1. 'The Brontes : A life in Letters' by Juliet Barker (biography/letters)

This is an edited collection of letters from Patrick, Branwell, Anne, Emily and predominantly Charlotte from 1829 -1855. It brings a sense of the domestics and dynamics of this literary family and the geographical context of their daily life. The focus on Charlotte picks up on her struggle to get published, then retaining anonymity, her unsettled state and isolation after the death of her last 3 siblings. Anyone who is Bronte fan or curious about the family will gain from reading this collection of letters.

2. 'A Little History of British Gardening' by Jenny Uglow (history)

Did the Romans have rakes?! Jenny Uglow's delightful account is straightforward, not overly technical and interesting bringing to life the history of gardens from Roman, monastic, Tudor, Stuart to modern times and trends. Key influential figures in the history of gardening are also covered chronologically. Uglow writes in an engaging style and covers sections on fruit, flowers, leaves and seeds.

3. 'The Sense of an Ending' by Julian Barnes (fiction)

This is a clever, witty, sparse and succinct novel tackling some profound issues. What is history and memory? A friend at school commits suicide as does another school friend shortly after getting a first at Cambridge in the 1960s. The central character Tony receives a letter from a solicitor and tries to come to terms with his past, understand his relationships and events 40 years prior. An arresting and extraordinary read.

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SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL

The last meeting of the Parish Council was on 27th September. Representatives of Two Castles Housing and Carl Lis the Chairman of Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority had been invited to speak at the meeting.

Lisa Hogarth from Two Castles briefed the meeting on the amended planning application for 10 affordable houses at the former CCC Depot in Guldrey Lane. The application which went to the National Park committee on 9th October and was supported by the Parish Council, but with a number of conditions particularly around local eligibility. Carl Lis talked about

various issues relating to the National Park and there was a good exchange of views on a number of subjects. It is a pity that more members of the public were not present to hear him.

Other Planning Matters

NYCC has been contacted for information about what is happening at the Baliol School site.

The meeting noted that the planning application relating to developments at 85 Main Street had been withdrawn. Detailed comments opposing the proposed development at 83 Main Street were also reported to the meeting.

The Planning Committee had already submitted comments

supporting applications S/03/533 and purchase new Christmas lights for the S/03/534.

Grant Applications

The meeting received an application for a grant from Farfield Mill towards the costs of an arts and heritage project 'Wool is my Bread' . Whilst supportive Councillors felt that they would like to know more about it before coming to a decision. The Chairman agreed to contact Farfield Mill and will report back to the next meeting.

Amenities Committee

The rainwater collection project for the Main Street toilets is now ready to go ahead and it is hoped that it will be completed in November. It was agreed that the Parish Council would Highways Signs Decluttering Project

Town.

Sedbergh Townscape Project

YDNPA have confirmed that funding is still available for the proposed Main Street entry sign. Progress has been made in producing a Sedbergh Logo to be incorporated in the sign.

A successful bid has been made to the Local Area Partnership to fund an expert assessment of the condition of the Jubilee Fountain in Finkle Street and the measures that should be taken to arrest further deterioration of the structure. It is hoped that the figure will also cover the initial work required by the report.

SEPTEMBER WEATHER

The news has been full of weather related incidents from floods to poor harvests etc. Meanwhile we carry on getting wet! A total of 7.34 inches ensured we were well boggy. Trying to get sheep clean for the sales was an impossibility. The month started reasonably warm with the maximum of 73.0F being recorded in the first part of the month. Things cooled off somewhat after this with only one more day reaching 60.3F. Night time temperatures also reflected this cooler spell with temperatures in the 40sF and 5 nights down in the 30sF with a sub zero low of 30.6F. It was quite a breezy month with only one day not reaching double figures with



23.3mph was recorded during a low pressure system falling to an atmospheric pressure of 28.50 inches of mercury.

The final swallow left us on the night of the equinox. I've been able to shut the kennels for the dog on these cooler nights. Other signs of autumn migrations have been small flocks of young swallows passing through, 4 fieldfares arriving early and the first skein geese honking through. The rain and wind has started to remove the leaves from the trees. What little fruit has matured is ripening. One of our hibiscuses produced numerous buds but they simply rotted before they open due to the excessive wet. Many roses have done the same this year. Standing talking at the gate, as you do, we were fascinated to watch a couple of weasels hunting along the stone wall of our paddock. It is some time since I saw weasels so close. Judging by all the digging we are still getting regular badger visits. Rabbits around us are still fairly active and haven't shown any signs of myxomatosis thus far this year.

DENT PARISH COUNCIL

The October council meeting dealt with a number of highways issues, making recommendations for maintenance priorities and deciding against taking over roadside verge cutting from the county council. It also heard about the increase in passengers on the Saturday bus, and discussed the poor mobile phone signal. Full minutes will shortly be published on the parish council pages of www.dentdale.com as well as being available as a hard copy from the Parish Clerk.

Car Park Trees

The Yorkshire Dales National Park has recently conducted a free survey for the parish council of the trees in Dent car park. This identified three trees that needed attention, which the council will be attending to, but it also resulted in an offer from the National Park to use the rest of the trees for a training exercise in maintenance

work. That way, YDNPA staff get training while Dent gets its car park trees maintained at no cost.

Mobile Phone Signal

The unreliable mobile phone signal in Dentdale was discussed at the October meeting. Because the First Responders rely on it for call-outs, it is more than inconvenient when it is not working – it can endanger life. The Clerk will be contacting the mobile phone company to register the concerns and to find out what can be done to improve the situation.

offer to grit or snow plough lengths of currently untreated roads in the winter. Given the problems there have been in Dentdale in recent years with both the Deepdale road and the road between Dent and Ewegales, the council felt this could be of interest to local residents. though it appears that Highways will require it to be done to their specification. If anyone would be prepared to take this on please contact the Parish Clerk (details below).

