

SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL

This report covers the Parish Council meeting held on the 12th September

<u>PLANNING</u>

The Planning Committee Report detailed three applications to which no objections were raised and another where concern was expressed again about extensions to smaller houses. If this happens too frequently it will lead to an imbalance in the housing stock making it difficult for first time entrants onto the housing market. There were two further applications, which were discussed by the full council, one because the applicant is related to a councilor and the other because it concerned a major development by Sedbergh School at Brackensghyll, Back Lane. The Council welcomed the continuing investment in the school and supported the development in principle, but expressed a number of concerns about various elements of the design. LEASE FOR LOFTUS HILL CAR

PARK

The Chairman reported that a five

year lease for Loftus Hill Car Park has now been signed and she welcomed the constructive approach from Sedbergh School in safeguarding this important community asset. SWIMMING POOL

As Sedbergh School has received £150,000 funding from Sport England one condition of the grant is that they have to develop a community use agreement. The Chairman reported that she had written to the school asking for the local schools and the swimming club, together with the Parish Council to be consulted on the details of that agreement. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION RE THE

PULSE COMMUNITY GYM Following a presentation from Sandra Gold-Wood the Parish Council agreed to support the principle of the gym being accommodated on the People's Hall site and wished to encourage local people to complete the questionnaire relating to the need for a gym and if possible to sign up as a member. This is being done to support an application for funding to develop the

gym. Sandra also reported that the British Legion is asking people to plant poppy seeds as part of next year's commemorations of the 1914-18 Great War. <u>SEDBERGH TOWNSCAPE</u> <u>PROJECT</u> The meeting received a written report detailing progress to date. It was reported that Cumbria Highways had commenced work on the signs de-cluttering project, which is removing unwanted or redundant signs and replacing others. Discussions have taken place with the consultant commissioned by the Council to prepare a report on the Jubilee Fountain, which should be received within a few weeks. <u>AMENITIES COMMITTEE</u> The signs banning dogs from the People's Hall playing field have been delivered and will be put up soon. The Amenities Committee continues to be busy. Baby changing units have been fitted, one in the ladies and the other in the disabled toilet at Joss Lane. 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COUNCILLORS CORNER From Cllr Evelyn

I was very disappointed that Sedbergh Parish Council did not take up the offer from Nick Cotton and me to help fund a picnic area on the river bank at New Bridge at Settlebeck. Sedbergh Parish Council acquired this land from South Lakeland District Council as part of the transfer of assets which included the tennis courts and the District's fishing rights on the River Rawthey. The eastern end of town has very few amenities and Sedbergh has no picnic sites within walking distance of the town unlike other places like Kirkby Lonsdale and Casterton. The idea was discussed at a Parish Council

meeting in August and I thought it would be a suitable scheme for part of the locality budget each district councillor has been allocated by SLDC to help initiate community projects in their ward. We saw it as the first stage in creating greater access to the riverbank, especially for people with disabilities. The idea was that the district councillors would have provided most of the funding so long as there was a contribution from the Parish Council. Sadly the Parish Council, for reasons I still cannot fathom, refused any financial support so without a local commitment we had no option but to withdraw our offer. Perhaps in the future Sedbergh Parish Council will have a change of

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heart.

From Cllr Ian

Sedbergh and District has traditionally being used to going it alone. Over the years this has certainly developed a sense of selfreliance partly perhaps because of the West Riding inheritance and latterly I think because Sedbergh has guite often found itself between the two stools of the Yorkshire Dales National Park and South Lakeland District Council or between Cumbria Tourism and Welcome to Yorkshire to give just two examples of divided authority and responsibility. To this extent the area tended to be forgotten or overlooked when policy decisions were being made notwithstanding that Sedbergh is the largest settlement in the National Park and in the largest Ward at SLDC represented by three councillors.

