DECEMBER GARDENING

For the last two years, at the beginning of December, I have bought a small, reasonably priced. "Christmas Rose" (Helleborus niger) plant, and kept it in its pot, bedded into the compost in a window box outside the kitchen window. Both plants flowered for weeks, through the darkest, grimmest months of the winter, and as they came to the end of their flowering time, I repotted them into larger pots using John Innes 2 compost, and then kept them through the summer in a shaded place on a gravelled area of the garden. New buds and leaves have begun to emerge and having fended off a few slugs and snails, they are now back in their winter position. It is unlikely that they will flower in time for Christmas so I shall probably be tempted to buy myself a third plant, in flower, as an early Christmas present (much cheaper and more long lasting than a bunch of cut flowers). Several other people may receive one too.

The first Hellebore to flower in this garden is generally the "Lenten Rose" (Helleborus orientalis or Helleborus x hybridus). I have plants with dusky pink, creamy white and

maroon spotted white flowers and though I love the colour of the pink hybrids, and especially the dark pink maroon – black flowers of the cultivars 'Pluto' and 'Harvington's Shades of the Night'. I find that these do not show up at a distance against the dark soil and soggy brown foliage and stems of my winter herbaceous perennials, so I favour the white and cream forms. There are now several unusual cultivars available including some with double flowers. (e.g. 'Ashwood Double Hybrids') As beautiful as these are, I still favour the single forms for their vigour and their prolific blooms.

Most Hellebores carry downward facing flowers, so if you can plant them raised up on the top of a wall or on a bank, you will have the advantage of looking up into their beautiful yellow stamens and cup shaped petals. If, like me, you have nowhere "up" enough, you will have to content yourself with putting them at the front of the border and lying down on the lawn to get the full effect. What could be nicer on a warm spring day? I am optimistic that there will be one of those sometime next year.

boundary changes had now been approved by the Secretary of State. These boundary changes would come into effect on 1st August 2016. Following careful consideration, it was resolved that the request for funding should be declined as a change would be premature having regard to the continuing debate on the name of the enlarged National Park and having regard also to concerns that such expenditure would be an inappropriate use of Parish Council Funds.

Other matters included the approval of Grant applications for the gym extension to the People's Hall and the Town Twinning Group for their student trip in February 2016, the recently relined road markings around town and the proposed enhancement scheme to the boundary and access at the People's Hall. It was also noted that eight recycling containers (4 x cardboard and 4 x plastic) had now been relocated to Spar from Joss Lane car park.

GARSDALE PARISH COUNCIL

Report from 19 November 2015 This week saw a full turnout of councillors, with apologies just from our clerk who was in Norway at the time.

The meeting was also attended by our District Councillor Kevin Lancaster: District Councillor Mel Mackie and County Councillor Nick Cotton both sent apologies.

A main topic of discussion was as always Highways; following the last meeting, David Metcalfe and David Labbate had met with our district councillors Kevin Lancaster and Mel Mackie, and shown them some of the worst problems along the A684. Furthermore, there were reports of roadsides crumbling on the coal road, mainly due to the latest batch of lorry



loads of a Network Rail subcontractor. The Parish Council will alert Network Rail and request that they or their subcontractors reinstate the damage.

The main news from the SLDC was that the changes to bin collection days had been a major disaster, with several expensive reprints of calendars and large mailshots. But no news about either school transport or private water supplies, which is far more important to the affected residents in Garsdale.

The Parish council is still very unhappy that the SLDC, with no stakeholder consultation, has chosen an Irish contractor as the only option for carrying out risk assessments of private water supplies, at the householder's expense. It is extremely worrying that we are being forced to pay a company for a risk assessment that many of us could do ourselves, when we have had no say in choosing this company and no opportunity to check their qualifications.

John Colton then reported that latest news on Fibre GarDen project, from the AGM held Tuesday 17/11.

