sheep we had no inkling of the scale of the task and the works of imagination before us. There were so many which were so good: they were all good. No wonder Sedbergh and Farfield were packed for the whole week-end. People coming for a couple of hours and staying three days. Well done everyone !

For those of us who follows politics more closely than we ought last night was a long one. I take some pride that I was within 1% on both turnout and the final vote on Political Betting. and lectures which I give but there is no doubt that these family historians have made an enormous contribution to our understanding of our local area.

Even more locally, there remains the unresolved guestion of whether the Lune Valley should be part of what is presently called the Yorkshire Dales National Park. There is little support in Bainbridge and Grassington for calling an enlarged park "Yorkshire and Westmorland Dales" and even less for "Westmorland and Yorkshire Dales". Although the name IS important my greater concern is governance. As with England and Scotland, the relationship between the Yorkshire and Westmorland parts WOULD be an unequal one. No matter how sincerely one bends over backwards to avoid it inequality must give rise to the perception of unfairness. That is why I would much

have preferred a Westmorland or even Cumbrian Dales AONB where governance would have been in the hands of people from the locality.

Whatever the repercussions our friends to the north, the affected electors, have at least chosen their own outcome. Advocates of extending the Yorkshire Dales National Park, please note. #### COUNCILLORS CORNER Cllr Evelyn

As Vice-Chairman of South Lakeland District Council's Licensing Committee I am heavily involved in the Council's licensing policies. They cover a a vast range of activities from



taxis and private hire vehicles and their drivers, to pubs, clubs and restaurants, cinemas, theatres and community halls to sex shops, tattooing, caravan sites, street collections and house to house collections, pet shops, animal boarding, riding establishments and many more. Recently scrap metal dealers have been added to the list so there is even more legislation we need to bone up on.

At a meeting of the Council's Licensing Regulatory Committee in September we approved a policy to Licence Horse Drawn Hackney Carriages and Drivers for South Lakeland. Among other things it specified the qualification required for

the driver of the carriage, the roadworthiness of the carriage and the certification of the fitness and the appropriateness of the horse drawing it. So if anyone wants to operate a horse drawn hackney carriage in South Lakeland the Council is well up to speed – or at least up to a fast trot - on the matter.

Most residents only experience the licensing system through the benefits it gives in the protection of the public. But on a couple of issues they may come into contact with the authorities. One is for a Temporary Event Notice or TEN (public authorities love their acronyms!) Anyone who is planning to sell alcohol at an event such as selling mulled wine at a Christmas

Fair or selling a glass of wine at the interval of a concert needs one of these licenses. Details are given on the SLDC website. Notice needs to be given, preferably at least ten working days before the event although there is a provision for a late notice which requires five working days. This is a statutory requirement and no amount of appeals, furious phone calls or threatening emails will make any difference is you leave it too late. The other area organisers of events may need to contact the licensing officers is on what are termed small lotteries – and that covers draws and raffles where tickets are sold in advance. These do not need a licence but need to be registered with the local authority. Again the website gives details or a guick telephone call to the Licensing Department provide information.

It was my great pleasure recently to go to Liverpool in my capacity as a County Councillor to attend the opening stage of the Tour of Britain cycle race. I was there with the Cycling Officer for Cumbria, meeting many of the people who had made the event happen, with a view to seeing what we could learn as a county for the next four years when Cumbria will be hosting a stage of the Tour of Britain.

We arrived early to go for a ride ourselves - many of the roads in the centre of Liverpool were shut to traffic to allow people of all ages to ride the course that the professionals would be zipping round just a few hours later. In the warm September sunshine it was wonderful to see thousands of people in their bright yellow bibs cycling around one lap of the 8-mile course that would be covered eight times by the Tour of Britain riders.


In this completely traffic-free environment, passing through the historic centre of the city near to the Royal Liver Building and the Cunard Building, there were cyclists of all ages, sizes and ability just enjoying the moment and savouring the chance to be part of such an



important day for Liverpool.

