

Footway repairs, Main Street, Sedbergh

As you will know, work commenced on the re-flagging of Main Street in early March but has now been suspended, apparently as a result of an incorrect mortar mix being used. The partially completed work has left the town's footways in a highly unsatisfactory condition with open joints, discoloured stone flags and loose sand on the pavement surface.

The Parish Council, at its meeting held on 9 April, considered the many complaints received from residents and businesses who are concerned not only about the quality of the work undertaken thus far but also the uncertainty about when work will recommence and the possible need

for further road closures. Members noted that the communication between your Authority and the Council has been less than satisfactory since work ceased and no indication has been given as to when the project will be completed and the nature of any remedial work necessary.

The Council meeting has asked me to express its very considerable concern over this matter and to seek a re-assurance that the completion of this project will be given priority by your Authority. An early response to confirm the timetable you are now working to would be appreciated.

Our outing to the Tulchan shop at Cowan Bridge on March 18th was very enjoyable, thanks to their vivacious manager, Karen, who demonstrated a talk on 'Layering up your Look' using the three Spring-Summer colour 'stories'. We liked some of the 'stories' much better than others, but then we are all conscious of the colours that suit us individually so those that don't will have less appeal. We also had a preview of the Autumn-Winter collection, and learnt that all the Tulchan fabrics and garments are designed by the team at Cowan Bridge.

Talking about 'stories' reminds me that the walking group, whose walk on part of the Limestone Trail happened to coincide with the date of the Tulchan visit, had quite a story to tell when they arrived, very apologetically, a few minutes late for the start of Karen's demonstration. First there had been some confusion over the path they should have taken, which caused some delay, and although they had arrived at the designated pub in plenty of time for lunch, it had taken the staff 45 minutes to actually produce their

food. Anyway, they were able to enjoy most of the Tulchan demonstration and take part in retail therapy with the rest of us afterwards!

The 'Reading Aloud' competition run by the Cumbria-Westmorland Federation of WI's took place in Sedbergh People's Hall on March 23rd. Sixteen teams took part, including our own inimitable team who won the Federation Cup last time: Anne Petyt, who did the prose reading from the 'set book' about the history of the WI over the last 100 vears, and Denise Thomson who chose to read a very amusing poem about a pig by Roald Dahl. The adjudicator commented about all the teams individually in the order in which they appeared and had nothing but praise for Anne and Denise so we were very hopeful of their chances, but they were pipped at the post by Levens WI who performed last. Those of us supporting Sedbergh WI felt that our team had definitely been runners-up. They did us (and the other WIs in the Sedbergh area, none of whom entered this year) proud.

Her first novel, "The Murder of Patience Brooke". based around the Home for Fallen Women that the philanthropic Charles Dickens did indeed set up, was published by the Mystery Press in 2014. Her second novel is due out this year and there's a third on the way. Jean spoke very entertainingly about her novels and read us some gory passages, which are certainly not for the squeamish! Some of us are enjoying reading the first novel now! Jean decided to write as 'J. C. Briggs', following the example of 'J. K. Rowling': we wish her the same success as the latter!

More books the next day! Meeting at Moira's house, the book club discussed "Oscar and Lucinda" by Peter Carey, his first Booker Prizewinning novel. As often happens, the fact that a book that has won high accolades doesn't necessarily mean that everyone finds it enjoyable and several members didn't finish this

one, partly because of other commitments. We did like a number of things about it, however. An average score of about 6 was given.

Our May meeting is traditionally our 'Resolutions Meeting' when we discuss the resolutions put forward for discussion and action by the National WI. There is only one resolution this year, supporting care in later years, since the decision has already been made nationally by ballot, but we are looking forward to hearing a speaker from AGE UK telling us about their work before we enjoy a Jacob's Join supper. We'll be meeting in the committee room at the People's Hall at 7.30pm on May 13th. Visitors are always welcome.

But I was drawn to the real story of the family of an American church minister, whose experiences of the next life bring hope to all who have suffered loss and bereavement and cause the sceptic to think again. If you work through the sentimental presentation of the book, "Heaven is for Real," you come to realise that hundreds and hundreds of people all over the world have experienced ecstatic experiences of heaven during a time of life threatening illness which are hard to explain away.

The story centres on the young son

of the minister who becomes dangerously ill in hospital and has an out of body experience where he visits heaven, encounters dead members of the family and his soul goes on a journey around the hospital and sees and hears things that he cannot have possibly overheard as he was in a different part of the hospital when these events took place. All rather fantastical until you work through the scrutiny the story undergoes from the boy's father. He deals with the science of near death experiences, that when the body nears death it releases narcotic type chemicals which promote a feeling of bliss and can cause hallucinations, which in itself I find rather comforting!









narrative, their story about God. That word 'God' is as old as human history and has evolved with us. Definitions crumble away from it. The informing reality, the ground of our being phrases work for a moment, and no more. The modern way of life, our use of time and language, none of them help us to know that reality. Inventories can be boring. Not so when doing the annual Inventory at St Andrew's.

Keeping a record of the fixtures, fittings and valuable items is a necessary requirement to be carried out by the Vicar, the Churchwardens and two members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) before the Annual General Meeting we hold in March each year. In law we are accountable for the church building and all that it contains.

