



opening, 16 while the sites were open pre-Fair (29 last year), none while the sites were closed during the Fair (9 last year) and 4 during the post-Fair site opening against 8 last year.

Incidents involving vehicles on verges stood at 3 this year, 13 in 2013 and 15 in 2012. Incidents involving horses on verges or in fields were 9 this year, 2 in 2013 and 11 in 2012.

Reported cases of Anti Social behaviour remained level with last year at 4 but this is half the number of 2012.

Incidents on the authorised sites were halved this year to 6 from 12 in each of the previous two years and

there was only one incident involving licensed premises, which matches last year.

Overall the Police considered this year's Fair to have been a very good operationally.

John Barwise, the Neighbourhood Enforcement Officer for South Lakeland District Council reported that from his team's point of view the migration of travellers through South Lakeland had gone very well this year. Vehicles had again started to arrive 2 or 3 days early but by 24th May there were 46 bowtops and vans on the Loop Road at Devil's Bridge. The amended layout of the boulder installation at Devil's Bridge had

proved very effective.

There was disappointment that the settled community had taken advantage of skips provided for the travellers to use and a resident in Sedbergh, identified from items dumped, had been spoken to about this. Woodclose Caravan Park had no incidents this year and had thanked SLDC and the Police for their liaison.

There had been some incidents of fly tipping (e.g. 11 fridges at Rawthey Bridge) and overall 8 tons of waste had been gathered in skips. None of the toilets provided for travellers had been damaged and the overall post-Fair clean up was completed by 16th June.

The posts had also already been

removed and the boulders would be gone by the end of June.

The drop in sessions seemed to be successful in that very few people came and therefore there had been no major issues for the settled population to report.

At Burnt Mill there had been an issue with caravans on the verge, breaching the guidance, but this was only 2-3 hours prior to the Cote Moor site opening and those involved were spoken to by the Police.

It was noted that there was no indication in the Police report of the seriousness of the incidents reported. Sgt Stephens advised that the crimes, shoplifting, passing of a forged bank note and the damage to fences, were

classed as serious whereas the horses on Jubilee Field were not, although that was serious for residents. He also advised that dispersal notices, referred to in the press, are only issued to deal with anti social behaviour by people who have been drinking. The person (or people) then have to stay away from the specified area for 24 hours or be subject to arrest. A total of 28 were issued during the 2014 Fair but none in the South Lakeland area.

The question was also raised as to whether the official site opening and closing dates were a waste of time. Traditionally access has been available form the Tuesday following the May Bank holiday but some people come early hoping or assuming there will be no police presence on a Bank Holiday. The consensus is that even if the opening were put back to the Thursday,

people would still come early. The travellers themselves, through representative Billy Welch had asked for the sites to be closed during the Fair, so that no alternative "fairs" could be set up. The framework of set dates is also useful for the Police in terms of enforcement. There are generally more issues around the Kirkby Lonsdale area as it is the first point of entry into South Lakeland.

A representative form Barbon advised that there had been no problems this year and that the extra toilet originally requested had not been needed after all.

Regarding the Loop Road, some people felt that the impression is given that it is for the exclusive use of travellers whereas anyone should be able to drive or walk along it at any time.

The Public post-Fair debrief drop in was to be held on Tuesday 8th July at the Lunesdale Hall, Kirkby YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK AUTHORITY Julie Barker, Head of Recreation, Tourism and Outreach at the Yorkshire Dales National Park, spoke to the Forum initially about the work of her team (2 people plus rangers and many volunteers) in promoting sustainable tourism and then touched briefly on the plans for the Tour de France Grand Depart, happening over the weekend of 5/6 July.

Each year there are approximately 12 million tourist days in the Yorkshire Dales as a whole (not just the National Park). Fifteen thousand people are employed in tourism, which is about 13% of the population. 90% of the visitors have been before and 34% and 51% of day visitors come from Yorkshire and Humberside respectively. £556m is spent annually by visitors of which £309m is from

day visitors.

The National Park works with various partner organisations nationally and locally. It is also part of the Dales Tourism partnership alongside the National Trust and Natural England among others. The Partnership's strategy and action plan includes measures to promote "insider guides" – local people who can offer a unique perspective on places of interest to visit; how make businesses greener; cycling initiatives, including the availability of electric bikes for hire and a dark skies policy to reduce light pollution.

The Dales Business Network promotes "brilliant" businesses such as the Dales Bike Centre at

Cumbria Highways

Cllr Cotton spoke to the Forum about the work that has been carried out in the Sedbergh & Kirkby Lonsdale division over the past twelve months. He highlighted that Cumbria Highways covers 84 divisions so the amount of work that has been done locally is quite remarkable especially against the background of cuts. A list of all the completed works plus some future planned work is attached.

A couple of queries were raised about jobs which residents felt had not been completed satisfactorily which Cllr Cotton promised to pass on – any new issues can always be passed to Cllr Cotton to follow up as well.

Barbon Open Gardens It was reported that the recent open gardens weekend in Barbon raised £4k for charity over the two days, with around 400 people visiting the gardens.

