NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUM A summary of the meeting held at Sedbergh Medical Centre on Tuesday 22nd October 2013 County Cllr Nick Cotton introduced his colleague County Cllr Roger Bingham and welcomed everyone to the meeting. Local Policing Update Sgt John Stephens updated the Forum on the crime statistics from the past 3 months (July, August and September) for the Sedbergh area. Sedbergh had 12 ASB and 17 crimes which is an increase of 12 and has included burglaries of sheds, farms etc. More resources have been focused in the area and targeted vehicles	have been stopped. This has resulted in only 1 burglary in September. The suspects are from the North East and Yorkshire. The mobile police station has been around the area. The Spar car park in Sedbergh was one of the locations and it was generally well received. <i>Community Speed Watch</i> Michael Roberts spoke to the Forum about Community Speed Watch – the top 3 concerns for Parish Councils are litter, dog fowling and speeding. Cumbria Constabulary is now setting up 'Community Speedwatch' schemes to address speeding. A community will purchase its own speed gun and volunteers will be trained accordingly and go out with

the speed gun to monitor traffic speeds. The speed gun will record the speed of the vehicle and the volunteer would record the car registration to pass on to an administrator who will record the information and write a letter to the offender indicating that they have been identified as speeding. A database will be built up and repeat offenders will be recorded and the information will be taken back to the CSO for further action. It then may be necessary for a Speed Indication Device to be put in place. The more intelligent SID's can now record the vehicle type, time, date and speed. Trading Standards

Alison Nutall, Principal Trading Standards Officer told the Forum how Trading Standards provide help and assistance to residents, businesses and visitors/tourists in Cumbria. Nearly half of the UK adult population has been targeted by a scam, with 1

in 15 people falling victim. Doorstep crime can involve rouge traders offering home improvements work or high pressure doorstep sellers. Bogus officials can include charity collectors or utility companies and favourite tactics include unmarked vehicles or hire vehicles, visiting an area for a short time period, targeting elderly & vulnerable people, fictitious trading names and mobile or 0800 numbers. Anyone who wants to report a suspicious trader to Trading Standards can contact them on 08454 04 05 06.

There are 35 no cold calling zones throughout the county which have been set up to deter cold callers and to raise local awareness, they also provide confidence and re assurance to residents within the zone.

Some scams to be aware of include websites offering passport checking or charging for the European Health Card, Charity Collection, Bogus loans



which ask for an upfront payment and telephone calls purporting to be from HMRC. To avoid such scams it is advised to register with the mailing prevention service and telephone preference service. Buy with confidence is an on-going scheme set up by Cumbria Trading Standards. Businesses carrying this logo:



have been vetted by Trading Standards and agreed to abide by certain conditions.


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textile heritage of the Western Dales with Farfield Mill and Sedbergh at its heart.

#### SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

Sara Losh

In the second talk of the 2013-2014 winter programme Raymond Whittaker introduced members to the architecture of Sara Losh, a notable nineteenth-century lady who was responsible for 18 building projects in the village of Wreay which is about five miles south of Carlisle. In particular, she is remembered for the design and construction of St Mary's Church in the early 1840s. Sara was one of four children born to John and Isabella Losh. They lived in Woodside, a large dwelling in Wreay and their wealth was derived from an alkali factory and mining interests in

north east England. They were a cultured family and associated with influential and intellectual figures like Wordsworth, Coleridge and Southey. Sara and her sister Katharine were joint heirs to the estate when in turn their father, mother and brother died. Sara and Katharine were very close and after Katharine died at the age of 47 Sara began to design and build the church partly as a memorial to her.

Raymond said that the only person in the nineteenth century to give any substantial information about Sara's life was Dr Henry Lonsdale in his book, *The Worthies of Cumberland* where he portrayed Sara as a woman of many talents. Educated in Wreay



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and later in Bath and London, she spoke several languages, developed an understanding of art and architectural techniques on her travels in Europe and was a skilled craftswoman. However, as Jenny Uglow has pointed out in her more recent book about Sara and her achievements, it has been impossible to discover much about Sara's personality and beliefs,

since her personal papers and diaries have not survived. Jenny described the search for the 'real' Sara as 'chasing after ghosts'

and maintained that she can best be understood through her architectural legacy and in particular through the design of St Mary's Church and the artistic expertise that is revealed in its decoration.