It was a pleasure therefore to attend recently what was intended to be the first of a series of meetings between the respective Chief Executives and Chairman of the YDNPA and SLDC and Ward councillors with the purpose of "joining up" the areas of responsibility of the two Authorities and making the whole process of governance more streamlined and user-friendly. Items on our first Agenda included such matters as tourism, business and commerce, roads and cycleways, employment for young people, localism, the proposed extension of the National Park boundaries and particularly the provision of affordable and socially rented housing. Dealing with the latter

is of real importance not only because of the lack of sufficient housing provision at the moment but also because at present the planning and housing functions are split between the two Authorities. The meeting was extremely positive and constructive and augured well for the future but there was equally an emphasis on local communities being willing to make their needs known and to work in partnership with other bodies and organisations. It is all too easy for groups to become talking shops with no obvious practical outcomes so in the meantime I and my District Council colleagues will be keeping a close eye on the development of this initiative.

As an aside we should be receiving notice fairly shortly now of the Inspector's findings and recommendations following the Public Enquiry into the boundary change proposals for both YDNPA and the Lake District National Park Authority. Whatever the Inspector's conclusions however the final decision will be made by the Secretary of State. So it could still be some time before the ultimate outcome is known.

I also recently attended a meeting of the Sedbergh Townscape Project to bring us up to date with how it is going and also to look at plans regarding a revamping of the Joss Lane Car Park and surrounding area particularly that adjoining the Community Office and Information Centre. This will obviously bring about changes in the street scene and it is more than likely that there will be a public consultation exercise

before the matter proceeds much further. I also brought up the meeting which I referred to above and the desirability of the town having a strategic framework within which to operate and to make its needs known to the wider community. I have no doubt that this is something which the Parish Council will be giving some thought to at one of its future meetings.

From Cllr Nick

There is a section of the Dales Way, the long distance footpath linking Ilkley to Windermere, that runs along the A683 to the west of Sedbergh. A footpath along an A road is clearly not ideal and I am looking at ways of creating a vergeside path where there is a wide grass verge between the fence and the road so that the 4000 walkers per year who undertake the 80-mile route have a safer alternative.

In the Sedbergh area the Dales Way follows the River Rawthey west from Millthrop past Brigflatts to join the A683 for about 600 metres before turning off towards High Oaks and joining the River Lune, heading north as far as the Crook of Lune Bridge near Lowgill.

So what can be done to address the problem? It is one of those complicated areas where the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority is responsible for maintenance of footpaths within the National Park but as it runs alongside the A683 it needs to be given the go ahead by Cumbria County Council Highways. The good news is that there are some very practical, 'can-

do' people in both organisations who are aware of the issue and are working hard to find the best solution which can be achieved at minimum cost. There is already talk of stone donated by local quarries and volunteer labour in the form of the Army.

This is one of those schemes where it may take a while to get all the pieces in place but with goodwill and the right attitude, a start can be made which shows what can be built in a relatively short time and at a relatively modest cost which may then act as a template for other such projects elsewhere. There are many places in the Lake District where such paths have been built and not long ago a

bridleway parallel to the A65 was opened between Clapham and Austwick, taking walkers, horseriders and cyclists off this busy road, so there are precedents for roadside paths. If anyone has other suggestions for similar schemes in the Sedbergh area I'd be please to hear them.

Through the tombola and fun and games a total of £96.75 Was raised


and the proceeds will go directly into the up keep of the Mill.



Travel in South Africa for coloured people is unbelievably difficult to organise. Currently she is being supported by individual donations because Thandi Friends

Projects has committed to ensuring the crèche is sustainable before supporting other 'projects'. What we would like to do is to offer support to young people from Lebanon Village who want to attend university. Robyn's struggle to survive is currently not a story likely to encourage others to aspire to



higher education.

The 'cradle to career' idea came from our new recruit to the Thandi board of trustees. Chris Hattam is head of School House at Sedbergh School. Chris says:

'The Sedbergh Gala two years ago gave me an introduction to Thandi and a conversation has led to

OCTOBER GARDENING

As the days shorten and the nights grow colder I shall be on the lookout for the best of the Autumn colour on local trees. Just along the road from the house there is a small wood which contains a single specimen of the North American "Scarlet Oak" (Quercus coccinea). Assuming that there is no gale at just the wrong time, this tree is guaranteed to produce a display of beautiful dark red and scarlet leaves which stand out well in amongst the oranges and yellows and browns of other deciduous trees, and dark greens of the conifers amongst which it grows. In a sheltered position the brightly coloured leaves will remain for six weeks before falling. They are longer and larger than those of our native oaks, and have sharply pointed lobes, rather than rounded ones. Three other North American species, "Pin Oak", "Red Oak" and "Shumand Oak" have similarly shaped leaves and good leaf colour.