The race itself was a very exciting affair with the breakaway group of four who had held a lead of up to two minutes over the main group of riders for most of the race gradually being hunted down by the peloton in the final lap, setting the sprint experts up for a dash for the line. Mark Cavendish came in third just behind the German Marcel Kittel in a cacophony of noise from the supporters banging the wooden barriers that lined the final section of the race. Just to show you the pace of the riders, the winner completed the 65-mile course in 2 hours 16 minutes, an average speed of almost 30 mph!

On the way back we discussed what options there may be for Cumbria to do something similar, allowing families and casual cyclists as well as the very fit to ride in traffic-free splendour the course that will be used by professionals later in the day. It could be one of the county's main towns such as Kendal. Carlisle or Barrow but what about a tour of one of the lakes in the Lake District with the stunning backdrop of the fells to showcase the area? Coniston would be an obvious choice as it is already used for the annual running race known as the Coniston 14 and offers scenic views around its whole length. Surely a 12-hour road closure would be a price worth paying for an event

In fact they received the report some time ago but as far as I can see they have done nothing with it. Normally Ministers make a decision more or less immediately they receive the report, this delay is unfair and seems to be starting to cause problems as people feel uncertain over whether they will be in or out of the National Park. This starts to affect property prices, decisions over building plans and various other things. I really cannot see why they are taking so long unless there is some major problem we don't know about.

On the subject of housing I have been supporting a bill through Parliament that will change the Government's plans for housing developments. The Government has

#### SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

On the final outing of the summer, members of the Society visited the new Carlisle Archive Centre at Petteril Bank. The centre is one of four in Cumbria. The others are situated in Barrow, Whitehaven and Kendal and each of them houses a wealth of archival material most of which relates to its surrounding area.

Tom Robson, the Senior Archivist who took us on a tour of the building described how the new Carlisle Archives had come into being in 2011. Its predecessor had been housed in Carlisle Castle where conditions were cramped and no longer fit for purpose. 8.2 million pounds were needed for a replacement. A grant of 4.8 million pounds was obtained from the National Lottery and the remainder was provided by Cumbria County Council.

The architects who were commissioned to design the new structure came up with a most imaginative solution. This involved renovating and transforming Lady Gifford's House, a Georgian, Grade 2 listed building on Petteril Bank Road by adding a glass-fronted extension which houses the main archive vault and a public study area. In addition, from the garden which has been attractively landscaped there are pleasant countryside views.

The tour began in the house itself where Tom showed us how a glass passageway seamlessly linked the original building to the extension. One

of the interesting features of the archives centre is the wedding room which has been located in the old house, providing an atmospheric venue for ceremonies. Tom then took us to the state-of-the-art temperature and humidity-controlled strong room, where documents would be preserved from fire damage because inert gas (instead of water) would be released if necessary. Our next port of call was the conservation room where fragile and damaged artefacts are preserved and restored by experts in the field.

Finally we arrived in the search room where visitors can ask for advice and consult archives which they have requested. The archives centre holds documents which date from the twelfth century to the present day, including priceless items like the Royal Charter of Carlisle which bears the seal of Edward 111. Some of the sources of evidence which are frequently searched are: censuses; parish registers; newspapers; maps; wills and trade directories.

We were grateful to Tom for giving us such an interesting overview of the building, a treasure trove which is accessible and free for the use of the general public. Furthermore it is one of the most modern county archive centres in the country.



War Memorial after which Sedbergh School's CCF and Brass band marched through the town with the Salute taken on the steps of Lupton House.




cakes like that every month. In fact, when it's my turn to be hostess you can expect digestive biscuits.

