

NEWS FROM THE PEWS



George Fraser Woodhouse (1875 - 1957), usually referred to as "Bobby" was a man of many skills; his musical, mechanical and scientific attributes used widely in his service to the church.

Originally from Manchester, "Bobby" Woodhouse was a Science Master at Sedbergh School and has been described as a quiet, lovable man.

My particular interest in "Bobby" is because one of his hobbies was bellringing; an art he practiced for many years at St Andrew's. He taught the boys from the school, even knitting jumpers for the new recruits featuring a church bell in the design. This was a measure of the dedication he showed to his team, (please don't get any ideas present ringers, especially Emma and Rachel our new recruits)! I might explain that bellringers use some very odd terminology, one of the calls we use when ringing methods is "Bob", hence "Bobby's" nickname.

The ringers at St Andrew's hosted a meeting of The Lancashire Association of Bellringers on Saturday 13th August. The branch of the Association we belong to is "Furness and South Lakes" and we get together at a different tower every two months to ring and practice different "methods" which is the name

for the "tunes" we ring.

We met earlier in the day than usual this time as we had something very unique on the agenda; the mechanical Ringing Machine designed and made by Bobby Woodhouse was to be demonstrated. Whilst the demonstration was somewhat disappointing due to a lack of expertise the sight and sound of the machine was enchanting. In recent times the boffins at GCHQ, Cheltenham, have marvelled at the machine. It is in need of an engineer's appraisal and a permanent home where it can be seen and admired. Sedbergh would seem to be an obvious choice but we await the outcome of proposals to be put forward in the near future.

Last month I promised to say a little more on work to be done in the bell tower. I am pleased to say we have made a start.

Rooks are very messy tenants in bell towers and as yet have not learned they cannot get into our tower via the louvres to make their nests because of the screens put there solely to keep them out. Every year at nesting time they have a good try at building their nests where for hundreds of years they have succeeded. Twigs and sticks are poked through the mesh screens, which lie behind the stone louvres

and what a mess they make. Now all is pristine as Andrew Mattinson's team removed all the old screens and the mesh and all the rubbish. There are now new screens and stainless steel mesh, which should stand up to the weather and the sticks being poked at them in the spring. The quantity of sticks that the lads removed from the tower would have made a healthy bonfire. A great result - no mess, and no bats in our belfry either!

The cost of this work will be borne by a generous grant received from the Sedbergh and District Community and Heritage Trust for which we are extremely grateful.

In September the next phase of

work will begin, this time on the bells. The jobs are nothing too onerous, but need to be done by someone who is skilled and knows what they are doing. The team are delighted that a ringer we have known for many years has agreed to do the jobs. Tom is at his happiest during retirement working on church bells. This means the huge costs we originally anticipated will be somewhat reduced. Another skill Tom has is ringing two church bells simultaneously, one in each hand, quite a sight to see, and very useful on occasions!

caused by some sort of internal stagnation. Feelings of heaviness, bloatedness, pain in the muscles and joints, excess mucous, constipation, PMT, painful periods (and many more conditions) are basically caused by some sort of "silting up" of the body due to lack of movement. The prevention (and in some cases the remedy) is to enjoy more of the right sort of movement.

There is a difference between movement specifically for health and movement for an ulterior purpose such as gardening, housework or playing football. People often say to me, "I'm on the go all the time, up and down stairs..." as if this would be sufficient exercise for health.

It is not just a simple matter of burning calories. Exercise for health is done with attention to the way the body moves and in particular to good posture. To get a feeling for this, try the following exercise, suggested by Peter Ralston in his (highly recommended) book "Zen Body Being"

 Stand with the feet parallel, pointing forwards, a little more than shoulder width apart. Feel for the centre of gravity of the body, a little below the navel. Imagine a chain attached there, dropping down between the legs and feet, to a point below the floor and that there is a 1000 pound weight on the end of the chain. Feel the difference this image makes to your posture.

Who amongst us can bring this much attention to the body while simultaneously painting the ceiling?

In a Tai Chi or Qigong class you will learn to coordinate movements from the centre of the body so that the whole body moves together. This is a more comfortable and effective way of moving which has a profound effect on health.

In Qigong the movements are designed to benefit the muscles, joints and the organs of the body. One enthusiastic participant of my Wild Goose Qigong class told me she could walk much better on her way home from the class than she could on the way there. The pulsing and circling movements of Wild Goose Qigong are very beneficial for the joints of the legs.

In the autumn Wild Goose class we shall be learning a particular sequence to strengthen the lungs to help prevent colds and coughs in the winter. You could think of this as being a bit like a flu jab – but less painful and more fun.

Crimson China by Betsy Tobin (fiction)



YOGA CLASSES

"I Can't join a yoga class because I'm too fat"

or maybe too old, or too stiff, or too busy. I've got a bad back, I've had a hip replacement, I can't sit on the floor with my legs crossed, I'm a man ...

