



COUNCILLORS CORNER

To her great credit, Sedbergh's Parish Clerk, Janey Hassam, is already thinking about school transport arrangements for September 2015. You may ask - why be worried so much in advance? The answer lies in the change in Post-16 Transport ie school buses carrying children over the age of 16.

Central government has decreed that children should stay on in education until the age of 18 but has failed to back up this otherwise laudable measure by paying for transport for these children to get to school. This has fallen to local authorities, but in the face of a 25%

cut in central government funding (amounting to a cut of £200 million over 8 years), Cumbria County Council (CCC) will have to stick strictly to what are its statutory duties: free transport for children below the age of 16 to their nearest catchment school, but no more than this.

In Sedbergh the situation is complicated: Settlebeck has no sixth form, so many parents prefer to send their children aged 11 - 16 out of catchment to Queen Elizabeth School (QES) in Kirkby Lonsdale or to Queen Katherine School in Kendal so that they have continuity at the same school from 11 right through to 18 years old. They are prepared to pay for the transport to send their children

out of catchment. The fact that there is no sixth form at Settlebeck means that children aged over 16 from Sedbergh and the surrounding parishes have no choice but to travel to Kirkby Lonsdale or Kendal for their education.

As of September 2015 all subsidies for Post-16 Transport stop. What is needed is full and open discussions between the schools, the parents, bus operators and CCC to arrive at the best transport solution. This would mean that the schools know in advance the numbers of pupils they will have in each year and can plan budgets accordingly; parents have the peace of mind that their children will be transported by bus even if this

means a higher cost than has been the case to date; bus operators have the time to plan how many buses and what size buses are needed for regular school runs and we avoid the nightmare situation of hundreds of extra cars around the schools driven by parents (many of whom work) taking their children to school or driven by pupils who then have to find somewhere to park all day.

We recently had a very productive meeting at QES to talk about these issues - as long as there is a free flow of information between schools, parents and Cumbria County Council, and a commitment by all three parties to make compromises to make things work, we should be able to come to a solution.

There has been some concern that the familiar rusting boxes and cages for recycling in Joss Lane Car Park have been replaced with new plastic wheeled bins. Some of the old containers were up to 30 years old and urgently needed replacement or refurbishment and because of the variety of containers different types of vehicle were needed to empty them. In addition there was the safety issue because some of the banks needed to be hoisted up on a crane to empty them. On several occasions I have watched aghast as people ducked under the safety tape and blithely walked underneath a swinging cardboard recycling bank.

The new bins are colour coded black for cardboard/paper, white for

plastic and blue for cans and are standard throughout South Lakeland. With the new bins it means that the majority of stock can be emptied with one type of vehicle. The new containers can also be emptied by a compactor vehicle so that the emptying process can be made more efficient reducing the number of vehicles required and the fuel used. The new containers, especially those for plastic, are easier to use. With the old green cages the flaps at the top, used when the bins filled up, were too high and often jammed open allowing plastic waste to fly around the car park.

In the longer term there is likely to be less use for "Bring" sites like that at Joss Lane Car Park. Between 2015 and 2019 SLDC is planning to roll out the kerbside collection of plastic and cardboard so residents will no longer have to "bus their trash" as the Americans say.

decisions, and the behaviour of the applicants in the case of the anemometer I fear there is little understanding of the planning process. It might be a weakness of the planning acts but in reality it is deliberate: councillors serving on a planning committee are not there to do what they or their electors want. They are there to uphold the law of the land and the law is very clear: planning committee members should determine a planning application according to the local development framework unless there are material planning considerations which dictate otherwise. This is called a "quasi-

judicial decision" - in a planning From the public comments about the matter the committee is like a jury in a criminal court. It is not there to find the defendant guilty because they want him to be guilty, it is there to determine the facts of the matter.

> And so on the anemometer application, on the face of it there was little reason to grant. It had been a part of the Killington windfarm proposal, but that is currently dead. Unusually the officer recommendation was to grant on the grounds that the visual harm from the mast was mitigated by the information that could be garnered. I and a majority of my colleagues took a contrary view and on this occasion the application was rejected. I am strongly of the

opinion that the site, being of the highest scenic value is totally inappropriate for wind turbines and every one of the neighbouring parish councils opposed the application. Having said that, I was surprised and delighted when that application was turned down.

To most fair-minded people the damage to Kendal town centre and our surrounding rural villages and towns from the Sainsbury's proposal is self-evident. However, that is not the point. Two earlier applications for the same Rugby Field site had been rejected and rejected at appeal. However, those appeal decisions laid down clear criteria which an application would have to meet

before it could be granted. It was clear to me that the essence of these conditions had been met by this new application. A majority of those of my colleagues who were present took a similar view and so the application succeeded. That is not to say we want a Sainsbury's or any more supermarkets in Kendal, we don't.

The public debate has unfairly centred upon five Lib Dem members who were not present and whether their presence would have altered the vote. That is unknowable and totally besides the point. No member can be at every meeting of any public body although they should always make a reasonable effort to attend.

What is knowable is that the applicants would have appealed against such a refusal and permission would certainly have been granted on that appeal. There might also have been the possibility of costs being awarded against the council.

In my view it is the law concerning out of town centre retail development as a whole which is wrong, not a particular application. I can see little justification for any of the applications which have been granted during the last ten years. The effect on independent retailers and our village and town High Streets is as obvious as it is inevitable. But, if there is a solution, and I believe there is, then it is through the system of premises





taxation, not development control.

TIM FARRON MP

Sadly I was not surprised to learn last month that about 60% of all deaths from road accidents in this country happen on country roads. Although I wasn't surprised I was still horrified to learn that on average 3 people die every day on roads like ours and sometimes, unfortunately, ours. So I am very pleased that the Government is at last launching a campaign to encourage people to drive more carefully on rural roads and in particular to think ahead a bit more than many do to anticipate animals and other road users that might be just around the next corner. You cannot live around Sedbergh and Dent without being aware of the challenges of driving down country roads but as you know not everyone

uses your roads with the same degree of care and indeed even when people do take care things can happen that surprise them. You only have to think back to the number of times people were surprised to find themselves sliding around on the bend on the A684 up above Lily Mere earlier this year to realise this is true.

However, it is not just about drivers taking care we also need the Cumbria County Council to do their bit and keep the roads safe for us to drive along (as they clearly did not on the A684). Every time someone tells me of a new pothole or other hazard that the council should sort out I pass on the issue and then check to see what they are planning to do about it. So

you can help keep the roads safer by simply letting me know of any holes or other problems that need sorting out.

With milk prices again falling I have been putting as much pressure as I can on the Government to do something to help. I realise a lot of this is down to the fall in global milk prices but we now have a supermarket ombudsman whose job is to ensure that supermarkets do not abuse their power at these times and bully small suppliers like dairy farmers into accepting ridiculously low prices for their products. It seems to me that this fall in milk prices is exactly the situation where this new ombudsman should be justifying her

societies hosts a national conference and this year the lot fell to the YDS particularly because of the fact that this November is the 60th anniversary of the founding of our own National Park in 1954. The event therefore became a joint effort between the Society and the Authority the latter providing a small grant as well as officer back-up and support. I was lucky enough to be a delegate at the three day conference which was held near Skipton.

The theme of the conference was focusing on how young people could become more involved in the future of the Yorkshire Dales and to examine how businesses, the public sector and voluntary organisations are

working, and can work in the future, to offer opportunities for young people living and working within and close to the National Park and the Dales. It is a sad fact that the population of the Park has now become static and this year showed no increase in the resident population. Many people, particularly young ones, are moving away because they are no longer able to find employment in the Dales and / or cannot find affordable housing for themselves. The conference's aim was to address these issues by inviting specialists in these fields to speak about these matters in the light of their own experience.

well known Dales "characters" - Bill Mitchell one of the founding editors of the "Dalesman" magazine, Colin Speakman a prolific writer on the Yorkshire Dales and community activist particularly in the field of transport, John Avison the Chairman of the YDS and also the Chairman, Peter Charlesworth, and Chief Executive, David Butterworth, of the Park Authority itself. I particularly enjoyed a presentation by Gary Verity of "Welcome to Yorkshire" who described very amusingly how he and his team were able to persuade the Tour de France organisers to bring the Grand Depart to Yorkshire. Most of the second day of the conference was spent out in the field visiting local projects, businesses and initiatives to see how they were rising to the challenge of either employing young people directly or by way of apprenticeship schemes. There were six young people amongst the delegates as a result of bursaries offered to them by the organisers. The National Park is also doing its bit in this respect by offering

opportunities to young people to train as National Park rangers. We had a plenary session on the final day when delegates had the opportunity to put questions to a Panel comprising representatives from the National Park. The Yorkshire Dales Millenium Trust, the YDS and an organiser of activities on behalf of the young people. Julian Smith the MP for Skipton and Ripon also gave a short address which regretfully failed to address the issue of how a significant reduction of funding to National Park Authorities across the whole of the country by central government is seriously compromising the work which the National Parks are able carry out across their communities to

I would like to think that next year we could give greater profile to Yorkshire Day on the 1st August to celebrate our roots and I shall be raising this at Sedbergh Parish Council in due course and hope that Dent and Garsdale Parish Councils will also give consideration to the same.



'Good neighbours stop rogue traders' campaign

Doorstep criminals exploit vulnerable people by convincing them to pay for shoddy or incomplete repair work, charging extortionate fees for their services, or use threatening behaviour. The 'Good Neighbours Stop Rogue Traders' campaign focuses on preventing doorstep crime by encouraging neighbours, family, friends and carers to look out for those most at risk in their communities.

Signs of Traders cold calling in your area include building or maintenance works starting unexpectedly, visibly poor quality work and unmarked vans. Your neighbour may be anxious or distressed, and visit the bank, building society or post office more often.

What can you do? Offer to be a 'Nominated Neighbour' this enables your neighbour to direct any cold callers to you by showing a card with your name on it. Find out more at https://www.cumbria.gov.uk/elibrary/ Content/Internet/533/4129611046.pdf

If work has already started, ask your neighbour in private if things are OK, make a note of vehicle registration numbers, ask if the Trader has left any paperwork or flyers and put them in a clean food bag. If you suspect a crime call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 03454 040506,

if the situation has become volatile call the police.



SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

On 15th October Sheila Fletcher gave a very different type of talk to members of the SDHS entitled 'The History of Folksong'. It was in part a history of the development of folksong in England – an enormously broad sweep - but also an entertainment, for it was punctuated with rhymes and parts of songs sung by Sheila herself and by her partner, Peter (one felt unsure whether to break into applause after these ditties... but the audience desisted).

From the outset Sheila, a music teacher from Lazonby in North Cumbria, made the point that traditional folksongs are words set to

a tune that have been passed on from person to person, region to region, and generation to generation. Sometimes variations have been made to the tunes or wording, but basically they remain recognisable. The earliest ones can be dated as far back as the 13th century. Then the only communal singing tended to be in church and sung in Latin, but possibly the first secular song, "Sing Cuckoo", made its appearance reappearing in the 1970s in 'Bagpuss' on children's television! Other early songs included "Greensleeves", possibly composed by Henry VIII, and ballads such as "Light O' Love" appeared in Shakespeare's 'Much Ado About Nothing'. In many of these



early ballads singing was intrinsically combined with dancing - just as today with clog dancing and other regional forms.

A key boost to the spread of the folksong came with the printing of the words on broadsheets from the mid 16th century onwards. Themes during these middle ages revolved around rural life: 'life and death' (we heard "John Barleycorn", "Death and the Lady"); 'love' (Early One Morning", "Sweet Nightingale"); 'seasons' ("The Trees They Grow So High"); and 'occupations' ("Raggle Taggle Gipsies", "Soldier, Soldier").

By the time of the Industrial Revolution in the 19th century themes had shifted to the harsher factory environment with "To Be a Farmer's Boy" and "North Country Lass" both lamenting the drift into towns. "Poverty Poverty Knock" echoed the rhythms of the Batley weaving looms,

whilst "Haul Away Joe" was just one of many sea shanties reflecting gangs of sailors pulling together to hoist the sails. More recently folksongs – now, of course, with printed music scores were revived in the music hall era, with "Pretty Polly Perkins" being revamped as "Cushy Butterfield".

Probably the greatest influence on the recording and continuity of England's folk heritage has been the work of collectors such as Cecil Sharp, Samuel Pepys, Lucy Broadwood, Ralph Vaughan-Williams and Percy Grainger.

Thus today through pubs and clubs, theatres and festivals, radio, TV and 21st century multi-media the folk tradition lives on: and in Sedbergh that Wednesday evening Sheila and Peter led the assembled historians in a rousing finale of... you've guessed it... "D'ye Ken John Peel".

SEDBERGH SCHOOL

Seven Year 10 pupils from Sedbergh School spent a week at Cambridge University researching academic topics, exploring the city and meeting University fellows. Year 10 pupil Maria Page (R) reports on the visit.

Arriving by train in Cambridge station on Sunday, we walked out into a haze of sunshine, busy streets and a hailstorm of bicycles; which basically sums up our stay - plus the daily five hours of hard yet interesting work that was an unavoidable side effect of our visit. We have spent the past few days saturating our brains with our individual favourite forms of knowledge in the mornings, followed by afternoons wandering the energetic city of Cambridge. The sheer majesty of Trinity College alone inspired our hopes and dreams for the future, while our trip to the Fitzwilliam Museum was awakening to the past. This trip has been a really amazing experience, both productive and enjoyable, and we would just like to thank Mr Hollingbury for making it the trip that it was.

The group lodged at Fitzwilliam College, the alma mater of Deputy Head Dan Harrison, and the group met with admissions tutor and Lecturer in History Dr Rosemary Horrox, who talked to the pupils about the application and interview process. They also visited the National Institute of Agricultural Botany, where Dr Phil Howell talked about the ethics of GM Crops and led a tour of the facilities. On their final day, the group

went punting on the River Cam –in the safe hands of a pro-punter!

Classics Teacher Andrew Hollingbury, a graduate of Oriel College, Oxford, said: "The opportunity to research a topic outside the normal school curriculum is all too valuable, as we know from the success of the School's Extended Project programme in the Sixth Form. By giving our younger pupils the chance to do so at one of the world's greatest universities, they gain a taste of academic life beyond school and, hopefully, an understanding of whether a university such as Cambridge or any other highly regarded institution is somewhere they would aspire to study. All those we have met, from admissions tutors to research geneticists, have been impressed with the curiosity and sensibility of our pupils on the trip. and their findings and opinions on their chosen topics should prove very interesting." SEDBERGH SCHOOL OS

Old Sedberghian (OS) James Simpson-Daniel (SH) and former England winger has been forced to retire due to an ankle injury last year. James, 32, played for Gloucester after joining the club as a teenager straight from Sedbergh School, and went on to make around 250 starts across 14 seasons, scoring 118 tries. His doctor's advice ends his career on 276 club appearances.

Dan Harrison, Deputy Headmaster and former Sedbergh School Football Club Coach, said: "We are very proud

at Sedbergh for all that James has achieved in rugby since leaving us 15 years ago. At school he was a tremendous talent and in his upper sixth destroyed defences regularly from fly-half. It has been fantastic to watch him continue in this manner at the highest level of rugby and we wish him all the best in his retirement."

James is the second of four Simpson-Daniel boys to attend Sedbergh School. Some quotes from the Sedberghian magazine from his time here:

1996 Colts C1 XV 'The fact that 32 of the 40 tries scored came from the outside centre, wings and full back is testimony to... the hands and

judgments of James Simpson-Daniel – the most vertically challenged but also most clairvoyant of the inside centres on our circuit."

In 1999 James was Vice-Captain of Rugby and in 2000, playing for the 1st XV against Stoneyhurst: "The half back combination of Richard Bean and James Simpson-Daniel was without equal, with the latter displaying sleight of hand and a range and variety of passes that dazzles spectators.'

In 2000 James went on to represent Yorkshire, Northern Division, England Schools (18 Group) and captained the Sedbergh National Schools Sevens Champion Squad. He moved to play for Gloucester RFU straight

and I owe him a great deal for everything he did for me. Tom is in Powell House and has experienced the shift in takeover from Mr Webster to Mr Seymour. "Mr Webster was a Powellian in every sense of the word. He built such a strong foundation within the House and now Mr Seymour, who has taken on the baton, continues to take the House forward from strength to strength. Powell House has a feel that is difficult to put into words – we have a unity throughout all ages and I hope that never changes." one of those is cultivating the respect that younger pupils have for the older pupils, and the consciousness that older pupils need in order to be good role models." Tom's involvement in school life is varied ¬- he plays piano to Grade 6, is Captain of Fives, Squadron Leader of the RAF section, a member of the Choral Society and Chapel Choir, Captain of the Third XV, Secretary of TGI and President of the School of Athens. His aspirations after taking A2 English, Philosophy and Economics is to take a Gap year at a boarding school in Vancouver and then to study Law, hopefully at Durham University.

One memory, in particular, that Tom vividly remembers at Sedbergh was his first Remembrance Day Service. "It was an emotional day on many levels. The service itself was beautiful and reflective, and the crisp, autumnal day made it all that more special. It was followed, the next year, by my visit to the Battlefields and to RAF Valley in Anglesey, where Price William is based. At RAF Valley, I held the Victoria Cross awarded to an Old Sedberghian and that was a moment

I will never forget. It is an extremely proud moment for me to be Head of School and Head of the RAF Squadron in this Centenary year of First World War commemorations. I hope that during my year in this role, I am seen as someone who is approachable, regardless of gender or age. I want to lead by example and set the tone for all pupils. I have a fantastic prefect body behind me, and I am very lucky to have such a supportive Deputy Head in Alex Porter."

Headmaster Andrew Fleck said: "Tom has been a popular choice amongst staff and pupils. He is a Sedberghian through and through; an enthusiastic 2nd XI cricketer and member of the 3rd XV, he is a chorister and excellent student. Most of all has a clear moral compass and is measured in his judgement. This has earned him widespread respect and marked him out for the role."

Tom's former Housemaster Dr Hoskin said: "I have the highest regard for Tom; he maintained exemplary standards as Head of SJS (2009-10) and proved himself to be utterly dependable as a House Prefect. Tom's deep-rooted Christian values were admirable and I recall numerous occasions when he stood up for what was morally right. Tom was an all-rounder in the truest sense and his name adorns the House boards. The only chink in Tom's armoury, which I am certain he will readily admit to, was his inability to bat against my off-spin bowling!"

SHEEPFEST

13/14 September 2014

For one amazing weekend in September the town of Sedbergh was awash with a glorious display of sheep made by local businesses, voluntary organisations, schools and individuals - as was Farfield Mill which had initiated and obtained funding for this project. The heads of two giant rams peered down on Finkle Street and the harpist from the early music group Corn'ewe'copia her fleece made from music scores entertained the crowds at the church gates. Outside the vets a ewe stood patiently as children queued to deliver her lamb – and put it back. 'I want to born it again, granny, let me born it again!' Lamblet, Prince of Denmark, raised the tone holding aloft a skull (sheep's) 'Alas, poor Ewerick, I knew thee well . . .' And a dare-devil tup from Bendrigg Lodge, complete with helmet and wheel-chair, abseiled down the church tower. These are just a few examples of 119 sheep (counting the entries that were more than one) in a community project which revealed the astonishing creativity of this small town and the wit and professionalism of the work that was produced. This was due in no small measure to Donna Campbell, Sue Gilmartin and Emily Jackson of the community arts group Art Sense, based in Kendal. Employed for 4 months to take workshops they helped everyone from children to their grandparents realise their vision. They had exactly the right approach, listening to ideas, not imposing their own, offering

Heritage and other supporting charities have helped us secure the complete restoration and weather proofing of the Tower and Bier Room (at a cost of £38,000), we can now plan to convert the old Bier Room into a Loo for the disabled and a Coffee Bar to serve refreshments. We will be advised by the architect how to design this, but one might imagine a doorway being created at the north west end of the Nave through into the Bier Room, which would be divided into two separate panelled compartments, one for the loo and one for the kitchen. We have been given an estimated cost of £28,000 for the work, which the PCC would

have raise. Certainly, with the many extra services and events which have been taking place this year, there is a great need for these facilities. You will see advertisements in Lookaround for fundraisers to begin raising the money.

Cowgill is fortunate to have a loo, but the interior of the church building is in urgent need of restoration and redecoration. An estimate of £10,000 is given for the work and the PCC will be advertising events and fundraisers to support this project.

The underlying message of all these efforts to develop our church buildings is that the church council believes both churches have a future

as "living churches," – places of worship, yes, but who are at the centre of our small communities and are places where the life of the community is expressed and celebrated and where all are welcome.

SEDBERGH WI

A goodly number of members and 3 guests braved the pouring rain on October 8th to watch the cakedecorating demonstration by Lee of Beaulea's Cake Studio. She told us that the fashion for tiered fruit cakes decorated with royal icing for weddings had been replaced in favour of iced sponge cakes in a variety of flavours: you needed to use a Madeira sponge recipe, though, as a Victoria sponge was not dense enough to bear the weight of the sugarpaste icing she used. She had prepared a three-tier sponge cake to demonstrate her technique. It did look a bit scruffy and uneven as it sat on the table waiting for its makeover and

we wondered how she was going to cover up all the uneven sides. She explained that she baked her sponges in large rectangles and then cut out the shapes required – hence the uneven cut of the cake on the table. It's more economical that way. she said, than baking cakes in round tins and losing chunks when you turn them out (my usual fate!).

Lee showed us how to prepare a very light buttercream filling: equal quantities of butter and icing sugar plus a little boiled water which you mix together with an electric mixer, leave it to get on with mixing while you go and have a cup of tea(!), then go back and check how it's getting on. She then deftly slid one layer of

cake onto a board and spread it thickly with fluffy buttercream before placing it centrally on the square presentation board. (We were horrified and nauseated to learn that in America they make buttercream with LARD and icing sugar!!)The same process was repeated as the next layer was spread with raspberry jam and deftly slid onto the first buttercreamed layer. Time for the last layer to be put on top of the jam, then the three tiers were straightened up, and the whole cake deftly spread with a thin smooth layer of buttercream to act as the base for the sugarpaste icing. Lee kneaded the ready-made sugarpaste (she advised us which

brand NOT to use!) to get rid of any bubbles before showing us how to roll it out (miraculously, I thought, with cornflour!) to make a proper circle which she could then use to cover the cake and square board after deftly lifting it over the cake with the rolling pin. She finished off the decorating with pretty shapes cut out of pink icing, finally tying a pink ribbon with a perfectly executed bow around the cake. Christine Sheppey, who bakes wonderful cakes but has so far not attempted sugarpaste icing, thanked Lee for her inspiring demonstration which we all enjoyed and learned a great deal from. I think I can confidently predict that Christine has



LEST WE FORGET

In July Andrew Jones, son of John and Angela Jones, of Millthrop visited the Kirkee Memorial near Poona in India. He was visiting on behalf of the Old Sedberghian Club to pay respects to Major Norman Ruthven Anderson, an Old Sedberghian, who was murdered by a fanatical sepoy whilst embarking troops in Bombay on 20 November 1914. Andrew very kindly offered to take crosses to remember the two local soldiers who are remembered on the Kirkee Memorial. He wrote each of their names on the front and on the reverse "The residents of Sedbergh remember".

Private John George Capstick, 34129, 1st Bn. South Staffordshire Regiment, who died on 4 August 1917, aged 28. Son of John and Sarah Capstick of Beckside, Howgill and husband of Elizabeth Capstick, of Murthwaite, Fell End.

Ravenstonedale, and father of a son. Enlisted first in Border Regiment. He had been in India a few months when he succumbed dysentery at the





PRIVATE JOHN CAPSTICK, South Staffs Regt., of Howgill, Sedbergh, died in hospital at Bombay, India 4th August, 1917.

Colabra Hospital, Bombay. Remembered with Honour on the Kirkee 1914-1918 Memorial Lance Corporal Joseph Gibson. 201793, 2nd/4th Bn. Border Regiment, who died on 23 September 1918, aged 24. Son of Robert and Ann Gibson of Finkle Street, Sedbergh. Formerly rural postman between Sedbergh and Garsdale. Member of Conservative Association in Sedbergh. Enlisted in Kendal November 1915. In India for three years. Died of pneumonia in malaria convalescent hospital in Daghsai.

REMEMBRANCE 14

This summer, on the 4th August, we commemorated the Centenary of the terrible events of the First World War remembering in a moving Vigil Service, the moment when the 'Lights went out' across the whole of Europe and a whole generation was plunged cruelly into a devastating war that cost so much in 'blood and treasure'. Good people of many faiths and beliefs were involved on all sides in these terrible events. Many took to arms in the hope that this could be a 'war to end all wars.' They were to be cruelly disappointed by events in the rest of the last century and on into this.

Others, notably the Quakers, but there were other 'conscie' groups and many individuals, courageously refused to fight arguing that the first casualty even of a 'war for civilisation' would be the values of civilization itself. They remind us all, whether we

agree with their pacifism or not, that a world without such killing would be a much better place – one the Bible reveals as the vision of the Kingdom of God, where people will 'train for war no more.'

Yet war, as we know from Afghanistan, Iraq, Syria and too many other places, continues almost unchecked. Principled people, of many different views and beliefs, still differ profoundly about the right response to great evil, such as that we see from IS and other extremist groups. Should we take up arms to defend the innocent, even at the cost of shedding blood? Should we rely instead on an equally costly 'nonviolence' to try and beat 'swords into ploughshares'?

I do hope that you can join us at 10.30 am this Remembrance Sunday (Nov 9th), in St Andrew's Church, Sedbergh and/or at the War Memorial in the Churchyard after the Church Service, to remember those who paid the ultimate sacrifice in wars past, and re-commit yourself to Peace.

There will also be a short ceremony at the War Memorial at 11 O'clock on the 11th Day of the 11th Month to remember the 96th anniversary of the signing of the Armistice at the end of the First World War.

CHRISTMAS TRUCE 1914 AND DENT FOLK CAROLS

"Christmas in the trenches! What a time? "Peace on earth, goodwill toward men." It is hardly to be believed but nevertheless it is quite true that such was the case this Christmas. On Christmas eve at four p.m. we had orders that unless the "enemy" advanced we were not to fire, and the same applied on Christmas day. Whether the Germans had the same order or not I don't know but not a shot was fired on either side. On Christmas eve we shouted "Compliments of the Season" to each other, and passed

pleasant remarks. We sang the "Austrian Anthem" and they replied with "God Save the King." On Christmas Day after service in the trenches, we went halfway and we shook hands, and had a fine crack with them. Altogether we spent a very pleasant two hours with them, and found them a nice lot of fellows."

So writes a soldier in the First World War trenches to his family in Cumbria. Hundreds of similar letters have been collected to celebrate this historic occasion when in the middle of the most bloody war in history the soldiers on either side found a common humanity in the singing of



travellers may have visited St Kilda from the Western Isles some 4,000 to 5,000 years ago. There is also evidence of early Christian settlements.

In historic times, a small population lived on Hirta in a single settlement known simply as The Village and survived by crofting, fishing and collecting seabirds. Gradually the St Kildans lost their self- sufficiency, relying on imports of food, fuel and building materials and furnishing for their homes. In 1852, 36 people emigrated to Australia, and population decline began.

In 1912 there were acute food shortages and in 1913 an outbreak of influenza. The war of 1914-18 brought a naval detachment to Hirta and regular deliveries of mail and food from naval supply vessels. When these services were withdrawn at end of war feelings of isolation increased. There was more emigration of able-bodied young islanders and a breakdown of the island economy. In 1930 the remaining 36 islanders requested evacuation to the mainland, bringing to an end an extraordinary story of survival. Most of the old houses are now in ruins but a few are still in use.

The islands of St Kilda, with their exceptional cliffs and sea stacks, form the most important seabird breeding station in north-west Europe and the seas around the islands are rich in marine life. In particular the islands house the largest colony of fulmars in Britain and the largest colony of gannets in the world. The islands have dual world heritage

status for their natural and cultural significance as well as many British and European conservation designations. Today, three organisations, The National Trust for Scotland, Scottish Natural Heritage and the MoD, work in partnership to care for the islands. The islands house a radar tracking station, with around 15 MOD staff living on Hirta, together with a small number of conservation rangers, archaeologists and researchers.

The seas around St Kilda are protected for wildlife. In November the monthly Wildlife Trust talk in the People's Hall will focus on marine conservation around our Cumbrian coast.

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

The first talk of the season was at Settlebeck School and was given by Isobel Stirk on the topic of the Bronte family. Patrick Prunty was born in Ireland in 1777 and being an intelligent person was able to enter St John's College, Cambridge in 1802 from where he graduated with a first class degree. At some stage there he changed his surname to Bronte. After university he became a curate of various parishes and married Maria Branwell from Cornwall. They had six children, Maria, Elizabeth, Charlotte, Branwell, Emily and Anne. In 1820 Patrick became the Perpetual Curate

of Haworth but in 1821 his wife died and her sister Elizabeth moved from Cornwall to look after the children helped by a maid Tabitha Aykroyd. Elizabeth devoted her life to the family and she also provided financial support.

Patrick taught the children to read and write and speak French. He also taught Branwell some Latin and Greek. To further their education the four eldest girls were sent to a school for the children of poor clergy at Cowan Bridge. However their delicate health combined with poor conditions at the school proved too much for Maria and Elizabeth who contracted tuberculosis and had to return home dying soon afterwards. The remaining two sisters were removed from the school. Whilst at home the children began writing stories which were written in tiny booklets. In 1831 Charlotte went to a school in Roe Head run by a Miss Wooler where she made some lifelong friends. After leaving as a pupil she returned as an assistant teacher and Emily became a pupil there but did not stay long. When she left Anne took her place.

During their adult life the girls worked as teachers or governesses but Emily never settled at anything and after a short time away always wanted to return to Haworth and its moors. Charlotte was more successful but seemed to get on better with the man in the family than the wife, a possibly not unconnected phenomenon. She certainly seems to have had an affair with Monsieur

Heger. She and Emily had gone as pupils to a school in Brussels run by him and his wife and they had returned there as teachers although Emily did not stay long. After some posts Anne eventually had a happy stay as governess to the Robinson family in Scarborough. Branwell had a talent as a painter and went to study at the Royal Academy in London and also tried to set up as a portrait painter in Bradford. However in these and some other jobs he tried he always failed through an addiction to alcohol and drugs. He became a tutor to the Robinson's children in Scarborough but this time his failure was due to having an affair with Mrs Robinson. His dismissal meant that

Anne also had to leave her post. In 1847 the three sisters had their novels published. Charlotte's "Jane Eyre", Emily's "Wuthering Heights" and Anne's "Agnes Grey". Anne's "The Tenant of Wildfell Hall" was published the next year. However, in the space of seven months during 1848 and 1849 three of the Brontes died. Branwell died of tuberculosis weakened by his dissolute life style. Emily died two months later from consumption. In the spring of 1849 Anne became ill and wanted to see Scarborough again but died there and was the only one of the family not buried at Haworth. After their deaths Charlotte eventually married her father's curate, Arthur Bell Nicholl, in 1854 but she became ill and died soon afterwards in 1855 when pregnant. Her husband stayed at Haworth and looked after Patrick Bronte who died in 1861 having outlived his children. Their novels and early tragic deaths had aroused a public interest and even before Patrick's death people were visiting Haworth to see the where the Bronte sisters had lived.

The chairman thanked the speaker for her most informative talk and several people took the opportunity to question her during refreshments.

GOLF IN SEDBERGH

We, that is, Sedbergh Golf Club, may be older than we think!

SGC celebrated its Centenary back in 1996, having been founded, we believed, by Masters of the Hostel of Sedbergh School. It has come to light however, that "Sedbergh Grammar School Golf Club" began in 1877, thanks to one Alexander Hamilton Doleman (1836-1914), an Assistant Master at Sedbergh School from 1876 to 1879, who, having laid out a 9 hole course on The Riggs, organised the first competition for prizes on April 4th, 1877. Ten players teed off and Thompson won, with 60 strokes, followed by Toppin 64, Hinde 66 and Prescott 68.

Sedbergh School therefore probably became the first in England to introduce golf as one of its school games, and the Masters, led by Doleman, effectively formed Sedbergh Golf Club.

Doleman himself was no mean golfer, having previously won a Medal at Cambridge University GC, later becoming a member of both Royal Liverpool and Royal Musselburgh, having finished a wonderful 9th in The Open Championship in 1870 at Prestwick! He was involved in 1886 in the founding of Lytham & St Annes Golf Club, later to be given Royal status.

Golf developed and was clearly well taught at Sedbergh School, for in 1896, a former pupil by the name of Whigam, won no less a tournament than the American Amateur Championship, and in that same year, another Old Sedberghian, one Freddie Tait (Evans House), won the much coveted English Amateur Championship. Both, of course, had played schoolboy golf on The Riggs.

The evidence of a Golf Club in Sedbergh in 1877 would make Sedbergh GC the oldest or first golf

PEOPLE'S GYM & FITNESS CENTRE

Fundraising is, of course, the main emphasis of our activities at the moment while we try to build and

equip our annexe at the People's Hall.

The estimate for the cost of the total building project is £88,346. The committee of People's Gym & Fitness Centre (PGFC) had funds in the bank of approximately £29,000 that had built up from subscriptions prior to Baliol closing and they have agreed to provide at least £27,000 to the People's Hall project.

Of this amount £10,000 is advance rent for 10 years. This means that PGFC will be able to operate in the annexe for 10 years without having to pay rent during that time, as it will have been paid upfront. This amount has been paid over and the People's Hall committee has used this advance rent to help them pay for completing the alterations to the front of the hall.

The remaining £17,000 is committed to be paid towards the construction costs of the annexe.



This leaves a shortfall of approximately £71,346! *Grants*

Gina Barney has been tirelessly applying for grants for the annexe and to date has received grant funding of approximately £52,129 from Sport England, the Sedbergh Community Fund and YDNP Sustainable Development Fund.

Grant bids have also gone into The Harold & Alice Bridges Charity, The Craven Trust and the Neighbourhood Forum. We have had an application to the Frieda Scott Charitable Trust rejected because they do not fund sporting activities.

The trustees sit on five subcommittees, Projects, Building, Finance, Community Fund and Charity Shops to carry out the objectives of the CIO.

Enabling work was carried out for the Police to move into 72 Main Street, the establishment of the Charity Bookshop, the purchase of the building from the White Knights and more mundane tasks such as opening a bank account.

charity shops to raise funds for disbursement to charitable causes April when it took over the accounts from the Heritage Trust and the responsibility for the day to day management of the Charity Shops and the disbursement of funds.

On the projects front two major projects have been identified:

- The establishment of a First Responders Team was the first project identified by the trustees and its feasibility has been researched in depth. A meeting was held in the People's Hall on Tuesday 7 October when the project was launched and it is hoped that the Team will be up and running within the next twelve months.
- A youth project is being developed. First thoughts are that the Monkey House Youth Group should be resurrected and a BMX or similar facility should be built in addition to giving young people

more say in the community.

Health and Safety audit has been
carried out together with a risk
management assessment and utility
suppliers have been reviewed.

Financial procedures are being reviewed and the two charity shops continue to thrive with net takings up by about 35% during the first six months of the current financial year which will make more money available for grant funding.

In conclusion the debt of gratitude owed to David Ramsbottom, without whom there would be no charity shops, and Ian Cockburn, secretary for the first year, was acknowledged.

BUS TRANSPORT

Saturday Bus to Kendal

As reported last month, the present Saturday 564 bus service to Kendal is going to end on November 1st. However, Sedbergh residents will still be able to catch a bus to Kendal on Saturdays because Western Dales Bus, the local community bus driven by trained volunteers, will be providing a service instead. A new Saturday 564A timetable will start on November 8th, with four journeys between Sedbergh and Kendal each Saturday.

The first journey will get into Kendal for 9 o'clock, and the timetable will allow passengers to spend different amounts of time in the town, from just under an hour and a half to nearly three, four and even seven hours. The route will also give other opportunities, including shopping, as

the bus will always go via Asda and the hospital in both directions. On one journey, it will give an hour and a quarter at Morrisons as well.

The bus will also connect with trains at Dent Station, for a day out in Leeds or Carlisle, going out on the 1016 or 1040 trains and returning on the 1732 or, if a request is made to the driver on the day, the 1920 or 1923.

The Western Dales bus can carry 14 passengers, which is fewer than the Grand Prix bus used at present, but the company will soon be acquiring a slightly larger and more comfortable vehicle, which will increase capacity to 16. In the meantime, passengers who are able to travel into Kendal early or in the afternoon are less likely to be affected by any overcrowding.

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Access Forum needs new members
A group that helps to improve public access and recreation in the
Yorkshire Dales National Park is on the lookout for new members.

There are currently eight vacancies on the independent Yorkshire Dales Access Forum, which provides guidance and advice on ways to improve and manage public access and opportunities for open-air recreation in this beautiful landscape.

Mohammed Dhalech (correct), the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's Access Development Officer, said: "The forum's job is to work with individuals and organisations who live and work in the 680 square miles of the National Park and those who use or visit the area for leisure and enjoyment, and to advise on ways to improve access

and recreation in this special place.

"This can be anything from looking at mobility issues to suggesting an upgrade of a specific footpath. The members also respond to consultations on a range of documents and strategies issued at local and national level."

The forum members should represent a balance of interests ranging from land management and agriculture to local business and outdoor recreation, although there is currently under-representation in land management and farming.

The forum meets three times a year, but some members also sit on a variety of advisory groups that meet regularly to consider specific issues in more detail and report back accordingly.

Chairman Alistair Thompson said: "Access forums were set up to improve access in the countryside and to help resolve potential conflicts between those who own and work the land and the people who use it for recreation. For that reason, it is important that the members have a range of interests that enable the forum to represent a balanced view."

Trading Standards have been alerted by a local company regarding the latest publishing scam aimed at businesses. The scam involves unsolicited telephone calls from a company claiming that they are representing Cumbrian Community Magazine and the Police and that the business has taken advertising with them and they want payment for it.

This type of scam is common.

Typically the publisher will cold call a business selling "advertising space" in a publication, magazine, wall chart or diary. The publishers will usually associate themselves with a good cause such as the emergency services, youth or drug awareness to encourage placement of an order.

Often the publication will exist but will only be distributed to a very small number of people If you receive such a call please follow this advice:-

- Never agree to place an advert or article in a publication over the telephone unless you are sure about legitimacy of the publisher you are dealing with
- Ask questions: How did they get

SEPTEMBER WEATHER

There were only two nights when the wind chill factor dropped into the 30sF. Winds were moderate only reaching a maximum of 13.9mph which reflected the moderate pressure during the month. On only 6 nights was the maximum gust not from the North West.

Already it seems that many birds have moved on, especially the house sparrows and goldfinch, as I am not filling the feeders anything like as often as previously. The rat problem has been a major factor this month

with me having to resort to poison, which I don't like doing, but the problem had become such a major issue it was a case of needs must. For a few nights at least 10 blocks were going, plus a few in traps, this seemed to get on top of the problem without any problems elsewhere. If you are putting food out for the birds these vermin won't be far away so beware. The other problem has been the continuation of wasps. I have also heard of a nest of hornets being dealt with in the area! Midges have been plentiful so anyone putting tups in early risk the possibility of Schmallenberg virus being transmitted to their sheep. With signs of Autumn with us there have been good crops of hazelnuts to go with the earlier brambles and sloes. Elderberries have also cropped heavily this year. Butterflies have been noticeable by their absence this vear in spite of a decent summer. The curlews have followed the swallows to their winter quarters but they usually only go to the coast in their migration. When we lived in Cleethorpes it was not unusual to see

at least a thousand feeding on the beach. Before they cleaned up the sewage outfall they used to make a bee line for that!!

NOVEMBER GARDENING

At this season, when most plants are dying down for the winter, it is good to have things in the garden which are bursting into life and flowering. A great favourite in my garden is the winter flowering Viburnum , Viburnum x bodnantense 'Dawn' which actually puts forth its first flowers in late August and goes on blooming until late April. The flowers are pink in bud and white on opening, and are born in small bunches all along the tall (10ft) bare winter stems. They have a heavy scent – wonderful out of doors, but almost too overpowering (with shades of old wet dog) when picked and brought into the house. This Viburnum, along with its parent V.

farreri has several other named cultivars – 'Deben', 'Charles Lamont', 'Candissimum' (pure white flowers) and 'Fioretta' (Dwarf).

Also well into flower this month are the first of the Mahonias. The cultivar 'Charity', with its upright racemes of rich yellow flowers, is probably the best known and widely available, but 'Winter Sun' has more strongly fragrant flowers and this, and the cultivar 'Lionel Fortescue' are more compact plants.

Underplanting for both of these could include the lovely foliage plant *Arum italicum* 'Pictum' which sends up its new leaves – arrow shaped, dark glossy green with creamy white veins - in October. I also like *Tellima grandiflora* which retains a tuffet of mid green, reddish backed leaves through the winter, "Black Grass" *Ophipogon planiscapus* 'Nigrescens' with its mat of strap like black leaves, and the wonderful, stiff seedlings of "Caper Spurge" *Euphorbia lathyris* which have rigid rows of grey leaves with white midribs.

THE TERRIBLE KNITTERS OF DENT

Did you know that?
In the 19th century, Dent and Sedbergh provided much of the woollen clothing to the army and navy. The war in the Crimea, in particular, received huge quantities of knitted goods from this area. The women of Dent were dubbed "The Terrible Knitters of Dent". Local historians have unfortunately chosen to suggest this was really a complimentary sobriquet and to gloss over the unpalatable fact that they really were terrible knitters. They had no proper idea of how to knit, no pairs of socks or gloves were ever the same size, often having too many or too few fingers and frequently fell apart, the wool was coarse and itchy and one batch of woollen undervests to the Crimea even carried anthrax. Because of the income from the garments, Sedbergh chose to ignore the appalling standard of knitting, but eventually the War Office had the women forcibly removed. Thomas Carlyle wrote in 1855 - "Those terrible knitters are worth five divisions to the enemy", and Florence Nightingale threatened to close her hospitals if Dent woollens continued to be supplied to the soldiers.

The Terrible Knitters were quickly replaced by more women and girls recruited locally and who, although now largely forgotten, became well respected as 'The Excellent Knitters of Dent."