#### **CITIZENS ADVICE BUREAU**

Major changes to Vehicle Road Tax From 1 October 2014, there are 3 changes to be aware of:

- the paper road tax disc will no longer be issued as the DVLA computer record is sufficient for the Police to know who has a valid tax disc (so no more paper tax discs in windscreens).
- if you sell a vehicle and you have notified DVLA, you will automatically get a refund for any full calendar months left on the vehicle tax.
- when you buy a vehicle, the vehicle tax will no longer be transferred with the vehicle, so you will need to get new vehicle tax before you can use the vehicle, using the New Keeper Supplement (V5C/2) part of the vehicle registration certificate (V5C) by phone 0300-790-6801



or online at:https://www.gov.uk/ government/organisations/driver-

and-vehicle-licensing-agency From 1 November, motorists can choose to pay by direct debit. Provided an MOT remains valid, the payments will continue automatically until you cancel the Direct Debit with

> your bank, or tell DVLA to stop taking them, or a Statutory Off Road Notification (SORN) has been made. Apply online using the details above and your unique reference number given

on your DVLA reminder sent in the post.

Another change is the option to pay monthly, as well as the existing annual and biennial options. There's no surcharge for an annual license, otherwise an admin charge of 5% will be added.

If all this sounds baffling, you can still sort out all your vehicle tax at a Post Office.

Before you pass on without a look please believe me that, townie though I am, I have lived in the countryside long enough to understand at least some of the problems and hardships endured by the farming community, particularly those in the harsh, unproductive uplands. Last year was terrible. This year the winter was mild, spring and early summer were wonderful and the autumn looks as if it might be a good one too. The least said about August the better! I'm told the lambing season was the best for years and the grass seemed to almost never stop growing. Bumper hay crops were

gathered in and healthy stock feed in fields and on fells. However the good lambing season has inevitably led to a glut and lowered prices at the market. At the same time the last panic about imported meat has been forgotten and urban consumers (many of whom are also feeling the economic pinch) are demanding ever cheaper food, leading to more pressure on prices and greater imports. Wool costs more to clip than it earns. Fuel prices and other costs rise inexorably. It seems that the upland farmers can never win. For how much longer is this sustainable?

However, the land has to be used sustainably. I know landowners care passionately about the environment, but there is still pressure to cut corners, to overstock and overgraze, sometimes encouraged by the everchanging subsidy system. Last winter some of the fell areas in the Howgills appeared to be almost constantly covered with more sheep than they could sustain, put there because of the mild conditions and kept close by supplementary feeding. Some people may like the totally bare appearance of the fells and I have been assured that the "Howgills have never been wooded". That is clearly nonsense as the wooded gills and exuberant growth of trees in the recently fenced Jubilee woodland have proved. Since excluding sheep our biggest problem there is cutting the growth back fast enough each year to allow the woodland plants to blossom. This summer I saw just one tiny sprig of

heather on the fells where the sheep had overlooked it. With less grazing there would be more plants. Overgrazing eventually leads to faster runoff of rainwater in storms, less productive soil, more coarse vegetation and less nutritious growth for feeding sheep. This is not sustainable.

Tourism is also vitally important to the economy of this area, not least as supplementary income for some of the farms. Tourists expect well maintained footpaths, spectacular landscape, interesting wildlife and clean streams and rivers. They like our winding lanes, beautiful managed hedgerows, tidy farms and pretty houses. They love the northern welcome that they unfailingly get. They also want (and pay for) accommodation, ice cream, local crafts and goods and local food. But ever increasing numbers of bikers roar up and down those small winding lanes, cyclists bike slowly and increasing numbers of cars make local access slow and difficult. Paths become eroded and there is pressure on the environment. At what level does this become unsustainable?

Visitors, liking what they see, move here and buy up properties at prices that locals cannot often afford, bringing money, new vitality, ideas and businesses and custom for local products and local craftsmen. How will this affect farming? Will there be bigger farms, smaller farms, fewer sheep, more tenanted grazing, fewer farmers left to maintain the landscape or committed new landowners with a passion for wildlife? What impacts will there be on the environment?