The deadline for using government grant has now passed, and the commercial build partners ITS have apologised for their failings in writing. The share holders decided to not pursue an offer from ITS. They then decided to attempt to recover funds from ITS and to investigate other options, primarily BT and the B4RN

The Parish Council's bank balance is currently healthy. Changing insurance company has reduced the annual Parish Council insurance from £335 to £157. Following scrutiny of the original agreement made in 2008, a refund from the Diocese of £750+VAT has been secured. This leaves the legal bill for work on requests of amendments to the contract at £1250+VAT, towards which the Diocese has granted a rent holiday of 5 years worth £1000, in return for prompt settlement of the original legal bill.




be constrained be the existing South Lakeland Local Development Framework. Also, at least until 2020 and probably until 2025 national policy will curtail the aspirations of those whose only true ambition is to thwart.

Nor have I ever been a great believer in the national lottery: there were several excellent Maths teachers at QES when I was there. But, like many I have noticed the extended campaign featuring Noel Edmonds and other even less famous celebrities, "Someone has to win, lets hope it isn't him". When the Ramblers' movement and its allies first decided they would try to extend the Yorkshire Dales Hillary Benn was DEFRA secretary and acceptance of the outrageous Natural England report was a formality. Part of that plan was for a major vanity project "Gateway to the Dales" at Junction 38 or Junction 39 of the M6. So

important was this that the National Park centre at Sedbergh had to be disposed of, under any terms, no matter how poor for the authority. Hopefully the desire to waste public money on such an edifice is less strong than it once was but I would not be surprised if in collaboration with the quasi-private sector this wondrous Tower of Babel is soon resurrected. A grant from the national lottery will be an essential element of such a project. Let's hope that like Noel Edmonds' bid that of the national park will be firmly rejected.

Meanwhile in the real world substantial progress is being made towards some form of devolution within Cumbria. Whether that will involve one or two unitary authorities



is as yet unknown but certainly there will be an elected mayor. Whether South Lakeland will survive also remains unclear. Here, many of my Conservative colleagues consider the first efforts at the new warding to be nothing more than gerrymandering by the controlling group unjustly to perpetuate their administration. I can't say I am too bothered. The lesson I learnt long ago was that gerrymandering always fails. The ballot box always wins in the end.

COUNCILLOR CORNER

After much delay, the boundary extensions for the Yorkshire Dales National Park have been given the go ahead by the Secretary of State, with the new boundaries coming into force in August 2016. More land both to the north and south of Sedbergh will now fall within the National Park. The northern half of the Howaills and large parts of the Orton Fells as far up as Maulds Meaburn will be included to the north. To the south. land either side of the River Lune down to Kirkby Lonsdale will included, taking in all of the parishes of Middleton, Barbon and Casterton and parts of Kirkby Lonsdale parish and other parishes to the west of the Lune.

For more details go to: https://www.gov.uk/government/ publications/national-parksextensions-to-the-lake-district-andvorkshire-dales-parks scroll down to 'Yorkshire Dales: maps of confirmed boundary changes' click on this and then click on 'Overview Map'.

So what will this mean for Sedbergh? With one third of the

Yorkshire Dales National Park now situated within Cumbria, Sedbergh will sit more centrally within the Park than it has done to date and the marketing of the new areas will place Sedbergh as a central base to explore to the north and south. Sedbergh may well be used as an example to show how the relationship between parish, district, county and National Park works, especially as there will be parts of Eden District and even Lancaster City (around Leck and Cowan Bridge) now forming part of the National Park, Parts of Lancashire within Yorkshire Dales National Park - who would have bet on that when the Park was first set up?



There has been a development in the plans the Government has to change the way that they work out how much money they will provide each of our police forces. I told you in Lookaround last month that their proposed new formula would mean that Cumbria police would lose more money than any other force in the



country.

Well the minister in charge of these changes announced last month that there had been an error in the way that the new funding had been worked out and as a result the whole scheme was being put on hold for 12 months. I am sure you agree this really does not inspire confidence, not only does it appear that the Government are not very good at maths but they are so bad that it will take them over a year to recalculate the figures that they need to use to decide how much money they will be providing. Either the sums involved are very very complicated or they have a rubbish calculator.

Here! VOTER REGISTRATION.

The Sedbergh Labour Group would like to see everybody, regardless of political persuasion, comply with the new regulations for registration before December 5th.

What are these new changes?
Up to now registration to vote was carried out on the basis of the household, one application on behalf of the household allowed all members to vote. Now each individual has to register separately. This change has been very stealthily introduced with the clear aim of reducing the numbers of registered voters prior to the deliberations of the Boundary Commission.

Why is this important to me?