Highways Drainage

Each year, the parish council is asked to pass on to Cumbria Highways a list of its priorities for

highway maintenance, and this year's list was agreed at the October meeting. In addition to this, members expressed more general concern about standing and running water on numerous road sections in the whole of the Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale area. Examples were given of standing water on the road into Sedbergh at Millthrop and on Busk Lane in Sedbergh, and running water destroying the tarmac surface up the hill to the south of Oliver Bridge, Gawthrop. The council agreed to pass these examples to the Local Area Partnership so they can be included in the area's response.

Verge cutting

For some time, Dent PC has been exploring whether it could undertake the cutting of roadside verges more effectively than Cumbria County Council within the present budget. After lengthy investigations, the council has reached the conclusion that, for the amount of money available from the county council to do the job, it would not be able to improve on the present service, and so has decided not to pursue the matter any further.

Bus Passenger Numbers

In spite of the bad weather, the number of passengers on the Saturday bus this summer has increased considerably compared with last year. In the four months from April to August, the total number of passengers carried went up from 611 to 859 and the average daily number from 36 to 51, so the improved marketing and publicity clearly has

In the meantime, the Saturday bus will continue to run throughout the winter and beyond, connecting Sedbergh and Dent with trains at Dent station, as well as making one return trip through to Kendal. Like all rural services, it thrives with community support, as the Dent Wednesday bus demonstrates, and the more it is used the more secure it becomes.

COUNCILLOR CORNER KILLINGTON WIND FARM

PROPOSAL: As expected Banks have now put in an application for three turbines between Killington Reservoir, the M6 and the A684. I expect the application to fail when it comes before members of South Lakeland Planning Committee, primarily for landscape reasons. The real problem will come when the application goes to appeal. On the face of it the parallels are more with Whinash to the north than Armistead to the south and hopefully the inspector will reject the appeal. The fact that the site is on the edge of the proposed extension of Yorkshire Dales must carry great weight. (This

is not because of the extension but because of the high landscape quality which proposed designation emphasises.) However, it was an earlier version of the Cumbria Wind Strategy which led to Lambrigg being passed and the present version which meant that Armistead was bound to be granted on appeal. It really was a monumental catastrophe earlier this year when the controlling group on South Lakeland, led by Peter Thornton, ironically the local member for Killington, forced the adoption of the Wind Strategy as part of the South Lakeland LDF. Really if that had not happened this application would never have proceeded this far. Please bear in mind, it is a matter of

planning fact that arguments concerning the usefulness or validity of wind as a source of energy will not just be discounted but will damage the whole case against. This is important, in the past developers have used objections concerning the poor value of wind energy as a means of hiding from discussion about legitimate environmental concerns.

in Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale much less has happened over the Summer. Partly that was because of the awful weather but also, it was caused by the latest restructuring with the Amey work force coming back in house.

I have spent two days this week in Kendal going through the issues project by project. In recent years I have secured unprecedented funding for the A684 and A683 so as I said earlier we now need to concentrate on the B, C and U roads. So, there are many major schemes proposed for this area. Howgill Lane is to be heavily patched and then surface dressed - this won't be as good as than nothing. Hebblethwaite Lane, Hawkin Hall Lane in Middleton and the road from the A683 through Mansergh are all high up the list for major repairs. Outside my division there are going to be works on the road from the A684 up to the A685 in Firbank. As a follow up to the works in Dentdale last year there is a major programme of surface dressing, to protect that which has already been done. I have spent a lot of time on Highways and have already achieved a lot. Now, I think I can legitimately state that if it had not been for my endless pressing as your county councillor, virtually none of these vital repairs would be going to happen.

This month I have been involved with the refurbishment of the Sedbergh Tourist Information Centre. It reopened on October 15th and is now run by the Sedbergh Community Interest Company. This is a not-forprofit company with three directors at the moment – Hilary Hodge, chair of the Parish Council, Douglas Thomson, Parish Councillor and Chair of the Sedbergh and District Community and Heritage Trust and Mark Westwood. The Centre is one of the new Dales Integrated Transport Alliance Hubs so there is a particular emphasis on giving transport information and collecting data about

transport needs in the area.

Nowadays there are very few grants for TICs so the Centre will be staffed mainly by volunteers with a part-time paid manager who will be appointed shortly. Already a couple of the volunteers have told me how much they enjoy welcoming visitors to the area and sharing their knowledge with them.

Some functions will not change. The Charity Christmas cards are now in stock and there is a good range of inexpensive gifts including special "Keep Calm You're in Sedbergh" mugs, coasters, fridge magnets and mouse mats.

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age has come up again with the news that 16 and 17 year olds will be given a vote in the referendum about independence for Scotland in 2014. It raises all sorts of interesting questions: clearly everyone can make a case for wanting to see more young people getting involved in shaping society to take account of their hopes, desires and needs but is 16 too young? If you pay no taxes should you be in a position to vote for how other people's taxes should be spent?

As a father of a daughter who will be 16 in January I am delighted whenever I see her reading a newspaper or asking questions which

tie up what she is learning in philosophy & ethics or history with what she is reading about in the news, but does this mean she is ready to vote? How many people of her age have had the experience of life to understand the moral dilemmas of politics and the difficult decisions that need to be made that are very rarely black and white?

At the same time I am always astonished when pupils at Queen Elizabeth School in Kirkby Lonsdale turn up to Town Council meetings and sit through two hours of discussions of what seems to be a whole universe away from the normal concerns of 16 and 17 year olds. After all what does

granting retrospective planning permission for internal double glazing on a Grade 2 building have to do with the exuberance of youth?