Sustainability is a concept that is easy to pay lip service to but hard to nail down. It is much easier to point to what is unsustainable. Before we can define sustainable we have to have a conversation as a community and wider society, together with planners, politicians and those who hold the subsidy purse-strings, about just what it is we are trying to sustain.

#### **SPEEDWATCH**

Dear Editor,

When the Sedbergh Speedwatch initiative was first publicized in Lookaround earlier this year, I did not waste much time in becoming its first volunteer. Like yourself, the excessive speed of many motorists within Sedbergh's 30mph speed limits has concerned me for many years. I was therefore looking forward to being part of a team which would hopefully assist in educating motorists about the dangers of excessive speed.

I was, however, warned by family and friends that my involvement might quickly make me unpopular. This has certainly proved to be the case. Being one of the few true 'locals' (60 years born and bred) who volunteered for the service, I am quite well known (and hopefully liked and respected) by most residents of Sedbergh and district. I took part in the second training session conducted by Cumbria Police on August 19th, when we were given instruction on using the radar gun at the bottom of Highfield Road and further down Station Road. I was obviously noticed by many motorists who passed during that half hour, and have since been the subject to the wrath of quite a few local residents. III feeling first made itself known during the training session, when we were approached by a local resident who accused us of 'joining the snoopers'. We were told in no uncertain terms that the was no need for this kind of

activity in Sedbergh, and that this function should be left to the police. Many others have since vented their anger and resentment in my presence. One resident is concerned because warning letters were not sent out to all Sedbergh households to alert everyone about this initiative. I did point out that it has been widely advertised in Lookaround for some months, to which the reply was that not everyone (himself included) buys a copy. I did remind him that prior warning is amply provided by signage stating the legal 30mph speed limit.

I have tried to appease my dissenters by confirming that the initiative is merely to educate motorists about the hazards of

excessive speed. Civilian volunteers have no powers to stop nor to prosecute motorists, merely to record the registration numbers of vehicles which are travelling at excessive speed. Persistent repeat offenders may then be dealt with by the police. Civilian volunteers are not even allowed to operate the radar gun within sight of the 30mph speed limits, which offers motorists some opportunity to reduce their speed after entering the restricted zone.

It somewhat surprises and disappoints me that the majority of people who have expressed their disapproval are from a more mature age group, rather than the younger element which may be deemed more

It is therefore with some regret that I have felt it necessary to tender my resignation from the Sedbergh Community Speedwatch group. I shall of course continue to offer my full support to the initiative, and will always attempt to drive within the prevailing speed limit. I also hope that sufficient volunteers are recruited to ensure the continuity of this service, before someone is killed or seriously injured by a speeding motorist. Yours faithfully

#### FRIENDS OF ST ANDREW'S CHURCH, SEDBERGH

St Andrew's Church has stood proud and fair at the heart of the town for centuries. It plays a central part in our community, hosting sad and happy milestones through people's lifetimes.

It is not just a centre for worship by both the Anglican and Catholic Communities, but it is also a venue for many diverse functions. As well as regular church services it is a centre for performances of many kinds. Once again it has been at the heart of the established biennial music festival featuring a wide variety of concerts from visiting and local musicians playing to full audiences who were literally dancing in the aisles at one event. More recently it hosted the Summer Fete on a brilliant sunny day and is a regular venue for Town Band concerts. Early in August, it was a centre for the remembrance of the start of the First World War.

The upkeep of this Grade One listed building is an ongoing cost – what will need repairing next?

Some twenty years ago, the foresighted wardens and supporters of our church set up The Friends of St Andrew's Church. Major restoration work was looming and they realised that a long-term plan was needed.

The aim was 'to pass on the church in good order for the future'-- a charity to finance repairs to the church and build up a reserve fund for rainy days. We have certainly had plenty of rainy days, real and metaphorical, since then!