We have two native Oak trees which look very similar to each other in shape and leaf form. They are most easily distinguished at this time of the year when they are bearing acorns." Sessile" or "Durmast Oak" (*Quercus petraea*) has acorns with no stalks (though its leaves are stalked) and "English" or "Common Oak" (*Quercus robur*") has long stalks to its acorns (and no stalks to its leaves).

Most Oaks have plain green foliage through the summer, but I did spot a

beautiful specimen of "Turkey Oak" in the Gardens at Threave Castle earlier this year. Quercus cerris 'Variegata' has leaves which are edged with conspicuous creamy white margins and acorns with large shaggy cups. All of these oaks make large specimen trees and are only suitable for big gardens or woodland planting. The most frequently planted, small oak, is an evergreen – the "Kermes Oak" (Quercus coccifera) which grows to only 1-2 m high. Its main claim to fame is as the host of the Kermes Insect – from which the scarlet dye Coccineal was obtained. Elaine Horne

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STIR FRY OR SUSHI

I was searching for an acupuncturist for a friend in the south of England recently, when I came upon a website likening the difference between Chinese and Japanese acupuncture to the difference between stir fry and sushi. It struck me that this analogy could be used in all sorts of areas of life. For example, on the Sedbergh allotments it is obvious that allotment holders have widely differing methods. I would classify the neat beds with bare earth between nicely lined up crops as sushi and the plots where things are more mixed up together as stir fry. Mine is definitely at the stir-fry end of the spectrum. My runner beans fell over for the second time this week and when I cleared them away I found a perfect Good King Henry plant (a spinach-like perennial) and guite a lot of promising looking kale. No bare earth at all, so no further work required. (It could be, however, that a little tidying up over the autumn is called for.)

Japanese-style acupuncture, as practised in the UK, is very gentle and thus well suited to people who are sensitive and is good for children. Jenny Craig practised Japanese acupuncture in Kirkby Lonsdale for many years (she has since moved to Scotland) and a lot of people benefited from this style of acupuncture as a result. Jenny was nominated as an "acupuncture heroine" by the British Acupuncture Council for her work in Africa treating patients suffering from TB. The

treatment uses moxa, a herb of the mugwort family, which is burned in tiny amounts directly on the skin. The method is taught to health workers and to family members or friends who act as "drug buddies" (people who remind patients to take their medication) so that treatment may be continued at home. This type of treatment was used for patients with TB in Japan in the 1930s and the charity Moxafrica co-founded by Jenny exists to explore the potential of this (cheap, low-tech and flexible) method to treat TB in Africa. The website www.moxafrica.com tells some inspiring stories.


I think all the remaining acupuncturists in this area have trained in the Chinese tradition. My experience during my visit to the Traditional Chinese Medicine Hospital in Hangzhou in China leads me to believe, however, that the treatments we typically give in this country are somewhere between the very delicate treatments of the Japanese-style and the strongly stimulating treatments given in the Chinese hospitals. Stir fry without the strong spices, perhaps. I suppose I do a bit of both: very fine needles and gentle technique for delicate areas (such as the face), sensitive people and children. At times, though, particularly with longstanding conditions, I think it is helpful to use a little more stimulation.

I recently had a telephone enquiry for treatment to reduce facial wrinkles, a growing application of acupuncture in the West (and

definitely an area where soft technique is called for). This led me to a period of reflection about the interplay between health and beauty. The face reflects a person's constitution (facial features would have been used in traditional Chinese matchmaking), how the person has lived life so far and the state of a person's energy at the moment. No facial treatment can have a long lasting effect without looking at these underlying factors and seeking to improve the aspects of a person's health which may have led to any perceived beauty defects.