COMMUNITY GRANTS

Cllr Cotton advised the Forum that the Local Area Partnership no longer has any funding to allocate but grants are still available through the County Council's Community grants process. Applications can be made by nonprofit making, constituted community groups whose projects support the aims of priorities outlined in the County and Local area plans. 


Hearing about the health benefits, the improved personal and working relationships and the courageous life shifts that people make once they begin to meditate is one of the great privileges of teaching.





The Tour strongly emphasised the importance of our scenery for tourism in our area. It was an unexpected delight that Banks Renewables decided not to proceed with their application for three wind turbines in Killington. Without any rational case and no friends apart from members of South Lakeland planning committee it was amazing the application lasted as long as it did. Hopefully we can

now move on with real projects, digesters, water power and ground source heating. Less visible but so much more effective than the tokenism of those who shout "climate change denier" from the sidelines.

appointed to the National Park Board as the Parish representative for Sedbergh, Dent and Garsdale following my election as a Sedbergh Parish Councillor in May. For me this is the dream ticket and I am grateful to all of those who voted for me in the Parish Council elections and also supported my continuing National Park membership albeit under a different hat!

I had my appointment confirmed by the Secretary of State just in time to attend the Annual Meeting of the Authority on the 24th June and at the same time was appointed to the Park Planning Committee. I attended the latter for the first time on the 8th July but there were no applications before

it relating to our Parish group.

I would say that the two most significant matters on the Park's agenda at the moment are the formal consultations currently taking place on the proposed new Local Plan and Building Design Guide and the longawaited decision on whether the Park boundaries will be extended to include the northern part of the Howgills, Middleton, Barbon and Casterton and the Orton Fells. 

AUGUST GARDENING

August is a month for taking bold action in the garden. I have my eye on three rambler roses – 'Seagull' (double white flowers), 'Albertine'(coppery pink flowers) and 'Veilchenblau' (violet flowers), all of which flowered profusely in July and are now in need of a severe haircut.

Ramblers flower best on new wood, and this is encouraged to grow when old, flowered stems are pruned back straight after flowering. Cut the spent stems back so that you remove all the old flower heads. With my 'Seagull' and 'Veilchenblau' this involves removing sections of the plant which may be 6 or 8 feet long. If you find that healthy, leafy, but non flowering stems have already grown amongst the flowered growth, then your task is much easier as you simply cut back to them so that all the plants energies and hence its ability to produce flowers for next summer, will be channelled into these new growths. If your plant has not been pruned for several years, and you are feeling a bit tentative, then just remove a good half of the older, most branched and scruffy stems and let the others decide who will do what next.

Other plants that require a good sort out this month are some of the ornamental brambles. Every year I approach with some trepidation, a beautiful golden leaved specimen – Rubus cockburnianus 'Golden Vale' – which grows in a friend's garden. The day on which it falls to do the pruning usually turns out hot and sunny, but this is such a prickly individual and

has such a thicket of stems needing to be thinned out, that I have to don my protective clothing of a thick donkey jacket, a tough pair of overtrousers, a large brimmed waterproof hat, goggles and thorn proof gloves. This gear has caused some astonishment amongst the lightly clad visitors who occasionally stray into the garden looking for the owner of the nearby campsite, but it means that I can get safely underneath the prickly arching branches and remove tall the flowered ones, leaving the beautiful white stemmed, current seasons "canes" to provide a splash of colour for the Autumn and the dark winter months. NEIGHBOURHOODALERT

Cumbria Trading Standards are warning homeowners to be aware of receiving telephone calls from businesses telling them they are entitled to several thousands of pounds worth of funding for home improvements and that the improvements will be free. Such calls are on the increase countrywide following the recent revamping of the government's Green Deal Scheme.

The householder is asked to pay up to £300 for an Energy Performance assessment to be carried out. The assessment is either not carried out or the work is undertaken but the householder does not receive an Energy Performance Certificate, which they should do under the Green Deal Code of Practice.

There have also been suggestions that the callers mention government grants but in reality they are offering a loan paid back through your electric bill which is part of the Green Deal Scheme.

The Green Deal can only be delivered through government contracted assessors and providers identifiable by a unique government allocated number. Consumers are advised to look out for the Green Deal Approved quality mark. Only Green Deal Assessors, Providers and Installers can use it. This shows they meet Green Deal standards and are authorised to operate under the Green Deal.

Consumers taking out a Green Deal will need to have an assessment completed by an authorised assessor who will visit your home, talk to you about your property and your energy use and help decide if you could benefit from Green Deal improvements. You may have to pay for an assessment and the assessor must tell you the fee in advance.

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK Plea to dog owners

Dog owners and walkers are being asked to take extra care as they visit the Yorkshire Dales National Park over the next few weeks.

Alan Hulme, the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's Head of Ranger Services, said dogs can cause long-term damage if they are allowed to run free – and can also put their owners in danger.

"The breeding season for wildlife and for farm animals is still with us and, although dog owners say their pet never chases or attacks sheep and lambs, some do.

"In addition, a lot of people don't

appreciate that dogs can cause just as much harm unintentionally by keeping parents away from their young, which leaves eggs, fledglings and lambs vulnerable.