In a series of beautiful slides Raymond illustrated many aspects of the church, most of which was built and decorated by local artisans. The church was constructed in the style of a rectangular Italian basilica with a semicircular apse at one end. He compared its design to that of a

Roman law court and the prominent position of the altar as similar to that of the table in a basilica where animal entrails would have been consulted when important decisions had to be taken in Classical times. Raymond's slides illustrated the importance of symbolism in the decoration. For example, death which is represented by two large poisoned arrows carved



on the door of the church is superseded by many symbols of regeneration in the interior of the building. Although there are no human forms or religious

iconography in the decoration, the depiction of animals, birds, vegetation and fossils interspersed with many carvings of Sara's signature pine cone provide a feast for the eve.

After Raymond's presentation, it was easy to understand why people come from all over the world to see such a beautiful and thought provoking building and why, in the opinion of experts like Nicolaus Pevsner and Simon Jenkins, it is one of the most important churches in the country.

- The extension to the car park at the People's Hall has now been completed.
- AMENITIES COMMITTEE
- After some discussion it was decided to defer a decision on employing a parish handyperson for a workable plan to be drawn up.
- A quote has been arranged for a new parish light in Loftus Hill.
- A 3ft gate is to be erected at the back of the garage at the People's

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Hall with a "No Dogs" sign attached to it to try and deter people with dogs from going onto the field.

#### **COUNCILLORS CORNER** From Cllr lan

It is several years now since the Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale Local Area Partnership (LAP) came into being. It is constituted by local councillors at County, District and Parish levels together with officers from these Councils and representatives from other bodies and organisations who are called in from time to time by the LAP to assist it with its deliberations. Over the years the LAP has considered a number of matters common to the area, particularly highways issues, and has also made a number of



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grants to individual Parishes for the furtherance of local projects. In these straitened financial times however less money has been forthcoming to fund its activities and a number of LAP members have starting voting with their feet by not attending meetings with the same regularity as in the past. At our last meeting we therefore decided to take a hard look at what our future vision and purposes might be and whether or not the LAP was continuing to fulfil a useful purpose. Strong views were expressed on both sides. There is no doubt that if Parishes act together rather than separately they have more "clout" and can also support each other with knowledge and

information rather than each Parish reinventing the wheel. There are also matters common across the LAP (such as Appleby Fair Travellers) which benefit greatly from a common rather than divided approach. However LAP meetings do take up time and energy etc for its members and the question arises as to whether or not that time might be better spent doing other things! So we decided not to have our next meeting until well into the New Year to give us all a chance to weigh up the pro's and con's of continuing as at present, changing our approach or deciding to disband the LAP altogether. More on this anon.

A couple of weeks ago I attended a

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training session at SLDC on home energy improvements. More and more people are beginning to feel the pinch when it comes to heating their homes and supplying their energy needs. Indeed some are in the unenviable position of either eating or heating which at the present day is guite unacceptable. However there are new initiatives afoot to address these issues. In particular the Home Heating Cost Reduction Obligation is a new system of grant funding under the general heading of the Energy Company Obligation (ECO) which is available now and which will focus on providing up front support for thermal performance measures which will help households to heat their homes

more affordably. The local face of this national initiative is the Cumbria Affordable Warmth Project which will arrange amongst other things for Energy Performance Surveys, help with funding and, for those households who meet the benefit criteria, free heating repairs, replacement boilers, draft proofing and insulation measures. The surveys and work will be carried out by the Projects Agents, TADEA, a company with specialist knowledge in this field. Thanks all of you who have been in touch over the state of the roads around Sedbergh. I am sure that this will also be discussed in the articles by your councillors. Anyway as you will know Cumbria Highways have acted on our complaints about the state of the A684 near Lily Mere with warning lights but clearly something is seriously wrong with the design of Tel. 015396 20148 the road during rain.

However, I really do not think that a email ianmcpherson24@hotmail.com speed indicator is the answer, clearly Tel. 015396 20648 speed is not the only issue as some *Nick Cotton:* people have been losing control when email red.pedal@virgin.net they really have not been going that



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#### fast.

Cumbria Highways say there is nothing more they can do until the weather improves without making things a lot worse. I am not at all sure that this is the case, if the weather does get icy we need to be sure that people can drive to and from Sedbergh safely. I have offered to contact the Department of Transport to see what guidance they can provide. It is a bit of a shame really as we were all so pleased when the road was at last resurfaced. I will keep pushing to see what more can be done.

I have also been in touch with Cumbria Highways over the closure of the Hawes road. Obviously the work needs to be done to stop it sliding into the river and there is a substantial bit of engineering involved. However, I don't think that they have really looked into how to get things sorted as quickly as possible. To completely close the road for such a long period of time with the consequent lack of access for emergency services, let alone the massive detours that people need to make to get around is simply unacceptable.

I have been chasing BT for weeks now to find out their plans for the role out of superfast broadband. So far all that I have had back are responses that tell us nothing. We need to know as soon as possible when and in



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particular where the company is planning to upgrade broadband provision across the county. Their decisions will have a significant effect not just on people at home but where businesses decide to locate. Their delay simply holds up other people.

