PEOPLE'S HALL

A community gym in Sedbergh has secured Olympic legacy funding from Sport England's *Inspired Facilities* fund.

Sport England revealed in April that more than 1,300 local sports projects across the country have now received National Lottery funding through *Inspired Facilities*, part of its Olympic and Paralympic legacy programme.

The Pulse Community Gym operated from "loaned" premises for four years and was made homeless, when the building became unoccupied. The Gym approached the People's Hall Committee, who agreed to find space for a new building adjacent to the Hall and to

build the Gym and invite the PCG to be its tenant. The People's Hall will receive £39,665 of National Lottery funding to add to funds already available to provide the premises. The Gym will then be able to provide facilities not only to individuals and families, but also to the local secondary school, the Health Centre, the Sedbergh Wanders Football Club and a host of other local sports clubs.

Sport England's Chair, Nick Bitel, said: "A year on from the Olympics, this National Lottery investment is helping us deliver a lasting sporting legacy in Sedbergh.

"With investment now on offer from our Inspired Facilities Fund until 2017, we look forward to supporting



many more sports clubs in the North West who play such a vital role in grassroots sport."

Gym Chair, Sandra Gold-Wood, said: "We are delighted to have secured this award, which means we can once again provide gym facilities into Sedbergh and District. We are grateful to our members, our supporters and the People's Hall Management Committee, who have made this happen as part of 2012 Olympics' legacy."

Hall Secretary, Dr Gina Barney, said "The Management Committee is delighted to have been able to support the Gym in its ambitions and looks forward to a long and fruitful relationship. It joins the Hall's family of community activities."

Barbara Hartley of Garsdale Design was thrilled to hear the news and said "We at Garsdale Design are only too pleased to provide architectural and planning assistance to such and energetic and enthusiastic group".

Local MP, Tim Farron, said: ""I would like to congratulate local residents and to pay tribute to the People's Hall Management Committee for securing

this grant of £39,665 to part fund the building of a gym. This is brilliant news for local residents and I know it will be a much used local asset in the years ahead."

The People's Gym is one of well over 300 projects across England receiving lottery investment from the fourth round of the *Inspired Facilities* fund and one of more than 1,300 to benefit overall.

Many more communities are now set to benefit from the hugely popular fund, after Sport England today announced that it was extending *Inspired Facilities* until 2017, with an additional £40 million of National Lottery funding to invest. SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

In the final meeting of the 2013-2014 season Mike Kingsbury gave a very interesting talk about the results of eight years' research into his home, High Bank House, Barbon. Not only did he trace the history of the house and its occupants from the sixteenth century to the present day, but he also provided copious information about its relationship with the local environment.

High Bank House which is situated on Banneriggs Brow above the village of Barbon faces west, with views across the valley. It appears on maps of 1576 and 1695. Mike's research revealed that although a building had stood on the site since the early 1500s it underwent considerable change and development in the Great Rebuilding of the late sixteenth and early seventeenth century. Differences in the windows prevent the front of the house which dates from that period from being completely symmetrical, although at first sight it appears to be so and the roof would have been lifted at a later date to add the attic rooms. The present windows are evidently late Georgian or Victorian. There is no visible date on the front door but there are examples of similar lintels on other seventeenth-century houses in the locality. One of Mike's photos gave a good idea of how additional building had filled in the L shape of the original house and of where the dairy, scullery and outbuildings had been constructed.

Mike discovered that the Garnett family had been connected with the property since the 1500s and had been responsible for the rebuilding. The Garnetts had owned much property in the area and the late 17th century Hearth Tax list revealed that they had owned or occupied 11 of the 39 houses in Barbon at that time. Mike thinks that the house was probably rebuilt by Edmund Garnett who died in 1680. He traced the history of the Garnetts' ownership of

High Bank House through the eighteenth century in various archives including probate records, inventories and window tax returns which showed that by 1777 there was only one Garnett family left in Barbon. By researching Garnett family history in the

nineteenth century Mike uncovered their connections with other local families and from the 1840 Tithe Map he was able to determine the place of High Bank House in the farming landscape of Barbon. A turning point in the history of High Bank House was when it was sold in 1865 for £4,000 to Joseph Gibson. The 1910 countrywide Financial Survey showed

that by then the house had been divided into two parts and the amount of its adjoining land had been much reduced. The house was sold again several times before it came into the

ownership of the Kingsbury

family.

Mike's talk was enhanced by a number of maps, plans, photos and documents. His enthusiasm for his subject brought the presentation

alive and his interest has led to involvement in the Cumbria Vernacular Buildings Group which seeks to foster a greater understanding of old buildings through surveying them.



BOOKWORM

What I have been reading this month:
1. 'The Poets' Daughters Dora
Wordsworth and Sara Coleridge' by
Katie Waldegrave (non fiction)

Brilliant, vivid writing and within a few paragraphs you feel as though you are in the Worsdworth/Coleridge households with all the complex family dynamics and domestic detail. The author explores the considerable influence of parentage and upbringing on these 2 women's lives. There is a lot on their health problems and torturous routes to their respective marriages. It brought me fresh perspectives on Wordsworth's and Coleridge's lives and the context for some of their poetry. Both Dora and Sara played important roles in the legacy of their fathers' poetry.

2. 'A Passionate Sisterhood' by Kathleen Jones (non fiction)

This is really a group biography of the sisters, wives and daughters of the Lake Poets and there are lots of Sara(h)s, Marys and 2 Dorothys plus moving about in various locations in the Lake District eg Keswick, Grasmere. A captivating read which brings to life the inter-relationships between the Southeys, Coleridges and Wordsworths - the jealousies and bonds across the generations and the devastating impact of the regular use of laudanum.

3. 'Provincial Pleasures' by Norman Nicholson (non fiction)

Millom, where Norman Nicholson lived all his life, is called 'Odborough' in this portrait written in the 1950s on the pleasures, benefits and

ordinariness of a small, industrial coastal town in Cumbria. It is a delightful, soothing and joyful read. The author, whose 100th anniversary of his birth is

celebrated this year, structures the book month by month so we learn about 'Opera week' and the 'Whit Monday cricket match' with astute observational details on items like the tides and bicycles people rode. His invented characters eg old Mr Sprout the shopkeeper, Mr Postlethwaite the strict Sabbatarian, and Miss Snoot bring the town to life. *RM Bookworm*

A summary of the meeting held at Barbon Village Hall on Wednesday 5th March 2014

Richard Rhodes is Cumbria's first Police and Crime Commissioner and he spoke to the Forum of his role and the areas of work he has been

There are still some misunderstandings about exactly what the job entails but the primary function is to hold Cumbria Constabulary to account and to question why certain actions have been taken. Executive meetings are held once a month at Carleton Hall Police HQ in Penrith and members of the public are entitled to attend and can also submit questions to be asked via e-mail to commissioner@cumbria-pcc.gov.uk.

smallest budgets in England (and 85% of it goes immediately on salaries). His final duty is to listen to people's views. This is done through attending meetings such as the Forum, street surgeries and other engagement activities. This is the main reason why the role was created, so the public could feel that their opinion was being heard. Public opinions are then fed back to the Chief Constable.

On the campaign trail Mr Rhodes also made certain undertakings on particular problems he wanted to see more focus on. The first of these is Anti-Social Behaviour. This is not in itself necessarily a crime and people

but it generally covers things like drunkenness in public places, noise and tensions between neighbours. In agreement with the 6 District Councils a centrally monitored countywide CCTV system will be in place in the main population centres by the end of 2014. New technology will also enable police to monitor the system from their vans and images will be of a standard which will enable them to be used as evidence in court.

Domestic Violence & Sexual Assault are a big, but largely hidden problem across the County as incidents are hugely under reported. Cumbria is the only county that doesn't have a sexual assault recovery centre and at have different opinions on what this is the moment victims have to travel to

More support is still needed to prevent re-offending when prisoners of any age are released along with better support for veterans who often find on leaving the forces that they are not only jobless but homeless as well.

CUMBRIA ARCHIVE SERVICE

Elaine Gilliard from the County Archive Service spoke to the Forum about the work of the service which has a statutory duty to preserve and care for local authority records. There are four offices in the County: The main one is in Carlisle and was based at the Castle but is now housed in a purpose built facility at Lady Clifford House, Pettrill Bank. They are responsible for the records of the old county of Cumberland. The Barrow office looks after records relating to Furness and the local area that was once part of Lancashire and Kendal holds all the old Westmorland County and Sedbergh records.

The service has a remit to collect, preserve and make available to the public original and unique records of evidence of activity of any other bodies so as well as local authority documents it also holds; maps, slides, parish records, school records,

police records, family and estate records, religious and business records.

The Kendal office in particular has recently acquired the collection of Alfred Wainwright and also holds the archive, including maps and drawings, of Thomas Mawson, an internationally renowned architect who lived in Windermere. The main users of the facilities are family historians who want to look at records earlier than those available online. The service has an extensive catalogue online and a programme is running to micro film of all parish records. There are strict rules for use of the search room but occasionally

some documents become unavailable as they are withdrawn for conservation.

The service also does outreach work, staging exhibitions, giving talks, working with schools (in particular KS2 pupils).

Sgt John Stephens updated the Forum on the crime statistics for the Sedbergh & Kirkby Lonsdale area from the 3 months (November, December, January 2013/14) compared to the same period in 2012/13.

Anti Social Behaviour: 9 incidents in Kirkby Lonsdale, up from 8 and 6 incidents in Sedbergh, down from 9. All Crime (includes theft) 17 in Kirby Lonsdale, down from 21; 26 in Sedbergh, up from 13. Violent crime (includes incidents in schools and domestic violence) Kirkby Lonsdale 6, up from 1 and

Sedbergh remained at 2 incidents. The high numbers of thefts in the

- we are facing a potential delay as we meet Cumbria County Council requirements for information prior to them paying BT to do an impact assessment on de-scoping our communities from the Connecting Cumbria roll-out;
- We are seeking a means to reduce these delays as they threaten a timely start and completion;
- We're working to finalise contracts that Cumbria CC want us to sign

now and commit to.

It is hoped that a further update can be provided by a representative of Fibre GarDen in person at a future Forum meeting.

LOCALISM IN ACTION IN SEDBERGH

Presentation to SLDC Cabinet by Hilary Hodge - Chairman Sedbergh Parish Council BACKGROUND

South Lakeland District Council (SLDC) held it's cabinet meeting in the People's Hall on the 9th April. An overview of localism in action or community development as some prefer to call it was given, a synopsis of which is reported below. HISTORY

Building community infrastructure is a long process but it has been going on in Sedbergh for decades. The Lookaround is 28years old, the community office has been running projects since the 1990s and numerous voluntary groups have existed for many years carrying out a wide range of activities.

SOME DEVELOPMENTS OVER

SOME DEVELOPMENTS OVER THE PAST DECADE BOOK TOWN

Post foot and mouth, the Book Town Company was set up to lead a rural regeneration project encouraging bookshops to open in Sedbergh. In addition rural regeneration resources and grants were obtained from various bodies, which enabled a number of literary and ideas festivals to be organized until the Northern Rock, which represented the major funder, withdrew. The relocation of Westwood Books from Hay to

All funds raised will go towards the upkeep of Middleton Church.

Sedbergh was a direct result of the Book Town initiative and has meant that a successful business was established which brings visitors to the town.

While this was happening the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) decided to close the Tourist Information Centre (TIC), which would have been a disaster for the town. The Book Town group decided that it had to take on the running of the TIC, which it did, mainly funding it through grants and by encouraging booksellers to take shelves in the centre to raise income. COMMUNITY CHARITY SHOP

In 2008 the Sedbergh Community
Charity Shop was set up which due to the generosity of local people in





the generosity of local people in donating goods has raised around £100,000 for local voluntary groups and for community development. A few months ago a second charity bookshop was opened so that more space could be found in the original shop for other goods.

PARISH COUNCIL

In 2009 the Parish Council carried out a survey of local issues and then set up the Sedbergh Townscape Initiative (STI). This brought together various organisations including SLDC, Cumbria County Council (CCC), YDNPA, Chamber of Trade and Sedbergh School, all of which put money in to enable consultants to be appointed to produce a report. This report focused mainly on public realm issues and provided the evidence to go to statutory and grant making bodies to obtain resources and assets to make improvements to the

town. As a result Joss Lane car park and toilets, the tennis courts and fishing rights have been given back to the town by SLDC. Various grants have been obtained to improve the town including the replacement of the street names, removing unnecessary poles and signs, replacing the entrance sign to Main St and rebuilding the bus shelter opposite Morphets. Plans have been drawn up to create a centre for Sedbergh making an open space from Joss Lane car park down to Main St by the information centre at 72, Main St. The consultation process has shown public support and so the next stage is to apply for funding. Negotiations are now complete with CCC to widen

the footway and create a priority system through the 'narrows', a grant is being applied for to improve Queens Gardens, now designated as a heritage site and Udales is being renovated to provide a business hub. 72 MAIN ST

Following the decision by YDNPA in 2010 to sell this building a campaign was established to save it for the community. The White Knights Company was set up and nineteen people lent enough money to purchase the building and hold it until the community could raise sufficient funds to buy it, which happened earlier this year. A lottery grant of £47K was obtained to put in central heating, new windows on the ground



floor and to do other minor renovations.

SEDBERGH CHARITABLE INCORPORATED ORGANISATION (CIO)

The building is now owned, on behalf of the community, by the newly set up CIO, which is a charitable body with Trustees and Members. The CIO is responsible for running the charity shops and leasing out the rooms at 72, Main St to the History Society, the Parish Council, Cumbria Police and the Information Centre. It also has a leading role in developing future community projects.

SEDBERGH COMMUNITY INTEREST COMPANY (CIC)

A non - profit making company, Sedbergh CIC, has also been set up to run the Information Centre, the TIC, book shop and retail activities on the ground floor of 72, Main St. It also provides support to some community projects including the transport hub,

funded through the Dales Integrated Transport Association (DITA). The whole building needs to be self sufficient as apart from the Parish Council other means of support no longer exist.

VOLUNTARY EFFORT

It is important to stress that virtually all of this has been achieved through volunteers. Parish Councillors, Directors of the CIO and CIC, people who work in the Information Centre, Charity Shop and Charity Book shop are volunteers. Sedbergh is fortunate not only to have so many people who are prepared to work on behalf of the community but to have people with such a wide range of skills who give willingly of their time and expertise.


Be wise to Scams

We are hearing of more and more scams in our area, stay safe with our tips.

Be Wise

- Government and financial institutions will *never* ask for information by email.
- Don't give information yourself, instead confirm what the cold caller already has. Beware -Scammers have a surprising amount of accurate data.
- Never give complete passwords or full account information but instead confirm certain letters or the last few digits.
- If someone phones you, take their

details and phone them back later that day *from a different phone.* Scammers often



- Request written information before making a decision, but beware of giving your address if they don't already have it.
- Don't give anyone 'remote' access to your computer over the phone.

Signs of a scam

• The call, letter, e-mail or text has



come out of the blue.

- You are asked to send money in advance.
- You are under pressure to respond quickly, no time to think about it or get advice.
- You're offered something for nothing and it seems too good to be true.
- Scare tactics are used, for example claiming your computer has been hacked or identity stolen.

What to do if you have been scammed

- Report it to Action Fraud on 0300
 123 2040 to help stop it happening to others.
- If you've used your credit or debit card ask your bank for a chargeback.
- Get advice and report it to Trading Standards through the Citizens Advice consumer service on 08454 04 05 06 or online advice at www.adviceguide.org.uk

HEARING LOSS SUPPORT SERVICE IN SEDBERGH

Caritas Care is reaching out to people suffering from hearing loss in Sedbergh and urging them to seek help through the charity's bespoke support sessions.

Bridging the Gap, which is run by Caritas Care, is hosting drop in sessions to support those living with hearing loss by offering free, practical advice and support on caring for their hearing aids. In addition, the sessions will also be providing free batteries and re-tubing for those with NHS issued hearing aids.

Attendees will benefit from one-onone sessions with trained volunteers for advice on maintenance, equipment and fitting. The scheme aims to improve confidence, reduce feelings of isolation and overcome the barriers that prevent those living with hearing loss, from being part of the community.

Bridging the Gap Project Leader Hugh Stirling commented: "Some 10 million people in the UK suffer from hearing loss and this can be a very stressful and sometimes frightening experience for a person, as everyday sounds such as road traffic in town centres can be rather confusing. NEW ROAD FOR DENT

On February 19th 1896 the following item appeared in the Westmorland Gazette.

At a vestry meeting held at the large room adjoining the Sun Inn on Tuesday, the 15th instant, at which the Rev. R. Pickering, Mr R. Tatham, Mr Thomas Hall. Mr Nixon. Mr Punchard. the agent for Lord Bective, Mr Robinson of Sedbergh, and about 150 of the inhabitants of Dent's dale were present, a proposition was brought forward by Mr Hall, on behalf of one interested in the welfare of the valley, to present to the township the necessary funds requisite to discharge the cost of deviating the existing road over Mill Brow, so as to

avoid the enormous gradient (1 in 7.25) at that place, and to substitute for it a new road level and of shorter length. Mr Pickering was voted to the chair, and it was at once unanimously resolved on the motion of Mr Tatham, seconded by Mr Nixon, "that the best thanks of the meeting were due to the anonymous benefactor who through Mr Hall had that day proposed free of expense to deviate the present road over Mill Head Brow, whereby the present steep gradients over Mill Head would be avoided, and the meeting cordially approves of the projected deviation." It was also resolved that the chairman be requested to instruct the township surveyor to proceed forthwith with the



works necessary to carry out the proposed deviation and give all proper notices, and do all other things necessary to obtain the requisite sanction thereto.

It may be mentioned that the inhabitants of Dent are entirely unaware whom they are to thank for this munificence. But at the same time they are unanimous in looking upon this act of generosity in a spirit of thankfulness which must gratify the anonymous donor, who we have no hesitation in saying will for many generations be looked upon as one of the most generous friends of the dale. It is estimated that the proposed deviation will cost £1,200 to £1,500, and it must be a true friend indeed

who will sacrifice such a sum for the sole benefit of the dalesmen of Dent. Votes of thanks to Mr Pickering for presiding, and to Mr Punchard and Mr Robinson for attending the meeting were passed and the meeting dispersed well satisfied with the days proceeding.

The new road was completed within two years and the munificent benefactor soon became known when a Memorial was erected to Lucy Elam (featured on the Cover of this month's Lookaround.). Lucy's father John Elam had been a surveyor who had carried out the enclosure surveys for Dentdale and apparently it had been his wish that this work should be carried out. At the time the family lived at Thorns Hall.

I have often wondered exactly where the original road ran. The eastern section is obviously Hollow Lane which joins the present road

near Barth Bridge. This still connects the main road to several farms on the hillside; Hole house, Hacra, Hining, Lunds and Rawridding. But exactly where is the other end of the road? The monument itself tells us the answer as it states that the new road is exactly 1122 yards long. This is only ten yards less than seven tenths of a mile and so can easily be measured by driving along it. Doing this brings us to a gate from which a distinct track can be seen traversing the hillside.

As the road follows the upper boundary of the fields it can easily be seen that in order to keep a level course it has been quite deeply cut into the hillside with a well built retaining wall along the northern side, having crossed two fields the road then becomes more overgrown with hedges and trees on both sides until it reaches Kitty Barn. At this point it makes a right angle turn to the north up Straight Lane leading to Hole house. From here it runs down to the present Hollow Lane to join the new road just below Barth Bridge.

Following the old road is quite a pleasant walk as it is on the sunny side of the dale.* To do this it is best to park in the lay-by at Barth Bridge, walk up Hollow Lane to Hole House where a footpath finger post points the way down Straight Lane to Kitty Barn. As the lane is completely overgrown with nettles and brambles it is perhaps preferable to walk down the field parallel to the lane. From the more open section of the road there are two minor lanes leading down to

the main road which can then be used to return to Barth Bridge passing the monument to Lucy Elam on the way.

Note: in Dent the north and south sides of the dale have traditionally been called the "sunny side" and "the money side". One explanation for this which I have been given is that on the sunny side the grass starts to grow very early in the spring and then receives a set back due to late frosts, while on the money side the grass grows later but having suffered no set backs produces a better crop.

MARCH WEATHER

about by the wind somewhat. Ours were also badly eaten but I did not catch the culprit! There was also a greening up as grass started to grow in the milder periods and the sheep were less keen on hay. With the curlew appearing at the end of last month the oystercatchers were back early in the month. Towards the end of the month the blackthorn was showing some colour. The hazel catkins were well elongated and the minute female flowers were visible and with all the wind some should have been fertilized. The Forsythia has also been colourful this year. We have biggish buds on the clematis so let's hope we do not get any very hard frosts. The "resident" mallard have made an appearance in the chicken run at feeding time. The female has nested in the garden for several years now but I've never found where. We have had to rescue the newly hatched ducklings from the magpies which, if we don't get the female, means we rear them in a brooder hence they feel at home as they eventually graduate to a coup in the chicken run!

CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

Wild flowers

Wild flowers can be found in any month of the year, but they are usually at their best during May and June. Normally you might expect to look for them in fields and woodland. There are many to be seen, though, along roadside verges and in hedge banks. For a plant there are some benefits in these sites, not the least of which is freedom from being eaten by sheep. Thus you will find many plants thriving on verges, out of reach of grazing animals and unaffected by agricultural chemicals.

As you walk, you have an opportunity to observe and record what you see. Which flowers come out first? Are the numbers of common plants, like primroses, increasing year by year? Are others threatened or declining in number? Are there particularly local or uncommon species that should be preserved or

protected? If you enjoy walking you can add to the pleasure of your walk and maybe do something for nature conservation by looking for answers to these questions.

Now that it is so easy to photograph wild flowers you may like to make a photographic collection of what you see. Most digital cameras have a special setting for flowers but even the automatic setting will often give good results, as will many smartphones. At least flowers, unlike birds, stay still! By making a record in this way you may be able to identify unknown or rare species.

You may like to pass on information to the Cumbria Wildlife Trust to add to local records- a note could be left at the Community Office. The Trust has an agreement with the Highways Department to delay cutting of hedge banks so that wild flowers can set seed. This ensures a good display in

future years. Maintaining variety (for instance there are well over 100 different flowering plants along Howgill Lane alone) preserves a good diversity of plant and animal life. Insects often feed on a particular plant; they in turn provide food for birds

Traditionally managed hay meadows are rare now. By spreading hay from the remaining meadows on improved grassland seed from the naturally occurring wild flowers may grow again. The crop gains extra nutrients and the sight delights the eye.

Finally, do leave the flowers in place for others to appreciate.



And restless too! As many involved in armed service family life well know, regular upheaval is the name of the game in terms of schooling, house movement – as she says herself: 'I could house-move for England'. Leaving school early stopped dreams of Architecture – but her early library work fuelled a growing and compulsive love of books. CUMBRIA ACTION FOR SUSTAINABILITY

Green Open Homes South Lakes, Saturday 3rd May

Local charity Cumbria Action for Sustainability (CAfS) is running an open homes event in the South Lakeland area on Saturday 3rd May where people can visit houses with energy saving and renewable energy installations.

Visitors will be able to see at least five houses across Kendal, Killington and Staveley area with a variety of renewable energy technologies and energy saving products including: biomass wood pellet boilers, solar photovoltaics (electricity), solar thermal (hot water) and a proposed hydro-electricity site. The houses include a new-build built to passivhaus standard, a timber frame extension to a Georgian terrace, a number of renovations and a barn converted into a delightful multi-level house. The event, which is part of the Centre for Sustainable Energy's Green Open Homes network, is on the afternoon of Saturday 5th May.

The open homes will be centred

around a central information 'hub' at the Castle Street Centre where visitors will able to get information on all the open houses, speak to local suppliers of renewable energy systems and environmental and sustainability groups, get energy saving advice and find out how to arrange a Green Deal Assessment or an Energy Performance Certificate.

Visitors will be shown around the properties and will be able to talk to the homeowners to ask all those unanswered questions - how much it costs, how much it saves, how long it took, the upheaval, has there been a change in lifestyle, and any planning considerations.

MAY GARDENING

Last month I had a brief stay on the west coast of Scotland, and visited a National Trust garden called Crarae. Crarae is a woodland garden, filled with a variety of plants many of which were collected from China by a chap called Reginald Farrer – a man who actually came from Clapham, near Ingleton, but whose Aunt had a grand estate in Glasgow and a country residence near to Inverary. (Incidentally, some might remember Reginald Farrer's descendant, Dr

Farrer, who was the school doctor at Settlebeck, and the baby clinic doctor in Sedbergh in the late 1950's and early 1960's.)

Many of the interesting plants in flower at Crarae in April and May are species of Rhododendron. They range from the small leaved species such as R. lutescens which has dainty, pale yellow flowers, and R. augustinii (soft mauve blooms), through the waxy leaved and flowered forms of R. cinnabarinum (red, orange and yellow flowers), to the felted backed, rust coloured leaves of *R. fulvum* (pale pink flowers with a crimson blotch at the throat) and *R. arboreum* (bright red), to the most impressive largest leaved species - R. macabeanum which has deeply veined, glossy dark green leaves a foot long and 9 ins wide. (at first glance, it could be mistaken for a rubber plant). Interspersed with these are giant Magnolia trees bearing enormous, sugar pink flowers, the shape of waterlilies (*M. campbellii*) and glossy Camellias with flowers of white, pink and red. Crarae garden has similar soil (rocky and acid) to many of our Lake District gardens, and the National Trust garden at Stagshaw near Ambleside has many of the same species and is well worth a visit this month.

One of the things that has always been close to my professional heart is the speed of vehicles on roads. Last month, Jacky & I had a trip to Somerset which we thoroughly enjoyed for many reasons. However, while viewing the local news, we were drawn to a report called 'Think Amy' which is about a 13 year old girl called Amy Hofmeister who was killed while riding her push bike in Taunton by a speeding motorist who was subsequently jailed with another driver. 