So, we get together and start ticking items off the list. Usually the silver in the safe comes out first for checking and then we go into the main body of the church to see all is present and correct according to the inventory.

Some items have interesting names

like "reredos" which is the decoration behind the altar. In St Andrew's the reredos behind the main altar is made of wood and behind the altar in the Lady Chapel we have a "dorsal" or "dossal" instead which is a made of cloth but does the same job as the reredos.

In many instances names and dates are engraved on items of silver, doors, pieces of furniture, sometimes where you least expect them, sending the imagination into overdrive as you try to conjure up what that person was like and where they lived and what role did they play in the life of St Andrew's and Sedbergh.

CCMS is provided by Cumbria County Council and sends out information from:

- Their Trading Standards
 Division ... about retail scams,

 fraud, but also about bogus

- The Police mainly about crime alerts and requests for

observed suspicious activity.

- The Environment Agency these are usually warnings of extreme weather conditions.
- The Fire and Rescue Service mainly alerts and reminders about home safety.
- The Cumbria Neighbourhood and Home Watch Network send out messages about national initiatives aimed at reducing crime and keeping safe.
- North West Electricity provide information about power failures.
- Other providers are Age UK, The Police and Crime Commissioner's Office and Cumbria Community Safety Partnership.

If you are worried about information over-load, you can choose from whom you wish to receive alerts.

In Sedbergh and Dentdale, the Parish Council's are promoting CCMS as part of the Neighbourhood Watch scheme and, so far, 160 households are registered with CCMS. Across the whole of Cumbria, over 7000 homes and businesses are registered.

CCMS provides a range of message

options for those with special interests. Proprietors of small retail outlets, horse owners, farmers, 4x4 owners, church wardens, caravan owners and other interest groups can elect to receive alerts relevant to their needs. Although the aim is to target messages only on the areas affected, if you have interests elsewhere in the county eg. a business or perhaps an aging relative, you can elect to receive alerts about that area too.

If you register with CCMS you will not receive any on-line advertising and there is no political or religious content. You can also terminate your registration at any time. CCMS is registered with the Office of the Information Commissioner for Data Protection purposes.



KILLINGTON HYDRO

The Hydro scheme at Broad Raine, Killington 50kW, 35kW or 32kw?

As a Killington resident and known to have been involved in this project in the past, I have been asked by opponents to the scheme to explain what I see as the true electrical value of this development.

The planning permission and approval states 50kW. So where does this figure come from?

32 kW is the designed output (Installed Capacity), the <u>important</u> figure.

50 kW is the amount of water power required to guarantee the 32 kW of electrical power, although this maybe of interest it is of <u>little importance</u>.

55kW is largest rated component on the site and it may be capable of producing this mechanical power, but only if the site was re-designed and re-equipped, and 35 kW is the maximum output of the smallest rated component, so although again

possibly interesting it is of little importance.

An analogy of this can be made to the tyres fitted to a car, the speed rating of a tyre usually greatly exceeds the cars capability.

I therefore conclude that the 50kW on the planning application is not significant, and perhaps deliberately misleading, as suggested by opponents to the scheme.

So what is the maximum usable power available?

Because the consumers are not at the site, electrical conversion and transport losses of at least 5% can be expected, so the useable <u>maximum</u> power reduces to 30kW.

To bring this into perspective, one medium sized saloon car travelling at 70 mph requires 35kW.

So what is the electrical energy production?

It is currently predicted by the applicant to be 186340 kWhrs / annum.

From the government DECC statistics and also used by STAK (Stop Turbines At Killington), ignoring transport losses it could supply the electrical meter requirement of 39 houses/annum.

If you Include conversion / transport losses this reduces to 37 houses/ annum.

If using the incorrect figures as Banks Development did for the Killington wind farm, then 56 houses/ annum is the result.

I hope this is informative and useful to your readers to put into perspective the electrical effectiveness of this type of scheme.

What is it all in aid of? Basically to transform lives from the domination of

Loko is a young woman struggling to live and support her children. Loko's choice in life is simple: 'If I can't collect firewood, my children will die.'

Four times a week, in a remote corner of Ethiopia, Loko makes a back-breaking eight-hour trip to gather wood. It's a task she dreads, but she steels herself to do it because if she doesn't her children will starve.



She prays to God as she walks. 'I ask him to change my life and lead us out of this,' she says.

In the Borena community, girls are expected to fetch and carry wood and water to provide for their family. Denied a good education and the respect of their community, women are trapped in a life of poverty.

Loko dreams of owning a cow . Why? A cow changes everything

Two years ago another woman, Adi, was the poorest of the poor. Then Christian Aid provided a cow which gave her family nutritious milk. Adi churned butter and made money. It gave her a position in the community where her opinion is valued. Now her dreams have turned into plans and she has saved enough money to build a small shop too.

So it could be for Loko. Selling the milk from a cow would provide an income.

An income could help set up a business.

This would give Loko status and a voice in her community.

A voice means speaking up for women, challenging domestic violence they experience, and ending discrimination.

At each step, Christian Aid journeys alongside poor communities as they walk free from poverty.