In fact, face reading is an established diagnostic method in Chinese medicine. I have chosen this as the topic of discussion for the last Chinese medicine class this autumn (10 November, 4.00 until 6.00). Do get in touch if you are interested. My telephone number is 015396 20972.

SEDBERGH SCHOOL

In August, Sedbergh School celebrated the best A Level results for seven years, with significant improvement in pass rates and A* - B grades. The Upper Sixth pupils achieved outstanding results with more than half securing A* - B grades and overall, a 99.6% pass rate. Over a third of pupils achieved A*s and As and girls did particularly well this year, with more than 70 per cent achieving A* - B.

Headmaster Andrew Fleck commented on the good news: "We have seen significant signs of improvement in pass rates and average grades, which is something we've been working towards for three years. We are delighted that these efforts and strategies have paid off and that our pupils are placed in an excellent position for entering university. We wish our pupils well as they embark on their chosen paths." Discussing the school's excellent GCSE results, Mr Fleck said: "Pupils have achieved the highest proportion of A* passes for five years and have



achieved this on top of a busy schedule of extra-curricular interests; their time management skills and 'can-do' attitude will serve them well as they progress into Sixth Form education and beyond. Some of the highest grades were recorded by former Sedbergh Junior School pupils, from the local area – including pianist Toby Randall-Payley, Stephanie Gardner and Tom Robinson.

The new term began with equal success on the sports field, where pupils demonstrated this 'can-do' attitude. The Sedbergh sailing team of 13 pupils, one OS and one teacher were Highest Placed School Team in the Southport 24-hour endurance race (which is 4th in the list of the 50 top sailing events). All pupils sailed at least three hours, including some night/dark hours, which is very disorientating. In girls' first XI Hockey, the first clash of the season against Rossall School resulted in a 6-0 win for Brown, with an extremely high standard of play. New coach Mark Shopland, from Leeds, has already made a huge impact on the team. Boys in the first XV, captained by Asian Youth Games Gold Medalist James Christie, started the season by playing Sale Academy and Newcastle Falcons academy - with solid performances all day the squad is looking like a very exciting outfit. First XV coach Simon Mullholland started the season as a new father.

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There are more medals and international success stories to celebrate this term - Harry Reed (Sedgwick House) has been selected to be part of the UK team to take on Ireland in the inaugural running of the Shergar Cup, for Irish horse racing on 21st September, and Master I/c Shooting David Nuthall has been selected for the England U25 team in the Commonwealth Shooting Federation Championships. David won the Bronze medal in the individual competition. He coached OS Rory Fagan (Evans House OS 2013) who has just returned from a successful tour of Canada with the British Cadet Rifle team.

Music and Arts look set to impress. The Choral Society, which is open to local people, began rehearsing Vivaldi's Magnificat and Britten's 'Rejoice in the Lamb' for a concert at Ripon Cathedral on 7th December. The Music Department has attracted a number of excellent new music scholars and the chapel choir is already in fine voice, many of the choristers having returned from a tour of Northern Italy during the summer holidays. On 17th October there will be a screening of a film project. The Fool's Burden - adapted from 'Woyzeck', Georg Buchner's unfinished 19th-century masterpiece. This was filmed throughout June, both on location in the surrounding area and in the school's own greenscreen studio. It draws on the talents of more than 40 pupils and includes specially commissioned Bunraku



puppets and music from the Rubber Duck Orchestra.

In September, the school's youngest pupils moved down the road to Casterton and the prep school is now known as Casterton, Sedbergh Preparatory School. The former site of the Junior School on Loftus Hill is now a Sixth Form Centre.

they have experienced in recent winters as more people have suffered ill health due to the cold. Although this is a significant amount of money (Morecambe Bay was one of only twelve to be given this extra funding in the North West of England), I am afraid the Trust needs much more to close its funding gap. So I will not be stopping here and will continue to press the Government for even more money, particularly to help cope with our unique geographical needs which lead to the need for the Trust to be spread across three main hospital sites.

