through faster than house price rises.

And then Bainbridge Road will see £2 million + houses in the future with average wages in the country of £ $\frac{1}{4}$ million.

JUNE GARDENING

I always think of June as the month when roses begin to flower. Having said that, this year may just be the one when our 15 year old 'Maigold' climbing rose actually manages to burst into bloom in May, rather than it's usual June. Whenever it happens, 'Maigold is always the first rose into flower here and its beautiful coppery buds open up into golden yellow semi-double flowers which brighten up the shed wall.

On the front wall of the house we have 'Gloire de Diion' an old fashioned rose with "quartered" very double, buff yellow flowers with a lovely tea rose scent. "Gloire de Dijon" has a very scruffy habit in this garden and usually begins the growing season looking as though it has barely survived the winter. I have to purposefully turn my attention away from the tatty twigs and focus on those heavy blooms and then it is all worth while.

Following on from 'Maigold' we have another yellow rambler 'Goldfinch' which bears sprays of small golden yellow buds, opening to primrose yellow, semi double flowers. 'Goldfinch' is useful, being much less rampant that many other ramblers and hence suitable for a low wall. railings or fence.

Moving away from the yellow theme we have the "Violet Rambler", 'Veichenblau'. This does very well on an east facing wall where it send out rather lax arching stems which