It is a bit of surprise that BT can be so slow, they were pretty fast to respond to a motion I submitted in Parliament calling on them and Electricity Northwest to abandon plans to remove street lights from their poles and pylons. In that case BT had good news as they promised not to do this. They can respond quickly when it is in their interest to do so.

I hope you have a great Christmas

and I wish you all the very best for 2014. Thanks so much to Dennis for all of his work on Lookaround over the past year. It is a magnificent publication of which I hope he is duly proud.


#### OFF TO ITALY ONCE MORE

#### LAURA COAKES

Speech and Language Therapy My name is Laura Coakes and I am an experienced speech and language therapist (HCPC Registered, cert MRCSLT, MASLTIP). I graduated from Leeds Metropolitan University in 1997. For the next nine years I worked for the NHS in Scotland. In 2006 I emigrated to Australia and spent six years working in remote towns before moving to Hobart in Tasmania in 2012. I returned to Sedbergh in July 2013 after the birth of my son.

As a speech and language therapist I work with children and adults to help them reach their full communication potential. I also provide support to

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children who have difficulties eating, drinking and swallowing. I work in partnership with parents, carers, education and other involved professionals to identify goals and deliver therapy. My commitment that I bring to my work was acknowledged in 2011 when I was awarded Speech Pathologist of the Year (Western Australia).

Why is speech and language therapy important for children? Communication skills are essential for a child's social, emotional and educational development. A child who has difficulty communicating may have difficulty making friends and learning to read and write. Some children experience frustration when others do not understand them or they may not join in as much at nursery or school. For children who have eating, drinking and swallowing difficulties a speech and language therapist can provide strategies that help them to develop these skills and also ensure that they are safe at mealtimes.

Who provides speech and language therapy? Speech and language therapy is available from the NHS. If you have concerns about yourself or your child you can speak to your GP, Health Visitor or teacher for advice. Speech and language therapy is also available privately from speech and language therapists working in independent practice. In January 2014 I will be working as an independent speech and language therapist, based in Sedbergh. Some

of the areas that I will be able to help with include therapy for children who are:

- late to start talking.
- difficult to understand or have difficulty pronouncing sounds.
- experiencing difficulties understanding what people are saying.
- getting stuck on words (stammering).

If you think your child may benefit from private speech and language therapy please contact me for more information and to see how I may be able to help.



the 60sF (16-18C) and only 2 days dropping below 40F (4.5C). The maximum recorded was 64.6F (18.5C) and the minimum 36.9F (3C). On this night there was the first ground frost or a grass frost as the BBC calls it these days!! The windchill took the temperatures to freezing or below on 6 nights. It was a windy month with all maximum gusts in double figures. The highest being

24.2 mph. In the middle if the month the wind direction was generally from a South easterly direction. Rainfall totalled 5 inches but there were only 4 days on which it did not rain!! The longest dry spell was 4 days.

There seems to be a massive crop of fruit both on fruit trees and the various hedgerow and garden berries. The birds should be able to feed well on rowan, hips and haws, blackberries, where they haven't been picked by folk walking the lanes, and crab apples. Many apples that are next to a branch have already been pecked by blackbirds.

Unfortunately they are not satisfied by eating one apple they peck bits out of several! A very occasional butterfly has appeared, usually a peacock, though I have seen one rare, for this season, painted lady. The mild temperatures have kept many of the leaves on the trees and allowed the grass to continue to grow. I am sure those with stock are pleased to see this! On the down side I thought when I cut the grass last month that would be it for the year but unfortunately it has grown and it is too wet to get on the ground to cut it now! I will have to bring the sheep across!! I have, this morning, received an excellent poster produced jointly by the BBC and Open University on the Great British Year to coincide with the TV programme of the same name. It shows which plants and animals you could see in different months and deals with topics such as migration and hibernation. It will keep me happy for hours!!

#### **CUMBRIA COUNTY COUNCIL**

#### A684 LILYMERE

*Letter to MP Tim Farron* Hello Tim,

I have observed the introduced "safety measures". These basically consist of temporary "slippery road" prop up signs. (which will no doubt blow down in the gales - thus creating more hazards.) They have also installed a series of double vertical grey metal posts, no doubt on which to install permanent"hazardous road" signs.

To me, the latter indicates that they obviously have NO intention of making immediate improvements, (especially before freezing winter weather make the stretch of road even more dangerous!) or else why would they install a provision for permanent signs? If they can find the funds for, the manpower for, and act so quickly to do that, that why not address the real problem - i.e. the road surface?

