## **COUNCILLORS' CORNER**

From Cllr Evelyn

I was delighted to be present at the South Lakeland District Council Cabinet meeting which approved the transfer of Joss Lane Car Park to the Sedbergh Parish Council on a 99 year lease. This means we can move forward to the next stage of the Townscape Project and make an application to the Heritage Lottery Fund for a grant to landscape the car park and regenerate the centre of town.

The SLDC congratulated the Parish Council on its professionalism and vision in conceiving and progressing the partnership which has produced the final plan. It was held up as an

outstanding example of localism in action which should provide a model for other communities. It was a proud moment for Sedbergh.

On a less cheerful note Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority has placed a notice in the Westmorland Gazette about the sale of the garden opposite the Community Centre, as it is required to do by law. As a District Councillor I will be objecting to the sale on the grounds that it is the only green space in the middle of Sedbergh which can be accessed by the public. Visitors picnic there, teenagers hang out there and the rest of us need a bit of green for our wellbeing. Negotiations over the sale of the Community Centre are still ongoing but the YDNPA has now put the building on the open market at a price of £192,500.

Another blow has been the decision by Sedbergh School not to renew the Parish Council's lease on the Loftus Hill Car Park next February because it wants it for a playground. Ian and I are having meetings with the Parish Council and Sedbergh School to see if we can identify other locations for car parking. With eight out of the 20 retail outlets in Sedbergh on the market we cannot afford to lose half our car park provision.

From Cllr Ian

Since the Japanese nuclear disaster I have become increasingly aware of the rapidly evolving situation at the Sellafield nuclear plant. Not only has it been recently designated as a site for nuclear newbuild but there is also currently a debate developing over

the building of a second Mox plant at the site for the purpose of re-cycling nuclear waste from civilian reactors into plutonium for burning in fastbreeder reactors. This is very controversial in view of the fact that the existing Mox plant has been a total economic disaster costing the tax payer millions of pounds and resulting in the current above ground storage of 84 tonnes of unsold plutonium. Plutonium is one of the most deadly substances known to man. Miniscule amounts can kill if ingested. On top of all this a partnership under the title of Managing Radioactive Waste Safely (MRWS) is investigating the viability of West Cumbria as the site of an

underground repository for the safe storage of nuclear waste – which will need to be kept safe and secure for tens of thousands of years. Considering that Sellafield is literally only a few miles from here as the crow flies (or more pertinently as the wind blows) we need to be very concerned in the Sedbergh area over what is happening on what is increasingly being referred to as The Energy Coast. For some time now I have been bending the ear of SLDC's Environment Portfolio Holder, Cllr Clare Feeney-Johnson, asking her to arrange a visit to Sellafield for all District Councillors wishing to have a closer look at what is going on at Sellafield. This is now being



arranged. In addition Clare has asked me to represent her at future meetings of the MRWS Partnership so that I can have a closer involvement in planning for the future. For anyone wishing to know more at this stage I would encourage them to visit the MRWS website (www. westcumbriamrws.org.uk) for the up to date situation. The decision whether or not to go ahead with the underground repository is probably one of the biggest decisions to be made in decades and will have profound implications not only for Cumbria but for the whole of the rest of the country as well.

A little closer to home but another event likely to have long term consequences for the future of Sedbergh is the closure of the Loftus Hill car park referred to by Evelyn in her article. I have to confess to being very disappointed at Sedbergh School's decision not to renew the Parish Council's lease especially in the light of the vastly improved working relationships which have developed between the town and the school over the last few years. Let's face it, the futures of both are irrevocably intertwined and if the town suffers socially and economically as a result of the proposed closure then so will the school. There is a very fine line to be maintained in balancing the interests of the town and the equally legitimate concerns and aspirations of the school and I cannot help thinking that the school has misjudged it on this occasion. It is a decision that will win the school no friends in the town

and I do hope that for the sake of future relations the school will have another look at its decision. We need to work together for the benefit of all!

It will not have escaped the notice of many readers that next year will see the celebration of Her Majesty the Queen's Silver Jubilee. Communities throughout the country are already well advanced in planning Jubilee projects to commemorate the event. There is already talk in this area of being part of a chain of celebratory beacons but I, for one, hope that we can do a bit more than this. Something that will be a permanent memorial of the occasion. I have already floated this idea amongst Parish Councillors and also have a

few ideas of my own. However at this Love the Lune Project, both fully point it is your ideas that I am more interested in. Why not let either the Parish Council or me have your thoughts on the matter. I am sure that between us we can come up with something really innovative and creative that would not only mark the occasion but also provide Sedbergh, Dent and Garsdale with a feature of lasting value for the future (maybe a beautifully landscaped Jubilee car park?!).

At SLDC's last Full Council meeting on the 14th July I asked the Portfolio Holder for Economic Prosperity, Cllr Graham Vincent, whether he agreed that the Sedbergh Townscape Initiative and the Kirkby Lonsdale

supported by SLDC, were prime examples of localism in action long before the Big Society was first mooted? He was happy to confirm that this was indeed so and added that both towns were models of local people taking responsibility for their own futures and being willing to do something about it! Another feather in our cap!

it as a means for them to deliver THEIR policies, not ours.

Over the years, more than any other parish in South Lakeland, we have taken management of some of our most important local assets. I have been part of this change, sometimes deliberately, sometimes subconsciously but absolutely driven in my wish to see Sedbergh, Garsdale and Dent beholden to noone. Firstly, and after much difficulty Loftus Hill became a parish car park. Then we re-opened the toilets there. Later we took over the management of Joss Lane Car Park, and eventually the market and the toilets there. We have also taken a more direct interest in the Tennis Courts at

Guldrey and fishing rights at the Clowes on the river Rawthey. It is right that we should now take a long term lease on Joss Lane Car Park, a lease which will see our successors through into the twenty second century. I am delighted also that we have taken over the cemetery, originally given to OUR community by Florence Anne Upton-Cottrell-Dormer in the 1890s.