It seems that there is no middle ground - people under the age of 18 have no vote and no real say about how they can influence society except via consumer preferences and yet if they want to get involved they would tend to start at the least exciting end of local politics ie the very small local concerns at parish or district level, not big moral issues where a blast of vouthful idealism and optimism might blow a refreshing wind through worlds of compromise and make-do.

Unfortunately wanting something and getting it does take time and

perseverance and quite often involves lots of research and paperwork, emails and phone calls to the right people, persuading others of the need for new facilities and being prepared to roll up your sleeves and show a real commitment to the cause. This is the other side of having a vote and maybe creating a democratic process within schools where matters discussed are clearly of interest to the pupils is the first step towards understanding how opinions are formed and changed. I am sure the debate will rumble on. And how would it change if voting were compulsory, as it is in Australia? Cllr Ian

Who guards the guardians? This is an extremely pertinent question to ask in respect not only of local authorities and their functions (such as SLDC and the YDNPA) but also in respect of national government and institutions generally. How do we ensure that these organisations are properly fulfilling their role and that they are answerable to the people who elected them in the first place? The most obvious answer is that their members are ultimately accountable to the electorate through the ballot box (not so the National Park unfortunately!) but in the case of District Councils for example this could mean waiting for up to four

vears until the next election. Public opinion is another way of keeping elected representatives in check as are the various kinds of internal and external audits particularly with regard to the proper preparation and presentation of accounts. However there is a further method which I particularly wish to address in this article and this is known as "scrutiny". With regard to District Councils, a group of back-bench councillors and co-opted residents from across the political spectrum form what is known as an Overview and Scrutiny Committee with the specific remit of holding executive Members (the Cabinet) to account for their actions

and acting as a "critical friend" so as to ensure that decisions made by the Council, or indeed by the Cabinet itself, are properly carried out and followed through on. Portfolio Holders and Officers can be called before the Committee and interrogated / challenged on their jobs and their roles and often asked very searching questions about how particular issues are being approached and dealt with. At a national level this process is carried out by parliamentary Select Committees and a couple of years ago I was fortunate to have the opportunity of being able to observe at close quarters how this process was undertaken by House of Lords' Select Committees.

I have a strong interest in the scrutiny process and have been a member of the SLDC Resources O & S Committee since being elected four and a half years ago. The subject is particularly topical right now because the whole of the scrutiny process is currently under review at SLDC and a Task group has been set up (of which Evelyn and I are members) to look at whether this whole process can be made even more efficient and effective. We have already undertaken a consultation and held a workshop for Members at which their views were canvassed and we shall now hold a series of further meetings to decide where we go from here. Any Lookaround reader who would like to make an input into this should feel free to contact me to discuss it further. Personally I feel that the scrutiny process is absolutely

essential to the proper functioning and transparency of local democracy and I would not want to see anything happening which would water down the process in any way. In the past under the old Committee system scrutiny was not so formally carried out, as in those days there was no Cabinet (therefore no backbenchers) and all Members were involved in the day to day running of the Authority which regretfully in many ways is no longer the case today. Quite a number of Local Authorities throughout the country are now returning to this former system and I think that there are very good arguments in favour of so doing.

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

The opening talk in this winter's programme was given by Dr Sam Riches. She is the co-ordinator of the Centre for North West Regional Studies which is based at Lancaster University. The topic of her talk was "St. George and that dragon". She has featured on a TV programme about him and Saints Andrew, David and Patrick.

Whereas many saints can be identified historically George's life is not known although some contradictory stories exist placing him in the fourth century. Rather than attempt to give an historical account Dr Riches illustrated the myths surrounding his cult. He is a popular saint in many countries and is the patron saint of several including England. Also similar figures can be identified in other religions. In this country he is, these days, viewed as a warrior on a horse slaying a dragon to save the life of a princess. However, that is an image that appears to have arisen in the thirteenth century. Much earlier representations show him on horseback slaying a man, allegedly a heathen emperor. In the fifteenth century the dragon was illustrated as snake like with wings, shown as female and with the lance depicted as killing it in the mouth or throat. George became the Patron Saint of England largely due to his popularity with medieval royalty beginning with Edward III.

In other countries and at different

times he was associated with martyrdom. Whereas a saint was usually connected with a particular type of death, e.g. Catherine and a wheel, George was shown being killed in a variety of ways. He was also claimed to have been resurrected, often due to the influence of the Virgin Mary. Indeed in one story he was tortured for seven years and resurrected three times before his final death. In addition to a connection with martyrdom he was often linked with water and particularly new wells. Also he was strongly associated with healing and skin disease.

The talk was an unusual one for the society but was most interesting and the speaker was excellent. The chairman thanked Dr Riches for her talk. She said that anyone interested in learning more about St George should go to the web-site www. stgeorgesdayproject.org.uk. *R Cann*

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PROPOSED KILLINGTON WINDFARM

time now to give your view

The consultation period for the proposed wind farm at Killington Lake is now underway at SLDC. It is not just the views of the major bodies such as the YDNPA that are needed. It is important to know what those living and working in the area and also our many visitors think.

A comment from anyone need not be long, in fact a single sentence will do, and all adults in a household can do so separately. If you wish, you could describe your personal links to the area, such as living here or being a visitor who loves the fells. There are three ways to send a comment to

SLDC: by email, by post, and on-line on the SLDC planning website. Details of how to do this are listed below.

Eventually the application will be decided on by the Planning Committee at SLDC, who will approve or refuse it. If approved, that will be the end of the matter, there is no appeal for local people. That is why it is so important to send an objection *now* to SLDC if you disagree. It will be your only chance.

The following comment from an author and mountain walker not only sums up what many feel, but also shows how the wind farm could affect business here:

'I use that stretch of the M6



extensively and one of the highlights is that wonderful view of the Howgills when travelling north and I've often enjoyed 'spotting' Killington Lake from high on those lovely fells. This is a landscape that tens of thousands of people treasure, it's a landscape that spells freedom, rest, peace, contentment and renewal, a landscape that's full of the promise of all those things that have been lost and abandoned in the urban regeneration of our cities and towns.'

If you wish to protect our landscape from creeping industrialisation, please add your voice and send your objections **now** to SLDC. And please encourage friends, family, colleagues and visitors to do so too.

The Planning Officer will accept comments after the currently specified end-date because of the time that it takes to gather all the information for a complex planning application such as this. However you should submit your views as soon as possible.

Many of Lookaround's readers may not be aware of the area of visibility of the three 440 feet (132 metre) turbines that are proposed to be erected at Junction 37. Parts or all of them will be visible from most of the Sedbergh area. Here are some technical facts to consider.

The developers have now produced

a Zone of Theoretical Visibility map (ZTV), which shows the areas from which the turbines can be seen. The word "theoretical" is used because the turbines will not be visible from every inch of our area. For instance, if you are standing next to a house or a row of trees, your view of the turbines may be blocked.

Conversely the visibility could also be more intrusive, since the map is not created at eye level, but from ground level contours. This actually makes quite a difference, as at the eye level of an adult they would see more of the turbines than the maps indicate.

If you wish to look at the ZTV map, it is displayed in the window of the

former Henry Wilson Bookshop on Main Street, Sedbergh. In the window you can also see further information about the wind farm and how it could affect this area.

The ZTV map can be also viewed by going to the SLDC website (at the time of writing it was on Page 6 of 8 pages with 25 records/page) see instruction box below. The SLDC website is not the easiest to navigate and new documents are added to the front of the list rather than at the back, and no search facility is provided so this means that finding a particular document is difficult.

If all else fails the full planning proposal can be seen in the Community Office.

KILLINGTON WINDFARM

I am pleased to see that my article in September's Lookaround has prompted a variety of responses. It is particularly nice to hear that Cllr Kevin Lancaster thinks I'm doing a good job and I thought Andrew Fraser-Urquhart's article was very informative and framed the debate in the correct context. The debate in the context of the planning application is not about the effectiveness of wind turbines, it is whether the Killington site is an appropriate location for a wind farm and whether the impacts

are, or can be made, acceptable. I have spoken to many people who agree that Killington is a good location and that there are a wealth of social, economic and environmental benefits of the scheme. What's your view?

I also wanted to update you on the progress of the project since my last article. On 20 September we held public exhibitions at Killington Parish Hall and New Hutton Institute which also attracted demonstrations by both pro and anti wind farm campaigners. The biggest changes being announced were the reduction of the size of the wind farm from five turbines down to three. We also announced proposals for delivering a

vastly improved and potentially free broadband service to the local area (in excess of 2mbps) along with a second proposal to cut people's energy bills by draught proofing homes in the area.

We submitted the planning application to South Lakeland District Council on Friday 28 September and this has been assigned the application number SL/2012/0845. You can view the application for yourself on the South Lakeland website or at the SLDC offices in Kendal. For a more user-friendly summary, you can download copies of the exhibition posters from our website (www.banksgroup.co.uk) in case you weren't able to attend in

KOREA TRIP

More On Paju Book City Korea. In September, I represented Sedbergh and as it turned out the rest of the UK, at an International book festival held in Paju, Korea. This place is not just a book town it is a book city, purpose built for the job. In 1989 a group of publishers held a convention to discuss the promotion of cultural development through books. In 1991 the Industrial Cooperative for the Construction of the Publishing Cultural and Industrial Complex was established. After consultations with environmental. government, media, research, educational and national university organisations the idea passed through a series of committees and in Oct 1995 the site was chosen.

In 1998 an auspicious ground breaking ceremony was held in the presence of the Prime Minster Kim Jong-pil, to mark the beginning of the



world's first city dedicated to books. Construction began in 1999 the details go on and on but suffice to say the Book City was completed in 2003 although its development is continuous. And you thought things were slow in this country.

The connection with Korea began some years ago when a professor and some students stayed here at 'Number Ten' while on a world wide trip visiting Booktowns. Sedbergh had just begun to establish itself on the international stage joining the International Organisation of Booktowns, so it was excellent to know that people had come to visit from so far away.

The Paju Bookcity president and those involved in the running of the book festival take great pleasure in showing visitors around and are truly dedicated to the promotion of the written word and its importance to the world today. Banners all over the city proclaimed, 'One Asia Through Books'

The hotel Jijihyang where myself and the other delegates stayed was purpose built to form part of the conference centre, exhibition



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complex, café and seminar rooms, all of which were interconnecting, marvellous planning.

There was a presentation from Tess Brady from Clunes, Australian first Booktown which is just a small place like Sedbergh. In fact a group from Clunes visited Sedbergh and this encouraged them to go forward with their Booktown. Clunes is going from strength to strength with thousands of visitors annually. This has done wonders for the economy of the town and saved it from becoming a town full of holiday cottages for the city dwellers of Melbourne, which is about 3 hours away. It was marvellous to hear Tess praising the efforts of local people who have really got behind

the Booktown idea helping with festivals, street sales and grant applications as well as offering accommodation for visitors. Everyone has T-shirts proclaiming their involvement with the Booktown and they all muck in as is the Australian way. It was a great success story and they expressed their thanks to Sedbergh for setting them on the road.

The delegate form Japan gave a talk about their long established book town near Tokyo which was set up 1902. Slides were shown of the shops in the 1900's up to the present day, quite astonishing to think that they had been going that long. We certainly have a good deal to learn



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form them.

The Norwegian representative, Eivind Odegard who came with from the smallest book town, a hamlet of only 250 people explained that despite this they have over 80,000. books on sale and get 1000's of visitors over the summer season far more than they had before becoming a book town.

President of the IOB is Jan Klovstad who is from the Norwegian book town of Ragnhild Haug kept everything running smoothly for all the European delegates as well as liasing with the Korean organisers.

To continue our theme our Member's Evening speakers presented "Looking Forward to Christmas". Pamela Sutcliffe commenced proceedings by teasing us about the charges made by other providers of Christmas Craft courses from Dabble Days to Denman, yet there we were with Dent WI's inhouse skills to share, free of charge. Pamela's topic was home made Christmas cards. She brought a wonderful array of her own designs. So effective yet fairly easy to construct by layering fabric, card, motifs, beads, sequins and more. You just need an eye for design plus neat cutting and sticking skills. Together we produced quite a selection and







each took our card home.

Pamela was followed by Rita Corpe who is preparing and freezing chocolate truffles. We each received a recipe and a comprehensive introduction to the different types of chocolate, their cocoa content and how this affects their use in cooking. More cocoa makes a smoother chocolate but not as sweet. Rita made the truffle production seem so simple, no curdling here! How to roll and when to coat, before or after freezing, formed part of the presentation. Two types of truffle were made, dark chocolate covered in cocoa, milk chocolate ones covered in grated white chocolate. Best of all we were presented with

one of each to taste and compare. These were NOT taken home! We completed this session with ideas on possible variations, like adding your favourite liqueur, and how to present our produce in a Christmas gift box.

Our third speaker was Sue Owen presenting her home made Christmas decorations. Sue brought a wide selection of items she had made by sticking and stitching felt and other fabrics and adding embroidery plus other embellishments. She had plain felts with checked and striped fabrics, buttons, beads, ribbons and more. There were assorted tree decorations, wall hangings, banners, wreaths etc. She gave us many construction hints: Don't sew if you



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can stick, it's faster. Use Bondaweb to stiffen finer fabrics. She demonstrated endless ways of constructing a range of items which all looked professionally made. There was insufficient time to make an item ourselves but we had an inspirational time looking at all of Sue's creations.

Last but not least came Dorte-Lis Stephenson with her Christmas Tree Decoration. What a challenge this proved to be, a woven paper basket to hang on the tree. Sounds simple? Not at all! This was a traditional Danish tree decoration, which has to be cut and woven accurately, as it has to hold a gift of sweets. A basket started as two pieces of folded paper with some straight cuts in each, plus a handle piece. Dorte-Lis showed us how to commence and off we went. For some it took a while to get the method but our baskets were eventually made. Sticking on the handle was the easy bit! Dorte-Lis showed us a range of intricate weaving patterns, which Danish school children accomplish! These were mathematically designed compilations, which were very impressive. We took our baskets home and look forward to hanging them on our trees.

There are of course always little annoying things that go wrong, electrics, tap washers, light bulbs, sometimes supplies run out or something cannot be found. The little Red Book, the "Housekeeping Book" in the plastic wallet with the Booking form is there for notes about such matters. PLEASE complete the form after your event with length of time and rooms used to aid in the sending out of bills.

The rooms are in use most evenings but if you have any suggestions for other activities do let us know.

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However there is a way and it starts with knowing where energy is used in the home and knowing where energy is lost and taking action, often simple actions, to reduce your energy needs.

Once our energy usage is streamlined and our costs have been minimised the next stage is about

how we can generate our own energy and become less reliant on energy suppliers and their costs over which we have no control. The market place is changing rapidly with new technologies, new products and new government incentives so it pays to think carefully and do your research before making any decisions. And these decisions will only make sense if you are able to benefit directly.

What we do know is that energy is a valuable resource and the cost keeps rising and this is likely to continue in the foreseeable future. What we also know is that if we as individuals can become more self-sufficient then we are insured against these price increases and whatever may or may

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not happen in the future. But it's not simple to know where best to make an investment because that decision is based on a number of variables, house size, construction, location, heating system, family size, life style as well as other demands on your finances. What this means is that saving energy and saving money needs to be personalised so it meets your needs for a more comfort and more security.

There is a lot of coverage in the press about global warming and carbon emissions and that our behaviour has an impact on the environment. This sounds guite scary and creates fears about the future and what impact all this will have on us in our life time and our children lifetime and our children's children lifetime. As if thinking about what's happening today or next week isn't enough for most people. How can we really engage with what's happening at a global level and what might happen three decades ahead. My view is to leave that headache to the scientists (who need to justify their special interest) and the politicians (who bend with the wind) and just keep an open mind and rational scepticism for what we hear and see in the media. What seems more engaging is how we can save money by reducing our energy needs and be more independent by generating our own energy.

Ok enough of that big picture stuff let's get real and share some information that can really make a difference. Did you know that the average family uses between 10 to 12 Kilowatts (Kw) of electrical energy a day. This amounts to over 4000 Kw a year (12kw x 365 days) which at today's prices (14p/Kw) comes to just over £600 per year. Hot water and space heating usually amounts to another £800 - 900 per year. Let's focus on the electricity and see where that goes. For a typical family energy usage might be: fridge 2%, washing machine 7%, kettle 12%, freezer 13%, dishwasher 14%, lights 22%,

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shower 28%. What we notice is that lighting and electric showers are big consumptions of electricity so this is where we can make the most savings. For example using LED lights in heavy usage areas or turning off lights when not needed, can make a big difference. Or showering for 5 minutes instead of 20 minutes can make a big difference. Some people may use tumble dryers but at 3 Kw this is another big user of electricity. In an emergency this may be fine but used on a regular basis and costs could soar.

So the big tip from this month's article is to find out how much energy you use and how much is being wasted. Get a simple plug in meter

and monitor each electrical appliance for 24 hours to find out how much energy is being used per day. Based on this knowledge you can start to make decision on how to save energy and save money. A 20% saving, just 2kw per day will save you £100 per year.

Next month we will look at hot water and space heating another big cost for the home owner. In future articles we will look at the renewable technologies and what the government is doing to encourage us to become more energy efficient.

Dr Hunt confirmed that the band she is in is happy to play one evening and raise funds. Janice and Kate will devise a leaflet explaining what the friends of Sedbergh Medical Practice are about.

Transport – Just to reiterate that transport via rural wheels for patients is only 35 pence per mile and there is no charge for waiting. Since moving to the new premises requests from patients for a home visit have not increased.

AOB – Clock needed in the waiting room.

Dr Lumb advised the group that online access for patients to access their medical records is now here, however the practice need to establish a process for doing this. Patients will be able to amend personal details online and book appointments online, this did raise a question that this may disadvantage those patients who do not have access to a computer or the internet. It was discussed and agreed to invite Linda Greensmith to join the Patient Forum on behalf of Age UK.

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TIM FARRON MP

I was really pleased to hear that the Education Department have agreed to rethink the proposed changes to the way funding for schools is allocated. Since this plan was announced I have had several productive conversations with David Laws, the education minister, about the fact that the proposed changes were going to leave many more remote rural schools struggling to survive (over 30 according to Cumbria County Council). This is because, as I said last month, in their proposals to simplify the school funding system they removed any flexibility for councils to make allowance for the fact that running a

smaller school in a more remote location is simply more expensive per child and so needs more money of we are to avoid children having to make long journeys every morning and afternoon. I am afraid this was yet another example of Whitehall failing to realise that rural life is more expensive than living in the centre of a city. A fact I have to keep reminding them of and that I am continually being supported in by any number of reports that reach my desk. There was even one the other week from Oxfam looking at the incomes of hill farmers. Oxfam is not an organisation I really associate with charitable issues in this country let alone the problems of our hill farmers. It goes to

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show how tough things are for the people who keep our dales looking as good as they do. Their report was shocking, highlighting a gap of around £7000 between what a family needs to earn in to meet the needs and what many hill farmers actually earn. As a result many are having to cut back quite severely on food for their families.

Anyway the Education Department have agreed to ensure no school loses any more than 1.5% from the funding they receive and to hold a full review of the funding formula by spring next year. I will fight to ensure the new proposals include an allowance for rural life.

The news that the Department of Transport have asked Virgin Trains to continue running the West Coast line is also positive. Many people have told me how worried they have been by the award of the franchise to the First Group. One of the things I am most keen to ensure in the debate over how franchises are awarded in future is that the voices of those who use the service are taken into account when deciding who wins. My major concern, however, is that after this interim period where Virgin are running the franchise the Government is proposing to award a short-term (2 year contract) before making their long award. This seems to me to be a recipe for the line to go without any investment for over three years. After all the good work done by Virgin it would be a great shame to see the line falling behind again.

Finally, 15th November sees the election of the first ever Police

Commissioner for Cumbria. Whatever you feel about this new post please do go and vote as whoever is elected will have a powerful influence on the running of the police service in Cumbria.

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TUESDAY NIGHT T'AI CHI AND CHI KUNG

This is just a quick note to let people know that Ian McPherson's Tuesday night class continues at the URC Rooms this autumn. We mostly practice gigong (chi kung), with a little taiji (t'ai chi) as well (don't worry about the spelling! Chinese doesn't turn into English very well). You will probably have seen taiji on TV - it's those sequences of slow, graceful movements people tend to do wearing silk pyjamas and an ineffable expression. What it's about is retraining the body, how it stands and moves, so it works more efficiently and in a much more relaxed way. You notice emotional tensions begin to drain away as the body relaxes and the smooth movements settle the mind down, and balance usually improves. Qigong is the underpinning of taiji – you learn sets of movements



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that help you relax, help the joints become more mobile and help the breathing improve, and you learn an attitude of relaxed concentration on the movement you're doing which helps the mind calm down and begin to let go of the worries and stress that usually chase about in it. Taiji and qigong are associated with older people, but also work well for athletes, people in stressful jobs, and so on – we tailor the content of the sessions to the people doing them.

I'll be looking after the sessions for the next few weeks as part of my, er, professional development, but lan will be back later in the autumn. The sessions are light-hearted but we do take the work seriously ... and we don't wear pyjamas! The class runs from 7.30 til 9 pm and costs £28 for a block of four sessions. The doors will open at 10am and they look forward to welcoming you all there.



News from the Sedbergh Pews

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

The Kingdom of Northumbria On 17th October members of the History Society were treated to a most informative and interesting illustrated talk by Sheena Gemmel entitled "The Kingdom of Northumbria: its Rise and its Golden Age." Ms Gemmel, a Doctor of Literature who had studied Early Medieval History at St Andrew's University and been a lecturer at Lancaster University, is a national authority in this field and during the talk she imparted a wealth of information about the formation. extent, evolution and influence (particularly its art, religion, literature and architecture) of the Kingdom of Northumbria, largely in the late 7th to mid 8th centuries - its 'golden age'.

Northumbria (literally 'the land to the north of the River Humber') initially evolved from a fusion of two kingdoms: Bernicia (founded in 567 A.D.) to the north, inhabited by Angles and centred around Bamburgh; and Deira to the south, a Saxon area centred around York.

Aethelfrith, described by Bede as 'powerful', 'ambitious' and 'cruel', was the king of Bernicia who, through his expansionist warlike methods unified the entire neck of land comprising central Britain between the Irish and North seas to the north of the Humber and to the south of the old Roman Antonine Wall between the Clyde and Forth rivers. This included Rheged (present-day Cumbria) as well as Gododin and Strathclyde, and indeed probably also had influence as far west as Ireland.

Once established, and with Christianity becoming more widespread, there followed a period of peace and prosperity under the rule of Edwin (of Deira), 617 A.D. to 633 A.D. He developed links with the kingdom of Kent and, through this alliance, beyond into Europe from where cultural influences flooded northwards: education, reading and writing became more commonplace.

Edwin was succeeded by Oswald, a son of Aethelfrith, and later and for a long period (642 to 670 A.D.) by Oswiu. During the former's reign, when dominion over the Scots was

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cemented. St Aidan came from Iona to establish his monastery on Lindisfarne. It was during Oswiu's reign, however, that the kingdom really flourished: through his 3 marriages links with Rheged and Ireland were strengthened, drawing in diverse Christian influences yet in an atmosphere of peace and cultural cooperation; the highly influential Synod of Whitby (664 A.D.) decided in favour of continental practices; there was a flowering of learning and the arts; and several important institutions were founded, including Ripon Cathedral (671 A.D.), Hexham Abbey (673), Monkwearmouth Monastery (674), York Minster (682) and Jarrow (685). Many key figures in this golden age were of continental origin, including Theodore, Benedict Biscop and Hadrian, whilst a local nobleman, Wilfred, was instrumental in the great building revolution, organising stonemasons brought in from Gaul.

The talk ranged much wider than this core history, with beautiful illustrations of, for example, Acca's Cross at Hexham; a simple memorial stone at Hartlepool comprising the Greek letters alpha and omega; Bewcastle Cross in Cumbria; and the Ruthwell Cross in Dumfriesshire depicting Christ's mastery over the beasts, and the Tree of Life – in Ms Gemmel's words, "the monument of the period par excellence."

The appetite of our audience for delving even further into this remarkable period was well and truly whetted.

We're delighted to be teaming up once again with the Sedbergh Branch of the Royal British Legion for our screening on the 10th November, the night before Remembrance Sunday and will be showing The Dam Busters, which we thought appropriate given the unveiling this year of the memorial to the 55,573 aircrew of Bomber Command who lost their lives in World War 2.

This classic black and white film tells | had only seven weeks to train with the true story of Operation Chastise,

a top-secret RAF bombing mission designed to strike a decisive blow against the seemingly invincible Nazi war machine at the height of its aggression.

In March 1943, a group of airmen drawn from across the ranks of the RAF were assembled and trained for an unprecedented and scientist, Barnes Wallis, but to be potentially deadly assignment. They





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exercises that imitated - but never

revealed – their intended target: to fly deep into Germany at tree top level. at night-time, and destroy three dams that were essential to the Nazi steel industry. A revolutionary bouncing bomb that could skip across water

had been developed by a visionary effective, the bomb had to be dropped from terrifyingly close range and at very low altitude. In specially modified Lancaster aircraft the airmen trained for a single mission, the likes of which had never been undertaken and whose potential for success was small.

There will also be a short presentation before the film on the work of the British Legion. A licensed bar and refreshments will be available, profits from which will go to British Legion funds.

Talks at Brigflatts Quaker Meeting House

Our three talks during the week were about three apparently very different things, but all were linked by underlying principles.

The first, by Liz Weller from
Brigflatts Meeting, introduced us to
the idea that there is a distinction
between stillness and silence silence does not neccessarily bring
inner stillness, inner stillness can
happen anywhere at any time in the
midst of a busy life. As a working
mum, Liz said that those moments of
stillness she tries to find within each
day are of great help to her.

The second, given by Peter Leeming from Kendal Meeting, explained how he came to be a Quaker from a childhood Anglican background. As a disaffected teenager, he came in contact with a local group of Quakers who impressed him by their caring for their community, their acceptance of individuals with all their faults and failings, and at the same time welcoming with gratitude the limited gifts each may bring. Peter was attracted by the Quaker form of worship, their non-judgmental and inclusive community, and the opportunities he found for service both at home and abroad.

And lastly, Martin Ashbridge from Brigflatts Meeting gave an interesting history of the Nenthead / Swaledale lead mines, which were started by a London firm, and were the first business in the country to be run on Quaker principles of caring for the workers - before the days of Cadburys and Roundtrees. He had a good visual display which showed us something of the life of the workers, which certainly included lighter moments, not just slog!

All in all, an informative and enjoyable week, giving us some food for thought.

Many of you will remember the magnificent concert with the Gladly Solemn Sound west gallery choir in Sedbergh parish church a few years ago - as well as the annual concerts at the Dent Folk Carols weekend in December where the choir is often accompanied by instruments appropriate to the age such as serpents, oboes, fiddles, clarinets and cellos. West gallery music takes its name from the place where - between 1700 and 1850 - the singers sang from the opposite end of the church from the altar in the east end. It was made famous by Thomas Hardy in his book Under the Greenwood Tree.

The music is lively with strident rhythms and strong melodies - and is a delight sing and play. Few people are better informed to teach it than Paul Guppy who leads the Gladly Solemn Sound choir and researches much of this music, often from manuscripts in dusty records offices or from manuscripts found in local attics. This includes music from local places such as Coniston, Martindale, and Wyresdale - where often only the

Sometimes this means Paul using his expertise to fill in the missing parts. With some of the music - like the Copper Family's Christmas Song and Shepherd's Arise - Paul has composed the four part arrangement himself.

All singers and those who play instruments are very welcome to join us in the People's Hall on Saturday November 17 where Paul will teach this wonderful music. We can send music scores in advance and there are videos of the choir singing some of the songs on Youtube. There will also be an opportunity for singers to sing with the Gladly Solemn Sound a couple of weeks later after the concert in Dent (November 30) when everyone goes for more informal singing in the George and Dragon. You can also get a flavour of the period where this music comes from with the readings during the concert which evoke a time when the singers would walk round all the outlying farms singing these songs and then would "pass forth into the quiet night an ancient and timeworn hymn, embodying a quaint Christianity. passed down from father to son right down to the present generation."

If you don't read music, there are also workshops where the carols will be taught by ear over the weekend of December 1 with carols from mediaeval times to the present day -

as well as a workshop on Sunday with "carols from afar." We have a large group of singers coming so there will be plenty of support - as well as festive meals cooked by the highly acclaimed Luzia Marquart, dancing at the Carols Ceilidh, a Sunday afternoon walk and more. 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NATIONAL CHILDREN'S ORCHESTRA

PLANS to set-up a regional section of the National Children's Orchestra at Sedbergh, Cumbria, are in the pipleline - if there's enough interest from budding young players.

Open to all children aged eight-14 across the North West and Scotland, the idea would be to base the ensemble at Sedbergh School's music centre. The NCO hold residential rehearsals in Sedbergh during the Summer holidays and auditions were held on Tuesday, October 30th.

Roger Clarkson, NCO's principal director of music, said that their regional orchestras provided an opportunity for NCO members to perform with children across the full NCO age range in-between the residential courses at a venue close to home.

He added: "This allows younger members to see what they can aspire to, and for older members to get a first taste of mentoring and supporting young musicians.

"We are continually striving to develop the regional orchestras so that we have more bases across the country. Setting up a regional orchestra in the north west would be extremely beneficial to the future of music in this area; it would allow more young musicians to meet together to develop and enhance their musical skills. We have a lot of talented musicians from the north in the NCO, but it would be exciting to see membership from this area of the



UK grow and develop even further." The National Children's Orchestra of Great Britain was formed in 1978 by Vivienne Price MBE, who saw the need for talented children aged under 14 to have their own symphony orchestra. The first course attracted 70 players and proved such a success that a more ambitious programme and more prestigious concert halls were chosen for the next two years. By 1981 so many children were applying to join that the Training Orchestra was set up for those who had just missed out. In 1983, Diana, Princess of Wales became Patron and over the next 30 years the NCO developed and grew. The orchestra has continued to perform in a variety of settings. including on the BBC's Blue Peter and at the Schools Proms in the Royal Albert Hall.

One of Sedbergh School's former headmasters, Michael Thornely, was a director of the National Youth Orchestra and the school's music performance hall is named after him. His wife, Jennifer, said: "It would fulfil one of Michael's dreams to have the

National Children's Orchestra based at Sedbergh. His involvement with the National Youth Orchestra began because the founder, Ruth Railton, came to Sedbergh auditioning children and she suggested Michael should join the board."

I have been teaching the primary school children songs from Slovenia which they sang for the Ambassador -

including the Slovenian National Anthem: "Blessings on all countries who long and pray for that bright day when over earth's habitation, no war, no strife shall hold it's sway. Who long to see that all people free, no more shall foes but neighbours be." The Ambassador told the children about the anthem's creator Franc Preseren and his similarities with Wordsworth. The children then sang the British national anthem as well as some of their own school assembly songs.

The Ambassador said how much he enjoyed meeting the children - the occasion reminding him of his own childhood when visiting dignitaries such as Partisans would visit his own school assembly. The Ambassador described our twinning with Zrece as one of the most successful in Europe and said how impressed he was both by the beauty of our landscape and the kindness of our people. This was not an official visit - the Ambassador and his party were on holiday en route for Scotland - but still they created an inspiration for our twinning activities with Zrece, and with the rest of Slovenia.

ORIGINAL MOUNTAIN MARATHON

By the time you read this article, the event would have taken place on 27/28th October but here is some interesting information. Hopefully, there will be an updated report for the December *Lookaround*.

Sedbergh School has four entrants for the Original Mountain Marathon, They are Mike Moss (54), Dan Harrison, (41), Sam Fisher (20) and Alan and Tom Peel (Father and Son, from Hathersage). Sedbergh School has been recruiting marshals for the run.

Formerly known as the Karrimor International Mountain Marathon, the event, which is in its 45th year, will have 3,000 runners competing within eight different classes presenting the ultimate in self-sufficiency challenges and a great community to share it all with. Sedbergh School will be the event headquarters and competitors will register on Friday afternoon or Saturday morning and the race will finish here on the Sunday.

The OMM challenges teams of two to experience a sometimes extreme set of circumstances, navigating their way - over two days - camping over night on a double mountain marathon There are eight classes catering for

all types of competitors with hillwalking and navigational experience.

This year's event returns OMM to an area of stunning natural beauty which is often overshadowed by its better known neighbour, The Lake District. Matt Williams, Event Director said "The terrain allows for a stunning backdrop to what should be a fantastic race with both significant navigational challenges as well as a good hard fitness test. I am incredibly excited about the location."

The Howgills was last competed across in 1998 and holds a deserved reputation of a tremendously challenging area in which to compete. Its mix of wonderful views and combination of complex terrain make it an ideal location for good competition that will see only the strongest and best skilled teams being in contention to win. The fact that it is just off the M6 motorway also means it is significantly easier to reach than some of the areas that have been used previously.

The competitors will include top adventure racing teams from around the globe such as Team Thule so the standard is expected to be better than ever. Despite this the event continues to attract people from all walks of life and ages who wish to take on the challenge and enjoy it.

The growing community of OMM is helping the expansion of these kinds of activities and with quickly disappearing places on this year's event it is set to continue its growth.

Working on stretched cartridge paper he explained that the smoother surface was better for this medium and demonstrated methods of achieving various textures using four different types of pencil. Derwent Drawing Pencils and Coloursoft are non-soluble, and Graphitint and Inktense are both soluble and the finished art works he brought amply illustrated the versatility of the medium when used wet or dry. He encouraged us to experiment and has recently been using the pencils over an acrylic ground. 