Perhaps it is just a measure to "cover their backs", so any complaints can be fobbed of the along the lines of "there are dangerous road" sign on that stretch". **Someone is going to get killed this winter!** 

There is also the issue that, if installed, substantial road signs on that stretch will just create an extra hazards for sliding vehicles to collide with, thus even more potential casualties ( a stone wall will "give way" - to some extent, collapse with a colliding vehicle - a metal pole will not!

I am surprised that County highways the contracts they tender, or the



have not come with the reply " Well everyone was complaining about the potholes and we resolved that with resurfacing ". Yes, it looked very nice and pretty with a lovely smooth surface, but did they give the contractors a stipulation that it had to be a surface compatible with a heavily used A- road which suffers severe weather conditions, or were the contractors free to dream up a "nice-looking surface" which maybe secured them the contract a cheaper price?.

County highways really need to take responsibility for either their own actions, perhaps **their** specification in the contracts they tender, or the

provision of services provided by their contractor.

I know this matter is no way within my role as a Kendal Town Councillor, but, as you are well aware, having grown up in Sedbergh and commuted to Kendal - often by motorcycle. in the 1980s ( no decent buses then, but that's I believed a resolved issue unlike workers buses in Kendal another County issue!) I know that A684 road inside out and can never understand why the road from the 1960s motorway stretch to Lilymere simply have just not been given, a what "half mile", by pass?

Actually, as a former motorcyclist ( especially on that road in all weathers), when I saw the works being carried out to repair that pot holed area, I DID remark something along the lined of "Looks nice, smooth, but no grip, - IT WILL BE DEADLY IN WINTER". If I spotted that as a lay man, why didn't the "experts" at County highways engineers?

"County highways may be saving money on road surfacing, but what about the cost of emergency services attending incidents? What about the NHS costs for subsequent health provision and treatment and provision? Lack of adequate road surfacing provision may help the County Council highways department to balance their budget, but all the other costs come from the taxes we pay and all come out of the "big pot", and we have to balance these figures.

There is a financial issue about people losing their vehicles in this way. Even IF they can afford to be fully insured these days (although of course insurance companies never FULLY pay the replacement cost - it'll probably cost accident victims a few thousand to make up the difference for a comparable vehicle), but what if it was someone with an "old banger" on third party insurance on minimum wage? They would have lost their vehicle, their transport to work, thus potentially their livelihood! When County highways are balancing their books, it's a pity that they don't have to have a consideration of if they had to pay compensation to victims from their neglect of roadways, - how much would that would cost!" ## BOOKWORM

'What I have been reading this month'.....

1. Born 1900 by Hunter Davies (non fiction)

HD interviews a range of interesting people born in 1900 and alive in 1998 (eg a Manchester millworker, a Cambridge university professor) from all walks of life and with good stories to tell. He also summarises the history of some 'things' that were 'born' in 1900 eg McDonalds, West Ham United. Easy to read and with some Cumbrian references.

2. Waiting for Columbus by Thomas Trofimuk (fiction)

An unusual mysterious blend of a fantasy and factual journey through grief and traumatic loss told in an arresting narrative. A man who believes he is Christopher Columbus is admitted to Seville's Institute for the mentally ill and is assigned to Nurse Consuela. She hears his stories which are 15th century history with a modern twist (eg Queen Isabella rings him up on a mobile phone )and gradually beomes attached to him. Meanwhile interpol agent Emile back at work from a spell off tries to locate missing people. The 2 threads connect with some astute observations of life, people and events.

3. The Novel in the Viola by Natasha Solomons (fiction)

I found this an extraordinarily bewitching treat of a novel. Elise is a young, rich Viennese Jew who finds work as a parlour maid in Dorset 1938 while her gifted musician sister goes to USA and her parents wait for visas. Elise tries her best as a domestic servant at Tyneford and also falls in love with the estate owner's son Kit. The class system at the outbreak of the 2nd world war and the changes that are coming are detailed in this story which is movingly and subtley written. Elise changes her name to Alice and discovers that she can love two people. Her father gave her a copy of his last unpublished radical novel which is hidden in a viola that she took to England - hence the title. 4. The Interpretation of Murder by Jed Rubenfeld (fiction)

Freud's visit to America in 1909, a murdered debutante, an heiress who

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
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slide at Garsdale Station from more than 50 years ago! Many thanks to Robin Hughes, Heather and Graham Fraser for supporting and organising the event.



# **Gentral Asia**

a year's journey by bicycle Sedbergh People's Hall. **7:30 pm Friday 31<sup>st</sup> January** Tickets £5 at the door. All proceeds will go to the People's Hall Regeneration Fund

The story of the journey told by Hugh and Pauline Symonds with photographs and music. Bar and interval.