Just £5 could give Loko a loan to start her own business buying and selling tea and coffee, freeing her from her desperate tasks as they are now and allowing her to spend more time caring for her family.

Better still, with your help, we can provide cows to vulnerable women in Ethiopia – just £150 is enough to buy a cow and a promising future for someone like Loko.

NATIONAL PARK NOTES

Every National Park in England has two, of what are called, "statutory purposes". These are:

- 1. To conserve and enhance the natural beauty, wildlife, and cultural heritage of the National Parks
- 2. To promote opportunities for the understanding and enjoyment of the National Parks by the public

If at any time a conflict arises between these two purposes then the former takes precedence as a result of the "Sandford Principle" so-called because of the court case which gave rise to this legal ruling.

Ever since being a boy and watching House Sparrows out of my bedroom window with a pair of opera glasses I have been fascinated and

delighted by all forms of wildlife, particularly birds. No surprise therefore that a prime focus of my membership of the YDNPA over the last four years has been in relation to conservation issues and what is called, in the jargon, bio-diversity. It is one of the objectives in the YDNPA current Management Plan to "establish baseline population estimates for all monitorable priority species by 2016, and to set targets to get the population of these species stable or increasing". 

(www.natureinthedales.org.uk) which goes into considerably more detail on the individual species (whether flora or fauna) and where they can be seen. There is also an exciting new venture The Northern Uplands Chain Local Nature Partnership (www.nuclnp.org.uk) of which our National Park is a leading member. My particular speciality interest is in Raptors (Birds of Prey) and I have an especial concern for the welfare of Peregrine Falcons, Hen Harriers and Goshawks all of which can be found in the Park. Unfortunately the situation regarding Hen Harriers is not a happy one and despite the fact that considerable areas of moorland both in the YDNP and the Nidderdale AONB are perfectly suited for the breeding of this species – as a result of illegal persecution very few young birds (even when the adults are able to nest at all) survive the first few months. The RSPB considers it a major problem and has for years worked with other agencies such as Natural England and the Moorland Association in an attempt to come up with solutions but so far with very little success. The Hen Harrier is a stunningly beautiful and iconic species and to find out more have a look at the Skydancer part of the RSPB website (www.rspb.org.uk/skydancer) and also view the Hen Harrier video which has recently been posted there. It is worth a look.

The Goshawk is a bird which all but became extinct in this country but which is now making a gradual comeback largely as a result of intentional and unintentional releases by falconers (known as austringers in the trade). If you want to learn more about this fabulous and immensely powerful bird I recommend reading "H is for Hawk" by Helen MacDonald which has recently won two top literary prizes for best non-fiction work of the year.

Another element of National Parks which makes them so special is the opportunity to get away from it all and enjoy the peace and tranquillity which they offer. As the Management Plan puts it [in the Yorkshire Dales National Park are to be found] "extensive areas where a true sense of tranquillity, remoteness and solitude can still be found, which is

rare in England today". John Muir the founder of the Sierra Club in the United States put it in a slightly different way - "I only went out for a walk, and finally concluded to stay out till sundown, for going out, I found, was really going in". An acknowledgment I think that our inner state reflects our outward environment and which given the right external circumstances can lead to deep inner peace, maybe even mystical experiences. To explore these ideas further I would highly recommend the two following books: "The Wild Places" by Robert Macfarlane and "The Living Mountain" by Nan Shepherd. If you are interested in the even wider

project of what is becoming known as "re-wilding" then George Mombiot's book "Feral: Re-wilding the Land and Sea and Human Life" is a must. And for a flavour of the possible reintroduction of what were once native species see, for example, www.lynxuk.org.

I must say that I give thanks every day for living in such a wonderful part of England and for the beauty and extraordinary scenery and wildlife to be found in our National Park. It is a privilege to serve the local community of Dent, Garsdale and Sedbergh as a member of the National Park Board. So I would like to set a little competition to stimulate more interest in particular in the mammals living in our three Parishes. It is in two parts:

COUNCILLOR CORNER

The meeting of the Respect Group took place last month as scheduled and gave some promise that preparations for the 2015 Appleby Horse Fair were well in hand. As far as I am concerned the Respect Group, (in spite of the weird name inflicted upon it by county council politics ten years ago) continues to do a productive job. It reports to the Local Area Partnership but it must remain independent. Yes it liases with the Eden Body but it should not be subsumed into it: if that were to happen there would be no voice for

the affected residents of South Lakeland.

My personal battle with DEFRA over the new Basic Payments Scheme continues. For England alone the abandoned computer system has cost £154 million to date. This is for a computer application to do badly what the previous Single Payment Scheme program did reasonably well. There is a long standing joke that when something goes wrong at the BBC "deputy heads will roll". I suspect the same will be the case in DEFRA and the Rural Payments Agency. the signs coming out of Hawes. DEFRA was a bad idea badly conceived and badly implemented. We need a return to a Ministry of Agriculture, otherwise it will continue to be one BPS fiasco after another.

Yorkshire Dales is consulting upon the latest version of its housing policy. I am cheered that the 90 sq m rule for new houses has been removed, it was sneaked in behind the backs of members. The removal of local and affordable elements from developments of fewer that six houses is also greatly to be welcomed. What a pity it required

PREVENTATIVE MEDICINE

A friend of mine has just received a diagnosis of being pre-diabetic and having high cholesterol as a result of some blood tests. He is quite upset that he has been given such a negative prognosis. So what can he do about it? The idea came to me to lend him a book I have, called "Nine Ounces", written by Bob Flaws, one of the Chinese medicine stars in

America.

It was written in the late eighties and its long title is "A nine part program for the prevention of AIDS in HIV positive persons", but actually it is a manual for preventing or delaying the development of any chronic disease. The author says, "My belief is that an HIV positive person could possibly live his entire life without ever developing a full-blown case of Aids. Or more modestly, need not develop active AIDS until advanced age and natural debility allow the latent virus to become active". My own belief is that a similar principle applies to other latent diseases, such as family history of heart disease or in my friend's case being pre-diabetic.

Bob Flaws' programme is based, not upon fighting a disease, but upon strengthening the body and making it more resilient. His nine points are:

 Chinese dietary therapy. The basic energy to do this comes from our food so the first thing to

do is to sort out the diet and the digestive system. If you would like to have a précis of Chinese medicine dietary principles, I can send you my "Healthy eating guidelines" by e-mail (jmpacupuncture@gmail.com).

- Aerobic exercise for at least 20 to 30 minutes every other day. I would suggest either Tai Chi or Yoga on the other days – having seen the health benefits of regular practice for myself.
- Deep relaxation (using a CD if that makes it easier) every day, citing the Chinese medicine aphorism "Small benefits after 100 days, big benefits after 1000 days". After the first 100 days he reckons the benefits are: more red and white blood cells produced, better circulation, high blood pressure comes down, low blood pressure normalises, brain waves show increased tendency to relaxation, improvement of appetite, elimination, sleep, energy and mood.
- Abdominal self-massage to regulate the digestion. In

Japanese traditional medicine, keeping the abdomen supple and pain-free is a way of aborting disease processes at an early stage. If you are interested in this, contact me and I will photocopy the relevant pages for you.

- Being a Chinese medicine specialist, Bob Flaws recommends acupuncture and Chinese herbal medicine as treatments. He sees the low-tech methods of diagnosis, such as feeling the pulse as being a particularly effective in detecting imbalances at an early stage. He sees other low-tech natural therapies as being similarly advantageous.
- In Chinese medicine, sexual moderation is advised to conserve the long-term energy resources of the body.
- Visualisation this is often recommended for cancer patients, but all of us can benefit from visualising the body and mind being purified and free from obstructions. In Asia there is a strong tradition of such practices.

their lives" (Westmorland Gazette). By 1841 the dam had been repaired and raised to its present level at which time the secondary dam was also constructed.

communities also have the benefit of regular visits by the Mobile Branch.

In the case of Sedbergh Branch I can say unequivocally we had no prior knowledge of Barclays similar and almost concurrent announcement. And in response to their announcement we immediately changed our own plans to support the community by agreeing to leave the ATM in situ and adding an extra visit day to the Mobile Branch schedule. And whilst I appreciate that the Mobile Branch schedule is not quite as convenient as the former branch (which was only open part time 3 times a week). the Mobile Branch does visit 16 communities during the course of the week, many of which have never had a NatWest Bank or have not had one for very many years.

The Mobile Branch is manned by very experienced colleagues (including people who used to work in Sedbergh Branch) and visits Sedbergh on a Monday and Wednesday each week. It can undertake many of the transactions previously undertaken in the former Branch. The nearest Post Office is about 100 metres away and accepts all types of transactions, such as: Cash withdrawals (up to £300 for personal and £500 for non-personal customers), cash deposits, balance enquires, pay in cheques and change giving. There is also another full offering Post Office within 1 mile. (Not sure about this paragraph. Ed)

I took on board your comments regarding peak demand for the ATM and will share these with the Bank's ATM Service Providers. I also discussed briefly with your wife the benefits of a bank account for your social enterprise (which given turnover levels would operate free if in credit) and I am happy to arrange for one of my business colleagues to discuss options with you should you so wish.

DENTDALE & SEDBERGH PARISH NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH NORTH WEST ELECTRICITY PRIORITY SERVICE REGISTER.

North West Electricity is the company that operates the national electricity grid in our area. (It will not be your energy supplier.) North West

Electricity maintain a **priority services register** of households where there is someone who would be at risk in the event of unplanned power failure. In the event of such failure, North West Electricity will consult the register and endeavour to give priority to restoring power to those at risk or, if the restoration cannot be achieved quickly, give alternative support by, for example, alerting supporting agencies like the Red Cross or perhaps offering the loan of a small electricity generator.

Households can be added to the register by going on-line to **electricitynorthwest.co.uk/priority**

Part of the Neighbourhood Watch ideal is to look out for others in the community. Please alert those who you believe may need priority service registration and may not have seen this message. If you know of vulnerable neighbours who may not have an internet connection, you can, after consulting with them, put them onto the register via your own internet device.

And will your telephone work?

Power failure most frequently occurs when there are severe weather



conditions and, at such times, maintaining contact with others is particularly important, especially for the vulnerable. Please be aware that whilst the telephone network carries its own low voltage power supply, many modern cordless telephones or those with answering devices rely on an additional power supply and may not function when there is a power failure. If your telephone does not work without an additional power supply you can buy a basic 'no frills' corded telephone for less than £10 which can be plugged into your telephone socket in times of emergency to ensure you can maintain contact with others; assuming of course that the telephone network is not also disrupted.

Note: If you register with Cumbria Community Messaging you will receive severe weather warnings from the Environment Agency by email or text. NW Electricity also use the Cumbria Messaging service to keep the public informed of power disruptions. To register, go on-line to www.cumbriacommunitymessaging.co.uk

Bankline ROI – Password Reactivation Form purporting to come from various names and email addresses @rbs.co.uk with a zip

attachment, could potentially corrupt your computer or steal your information.

We would also like to take the opportunity to advise all residents who do their banking online of the following simple steps they can take to safeguard their accounts:

- Always be suspicious of any emails that are supposedly from your bank or any other bank that you do not normally deal with.
- Keep passwords and pin numbers safe and be very wary of any unsolicited emails asking you for personal information such as bank account numbers and passwords. Your bank or building society would never contact you either by telephone or email to ask for such information.
- Be particularly security conscious if you use a public computer or public Wi-Fi internet connection.
- Know who you are dealing with. Access banking websites by typing the bank's web address into your browser. Never go into such a website via a link sent in an unsolicited email and then enter your personal banking information.

If you suspect any fraudulent activity contact your bank immediately.

SINGING SEDBERGH & SLOVENIA

It's now 10 years since the first singing group came from Zrece to Sedbergh - a small group of farmers who sang folk songs based on the poems of local folk poet Jurij Vodovnik. Vodovnik was sometimes referred to as the singing newspaper because he would travel from farm to farm and on the journey make a song about the people he had just stayed with which he would sing when he arrived. Naturally everyone tried to be as hospitable as possible in case they got a negative review in his songs.

The group, called Ljudski Pevci iz Stranic (which translates: "male folk singers from the village of Stranice,") spoke no English but it didn't stop them from coming to the folk session with Ken Pope and many other musicians in the Middleton Head pub. Half way through the evening the then Slovenian Ambassador Iztok Mirosic turned up in the Embassy BMW (number plate: SLOV 1) and greeted all the musicians in both languages. I remember asking Ken Pope if it was a problem the sudden influx of this foreign language in the session. "No problem at all, " he replied. "They all speak like this down Dentdale."

And so started an exchange of singers which bounced backwards and forwards - the Cautley Carollers visited Zrece, the youth choir Zbor Vladko Mohoric came here. Howgills harmony did a tour based in Zrece, the Zrece town choir Zbor Jurij

Our singers have always believed that it would be hypocritical to show hospitality to singers coming from our twin town, but then be less than welcoming to visiting singers from other towns in the Greater Sedbergh area - so we have shown the warm hand of friendship to groups such as the Northumbrian men who sing with Voicemale. They came one summer Sunday to join the Zrece Firemen's

for the festival, and then joined other local folk choirs when we went to sing carols in a candlelit cave at Rydal.

As well as the Greater Sedbergh area, there's also been the Greater Zrece area with our visiting English choirs in Slovenia meeting up with other choirs in Cerknica, Ljubljana, Crni Vrh, Bled, Kranj, Ptuj, Ljubljana and several other singing groups who have then come to visit Sedbergh and other places in the North of England and Scotland, making a web of harmony and friendship within our two countries.

SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

May is the month when our swifts return after their long flight from Africa, usually in the first week. For thousands of years they have been coming to this country to raise just one brood of chicks before leaving at the end of July for the long journey back. They have distinctive scythe shaped wings and on warm summer evenings hurtle around the roof tops in screaming parties.

A swift eats tens of thousands of insects a day - including midges!

They are true masters of the skies, only landing for 3 months when breeding. They have tiny legs and cannot perch – a bird on the wire is not a swift. The young, after they leave the nest, are completely independent of their parents. remaining on the wing until they themselves breed in 2-4 years time. BUT SWIFTS ARE IN TROUBLE!

Over the last 20 years swifts have declined by over 40% and if we don't act now there is a real danger that they could become extinct. They are reliant on buildings for breeding,

nesting in the eaves and nooks and crannies of old buildings. Their nests are hidden from sight and the only clue is if you catch sight of them as they zoom in at great speed. They often nest on top of the wall plate in the eaves but they don't enter the building itself. And the good news is that swifts are not messy birds (unlike swallows and martins!)

WHAT IS THE PROBLEM?

Swifts are faithful to their nest site. returning each year to the same

place. The greatest threat is sadly from renovations and repairs which block up the entrance holes, preventing the swifts from getting in, so if this happens yet another breeding pair is lost. Modern buildings don't have crevices suitable for swifts and gradually we are

losing these special birds. This is an avoidable tragedy.

WHAT CAN BE DONE?

Renovations can easily be done without altering the nest site hole or compromising the building's interior. Work should be carried out outside the breeding season. Swifts do take to nest boxes, on newer houses and

Sedbergh Community Swifts (SCS) can help and advise on boxes and how to do repairs in a swift-friendly way. There are a number of options that will not damage properties, old or new.

HOW CAN WE HELP?

SCS plans to survey the area to find out where swift nest sites are, so we can monitor the population and see where the best places are to put up more boxes. Screaming parties can be an indicator of where they may nest. If you see us hanging around

gazing up towards roof tops, don't be suspicious!

WORLD WAR ONE

Sedbergh School receives gift of WW1 trench letters

Thirty letters from the First World War have been donated to Sedbergh School, from the family of Edward Staveley Taylor (Lupton House 1909-1912). The letters cover the military career of a young man in the King's Liverpool regiment from signing up in 1914 to his death at the Somme in 1916. Together with replies from his friends and family, these documents give a first-hand account of day-to-day life for soldiers during the First World War.

The early letters record Edward's concerns about whether or not to volunteer and about leaving his mother without support at home.

During his training he describes frustration with the lack of moment, writing: 'That is one of the great faults of the Terriers, you waste such a lot of time, waiting for orders'. In one letter Edward writes to his Uncle about the food he is served in his mess and, in particular, his delight at having pineapple chunks for the first time. As the war progresses Edward writes about life in the trenches and manoeuvres he was involved in. The later letters are written by staff at No.5 casualty clearing station, detailing injuries Edward sustained in battle, his slow recovery over many months and his sudden death.

Edward came to Sedbergh School after attending Sedbergh Preparatory School and stayed at Sedbergh until

just short of his nineteenth birthday. He achieved much and was a popular member of the community. The Sedberghian testifies: 'He had a quick brain and ready wit, and was generally the centre of a knot of boys. full of chaff and laughter. In his presence it was impossible to be dull: though he never gave the impression of great effect he rose rapidly in the School and in 1912 surprised and delighted his friends by winning the Sedgwick Mathematical Prize. 'At the end of his first year he had been top of his class at Classics. French and Mathematics.

The letters have been passed down through the family who have kindly donated them to Sedbergh School so that they can be preserved and made available to First World War researchers. Sedbergh School Archivist Katy de la Riviere spoke of her deep gratitude to Edward's family: "Their kindness in donating the collection has made it available to a wide audience of researchers. The minutia of daily life recorded in these letters paints a vivid picture of one man's experience of the war.'

Sedbergh School history teacher Philippa Prall is keen to share the letters with year 10 pupils in preparation for the school's annual battlefield trip later this year. She said: "It is so important to be able to teach pupils about the events of the First World War. Having these fantastic letters brings to life the experience of Sedberghian Edward Taylor and helps us share that with our pupils."

The collection also includes a photograph of Edward's gravestone taken in 1926 by a visiting family member, the papers from Edward's commission and promotions and telegrams sent to his mother on the occasion of his death. All documents in the collection are available to view at Sedbergh School Archive. For details of visiting the archive please contact the archivist on 015396 22275.

BUMBLEBEES

Gardening for bumblebees Queen bumblebees will have been active for a week or two now on sunny days in the garden, as they seek out suitable nesting holes at or near ground level. Queens are rather easier to identify than workers and a study of these in the garden should yield five or six species without too much difficulty. First to appear (April) was the largest species Bombus terrestris (Buff-tailed Bumblebee) with a buffwhite tail turning brown where it meets the black of the abdomen. The whiter tailed Bombus hortorum (Garden Bumblebee) appears in May, as does the similar Bombus lucorum (White-tailed

Bumblebee), but this has stripes that are more lemon than yellow. The two red-tailed species Bombus lapidarius (Red-tailed BUmblebee) and Bombus pratorum (Early Nesting Bumblebee, having two yellow bands as well as the orange-red tail and is smaller) are also on the wing, but the ginger coloured and hairy Bombus pascuorum (Common Carder

Bumblebee) does not normally appear until later in May.

HOW TO ENCOURAGE BEES

As a rule of thumb your garden should provide bee-friendly flowers that are rich in pollen and nectar which bees can easily access from spring until late summer. This will ensure that there is a good supply of pollen at all of the crucial times:

The greater the number of suitable flowering plants in your garden the

better but you should aim for at least two kinds of bee-friendly plant for each flowering period. You can plant what you like in your garden so long as it doesn't escape into the wild. You will find all sorts of exotic

things in garden centres and catalogues which bees will enjoy.

Try growing Viper's bugloss, Echium vulgare. This is a magnificent plant for a herbaceous border, with spikes of vivid blue flowers up to 60cm (2ft) tall. And it will attract a cloud of bumblebees in high summer.

Bumblebee species differ in the length of their tongues, and, as a result, prefer different flowers. For




example the longest tongued species, Bombus hortorum, loves deep flowers such as honeysuckle, foxglove and aquilegia. If you don't want to plant wildflowers choose cultivated varieties of native species

BUILDING A BEES' NEST IN YOUR GARDEN

What you need:

A flowerpot (> 20cm in diameter)
A piece of slate / tile
A bit of tube or pipe



Instructions:

Sink the upturned flower pot into the ground and use the slate/ tile to cover any drainage holes to keep the rain out. Run a hose or pipe underground to the pot, leaving a prominent entrance. Be sure to make drainage holes in the pipe. Finally, fill with a generous handful of nesting material, such as old bedding from a pet mouse, guinea pig, etc.

pesticides in your garden. They are often labelled as 'bug killers' or something similar, but almost all of these can harm bumblebees, even if you don't intend to harm them. Some pests can be controlled by simply planting certain other plants nearby, and you can learn more about this on the BBC Gardening website


communicate, doctors know about and respect their

MARCH WEATHER

March "many weathers" lived up to its name but it came in like a lion and left the same way contrary to weather lore. It was a bit quieter on its way out. I was quite a breezy month high of 21.6mph on the first and 19.4mph on the last day. On only 3 days did the wind not blow from the north westerly quarter. Likewise the first and last days were the ones with very low pressure. Temperatures increased as the month went on with a high of 58.6F (14.5C). We had lots of cold nights with many ground frosts and 8 nights of actual frosts. The minimum temperature was 27.1F(-2C). On only one night did the wind chill not take the temperatures below

freezing.

The crocuses were out and gone before the bees could work them. Early signs of the daffodils are that there are quite a few blind ones amongst our established ones. The newer ones look more promising. Bird song is increasing and there is a little more activity at the feeding station. I have cleaned, repaired and disinfected the bird boxes and disinfected the swallows nest in hopeful anticipation they will be used again. A swallows nest in which they had chicks die was simply alive with mites, hence the spray. The bees have ventured out on cleansing flights on the better days. Next month is "lack of sleep month" i.e. lambing!!

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

On Wednesday 18th March a large, captive audience was treated to a fullblooded, highly topical and provocative talk given by Dr Sandra Pendlington entitled 'King Richard III: Lord of the North and the search for his Grave'. Dr Pendlington, as an active member of the Scottish Branch of the Richard III Society for 40 years and editor of the Scottish Journal, is well qualified to expound her theories and expertise on one of the most controversial characters in the history of the British monarchy. The diverse arguments surrounding his accession to the throne in 1483, the mystery of the deaths/disappearances of the two princes in the Tower, the exact nature of his own death in the Battle of Bosworth on 22nd August 1485 (aged just 32), and the subsequent uncertainties regarding the fate of the corpse – all these controversies were dramatically re-ignited when, of course, his skeletal remains were uncovered buried beneath a car park in Leicester on 25th August 2012 (precisely 527 years to the day after his burial). And now, just one week after Dr Pendlington's talk (26th

March 2015) the body is about to be re-buried in its new coffin and tombstone in Leicester Cathedral after a procession from Bosworth Field and three days of lying in state.

The first part of the talk, however, covered Richard's less celebrated vears as the Warden of the West Marches in the North-west of England from 1471 (as an 18 year-old) to 1483. Having spent his earlier teenage years at Middleham Castle in North Yorkshire . the then Richard Plantagenet Duke of Gloucester made his home near Penrith, visiting Dockray Hall, now the Gloucester Arms pub. Later he moved further north to Carlisle Castle, erecting a new tower in the north curtain wall to add protection against the frequent Scots border raids. Under his tenure he seemingly built up a strong reputation as a firm but fair Warden. introducing novel ideas on bail and the presumption of innocence to the legal procedure.

Indeed, Dr Pendlington was keen to stress the many positive aspects of the character of this much-maligned historical figure. Often referred to as 'The Usurper King', one line of enquiry now puts him as the rightful heir to Edward IV's throne. Derided as deformed and ugly, his curved spine was actually due to scoleosis, developed in teenage years, and even the Tudor-biased 'White Survey', the Crowland Chronicle of the Battle of Bosworth which is essentially a catalogue of hate against Richard, describes him as 'spirited' and 'brave' in his ultimate demise. Three days after his death he was buried at the back of Leicester's

Greyfriars Friary, with a tomb erected over the grave nine years later. However, in 1611 the mapmaker John Speede could not find the tomb (probably due to confusion between 'Greyfriars' and 'Blackfriars') leading to rumours of the body having been thrown into the River Soar, or pulled down and defaced during the late 1530s Dissolution of the Monasteries.

The final part of Dr Pendlington's talk related to the detailed investigative work of Phillippa Langley (secretary and founder of the Scottish Branch of the Richard III Society), John Ashdown-Hill, herself, Audrey Strange and others in their belief and quest to find King Richard's remains. They had established that they would almost certainly be

located at the site of the original Greyfriars Friary, now a social services car park.

At 2.15pm on the first day of the dig, at the spot where Phillippa had experienced a strange frisson when standing alone, a leg bone was uncovered... then a curved spine... . Subsequent DNA investigations and examination of the skeleton, including two clearly fatal blows to the skull, eventually confirmed its identity.

Dr Pendlington then fielded a number of questions ranging from the burial argument – York or Leicester – to the fate of the princes. She was thanked for providing such a stimulating evening, a fine conclusion to this season's lectures.

MAY GARDENING

May is my favourite month for planting out new plants in the garden. By now, I reckon that the worst of the frosts will be over so it is safe to remove plants of slightly suspect hardiness from their protected places in garden centres or nurseries and introduce them to my cold and rather windswept plot. Herbs such as rosemary and sage, lavender and thyme are very short lived in this garden – though thyme has proved to do quite well if grown in a terracotta pot. Shrubs such as Cistus (sun rose), Lavatera (tree mallow), Erysimum (perennial wallflower) and

most "hardy" Fuchsias also give up. If I add one or two of these things to the garden at this time of the year then I will have colour, fragrance and, in the case of the edible things, flavour for the whole summer and autumn.

There are several cultivars of my favourite herbs. I like "Lemon Thyme" (*Thymus x citriodorus* 'Doone Valley,) for its variegated leaves and zesty fragrance, and Common Thyme (Thymus vulgaris) for its flavour. "Purple Sage" Salvia officinalis 'Purpurascens' is decorative in leaf, but, should the plant survive at least one winter, I prefer ordinary Common Sage as this blooms more freely in the second year and the rich purple/ blue flowers make a lovely show beside the path in summer. Rosemary (Rosmarinus officinalis) varies very much in hardiness, but the upright form, 'Sudbury Blue' is supposed to survive temperatures down to - 15c so that will be the one to try next. I suspect that it will still need very good drainage at the root if it is to survive the winter mist and damp. As for Lavander (Lavandula angustifolia), the Nation's favourite has become 'Hidcote', the dwarf, neat, cultivar, which bears deep violet coloured flowers. If this is your choice, do make sure that you buy this from a reliable source. Hidcote labels have been known to be freely used on all sorts of things. Recent new cultivars include L.x intermedia 'Heavenly Angel', 'Heavenly Night' and 'Heavenly Scent' which all share a good perfume, and are later flowering than previous angustifolia and x intermedia plants and hence extend the season Elaine Horne

SEDBERGH BOOKTOWN

Partnership with Booktown Literary Trust

Durham University's Department of English is immensely pleased to announce that it has agreed a formal partnership with Sedbergh Booktown Literary Trust. The aim of the partnership is to stimulate new interest in literature and generate new audiences for books, especially in the north of England. The partners will work closely together to organise a series of lively events, including lectures, writing workshops, and readings. Plans are already underway for a programme of events exploring the evolution of English poetry from Beowulf to Brigflatts.

Durham University holds the archive of the Northumbrian poet, Basil Bunting, who was a frequent visitor to Sedbergh, and who titled his best-known work *Brigflatts* (1966) after the nearby Quaker hamlet of that name. Bunting praised the spiritual solace and tranquility of the place and took inspiration from the local landscape around Sedbergh, including the River Rawthey.

The English Department at Durham is one of the top university research departments in the country (currently ranked 1st for teaching and research in *The Complete University Guide*). It teaches all aspects of English literature from Anglo-Saxon and Old Norse to the present day, and it has particular strengths in the study of British, Irish, and American poetry.

Professor Stephen Regan, who is leading the collaboration for the University, has a strong attachment to Sedbergh, having spoken about Basil

Bunting on several occasions at the Sedbergh Books and Drama Festival. He commented that it was 'an enormous pleasure and a privilege for Durham University to have such a good working relationship with the people of Sedbergh and to have a partnership with one of the UK's premier book towns'. He hoped that support would be forthcoming from many good-willed individuals and organisations, and that the shared endeavours of Durham and Sedbergh would generate new cultural events and new creative projects for both places.

Three of us have passed our training, one is waiting to be assessed, sixteen more are applying, waiting to be interviewed, DRB checked and trained. We hope to hold the training in Sedbergh.

So the good news is that we could soon have a team of up to twenty First Responders!

NWAS provides us with one set of kit. The rest we have to buy ourselves. Ultimately we would like to have one set of equipment for each

First Responder, but recognise that initially we will have to share. Committee members are putting in grant applications to both local and national charities. One or two local groups have started to fund raise for us. And we have some collecting boxes around the town— one is in the craftworkshop, should you wish to donate!

As we move towards the practicalities of becoming fully operational (probably at the end of June now) we have learned about the pagers that we will have to use.

These are necessary because even if



First Responders live in an area where there is a mobile phone signal – they may be sent to an area where there is none, and will be unable to contact the Control Centre. The pagers work

everywhere, apparently. The Parish Council has agreed to sponsor four pagers for a year. We are wondering if any local businesses may feel able to sponsor a pager? They cost £18 a month, which is going to deplete our funds.

In order to be effective we are going to need some practical help from **YOU!** How easily can someone who doesn't know you well find your home? Are you the third house on the left up a track? Or perhaps, like me, your 'front' door is at the back, off a yard? How will we - or the ambulance team - find you if the need arises? A group of neighbours might

get together to 'signpost' where their house is. In a situation where minutes matter this could be vital. To this same end we are starting a 'mapping' exercise which will help us more than postcodes or GPS. We even have to 'define' where 'our' area is, sine we seem to be filling the gaps between Dent, Gardsale, Kirkby Lonsdale, Grayrigg, Kirkby Stephen etc...

If you would like to help our First Responder Group you can come and meet some of us at the Gala on 16th May. We may even have our new reflective jackets by then! Perhaps you could bake some heart-shaped cakes for us to sell? We hope to demonstrate cardiac massage as well as collect donations and information. We now have an e-mail address: sedberghfirstresponders@gmail.com

. And we plan to shake our collection boxes again on 23rd May.

Finally, our thanks to our supporters, especially this month to the Ladies NFU who we hear have done us proud and to the United Sedbergh Charities who are helping us on our way!