These are just some of the reasons that people give for not trying a yoga class.

Yoga is often misunderstood by many people who, although they have a general feeling it may do them some good, have all sorts of odd ideas about what goes on during a lesson.

May I challenge you to come and find out for yourselves?

I have been teaching yoga for over thirty years and my students are a varied bunch of people. They range in age from 4 to 94 and come in all shapes, colours and sizes. Some have chronic health challenges, MS, arthritis, long term depression, sleep problems .. whilst others are at the peak of their physical conditionmembers of the 2012 Olympic Judo team based in Kendal.

Classes provide each student, whatever their circumstances, with an opportunity to learn new skills and practices to improve their overall sense of wellbeing and health. Movements are made slowly and repeated regularly, building familiarity with the demands of the postures, allowing us to tune into our innate structural feedback systems so as to avoid strain and allowing us to monitor our progress towards more freedom, ease of movement, core



strength and confidence.

All classes are local, friendly, supportive and informal and you work at your own level. I will prompt you to fulfil your potential but will never coerce. Any pushing or forcing in yoga is counter productive, tightening rather than releasing muscle fibre and restricting rather than encouraging freedom of movement around the joints. At a very practical level - if you can't sit on the floor, you can sit in a chair to work.

My qualifications include a Therapeutic Yoga Diploma awarded after a four -year long course with the Yoga Biomedical Trust in London. This means that I can safely adapt all yoga positions to any medical condition that presents itself in class. Occasionally I might recommend one or two private lessons so that I can be sure that when you do join the class you have a thorough understanding of the basic principal of yoga - nonviolence and non-competitiveness. Many students feel more confident joining a group once they realise how straightforward the movements are and how good they feel afterwards. According to the ancient teachings

of yoga, regular practice "reverses the effects of ageing"- wouldn't that be something!

Actually .. from my experience working with students over the past thirty years .. it does just that. Here's How ..

Over time in class, we each rediscover our innate physical, mental and emotional strengths. When this re awakening starts to happen it sets up a chain of positive effects .. our confidence improves, we become less isolated and introspective, our balance and posture improve, our digestive systems work better, our appetite improves and we become less attracted to food that is unsuitable for us and more attracted

to food that helps to maintain our strength and vitality, our energy levels improve and, for those of us 'too busy to learn to relax' .. time begins to expand as we stop rushing around, finding that we are able to prioritise better and let go of many of the worries and anxieties that eat into our time and energy.

Please don't just take my word for any of this (students are always encouraged to question and challenge in yoga tradition). Instead, come and find out for yourself.

BEEKEEPING

Bees - cursing the weather!

Yes, 2011 looks more and more like 2007/2008/2009/2010 - a superb spring, with the bees storing huge volumes of honey, only for the weather to change to cool and wet as it has in the last fortnight. The result, as I have mentioned before, is that the bees are then forced to eat their own stored honey to survive. Watch out for bees landing in your garden on wet stones, wet moss, etc. They are gathering water to take back to the hive. We call them 'water bees'beekeepers know them well and their meaning - to dilute honey to feed themselves and their brood. On a scorchingly hot day, when the hive internal temperature can go dangerously high, they use the water to absorb heat by evaporation, much as we use sweating! You can see large numbers of worker bees at both sides of the main entrance' fanning' their wings, those on one side removing the warm wet air from inside the hive, and those on the other side blowing fresh cool air into the hive. Honey bees are very good at air conditioning!

Last year my bees were forced to eat 90% of the honey they had stored in spring, so I extracted and bottled a record low crop, as in the previous three years.

Let's hope the weather returns to something more settled to save us going crazy!

The 'crazy' behaviour I mentioned last month has thankfully largely stopped, but I heard only this morning that one of our very best beekeepers

had a large swarm yesterday- truly crazy at the end of August.

Why crazy? Bees evolved to 'know' that swarms in July, let alone August, are most unlikely to be able to survive the subsequent winter. Also, as most people know, before they swarm they prepare to replace the departing queen, with a virgin queen, carefully reared, who must mate if she is going to be any use. She therefore needs drones (male bees) for that mating. But the bees also 'know' that the end of swarming means the end of the need for drones for mating. What happens? Those poor fellows that have done no work all summer are suddenly redundant! And nature is not kind. The worker bees systematically destroy all the drones in the hive, leaving none for virgin queens. You can occasionally see an 'undertaker' bee picking up and carrying away a dead drone corpse to drop somewhere well away from the hive.

So, hope for good weather, and our lovely huge honey crop will still be there to extract and bottle in a couple of weeks, with hopefully a jar for you! Malcolm Fraser-Urguhart

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Visitors to the Yorkshire Dales National Park are being asked to lend a hand in looking after the landscape – by taking their rubbish home.

Lazy litter louts are potentially endangering wildlife as well as creating an eyesore, according to the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's Head of Ranger Services, Alan Hulme.

"A small minority of people who can't be bothered to clear up after themselves - either because they are too thoughtless or too lazy to take it home – are spoiling this very special landscape for everyone else," he

said.

"They are leaving all sorts of things behind - from disposal barbeques to drinks cans – and they don't seem to realize that it can be harmful to wildlife as well as being unsightly.

"Animals can easily get their heads stuck in discarded food jars and cans and cut themselves on jagged metal edges.

"In addition, glass bottles can start fires in hot weather by magnifying the sun's rays.

"As well as asking visitors to take their rubbish home, we would ask others to report anyone they see leaving rubbish behind to any of our Rangers."

the power to issue fixed penalty notices to people who leave litter behind and to dog owners who fail to clean up after their pets.

Another problem is caused by Chinese lanterns that are released in the countryside, Alan said.

Newspapers report that Mountain Rescue teams around the country have been called out after sightings of 'distress flares', only to find they are lanterns. There is also the risk that, in dry conditions, they could start fires when they land.

In June Agriculture Minister Jim Paice said people should think twice about using sky lanterns at celebrations because they are causing problems in the countryside. He said that, after floating for many miles and falling to earth the burnt-out remnants could hurt livestock and litter fields.

Farmers have reported that sheep, cattle and horses are being injured, and in some cases dying, from eating the metal wire frames, which pierce their internal organs. They also report they are being forced to scour fields to pick up the remains of the lanterns.

Malcolm Petyt, the Authority's Member Champion for Recreation Management, said: "These lanterns may seem a fun way of celebrating some happy event, but please think of the possible consequences for other people affected by them."

GARDENING

As things in the garden begin to look a little tousled and back-end-ish I am always delighted to see the flowers which emerge late in the year popping up out of the soil and looking all fresh and new. My favourite at this time of the year is Cyclamen hederifolium, the hardy cyclamen which throws up its marshmallow pink or white flowers before the leaves. Cyclamen hederifolium (or C. *neapolitanum*) thrives in sunshine or under the shade of deciduous trees. I always buy plants when they are in flower, rather than the dry corms which are available for planting in spring, as the latter cam be hard to start into growth and are more likely to be dug up by mistake during the growing/weeding season.

Apart from these ready growing corms, this month is a good time to buy and plant corms and bulbs of spring flowering plants. This year I aim to put in some Crocus corms to "naturalise" in a part of the lawn. The species crocus, *C. tomasinianus* seems to grow reliably here, but the flowers are fairly small and slender, and, given our frequently sunless

days in February and March, they do not open to create much of a show, so I shall also plant some of the large flowered varieties, as they usually create a show even when there is no sunshine to open the flowers.

Species Tulips are now much more widely available and I shall look out for some dwarf bulbs for the rockery. *T. humilis* has several named varieties, including 'Persian Pearl' and 'Violacea', which produce pink or rich magenta, yellow centred flowers on short (4ins) stalks. *T.* 'Little Beauty' and *T.* 'Little Princess' are similarly neat. Both have blue/black centres to their flowers, but those of 'Little Beauty' are deep pink, whereas those of 'Little Princess' are dark orange.

We look forward to a beautiful display in Spring, and hope that the resident voles do not find the new bulbs before they have the chance to grow.

JULY WEATHER

The month started and finished with a dry spell but we did received 21/2 inches of rain. The dry spells were also quite warm with maxima in the upper 70sF. In between it was quite cool at times dropping down to maxima in the high 50sF. We actually had minima below 40F on 2 occasions and several nights in the low 40sF. In the wetter part of the month the pressure dropped quite markedly with a deep depression during the second week for several days. Breezy for most of the month we recorded a maximum gust of 17.7mph.

The dry spells, especially the longer one at the end of the month, produced an increase of activity with the noise of tractors and other machines working in the fields getting in winter fodder. The length of the dry spell meant many managed to get hay thus saving the cost of wrapping of silage. Even clipping was temporally suspended.

Bird activity has continued to increase around the feeders. They were finishing 3 fat balls per day before I put them on rations! We now seem to be getting more linnets than goldfinch at the niger seed. We had a stunningly marked cock siskin a couple of times. He had obviously just got his new mating plumage. The swallows duly hatched their eggs but the young died within a couple of days. On investigation of the nest my hand was literally covered in thousands of mites!! According to Miriam Rothschild and Theresa Clay,

in their classic, "Fleas, Flukes and Cuckoos- a study of bird parasites", the swallow mite is one of our most common mites. Obviously there were enough to suck these poor youngsters dry! Red mite is a problem in the chicken sheds at this time of year but a good spray with Jeves fluid around the perches and corners keeps them under control. Not to be out done the adults swallows built another nest at the other end of the kennel and laid 5 more eggs. Let's hope the adults haven't transferred too many mites across and they are successful this time. Butterflies are still scarce, especially as the buddleia has come into bloom. A few small whites, one peacock and one female small blue were my tally of butterflies this month. Pipisterelles continue to be active but I haven't seen them emerge from a roost yet.

COUNCILLOR CORNER LOFTUS HILL CAR PARK:

As a parish we owe much to Sedbergh School, but no more that Sedbergh School owes to the parish. For two or three months my parish colleagues and I have been aware that Sedbergh School did not intend to renew the parish council's lease of Loftus Hill Car Park. Although obviously a matter for concern, in itself this was not entirely surprising. Deliberately when we first heard we did not publicise the matter more than absolutely necessary as we needed greater clarity as to what was intended; hence my reticence in previous articles. Discussions are

"on-going". No doubt we will all know more after next week's Parish Council meeting. Convenient and plentiful car parking for the town, in the centre of town is clearly essential.

COLIN HODGSON:

It was with sadness that I heard the not unexpected news of the death of my long time friend and fellow councillor Colin Hodgson. He was a man born and bred in Ulverston, a man who lived and died serving the community which he so much loved and which so much loved him. With the advent of cabinet local government it was no surprise that it was Colin, the leader of the Conservative Group who SLDC



councillors entrusted with the new role of Council Leader, even though we were never the largest group. As Finance Portfolioholder I worked along side him for five years. We were faced with many serious problems of which two stand out – Job Evaluation and a central government financial regime rigged against shire districts in general and South Lakeland in particular.

Within his own community the fully restored Hoad Monument, the thing which looks like a lighthouse as you approach Ulverston, will be Colin's fitting memorial. This was a million pound project which he personally lead and continued to lead even when his health was no longer robust. Here in Sedbergh we can thank him for listening to Paul Winn and me when we banged on about Loftus Hill and Joss Lane toilets and car parks. That we were able to make the progress that we did was in part down to the fact that Colin was prepared to listen and to come over to Sedbergh with the entire cabinet and senior officer team on a bitterly cold February day.

BETTER HIGHWAYS:

Relaunches and re-enactments are usually cited as evidence of failure. In truth I do not think that is the case with the Better Highways project in Cumbria. The constant need to catch up with last year's winter maintenance had to be the primary concern. Now that is done we can look at the other more run of the mill

work. A key element of the new methodology is the distinction between minor and major schemes. The six severe subsidences between Cross Keys and Rawthey Bridge are, contrary to what some seem to think. well on the county's radar. They are now by far the most serious problem in the Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale division. A resolution will consist of several major county level projects. If you disagree just look at what was done about thirty years ago where the road and river actually meet. In recent years finance has not been so plentiful so it is unlikely that a scheme to match that could even be contemplated, but certainly, that is what is needed.

I am delighted with the progress being made with the Dentdale Community Bus project and delighted to have been able to support it with money from my own county councillor pot.

It will be interesting to see how many of my former National Park colleagues will turn up for our Community Office Open Afternoon on 6 September. In view of their collective aspiration to expand so far into Cumbria a very good attendance should be expected. Anything less will be damning not only of their attitude to Sedbergh but of their whole expansionist agenda.

August I attended the inaugural meeting in Grassington of The Dales Integrated Transport Alliance (DITA). This initiative arose from the activities of the Dales and Bowland Community Interest Company and its primary concern is to assist in establishing a network of community transport across the whole of the National Park and the Nidderdale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. This includes, of course, Sedbergh, Dent and Garsdale. The network will be established via community "hubs" and Sedbergh has already been marked out as being a contender for this position. The aim will be not only to protect existing services (such as the Dent Saturday bus) but also to roll out our area. It is obviously vital that

new services which might include such things as lift and car sharing, bicycle hire and a community minibus operating as a half-way house between a bus and a taxi. The community office would act as an information and co-ordinating centre providing enquirers with information about all transport options for particular routes and destinations. The other good news is that DITA has just received grants totalling over one million pounds to help to get the scheme underway. Following this meeting I convened a meeting in Sedbergh on 17th August of local representatives, to have a preliminary discussion about the way forward for

local residents and visitors have a significant involvement and investment in these plans as well as the project receiving sound technical advice and assistance to bring the plans to fruition. To this end a major meeting of existing and likely future stakeholders is being held in the Peoples Hall on the 5th September when Councillors, National Park Members, DITA representatives, transport providers and consultants are being invited to attend to examine and discuss possible ways forward. This is an exciting initiative with the likelihood of very positive outcomes for our area. For anyone wishing to know more at this stage I would suggest they visit the DITA website on www.dalesconnect.net.

On the 16th August I chaired one of the regular meetings of the Sedbergh Tourism Initiative. Having successfully completed our first project of producing a tourism brochure for Sedbergh and Dentdale we are now considering what to tackle next. One option is to seek to extend to an all-year-round basis the Heritage Open Days which Evelyn refers to above and another option is to start developing Adventure Tourism in the area. This would involve not only encouraging the provision of activity holidays of one sort or another (such as the Dentdale Walking Festival which is already up and running) but also ensuring that information about what is on offer gets out into the wider market place. DENT PARISH COUNCIL

Victoria Lepper from Cumbria
Highways visited the August meeting
to discuss parking restrictions in
Dent, and the meeting also discussed
the possibility of a new weekly library

Parking Survey

Prior to the meeting, Victoria Lepper and councillors conducted a walkabout in Dent to look at the options for parking restrictions in Dent village. Two actions were agreed:

- to mark Dragon Croft at its junction with Flintergill as a 'Keep Clear' area
- 2. to carry out a public consultation with all the dale's residents over whether the cobbled surface area in Dent should become Restricted Parking Zone.

With parish council help, the consultation document will be delivered to every household in the second or third week in September, after which there will be 21 days to respond. Unfortunately, although funding has been made available for this consultation, none has yet been allocated to carry out the work should the response support it, so it is likely to be some time before any zone could be established.

Saturday Bus

A recent large-scale development is likely to be good news for the

Saturday bus service. An organisation called the Dales Integrated Transport Alliance (DITA) has been awarded £1.1m of government funding to develop a community transport scheme across the whole of the Dales. They plan to base bus networks on a series of transport hubs, and one of these would be Sedbergh. Each community will then have the opportunity to identify local bus services which meet local demands, and ask to DITA to run them.

This is good news for Dentdale's Saturday bus. Since the parish council intervened in April to save it, passenger numbers and fare revenue have increased considerably, and it now looks like a service that could be run commercially. If this is so, it could become part of this new community transport scheme and continue indefinitely. More details of the DITA project can be found at www. dalesconnect.net.

Dispute with HMRC

As reported in the May Lookaround, the council has been disputing HMRC's claim that it did not submit last year's PAYE summary on time. and this finally led to a tribunal appeal in Leeds at the beginning of August. Although the judge did not allow the appeal, he was sympathetic to the issues for small councils when submitting returns on line, as well as to the efforts made by the then Parish Clerk to complete the process by the deadline. Although the council has had to pay a £400 penalty, hopefully its presentation at the tribunal has defused any further penalties HMRC may have considered imposing.

Road Repairs

The Council received notice that Cumbria Highways will undertake significant repairs to the Sedbergh to Dent road prior before 30 September 2011, which will involve the road being closed for short periods. Diversion routes will be in operation at short notice to allow the work to be completed.

Amenities Committee

Following the takeover of Joss Lane toilets by the Parish Council the promised refurb by SLDC has now taken place. In order to save costs it was agreed that the possibility of the Community Trust running the Toilets would be looked into and in the meantime an appeal against the business rates would be made.

72 Main Street

The Council continues to oppose the disposal of the building and land. Parishoners are encouraged to write to the National Park Authority to object to the disposal of the land in front of the building.

Sedbergh Townscape Initiative

The installation of new street name plates has now commenced and we are very pleased with the favourable comments being received.

Amenities Committee

Work has continued on the replacement and refurbishment of benches in the Town and also much effort has been put in to the administration of the newly acquired Joss Lane Toilets.

Car Parks

We are delighted that SLDC have now agreed to transfer Joss Lane Car Park to the Parish Council on a 99 year lease.

Sedbergh School however is terminating the lease on Loftus Hill Car Park at the end of June 2012. The Council is talking to the School about possible alternatives, as it is considered that the loss of Loftus Hill car park will further exacerbate parking problems in the town.

Proposed sale of land at Baliol School

A letter has been received from North Yorkshire County Council consulting on the disposal of land at Baliol School. The land in question comprises all those areas which have been used as sports pitches or formal or informal play areas (the consultation does not relate to any buildings).

The Council understands that this formal consultation is required because the consent of the Secretary of State for Education must be obtained before a local authority is permitted to dispose of such land and that, in reaching his decision, the Secretary of State will have regard to factors such as the level of playing field provision available to other schools within the local area and the extent to which there has been any community use of the land intended to be sold.

This consultation is quite separate to any consideration of the possible development or change of use of the land which would be the subject of normal planning procedures.

The closing date for the submission of comments or representations to North Yorkshire County Council is 7th November.

Whilst it was noted that a statutory public notice of the intended disposal had also appeared in the local press,



members of the parish council resolved to contact all schools within the town before considering whether any response to the consultation would be appropriate. Members of the public may pass their vies on to any Parish Councillor for consideration



TIM FARRON MP

I was extremely pleased to receive the formal confirmation of the coalition Government's plans to compensate Mountain Rescue teams for the VAT they have to pay on their equipment and fuel. My colleague Danny Alexander, the Chief Secretary to the Treasury, told me earlier in the year that he was looking into how this could be done. For reasons to do with European Law it appears that the Government cannot simply refund the VAT, as they do with the other emergency services, and so they have decided to make a grant of about £200,000, roughly what they pay the Government in VAT each year, to the teams. I have been

campaigning for action in this area for several years now. The teams are largely funded by donations and it is simply wrong that the Government has been taking 20% of the money that they raise through their hard work by making them pay VAT on all the equipment and fuel that they use. As party spokesman on rural affairs I made it part of the Liberal Democrats Election Manifesto last year that action was taken to sort this out, so it is great to see this commitment turning into action.

However, £200,000 still does not completely cover all the VAT that the teams pay and the funding that English teams receive lags behind the support that teams in Scotland



upset more people in the process than any other council. No one denies that the managing of Teaching Assistant's terms and conditions is a particularly challenging aspect of the move to treat all council staff equally, but Cumbria seems to have been particularly inept in the way that they have handled it compared to other councils. I continue to ask them to put everything on hold whilst the process they have followed is reconsidered to see where things have gone wrong.

Finally, on the subject of poor administration, I was alarmed to read the report on the Rural Payments Agency by the National Audits Office. So far this agency has had to pay over half a billion pounds to the EU in fines for failing to apply regulations correctly. In these times of tight public finances we simply cannot afford for this type of waste to continue. However, the more significant concern is the reason why these fines have been imposed, because the agency has failed to do its job properly in providing funding for farmers in their work to protect the environment. This was a disaster under the last Government and we need to ensure that it does not continue to be so under the current one.

SEDBERGH & KIRKBY LONSDALE | Energy Trust NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUM

Summary of the meeting held on Tuesday 12th July 2011, at Killington Parish Hall.

Councillor Kevin Lancaster welcomed everyone to the meeting and introduced Councillor Roger Bingham whose electoral division covers Mansergh Parish. Both councillors declared that, as the grant application from AgeUK was being presented by a Conservative party colleague, they would defer the decision on any award to Cllr Stan Collins whose Firbank and Killington parishes are in the Sedbergh & Kirkby Lonsdale Forum area.

K-SET: Killington Sustainable

Ian Dawson, chair of K-SET outlined for the forum the history of the company and its work to date. The non-profit making trust was set up two years ago with seven trustees with the initial aim of helping all households in the parish to reduce their carbon footprint. They produce a regular newsletter and hold open evenings and all dwellings have had a reduction target set. Additional insulation has been added to the lofts of 10 homes and nine people took a course on energy saving techniques and have since been able to put the advice they were given into practice and pass tips on to others. The trust is hoping to provide opportunities for

local trades people to train in the installation of all types of energy saving equipment and also to offer the facility of low interest loans to households wishing to install new energy efficient equipment.

An interest in generating power for the parish was the logical next step. Wind turbines were quickly ruled out as the obvious option was hydropower, given the amount of rainfall locally and the three becks running through the area. The aim however is not to supply power direct to dwellings but to send all the electricity generated straight to the National Grid and take the benefit of the feedin tariffs available. An existing weir and fish counting on the Lune near

the site of the old Broadraine Mill seemed to be an obvious and ideal location. The preferred method of generating the power is a turbine in the form of an Archimedes Screw, due its efficiency in coping with a low head but large volume of water.

Only a small amount of the water going over the weir (c. 10%) will go through the turbine so there will be no harm to fish or effects on angling.

The project has been phased and the first part, the design study, which includes improvements to the fish ladder as well as the turbine installation, was funded with support from various sources including the Sedbergh & Kirkby Lonsdale Local Area Partnership. Negotiations with

the Environment Agency on water extraction and licences will largely form the second phase and after that the design will be finalised, the necessary planning application will be submitted and work will be put out to tender. 2013 should see the start of the final phase – construction. The net income is currently estimated in the region of £12-13k per annum, but will depend on the charges levied by the Environment Agency. A similar project at Beetham was reported to have had a number of teething problems but was now generating a substantial income for the Heron Corn Mill.

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL

PARK

Kathryn Beardmore, Director of Park Services, advised the Forum that there had been a number of changes within the Authority in the last 6-9 months. The Authority is funded by Defra and has had a 30% cut in funding spread over the next four vears. This has meant a restructure of some roles and an overall reduction in staff, mainly through retirement or voluntary redundancy. Thus, for example, traffic and transport issues are now dealt with by planning rather than separate officers and rangers have taken on education and Rights of Way roles. Maintaining frontline services has been the prime

focus so there are now also less senior managers overall.

In terms of local projects, a report from Paul Wilkinson, the ranger stated that among other things maintenance on Rights of Way had been carried out in the Sedbergh, Dent and Garsdale areas and east of Sedbergh a number of stiles had been replaced with gates.

A member of the audience asked how the cuts might affect the Authority's ability to cope with any extension to the Park's boundary. Kathryn advised that the Authority was broadly in favour of the extension provided the number of members and the funding were increased

proportionately. However, the final decision rests with Defra and the authority would have to manage any extension even if no additional resources were allocated by Defra. A decision on extending the National Park is at least another two years away.

CUMBRIA HIGHWAYS

Steve Gibson, Highways Engineer, reported that the Better Highways scheme had led to greatly improved road conditions in the area. The aim was to identify and fix problems before they got to a stage where someone reported the fault. With current budget availability Cumbria's 7,700 km of road would be

completely resurfaced every 114years and for some types of work budgets are half what they were 15 years ago. £1.4m of funding for pothole repairs has been drawn down from the Government and, although this has to be spent by September, a lot a work can be done with that money in the time available.

Some roads do need larger programmes of work, the A683 round Barbon for example. These will take time to get to the top of the schedule as work is now being programmed for 2012/13 to ensure funding will be available. Inspections are carried out monthly on A class roads, quarterly on B and C class roads and annually on unclassified routes. One pothole

does not constitute a scheme of work which is why they are simply patched with small aggregate. Several potholes and other defects over a certain distance can equal a scheme where more substantial re-surfacing work can be undertaken.

Road closures are avoided wherever possible but, although they can be inconvenient they are often the quickest way and safest to get the work done.

Some queries were raised and answered about specific faults in the area and generally it was reported that efforts are being made to get utility companies to resurface to a higher standard when they complete work but it is a slow process.

ZRECE YOUTH GROUP VISIT August 2011

A merry band of 13 teenagers aged 13 to 17 and three Leaders (Dave Smith, Susan Garnett and Ben Maunder) arrived relatively unscathed at the Gorenje Youth Centre near Zreče our twin town on Sunday evening 31st July. A minor hiccup was the delay at Venice Marco Polo airport immigration while our obviously unfamiliar group passport was passed from official to official of increasing seniority and puzzlement. Fortunately they let us pass. We were delighted to be met by Rosanna and Marietta from the Zreče "primary" school (6 to 14). This was my ninth visit to Zreče since our twinning

charter was signed in May 2005 and as ever our welcome was warm and friendly.

Hot sunny weather was forecast with some thunderstorms at night so the prospects for a week of mainly outdoor pursuits seemed promising. Sure enough the next morning dawned bright and warm. We set off to walk the 7km (downhill fortunately) to Zreče, stopping to hear an accordion player on route amid the haymaking. After some preliminary exploring we headed for the spa, a new experience for the majority of the group. The spa (terme) is at the heart of a "wellness" complex providing all sorts of treatments. There are several pools indoors and out of varying

temperatures with jacuzzis, water chutes and slides. It seemed a good idea to get our share of accidents out of the way to begin with so, without wasting any time, calamities occurred and two of our number had to visit the clinic and thence the hospital at nearby Slovenske Konjice for treatment requiring stitches in one case and restrictive bandaging for the other. This didn't seem to slow them down at all.



Meanwhile, back in town, Dave and Ben had met with the Zreče teachers again to discuss and plan future exchanges.

Evenings were spent on the outdoor sports pitch or playing table tennis and cards, all very competitively!

We had an early start the next day with a coach trip heading west to visit the Predjama Castle and Postojna caves. The castle was a new venue for me and its dramatic site built into a cliff and series of caves is unique. Legend and mystery abound in this historic site and a fascination with local wildlife, Grendel the grasshopper and Leonard the lizard caused diversions for some. We were intrigued to hear that a previous 15th century denizen met his end by being crushed by a large boulder while visiting a place "where even the

sultan must go alone". Thence to the magnificent Postoina caves. This complex is awesome in its size and proliferation of karst features. The dramatic drop in temperature, as we were transported underground by train, from 25°C to 8°C degrees came as a shock to some! This was my 5th visit to the caves but never when the contrast was so marked. All were impressed especially by the strange pink salamander proteus known as the "human fish". From there we drove to the capital Ljubljana for some free time exploring and enjoying the very special and caloriestuffed confections in the cafés. More of Ljubljana seems to be pedestrianised now and a bicycle hire



scheme similar to "Boris's bikes" in London is in operation.

Wednesday saw the group setting off for a three hour mountain bike ride with Gregor, one of the centre's instructors. The less athletic for various reasons set off on a gentle forest walk which turned out to be more adventurous than intended! After an enormous lunch we headed for Rogla, the nearby ski resort to try the precipitous and very scary toboggan ride there. Several circuits later we repaired to the café for hot chocolate and more cake. Just as well it was in that order!

The following day, hot and sunny again, was spent at, on and in Lake Bled. After a guided tour with Gregor

and his delightful three-year-old daughter we headed for the swimming area. The last time I saw this was in October 2010 when winds and rain lashed the lake and we heard tales of vicious swans and giant fish. Neither of the latter were in evidence, just a perfect setting for water sports of all kinds. Swimming, diving, rowing and zorbing (rolling around on the water in a large transparent ball) kept the party thoroughly occupied for over three hours. This complex even has a lending library with books in all languages and for all ages which can be borrowed for the duration of your visit. Cafés supply all sorts of drinks, ice cream, huge bowls of chips and

cake. Perfect! There was time for a short diversion to visit an exhibition showing some of the famous people who had visited Bled in the past. American and British film stars, politicians of all persuasions, royalty including our own had all enjoyed holidays here or indulged in some eccentric health treatments involving steam baths and living in isolated huts. Kill or cure at its best!

The week was flying past and on Friday morning Gregor led another forest walk. Slovenia has very large areas of protected native forest with public access on walking tracks. In the afternoon we headed for the spa again, this time uninterrupted by disaster. Besides all the pools, slides etc. the complex is surrounded by gardens where swimmers can lounge in the sun. In these sorts of temperatures it is the ideal place to be. We all enjoyed the facilities enormously.

We spent Saturday in and around Celie, originally a Roman settlement around 10 miles from Zreče. There were students in mediaeval costume at Celje castle who introduced our youngsters to archery, armour wearing and fire-eating. The tortuous and unlit climb up inside the tallest tower was accompanied by a sound installation involving deafening booms and crashes the significance of which was not immediately obvious! The tower was the prison of







a former prince's son who had made an unfortunate marriage and so was confined there for twenty years by his disappointed father. Perhaps there was a connection. Fortunately there was an excellent café at ground level serving the usual and very welcome beverages and cake. We walked down from the castle to the old town of Celje to eat our packed lunch by the riverside forgetting that everything closes at 1300 hours on Saturdays. However that doesn't seem to apply to the ubiquitous McDonalds which must send out invisible rays to draw in the addicted! Happy and well fed we headed for the nearby lake/ reservoir Smartinsko where we had the water sports area all to ourselves. Apparently it was too cold at around 27°C for Slovenians. They wait till the temperatures are well into the 30s before they take to the waters. More diving, swimming and zorbing went on and a great time was had by all. On the way back to base we visited the Francolova museum, site of a war-time atrocity, where our guide was our dear friend Zdenka, orchestrator of the original Zreče twinning bid. It is a sobering site and was observed with due reverence and respect by all.

Our last evening was spent packing, discussing the highs (no lows!) of our week and ending with a quiz.

Breakfast next morning included the appearance of a surprise birthday cake, a tasty sponge with a lavish dressing of icing sugar. The remains accompanied us to the airport where the large amounts of white powder

fortunately went through security unremarked and proved to be very welcome sustenance during our 7 hour wait for the delayed plane!

These friendship links between young people of different nationalities, some of whom have had a very different history to our own, can only be a very valuable exercise in international understanding and surely this is what twinning is all about. It was a great pleasure to get to know the youngsters in our party. They were great ambassadors for Sedbergh.

NATIONAL CHILDREN'S ORCHESTRA

Well, as they say, you had to be there! Under the **National Children's Orchestra** banner on August 4th in Powell Hall, a huge phalanx of 100 or so musicians all under 14 were giving it fearful stick!

Sensational power, stamina and energy - how the lips of brass and woodwind, and the wrists and fingers of string players did not bleed, driven as hard as they all were is a miracle. Tchaikovsky's Fifth Symphony was given a fizzing, urgent performance, ensemble generally pretty tight, some excellent horn work here, and that headlong enthusiasm did not flag for one moment the whole evening, which, given that in the second half they played a whole range of swaggeringly brash Spanish and South American show-stoppers, that stamina was awesome to behold.

Unfamiliar instruments, fiendish counting, all played with panache and aplomb.

The evening brought the Sedbergh audience to its feet cheering – and that takes a bit of doing too!

The audience at The Sage on August 6th for which the Sedbergh gig was merely a dress rehearsal, would have had one heck of an evening.

Many people said afterwards how inspiring and charismatic the conductor, Natalia Luis-Bassa, was. As you may know, Natalia is the regular conductor of Lancaster's Haffner Orchestra. If you would like to see her in action again, the next concert is at Lancaster University's Great Hall on Saturday November 26th at 7:30 pm. The programme is:






