This report covers the meeting on 8th August

LOCAL POLICE

PCSO Karen Dakin gave the members a summary of recent initiatives and crime trends.

PLANNING

The Planning Committee report gave unconditional support to four planning applications and expresses reservations regarding three more. The meeting also considered the application by Spar to remove the

requirement for recycling from the new store in Station Road. The Council expressed concern over the way the issue had been handled by YDNPA Planning whilst accepting that there was now little that could be done about the issue. It was noted however that Spar are still looking at a limited scheme for recycling.

Detailed comments can be seen on the Council's web site and in the office at 72 Main Street.

GRANTS

A grant of £1,500 was agreed to assist the Town Twinning Committee with the planned 2014 exchange visit to Zrece.

Sedbergh Parish Council seeks a confident person with an interest in the local community for the post of Clerk to the Parish Council from October/November 2013

The Clerk is responsible for managing the Council's day to day business, providing advice, and implementing decisions.

Applicants will need to be computer literate, able to prepare council agendas and record minutes, be familiar with book keeping and financial procedures and be able to work with external organisations on behalf of the Council.


There is a great deal of work being done including:

FAMILY MUSINGS



TIM FARRON MP

Thanks to everyone who braved the weather to come out and meet me on my summer tour last month. As I have said these tours are very important to me doing my job well but also one of the most enjoyable times of my year. The tour allow me to meet with a very broad range of people and hear about the issues concerning them that they may not feel worthwhile to bring along to one of my surgeries.

I picked up quite a few concerns during our stops in Sedbergh and Dent. Clearly the number of grit bins up around Garsdale is not adequate to cope with the kind of weather we have had in recent winters and I will speak to Nick Cotton to see what we can do about it.

One matter that came up repeatedly was concern for our environment, both in terms of recycling and alternative sources of energy. Several people mentioned that plastic recycling has not yet reached Sedbergh. Of course you can recycle plastic in the containers in the Car Park but in some parts of Cumbria plastic can be put into your recycling boxes to be picked up with the Monday collection. This facility has not come to Sedbergh yet but again I will be working with my colleagues on both the District and County Councils to see what can be done to make it

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happen soon.

On the issue of renewable energy several people mentioned how difficult it is to set up small scale community hydro-electric schemes. Clearly in an area such as ours, where there is no shortage of water falling down mountains, hydro could be a very useful source of energy and one I am keen for us to use as much as is possible. I will get in touch with my colleague Ed Davey who is Secretary of State for Energy and Climate Change to let him know how challenging people are finding setting up these schemes and asking him to see what can be done to help.

Finally, (although this was not the last issue raised, just the last I have space to report on here), I hope many of you know that if you are under the age of 18 you are eligible to join the A2B scheme that allows you to

purchase bus tickets for any "off-peak" journey which starts within South Lakeland for only £1. This is a wonderful scheme introduced by our local County Councillors that brings a lot of independence to young people in this area, particularly during holiday times. Anyway I was asked if this could be extended to people under the age of 21 who are just starting work and so are on low incomes and find that a large part of their wages go on getting to and from work. Again I will look into this and see what can be done.

In August I had a great day out at the Civic Day for the Leeds Children's Charity at the Holiday Centre it runs at Silverdale just inside the county border. Set on the cliff with sweeping views over Morecambe Bay you could not wish for a more beautiful spot. Some 500 children a year from disadvantaged families in Leeds visit the centre for a five day break, which for many of them is not just a holiday but a life changing experience. I was most impressed by the strong local support for the centre with volunteers both fund raising and helping out with the children. The week I visited the

eleven, were all young carers although most of them looked barely old enough to tie their own shoe laces let alone take on the responsibility for a parent or sibling.

But despite their problems they were completely irrepressible -racing round on pedal go-karts, shrieking with excitement on the playground equipment and screaming with delight in the swimming pool. We finished the day with a short concert of songs by the children, sung with such exuberance that the whole audience joined in the final one. girl stuck in the sands". Cllr Nick

I am in the middle of an experiment in Kirkby Lonsdale which, if it works, it would be good to roll out in Sedbergh as well. It involves drains, torrential rain, a camera and lots of waterproof gear. There was a spell of very heavy and prolonged rain in early August when the heavens opened and the River Lune rose 10 feet in as many hours. Having covered myself head to foot in waterproofs I went out with the aim of tracking down every drain in Kirkby Lonsdale which was not working, where the surface water ran over the top of the metal slats instead of draining down off the road and awav.