I was also pleased to see the Pupil Premium funding will increase again next year. The Pupil Premium was introduced by the Coalition Government a couple of years ago to support our more disadvantaged children. Since its introduction the amount that is being provided has more than doubled so that some schools in our area are getting nearly £150,000 extra funds as a result. That could fund four extra teachers.

I am pressing the Government to revisit their plans for the funding they provide for rural GPs. Currently the Government is proposing to phase out the extra money it gives to rural surgeries to compensate them for having fewer patients. This makes no sense to me, surely, as health care is moved more and more into the community the need for these surgeries will only grow and so if they are closed it becomes another thing that makes it harder for a broad range

of people to live in small villages and towns.

The Settle & Carlisle Railway passing through Dent Station and Upper Dentdale has since 1876 been a feature of the landscape and an important part of community life. Having been consecrated in 1838 St John's Church, Cowgill has played an equally pivotal role in the life of the community, to the many visitors to the Yorkshire Dales, walkers on The Dales Way and the builders of the Railway in the early 1870's.

In celebration of it's 175th Anniversary and also in recognition of the rich local Rail Heritage, 'An **Evening with Father's Slides'** will be held at St John's Church, Cowgill from 6.30 pm on Saturday 26th October.

The father in question is the eminent Railway Photographer and Author, the late *Derek Cross*. 


FAMILY MUSINGS

approaches we can feel the nip in the air that signals autumn is underway. In the church plans are made to celebrate the gifts of the Harvest with special services morning and evening.

This year at St Andrew's on Sunday 13th October at 10.30am we are holding a traditional Harvest Festival

service where everyone is invited to bring gifts of food which at some point in the service they will take to the altar where they will be received and blessed by the vicar before being used to help those in need.

We ask that the gifts of food will be dry goods, tins, or packets for example: baked beans, tea, coffee, sugar, breakfast cereals, tins of fruit, pasta, rice, etc. They will be taken to the "King's Food Bank" collection point in Kendal and distributed to those in need in our area. The box we have permanently in St Andrew's has been well used and regularly every week since before last Christmas a delivery has been made to the collection point. At 6.30pm Choral Evensong will complete our celebrations for which the choir will have been well rehearsed.

The choir has a long tradition at St Andrew's, the first evidence being an account for "candles for the singers" in 1789 of one shilling and five pence. In the early 19th century there were 'singers and musicians" in the gallery at the west end of the church.... probably a very boisterous bunch! In 1851 a barrel organ placed in the north aisle was introduced to accompany them.

The first pipe organ for St Andrew's was built in 1868 and placed where we have our present organ. The "singers" came to sit, (perhaps under



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the watchful eye of the vicar?), in the choir stalls which Sedbergh School boys before the building of their own chapel had previously occupied. The gallery was later removed.

We are fortunate to have a keen, enthusiastic, friendly and loyal choir who endeavour to sing an anthem during each service and lead the congregational singing. The repertoire reaches from Renaissance to the present day with the hope there is something to please everyone.

The choir aims to continue the choral tradition and is determined to keep going...however; there are spaces in the choir stalls for new members, especially on the back row for tenors and basses. Age is no barrier; a welcoming hand will be extended to all.

AUGUST WEATHER

Another warm month but not such a prolonged heat wave as last month.

The highest temperature was during the last week reaching 74F (23.5C). The coolest night was on the last night dropping down to 43.2F (6.5C) There must have been plenty of cloud cover because the wind chill readings did not fall below these minimum temperatures. Wind speeds were in double figures except for 2 days when the maximum gust was not from the North West. We continue to have plenty of rainfall logging 8.16 inches for the month. Some parts of the UK, the Midlands and East Anglia, only registered 2/3 inch for the month. Our longest dry spell was 6 days but this produced a lot of activity in the fields with bale wrappers whirring well into the night!



Did you spot my mistake last month? When converting a F temperature to C I moved the wrong way across the conversion tables and put 105F down as 71C!!!! It should have read 41C! I thing I would have lost more than a few pounds in sweat at 71C!!