There have been changes enacted by Parliament in advance of the next round of Constituency Boundary reassessments. The cut off for this is December 5th and only those registered by that date will count when the numbers of voters are assessed to determine the new boundaries. Each constituency has to have a certain number of voters, so the fewer the registered voters, the greater the chance that Westmorland and Lonsdale will disappear and that Sedbergh will be absorbed into a super Penrith constituency.

Will I be able to register after December 5th? Of course you will, but you will not count when the new boundaries are determined.

How do I register?

Very simple. Go to gov.uk/register-to-vote. Fill in your name, address, date of birth and a few other details. You will need your National Insurance Number which can be found on your National Insurance Card, or on official paperwork such as payslips or letters about benefits or tax credits. For any further information contact the electoral registration department of the local council.

NATIONAL PARK NOTES

Well, it's happened at last! A couple of weeks ago the Secretary of State for the Environment confirmed the Planning Inspector's recommendation made two years ago that the proposed boundary extension for the Yorkshire Dales National Park should go ahead. This is a truly massive extension increasing the area already covered by the National Park by almost 25% and taking in additional parts of South Lakeland District as well as extending into entirely new territory within Eden District Council,

Lancaster City Council and Lancashire County Council. On the ground this means sixteen Parish Councils in Eden, eight in South Lakeland and two in Lancaster City as well as five new County Councillors from Cumbria, one from Lancaster, six District Councillors from Eden and two from South Lakeland. The logistical challenges are great but this has been planned for over a number of years so the transition to the new arrangements will hopefully go relatively smoothly. David Butterworth the National Park's Chief Executive officer will be visiting his counterparts in all the new local Authorities now included in the Park and it is anticipated that there will be one or more Parish Forums for the


new Parish Councils which will be attended by the local existing Members of the Park Authority (such as Cllr Nick Cotton and myself) and National Park senior officers to explain to Parish Councillors the implications and consequences of now being within the boundaries of the Park which, of course, will also become the Planning Authority for the new areas. Naturally all those involved with the Park hope that the existing central government grant will be increased to take into account the augmented size of the Park and the responsibilities that go along with that. I cannot pretend that everyone is welcoming the change although representations from those wishing to

see the Park extended greatly exceeded those against when the original consultation was held prior to the Inspector's decision. In fact anyone objecting to the Confirmation Order has until mid-December to give notice of intention to challenge the decision through the courts. There are busy times and challenges ahead but I, for one, am looking forward to them especially with regard to the extra environmental protection that being a part of the Park will bring to those new areas concerned.

Now I am going to start a rant! A couple of years ago I mentioned in one of my articles the concern that I felt about the growing amount of dog mess on the streets of Sedbergh and

also the particularly disgusting habit of people "scooping the poop" and then leaving the bag hanging on a convenient hedge or gate. Why irresponsible dog owners should consider this as acceptable behaviour is beyond my comprehension. In recent weeks the situation seems to be worsening and most pavements now seem to have their regular "pile" presumably deposited during the hours of darkness when either the dog, which has been let out unsupervised to do its business, or the owner, cannot be seen. SEDBERGH ORCHESTRA

The Sedbergh Orchestra played Orchestral Contrasts in St Andrew's Church, on Thursday 19th November. On a number of levels this was an evening of revelations.

The young violinists, Kasia and Monika Davies provided the first revelation. So young (16 and 13 respectively) yet so precociously talented, they played J S Bach's challenging Double Violin Concerto with assurance, practised discipline, the fearlessness of youth and an empathy that only sisters could bring to such a performance.

They sparkled and pranced their way through the first movement, which perfectly complemented the slower, second movement – *largo ma*

non tanto. Even the most experienced of virtuosi find this movement difficult to sustain, yet here they were, young Kasia and Monika, playing with sensitivity and musicality. They boldly added their signatures to Bach's intertwining melodies – and went on to attack the final movement with appropriate style and passion. They managed to articulate the modulating motifs with finesse and, on occasion too, with imperious force. This was indeed, a very fine performance.

The second revelation came in the form of two obscure pieces each written for ten wind instruments. Probably few in the audience had encountered the pieces before – I certainly had not. The first piece,

Andante in E flat by Sergei Ivanovich Taneyev was very well worth its airing. It is an elegiac piece that hints of darkness. It has to be played with precision and careful nuancing, and that is just what it got. The result was a subtly layered palette. By contrast the second item, Vivace from Sinfonietta in F. Opus 188 by J Raff. was light and crisp. Sinfonietta is an engaging piece and the flautists, Philip Gruar and Liz Rice, exemplified its lilting quality in a haunting melodic interlude. Altogether, the Wind Ensemble covered itself in glory. It would be good to hear much more of them in future.

The third revelation was the most striking of all. It was the Sedbergh Orchestra itself. It came of age on 19 November 2015, with a performance of considerable accomplishment. Of course Beethoven's First Symphony is familiar ground, but the Orchestra gave it life, performing it with verve



Prickly particulars - all about Hedgehogs

At their October meeting, the Sedbergh Support Group welcomed Rowan Worsman of the Hedgehog Preservation Society. Rowan has rescued and rehabilitated many distressed hedgehogs over several years. She gave us a fascinating insight into the habits of this increasingly rare animal.

FACTS. The hedgehog is the UK's only spine-covered mammal (up to 7,000 spines), giving it formidable protection when it curls into a ball. Hedgehogs have changed little over the last 15 million years. Their ancestors roamed the earth before mammoths and sabre-toothed tigers. Newborn hedgehogs are born with their spines under their skins - they emerge when they are a few hours old. The hedgehog is a nocturnal creature, using its strong sense of smell to guide it through the dark, often travelling as far as two miles per night.

FEEDING. Hedgehogs are insectivores and are related to voles and shrews. Feeding on at least 100

invertebrates a night, a hedgehog can weigh up to 1kg on a varied diet that includes beetles, caterpillars, slugs, snails, earthworms, cereals and even pet food. They can detect their prey up to 3cm deep under the soil. Hedgehogs are a welcome visitor to any garden and will help rid your flowerbeds and vegetable patches of unwanted pests. Hedgehogs are good for your garden, as they love to eat slugs and snails and other pests that gardeners find a nuisance. Slug pellets and pesticides entering the food chain can poison hedgehogs.

In autumn hedgehogs will be feeding voraciously in order to increase the fat reserves that they need to survive during the long winter months. Although their usual diet consists of beetles, caterpillars, earthworms and other invertebrates. hedgehogs are quite partial to peanut butter and digestive biscuits, cat or dog food, crushed dog biscuits or muesli plus a small amount of vegetable leftovers. If you have a hedgehog visiting your garden regularly, it may benefit greatly if left some of these in the evenings. But please do not feed hedgehogs bread

and/or milk - it's bad for them and causes diarrhoea. However, in order to avoid providing an extra meal for neighbourhood cats and even rats, cover the dish with an upturned box, leaving a 12cm entrance hole just large enough for the hedgehog to access and only leave it out at times when your hedgehog is likely to visit. Hedgehogs will also appreciate a supply of fresh, clean, water.

HIBERNATION.

Hedgehogs are warmblooded mammals and need to feed regularly to maintain their temperature and energy levels. In winter, food supplies may be scarce, particularly in the coldest

weather, so hedgehogs hibernate during these barren times.

Hibernating between November and early April, the hedgehog slows its body functions down considerably. Their metabolism slows down to a very low level enabling them to survive by expending the minimum amount of energy possible and heartbeats decrease from 190bpm to 20bpm, while body temperature drops from 35 per cent to 10 per cent.

Hedgehogs make hibernation nests in places such as sheltered compost heaps and under piles of leaves and logs. Never disturb a hedgehog nest or hibernation place at any time of year.

HOW TO HELP: Gardeners can help hedgehogs by piling and sweeping autumn leaves and grass cuttings in undisturbed areas providing excellent winter nests. This

will also provide excellent habitat for invertebrates, the main food source for hedgehogs.

Let a few of your bushes overgrow, so they feel sheltered enough for hedgehogs

to live under.

If you do collect and dispose of leaves or cuttings, please check carefully beforehand to make sure there are no hedgehogs nesting underneath.

Hedgehogs can swim but have difficulty climbing up slippery or vertical banks. Place some chicken wire or a plank of wood on the side of your ponds.

Once considered a gastronomic delight, the only baking a hedgehog faces nowadays is accidental. So spare a thought for hibernating hedgehogs when lighting your winter bonfires.