This fund is to manage those repairs and improvements which are not covered from other sources. For example, a generous bequest paid for the reordering of the church when the chancel floor was extended to create space for drama and musical performances. Often our own contribution is matched by a corresponding amount from other sources such as English Heritage.

By regular giving, since its inception, 'The Friends' have paid for the restoration carried out in the late 1990s. This included major work on the walls with subsequent repointing and redecorating work in the church. Consequential on the remedial work,



the rotten wall-plates under the gutters in the South wall needed tackling. In the 2000s further work included improvements to the kitchen and church rooms, work on the porches, repair of the west wall of the bell tower and the belfry window. The South East window of the Lady Chapel needed urgent repair in 2012.

Money from the Friends of St Andrew's is used entirely for the upkeep and improvement of the fabric of our church. New Friends and donors are always needed to ensure that money is available as repair work becomes needed.

Many of the current Friends are regular members of the congregation, but many are not; they are people who want to see the church remain at the centre of our community. Some are local people who have always lived in Sedbergh; some no longer live here but have family or holiday connections with the town. It is essential that the regular donations are continued to provide for the future. In earlier days, the capital accrued attracted a further income from interest; but as rates are so low, this is no longer an additional source.

Please can you consider becoming a Friend by making a donation, or a regular covenant. Leaflets and forms are available from the church, or contact either of the numbers below. It is still our task to pass on the church in good order for future generations!

#### **BOLIVIA WORLD CHALLENGE**

I have just returned from a month long expedition to Bolivia with the World Challenge Organisation. This trip involved trekking in the Andes, working with the charity 'Habitat for Humanity' helping a family to build their own home, going to an orphanage in La Paz and spending just over a day near the border of Peru.

The trip was far more than I expected it to be as my group had to do our own budgeting and organise our food, travel and accommodation in-country and travelling to/ from Bolivia. The high altitude in Bolivia is also something you can't begin to prepare for at home as the lack of oxygen makes everything physically exhausting.

My eyes have been thoroughly opened to the wider world. I saw how little the people of Bolivia have – the most basic of housing with no

#### YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Access Forum needs new members A group that helps to improve public access and recreation in the Yorkshire Dales National Park is on the lookout for new members.

There are currently eight vacancies on the independent Yorkshire Dales Access Forum, which provides guidance and advice on ways to improve and manage public access and opportunities for open-air recreation in this beautiful landscape.

Mohammed Dhalech (correct), the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's Access Development Officer, said: "The forum's job is to work with individuals and organisations who live and work in the 680 square miles of the National Park and those who use or visit the area for leisure and enjoyment, and to advise on ways to improve access and recreation in this special place.

"This can be anything from looking at mobility issues to suggesting an upgrade of a specific footpath. The members also respond to consultations on a range of documents and strategies issued at local and national level."

The forum members should represent a balance of interests ranging from land management and agriculture to local business and outdoor recreation, although there is currently under-representation in land management and farming.

The forum meets three times a year, but some members also sit on a variety of advisory groups that meet



regularly to consider specific issues in more detail and report back accordingly.

Chairman Alistair Thompson said: "Access forums were set up to improve access in the countryside and to help resolve potential conflicts between those who own and work the land and the people who use it for recreation. For that reason, it is important that the members have a range of interests that enable the forum to represent a balanced view."







little girl to Batty's Grocers and or Dinsdales, one sold Walls Ice Cream and it was voted a bit better than the Lyon's sold by the other! The Post Office was a thriving business in it's own right as was Middleton's which sold almost everything except food. Pot menders, Hen rings, Pyrex dishes, Wallpaper & Paint, Ladies, Gents & Children's clothing, Toys and fancy goods and lots inbetween. At Christmas the windows would be brightly decorated and little faces would come and press up against the glass especially at the Toy window. Then, Billy Middleton would go of around the Dale, and beyond, "Travelling" with his wares to the farms, always made very welcome

and usually returning with lighter packing cases. Now, we have one shop which includes the PO two mornings a week, it would be to the disadvantage of the life of the dale should this too be delegated to the history books.

