At the start of the Forum Rob Kitchen from South Lakeland District Council gave an update on how these plans formed part of a wider, multi agency protocol for co-ordinating access to the Fair across Eden and South Lakeland. The procedures in South Lakeland have been firmly established for two years, and have, with the full protocol, been reviewed each year and revised as necessary.

Neighbouring County and District Authorities such as Lancashire. Lancaster City, North Yorkshire and Craven are kept informed of what measures are being put in place in South Lakeland and Eden, although

feedback from these areas has, in the past, been very limited. Residents of Wennington, attending the Forum, confirmed that the restrictions on early movement into and stopping in South Lakeland had had a negative impact on their village and others in the immediate area of North Lancashire.

People were reminded that the restrictions implemented under the TRO along the A683 cover all vehicles parked or stopped illegally, and not just those belonging to members of the travelling community. Therefore, any parishes planning events to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee should bear this in mind when organising their parking. It was asked if adequate cover was in place for the Jubilee Bank Holiday weekend, which falls immediately prior to the start of the Fair. SLDC will have staff available for the whole period and the Police will also be organising adequate cover.

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As well as attending fires and carrying out home safety checks, the Service offers many other training and awareness raising opportunities. born following concerns raised when Dent produced its last Parish Plan. 73% of residents who responded to the Plan survey had concerns about the relationship between the community and the Yorkshire Dales National Park, mostly connected with stories about, or experience of, the YDNPA Planning Department.

The Chief Executive of the YDNPA was keen to ensure that the National Park improved its relations with those living within the area and the search was started to find a community to work with on a pilot scheme. Dent fitted the bill, as a very active community, which wanted to improve its relations with the Park authorities but also felt a little out on a limb, being within the Park boundary but in Cumbria.

Two years ago £10k of funding was set aside to start a pilot scheme. A steering group was set up comprising four representatives from Dent (not just members of the Parish Council) and YDNPA staff ranging from the CEO to the Local Area Ranger.

In the last 18 months an YDNPA officer has regularly attended Parish Council meetings to ensure that issues and perceptions on planning matters are discussed and resolved. YDPNA staff have also supported local shows, organised events, such as hedge laying competitions and generally become more involved in village life. Around 30-40 projects



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have been worked on, including leading local walks and helping to design leaflets for a high level walk around the area, establishing a local conservation group, including a tree planting scheme; helping local people to carry out surveys of and improvements to local Rights of Way. A follow up survey by the Parish has found that 70% of the 69 respondents felt that communications between residents and the National Park had improved. The pilot scheme is nearing its end but staff will continue to be available to support the local area and there are plans to roll out the scheme in other communities. DENT BUS SERVICE

K-SET

Spending £10,000 How would you spend £10,000 today, in a way that would save you money tomorrow? With interest rates so low, it could make sense to spend money in order to save money on fuel bills for the foreseeable future.

In a stone built house with no cavity walls, internal insulation is one possibility. In January this year K-SET received a grant from LEAF (Local Environment Action Fund) amounting to nearly £10,000 and we have used it to insulate four rooms in three different houses, one in Garsdale, one in Sedbergh and one in Killington.

This job is best done if you are thinking of redecorating as it involves the installation of stud frames set away from the outside walls and around windows and they are then covered by insulation board and plasterboard. Skirting boards, power points and other fixtures have to be re-located and the walls are then plastered. The cost is between £1,000 and £2,000 a room depending on size.

If you would like to see where this has been done, please get in touch with us and we will arrange a viewing on a house nearest to where you live. We can also advise you on local builders with experience of this work if you do not know of one yourself.

Those who have had it donesay they really do notice the difference.

Another way of spending £10,000 is on solar voltaic panels. Yes this is still worth while, especially if you have a south facing roof. According to a



government website (www.direct.gov. uk) installing a 2.5 kilowatt solar system could save you £1200 a year of which £920 would come, in cash from the Feed in Tariff.

Not everyone has £10,000 to spare and there are much cheaper ways of insulating your house - one of the most important is to look at ways of draught proofing. If you are on certain types of benefit and are living in a cold house with perhaps no central heating, grants are still available up to the end of this year from the Warm Front Scheme run by SLDC in association with the energy companies. Look up South Lakeland District Council on the web and search for Warm Front.

We are not experts at K-SET but if you have any enquiries about sustainable energy do contact us and we will point you in the right direction if we do not know the answer. And if you do have any work done, do let us know. We like to hear about people's experience for the benefit of others.

The council presented its annual report to the Annual Parish Meeting at the beginning of April. The council meeting that followed the Annual Parish Meeting decided to part-fund a prize for the walling competition that will be held at this year's Dentdale Show and once again discussed the damage to Stonehouse Bridge.

Stonehouse Bridge

The parish council is continuing to press Cumbria Highways for a date when repairs will start at Stonehouse Bridge, following further damage to the parapet when a second vehicle collided with it recently. As the bridge is a listed structure, the National Park are also keen for the repairs to be carried out properly, and a site meeting between officers from the National Park and Cumbria Highways took place in March. But as reported last month, it is likely to be some time before the repairs are made. Week-end Bus Services

On Easter Saturday the new timetable came into effect for the Saturday bus service between Dent Station, Dent, Sedbergh and Kendal. The service will start earlier, and there will be more journeys between Dent and Dent Station. The service, which is operated by Kirkby Lonsdale Coach Hire, has been set up by the Dent Parish Council with funding from the government's Sustainable Transport Fund.

The Saturday bus will run throughout the year, with additional late journeys in summer, and from May 20th a new summer Sunday service will be introduced to link Sedbergh and Dent with trains from Dent Station to Leeds, Carlisle and Lancashire. (*The Bus Timetable has been amended to incorporate the new runs and times. Ed*)

Roadside Verges

Some time ago, the parish council made an unsuccessful approach to Cumbria Highways to take over responsibility for some of Dentdale's roadside verges. This idea has now been revived by Highways, but unfortunately it is not clear whether the amount on money on offer from the County Council is enough to cover the costs. 
Walling Competition

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK IN SEDBERGH AND DISTRICT

Christian Aid Week in May tells the story of a community in Sierra Leone that has seen remarkable change. Tenneh Keimbay's life turned around when the Methodist Church of Sierra Leone (MCSL) started to work in her town of Gbap (pronounced Bap), distributing tools and teaching farmers simple food production techniques. She talks enthusiastically about the difference this has made: 'Now the children eat two meals all year round, whereas before it was one. They are growing well; they don't cry around me because of hunger. They are happy to go to school because something is in their

stomach.'

The benefits of regular food speak for themselves. But the effects of the food production group have been more wide-ranging than this. Tenneh speaks of the huge difference working in a group has made to her. Acting together, the farmers can share their skills and work more efficiently. As she tells us, the bottom line is that 'the group work provides more food'.

Tenneh speaks of the support and the encouragement that the farmers give to each other, and how much can be achieved when the community comes together. 'What inspires me in life is unity,' she says. 'To me, unity means coming together to decide on one thing and take that forward.'

Now that they are no longer limited by hunger, the people of Gbap have come together and successfully lobbied for a new school and an agricultural work centre for the community. The people of Gbap have taken their future into their own hands.

During Christian Aid Week, Sedbergh and District Christian Aid Committee together with 15,000 churches across Britain and Ireland will organise house-to-house collections and events to raise funds to enable organisations like MCSL to carry out their work transforming communities such as Gbap. Our big event is of course our 'Shop' in the URC rooms, Sedbergh open at the following times on Saturday 12th – Thursday 17th :-

Christian Aid currently works with 507 partners in 47 countries in Africa, Asia, the Middle East, Latin America and the Caribbean, helping people to make change happen. Our donations will be multiplied many times over as many small actions come together to make a huge change. But the giving that takes place during Christian Aid Week is not one-way.

Unity is something that we're not always good at, and the value of community that has inspired Tenneh is something that we can learn from and be changed by. Christian Aid Week is about raising funds. But it is also a call to unity – an invitation for churches and communities to come together and celebrate the possibility of hope and life in parts of the world where mere survival can be a struggle.

This is a challenge, because we're all so different and like to do things our own way and often feel restricted by others. But Tenneh's insistence that remarkable things can happen when we come together is not new. Christians see it in the actions and ministry of Jesus, who pushed against all that leads to violence and separation and called his disciples to model a new way of community.

If we can work together, with each other, with our communities, our churches and with our neighbours both at home and as far away as Gbap, then we may start to see huge change happen not only there but

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within our own community.

Tenneh says that 'when you are a group and work with focus and total commitment, you work at a faster rate; the stronger ones can help with work that weaker ones cannot do by themselves'. As we engage in Christian Aid Week, we can rejoice as we stand together in solidarity. Although we might ask who is the strong and who is the weak – and who is actually giving to whom.

Be a part of Christian Aid Week this year: if, together, we take small actions we can give people like Tenneh the tools to make big change happen.

£6.50 could buy a set of four hand

tools for a farmer living in the town of Gbap.

£50 could pay for advocacy training for two young people in a Kenyan slum, equipping them with the tools they need to pressure their government to provide essential services.

£123 could buy a reclaimed aluminium greenhouse for women working on market gardening projects in Tajikistan, providing a vital tool for growing vegetables in a harsh climate experiencing extremes of hot and cold.


does not do justice to how we are all feeling, great, fantastic news.

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HITCH-HIKERS ABOUT

Look out! Hitch-hikers about! Picked up a hitch-hiker recently? Many of you may have unknowingly provided a means of transport for some very sneaky, adaptable and UNWANTED species of plants and animals, and dropped them off in our precious waterways.

Invasive non-native species, or INNS, are becoming more prevalent throughout the UK and Cumbria and can have devastating impacts on our ecosystems, recreational and local amenities, infrastructure and the economy. They are now the 2nd greatest cause of biodiversity loss globally. Cumbria hosts a number of rare and protected wetland habitats. These unique areas are at risk from imported pond and ornamental garden plants and animals found in shipping ballast released into UK ports, all of which can thrive here and out-compete native species and degrade the habitat. When contained and managed responsibly, these plant species can be considered as pleasant additions to gardens. However because of their ability to grow and reproduce rapidly, when allowed to escape into the wild they cause huge and damaging impacts.

You may wonder how some of these species become so invasive, so here are a few facts:

 Himalayan Balsam – can produce up to 800 seeds per plant which are spread from their exploding seed pods. The seeds also survive dormant for up to 2 **years** in the soil before germination.

- Japanese knotweed can reproduce and spread from a piece of root/rhizome the size of your little fingernail (0.6g)!
- Floating pennywort -can grow up to **20cm a day**.
- Killer shrimp can survive out of water for 6 days.
- Crayfish plague is a fungus which can survive between 6-22 days without a host under wet or damp conditions.

South Cumbria Rivers Trust, Lune Rivers Trust and the Cumbria Freshwater Invasive Non-Native Species Initiative are striving to protect, control and eradicate inns from our catchments across south Cumbria and the rest of the county – a huge undertaking. We need the support and help from local residents, organisations, businesses and



visitors to stop the spread. *So how can you help?*

1 – Check Clean Dry

Check all clothing, footwear and equipment before leaving a river or lake and remove any plant fragments or invertebrates and leave on site. Clean if possible with tap water to remove anything you might have missed. Then, ensure everything is thoroughly dried before visiting a new watercourse.

2 – **I Spy**.....

Enjoy a walk out and about? Help us to survey the catchment whilst you're out enjoying the countryside and get into areas you may not have been before. We need to find source populations of INNS so we can start our control efforts from the headwaters down to the coast. Training and equipment provided if you can provide your own transport and a bit of time.

3 – Be Plant Wise

Although it may seem like the right thing to do, please don't re-home your aquatic pond plants in the wild. You might unknowingly have aquatic INNS in your pond. When you clean out your pond, please make sure that you compost everything that comes out and do not put it in the wild. When these plants are released into the wild they can smother our native plants, clog our waterways, exacerbate flooding and remove oxygen from the water which can harm fish, invertebrates and other energing

invertebrates and other species.

4 - Balsam Bash

Join us for an hour or few or however much time you can spare to help remove patches of Himalayan balsam from riverbanks with one of our work parties. Meet likeminded people from around the area, get a sense of satisfaction seeing these areas shrink and seeing new and varied native species start to inhabit in the following seasons.






their stock of saleable items and would welcome your help to replenish their stock before the Gala (21787 or 21902 to arrange collection)

Yvonne now lives in Millthrop and has a treatment room at home.



Because of the rolling system of elections we have here there are elections every year in at least one part of the constituency. This, of course, puts a lot of stress on my hard working office and our dedicated band of volunteers, and I am sure that it gets a bit tiresome for you at times, but it does mean that we have to get out and talk to as many people as answer the door when we knock at least once a year, which is not a bad discipline.

Actually I really enjoy getting out to meet people as much as possible, in fact Rosie, my wife, insists that we leave the constituency completely for family weekends together fairly regularly as every time we go out around this area I find it hard to stop myself being dragged into conversations about whatever issue it is that people want to raise with me. As you would expect people have been raising the issue of the hospital and the tragically poor management that they appear to have had over the past few years. Only the other day I found out that one of the regulators had found the maternity care at Furness Hospital to be satisfactory when eighteen months later another

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regulator found 66 serious failings. It cannot be that none of these were present during the first inspection so I have called upon the regulators to look at their practices to ensure that no more children die because of their failings.


Within the hospital management itself we are seeing the arrival of a new team of people to try and sort out what can only be described as a very sad and worrying mess. I will keep a very close eye on the progress they make and ensure that they update me regularly.

Affordable housing has been another issue that people have raised frequently. At the last count there were over 500 new affordable homes provided by the District Council which is more than the target they set themselves but still far short of what is needed. I am continually on the lookout for new ideas or places for houses to be built. A third issue has been the quality of broadband, particularly in more out of the way villages like those around Sedbergh and Dent area. I have been speaking to organisations ranging from Vodafone through to Network Rail to see what can be done about this. So far nothing concrete has been agreed but I am hearing encouraging noises and am hopeful that we will see some progress soon on at least one front.

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Dog owners are being asked to take extra care as they walk in the Yorkshire Dales National Park over the next four months.


Alan Hulme, the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's Head of Ranger Services said the breeding season for wildlife and for farm animals is now well underway and dogs can cause long-term damage if they are allowed to roam free.

"This is a very sensitive time for domestic and wild animals – especially ground-nesting birds, for which the Dales are renowned," he said.

"Although dog owners say their pet never chases or attacks sheep and lambs, some do. In addition, a lot of people don't appreciate that

dogs can cause just as much harm unintentionally by keeping parents away from their young, which leaves eggs, fledglings and lambs vulnerable.

"Dog owners are entitled to keep their pets off the lead on public paths



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although they must keep them under close control. But we would ask them to be on the safe side by keeping

their pets on a lead in an



effort to reduce the risk of wildlife and farm animals being unintentionally disturbed at this crucial time."

The Countryside Code contains some simple rules that pet owners must remember, the most important being that, in most areas of open country and common land – known as 'access land' – you must keep your dog on a short lead between 1 March and 31 July, and all year round near farm animals.

National Park Rangers and National Park Centre staff are only too happy to give advice to anyone who is concerned about going into area that may be used as a breeding ground by wild animals.

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APPLEBY HORSE FAIR

A Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) in South Lakeland will be in place from 4 May 2012 (at the latest), and you will see work starting in late April. The TRO will be enforceable once the signage is in place and any Highways issues should be directed to betterhighways.

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Runners in 1:42.30 and fourth was Nichola Sykes of DenbyDale Travellers in 1:43.10.

First local man went to Joe Stafford who completed the course in 1:59.36 and of course Pat Gardner finished the course in 2:18.07 making her the first local woman to ever finish the race.

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72 MAIN STREET



CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

Diamond Jubilee Wood Way back in 2002, the year of the Queen's Golden Jubilee, our local support group decided to fence off part of Settlebeck Gill to exclude grazing, coppice the woodland and hopefully to try to conserve a portion of the natural woodland which formerly covered much of this area. With the help of grants, a generous landowner and volunteer groups this was eventually accomplished. The wealth of wildlife, flowers, nesting birds and small mammals including red squirrels, that followed was very rewarding.

However nature doesn't stand still!



The Settlebeck in spate has rearranged some habitats and despite our best efforts rabbits and the occasional rogue sheep found some of our new hedge whips irresistible. Sycamore and blackthorn have galloped on apace. Meanwhile pupils from Sedbergh Primary School have enjoyed wildlife walks into the wood and have had much to contribute with their knowledge of habitats and local farming practices. It was a great pleasure therefore that, in this Diamond Jubilee year, a group of year 7 volunteers from Settlebeck High School found time to come and revisit the wood for a spot of hard labour. In little more than an hour they

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did an amazing amount of work. 24 hedge whips were planted, staked and guards fixed. Huge amounts of overgrown blackthorn already pruned by Sedbergh School volunteers, were dragged away and stacked. Coppiced wood was piled into stacks to shelter



small mammals and two English oaks were also planted to commemorate the Jubilee. All this planting has been registered on the Woodland Trust website for inclusion in the Royal Record. Inspired by the discovery of the Royal Record of King George VI's Coronation, which details thousands of celebration trees, the Woodland Trust is creating a new Record of trees planted in 2012 for the Diamond Jubilee. At the end of the project they

will present their collection of records to Her Majesty The Queen as well as preserving a copy in the British Library for generations to come.

Our splendid young woodsmen departed covered in glory and a thick layer of mud for which I apologise to whoever does the laundry in their households! I hope they will come back and see how well their hedge is doing.

For those who have not visited the wood before, it lies on a public right of way and there are descriptive leaflets available at the Tourist Office. Please remember to close the gates!

QUEEN'S JUBILEE

APRIL 23, 1897 District Council. A deputation from the Finkle Street Improvement Committee, consisting of Messrs R. Burra, C. E. Pugh, and the Rev. E. R. Gayer waited upon the council, and Mr. Burra said he considered they had been very successful in the matter of subscriptions. They had obtained £820 (of which the governors and masters of the Grammar School had given £350), and they had come to ask the district council to take it into their own hands, as they thought they could not get any more or very little more money. Mr Dover asked if they could get any more subscriptions, because if people saw the council take it over they would cease to give. Mr Burra said they might get £80 more. Mr. Pickering said that as they had not had any notice of the deputation until he had come to the meeting, it would be better if it was left over for consideration for a fortnight. Mr Burra suggested retiring while they considered the matter. This was done, the council resolving itself into committee.

BUS TIMETABLES

New Bus Services for Dentdale and Sedbergh

Local people will have some new public transport services this summer. After rescuing the threatened Saturday bus service with local funding in 2011, local enthusiasts and activists have now negotiated a regular bus service from Dent Station (on the Settle to Carlisle line) along Dentdale to Sedbergh on Saturdays and Sundays, funded through a Dales-wide initiative.

The Saturday service has an increased number of journeys. It will run from Saturday 7 April right through the year, making six return journeys during BST and four through the winter months. The new Sunday service will make seven round trips each day but will run only in the peak tourism months, from Sunday 20 May to Sunday 9 September. The first bus of the Saturday service will run from Sedbergh to Dent Station, leaving the Dalesman in Sedbergh at 8.25am and due to arrive at Dent Station at 8.55am, in time to connect with the

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first train to Leeds.

The new services are being financed by the government's Sustinable Trnsport Fund and will be operated by Kirkby Lonsdale Coach Hire. As well as travelling to and from Sedbergh, Dent and Kendal, local people will be able to use them to connect to train services to Skipton, Leeds, Carlisle and, on Sundays, Lancashire as well.

The return fare from Sedbergh to Dent will cost £3.75 adult and £2.50 for children while the return journey from Sedbergh to Dent Station will cost £4.50 and £3.00.

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BELLA ITALIA

Italy is a beautiful country and, as you read this, twenty-eight people, mainly from Sedbergh and district, will be imbibing the delights of what the poet Dante called "il bel paese". We shall be staying in a hotel in a beautiful village on the edge of the hills of Tuscany, in a spa town with trees and towers on all sides. The local food is delicious and the vineyards on the hillsides furnish the wines of this favoured region steeped in history. Nearby are wonderful cities like Florence, Bologna and Ravenna.

We fly into the unique city of Venice, with a marvellous view of that city built on islands in the lagoon at the edge of the Adriatic. During the week, we shall visit the historic city of Ferrara where that enigmatic lady Lucrezia Borgia once lived in the moated castle in the centre of the town. Our visit, during the first week of May, is the last one I shall organise from Sedbergh. It is our twelfth. But there will hopefully be *further* opportunities for us to continue visiting Italy with our neighbours from the Kirkby Stephen area and to share in their activities. Several people from the Upper Eden Valley have already been to Italy with Sedbergh Groups, and several continue to learn Italian at the Community Development Centre here. 




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AS WITHIN, SO WITHOUT

The interconnection between the individual and the world in which he lives is fundamental to the understanding of Chinese medicine. For example, I wrote last month about the effect of damp weather on the body (feelings of heaviness, bloating) and the mind (brain fog). The damp on the outside is reflected by "internal damp" on the inside.

Parallels are drawn between the flow of water in streams, rivers and ocean currents and the flow of blood, Qi (energy) and fluids in the body. Qi in the human body can be thought of as being all movement and transformation in the organism, including thoughts and emotions. For example, the digestion of food, absorption of nutrients, transport of nutrients to the tissues and utilisation of nutrients by the tissues are all examples of Qi at work. When everything goes smoothly we are not



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really aware of these processes. When things go wrong, we can use the analogy between flow of water in a river and flow of Qi round the body to start to understand what the problem is. For a river to flow harmoniously there has to be the right amount of water (too much results in flooding and damage to the riverbanks, too little and the flow dries up) and the riverbed must be free of obstructions. Man's activities, such as water extraction, deforestation or building dams can cause major changes in the river flow.