Many of those present had observed hedgehogs in their gardens and appreciated the opportunity to discuss their welfare with Rowan. Hopefully Sedbergh hedgehogs will thrive as a result.

Our small group has once again worked through the year to enhance Sedbergh with our work on the planted areas around the town. (We were surprised to think that some people assume that it is the 'Council' who attend to the flower beds - can I assure them that it is not). We have to say a big thank you to everyone who has complimented us on the work we do. It is much appreciated.

We have continued to maintain all the flower beds along Main Street and we now have more permanent planting rather than having to replace annuals each year.

The project at the Fire Station which was funded by the Yorkshire Dales Sustainable Development fund (with grateful thanks to Andrea Burden at the YDNP for all her help with us obtaining this grant) is now becoming established with one or two plants deciding the site was not for them but for others they love it so we will be doing a little bit of jigging them so that they are in the best position.

The site at Toll Bar with the tyres also took off so we hope to enhance the 'tyres' come the spring time. We kept the flowers in the tyres low so that we did not obstruct the line of sight for motorist at the junction.

As many will have noticed the wall at 72 Main Street has been lowered between the car park and the garden at the property. This was undertaken by Sedbergh Parish Council and our involvement was to ask if we could have raised flower beds built from the surplus stones to enable us to deal

A follow up to the November issue of the Lookaround. A lot of the people in the community asked me where the fares go to, taken from the Community Bus as it is public money. That I do not know. If you travel on commercial services and you do not have a concessionary pass you have to pay the fare that the commercial operator requests for running his service. For example - £6 to Kendal for a return ticket. If you have a concessionary pass Cumbria County Council pays 58 per cent of the £6, which is slightly over half (£3.20). This money comes from your Council Tax, not Central Government. (Whitehall, London). Now this applies



BLOOD DONORS

Don't forget to give blood before Christmas

The run up to Christmas is always a busy time, and festive season will be here before you know it. NHS Blood and Transplant is urging people in INSERT AREA to give blood before things get too hectic to help ensure patients get the blood they need in the lead up to, and over, the festive period.

Donors are being asked to book an appointment to give blood before Christmas if they haven't already done so, and to keep their appointment if they have already made one.

Blood is always needed, with hospitals in England and North Wales requiring around 6,000 units of blood every day to treat a range of patients. To keep stocks healthy as the festive season approaches and over this time, donors are urged to remember to donate between now and Christmas.

It is important that vital blood stocks are maintained at all times, as red blood cells have a shelf life of just 35 days and platelets a shelf life of only seven days. NHS Blood and Transplant needs to collect enough blood in the right quantities of each type to meet patient needs. Donations from all blood groups, but especially from O-negative, Bnegative and A- negative donors, are needed in the run up to Christmas.

Amanda Eccles Senior Marketing Coordinator at NHSBT, said: "We know it is a busy time of year and will only get busier as the festive season approaches. That's why we're urging

our donors to book an appointment to give blood before Christmas, if they don't already have one.

"And we'd ask our donors to please keep their appointments over the coming weeks to help us keep blood stocks healthy and help hospital patients this winter."

While many people think that blood is used mainly for accidents and emergencies, donated blood is vital for a wide variety of life-saving procedures. This includes helping to save the life of a new mother during or after childbirth or treating patients with blood disorders, such as sickle cell anaemia and Thalassaemia. which require regular transfusions.

THE COBWEB ORCHESTRA

The Cobweb Orchestra has grown from an outreach project of the then Northern (now Royal Northern) Sinfonia 20 years ago as an evening class in Stanley, County Durham. It has since expanded under the direction of Andy Jackson and its board of trustees to become the largest amateur orchestra in the north of England with eight separate orchestras, from Morpeth in the north, York in the south, Dalston in the north west and Tebay in the south west.

Cobwebs have won three national awards, and recently have been selected by "Making Music" to have a composer in residence, Michael Betteridge. He will work with the orchestra for a year and compose a piece of music, which Cobwebs will perform and which will subsequently be broadcast on BBC Radio 3.

The local Cobweb orchestra meets at Tebay Methodist Church Hall every Tuesday at 7.30pm during term time, and is directed by conductor Peter Crompton. The philosophy of Cobwebs is based on the same values held since it started: everyone and anyone who plays an instrument is welcome to come and play with us. We don't audition.