The county too recognises the need, and the practicality of devolving control of the local roads network to local voices. It is not difficult to see the contrast as yet between these authorities and the current management of Yorkshire Dales. Sadly, their actions in Cumbria are

I am disappointed that they have chosen a fight rather than an agreement but I have no doubt that we will win.

THE LIBRARY SERVICE: There have been open meetings in every library in South Lakeland over the first stage review. That Sedbergh is in a stronger bargaining position than others because of the unique lease between Cumbria and Sedbergh United Charities remains a fact. For Dent the possibilities of library shelves within the village provides an opportunity to improve on the present, inadequate and perhaps outdated Library Bus service. For all the concern expressed everywhere these reviews do provide us with an

service.

## PLANNING IN THE LOCALISM ACT:

Roger Bird and I were involved in a Conservative Party project three or four years ago called Open Source Planning. This was to create a mechanism to provide a planning regime devolved to local communities. Because we have a Coalition rather than a one party government not all the aspirations have come forward, but many of them have. I will be spending a couple of days at a seminar next month to learn how exactly planning will work under the new Localism Act, and what we as a community need to be doing to gain the best advantage from the changed legislative environment. ## **GARSDALE PARISH COUNCIL**

Acknowledged at the last meeting of the council was the fine service over a period of years rendered by Michael Roper as Chair. Unfortunately, due to the pressure of work commitments, Michael has decided to stand down from that position though fully intending to continue involvement as a councillor. Tony Roberts was unanimously elected as his replacement.

Over the last few months a significant amount of work has been completed on the super-fast broadband initiative. The government's eStrategy has at its heart the development of a rural infrastructure with next-generation super-fast access. The Parish council, in partnership with their colleagues in Dentdale particularly Jock Cairns, David Pilgrim and Anne Fleck, have collaborated to ensure that Garsdale and Dentdale are at the pioneering and development forefront of this scheme. The instigation of fibre GarDen was a key element of

the work. At the time of the last Parish Council meeting news was imminent regarding the announcement of funding for the pilot schemes of which there is high expectation that Garsdale and Dentdale will be one.

Once the announcement is made. the next phase of planning will commence: there will be significant involvement and work demanded of the Parish Council in bringing the scheme to fruition. Garsdale Parish Council representation on the *fibre* GarDen board is through Tony Roberts (as Finance Director) and David Labatte. At the meeting of the Parish Council the considerable work and impressive expertise of Tony Roberts along with other Garsdale residents, John Colton and Stefan Kosciuszko, in bringing the initiative to the point that it is was duly acknowledged.

## **DENT PARISH COUNCIL**

The July meeting discussed the Internal Auditor's report, changes to Dentdale's websites and heard about the level of timber extraction from the Cowgill plantation. A full account of the meeting is contained in the minutes, which will be published on www.dentdale.com (follow the parish council link) and which are obtainable as a hard copy on request from the parish clerk.

## Website

The July meeting discussed the future of Dentdale websites following Neville Allen's decision to retire from running *dentdale.com* this autumn. Members paid tribute to the outstanding work Neville has done in

setting up and maintaining the site since it started, all of it for free. The council noted that a small community group is being formed to look at the options for replacing Neville's site with a community-based Dentdale website, and that, as part of the YDNPA/Dent Initiative, the National Park had allocated £1,250 towards establishing it. The council agreed to purchase a new domain name on behalf of this site, and to explore the implications of the change for maintaining the council's own web presence.

## **Timber Extraction**

Following the discussion about the effects of timber extraction on the upper part of the dale at the previous

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meeting, the council was presented with more information as a result of the Clerk's enquiries. In 2011, 550 loads will be removed from Cowgill plantation; in 2012, 250 loads; in 2014/15, 400 loads and in 2016/17, 400 loads. Most , if not all, will be taken out through Garsdale, but in view of the proposed extraction at Hobsons Farm, Cowgill, it was agreed ask the site agent to minimise the amount of traffic using Dentdale.

## **Dentdale Show**

The National Park will be more visible than usual at Dentdale Show this year. As well as a display stand showing some of the Park's work, the National Park Chairman, Carl Lis and

Chief Executive David Butterworth will be at the show to chat and answer any questions on National Park matters. This is all part of the YDNPA/Dent Initiative, a pilot project backed by £10,000 of YDNPA funding, where National Park officers are working with members of the Dentdale community on issues that meet the aims of both groups. More details of the YDNPA presence will be available at the show.

## **Audit Report**

The report for 2010-11 by the Internal Auditor, David Ramsbottom, was presented to the council. It made two main recommendations, both of which were adopted by the council:

- 1. The council should regularly monitor its spending against the budget
- 2. If the council was without a parish clerk in future, members other than the Chair should take responsibility for the Clerk's duties.

It also recommended that the requirements of the council's insurers should be met by carrying out and annual inspection of the playing field goalposts, but since the report was published, the insurers no longer require this to be done.

## Police Drop-In

The police drop-in session at Dent Stores now takes place between 12 noon and 1pm on the first Tuesday of each month. Please let me know if this new time causes any problems.

## **Devil's Own Rally**

The council was notified that the annual Devil's Own Rally will pass through Dentdale in the early hours of 13/14 August. As usual, it will avoid Dent village, entering the dale from Holme Fell and travelling south of the river to Gawthrop. From there it will cross Barth Bridge, pass along Floods Lane and then travel up the full length of the Dale to Cowgill, Dent Head and the Hawes Road.

## **Road Resurfacing**

County Councillor Kevin Lancaster informed the council that Cumbria Highways intend to undertake resurfacing work on the road between Barth Bridge and Dent. This work may be started at short notice, and may result in the road being closed from time to time. More details will be posted in Dent village when they

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## TIM FARRON MP

The issues surrounding the future of 72 Main Street were covered in some depth in last month's Lookaround and I am sure that there will be further discussion in this month's edition. There is an impressive organisation building behind the campaign to bring the building into community ownership and so allow it to play an important part in the Townscape Project. I believe passionately in projects like this, communities taking responsibility for what goes on in their area and doing something about it. We are lucky to have several good examples of community projects in

our area and I done all I can to promote them in Parliament to encourage more communities around the country and to persuade the Government to help initiatives like this. Rest assured that I will do all that I can to support the plans and if that involves trying to persuade the YDNP to sell 52 Main St at a reasonable price and over a reasonable timeframe then I am on the case.

I was particularly horrified by the announcement that the building has been put on the market at a price just shy of £200,000. I don't really care if it is the "market price" for the building, it is a massive amount of money. Clearly there is a huge gap between

communities. To get hold of the money Cumbria County Council needs to agree a plan with the authority responsible for the project. So it is over to the Council and the local broadband "hub co-ordinators" to pull together a plan as fast as possible. If you would like to be involved in this process and so ensure that your community benefits (I think there is a theme emerging here) then please do get in touch with my office.

Finally, I was flattered to be reelected as the Chair of the Parliamentary Hill Farming Group. This is a group of MPs who take it upon themselves to represent the issues of hill farmers with Ministers, European bodies and any other group

this and the £60,000 currently on the table. My worry is that the scale of the challenge involved in finding the money that the Authority are looking for may result in some people deciding to give up the fight before the battle has really started. In which case the authority have not just rejected the original bid but actually harmed the chances of the community case ever winning out. We cannot let this happen.

On a more positive note I learned, through a letter I received from Vince Cable and Ed Vaisey, the two Ministers responsible for improving the provision of broadband in this country, that Cumbria has been allocated nearly £17 million funding as part of a pilot stage for a project to roll out superfast broadband to rural communities. 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# HEALTH CENTRE NEWS

It is heartening to see the walls of the new building going up with such speed; and the project manager tells us that they are running to schedule; aiming to complete the build early in the New Year. Our staff have already been down there this week for a site visit and their response was very positive.

Many thanks to our patient support group who have begun a series of fund raising events for the new surgery. They ran a very successful coffee morning last month at very short notice – thank you to all those who attended and to the organisers. Any ideas for further fund raising activities would be gratefully received – how about a Ceilidh?

We have just received a copy of our GP survey – you may have been asked to respond to this – it was a postal survey for all GP practices in England. One of the questions asked if you were able to obtain a consultation within two working days with a GP at your surgery. We were very alarmed to note that 1 in 5 of our patients responded in the negative to this. In offering an open surgery

every morning with the option of booking an appointment in this surgery we can virtually guarantee patients can see a GP the same day as long as they come into surgery by 10.30 am. Failing that we can usually offer an appointment within the next 24 hours if you miss the 10.30 deadline.

In addition, 1 in 8 patients said that it wasn't possible to book an appointment more than 2 days in advance. Our appointment book is open for the next three months and so appointments can be booked at any time in the future up to three months in advance. There will always be times when there will be a shortage of nurse appointments due to holidays – but we always try to ensure there are adequate appointments to see our Doctors and Nurse Practitioner.

These questionnaires are used as one of the measures to calculate our practice income. Unfortunately for the practice this has been reduced, which can affect the level of service we are able to offer. However, we know there are always areas where we can improve and we appreciate

the feedback especially as to how we might improve on the areas above.

I was interested to meet a patient this week who told me he was not registered with me and that he would normally see Dr Lumb – however he did not mind seeing me on that particular occasion as it was an open surgery. The historical list system whereby patients were allocated to a particular GP is no longer in operation in England. Although you may see a particular GP's name on your prescription, patients are registered with the practice and not a named GP. This gives patients the advantage of being able to see any clinician in the practice. Most Doctors including GP's are beginning to specialise in certain areas of care, thus conferring additional benefits for patients. It means they can access appropriate care to their problems more quickly. For example, I specialise in Women's Health and Dr Lumb in Minor operations and Joint injections. We accept that many patients prefer to stay with one Doctor or Nurse for continuity, and that it quite acceptable, although a down side to this is that it can lead to waits for appointments.

We have been looking at the provision of telephone consultations, and given that no clinician works full time in the practice, it can sometimes be difficult to arrange a same day phone call with the Doctor or Nurse of your choice. To try and improve the service offered we propose that a same day/flexible time telephone consultation may well be from any

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clinician, but if a specific Doctor/ Nurse Practitioner is requested then we will only be able to offer a phone appointment at some time in the future. This means that patients get exactly what they request; however there may be a time delay. All the clinicians here work in a similar fashion and have access to the full medical record-which should ensure a feeling of continuity.

And finally, hot off the press, congratulations to Dr Batty who has been appointed Doctor to Manchester City Football Club. The implications of this appointment to our practice have yet to be discussed; however we are very pleased for Dr Batty and wish him success in the future.

(As a post script – I am very pleased to announce that I have been awarded a Masters Degree in General Practice from the University of Central Lancashire and have just attended my graduation ceremony at Preston Guild Hall this week. Thank you all for your support during the

## **AUGUST GARDENING**

It seems that after a good growing season for shrubs, our Buddleias are going to perform very well this year. They were cut back hard in March to a height of about 18 inches – as they are every year - and have so far managed to put on about 5 – 6ft of growth, with numerous flower spikes on the top. My favourite Buddleia here is B. 'Black Knight' which has rich dark purple flowers, but the most prolific shrub is plain B. davidii (Butterfly Bush) which has mauve, heavily scented flowers which always prove to be a great attraction to butterflies, bees and hoverflies, B davidii is named for Père David, a Roman Catholic priest whose travels in China resulted in the finding and collecting of several of our most popular garden plants. Davidia involucrata, commonly known as the Handkerchief tree, or Dove Tree for its large white bracts which hang down below the branches at flowering time, Acer davidia, a "Snakebark Maple" and the low growing, rich china blue flowered herbaceous perennial Corydalis flexuosa 'Pere David'are three of his other discoveries.

Some years ago I planted the earlier flowering *B. alternifolia* in one of our borders. This shrub has attractive arching branches with narrow silvery leaves and clusters of pale mauve flowers born along the length of the stems. It can be a difficult shrub to place as the stems spread wide within a few years and tend to crowd

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out other plants around. Pruning has to be done carefully to ensure that the elegant shape is retained, but the size is confined. As this plant flowers on year old wood, pruning happens after flowering - in late July or early August. I was saved the trouble in this garden as the whole plant succumbed to a cold wet winter before it got beyond manageable size. Although I am fond of the orange flowered B. globosa (incidently, used as a herbal remedy for healing wounds, pain and digestive complaints in it's native countries of Chile and Peru), and the hybrid, yellow flowered B. x weyeriana, these two are slightly less hardy than good old *B. davidii* so would probably not enjoy a Firbank winter - hence I am spared the dilemma of having to decide where to Elaine Horne ☆ put them.

## **DENTDALE WI**

July already, and we are more than half way through the WI programme. This month we held our Open Meeting which was followed by a Jacob's Join supper. Unfortunately, our speaker who should have been talking about the Cross Bay walk, was unable to attend due to family illness so we were delighted to welcome Chris Comerie who kindly stepped in at short notice to give a very interesting and informative talk on his experiences trekking and climbing in the Himalayan Mountains. Chris engaged our interest from the start moving quickly through the stunning slides. He told us he had been drawn into rock climbing from an early age learning the craft on his native rock faces in the Peak district. He has continued the hobby with a passion and dedication which was born out in the slides and his presentation. Chris has been on several trekking trips in the Himalayan Mountains and took us through the preparation, usually involving months of work which has to be time tabled so one would hope to arrive at the start with the very best chance for decent weather during the climb. He has climbed Kangchenjunga in Nepal, the third highest mountain in the world and the slides showed all aspects from preparing the precise weight of daily food parcels and packing into convenient sized drums for transportation, hiring the chain of Sherpas to carry all the gear and food, to sleeping on ledges and bivouacking and the final approach to

the summit. One bonus of climbing this mountain is the superb slides of the surrounding spectacular mountainous scenery he was able to take. Chris mentioned the disadvantages of the sport. The leeches, altitude sickness, the mud slides the avalanches the weight loss, lack of sleep, but they still do it!!!. Chris did say that as a climber, he knew his own body limitations and his climbs were preceded by altitude acclimatisation sessions before the serious trekking began! However, the sheer physical determination needed to push oneself on was apparent.

Chris finished with some slides of the Old Man of Hoy and him climbing Coombe Scar in the snow and ice earlier this year. It was a fascinating presentation and Chris's own enthusiasm was tangible.

As the meeting was an Open Meeting and we had a good number of visitors, the Business meeting was brief. However, with usual Dentdale WI efficiency our Secretary had lists and reminders for everything that was coming up in the next month or so for us to look at or sign while we ate our way through the delicious spread that had appeared as if by magic with each Member's contribution to the Jacob's Join.

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
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## KIDZONE EXPERIENCE

I went to Kidzone in early July – an orphanage for 22 girls in a very deprived area in the heart of the city of Nairobi, Kenya. Many Sedbergh residents know of the Sedbergh link with Kidzone. Christine Wood of King's Court has been involved with it for several years as her son Simon, a BA pilot, helped to set it up. Knitters (especially Kath Winn but many others too), made colourful blankets for the girls' beds a couple of years ago. They look very cheerful.

My objective on this trip was to teach the girls the descant recorder. Sedbergh people donated lots of recorders, and also quite a lot of percussion instruments – xylophones, tambourines, shakers, and so on, and I took these with me. We became the Kidzone Band, and after only a week the children played in front of 800 people at the School Assembly. One 10 year old managed the Kenyan National Anthem by herself. The others played "Merrily we roll along", which just uses 3 notes on the recorder. Eight teachers also became enthusiastic players of the instrument, and a rota was set up so that the girls will continue with weekly lessons in small groups. Several of the girls wrote why they liked playing, saying "because it makes me happy". I did not hear any of them cry or whine in a whole week, incidentally.

So a big thank you to everyone who



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donated instruments, (especially Rose Pease), and also money. I was able to have 12 solid wood music stands made by the school carpenter, with the money people had given.

I will be keeping in touch with the orphanage – the teachers have email addresses, as does the director of the orphanage, Mary Kanini (a dry and witty character, and a highly organised woman). They need lots of things, and these can be delivered free of charge via the BA pilot network through Simon and Christine Wood. In particular the girls would like to learn to knit and crotchet, and their housemother Florence is keen to teach them as she loves knitting, but

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they haven't any knitting wool.

The following can be left at the Community Office in the box on the landing marked "Kidzone, Nairobi": Knitting wool, needles (up to size 9), crotchet hooks; Old clipboards; Recorders or percussion instruments (if any of these should be unsuitable for any reason they will be given to Sedbergh's charity shop, unless you indicate that you don't want this, in which case attach a phone number). The girls share one dormitory with 11 bunk beds. They have to do their homework or any other arts & crafts work on the stone floor as they have no tables. 15 stacking plastic tables and 25 stacking plastic chairs, which is what Mary would like, will cost the Kenyan equivalent of £300. Anyone who would like to help raise this money can give a cheque payable to "Sedbergh Friends of Kidzone Kenya". 

#### **BEEKEEPING**

**Bees** - driving us crazy!

In my last item on the subject, I expressed the hope that 2011 would be less challenging than 2008/2009/2010 had been for both bees and beekeepers. Some hopes! So far 2011 has been much like recent years - an excellent spring and then very 'changeable' weather, to inject uncertainty into our hopes for a good honey crop this year. And the bees seem to be getting their own back.

They have been behaving most oddly - swarming repeatedly without the usual warning signs - and then apparently giving up and absconding back into their own hive as if they were just out to take the air!! One of my hives has swarmed FOUR times in July, but they are all back in their hive again and working hard. They do indeed seem to have gone crazy.

will always seek to gather the cluster that forms nearby into a skep, which can then be carried to his own or a friend's empty hive and rehived there. Most importantly he then checks that the parent hive is not harbouring one or more virgin queens who can head a second 'cast swarm'. If any are found, they can be removed and given to a friend who may have a 'queenless' colony, and all is well.

It seems that this year a lot of colonies have taken an unshakeable decision to swarm repeatedly come what may. But the curious thing is that many have then 'changed their minds', and instead of flying off to the 'new home' the scout bees have previously found - a deep hole in a dead tree perhaps, hopefully not into vour shed or attic - then the decision process is somehow reversed and they all 'go back home'.

Most are aware of the beekeepers' When a hive swarms, the beekeeper saying about swarms - "A swarm of

bees in May is worth a load of hay",
"A swarm of bees in June is worth a
silver spoon", but " a swarm of bees
in July isn't worth a fly" (more crudely
"let the b\*\*\*\*\*s fly"), but the latter
doesn't seem to be working - they do
not fly, just abscond back!! - crazy
indeed.

Apart from the assumption that it is yet another manifestation of 'climate change', that the frequent weather extremes we are now experiencing are somehow distorting their normal evolved behaviour patterns, we are finding it very hard to explain. So the hope must be for a return to normal weather - many of us are spending every day watching our hives on hot

mornings, looking out for the excess activity at the front of the hive that presages a swarm. As always, ' we'll see', and try to avoid going crazy ourselves!

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
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#### **WEATHER**

Well hardly "flaming June"! Although we only had 1 3/4 inches it rained on more days than not. Much was often light drizzle, which sometimes did not trouble the rain gauge. It was enough to keep it muddy. At the beginning and end of the month we had our warmest days with a high of 75.6F. It was also cool at nights with 3 nights dropping into the 30sF with a low of 37F. June was a breezy month, with all but 4 days registering double figures in mph wind speed, and a maximum gust of 20.1 mph on the 4th. For the first month of the year the wind chill was above freezing each night.

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June, D Day, but came back for a few nights to roost. The parents didn't waste much time as by the 23<sup>rd</sup> they had laid 5 more eggs! I find it absolutely incredible that something as small as a swallow can hatch from such a tiny egg, grow so quickly, fly so well straight from the nest and in a matter of weeks be off to Africa! If the activity around our feeding station is anything to go by most birds have done well so far. We have had young of chaffinch, blue tits, great tits, coal tits, house sparrows, goldfinch, robin, great spotted woodpecker, linnet, siskin feeding with longtailed tits around the garden. The linnets and siskins have been visiting the niger

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seed, both new additions to our list. The jackdaws have had a population explosion and most seem to breakfast at my expense first with the poultry and then they follow me to the sheep! Still very few butterflies are on the wing with the odd small white being the only regular. The mud meant that a second pair of swallows could build in our field shelter. It was fascinating to watch it constructed in layers, each one being left to dry with dry grass being incorporated as reinforcing material hanging on a post. My fancy pheasants, having finished breeding, are in full moult, perhaps a little earlier than usual. The cock birds, as their new feather grow,

look as though they have a beaded cape rather like some of the head gear of the pharaohs. Presumably because of the warm moist days we have not had much of either a June drop with the fruit trees or a June gap with the bees. The latter have been stacking in the nectar, hopefully from all the clover that is flowering, as this is a honey I like. The fine days at the end of the month brought out the contractors machinery with everyone, except me, trying to get some winter feed in store either as silage or hay.


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was enjoyed by many proud parents and visitors alike.

The evening seemed to go smoothly, the hours flew by and everyone left, some a little richer, some a little tireder, but hopefully happy and ready to compete next year.



#### **SEDBERGH TOWN BAND**

Town Band at the Sedbergh Folkfest
The Town Band were invited to
perform in this expanding Folkfest on
Sunday 26th June. Only in its second
year since its move from Dent the
week-end attracted some fifteen
hundred campers and in all there
were an estimated three thousand
attendees over the three days of the
festival.

Continuous rain and heavy human and mechanical traffic the previous day had rendered the site somewhat boggy, though Sunday's more clement weather had improved matters underfoot somewhat. However boots or bare feet were the sensible chosen option for the festival goers though as performers the Band cut their usual immaculate figures in uniform and black shoes. It was one of those exceptional evenings when both humidity and temperature were high and jackets were gratefully discarded after the first number played.

The Band took over from a group comprising electronically magnified violin, guitar and double bass. Their pulsating and accelerating rhythms clearly captivated the large audience gathered and many were those who took to the floor.

They were a hard act to follow but the Band's total contrast and imaginative programme served to provide a further dimension to the festival's music . Familiar numbers from recent concerts were played amongst which the jazz number 'Sugar Blues' featuring solo cornetist: Paul Grey, and the frenetic 'Amarillo', 'Great Balls of Fire' and 'Music to watch girls by' proved particularly popular with the audience. Each item was punctuated by a familiar folk number played on the bagpipes by Jim Dillon. For the final item Jim was joined by Tony Playfoot and they combined superbly to give a thrilling rendition of 'Highland Cathedral' stirringly backed by the full band.

The performance at the Sedbergh Folkfest was just one of a number of new experiences for the Band. The recent trip to Belgium now makes three countries visited - besides Belgium, Slovenia and Italy have provided exotic venues. The recent trip was such a popular success that it is intended to have a return to Ypres in 2013 having, hopefully, been successful is booking a slot to play at the Menin Gate. The Band played at a barbecue at Cautley, in mid-July and will provide the 'marching band' element of the Silloth Carnival in August. A Lion's Christmas Concert in Kendal will feature the Town Band and an appearance will be made in Keswick.

Besides the above additions to the Band's engagement calendar all the traditional activities will be seen - Christmas Concert in the People's Hall, late night shopping, carols in Kendal and Sedbergh.

Dr. Gina Barney's delightful garden at Cautley was the venue for a short

concert on Wednesday 13th June. At 7.30 the Band played their opening number, Alan Lewis's 'Tarka 1,2,3', and then paused whilst John Challoner welcomed all those attending. He proceeded in a few well chosen words to recall the Appleby migration of three years ago that was dreadful for everyone concerned and reminded us that the barbeque was to say thank you to the appointed and elected officers (CCC, SLDC, and police) for achieving what at the time seemed an impossibility the more traditional experience of the last two years that had been pleasant for Cautley residents and travellers alike.

He thanked the Band for coming and Gina Barney for her hospitality and keeping the Campaign show on the road all this time.

The second half of the concert had to be cut short. Not totally characteristically the weather was superb - cloudless sky, no wind and warm. Ideal conditions one would have thought but sadly those conditions accompanied by attendant stock, a flowing stream and lush vegetation brought out the midges in clouds and reluctantly a premature end had to be called - even liberally applied 'jungle formula' was no match for these persistent irritants.

# SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

Visit to Bentham 6th July.

The two Benthams, High and Low, are half an hour from Sedbergh, but even further west in the West Riding, on the link road between Lancaster and the A65 at Clapham. They are separate parishes, but with a combined town council.

David Johnson, a retired head of Bentham Primary School and our guide, provided a booklet of photos covering 1880's - 1950's, illustrating the town's changes. His route followed the pictures. The Benthams, with one exception, have no pretence to architectural distinction, no grand design or impression to make, but were subject to change as economic conditions required, with the auction mart at its core, still busy after a century and a half. There are no traces of any early occupation, except a very primitive head and arms of a

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small crucifix retained in one of the churches.

We started looking at a building in the centre of High Bentham which operated in the 19C, as a corn mill destroyed by fire 30 years ago and is now converted into an attractive flat development. Nearby we looked at the local alms houses, but complete re-modelling in 1998 had been a modern make over, so any historical features were gone. They were founded in 1726 by one of the Collingwood family of naval connections as a "hospitell for 12 decrepid housekeepers".

Across the way the Grammar School was established in 1736 later taken over by the local authority under the 1870 Education Act. The original building a house in a walled enclosure had disappeared, the site expanding with new building and extensions, but soon, after being a location for education for 275 years, teaching will cease there when a new school building on another site opens. Mr. Johnson regretted that the limited area in front of the school was the only open space in the town for any public gathering, too small for the purpose.

Centrally positioned in the town was the Royal Oak, a coaching inn, a substantial building, but now minus sign, clock and coach mounting steps. A dozen miles from Lancaster, the inn was the first or last stop depending on direction of travel and is now incorporated into the auction business complex.

The railway reached Bentham in the

1860's on the line between Bradford and Morecambe, its counterpart on sea. It attracted development along the inevitable Station Road between the railway line and the town with a hotel, shops with large display windows and a substantial area cleared and re-built in the late 19th and early 20th C.

Silk was produced on a large scale here at a mill by the River Wenning with another producing the same product in Low Bentham. The technique of weaving in a circle was refined to produce fire hoses and there developed a large business employing over 600 people producing fire fighting equipment. Even now, it continues as a substantial employer with export markets under the trade name of "Angus Fire Equipment". Its administration building is the former Victoria Hotel.

The tour moved onto Low Bentham to see the distinguished buildings of Norman Shaw architect of St. John's Church, and the adjacent rectory which later became Bentham Grammar School and Sedbergh Junior School, but which is currently obscured by scaffolding, as it moves to another educational phase as part of the Witherslack Group.

Of the Church, the tower and chancel arch is all that remains of any earlier structure demolished for the new in 1875. The rest is Shaw's design. He was a. progressive architect aligned to the arts and crafts movement, apprentice to and teacher of other distinguished architects, "a cool headed Scot, of first rate ability".

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Amongst buildings of national significance designed by him are Scotland Yard in the metropolis and the Armstrong family residence, Cragside in Northumberland. The entrance porch, a later addition to the main work is very evocative of the period style and inside is a limited space, with the unity of an ecclesiastical building conceived and built in a single style with balanced proportions as opposed to those with changes made during different eras.

After a couple of hours learning of the Benthams and their history the similarities between them and Sedbergh were striking.

#### **SHINGLES**

Shingles is a disease of the skin involving the same virus as chicken pox. It mainly occurs in middle aged and older people and is thought that it can be triggered by stress or after a shock, such as a fall or bereavement. It involves pain followed by a rash which often appears in the belt area.

I was very interested to read, in the latest issue of "The Acupuncturist" about an Italian randomised controlled trial, comparing acupuncture with standard drugs for the treatment of shingles. The acupuncture patients had treatment twice a week for four weeks. Both methods were found to be effective with no significant difference between the two groups of patients.

My interest in the treatment of shingles began when I had shingles myself when I was in my twenties. This manifested as what seemed to

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be a mosquito bite (very strange, in January) accompanied by pain in the kidney area, which was bad enough to prevent me sleeping. I was living in Germany and I was told by my GP that I had "Guertelrosa" (pink belt) and given treatment on several consecutive days. This consisted of vitamin B injections into the site and I recovered completely in about a week. I now realise that I was very lucky (of course, I had youth on my side) and that the pain from shingles can go on for several months.

More recently, I have treated several people with acupuncture for shingles. I have learned that a very gentle approach is best: few needles and little stimulation, as pain from shingles is quite volatile and it does not take much to set it off. Usually four to six gentle acupuncture treatments have been enough to



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resolve the pain, even if the person has had the condition for some time.

On my study trip to China last year, I had the opportunity to observe acupuncture treatment of shingles at the Traditional Chinese Medicine Hospital in Hangzhou. I was fortunate to be with two doctors who spoke very good English and I was heartened to find that very often the treatment given in the hospital was similar to the treatment I would have given here in Sedbergh. Treatments for back pain, neck and shoulder pain, pain in the joints, facial paralysis and neuralgia, headaches, migraines and dizziness, for example were

similar to treatments given in this country.

Patients with shingles came to the hospital three times a week and I was surprised to see that the treatment involved very strong stimulation. Although I was generally very impressed with the standard of care at the hospital, the shingles patients did not seem to be experiencing rapid improvement and I still hold the view that in this case gentle treatments are best.

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#### PHENOLOGY IN SEDBERGH?

My trusty old Collins Dictionary defines phenology as the study of the times of recurrence of natural phenomena, especially of the influence of climate on plants and animals. (However, my super-duper modern computer does not recognise the word and highlights it as a spelling mistake!)

Collaboration and data sharing between the many biological organisations around the world show that climate change is having an impact on our wildlife. For example, the dates for the flowering of trees and plants, the appearance of butterflies and moths, migration and nesting patterns for birds are all showing trends of change. Observations have shown that Swallows are arriving in the UK about 20 days earlier than they did in the 1970s. It is something we read about and occasionally think about happening, but this year the migrant Pied Flycatchers in Sedbergh provided real proof of climate change. In 2007 the Sedbergh local support group of Cumbria Wildlife Trust regenerated a Nesting Box project for Pied Flycatchers, with around 30 boxes located in three woodlands around Sedbergh. Each year, an average of nine boxes have been used by Pied Flycatchers, with the

young being ringed in 2007 on 11th June, for the next three years on 10th June and this year, 2011, on the 9th June. In the past, only once has a whole brood fledged before ringing and in several boxes the young were too small to ring.

By 2nd June this year, 6 broods were ready to fledge and by 9th June there were only two complete and one partial broods left to ring, which means that 70% of the birds had fledged 7-10 days early. Looking back at previous records, the 'normal' hatching dates were around 25th May, but this year the eggs were hatching around 18th May, at least a week early.

Comparing these data with two similar locations in the Lake District, it seems that in Kentmere, out of 25 nests only 8% of them had fledged by the 10th June but in Selsides, out of 15 boxes 40% had flown. So why has there been such a drastic change around Sedbergh in just twelve months?

Maybe the Pied Flycatchers are breeding early to keep up with the plant and insect phenology, which can be a problem if they do not all advance at the same rate. For instance, there are data from Holland suggesting that the trees are in leaf earlier, the caterpillars on which the birds depend are available earlier, but the birds are not advancing their breeding fast enough to take advantage of them, causing a decline in the Pied Flycatcher population. Fortunately, this 'phenology mismatch' does not seem to have

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happened in Sedbergh this year.
Other changes noticed in the area this year have been very positive ones. Redstarts, Spotted Flycatchers, Cuckoos and Ring Ouzels seem to be more abundant even though they are on the decline in other areas of the UK.

All records sent to organisations such as the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) from surveys and everyday observations are essential for compiling the data on climate change and wildlife populations. Have you seen any change in the distribution or breeding dates of your local wildlife and, if so, please inform me or the Sedbergh CWT group so that we can forward your information? In memory of Colin Armistead who started the Nesting Box Project in the 1960s and who gave so much of his time and energy to wildlife conservation. Jackie Foott ☆

#### MRS MAGGIE CULLEN

Plenty of pupils have come and gone throughout the years, but head teacher Maggie Cullen has been steadily at the helm of Sedbergh Primary School for nearly 20 years. However on July 22nd 2011 she left to take early retirement.

Maggie was born in a small Essex village, met and married her husband Ed in 1973, before qualifying as a teacher in 1974. Her earliest teaching post was in an east Derbyshire mining village, where she taught for four years in this depressed area following the closure of the local pit. Ed and Maggie then moved to Nottingham, where they began their family. Following the birth of two sons, James and Thomas, Maggie became a full time mum. When the children were at an age to commence nursery and school, Maggie resumed her career, taking on a part-time job teaching special needs children in a local primary school and this soon became full time. The family moved to Sedbergh in 1988, when Ed got his first headship in Cumbria. On arriving in Sedbergh a temporary vacancy teaching juniors occurred at Sedbergh Primary School: this was further extended to full time in 1989 and eventually to Deputy Head in 1990. It was in 1992 that she became Head, supporting teaching in Reception.

Whilst much in education may have changed beyond recognition in many ways, especially the role of the head teacher, relating to children has always been the principal aspect of

her job, working with them to bring out their talents and develop their potential. Meeting every eventuality with calmness and humour, this might have been put to the test during a lesson in Reception, where Maggie had carefully planned a great session on squirrels, with plenty of wonderful resources to look at and hold. Halfway through a sentence, in full flow, a hand went up, and, thinking this child has been so interested and keen to speak, we can only imagine the look on her face when the child blurted out'. "My dad says you should shoot the little b\* \* \* \* \* \*!"

Despite the heavy workload of the modern headship, she has also maintained a part time teaching commitment. The other remarkable thing that has kept her dedicated to her role has been her endless energy and ability to meet fresh challenges, as the role of head teacher is not just

one job but a succession of many jobs.

Over the years Mrs. Cullen has had to adapt to many members of staff leaving, as well as the changes to her job, rebuilding teams more often than most football club managers! She has always encouraged and supported all members of staff to develop their own careers and allowed those in the early stages of theirs to develop their new skills and ideas, leading Sedbergh Primary School to its well deserved reputation for excellence, recognised by Ofsted who have twice awarded the school the highest accolade possible - outstanding, noting that she is an outstanding head, a most dedicated professional who is passionate about every single child who comes through the school. Under her influence, the school is held in high regard in the local community and has forged outstanding partnerships with other schools and agencies.