**CENTRAL ASIA** From the Yorkshire Dales to Central Asia – a year's journey by bicycle Someone's travel blog we had read termed our destination for the day, 'Shit pee', so we weren't expecting much. On the way in to town a driver stopped to chat, and as he left he put four grand in Hugh's hand (4000 Tenge, around £16), driving off and wishing us 'good luck' before we could protest! He also told us that there was nowhere to get water between Shetpe and the next town of Beyneu, 350 km away – he wasn't the only person who told us that, and it was just as well we didn't take them seriously or we would have been towing a trailer full of it for the next four days.

In Shetpe there are shops for fruit, vegetables and other essentials. In the dry sunshine it didn't seem that bad, but we couldn't help but wonder what sort of life people lead in this far-flung place. We found ourselves a 'hotel'. A comfortable enough room, a shower downstairs and a pit loo outside (water is scarce), all for 6 grand (6000 Tenge or around £25).

Not that cheap really, but I wanted a shower and felt the need to wash some underwear before the four or five days in the wild and empty steppe that lay ahead.

We went to the 'KA $\phi$ E' (cafe) next door for dinner. Unable to make much sense of the menu written in Cyrillic, we caught on to the words 'Shashlyk' and 'Pilov' and ordered those – with draught beer of some unspecified type. We really were lost when it came to communication. As so often happened, they tried to 'phone a friend' to help us out, but as was frequently the case the friend's English wasn't much better than our Kazakh/Russian.

Shetpe was a key supply point on our journey across around 860 km of vast and empty steppe, from the isolated eastern Caspian port of Aqtau in Kazakhstan to Qonghirat in Western Uzbekistan. The previous two days of riding from Aqtau had been the easy bit. The road had been paved, if a little broken at times, and we had found places to get essentials every 70 km or so. The onward road had a terrible reputation. One blog I

read termed it as the 'worst road in the world'. We knew little for sure about where we would find food and water.

It was hot at times - the thermometer reached 50° C at one point and it was frequently in the high forties - and the only shade in the waterless expanse was under the verandas of the chaihana (tea shops), the shade of the odd ruined building and a slither of relief from a telegraph pole. At one point we had 27 litres of water on board between us fortunately our bikes are strong! But, we were lucky. We had just missed the rains which turn the track into a thick mix of sticky mud and we were just ahead of the ridiculous temperatures which force cyclists to shelter in storm water drainage pipes during the midday heat. The gravel road was a nightmare surface which reduced the Willie Betz lorries driven by Eastern Europeans to a crawl, but off-shoot tracks on the hard baked sand of the steppe often made for good riding on two wheels. Camping was no problem - great flat expanses of nothing provided atmospheric and

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It took ten days to reach Qonghirat, with a day's recuperation in the midway oil town of Beyneu where there are camels in the streets and a railway station which has tempted many a cyclist to give up riding. It was not the sort of ride you would choose to repeat, but for us it was an essential and truly memorable element of our year's travel out to the heart of Central Asia, crossing many different countries and landscapes and travelling through all seasons. It was one of the challenges, possibly the greatest challenge to be overcome in the pursuit of a continuous journey and we had set our heart on it being continuous from the moment we pedalled down the lane from our home in Sedbergh.

After escaping the full force of winter in Southern Europe,



occasionally enjoying cappuccinos in the warmth of the sunlit Mediterranean, we had no alternative but to traverse the high ground of Turkey in February and March. We crossed the last pass at 2550m in a blizzard, with winds so strong that we had to walk at times. But once again we were lucky - the route would almost certainly have been closed the following day. We had made it to the lower ground of Georgia, a Christian country with a delightfully impossible script, delicious food, fine fruity red wine and archetypal examples of crumbling soviet tower blocks. Azerbaijan followed, Baku being the key point for getting visas for the 'Stans ', (a collection of ex-Soviet Central Asian republics about which we had known precious little prior to this bike ride) and the port for the infamously difficult to pin down freight boat across the Caspian Sea. After the challenge of the steppe we went on to explore the magnificently restored blue-tiled Silk Road cities of Uzbekistan. We took the high road through Tajikistan along the Pamir Highway, which must be one of the

world's greatest adventure bike rides.

This was our third major journey by bike, the first being through South America in 2010/11 and the second to Australia and New Zealand in 2011/12 - both of these having had the advantage of escaping the northern winter. We had always dreamt of setting out from home and just seeing how far we could get in a year. After crossing the high pastures of Kyrgyzstan dotted with yurts of nomads, we reached our journey's end in the old capital of Kazakhstan, over 3000 km distant from Aqtau where we had entered the country for the first time over three months earlier. Almaty, was previously named Alma-Ata meaning 'Father of Apples' – apples come from Kazakhstan.

All these factors contribute to a rich language learning environment. Parents who have used signs with their babies report that their babies are less frustrated because they can use a sign to communicate what they want, such as wanting something to eat or drink.

sore ribs. Kalum was disappointed but had to put that behind for the following days final.



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

JUBILEE WOOD Our own special piece of wooded gill was designated in 2003 as a result of, initially, an Earthwatch grant then with further funding assistance from

Cumbrian Woodlands, Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust and United Utilities. Since then much hard work has been done by Cumbria Wildlife Trust Local Support Group, Yorkshire Dales, Sedbergh School and Settlebeck School volunteers to coppice woodland, clear undergrowth and plant new hedge whips. An interpretive board was put in place and protective fencing erected. In our first spring these efforts were rewarded by a splendid show of wild flowers.

A succession of Primary School pupils have visited to explore, draw, and hear about the variety of habitats and their wildlife and we hope this can continue but ..... after some very strange weather, long wet winter and hot summer, brambles, not particularly evident before, have taken over. It is virtually impossible to clamber down to the stream and hunt for flowers and fungi. If some sort of order is to be restored we need some willing bramble bashers. They could be individuals or groups and all their assistance would be greatly appreciated. Wooded gills hold the remnants of the native flora and often fauna which covered much more of our hillsides and with the exclusion of stock and some management, these can be preserved in their natural state.

## SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY ANGKOR

On 6<sup>th</sup> November the Sedbergh & District History Society was entertained to a talk by Dr Raynor Shaw as a result of his visit to Angkor about four years ago. Ever since he was quite a small boy and had first heard of Angkor Wat ,he had dreamt of going there, and so, when as a geologist he was asked to go and help assess one of the temples in the Angkor complex, which the French had said was likely to slip downhill, he had jumped at the chance.

He described the layout of the surrounding area, with it very flat plain, flooding in the wet season, and stretching to the hills some 40 miles away. Angkor means Great, and Thom means city, and the main complex is a walled city some two by three kilometres in extent and surrounded by a wide moat. In the centre of the city is a large pyramidical stone temple known as the Bayon (representing the Hindu sacred mountain, Mount Meru) which was the focus of the city. This temple and the walls are all that remains of the city as all other buildings, even the royal ones, were constructed of wood and have long disappeared. At its height the city may have contained as many as a million people, at a time (12<sup>th</sup> century) when London probably only had about 17,000 people.

Outside the city there were many stone temples, from small to huge, and numbering about 170. The famous one, of course, being Angkor



Wat ("Great Temple"). This building is truly huge, being about 190 metres by 200 metres. It is surprisingly plain in construction apart from a sort of inside out cloister facing outwards round the building and containing a frieze approximately four feet high which runs right around the temple, mostly showing the good soldiers (facing right) fighting the demons facing left.. The temple rises in three huge terraces to the top and is crowned with five towers, only three of which can be seen from afar at any one time. It again is surrounded by a wall which is between about 200 and 500 metres from the temple, and outwith that an enormous moat almost 200 yards wide. The famous views one sees on postcards (and in Raiders of the Lost Ark) of tree roots growing over and through the stones are in yet another temple, Ta Prohm, some considerable distance away, which has been deliberately left in the state in which it was found, and are not at Angkor Wat. Angkor Wat was never completely deserted and so did not get overtaken by the jungle. Like the other temples, Angkor Wat was

originally a Hindu temple but later the population converted to Buddhism in the 13<sup>th</sup> century. The amazingly sharp carvings (after 9 centuries) of the basse reliefs reflect this change

Dr Shaw pointed out that a large city such as this needed supplies, and in particular water. Cambodia has only two seasons, the wet and the dry. Angkor is beside the largest lake in south east Asia. In the dry season this lake is comparatively very small (2.700 sq km) and only about a metre deep and drains via the Tonle Sap river to join the Mekong at Phnom Phen about 100 kilometres south.. In



the wet season the melting snows in the Himalayas and the monsoon cause the Mekong to force the Tonle Sap river to flow backwards into the Tonle Sap lake, and it expands enormously and can be 9 metres deep and 16,000 sq km. It contains over 2000 varieties of fish, many of which take advantage of the backwards flowing river to spawn in the lake. The Khmer built numerous canals, and in particular a canal to bring the huge building blocks of sandstone from the hills 40 miles away. were raised above the ground by huge embankments.. Built by slave labour from the Khmers' successful wars, one of them is eight kilometres long.