We encourage everyone to play to the best of their ability, both in the orchestra and individually. We play a wide range of orchestral music, some standard repertoire and some especially written for us. We hold study days and residential weekends; one is usually held in Sedbergh every year and we have been to Tuscany biennially since 2003, on trips successfully organised by Andrew

Forsyth.

When you come and visit us, your first evening is free and you don't have to commit to attending every week - you can come and go as you please to fit in with other commitments.

So, if you have ever played an orchestral instrument, or would like to learn to play one, we have an instrument bank from which you can borrow an instrument. matches and all six hockey matches. A party of about thirty Old Sedbergians with wives and other hangers on went to Gallipoli at half term to visit the graves of the 23 Sedbergians who died there. A service was held at the Helles Point memorial where the names of the 14.000 unknown graves are commemorated (there are 9,000 known graves, and 13,000 simply believed to be communally buried in certain cemeteries). The names of the Old Sedbergians were read out, together with those of Corporal Thomas William Rigg, husband of Nellie Rigg and father of three children of Derry Cottage, Sedbergh, and Lieutenant Surtees Sheffield, brother of Mrs Wayte-Hicks of West

House, Dent. The name of 16 Sedberghians, together with the 2 local men, are inscribed on the Helles Point memorial. The known graves were all visited with a small ceremony at each.

SEDBERGH AND DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

The Great Wall of China

On Wednesday, 4th November Dr Raynor Shaw again transported over 30 members of the SDHS to an exotic location in the Far East with his illustrated talk on the Great Wall of China. He had previously entertained the Society with his equally illuminating lecture on Angkor Wat in Cambodia.

Dr Shaw, who hails from Rotherham, had spent 27 years of his working life in Hong Kong and had therefore been able to develop his keen interest in ancient cultures and monuments by making several visits to these sites, building up an impressive body of knowledge and collection of photographs of the Great Wall. More recently he even travelled by train with a companion all the way from Rotherham to China, and also walked along sections of the wall with his daughter Amanda, then teaching in the country.

This talk began, however, with an outline of the various purposes of wall building throughout history and across the world. Protection against real or perceived threats resulted in the building of the Roman city walls around York and Chester, for example, or many Mediterranean cities such as Rome, Jericho and Dubrovnik; or even in America where, in 1609, New Amsterdam (later New York with its Wall Street) was established by the Dutch with its

ramparts. Castle walls, of course, abound throughout Europe and beyond from early medieval times as many as 260 in Germany, 116 in France, and a relatively few 75 in Britain – whilst the 73-mile long Hadrian's Wall was built to separate the Roman Empire from the marauding Picts. In the 20th century the Berlin Wall was erected to segregate the political poles of East and West; and Dr Shaw showed a slide of Northallerton Prison to make the point that high, strong walls have also been used to keep certain members of society contained within.

In China, for centuries the traditional lay-out of domestic buildings has been around a central courtyard with

a protective wall surround. In the south of the country the Hakka villages had circular high-walled homes, thus strong wall construction has been a long established skill from the times of the 1st Dynasty when Chengtouhan (Hunan) became its capital. From about 300 BC the Chinese civilisation began to expand southwards and westwards from its origins in the north-east around the Yellow Sea, but it became repeatedly under threat from tribes such as the Xiongu and Mongols to the north. Of the 10 great Dynasties overall, three the Qin, Han and Ming – became great wall building periods in order to protect the growing Empire from invasion. From 221 BC under Emperor Shi Huang, the now unified China built its first walls; during the Han period several walls were constructed further to the west towards the Gobi Desert: and in the Ming Dynasty came the classic Great Wall, a remarkable 4,163 miles in length, built using soldiers, convicts and forced labour. The Ming builders used slaked lime and sticky rice for mortar, long and heavy bricks (3) times heavier than standard British) stamped with the maker's name and

the date, and within the core of the walls innumerable skeletons were packed.

Today, in total, the different sections of the Great Wall of China extend for over 13,000 miles!

Curiously, during the communist era (post 1949) and the rule of Chairman Mao and the Cultural Revolution, the Great Wall was ignored and even partly demolished by the Chinese. Only since 1984 with Deng Xiaoping has it been re-valued, with American presidents from Nixon to Obama being regaled on its ramparts, and tourism suddenly flourishing. In 1987 it was declared a World Heritage Site, and by 2010 it was estimated that it received 20,000 visitors a day! (91% of whom were Chinese).

In conclusion, Dr Shaw took us on a wondrous visual tour of the Wall from the Yellow Sea in the east to the First Platform (built 1539) in the west, centred around 10 key locations of interest and based on photographs taken on his recent walk with his daughter and previous visits. That journey threw up images of dragons, grand arches, ramparts built from reeds and loess (wind-blown dust), colourful art work, temples, Buddhist statues and so much more.

It was a memorable journey!

look to see what was being written at the time about the war, the hospitals, and the view of the war by the various authors.

She started by referring to the training college opened in Leeds in 1913 which was converted on the outbreak of war to a hospital with 800 beds by August 1914. The first wounded soldiers arrived on the 17th September – and the ambulances were cheered through the streets. The hospital were staffed by Queen Alexandra nurses and nurses from the territorial service, who had been trained for 3 years, but there were few of them and the hospitals were mainly run by VADs. The latter were volunteers who received no payment, had some training and certificates in

home nursing, invalid cooking and hygiene, and cleaned, scrubbed, made beds, and, despite their Victorian upbringing had to dress, undress and wash men. Vera Britten gave perhaps the best description of their experiences in *A Testament of Youth*.

She spoke of the desire of the various war poets to make the complacent people at home aware of the reality of war in the trenches, and in particular Sassoon's A Soldier's Declaration. She spoke of how poets such as Sassoon and Wilfred Owen suffered from shellshock and were affected by their experiences in Craiglockhart Hospital in Edinburgh. By the end of the war it was thought 80,000 soldiers had suffered from shellshock. Some doctors thought them either mad or cowards, although others tried various treatments including psychic response, explosives, ergotherapy and talking it

out. Many such as Owen and Sassoon were eventually passed fit enough to return to the front, although many did not

Other authors she referred to were Robert Graves, Rupert Brooke, Virginia Woolf (Mrs Dalloway), Dr John McCrae who wrote In Flanders *Field* in a dug out on the edge of what is now Essex Farm cemetery, the German Erich Remarque's All Quiet on the Western Front, and Isaac Rosenberg's Break of Day in the Trenches. She also spoke of the Rev. Studdart Kennedy (k/a "Woodbine Willie") who "took cigarette and God" to the trenches. There is a memorial in Poet's Corner in Westminster Abbey to 16 war poets.

She finished by quoting Edith Cavell "Patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness towards anyone". Karen BL

Better Consumer rights – in time for Christmas!

UK consumers spend on average a whopping £90 billion a month and December must surely be see the biggest spend. More than one in five people in the UK experience problems with goods and services. A quarter of them spend more than four hours trying to sort out these problems, one in ten having to take time off work to do so. The Consumer Rights Act came into force on 1 October 2015 and streamlines eight pieces of legislation into one. This should make life a little easier for shoppers.

Most of the changes were important updates to existing laws. But two new areas of law were also introduced.

For the first time rights on digital content have been set out in legislation. The Act gives consumers a clear right to the repair or replacement of faulty digital content, such as online film and games, music downloads and e-books. The law here had been unclear and this change has brought us up to date with how digital products have evolved.

There are now also new, clear rules for what should happen if a service is not provided with reasonable care and skill or as agreed. For example, the business that provided the service must bring it into line with what was agreed with the customer or, if this is not practical, must give some money back.

In addition, Alternative Dispute Resolution is now available to all businesses to help when a dispute with a consumer cannot be settled directly. The Citizens Advice Consumer Service can give advice and information on these new laws, telephone 03454 04 05 06 helplines are open Monday to Friday 9.00am to 5.00pm, or you can download a leaflet type 'Citizens Advice know your new rights' into your search engine for the link within our website.

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Thumbs up to expansion of Yorkshire Dales National Park

The Yorkshire Dales National Park will be increased by nearly a quarter in the next year following the announcement by Environment Secretary Elizabeth Truss in October that its boundary is being extended.

The news means the area covered by the National Park will expand by nearly 24 per cent while the Lake District National Park will increase by three per cent –changes involving 188 square miles.

Extending the boundaries of these beautiful and internationally iconic areas should provide a welcome

boost for rural tourism in the area, support rural businesses and potentially add millions more to the £4 billion already generated by visitors to the National Parks each year.

Yorkshire Dales National Park
Authority Chairman Peter
Charlesworth said: "We are thrilled
and delighted these stunning
landscapes have been recognised as
worthy of national park status. The
decision is particularly welcome after
the tremendous work of so many
people from these communities who
fought so hard for national park
status. It is marvellous that, even at a
time of financial austerity,
Government have recognised the
equality of these landscapes and

designated as national park."

The Authority Chief Executive David Butterworth said: "Now the hard work starts. We will be listening to and learning from the local communities, farmers, landowners and businesses to enable us to develop productive, long-term relationships with all these parties. Working together with others, the National Park Authority is determined to play a leading part in making the most of the wonderful opportunities this decision offers for both the landscape and local economy."

The new boundary for the Yorkshire Dales National Park will now include parts of the Orton Fells, the northern Howgill Fells, Wild Boar Fell and Mallerstang to the north and, to the west, Barbon, Middleton, Casterton and Leck Fells, the River Lune, and part of Firbank Fell and other fells to the west of the River Lune.

The Lake District National Park will absorb an area from Birkbeck Fells





Common to Whinfell Common to the east and area from Helsington Barrows to Sizergh Fell, an area north of Sizergh Castle and part of the Lyth valley to the south.

The announcement of the extension, which will come into effect next August, was made as the Secretary of State visited Wensleydale Creamery in Hawes.

It follows two public consultations on the Natural England's proposal and a public inquiry in 2013.

Keeping up with Three Hares

You could be forgiven for thinking James and Nina and 'Three Hares' had been on Main Street for years, so loyal is the clientele. But believe it or not, it's only one year.

Busy, cosy, with a seductive range of cakes, newspapers at the table, friendly service, lunch and dinner menus to wonder at – oh yes, and I nearly forgot, shelves of made-on-the-premises seeded, wholemeal and sourdough breads, which means getting up every day at 3 a.m. to get things moving, and getting to bed at very late evenings. Energy and enthusiasm for good food drives them all like people possessed!

The lunch and dinner menus are firmly based on locally reared and sourced ingredients. Given the farming cycle and current stocking techniques, serious research into best buys finds James and Nina on many local farms to evaluate how their options on lamb, beef and pig for eighteen months to two years ahead are developing on the land now. Yorkshire's own Middle Whites and Berkshire pork products, plus pheasant are all regularly offered, and while out with his dogs, James uses his own ferrets to catch wild rabbit.

Their background is in gastro-pubs, restaurants, hospitality work and promotional events. However, the urgent desire to do their own thing, find their own way has luckily for Sedbergh brought them to the foot of the Howgills, and the non-stop high-octane of running *Three Hares* they have committed themselves to. And as if that were not enough, what about the string of weddings, birthdays, and all manner of outside catering they do as well?!



temperature was "low" being 50.5F (10C). The rest were in the upper 50sF or above with a maximum of 72.3F (22.5C) on the 1st. On the minimum side we didn't actually have a sub freezing night with a low of 34F (1C) though we had a few ground frosts. Even when the wind-chill was taken into consideration only one night actually got below freezing at 30F (-1C) and a couple at freezing point. It was again quite a breezy month especially the latter half. The maximum gust recorded was 18.6 mph with 12 days when the gust was not from the North West. Rainfall was again relatively low with a total of 2.76i nches (70mm) and most of this fell in the last 3 days. We had 18 dry days!!

The mild weather has continued the summer like activities around and about. The bees are still bringing in pollen from where I have no idea since most of the usual sources have ceased flowering. Having said that fuchsias and nemesia in the wall baskets are still flowering as are the geraniums in pots but bees don't work these. The odd butterfly is still about. Did anyone see a painted lady

Banks Renewables have just announced that they are completely withdrawing from their scheme to construct a wind farm, with turbines almost the height of Blackpool Tower, on land adjacent to Killington Lake. The scheme became controversial as it would have blighted magnificent views of the Howgill Fells and been visible over 100 square miles of Cumbria and the Yorkshire Dales.