It is a credit to her professionalism that in all her years as head, she has rarely had a day's illness, and that despite flooding, heavy snow and even foot and mouth, the school has never been closed! Her only relatively lengthy period of absence was when she undertook a 2 week educational visit to Eritrea, working with colleagues from St Martin's College in order to develop teacher training. The first visit was so successful that they were asked to return for another two weeks in order to develop it further across East Africa.

A retirement celebration was held at



the school on Wednesday July 20th, where Mr Alan Fell, a past chair of governors who had worked closely with Mrs Cullen for many years following her arrival at the school, presented a farewell speech, thanking her for her many years of service to the school and local community. An informal farewell assembly took place on the last day of term, when Mrs Cullen was presented with gifts, cards and a bouquet. Whilst children, friends and colleagues will miss her warmth, wisdom and direction, they wish her a long and active retirement, with time to pursue all her many and varied interests.

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Help towards this cost was gratefully received from The United Charities, Sedbergh Community Fund, Sedbergh Parish Council and Lookaround. You have probably admired our smart new gates, replicas of the old ones expertly made by Graeme Robinson with 80% of the total cost generously donated by The Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority.

Inside we have been busy too. The organ built in 1895 by Norman and Beard has had parts removed and refurbished. Back in 1987 the organ required major work to repair damage caused by water ingress from the roof. Most of this work was confined to the parts of the organ played from the keyboards, with relatively little attention paid to the pedal organ. As the pedal organ (that part of the organ played by the organists feet) became more and more unreliable remedial work was necessary and has been completed in the last few weeks. During this time all the valves that control the flow of air into the pipes were refurbished and the linkages replaced. This required the

majority of the pipes to be removed allowing access to the wind chests on which they sit and the removal of 90 valves, one for each pipe, to be releathered. Happily, Tony's feet are once again tapping on the pedals. Another job well done and crossed off the list.

As we heave a sigh of relief on completion of those jobs another list of things to do has reared its head. Church law dictates that every five years the architect has to make a thorough survey of the church fabric. This "Quinqennial Report" submitted to us recently identifies jobs which in themselves are not huge but added together amount to around £70,000. These are to be completed in the next five years. Work on the bells and in the tower has not got a mention on this list, but more on this theme next time.

#### **BOOKWORM**

What I have been reading this

1. The Lost City of the Incas by Hiram Brigham (non fiction/history)

Published in 1952 there is an updated introduction but the 'story' of the discovery of Machu Picchu according to Brigham is unchanged. There are sections on the Incas their origins, civilization and emperors; the search for the capital city of the Incas and the discovery of

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the ruins of MP and its excavation.

Brigham's style is easy to read and understand whether tackling history, architecture or just 'exploring'. I found the book a great insight into the discovery of the Machu Picchi ruins in 1911 after huge difficulties. The city was hidden for centuries and is now a very popular tourist destination in Peru.

2. Engleby by Sebastian Faulks (fiction)

The book opens when Mike Engleby has just started university in 1970s. Faulks develops this character into a compelling narrative that descibes his past (fatherless scholarship boy at brutal boarding school ) and late blossoming of a journalistic career. An incident at university catches up with him, the outcome of which dominates the latter part of the book. Very skillfully written, intellectually precise and psychologically scary and sad. 3. Lady Hester: Queen of the East by

Lorna Gibb (biography/non fiction)

Lady Hester Stanhope was William Pitt's niece who moved away from aristocratic life in England to an unorthodox, exciting life travelling in the Middle East. Written in a lively, well researched style with good emotional insights into the range of Hester's relationships eg lovers, Meryon the devoted physician, servants; it is a vivid portrayal of what was then a rarely visited area. Hester died in the Lebanon in 1839 in eccentric seclusion and poverty.

The highspot of the evening for me was the first Saint Saens Cello Concerto of 1872. This was played with great panache, tremendous sensitivity and consummate skill by Daniel Crompton of Kendal, still a teenager but surely one with a brilliant future ahead.

I am not a regular orchestral concert goer but this for me was an outstanding evening - most of all because it showed yet again what



### **BRAIN CHILD**

Some of you reading this article might know Viv Hailwood as the director of the Rose Community Theatre that has given Sedbergh many an evening of fun, over the years, with pantos and musical productions. Most years, around 50 children and young people are involved and enjoy the experience so much that they come back for more the next time!

But Viv also has a work role and it will come as no surprise, to those of you who know her, to find that it involves babies and children.

Over six years ago Viv left her successful primary headship to set up BrainChild. I will let her tell you about it:

In my many years of teaching, I always had a group of children in my class who I thought of as my 'strugglers'. They were bright, and tried hard, but life seemed so difficult for them and they were usually worn out by lunchtime. I had originally trained as a Speech Therapist and I have always viewed every child individually and I looked for the answer to their difficulties.

To cut a long story short, I began to search for solutions. Our school had become popular, particularly with children with Autistic Spectrum Disorder and Dyspraxia, who were well integrated into school life. Following a wide range of training, I began to develop a program for use in schools. Cumbria Children's Fund funded a project which showed its positive impact.

The BrainChild program has continued to develop. I have worked with many groups, including National Autistic Society groups of children and parents. Individual families come for help.

The children I work with have developmental difficulties - which are surprisingly common. These children have some aspects of their functioning still influenced by babyhood. It can be something isolated, such as bedwetting or writing difficulties or can affect the whole child. The program is physical and natural and shows parents a way forward with their child.

Whole families are affected by a child who has sleeping issues or emotional instability or fears .....or all of those. To find out if BrainChild can help your child, look at the Checklist on the website.

The new BrainChild website will be online by October when the Online BrainChild Program will be launched. Individual assessment and a tailored program will be available for each child. area where local youths can meet and have their own space. It is very disappointing that this damage has occurred, if anyone has any information regarding this or any other problems with antisocial behaviour in this area please contact the Police