The warm damp weather has produced plenty of growth. Trees seem to have exploded this year as have nettles and thistles! I spent 2 ¹/₂ days pulling up thistles before the wind blew the seed heads around. My

neighbour would not have been a happy bunny with the prevailing wind taking them over the hedge! They also acts as a harbour for blackfly. At long last as the month drew to a close the buddleia started to flower and we had a few peacock butterflies in the garden. Towards the end of the month the swallows were obviously starting to congregate before their Autumn migration. I counted 27 youngsters on the wires over the shippon so the local swallows have obviously had a good breeding season. One neighbour has had 5 nests this season in her garage! Although "ours" have flown the nest several of them still come to roost in the kennel each night. An unusual visitor to the feeding station has been an albino sparrow! I suspect it is not totally albino as I cannot see a pink eye and although it doesn't seem to have any markings it is not totally white.

We have however been disappointed with the state of the pavements etc., with regard to weeds - not just in Main Street but as far afield as the pavement alongside

ROYAL BRITISH LEGION

Poppy time in Sedbergh and District. Thomas Birkett Stockdale was just one day short of his 20th birthday when he was killed at Ypres in 1917. He was said to be a fine young man with much promise. He still has relatives in Sedbergh.

Flight Sergeant William Dawson. (Jack's Brother) RAFVR was killed and lost to his family when his Lancaster was shot down during his 28th operational sortie in 1943. He was just 22.

Just 2 of so many from our town and area who gave their lives in the great conflagrations of the last century.

Others survived but had their lives shattered by wounds or the experience of war.

This is the time of year when we can reflect and remember these men and women and consider the undeniable fact that without their sacrifices we as individuals would have very different lives, or more likely we would not exist at all.

If I may use a recent quote from the eminent historian Max Hastings -

"European freedom, justice and democracy would have paid a dreadful forfeit if the Kaiser and later Hitler and their cohorts had prevailed. Thus those who fought and died in the ultimately successful struggles to prevent such an outcome did not perish for nothing, save insofar as all sacrifice in all wars is just cause for lamentation".

The Royal British Legion carries the responsibility for such remembrance and as many of you will know we have a dedicated team who work extremely hard to raise as much as possible during these few days. The money raised goes to help the veterans of service and of conflict and their families who are in need.

The people of this area are asked every year to remember and to give as much as possible for this truly worthy and proper cause. YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Have a say on planning plans Public consultation begins on Monday (September 16) on a range of options that will shape the way planning decisions are made in the

Yorkshire Dales National Park for the next 15 years.

Ideas include encouraging more overnight stays in the National Park by developing new visitor facilities and new camping and touring pitches. Another is to allocate brownfield sites near Sedbergh to develop new business uses while a third is to review quarrying in the National Park.

The options are the latest phase of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's (YDNPA) drive to create a new Local Plan for 2015 to 2030.

Last year the public was asked to have a say in the creation of a new, five-year National Park Management Plan that sets out how the National Park should be looked after in the future.


It was produced by a partnership of 15 organisations, including district and county councils, the Environment Agency, the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority and Natural England, as well as groups like the Dales Farmer Network.

Following a huge response to the consultation, the Management Plan was launched earlier this year and the objectives in it that are related to development will be delivered through the Local Plan.

The consultation period will end on

October 29. A draft Local Plan will then be produced for further public consultation next year. A final submission version of the Plan will be sent to Communities and Local Government Secretary Eric Pickles for approval in 2015.

We were treated to an evening of poetry with Stuart Manger: Stuart read a wide variety of poems in his own inimitable style and helped his audience to understand more about the language and meanings, personal and public, explicit and implicit, of each poem. We were involved from the start and had a go at unraveling two poems for ourselves. Stuart is passionate about poetry and this inspiring talk may have sent some of us away determined to read more poetry ourselves.

The walking group enjoyed a wonderful walk around Semerwater,

which is the second largest natural lake in North Yorkshire. Anne Petvt led the walk in her usual informed and entertaining manner: The weather was soft and warm, the only hiccup were the number of flying ants that tried to share our lunch. While the two drivers went to collect the cars, the rest of the group walked the extra two miles, along the river bank, to Bainbridge, where some members tried the zip wire and swings on the village green (oh yes, there is photographic proof!) We had a quick look around the National Park Centre before heading for the tea shop.