The majority of the drains were working well but I discovered 31 which were not. I took two photos of each blocked drain, a close up and a shot to give it a location, transferred these onto a CD and sent this together with a list of locations and some large scale street mapping marked up with the trouble spots to Cumbria Highways. That is where we are at the moment. If it turns out that Highways are happy to have information presented to them in this way, it is clear to see how Parish and County could work effectively together - it is at Parish level where you will find real knowledge of local drainage problems and how these are affected by different conditions,

We are all very lucky. In general terms lucky to be alive but specifically very lucky to live in such a beautiful part of the country. What gave rise to this reflection was recently having to cancel a holiday abroad and instead opt for a staycation here in Sedbergh and the surrounding area. Staycation is really just a clever way of saying "there is no place like home". So why is this place so special? Whilst not everyone agrees, we have the good fortune to live in the Yorkshire Dales National Park and just a few miles the other side of the motorway we also have the Lake District National Park. To the South lies the Forest of **Bowland Area of Outstanding Natural** Beauty (AONB), to the south west the Arnside and Silverdale AONB, to the east the Nidderdale AONB and to the north east the North Pennines AONB. Not to mention just a little further afield the Northumbrian and North York Moors National Parks and over the Border the lovely countryside and coast of Dumfries and Galloway. The whole of the Lune Valley is gorgeous too and the fascinating upland world of Hutton Roof Crags and Farleton Fell well worth exploring. Mixed in with these are nature reserves, sites of special scientific interest and specially designated conservation areas. For anyone with a love of the great outdoors and the vast amount of wildlife which it contains the whole area is truly a paradise. Given also

the wonderful weather we have had over the past few weeks why go through all the hassle of travel and airports when we have such a holiday destination literally on our doorsteps?

Apart from the fact that I believe this to be true and had a wonderful holiday without even leaving the north of England I also have a vested interest in promoting holidays at home in that one of my duties as a member of the YDNPA is to hold the position of Member Champion for Promoting Understanding of the National Park. This includes tourism and the provision of visitor information resources and supporting the work of the Dales Countryside

News from the Practice

Good news. In addition to the annual festival of flu injections looming in the early autumn we also welcome this year new vaccines for shingles and an oral flu vaccine for children. We may be able to fit these in with the existing Flu vaccination clinics-which will take place on Saturday 21st September and Saturday 12th October between 9am -11am as walk in clinics *. The down side is that to qualify for the shingles vaccine a patient has to be either 70 or 79 on the 1st September 2013. There is no give in the criteria-being a day older/younger or if your partner/

spouse is in receipt of the vaccine will not affect your eligibility. We don't make the rules-we just have to apply them-so please watch this space. Similarly with oral flu vaccines for the under 5's-you have to be aged 2 or 3 on the 1st September 2013.

Sedbergh Medical Practice endorses the current vaccination programme. Prevention is better than cure in the world of infectious disease (often viral so unable to be treated) and vaccinations are a major reason why the general health of the population has improved. Sure all interventions will have an element of risk or adverse effect-but the overall benefit outweighs any problems

With the availability of medical records on line including messaging and ordering prescriptions we have changed the prescription request link on the website to take you straight through to EMIS Access. We accept that it can be a little fiddly to set up (but getting better) but once sorted any individual can request medication directly from our records, see results and the wider record we hold including documents along with being able to electronically message clinicians directly. This is an excellent way of enabling patients be more involved in their own health care and helps us look after patients better.

principle of caring for patients we would like to point out that there is no public right of way down the slope behind the new Health Centre to the SPAR supermarket. There have been several near misses with children running or biking through the parking area during the working day. CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

When does habitat destruction become conservation?

It often seems counter-intuitive that conservation of wildlife habitats requires the destruction of habitat! Conservation is often taken to mean preservation of an existing state of being such as artwork or a house. However when one considers the conservation of a habitat and its entire wildlife, then one has to carefully manage the habitat to avoid succession occurring and actually destroying the very habitat that one is trying to maintain. Succession is the predictable and natural series of events that changes a current habitat into a new one. One textbook example is to consider bare rock revealed by a glacier retreating slowly but surely being colonised by lichens, followed by small non vascular plants and then via a series of herbs, via bushes to woodland. In Cumbria the likely "climax vegetation" is deciduous woodland so that if we left Sedbergh to its own devices (and removed all humans and their activities) it would turn into native woodland over the

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next few thousand years. In this area, deforestation and consequent agriculture from Neolithic times has kept the fells looking like they do now for thousands of years; so what is natural habitat in Sedbergh?

Cumbria Wildlife Trust has a responsibility to conserve valuable areas of habitat, to manage them and where possible to provide "corridors" to link existing habitats so that they become part of a coherent larger ecosystem that preserves (and often restores) biodiversity. Consequently hedgerows and rivers provide natural routes by which some species can move from one habitat to another. Their work comprises advice to land owners and other land managers, management (and acquisition) of reserves and of course the ever present fund-raising (and accompanying public education) to allow the former processes to continue. Farmers are invaluable agents of this habitat and government funds of various types help to make it financially viable to manage portions of land in an ecologically valuable fashion.

In Sedbergh there are several areas of active conservation, whether it be removal of non-native invading species such as the removal of Himalayan Balsam from river banks, or the creation and management of Jubilee Wood. Sedbergh and Settlebeck School are both actively involved in conservation with Settlebeck having recently been involved in the clearance of Himalayan Balsam. Students from Settlebeck regularly work with Yorkshire Dales National Park rangers, and awards won have funded creation of a wildlife garden. Sedbergh School has created conservation areas; Bruce Loch and Old Peculiar Pool (part-funded by



Theakstons!).

Bruce Loch is an interesting example where a former small dammed area (for ice skating) was extensively dug out in the mid Eighties to create a permanent pond along with tree planting to shield the area from disturbance by passing dogwalkers. The pond area would, by now, be filled in with reeds and other fringing vegetation and have developed into marshland which, in turn, would develop into heath and woodland eventually. Teams of "enthusiastic" volunteers from the school enter the pond in the autumn and clear out a proportion of the new growth each year to preserve the open water. Slightly upstream of this area is Old Peculiar Pool which was created some 15 years later and includes an artificial otter holt and there is beginning to be evidence of otter activity near the pool, even if not any resident breeding yet. There is an ever present conflict between public access and wildlife disturbance in any conservation area, and these small areas do not have the facility of creating walkways and hides unlike larger areas such as Burns Beck Moss up near Killington.

Should you wish to become involved in active conservation the Cumbria Wildlife Trust's website publishes a calendar of events such as at Orton Moss where there are regular work parties on the first Tuesday of each month. Alternatively come and learn about their work at one of their local events.

JUNE WEATHER

When did we have a spell of weather like this month? There have been various comparisons but for me the most memorable has to be 1976. In fact we have a dry/hot spell every few years. Recent ones have been 2003 and 2006. These were not as long as 1976 but came after fairly dry winters. This year we had 19 dry days but with the water table fairly high there weren't even any hosepipe bans. The 1976 drought lasted 45 days!!! We even had a Minister for Drought in 1976 and rivers as well as reservoirs ran dry that year. That was the year when stand pipes were in use in many parts of the country! The middle three weeks of this month had most days touching 80F with a maximum of 86F(30C) on the 18th. Minimum temperatures were, as to be expected, also fairly high but we did have one cool night on the 27th when temperatures dropped to 38.1F(3.5C)



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and 37F with the windchill. In spite of the high pressure it was a fairly breezy month with a maximum of 17.2mph and only 5 days when these gusts did not come from the North west quarter. We had had only 0.3 inches of rain until the 22nd of the month but we finished with a total of 6.02 inches! We had 2.8 inches of rain falling in the 24 hours on the 28th of the month. In fact 1 inch fell in 20 minutes around 8.30am! I know as I was doing my feeding rounds!!

Most farmers literally made hay whilst the sun shone. I got my first hay for 4 years!! I carted 140+ bales in one afternoon in a sun temperature of 105F(71C). I literally lost 4lbs in sweat!! Anyway the shippon is full so the sheep can feed again this winter without too much expensive proven! The rain quickly greened up the fields. Hedgerows have put on a real spurt of growth. We shall have to get

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busy after the 13th of next month cutting the growth back. A moratorium on cutting was agreed to allow nesting birds time to get their clutches away. The birds seem to have had a good year especially the house sparrows, jackdaws and crows. Butterflies seem still to be struggling with only cabbage whites about regularly. These have found my few Romanescue plants on which to lay their eggs! I physically wipe the eggs off each day. Imagine trying to do this on a field scale and yet there are some folk who don't want crops sprayed! I wonder what price they would pay for cabbages, cauliflowers etc full of holes? Rabbits haven't made a re-appearance yet but up Mallerstang both rabbits and hares are apparently plentiful. A few small rodents have been seen about which is surprising with weasels living in the paddock wall. The odd bat is out

hunting at dusk. A fox is visiting regularly and had dug up a dead chicken that must have been good and smelly. I haven't seen signs of the badgers recently. We've got woodpeckers back at the feeding station but recently it has been a female. The swallow brood kept returning to roost until the parents laid again. These hatched on the 18th. The wrens also had a second brood. Sadly this brood was lost when on a windy night on the 26th/27th when the nest fell into a tray of water chilling the brood inspite of replacing the nest in a suspended plant pot. A nuthatch has returned to the nut feeder. They are instantly recognized as they are invariably upside down when feeding. I am a beekeeper again. I went back over to the East coast to bring several colonies back. Prior to going I got some hives ready to put the nuclei in and low and behold I gained a swarm as well! They seem to have settled in.



SEDBERGH CAR CLUB

A Car Club for Sedbergh & District?
It's part of the Information Centre's mission as a transport hub to look for ways to help people travel around the area (and beyond) while keeping carbon emissions down and building communities.

One thing I've long wanted to see if we could get started here is a car club. It's easily described: it's a kind of membership car hire scheme. You pay guite a bit less than the cost of car insurance to join, then when you use one of the club's cars you pay a fee for the time you have the car and the distance you drive. Hire costs would be competitive with car hire firms, with the benefits that you can hire the car just for an hour or two if you want and that the insurance excess is low ... not to mention that the car's here rather than Kendal or elsewhere. Organising the hire involves a simple online form or a phone call.

This kind of scheme would help people who need a car now and again but don't want, or can't afford, to own one; changing to a car club from owning a car is also a good way of saving money, partly from the simple economics of it (no need to find money to buy one; no servicing and MOT fees) and partly because the amount people drive drops by quite a bit when they change from their own to a shared car. That last bit is how a car club helps our carbon footprint.

I don't think Sedbergh is too small

for such a thing; smaller places like Staveley, Mallaig (western Scotland) and South Brent (Devon) have one and seem to be doing pretty well.

For now, I would like people who think they would be interested in such a scheme to let me know; this will help me look for funding to buy a car or cars - I am fairly sure there are a couple of good possibilities. In a couple of months, I will invite people who've expressed interest to get together to think about how a car club might operate here and hear from people who've been involved in schemes in other places. There would be no obligation to join if we did get something going.


OPIUM WAR



TELECOM MASTS

Last summer a large number of Sedbergh residents signed a petition protesting against the proposed erection of a 65.5 foot high mast behind the Electricity Substation off Busk Lane, and when the issue came up before the Yorkshire Dales Planning Authority, in May and July last year, it was turned down: cheers all round were to be heard. But lately the news has not been so good. Undeterred, Electricity North West has already erected the 6'6" high plinth for a 42.5 foot mast, which they hope to complete before the end of August. The plinth is set on ground which sits higher than Queen's Drive, so the mast would be both higher -

almost 52.5 feet above the level of our houses - and extremely near to some of the houses in Queen's Drive: horror, horror!

Local residents were NOT informed in advance. If it was discussed by the Parish Council, no one told us, maybe because they thought it was a fait accompli. The Planning Officer of the YDNPA had assured Electricity North West that it was a 'permitted development' as being under 49 feet high, but we believe he acted illegally by not submitting the proposal to scrutiny by the full Planning Committee; the Law requires that it has full planning permission in a National Park. We have had assurances from a



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telecommunications consultant that the Substation could have the necessary time-critical remote control that is needed, by more discreet means. National Parks surely exist to protect us from the intrusion of unnecessary masts, and there are laws to deter their construction. Both the residents and the landscape need protection . . . and vigilance on everyone's part!