The Khmer civilisation was at its height between the 9<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> centuries. It was at its height in the 12<sup>th</sup> century when a strong king, Survavarman, built Angkor Wat. A series of weak kings, possibly climate change with prolonged droughts, and war, culminated in the city being sacked by the Siamese in 1431. The next year when the Siamese came again the city was deserted, the population having moved south to the Mekong Delta, and ultimately to Phnom Phen. The jungle gradually took over, and the complex disappeared from history. It was not until the 19<sup>th</sup> century that it was really re-discovered, though intrepid explorers had reported huge temples in the jungle – and been disbelieved. [Foot note: The Khmer are the Cambodian people. In the 1960s and early 1970s there were three political parties, known simply as the Blue, White and Red Khmer. The latter was the Communist party, and was the one that ran out of control as the infamous Khmer Rouge (Cambodia having been part of French IndoChinal.




#### SEDBERGH SCHOOL LOCAL YOUNG PEOPLE'S FUND

This source of funding helps young people from the parishes of Sedbergh, Dent and Garsdale with educational and recreational needs beyond those provided by their current places of learning. The fund has been in existence for at least a century and was originally a fund for boys. Assistance for girls was added later as a separate fund and now the two funds have been amalgamated.

Students involved in the Sedbergh Town Twinning Student Exchange project were supported in August 2011 when 13 youngsters, aged 13 to 18 years visited our twin town of Zreče, enjoying the recreational facilities and learning about the culture of a country which suffered badly in both world wars. Slovenia was part of the communist state of Yugoslavia until 1991. They returned having appreciated warm hospitality and having made new friends. One of many lasting memories was the visit to the site of a wartime atrocity. Our young people were deeply moved by the experience.

In February 2014 another group of teenaged students living in Sedbergh and district and being educated at local schools will return to Zreče. They will be meeting their Slovenian contemporaries and enjoying everything that a ski resort and spa town can offer. Cultural visits will include a visit to the capital city Ljubljana and its Parliament.

Along with our local singers, we have others coming from as afar away as Hastings and Ullapool - we all hope to make a splendid start to the season of goodwill and look forward to seeing you at the Dent Christmas market when we sing there.



Also this year for the first time at the Dent folk carols weekend we have a free children's singing workshop led by Picolo Amabile leader Mel Rowe in Dent - all primary school children from years 1-4 are welcome. If you can't make that weekend, we

might see you when our local folk choirs, and the Cautley Carollers who I sing with, go on our annual star-lit walks through the winter landscape singing at the doors of cottages cradled in the dale and, more often than not, round the fires of the kindly dales folk who live here.

It's been a fabulous year for our singers.

We started just after the new year with our mountain singing retreat at the Black Sail youth hostel, one of the most remote hostels in England which you cannot drive to - the singers walked up from Buttermere over the Scarth Gap pass and sang on Haystacks, Great Gable and Pillar, ending the weekend with a lovely concert at the Bridge Hotel in Buttermere.



Our Spring Sing Thing weekend at Howtown by Ullswater (2014 is in

Sedbergh) just before Easter turned into a celebration of very wintry weather as we walked through 6 foot snow drifts to sing in the Martindale churches.

But the following week, on the Scottish island of Jura. we were in glorious sunshine, singing on a boat out to the Coryvrekin Whirlpool, on a walk to George Orwell's house, and in the Easter service at Craighouse. I've often felt that carol singing was too much fun to only do once a year so we finished our week by singing at some of the more remote cottages at the north end of the island near the estate mansion where we were staying. In one cottage, two young lads in their pyjamas leaned out of an upstairs window to hear us, while their grandad at the door told us how he had been to school in Sedbergh.

Our Midsummer Music of Martindale event saw our west gallery choir The Gladly Solemn Sound travelling back to this remote Lake District valley to sing in the old church - with songs on the Ullswater steamer and stories about the early 18th century choir led by Martindale schoolmaster John Jackson the second, who led the singers and instrumentalists with his fiddle in the old gallery. We followed the route taken by the 19th C. bobbin mill apprentices who walked walk from Howtown over the fell to the church and ended with afternoon tea in the old mill where they once worked. Our singers also travelled out to Slovenia where we sand at the Bohinj wild flower festival and



presented our squares embroidered with Sedbergh floral scenes, to add to the international patchwork. The Zrece choir, Zbor Jurij Vodovnik had visited Sedbergh earlier in the spring and it was a delight to sing with them again at an evening picnic near our twin town - as well as other choirs in Ljubljana, Skofja Loka and Stara Fuzina.

Later in the summer I returned with some more singers and we sang on **Triglav,** Slovenia's highest mountain a trip we will be making again next year 2014 accompanied by Slovenian choirs singing in the mountains refuges on the way to the summit. Do please let me know soon if you want to join us as places are already filling up.