The reading group has been reading 'Suite Francaise'; this was part of a planned sequence of five novels by Irene Nemirovsky, a French writer of Ukrainian Jewish origin. In July 1942 the writer was arrested and sent to Auschwitz where she sadly died. The note books containing the first two parts of the sequence were saved and not examined until 1998. CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST *Tree Trail in Dent.*

On a remarkably fine sunny Bank Holiday Sunday, a small but select group gathered in Dent Car Park eager to learn about our native trees from John Mounsey.

He began by explaining some of the ways in which trees over the ages had taken root in this area and how their seeds had been transported by various agents. Much forest had been cleared by early agriculturists before the Romans came, probably by stone axes or ring barking.

Most trees have to be pollinated by insects, bees in particular, so the climate would have to be suitable for these to thrive. Following the last Ice Age dwarf birch would probably be the first to appear. We found ourselves standing by a birch tree and this proved to be a hybrid between the silver and downy varieties. This is a relatively shortlived tree and as it declined would be attacked by fungal growth. Woodpeckers are also very partial to rotten birch trees. The next tree was a rowan or mountain ash. Trees breathe through slits in the bark and horizontal examples were very evident here. Rowans have big buds and grow slowly. Some trees have thick bark e.g.the redwood and these provide protection from fire.

A sycamore was the next in line. Few animals feed on it but it attracts greenfly which feed on a sugar solution from the tree. Ladybirds feed on the greenfly and all the resultant sticky goo falls on your car if you are unwise enough to park underneath. Small birds can feed on both insects. The sycamore has only been in Britain for about the last 400 years so is, strictly speaking, not native. It is more resistant than some to wind so is often used for windbreaks. Meanwhile the wind helps disperse the winged seeds.

The group moved on to a cherry tree and examined the little red sugar producing glands on the leaf stalks. This tree's leaves were curled by aphid damage. There are several native wild cherry varieties including bird cherry and blackthorn or sloe.

A Norway maple stood near. This is very similar to the sycamore but with flatter leaves. To add to the possible confusion, sycamore flowers hang down but maple leaves go up except later when fruiting. The sycamore can get black patches on its leaves from fungus but this condition is unknown in towns and cities where sulphurous compounds in the air destroy the infestation..





Turning downhill we found a goat or pussy willow. The willow family includes aspen and poplar. This one produces the familiar furry catkins. Willows, being relatively quick growing were often pollarded or coppiced in the past for wood products like broom and tool handles. Wooden bobbins for thread were often made from willow. Willow and reed beds can also be used as water filtration plants and an example of the latter was observed later.

Nearby we found an ash. Its seeds are wind borne with only one wing and all its leaves tend to fall at once. Sadly our native ash is threatened by infected saplings imported from abroad. Another In these damper areas at the lower part of the park there were several examples of fungi. Many grow on dead wood making interesting patterns and colours in the timber.

There are two species of native oak, sessile and pedunculate. We found what appeared to be a hybrid here. The pedunculate has an acorn on a long stem and its trunk branches low down whereas the sessile does the opposite with more of a long straight trunk. Hybridisation is common in the British Isles. Oaks support more insects than any other species (even willows) and those grown on slopes develop the angled lower branches used by early builders as crucks. In this area suckers were growing vigorously of poplar and cherry. Poplars and aspen trees were spotted next. The leaf stalks of the aspen are flattened catching the wind and causing the "quiver like an aspen" effect. Toadstools were also evident some of which associate themselves with certain trees e.g. the fly agaric with the birch. Diamond shaped marks on the trunks are typical of the poplar.

Near the bottom gate was a lime, the favourite of beekeepers. The alder next door is popular with siskins and red polls. Its green fruits turn brown and open on ripening ready for the birds to spread the seeds in their own special way. The alder grows in symbiosis with certain bacteria which absorb nitrogen from the air. These organisms live in nodules on the roots improving soil fertility. The timber's resistance to moisture made it ideal for clog making and early wooden drains.

Hoping to have absorbed at least part of this fascinating information, the group dispersed after thanking John very much indeed for his informative talk. Susan Garnett

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



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