The glorious weather which has continued over recent weeks has helped my home grown grapes to flourish along with Strawberries and Tomatoes, the bags we grew our spuds in have yielded from 28 to 6 as we have emptied them out, the smaller number ones perhaps missed out on watering or feeding. A recent purchase of a fleece pop-up plant cover and a mesh one along with a small, grandly named, "fruit cage" make for exciting times ahead. Enjoy your gardens and as well as thinking back keep looking forward, that is the most exciting!



#### SEDBERGH MEDICAL PRACTICE

Once again this year, as well as the normal flu injections, we will also be offering the shingles vaccination and the nasal flu vaccine for children. We will be able to fit these in with the existing Flu clinics which take place at the surgery on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> October between 9am-11am as a walk in clinic, we will also be running a flu clinic in Dent Methodist Church on Monday 6<sup>th</sup> October between 11.30am - 12.15pm. Please telephone the practice if you are attending the Dent clinic.

The patients eligible for the seasonal flu vaccination are those patients aged 65 and over on 31<sup>st</sup> March 2015, pregnant women, those patients aged 6 months to 64 years defined as at risk.

Children aged 2, 3 and 4 as at 1<sup>st</sup> September 2014 and those with a date of birth between 1/9/2003 and 31/08/2010 who are not in the seasonal flu at risk groups are eligible for a nasal flu vaccination - these can be given in the Saturday morning clinics or alternatively please telephone the surgery for an appointment. (01539 718191)

To be eligible for the shingles vaccination a patient has to be aged 70, 78 or 79 on 1<sup>st</sup> September 2014, other age groups will be introduced in future years to ensure that all patients aged 70-79 are offered the vaccination.

"Don't worry if you've never donated before. Giving blood is easy and there's lots of information on our website about what to expect when you donate."

Patients in need of blood in accident and emergency situations, patients undergoing surgery and receiving treatment for cancer and blood diseases, and women haemorrhaging in childbirth rely on blood donors. While overall blood use within the NHS has reduced, thanks to improvements in clinical and surgical practices, hospitals and patients still rely on more than 7,000 people attending a donation session every day across England and North Wales for the blood they need.

Every donor can save or improve up to three lives every time they donate blood.

In general, as long as you are fit and healthy, weigh over 7 stone 12 lbs (50kg) and are aged between 17 and 66 (up to 70 if you have given blood before) you should be able to give blood. If you are over 70, you need to have given blood in the last two years

to continue donating.

#### K-SET

Killington Sustainable Energy Trust Planning applications, impoundment licence, abstraction licence, establishing site ownership, sound survey, weir survey, ecological survey, feasibility study, flood risk assessment, objections from local fishermen and Environment Agency licence are just a few of the many hurdles which have been encountered in our guest to install an Archimedes-screw water-turbine at Broadraine Weir. The actual planning, design and engineering problems have also required a huge investment in time and energy on the part of the

enthusiastic Committee members. All of this before the small matter of raising the sum of £500,000 for the actual construction is considered. Many thousands of pounds have already been spent (mostly assisted by various grants), to pay for many of the expensive surveys and studies listed above. Even the connection to the National Grid is going to cost us dear, the last quote being for £34.600! If the new transformer is to be ground-mounted, it could add yet another £30,000 to the bill. Is it any wonder that there are so few hydroelectric schemes in the UK, even in an area such as South Lakeland which has so many locations ideally suited for the generation of electricity from water, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year and without the highly controversial visual impact of wind turbines or fields full of hundreds of solar panels.