National Park "At the same time, dog owners and walkers should be aware that cattle can sometimes become aggressive

towards their pets and them, especially when calves are around.

"If you are walking in a field of cows and they start coming towards you, the best thing you can do if you feel threatened is to get to safety yourself. If you have a dog with you, let go of its lead – it can look after itself well enough."

The Countryside Code contains some simple rules that pet owners must remember, the most important being that, in most areas of open country and common land – known as 'access land' - you must keep your dog on a short lead until July 31, and all year round near farm animals.

National Park Rangers and National Park Centre staff are only too happy to give advice to anyone who is concerned about going into area that may be used as a breeding ground by wild animals.



JUNE WEATHER

In over 50 years of recording the weather, this month has been the driest ever with only 1.2 inches of rain recorded!! A hot dry spell meant many

were haytiming with temperatures in the mid 70sF(24C). A maximum of 75.9F (24.3C) was recorded. Only once did the minimum just go below the 40F at 39.7F(4.3C). Also on only 3 nights did the windchill drop

to 39F(3.9C). Even though it was dry we didn't actually record an official drought as only the last 12 days were dry. We shall have to see if next month completes the 14 days for an official drought. Pressure was variable so were the resulting winds with a maximum gust of 19mph and on all but 4 days these gusts came from the north west.

As mentioned earlier most local farmers got in a decent hay crop. Unfortunately mine wasn't quite ready so I missed the good weather. Let's hope we get another such spell. On the positive side a swarm of bees took up in one of my empty hives making me a beekeeper again! They seem to be doing well. Much has been written about the use of neonicotinoids on farm crops as being a destroyer of bees. Up here there won't be much, if any, use of these insecticides as they are generally used as a seed treatment and the only crops around here are grass and sheep! However we still lose bees. A European survey of bees has found losses throughout the

continent especially the more northern countries. This suggests, at least to me, that there is a more important factor in the colony losses, namely the weather!! Birds generally



seem to have had a good breeding season with losts of youngsters about particularly, house sparrows, jackdaws, crows and magpies! The latter 3 we could well do without! Butterflies are noticeable by their absence

so far this summer. The cuckoo seems to have moved on as I haven't heard one in the latter part of the month. The latest nest of 3 swallows are progressing but nothing else seems to be nesting at present.


News from the Pews – St Andrew's Church, Sedbergh





CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

In July, Sedbergh support group were invited to a tea party by Tanya and Edmund Hoare at their home in Lowgill. Tanya and Edmund are keen



birders and when they bought their Lowgill cottage they were delighted to discover that they were hosting swifts in their eaves. Over the years they became enthralled by their new neighbours. They preserved the nesting spaces in the eaves, created more and installed nest boxes to increase their colony. They have also become acknowledged experts on swifts and many of you will have heard their talks.

Many of the expertly designed nest sites are occupied and some have cameras, recording the movements of the swifts and their chicks constantly for the 3 short months that they are here. On our visit we were able to see some of the installations and watch chicks and adults on the nests on the live television feed. In the late summer evenings the swifts are usually active and we watched as more and more appeared in the skies above Lowgill, hunting for insects before nightfall.

Most of the villages in this area have swifts nesting in the eaves, screaming along the streets and hunting in the skies overhead. Their preferred nest sites are in the eaves on top of the wall, high enough for them to be able to swoop straight up and in at high speed. Some of these sites are lost as houses get renovated but this doesn't have to happen. Eaves are meant to be ventilated, not air-tight, and a circulation of air is good building practice as it helps prevent rot and prolongs the life of a roof. Maintaining the entry holes in

strategic locations, as at Lowgill during renovation of the roof, demonstrates what can be accomplished for the mutual benefit of the householder and swifts.

Swifts need our help as they are entirely dependent on buildings for nest sites. Swifts can happily coexist with humans even in modern houses. If the roof cannot be adapted then swifts will use special boxes which take little effort to fix and maintain and Tanya and Edmund are happy to give advice and help.

Several years ago members of the Sedbergh group contributed to a survey of swifts, organised by Ingram Cleasby. One of the aims of Sedbergh Community Swifts, a group set up at the instigation of the Hoares, is to repeat this survey to see how our local swifts are faring in the twenty first century.

You can help with this. We need to know where the swifts are currently nesting. If you see a swift swoop up and into the eaves then that tells us where the nest is. Also, at this time of year, as the chicks are getting ready to leave the nest, droppings can usually be seen directly below the nest site. In a few short weeks the swift season will be over for us for another year but the survey will continue next year. 
AGE UK SOUTH LAKELAND

JOURNALISM IN SEDBERGH

Did you know that

..an early precursor of our popular Lookaround was a broadsheet titled "The Scandal Monger" with a first print date of 1st August 1815. It closed after its first (and only) issue; the editor, one Dennis Snicker, having been chased out of town by an angry mob.

Unabashed, Snicker continued to set up similar broadsheets in towns and villages across the north of England, until, on 17 December, 1819, the law caught up with him at York Assizes. In Court the unrepentant Snicker "snigger'd, laugh'd and belched loudly" throughout his trial.

The "brazen Reprobate" was sentenced to Transportation 20 years.