So it is with the flow of Qi in the body. Abuses such as overeating or sitting for long periods, can have a "silting up" effect and slow the flow of Qi. Getting over-tired uses up the available Qi so the flow is diminished and less Qi is available for essential functions such as fighting disease or maintaining a regular heart beat.

These ideas come from the Chinese classics, but I was inspired to write on this subject by a recent article in the Journal of Chinese medicine about climate change and human health. Climate change is a set of interrelated

processes whereby the cooling mechanisms of the earth are disrupted. For example greenhouse gases prevent heat escaping and reduction in polar ice means less of the heat from the sun is reflected. At the heart of the problem is the extraction of fossil fuels, the earth's long-term energy reserves, for shortterm perceived gains.

Compare this with modern lifestyles. People are always busy: working, travelling, buying things, picking up the children, playing computer games, television – never a dull moment. More to the point, never a still moment. Stillness and calm are our cooling mechanism and the counterweight to the activity of daily life. Constant activity draws on our long-term energy reserves, and can be accompanied by states of inner agitation: difficulty relaxing, anxiety and poor sleep. This is the internal equivalent of climate change. Furthermore the over-activity which prevents our inner calm is the same activity (it almost all involves consumption of fossil fuels), which produces climate change.

Of course, this is our collective destiny at this time. We live in a culture which demands constant expansion. I read a newspaper article this week said that the British economy has stalled. This is quite untrue, the economy is still running, but to use a motoring analogy, it is not accelerating. Why is this such a cause for concern? Ebb and flow, slowing down and speeding up, expansion and contraction should be



recognised as natural variation in any process.

The most recent newsletter from Greenpeace tells of the race of nations to claim ownership of the arctic and the plans of major oil companies to drill for oil in the region – destruction of pristine habitat in return for enough oil to fuel our dysfunctional lifestyles for another three years. Of course, we are all to blame in that we are part of the demand for fossil fuels. Because of our inner agitation, there is no time to do things slowly, to walk instead of drive. Last night at the allotment, I whizzed round with the petrol mower, while my more patient friend tinkered with the push mower.

LYON EQUIPMENT

Goodbye to Dentdale

Lyon Equipment has been a part of Dentdale since the 1970's, growing from one employee working from a shed on the Green (now Sophie's Woollens) to the over-80 employee company of today.

We moved from the Green into the former Dent Glass premises in 1981. At that time, with few staff, and deliveries fitting comfortably into small vans, Dent was a great place for us to work from. Our products are all to do with the outdoors, and it was a privilege to be able to work in such a glorious part of the Yorkshire Dales National Park. were getting rather more complicated. Business continued to grow, and with it the need to move more people and more goods to and from Dent every day. Despite every possible effort to avoid having 40 ton lorries blocking our narrow roads, that was exactly what was happening all too frequently. Emptying big trucks into vans and ferrying goods to and through Dent became a daily reality. . . .In addition we were simply running out of room. We just had to find an alternative location for our warehouse operations.

After much searching, we found a large enough building (we did look in Sedbergh, but without success) that would not involve any staff having to

However by the mid-90's things would not involve any staff having to



move home – some would find it easier to get to work, for some it would be a longer journey, but it would be manageable for everyone. And so, at the turn of the new Century, we moved all our goods inwards, warehousing, and goods outwards operations to premises in Tebay.

This gave us the opportunity to reuse the now redundant warehouse space and so improve the working conditions for all our staff remaining in Dent. However other pressures of running a still-growing business from a small historic Dales village did not go away. Next to move was our training school, which needed an expanded work-at-height training area.

And so now, with over twice the turnover and twice the staff since our first, partial, move to Tebay, and the business almost literally bursting at the seams, the time has finally come when Lyon Equipment has to say a reluctant goodbye to Dentdale. We have to move, and reunite all our business onto a single site. Our new office and manufacturing block in Tebay will be complete by the end of summer 2012, and then we will be closing our Dent premises down.

This really will mark the end of an era in Dentdale's life. No longer will our incoming staff have to look out for the residents of Dentdale driving out in the opposite direction to jobs in Kendal or elsewhere. . .we will have to say a reluctant goodbye and thank you to other Dent businesses that have provided services for us . . and,



with much regret, it is likely that we will be leaving an employment 'hole' to be filled.

We would love to find a single business purchaser for our Dent buildings, but it is unlikely that this will happen. The fact is that because of size and location, Dent is more suited to smaller businesses. We hope therefore that we may find someone with an interest in turning Rise Hill Mill into smaller units – or maybe someone will come up with a new idea for its use entirely! Some of our employees will continue to live in Dentdale and Sedbergh, and we will all cherish our memories of our time living and working in such magnificent surroundings.

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SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

Sedbergh Inns

When the original speaker had to cancel her talk due to family reasons the society was fortunate that Joyce Scobie agreed to give a talk on brewing and the inns in Sedbergh.

Evidence from excavations for brewing ale goes back to the Bronze Age and Julius Caesar gave written evidence in Roman times. By mediaeval times brewing ale was a normal household activity usually undertaken by women. It was safer to drink ale than the local water supplies and large quantities were drunk as a result. It has been

calculated that about half a gallon per person per day was drunk including children. This large production meant that about a third of crops grown were used for brewing. The crops used were oats or barley (bigg). Hops were introduced into this country in the early sixteenth century and this gave rise to the production of beer which was stronger than ale.

The selling of alcoholic drink has always been seen by government as a source of revenue from taxation. Laws governing the sale, price and quality of drink have existed in different forms since the Middle Ages. These laws have been enforced in various ways and by the end of the

eighteenth century a government department, the Excise Board, existed. This was a national organisation run from the Treasury. In 1805 Sedbergh had two Excise Officers who were Ride Officers rather than Footwalk Officers, presumably because of the large distances to be covered in the parish.

In 1653 Sedbergh had 14 ale houses although they would have been small by modern standards. The first written record giving the

The White Horse mentioned in 1718, on the site of the present hairdressers, had become the Blue Ball by 1752. The first record of The Golden Lion was in 1734 and this was converted into the Dalesman in 1987. Barclays Bank was the site of an inn known at various times as The Old Red Lyon, The Sun and The Plough. It later became a temperance hotel.

The Bull and Dog later became The White Hart and this is now a club. The Old George Inn, The George Inn and The Old King's Arms were situated where Marshall House is now. The King's Arms was on the site of the Sedbergh Cafe. The first record of The Black Bull Inn otherwise known as The Bull was in 1721.

The Duke of Cumberland was probably on the site of the toilets in Main Street and The Swettenham Arms was on the site of Cannon House. Finally the present Red Lion was previously known as The Horse Shooes Inn and the Golden Lion. Other inns existed, the names of which are known but not their sites. In addition to inns there were brew houses and a malt kiln. The latter was off Howgill Lane near the site of The Peoples Hall.

The chairman thanked Joyce Scobie for coming to the rescue of the society and for providing such an interesting talk.


Dear Editor.

I was interested to read (in the April Lookaround) your scholarly account of the geological stratification underlying the Howgill Fells, where slow erosion over the preceding millenia, when there was still an adequate water table, has created a huge subterranean cavern thought to date back to the neoplasticene era, and today still populated by a hitherto unrecorded colony of active garden gnomes (fortunately not yet fossilised). Adam Sedgwick would have been proud of your researches in this field.

I was particularly impressed by the industry and organisation displayed by these hard-working, if often

overlooked, residents of our great (and soon to be greater) National Park, and have to applaud their unremitting endeavours to maintain a traffic management plan for that noisy souther intruder, the M6, with the aim of reducing noise at peak rush-hour times to a near zero level by the continuous redeployment of traffic cones so as to always ensure maximum congestion, if not gridlock.

I do, however, in the present economic climate, understand their need to expand their range of designs beyond the purely conical, triangular or (for marine use) spherical, in order to diversify into alternative markets. So I was reassured to learn that they have now been able to locate



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alternative agricultural sources of red dye (fortunately, here at Acre, we use only green or yellow 'ruddle'). I am therefore prepared to offer (for a proportionate share of any royalties arising from Prince Charles' next visit) an innovative business plan for the further development of their portfolio of red plastic products.

Here in Upper Dentdale we, too, live over an extensive system of subterranean caves of the palaeozoic epoch, of which the largest one, at Ibbeth Peril, is noted for being of a size 'to accommodate twenty doubledecker buses'. However, on the (very) odd occasion that I have been down, I have been disappointed never yet to see one there, perhaps due to the restricted access afforded under Ibbeth Peril waterfall (not vet alleviated under the CROW act). I therefore propose there could be a marketing opportunity in producing injection moulded plastic models of the original red London doubledecker bus, (sorry, Ken), say at the scale of the old Dinky Toys.

These could then be introduced into the caves and sited prominently on suitable rock shelves, or stationed at hazardous crossings over crevasses, or even suspended from stalactites at points where there is very limited standing room only. The whole could then be illuminated by stroboscopic lighting, which would create a suitably dramatic contrast after the millenia of total darkness; while the sale of the red model buses could be facilitated by the provision of a waterproof honesty box at the lbbeth Peril entrance. This scheme would hugely

increase the touristic attraction of Upper Dentdale, with all the concommitant benefits to local trade: whilst our friends from under the Howgills would be able to enjoy a greatly extended source of income from the diversification of their products. At the same time, any resulting traffic congestion could be eased by deployment of the 'no parking' traffic cones they are currently producing, along the entire length of the Upper Dentdale road network, from Dent village itself to Arten Gill Viaduct and beyond, to considerable benefit for all residents currently domiciled in the area. NEW WIND FARM

Plans for a proposed new wind farm in South Cumbria was revealed at a public exhibition in April

Banks Renewables has just commenced a public engagement programme around the proposed Killington scheme, which would be situated on land between the A684 Sedbergh Road and Junction 37 of the M6.

Part of the proposed site is owned by Killington Educational Foundation and Killington United Charities, and both organisations would benefit directly from revenues generated by the new wind farm if it is approved.

A spokesperson for the Killington Educational Foundation and Killington United Charities says "As charities, we are giving the project our full backing because we believe there will be many benefits to the community."

Detailed proposals for the scheme are still in development, but it is expected to encompass up to five turbines with a maximum tip height of 445 feet.

The wind farm would have an installed capacity of up to 17MW, which is enough to meet the annual electricity consumption requirements of around 9,500 homes, and would take around 23,000 tonnes of carbon dioxide out of the atmosphere every year that would otherwise be released with the production of the same amount of energy by nonrenewable means.

Up to 50 people could be working onsite through the construction of the wind farm, and local businesses would also be able to tender for



contracts worth around £4 million relating to its different aspects of its development.

Banks is about to submit a scoping report on the scheme to South Lakeland Council for initial review, as well as a planning application for a test wind mast to go on the proposed site, which would be used to gather wind speed data that will assist with the scheme design process.

Phil Dyke, development director at Banks Renewables, adds: "Onshore wind farms such as Killington are viewed by the government as the cheapest form of renewable energy generation, and are central to achieving the vital goal of continuing to reduce the amount of carbon dioxide that we produce as a nation.

"Feedback from local communities always plays an important part in shaping all the proposals that we put forward, and the public engagement programme that we have now commenced will enable local people to give their opinions and ask any questions they might have.

"In addition to generating significant amounts of renewable energy, the Killington Wind Farm would also bring

a range of other benefits to the local area, from jobs and commercial opportunities for local businesses through to funding for a range community improvements.

"Sharing the benefits of the property and energy schemes that we operate around the country with the communities in which they are situated is part of Banks' long-term policy for ensuring that people living in these areas gain tangible, longterm advantages from our presence there – this is already happening locally as a result of our Armistead wind farm, and would very much be part of this proposed new development.

"We are confident that we will be

able to design a scheme that is both environmentally acceptable to local communities and capable of producing significant amounts of renewable energy, as we have done at Armistead, and we hope that as many people as possible will be able to attend our initial public exhibition."

A planning application is expected to be submitted in the autumn. 
MARCH WEATHER

March certainly lived up to its promise of "many weathers". We had snow, blow, frost, "heat wave", rain and near drought, in fact 3 days short of an official drought at the end of the month! With a minimum temperature of 28.7F and a maximum of 70.9F we had possibly one of the largest ranges in temperature for some time in a single month. As March often is, it was a breezy month with a maximum gust recorded at 19.5mph. Although we had a couple of dry spells we still recorded 3 ¹/₂ inches of rain. In the warmer days night time wind chill temperatures stayed above freezing but with a lowest on the night of the 4th at 18.0F.

The hedgehog has put in a couple of appearances, assuming it is the same one. Bird activity at the feeders has increased a little with linnets out numbering the goldfinch on the niger seed. Some unplanned lambs

arrived, the ewes burst into a pen in which I had caught up a tup to take to the sales! One I am having to bottle being a triplet, though sadly the ewe lay on its sister. Bird song has

increased, as has magpie activity around the garden. Some of the rarer visitors to the garden this



month were bullfinch and goldcrest. The early cherries were in blossom towards the end of the month. After the good display of snowdrops I think the daffodils have out done them this month. Forsythia and Magnolia stellata have been in bloom also.

MAY GARDENING

One of the greatest pleasures of gardening is the chance to observe wildlife at close hand. Some wild creatures – snails, slugs and greenfly, are not at all welcome on my patch, but birds, bees, hoverflies and beetles can provide hours of amusement. This year the garden is going to be more wildlife friendly that usual as a back injury has left me unable to do most things. A neighbour, who is an expert with a mower is giving the lawn a well cared for look, but everything else is just going to have to take its chance.

In the borders the first obvious winner under this new regime is a plant called Cardamine (formerly Dentaria) bulbifera. This lovely pale pink flowered springtime plant resembles, and is closely related to our local native "Ladies smock" or "Mayflower" but, whereas the latter is an short lived perennial, spreading by seed, my border variety spreads by rhizome underground, and by little bulbils which are produced on the stems amongst the leaves and flowers. It is currently threatening to engulf a patch of primulas and some Dicentra, both of which are shorter than it is, but is equally matched by another strong grower, the "Shuttlecock fern" Matteucia *struthiopteris* which is rampaging in from the left. The Martagon lilies and Giant Bellflower which also live in the border will rise above the occasion and everything else will just have to take its chance.



Extra undergrowth in the garden has obviously provided a home for some mammal life and my young cat, who is of a particularly friendly disposition likes to introduce interesting creatures to her indoor space, rather than letting them endure the cold out of doors. I have become adept at rescuing wood mice and voles in an Wellington boot, but was most surprised the other day to go into the kitchen and find a small rabbit sitting on the kitchen windowsill. The rabbit, being very young was guite calm about the whole situation and carried on nonchalantly eating the Geraninum plant in the pot beside it. When bundled up in a rug and placed down on the ground by the far hedge it gave me a look as if to say "What are we going to do next" before lolloping off to find a new place to stay. It did give me a timely reminder to cut back the rest of the Geraniums and take some cuttings, but I do have slight anxieties about the next wildlife visitor. What if she brings in a buzzard next time?

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QUEEN'S JUBILEE

JUNE 25, 1897 On Sunday the Oddfellows, Orangemen, Volunteers, and Boys' Brigade attended the service. On Monday the inhabitants were busy decorating their premises, and when finished the town presented a very bright and festive appearance. The festivities (owing to the large sum required by the Finkle Street improvements) were confined to a tea for the Sunday School children in Sedbergh, Cautley, Frostrow, Howgill, Vale of Lune, and Millthrop. A short service was held in the church, the choir being, augmented by the choirs from the School-chapel, Wesleyans, Congregationalists and the school and town string bands, at the close of which the National Anthem was sung. The large church was packed in every part. At noon the children assembled in the Market Place, and here they gave three hearty cheers for the Queen, and sang a verse of the anthem. Led by the Vicar a procession was formed, and after walking through the streets set out for Gate House, at which Mr R. Burra had kindly invited them to spend the

afternoon. Here a series of sports, games, &c., were indulged in, and a mug, the gift of Mr Burra, and a medal or prayer book, the gift of Mrs Dormer, were given each child as a souvenir of the Diamond Jubilee. The whole of the arrangements were carried out by a committee of two from each school, and were most satisfactory. In the evening a bonfire was lit on Winder, and a grand display of fireworks. Unfortunately there was a rather heavy mist, and the wet night of Monday prevented as many fires being seen from the top as was the case in 1887. The fire was organised by the Rev J. Mackie and Mr T. Greenbank. The illuminations in the town were of a very pretty nature, but the palm was undoubtedly taken by Mr Mackie, whose house was a perfect picture. the workhouse. On Tuesday the

inmates were entertained to dinner by Mr and Mrs Taylor, of Akay Lodge, in commemoration of the Jubilee. Mr and Mrs Taylor were both present and also Mr and Mrs J. Handley of Brigflatts. At the conclusion Mr Taylor proposed a vote of thanks to the matron, Mrs Kay, for her kindness in making ready the repast in addition to her ordinary duties. The inmates were then invited (such as were able to go) and look round the grounds at Akay and to each that smoked a packet of tobacco was given, and to nonsmokers a cake. Mrs Warden, of Brackensgill House, sent to each inmate a medal, and gave for use in the house bound volumes of the Graphic Jubilee Number, one for the women and one for the men.

The total amount raised from this year's Lent Lunches came to £900. 266 lunches were served. The Charity we have supported this year is Lancaster and District Homeless Action Service.

Thank you to everyone who supported the lunches, especially to those who made soup and rolls and to all the other helpers.

A pleasant time was spent by those attending and the new Boat proved a popular addition. The QG Movement is an international organisation with gardens open for prayer around the world, the garden does not have to be immaculate, thank goodness! WILSON RUN

The 2012 Wilson Run on 27th March was one of intrigue and excitement from start to finish. Several days of beautiful, coursedrying spring weather brought us into summer heat by Tuesday morning. The race began in temperatures probably not experienced on Wilson Run day since 1948, reaching 24°C by mid afternoon. As widely expected Charlie Mason (S) made an early break and led the way to Cautley. His remarkable 13th place in a field of hundreds at Dentdale 14. some weeks earlier, showed his fine form for endurance running. The roar of the hundreds of spectators on Green Hill carried across the still air to marshals on Baugh Fell, but by Rooker Gill, it was clear that this was an unusual Ten in more ways than just the weather. There were no less than a dozen boys in sight of one another as they dropped down to Wardses. Mason (27.09), Dennis (P) (27.30), Brock (SH) (28.18) was the order at Cautley. Eilidh Sproul (L) had established a good lead from Alice Kerr (R), crossing Cautley in 33.41. Mason hung on over Baugh Fell but reports he was not feeling right, Thomson (H), had pulled forward from 4th place and was only six seconds behind Mason by Hebblethwaite. Dennis and Brock came through within a minute. Roach (H) and Stewart (SH) were also in close contention at Muddy Slide. Running strongly Thomson took Mason on the stiff climb to Spectators

Hill and in the glaring sun and isolated splendour of that place he pulled away, ploughing on through the bogs of Dowbiggin, by Danny he had 78 seconds on him, but Dennis and Brock were just seconds behind Mason, who collapsed at Danny, finally succumbing to the heat. Thomson pulled away, homeward bound from Garsdale, nearly two minutes ahead now, and no doubt sniffing victory. In pursuit was James Brock who relished the heat, third last year, 10,000m winner and renowned for his power and pace on the flat. Thomson held on until Settlebeck Bridge but then Brock pulled through swiftly and gained the lead over the bridge. With just a thousand metres to go he managed to put an impressive 38 seconds between himself and Thomson to take the tape. Brock won in 1:20:27. Thomson second in 1:21:05. Meanwhile amongst the girls Sproul extended her lead to three minutes by Hebblethwaite, though Kerr held that gap to Cautley. Sproul and Kerr both came home strongly gaining the only two gold standards of the day with Sproul winning convincingly in 1:38:02. Kerr second in 1:43:24. Emily Wellock (L) came third (1:49:06). Further down the field the heat was taking its toll. After the gruelling grind down the A684, in good position, Shelton (H) collapsed 500m from the finish, he recovered rapidly thanks to a swift response from medics on hand.

The fact that the Race was such a

success in the most demanding of conditions was due in no small part to the support of over 60 marshals and the large numbers of spectators along the whole route. None of this could have happened without the cooperation of landowners and farmers to whom we are deeply grateful. We recognise that the unusually large numbers of spectators will have caused inconvenience and we are enormously grateful to all those who help us stage this historic event.

QUEEN'S JUBILEE APRIL 9. 1897

Diamond Jubilee Scheme. At a meeting of the Finkle Street Improvement Committee held on Monday evening, subscriptions were announced amounting to £800. As the total cost of the proposed scheme is £1020, a sub-committee was formed to make arrangements for purchasing part of the property, and to make ready for commencing operations. As the subscription list has only been open two months, the progress is very satisfactory.

MAY 7, 1897

District Council. Mr Robinson said the medical officer had been to examine the Oaks, but had not been able to make out his report as he had taken some of the water to analyses. A letter from the Rev J. A. Haydon, Vicar of Dent, was read, in which he said he had seen the report of the application by the **Finkle Street Improvement** Committee for help from the council, and that if they took this matter over he thought it only just and right that they should help in the proposed Dent Jubilee commemoration, viz. of providing either telegraphic or telephonic communication with Sedbergh. This was left on the table. With respect to the Finkle Street deputation, the following resolution was passed: "In the event of the Finkle Street Improvement Committee entering into contracts for the purchasing of all or any of the freehold houses and buildings on the West side, and clearing away, the council will accept the site thereof as an addition to the highway, and dedicate the highway to the public for ever, and also fence the said highway, where a fence does not exist." Mr Pickering proposed, and Mr C. E Taylor seconded, that this be passed. On a vote being taken, the following were for it: Messrs Boustead, Taylor, Handley, Dover, Bland and Rev R. Pickering, the rest being neutral - carried nem. con.