It was as a result of the detective work by a neighbour that the plinth was discovered - only on August 9th. Since then, preliminary approaches have been made to the YDNPA, ENW and Tim Farron, MP for the area who, although he was on holiday,

immediately wrote to the Chief Executive of the YDNPA on our behalf. No response is so far forthcoming, but apologies for not giving residents of Queen's Drive advance warning of the construction have now been received from ENW. There has been no comment so far on a request for evidence of full planning permission for the work.

For the sake of everyone - local residents, townspeople and the many visitors who come to Sedbergh to enjoy the beauty of the landscape, we intend to take the matter further.

SEPTEMBER GARDENING

My most successful fruit crops in the garden this year have been the greenhouse strawberries, and the gooseberries, both of which provided a steady supply of berries.

Each year I aim to replace some of my older strawberry plants, either with runners from my own stock, or from plantlets, from friends, or newly purchased from a nursery. This month is the ideal time as it gives the plants a chance to settle in well before the winter. I use large black buckets, with holes drilled through the base for drainage, and I plant my strawberry plants into John Innes no.2 compost, 3 plants per bucket. The filled buckets live out of doors through the winter, and are moved into my cold and airy (it has one or two panes missing at ground level) greenhouse in spring when the plants show signs of good growth. The greenhouse plants fruit at least a month ahead of their garden relatives, and, as I keep the buckets up on the greenhouse bench, they are easy to pick, and avoid the dangers of the slugs, snails, black beetles, woodlice, centipedes, voles





and woodmice and the blackbirds which have, over the years, eaten their way into my outdoor strawberry fruit. So far the only pest problem on my indoor plants has been vine weevils, whose small, creamy white grubs have occasionally got in amongst the roots and had a good old chomp. Plants with this pest can soon be identified as they grow more slowly than their neighbours. The best solution is to turn out the bucket full and have a scrabble around amongst the roots. Pick out, and squash the grubs – or put them in a bowl on your bird table, (they are a great favourite with robins) and if the plants still have some healthy strong roots left, replant in clean compost. Greenhouse plants do. of course need regular watering and appreciate an occasional feed with a high potash fertiliser, but the extra time spent is always well rewarded by a good supply of clean, dry, mould free fruits in early summer. The buckets are moved out of doors again as soon as fruiting has finished to make way for the tomatoes, courgettes and runner beans which follow on. Elaine Horne

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QIGONG & T'AI CHI

Balance, strength & presence this autumn

The Sedbergh area is an increasingly good one for people interested in Chinese ideas about movement, relaxation, concentration and health that are expressed in qigong and taiji (also spelt 'chi kung' and 't'ai chi'). This autumn, three local and two guest teachers will give people a chance to learn and practice a wide range of approaches whether they are an experienced practitioner or new to it all.

Ian McPherson has studied energy arts, meditation and martial arts for many years. He has long-running

June Parker's knowledge of Chinese medicine is based in her study of acupuncture and her work as an acupuncturist. She has studied qigong and Chinese martial art within the UK Taiji Qigong Foundation for well over a decade. She specialises

in teaching the flowing but powerful movements of Wild Goose Qigong; she has a weekly class in Sedbergh on Monday mornings and a monthly day-long class in Barbon. She has also organised a visit in October from Kevin McGee, a senior teacher of Peter Ralston's 'Effortless Power' approach to movement and 'Zen Body-Being' approach to selfawareness.

Hazel Hunt is a trained nurse as well as an experienced taiji teacher and is interested in what taiji and gigong can do for those with health or mobility problems. She will be teaching Sun style taiji in Sedbergh over three Saturday afternoons this autumn -Sun style is a sprightly, easy-to-

understand system of movement, which Hazel learnt from Faye Yip, a student of Sun Jianyun, the daughter of Sun Lutang, the style's inventor.



Under Roger Clarkson's direction, the core of the 'concert' was Rimsky-Korsakov's narrative tone poem 'Scheherazade', a hugely demanding piece involving scarily exposed and dizzying linking violin solos voicing the lady's seductive story-telling to weighty orchestral textures depicting the high seas, wild love and magic. So much depends on the role of the lower strings and bottom brass to create the urgency of the sea and adventures on it. while the woodwind and top strings have the role of sketching out romantic adventures in love and magic. For many, of course, the thread is the tale of Sinbad. despite the composer's later attempts to suggest the piece was not tied to any particular narrative from The Arabian Nights.

The sheer expressive power and energy of this orchestra was astonishing. But from the start, top billing must go to the astonishing joint leaders of the orchestra, particularly the boy, who carried the weight of the narrative in challenging violin solos played with captivating assurance. Elsewhere, there was fine cello playing, expressive clarinet and bassoon work, alert percussion, and show-stopping brass, particularly from trombone and trumpet sections. As if to underline their virtuosity, the orchestra played their by now familiar



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encore piece of South American dazzle, and here the percussion team was for me the star of the show with some fiendish cross rhythms carried off with cool aplomb.

If you ever want to hear electrifying playing, and experience music-making excitement of a rare order, then this NCO ensemble is worth catching. Let's hope they return next year to illuminate our Sedbergh summer.

An excellent effort from our caring community. Further down you'll see how the communities we were focussing on this year are getting on but first I'd like to raise some help we'd like on the committee.

The committee is a great little working group comprising of people representing most branches of our local churches who all contribute in one way or another to the operation and running of the various events. We only meet about 3 times a year with maybe a couple of sub groups if something needs doing out of the

ordinary. Mrs Christine Wood has been our able Chairperson for the last few years but has now stood down and we would like to draw in to our group someone prepared to take on this role. It isn't an onerous task as the rest of the committee get on with the practical jobs so it's really a case of leading the meeting through its agenda in a timely manner so we can then relax over a cup of coffee and biscuits. We could also do with a new member who'd be prepared to jot down the minutes - at present we're rotating the task but it would be good if someone would come and take the little task on and circulate them by email. They are not scary jobs, nor do they demand a lot of time but we just need some extra folk to have a go so things keep running smoothly. 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members. Our next event is the Coffee Morning on the 9th October which would be a good opportunity to find out more.

Since May there has been further news about the project work of Christian Aid's partners in Zimbabwe and Bolivia.

In Zimbabwe, when the Dabane Trust's Thelma Ntini visited Dambashoko in June, she found the 10 cooperative gardens doing well despite the difficult weather, thanks to a new surface water dam.

Thelma also visited Jonah Tshuma and his wife Jessy, whose story was featured as part of this year's Christian Aid Week materials. Jonah had just harvested sugar beans and garden peas, and had a beautiful crop of tomatoes ripening in his beds. Jonah and Jessy now sell their surplus crop to the Matshetshe Processing Centre, which Dabane

helped the community to set up. The centre is at the heart of Christian Aid's ambition to build a more sophisticated conservation-based agricultural model.

Communities now process, preserve and package their produce, adding value to the crop and allowing them to access more lucrative markets.

Jonah and Jessy have a message for Christian Aid supporters: 'We're so thankful. Where you have sacrificed to give to us, may the Lord replenish you tenfold so you are able to give to other communities as well. Blessed is the hand that giveth as that which receiveth'.

In Bolivia, thanks to Christian Aid's partner CIPCA, the cocoa-producing community has now opened its own chocolate factory, funded by Christian Aid. This creates a world of new opportunities for indigenous cocoa producers, who until recently were

excluded from much of mainstream Bolivian society. As well as enabling them to earn an income from their own land, which means they won't have to migrate to cattle ranches or sugar cane plantations for work, the chocolate factory also gives them the opportunity to be active citizens, contributing to the country's development. The machinery is operated by young people from the forest communities, who also receive training in how to run a successful business.

Christian Aid Bolivia country manager Emma Donlan recalls: 'I remember indigenous people saying that they dreamt of being able to process their own chocolate. They said: "If Switzerland can have the best chocolate in the world and it doesn't even have one cocoa plant, why can't we produce good chocolate?" And now a dream has become reality and there's just such hope here.'

I'm not sure when we'll get to taste the chocolate here in Sedbergh but I'm sure we will.

St Andrew's has a Missionary Committee that helps to support

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

The Frieda Scott Trust has awarded us a grant of £2,500. We were also very fortunate to receive a Gift Aid donation of £10,000 from an anonymous donor in the last month, for which grateful thanks. The Coffee Morning brought in £404 including some sales of bricks and donations. But we still have a deficit of about £10,000. This is covered by loan pledges and so is manageable.

The redevelopment is slightly behind schedule, but we hope to have the changing facilities available for the start of the football fixtures. So what's to make a fuss about? Well, what we have really is fuss-worthy. A trip to the doctor's in

almost any other corner of the UK, including London (perhaps particularly London) will confirm just how lucky we are.

It's not really luck, of course. It was the result of planned action, and we really do need to thank those responsible – Dr Lumb and the others – for what they have done for our community. Perhaps we need to find some proper way of saying thank you. I don't know what this might be, but whatever it is, it does need to be public. Gratitude mumbled from person to person isn't really enough. The Thank You should be **LOUD**.

BOOKWORM

What I have been reading this month:

1. 'Miracles of Life' by J G Ballard (autobiography)

This book charts Ballard's life from Shanghai to Shepperton and covers an extraordinary range of experiences, dispassionately told, which influenced his writing career. The early chapters on China in 1930s from a school boy perspective are very illuminating.

2. 'The Chemistry of Tears ' by Peter Carey (fiction)

Astute, original, detailed description of the process of grief told through the eyes of Catherine a London museum conservator (2010) and the pen of 19th century Henry whilst he is in Germany.

The two are linked via the complex construction of a silver swan automaton - a project aimed at distracting both from grief - in Catherine's case the death of her married lover and in Henry's his dying son

Those who have enjoyed the Bowes Museum silver swan automaton may have a special interest in this book!

3. 'A Delicate Truth' by John le Carre (fiction)

Operation Wildlife: counter terrorism, the Foreign Office, a new minister, Gibraltar, American mercenaries and the secret collateral damage of 2 deaths. Why is the situation so toxic 3 years after the failed plot and why are certain people being killed to prevent 'the truth' emerging?

John le Carre weaves all this into a realistic yet thrilling and compulsive read.

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COMMUNITY GRANTS

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SEDBERGH TOWN BAND

Alan Russell Lewis

Following a private family cremation at Morecambe a Commemoration Service for the life of Alan Lewis was held in St. Andrew's Parish Church. The church was filled to capacity with family, friends lovers of brass music, players from the world of brass and former pupils. The sheer numbers of those attending, many of whom had travelled considerable distances, reflected the high esteem in which Alan was held by so many diverse people.

The potentiality for sadness was quickly dispelled as the life, achievements and huge personality of Alan were revealed by addresses from the Vicar, Rev. McMullon,, a lifetime vicar friend of Alan's from Wales (David Jones) Chris Sweeting (Sedbergh School's Chaplain) delivering in his absence Nick Brown's tribute and the combined reminiscences of his sons Iwan and Gavin.

The record of his life and musical achievements as given in the service sheet admirably gives a

comprehensive appreciation of his remarkable talents and accomplishments in the world of Brass Band music. It is not unreasonable to quote it at length to ensure and appropriately detailed record of this larger than life personality.

Born 27th January 1948 in Neath, Wales, he grew up in Seven Sisters with his brother Brian and mother Glenys, his father having passed away in 1954. Aged 15 he started working in the local mine as an electrician, and at 18 years old he joined the army. During his army service he was Principal Cornet of the regimental band of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers, and at the Royal Military School of Music at Kneller Hall. After serving as the Trumplet/Cornet instructor at the Welsh Brigade School of Music he left the army to enter the teaching profession. He taught in Worth School in Kent. Christ College Brecon in Powys, and finally in Sedbergh School where he was the Head of Brass, Bandmaster and founder of the internationally renowned CCF Band.



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Alan's teaching at Sedbergh School led to many pupils achieving grade 8, and eight pupils achieving ATCL and LTCL diplomas, reaching degree level playing and achieving degrees before they even left school. However, his ability to inspire touched many more; just ask any of the hundreds of his former pupils what he meant to them.

Alan held a Licentiate of Trinity College London performers diploma and a Bachelor of Philisophy degree from Lancaster University, for which he wrote a thesis on the technicalities of conducting, later becoming his book 'The Brass Bandmaster'. The topic was so unusual that when the university started searching for someone to mark it, Trinity College

London recommended that they ask a certain Alan Lewis in Sedbergh!

He founded and directed the International Brass Band Summer School in 1989, was a member of the National Association of Brass Band Conductors and in 1995 was elected President of the Cumbria Brass Band Association. He was awarded four medals for his services as Music Adviser to the Band of the Royal Swedish Dragoon Regiment and received the Lord-Lieutenant's certificate for his work with brass bands. Alan Lewis was the Music adviser to the Army Cadet Force and Combined Cadet Force for the north of England and Northern Ireland.

Alan loved composing music and








published a large number of solo and ensemble works, his own website (arlmusic.com) showcasing many of these. He played for many orchestras, big bands and brass bands in his life but enjoyed the challenge of conducting most of all. He was particularly proud of taking Ammandford and then Flookburgh from the unregistered up to the championship section.

In March 1998 Alan, on a voluntary basis, started a brass evening class for people in Sedbergh. This proved to be so popular that he agreed to form the Sedbergh Town Band, which now has 35 players in the senior band and 25 in the youth band.

A larger than life character, driven, inspirational, stubborn, honest, caring, he will be missed.

Space precluded the inclusion of much detail - for instance, although reference is made to his composing it is less well known the full extent of his original works, a number of which feature in the Town Band's concerts are famous pieces skillfully arranged specifically for the Band where his awareness of the strengths and



weaknesses of the Band are magnificently catered for.

He has been a colossal figure as far as the Town Band is concerned. When he gave a relaxed lesson in brass playing at the request of a few regular customers in the Bull Hotel he probably did not realise that his personality, skill, enthusiasm and

He thought up, directed and organised the accumulation of excellent quality instruments for all. uniforms, music stands, badges, banners, a dedicated trailer, a marquee etc., ensuring a band as well equipped as any. He was able to tap into the expertise, assistance and generosity of many organisations thanks to the regard in which he was so widely held. He was instrumental in producing the C.D., and being the inspiration behind trips that took the Band to Slovenia, Italy, Belgium and

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Scotland besides successful participation in a few contests. He was always conscious that there was a local role the Band could play and he organised well received presentations of the Band to a number of nearby villages.

The domestic Alan was graphically conveyed by his sons Iwan and Gavin who gave an affectionate account of a dedicated and caring family man. A visual record and portrait was provided at the end of the service when a range of photographs from the Lewis family albums were screened at the West end of the church as the congregation departed.

The service was undoubtedly one of which Alan would have fully approved. A strong Welsh influence was apparent. After the singing of 'Guide me, O thou great Redeemer' (almost in itself a Welsh anthem) the choir gave an excellent rendtiion of the anthem 'Cantate Domino'. Refreshments were provided in the church and grounds and much praise and thanks go to the ladies who so tirelessly and efficiently undertook the daunting task of providing refreshments for upwards of 400 people.

On completion of the service the Band retired to the marquee



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previously erected outside and proceeded to give a concert to the many attendees who went into the grounds and enjoyed the delightful late July sunshine. The passing of Sedbergh Town Band's Director of Music, Alan Lewis, was tastefully acknowledged at 7.50am on Friday 26th July by Radio Cumbria. The item opened and closed with an extract from the Town's prize winning performance at last year's Hardraw contest. The interviewee, a distinguished figure in the world of banding, (Mr. Swanson, President of the N.A.B.B.C.) paid tribute with glowing reference to various stages of Alan's career. He recalled the astonishing achievement of raising a modest Flookburgh band up to Championship level. Particular emphasis was placed on Alan's career at Sedbergh School where in the role of Bandmaster and principal brass teacher he achieved a national

reputation for an incredibly accomplished school band. He led the band on numerous tours, many to exotic locations, and derived immense satisfaction from the degree level of attainment of some of his pupils. It was universally recognised that Alan demanded and achieved the highest standards.

Admiration was also expressed for the manner in which he formed from scratch the Town Band which initially comprised members who previously could not read a note of music nor had ever lifted a musical instrument. Coffee Morning

John Brown won the toss and



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

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

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