Our annual **Singing Settle Carlisle** weekend steamed off into the early autumn with our usual rolling stock of songs about the railway sung on the trains, in the stations, and on walks through the wild Pennine fells....and then in pubs at the Ingleton Folk Festival packed with singers joining in lustily with the choruses. Many thanks to Ken Pope for letting us sing some

of the songs he wrote about the railway.

The Swedish harmony singing guartet Kongero came by in October to do a workshop and concert en route from Edinburgh to Derby. A stunning performance and a cleverly led workshop making Swedish folk songs and harmony very accessible to our English singers. Their workshop reminded me of Woody Guthry's timeless advice: "Any fool can be complicated, but it takes a genius to achieve simplicity." It was also a delight to make contact with the many Swedish people who live in the area, many of them married to English folk but all very happy to hear the songs of the homeland from these fabulous four women acapella singers and to join us in singing them.

And so the year turns round again to the Christmas festivities starting in mid-November, with our **West Gallery carol** singing workshop in the

People's Hall with Paul Guppy followed by the Gladly Solemn Sound choir concert in Howgill - with an interesting reading about life in the 19th century Howgill church from a letter by a 19th century resident. #### **DECEMBER GARDENING**

One of the most satisfying garden tasks to do at this dark, cold time of the year, is to look forward to spring and plan what seeds might be sown and grown in the vegetable and the flower garden. This year, following the wet growing season of 2012, which produced a grand crop of 3 pods on our runner beans. I planted some seeds in a cold, well ventilated (it has 2 or 3 panes missing)greenhouse and, once the bees found their way in, we had a good crop of beans which fruited earlier, and went on for longer than the out door plants. I also grew a courgette which grew well, but did not quite keep up with the cold frame plant. The latter had more light and more water and produced female flowers much sooner than the former. This year I intend to try some sweet peas under glass. They do of course all need regular watering but I hope to be rewarded by a greenhouse full of fragrance as well as flowers and food.

Packets of vegetable seeds usually contain far more seeds than are required for one season's growth in a modestly sized vegetable plot. Most will keep for more than one year so have a good sort through your packets before you set off to the garden centre to buy more, and, when you have purchased new ones, check that they are dated and if they are not, write the year of purchase on the packet. As a rough guide to the staying potential of seeds, here is a list of the most commonly grown things: One year - Parsnips; two vears – Runner Beans, Onions, Leeks, Sweet corn; three years -

Lettuce, Swede, Tomato, Turnips, Basil, Parsley, Coriander; four years – Beetroot, Broccoli, Brussels sprout, Carrot, Cauliflower, Chard, Spinach, Kale; five years – Sweet peppers, Chillies ,Radish, Celery; six years – Aubergine, Cucumber, Courgette, Pumpkin.

These are, of course just guidelines. If you decide to sow old seed, broadcast, as I did with some aged parsnips one year, you may find that they defy the rules, and all germinate in a disorganised patch. If you do decide to keep seed from one year to the next, make sure that it is thoroughly dry before you store it, and that you keep it in a cool, dark, dry place. Seeds which have been stored should be exposed to air at room temperature for two or three days before they are sown, so that they have time to reabsorb some moisture before they are planted.





#### SEDBERGH **NESTING BOX PROJECT**

One of the most attractive birds to visit the Sedbergh area for the nesting season is the Pied Flycatcher. The male is especially striking when he returns from migration in early April with his flashing black and white plumage.

In the 1960s there were very few local records of Pied Flycatchers but thanks to a project installing nearly 60 the birds. Thank you. nesting boxes, by the 1070s more than 100 young birds were being ringed each year. The boxes then fell into disrepair, being vandalised by woodpeckers and grey squirrels, until 2007 when the Sedbergh Support Group of Cumbria Wildlife Trust replaced many of them. These boxes were well used and an annual program of monitoring and ringing resulted in proof that the population of Pied Flycatchers, and other birds, can be greatly improved by the installation and maintenance of nesting boxes.

Unfortunately, I was unable to carry out the annual monitoring in 2013 and will be unable to continue in the future. So the birds are desperately in need of help - not only Pied Flycatchers, but also Blue and Great Tits, Nuthatch and others which may use these boxes.

This would be a chance to have your own 'Springwatch' project - it involves walking round the boxes in two woodlands near Sedbergh about 5 or 6 times during the nesting season (April -June). You would be

able to experience amazement at the intricate nest construction, the excitement of seeing the first eggs, and then the enormous pleasure of watching the babies developing and, hopefully, fledging.

No previous experience of bird watching is required, all training would be provided; maybe you could share the monitoring with a friend? Please let me know if you could help



- A male has been arrested from Sedbergh for the cultivation of cannabis, enquiries are still ongoing.