#### **OCTOBER GARDENING**

It has been a bumper year for fruits, vegetables and hedgerow crops. During the last few weeks I have been picking "Japanese Quinces" from the ornamental bush in the border, fresh figs from a wall trained tree in a garden in Silverdale and quantities of hazel nuts from the local hedgerows. Cob nuts (bred from the native hazel Corylus avellana ) and Filberts (C. maxima which hales from south eastern Europe ) have been in cultivation since the sixteenth centaury. They are easy to grow and flourish in any type of well drained soil but though they are self fertile the male and female flowers are infrequently born on the bushes at the same time, so you do need to have more than one plant and more than one variety of nut in order to get a crop. Nuts are harvested, and eaten fresh, rather than being stored. Like their wild counterparts, cultivated cobnuts and filberts have bumper years and lean years. Flowering so early they are very dependant on the early spring weather and can easily

be ruined by a badly timed frost.

I have never grown Medlars (*Mespilus germanica*), but they do make an attractive tree with large pink and white blossoms in early summer followed by brown rosehip shaped fruit and brilliant autumn colour. Medlars were most popular in Victorian times when they were eaten as dessert fruits or as Medlar fool. Fruits are picked in October and early November but are then stored to mature (a process known as bletting). When the skin turns dark brown, the flesh turns soft and brown and sweet and the fruit is ready to eat.

Similar in flower to the Medlar, the quince (*Cydonia oblonga*) has also been cultivated in Europe for many centauries. Quince fruits are pear shaped but golden in colour. They are tart and hard and are not suitable for eating raw, but are excellent in jams.

All of these fruit make attractive specimens in their own right. It is unlikely that they would bear a good crop here on the top of Firbank Fell but I am very tempted to try them out purely for their ornamental qualities. Elaine Horne

#### AUGUST WEATHER

Generally a mixed month weatherwise. Temperatures varied from a high of 77.5F (25C) to a low of 36.7F (2C). The latter temperature was low enough to give a ground frost in places. Pressure was generally around normal except when the "remains" of hurricane Bertha reached us when we recorded our lowest pressure, 28.82 inches of mercury, and our strongest gust for the month, 24mph from a Westerly direction. Rainfall was 5.44 inches overall with only a couple of periods of 4 and 5 days when it didn't actually rain. The heaviest shower came on the day that "Bertha" passed through.

We are still very short of butterflies. A few peacocks and the odd red admiral and tortoiseshell, plus a few small whites, have been the sum total. Badgers continue to be active digging in the field. Rats are still around in spite of trapping some. They simply did not stop breeding last winter as it was so mild. Rabbits are about again but not back to anything like their former numbers yet. Birds, particularly sparrows, are active at

the feeding station. The pigeons clear up anything the sparrows drop. The adult swallows seem to have gone but a couple of youngsters are still returning to roost in the kennels. There is a good crop of brambles, sloes, damsons and plums. Apples are somewhat patchy, pears non existent again. Hopefully we will be able to beat the birds to some of the fruit if they leave it to ripen! As it has been the year of the wasp they will also be after the fruit. We've had 2 wasp nests, the size of footballs, in the loft with the occasional wasp being attracted to the downlighter bulbs and some falling through onto the landing. A campaign with foam and spray has reduced them significantly but one is difficult to get at.

### Western Dales Bus

Saturday Bus to Kendal As has been reported in the local press, the county council is in the process of withdrawing all its subsidies to Cumbria's bus services. As a result, the Saturday 564 bus service from Brough to Kendal via Sedbergh operated by Grand Prix Coaches is going to end on Saturday November 2<sup>nd</sup>.

In response to this situation, Western Dales Bus, the local community bus run by trained volunteers, will be increasing the number of journeys between Sedbergh and Kendal on its Saturday 564A service. The present 564A timetable will continue until November 2<sup>nd</sup>, but from November 8<sup>th</sup> onwards, the bus will make four journeys between Sedbergh and Kendal each Saturday instead of the present single trip, thus enabling passengers from Sedbergh to continue to travel to Kendal by bus on a Saturday.

#### ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR


