However the Sedgwick family of Lockbank have kindly agreed that the fireworks can be set off from the field next to Havera Bank as usual, and there will be food and beverages available on the People's Hall car park. Gates open at 6.30pm with fireworks at 7pm and 7.30pm – entrance is free for everyone.

SEPTEMBER WEATHER

Although we registered a total of 5.71 inches (145.03mm) of rain we actually had 8 dry days and more when most of the day was pleasant. It was just that when it did rain we had heavy downpours. It was also fairly mild with some very pleasant temperatures, a maximum of 77.9F (25.5C) on a day with only a shower. The coldest day was the last one when a minimum of 41.7F(5.38C)was recorded. On only 2 days was a maximum gust below double figures recorded with a maximum of 19.9 mph. On all but 4 days these gusts were recorded from the North West.

At last a few butterflies!! Although the buddleia was almost over on a warm day, the 29th, we had some red admirals and a solitary painted lady. Did you watch the fascinating programme on the Painted Lady and its migration all the way from Morocco this last week? An incredible journey for such a small animal! We've had a good crop of acorns on the trees I planted when we arrived here 21 years ago. It has also been a bumper year for fruit on other trees. The hawthorns and rowans are red with berries and our yellow berried version, Sorbus Joseph Rock, is likewise ladened. I have never collected so many hazel nuts either. It used to be said that a heavy crop of berries was a sign of a hard winter to come but perhaps it was more likely we had a decent spring. Although we again had a good crop of Josta berries the blackbirds beat us to them again. I was guite hopeful that they had left us some but it wasn't to be! This is an interesting fruit, a 3 way

cross between blackcurrants, European gooseberry and a black North American gooseberry. Worth trying if you can beat the birds!! We even managed a few Cox's Orange Pippins this year. Everything is still green, except for a sycamore in a next door field, and grass continues to grow. The sycamore has probably drowned! I lost a Serbian spruce last year which was under water for a great length of time. When I enquired of Kew if that were possible they said it was but the excessive wet probably caused Honey Fungus which is often associated with such conditions. The birds are eating us out of house and home, especially the sparrows. No bats seen again. They have obviously been disturbed & moved on this year.



Repair works were ongoing at the Park at the People's Hall following the recent damage which included a fire at the shelter and breakage of a supporting rail at the chain walk. Fly tipping had been noted at the laybys at both Settlebeck Bridge and Straight Bridge and South Lakeland District Council had been made aware.

OTHER MATTERS:

Cllr Kevin Lancaster was elected as Vice Chair of the Council and Cllr John Capstick appointed to the Policy & Resources Committee (following the resignation of Mary Macpherson

last month). The co-option process for a replacement Parish Councillor is advertised in the Lookaround this month.

The requests for free parking on December Saturdays and on Artisan Market days were not supported by members for a number of reasons, including the favourable parking terms already operating on both car parks in town and the substantial anticipated resurfacing costs at Joss Lane car park in the future. It was noted that a petition had now been instigated in connection with the park at Maryfell. Notice had been given by BT of proposals to remove a number of telephone kiosks in the area, including that at Millthrop. Members noted, with regret, the announcement





and that the firework display in November would be their last event, as matters presently stood. Please note that members of the public are invited to our monthly Meetings where, as always, they are

able to comment or ask questions. Public Participation is now at the beginning of the Agenda and should anyone wish to speak, they would be welcome to attend from 7.30pm.

FANCY A COFFEE?

Three things have occurred recently in the quiet and sometimes not so quiet foothills of beautiful and majestic Garsdale.

Firstly, following yet more protestations by the parish council and from local parishioners about the disruptive and dangerous behaviour at weekends by speeding, irresponsible motor bikers, there has been a more noticeable presence of the boys in blue. Marked cars have




been stationed in the 30mph zones on a Sunday and the noise levels were clearly reduced. More's the pity though, that other bikers were positioning themselves on nearby bridges, warning fellow bikers that officers of the law were waiting for them so it's doubtful that many were apprehended. Hopefully, however, it may have given them something to think about: that they can't ride roughshod over the feelings of the locals without some consequences.

Secondly, a copy of a letter received by Tim Farron from Highways, has been seen, stating that the A684 had been surveyed and a set of rolling repairs will be effected shortly, using temporary traffic lights. What 'shortly' means to Highways is anybody's guess but let's await to see developments.

Thirdly, the telephones in the red BT boxes on The Street and on the road up to the station are to be removed unless viable reasons for their retention can be demonstrated. Unfortunately, their criteria for keeping the phones live are reasonable and it would be very difficult to justify their continued

existence. However, it may be possible to 'adopt' the boxes themselves, without phones, and use them for local purposes. Therefore Garsdale PC is launching a massive fund raising campaign to enable to purchase these boxes and urge all local residents to dig deep and donate generously. A thermometer type chart will be erected outside the Village Hall showing the progress of the fundraising which will continue until 21st December and various appeals will be aired on local radio and television. A local dignitary is being sought to head the campaign. The target for each box is £1. (I have sponsored the Street Box with 20 pence to get it up and running. Ed) After their purchase, suggestions will



be sought as to what use they can be put to, such as housing defibrillators or used for small convenience 'honesty' shops or as homes to wayward wildlife or set up libraries or book stores. One thought is to approach one of the large coffee retailers to see if they were willing to put in one of those 'coffee as you go' machines ... Fancy a coffee, anyone?

The next meeting of Garsdale PC is on Thursday 17th November at 7.30pm in the village hall.

Unfortunately, there will be no coffee machine ... unless we invite Costa to come along?

Interested in helping your local community?

We currently have a casual vacancy on Sedbergh Parish Council and, as no election has been requested, we wish to co-opt a new councillor.

The Council may co-opt any person who is legally qualified to hold such office, and who is willing to serve provided they are a British citizen, or a citizen of the Commonwealth or the European Union, and are neither the subject of a bankruptcy restriction order or interim order or have, within five years before the day of the election, been convicted in the United Kingdom of any offence and have had a prison sentence (whether suspended or not) for a period of over three months without the option of a fine.

Provided you also satisfy at least ONE of the following you may apply:

- You are registered as a local government elector for the Parish
- You have during the whole of the preceding twelve months occupied as owner or tenant, any land or premises in the Parish
- Your principal or only place of work during the preceding twelve months has been in the Parish
- You have during the whole of the preceding twelve months resided in the Parish or within 4.8 km of it

You must also be 18 years or older on the day you become nominated for election.

Written expressions of interest from persons wishing to serve as a Councillor need to be submitted to the Clerk to the Council 72a Main Street, Sedbergh LA10 5AD **to be**

received by Friday 25th November s

2016. It would be helpful if your letter (preferably on one side of A4 paper) could provide some details of your background, any experience you feel is relevant, and a statement explaining why you would wish to serve as a Parish Councillor.

Should you be interested in serving as a Councillor you are encouraged to contact the Clerk to the Council who will be able to explain the nature of the role, the time commitment likely to be required and the training which is available for new Councillors. NATIONAL PARK NOTES

Many organisations and individuals are facing major challenges as a result of the decision to leave the EU. This also inevitably includes the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority. As I mentioned in my previous article one of the principal causes for concern is the question of the extent to which the British government will confirm the existing wild life directives and habitat regulations or repeal these in due course to replace them with a more home grown version (either better or worse). The other main area of concern (probably the most significant challenge for the Authority at this time) is the whole issue of agrienvironmental subsidies and the





effect that leaving the EU will have on these subsidies not only for the farmer but also for the residents of the Park as a whole and the countryside generally.

The situation at the moment is that farmers receive Direct Payments from the Rural Payments Agency (often unfortunately many months after they fall due) and also payments directly related to the carrying out by farmers of environmental improvements on their land. Until recently these latter payments were made under the various Environmental Stewardship Schemes which were divided into entry level and higher level schemes. Many of these schemes will remain in existence for some years to come. However before Brexit the government introduced a new scheme called the Countryside Stewardship Scheme which came with a new set of rules, conditions and levels of entry. Apart from the additional work for farmers in coming to grips with the new scheme and the extensive documentation that goes with it there is also a general feeling amongst upland farmers that this latest scheme is designed more for



the kind of farming which takes place in lowland and arable farming areas and is not as advantageous to farmers in this part of the world as the previous scheme. The number of farmers and land managers signing up for this new scheme has therefore reduced considerably. This in itself is a cause for concern. It remains to be seen whether environmental improvements will continue to be made by farmers if they are no longer part of a stewardship scheme and where such payments are only made on condition that the environmental work is carried out. An even bigger question, of course, is whether the government will wish to continue with any agri-environmental schemes at all once the UK is no longer part of the EU Common Agricultural Policy. There are many questions to answer and so far the government has been completely silent on the matter which does not help anyone to plan for the future. Opinion is divided between those who would like future schemes to continue in a way similar to the ones that we already have and those that would prefer the whole subsidy scheme as we have known it for

many years to be abolished altogether!

One way forward is what is being referred to as a results based agrienvironmental policy. The National Park is currently leading on a two year Defra pilot project in Wensleydale to which 19 farmers have already signed up. Instead of a one-size fits all scheme this will allow farmers and land owners to develop their own environmental projects tailored to the land which they own and with particular reference to the nature of the wild life to be found on it. A scheme will then be developed in consultation with the farmers and the Park's farming advisory officers and payments will be made on the basis of the results actually achieved over the initial two year period. It is therefore much less a tick box exercise and instead an acknowledgement of what is actually happening on the ground and the direct effect that it is having on the





environment. Such "results based schemes" are already becoming widespread in Europe and in Ireland and are proving very popular with farmers as they feel that they thereby have much more control over their own destiny and the impact on their land. If the results of the pilot project prove successful in Wensleydale then there is every prospect of a similar scheme being rolled out across the whole of the country. As always however the final decisions will be Defra's which effectively means that anything could happen! In the meantime I am currently chairing a series of meetings at the National Park bringing together the farming members of the Authority with officers

of the Land Management team to help plan and co-ordinate the way forward. This team recently gave a presentation to other members of the Authority and it was received with a great deal of interest.



projects submitted by individuals, businesses, community groups or voluntary-sector bodies that contribute in some way to looking after the National Park's natural beauty, wildlife or cultural heritage.

Alternatively, they should promote opportunities for the public to understand and enjoy those things. At the same time, all projects should provide some local economic or community benefit.

Since April 1 the SDF has made grant offers to 13 worthy projects including:

 More than £31,000 for three B4RN community broadband schemes covering Dentdale & Garsdale, Chapel le Dale and

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Casterton

- £552.75 towards the staging of two music concerts to celebrate the 40th Anniversary of Dentdale Choir. Archive material will also be created and made available via Dent Heritage Centre.
- £16,000 to the Killington and District Sustainable Energy Trust towards the cost of installing a fish pass and interpretation board at Broad Raine for the Killington hydro project.

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Cash available for Dales initiatives Clapham-based charity Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust (YDMT) is offering grants for a range of projects across the Yorkshire Dales.

Through the Roger Stott Community Grants programme, grants of between £250 and £1500 are available to support small voluntary organisations and community groups in and around the Yorkshire Dales wishing to continue or expand their activities to benefit local people.

Thanks to support from players of People's Postcode Lottery, this funding can be used to cover revenue expenses, such as staff costs, rent or training, or for capital investment in assets such as furniture, computers or catering equipment, to name just a few.

Recent successful applications have ranged from a new dishwasher for

Sedbergh Village Hall.

There are also three kinds of grants available for projects in the Ingleborough area: Heritage Grants of £200 - £5,000 are for communityled projects that restore, celebrate or increase understanding of the area's natural or historical features; Dry Stone Walling Grants of up to £10,000 are available for landowners and tenants who want to restore dry stone walls; and Woodland Grants of all sizes are available for landowners who want to restore native broadleaf woodlands.

These Ingleborough grants are part of Stories in Stone, a four-year programme of community and heritage projects developed by the Ingleborough Dales Landscape



Partnership, which is led by YDMT, and mainly funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund thanks to National Lottery players.

Chris Lodge, YDMT's Stories in Stone Project Officer, said: "The grants provide great opportunities for residents to help protect the rich historical and natural heritage of the Ingleborough area. If you have an idea for a local heritage project, or want an important dry stone wall to be rebuilt or a new woodland to be planted I'd be delighted to hear from you and I can help you to develop your grant application."

Roger Stott Community Grants Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust set up the Roger Stott Community Grants programme in March 2016 to distribute £25,000 in funding to community groups who are making a difference to the lives of local people. The programme is named after our founding Chairman who sadly passed away in 2015. Roger Stott was instrumental in establishing the firm



foundations of the Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust in 1996 and dedicated much of his life to the area.

The programme is open to voluntary organisations and community groups with an annual income of less than £30,000

Projects must be in or near the Yorkshire Dales National Park – including within the boundary extension.

Grants of between £250 and £1500 are available for a wide range of uses - revenue expenses, such as staff costs, rent or training, or for capital investment in assets such as furniture, computers or catering equipment to name a few.

There is no match-funding requirement, meaning that groups





can apply for up to 100% of the total project cost.

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Work starts on flood-hit bridge Work has started to replace a bridge in the Yorkshire Dales National Park that was demolished during flooding in early December last year.

The bridge at Birks Mill outside Sedbergh – which had a span of 108 feet – bore the full force of Storm Desmond and its disappearance has disrupted some local walking routes.

The new version is being supplied by Cumbria County Council and will be assembled by Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority Rangers.

The work is likely to last two to three weeks, depending on the weather, and it should be open for business by the end of November, according to Authority Area Ranger Paul Wilkinson. "The bridge was important for a number of circular walks around the town, and the Dales Way passes the western end of it," he said.

"Its disappearance means that people wanting to cross the River Rawthey between Birks and Catholes are forced to take a detour via Millthrop.

"The Authority has been working with a number of partners to plan the replacement and the work started at the weekend."

Financial support has come from the county council, the National Park Authority, Sedbergh Parish Council, Friends of the Lake District, HF Holidays (Pathways Fund), the Ramblers Association and the Dales Way Association.

Nick Cotton, the National Park Authority's Member Champion for Recreation Management, said: "The National Park has more than 2,600 kms of public rights of way, including almost 900 bridges, which means there is a lot of maintenance work involved to keep the network in tip top condition for all the walkers, cyclists

and horse riders who use

it. "We are always grateful for any help we can get – in terms of finance, materials or volunteer workers – from individuals, businesses or other partnership organisation to do the work. Without them it would be virtually impossible."

COUNCILLOR CORNER

As we approach the first anniversary of Storm Desmond in early December, more and more attention is being focused on how prepared we are for heavy rains this winter. One of the most obvious signs of this is how well the drains are working. Cumbria County Council, as the Highways authority, are very aware of the need to deal with the issue of surface water and there are a few schemes in place to address problems in and around Sedbergh.

The first of these is greater coordination with South Lakeland District Council who are responsible for street sweeping, especially the autumn leaf fall. There will be close liaison between both authorities to ensure that cleaning and rodding the drains (Cumbria Highways) dovetails with collection of leaves and debris (South Lakeland Streetclean). Negotiations are in hand with the Environment Agency to allow a degree of flexibility about the temporary storage of leaves collected by the leaf sweeper so they can be bulked up and taken away by a larger vehicle at a later stage, leaving the leaf sweeper to do its specific job for the maximum amount of time and not waste time transporting the leaves to a distant dumping area.

Clearly there will be times in the heaviest period of leaf fall, during a storm in November for example, when the roads could be swept clean in the morning and be full of leaves



again by the end of the day, so success must be judged over a longer period than a single day. It is this element of managing surface water where we as residents can do most to help - a boot scraped across a grating covered with leaves is often all that is needed in autumn to allow water to drain away or better still pick up the leaves with gloves and throw them into the verge, so they do not just get washed back on top of the grating or down the road to block the next gully.

Finally, each parish is being given a map marked-up with gullies that Cumbria Highways has on its system, asking for any that are missing or the location of soakaways by the roadside that may only be known to

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local residents. I sometimes wonder if a metal detector might also reveal a few hidden gratings, covered over by verges growing out into the road. Although you get quite an eye for where you think a gully should be in lane verges, at times if they have been covered for a long while they take a lot of finding. If you would like to help with this work please contact a Parish Councillor or the Parish Clerk.

COUNCILLORS CORNER


The Boundary Commission has been busy this month as far as our area is concerned. Firstly there were the proposed parliamentary boundaries for the 600 member House of Commons. There has been a strong but hardly reported learning of lessons on this one with minor changes to the rules upon which they have operated. The result has been



a report which has been infinitely less controversial than the last one. The change to five constituencies should work well for Cumbria. The new Westmorland and Lonsdale will be all the Cumbria part of Lonsdale, all of Westmorland and us, the three West Riding parishes. This is much more satisfactory than the West Coast and Windermere seat suggested last time.

Then, a couple of days ago they released their final version of the new wards for South Lakeland. There are to be fifteen three member wards and three two member ones. Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale will remain unaltered. The change from the draft concerns fitting the wards around the major lakes, Windermere and Coniston. I think again the Commission is to be commended for making the best of an awful choice. Because the controlling group forced through the retention of election by thirds everything else followed. We have now had eight years of the three member Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale ward and experience has shown it to be an unhappy marriage. Sadly we will be stuck with it for several more years or at least until there is a change of control on the district. Three member wards are large wards and large wards dilute the local knowledge which should be at the very heart of local government.

This lack of localness has long been a concern to me and lies at the heart of my unease about a Unitary Cumbria. How can a decision be taken fairly by the elected members on a particular local issue if there is no-one in the room who has an intimate knowledge of the location and the sensibilities involved. This



creates a vacuum of decision making which officers are often more than willing to exploit. We have seen it in Highways for many years and it has long been a danger in county planning matters.

These minutiae of local politics might seem tedious, irrelevant or even offensive to those who are not personally involved. But. Politics are a good thing and they do matter. We are now approaching that most solemn part of the year when we remember those who died because of what happens when politics goes wrong. We have the choice as to whether we get involved, a choice I first made when I was 16. They had no choice.

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

The saga of the failure of the Rural Payments Agency sadly carries on. By the time you read this the deadline for completing payments to farmers for 2015 will have passed and I am fairly certain that quite a few will still not have been paid. This is over 9 months later than they should have been paid, which is bad enough, but also the EU, who fund these payments, say that when this deadline is passed they will not



provide the money for any further payments, meaning the Government has to find the money from our taxes. So even if you don't have any farmers in your family this failure by the Government is affecting you. We are particularly badly hit in this part of the world as early on the Agency took the decision to delay payments made to farmers with animals on "common land" (the fells that we see around us) as these were felt to be more complicated to sort out. This situation really is not acceptable and I have yet again asked Andrea Leadsom, the Minister in charge of farming issues, to sort it out. Let's hope she gets on with it this time.

I have heard of several occasions where a woman in labour has got to the hospital and been told to wait for the midwife to turn up. Unsurprisingly we have seen a decline in the number of women giving birth at the hospital over this period and I am really worried that if the changes

Defibrillator at Number 72 In the UK, approximately 20 per cent of cardiac arrests occur in a public place and the proportion of those that may recover is increased if they receive resuscitation from bystanders. Lives can be saved by immediate treatment and by the use of a defibrillator which delivers a highenergy electrical shock.

There is a new defibrillator in position outside number 72 Main Street in Sedbergh. An application was submitted on behalf of the Community First Responders for a Roger Stott Community Grant and was awarded £1.500 towards the cost. It is housed in a secure,

temperature-controlled cabinet fixed to the wall. Both residents and visitors will be able to access this in an emergency and it is designed to be used easily by anyone even if they have no training, although some people have already shown a keen interest in knowing how to use this one and the one already at the Peoples Hall. A couple of Community First Responders are trained in teaching basic life support and will be showing these interested people how to help in a cardiac arrest situation and if you would like to be included please contact us by using the details on the leaflets readily seen in Sedbergh. We are very fortunate to have these potentially life-saving devices in the town.

The ambulance control will immediately dispatch an ambulance and contact a First Responder volunteer who is on call. The operator will give you clear instructions on the phone so you will know what to do until the ambulance and First Responder arrives. If anyone needs any further information, please contact us and we will be very glad to help in any way we can. You may be the one who is there to help save a life.

NOVEMBER GARDENING

One of the most cheerful sites in the autumn garden must be the winter flowering Jasmine - Jasminum *nudiflorum*. Mine is planted beside the east facing wall of the house beside the back door, and its first blooms appeared in late September,

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beginning to look tired and back-endish. It, and the white- veined leaves of *Arum italicum* 'Marmoratum' begin their growing season and add a lovely freshness to the garden.

Every year I am struck by the vibrancy of the autumn colour displayed in some trees and shrubs, and this year is proving to be no exception. In my garden, *Stewartia pseudocamelia* always produces an autumn riot of glowing red and orange. This useful small tree bears single white Camellia-like flowers in June and July, and also has interesting cinnamon brown, flaking bark. It likes to grow in light shade in a moisture retentive, acid soil.

Hydrangeas are not usually

cultivated for their autumn tints, but Hydrangea quercifolia – the Oak leaved Hydrangea, a white flowered species, usually turns red before leaf fall. Two other acid soil loving shrubs, Hamamelis mollis 'Pallida' and Fotherailla monticola turn vellow and orange. The former is the attractive, winter blooming Witch Hazel with fragrant flowers whose yellow petals were once described to me by a 7 year old girl as "being just like grated cheese on sticks", (though the perfume is much more attractive). It makes a broad, spreading shrub perhaps 2m wide and 1.5m high in 10 – 15 years. Fothergilla monticola is smaller and has spikes of creamy white flower with long stamens, born

B4RN

Remember, remember, the 23rd of November! That's when the Dentdale

and Garsdale community team working with B4RN is planning to hold a public meeting in the Memorial Hall, Dent, to demonstrate how hyperfast fibre broadband works and what it can do for you. Look out for confirmation and details nearer the time. We'll be telling you what's been achieved so far, and what's going to happen next. Don't miss it.

So where are we up to now in the big community effort to bring state of the art hyperfast broadband to every home and business that wants it in Dentdale and Garsdale? Well, we've dug our way over Barbondale – along the verges, through the fields, under streams, through the culverts – and laid the ducting that will carry the fibre. The first length of fibre was 'blown' through from Gawthrop to Dent primary school in mid-October, and by the time you read this our techie teams will be completing the fibre connection from Barbon and connecting homes in Gawthrop



hamlet to the newly-installed 'cabinet' in Dent. To start with, a switch for 92 connections will have been installed by the end of October, with another 500 to follow.

The next step is to start building the network that will bring connections to homes in Cowgill, Deepdale, and then Garsdale – the places where old -style copper wiring struggles to produce broadband speeds of 2Mbps, compared with fibres' top speed of 1000Mbps! Once again, we thank the farmers and land-owners who have given us free wayleave agreements to allow us to proceed. They know that modern hyperfast broadband is vital to a successful farming future, and they are not going to be left behind.



SEDBERGH TRANSPORT

Re "*Transport Problems*" *in the September Lookaround.*

I believe that the Western Dales Bus (WDB) provides us with a much better service on a Saturday than we have with the commercial services during the week, with four return trips to Kendal and Dent, and two connections with the trains at Dent Station. There are also services to Hawes and Kirkby Stephen during the week.

I understand that the seating capacity is as it is because this enables the drivers to drive the bus using their normal car driving licences, complemented by specialist training courses and the attainment of a certificate of competence. Any increase in capacity would mean they would have to have a PS V licence. As the drivers (and everyone else working for the WDB) are all volunteers, this would mean extra training and expense, when they are already giving up their valuable free time for the sake of the community.

Additionally, the very narrow and bendy roads between Dent and Dent station would be much more difficult for a larger vehicle to negotiate. I feel the WDB does provide a good

service for the communities of Sedbergh and Dent, as well as visitors to our area. Without the commitment of all the volunteers, we would have no service at all on Saturdays to Kendal, nor the opportunity to visit Hawes or Kirkby Stephen by bus. To therefore say that the bus is unsuitable and to imply that the WDB does not provide a service is not only hurtful, but misguided as well. Mary Maples Ed Comment. SEDBERGH WI

Anne-Marie Quinn from the Lakeland Arts Trust came to speak to us on 12th October about her work, which turned out to be much more varied than I, for one, had expected. When she was appointed to the Trust in 2012 as Learning and Engagement Officer, her brief was to encourage people who would not normally go to art galleries to visit the four properties managed by the Trust, namely, Abbot Hall and the Museum of Lakeland Life in Kendal; Blackwell, the Arts and Crafts house near Windermere (which several of us know and love!); and the Windermere Steamboat Museum, currently undergoing a transformation.

Many of us will recognise the worries parents might feel about taking young children into a gallery or stately home (though nowadays many of these are actively encouraging children) but Anne-Marie has organised groups of parents with young children to introduce them to



these places and find things of interest there, bringing family members closer together through shared activities. She showed us some photos of these happy occasions. Similarly, she has arranged activities with youth groups and people with mental health issues. The main focus of her talk and slide show on this occasion, however, was her work with people living with dementia, to give them creative and cultural enrichment.

Inspired by Anne-Marie's visit to the Museum of Modern Art (MOMA) in New York and their outreach to people living with dementia, entitled 'Meet me at MOMA', which has an interactive museum gallery programme for people with dementia



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and their families and dementia caregivers, Lakeland Arts have set up the "Enriched by Moments" programme. Working with the Kendal Dementia Action Alliance (of which Anne-Marie is Secretary), groups of people with dementia are selected to meet at the Museum for a few hours a month on Tuesdays or Fridays and are encouraged to look at particular works of art and express their feelings about them. They also have practical sessions and occasional visits out. Anne-Marie records their comments and takes photos which can be shared by the group later, thus 'stretching out' the fleeting 'Moments' enjoyed by the group when they are together, enriching them further. Anne -Marie read out to us some of the perceptive comments they made. The advantage is that the group can interact in a situation that doesn't rely on memory, and they can express emotions openly. "Live well for longer!" is the aim. Anne-Marie described this interaction with a work of art as 'a brain-gym': people with dementia can still feel and express emotion so it's good for their language skills too. It's obvious from

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comments made by the participants that the classes can have a transformative effect. As one member of the Friday group said: "It's not just here on a Friday: it's how that changes every day!" Anne-Marie's talk gave us much food for thought. She also told us that poetry is a good basis for encouraging people with dementia to talk about their feelings, and some of our own members pointed out the benefits of group singing, experienced here in Sedbergh at the Gladstone House singing group. Sandra Gold-Wood thanked Anne-Marie on behalf of us all for a very interesting talk.

Meeting at Moira's house the next day, the remnants of the book club -

only three of us since five were on holiday and one was babysitting! switched their attention from Cumbria to Kolkata (Calcutta). "The Lowland" by Jumpha Lahiri begins in that city in the 1960s and 1970s. A very traditional Bengali Muslim family in which the parents had expected to arrange their sons' marriages is torn apart when one son becomes involved with Indian-Maoist revolutionaries, known as the Naxalite movement, which is still active today. The author, herself the daughter of Bengali parents who moved to the United States when she was a child, was inspired to write this book based on a news item she read from Bengal. The action of the novel



switches between Bengal and the US and has plenty of drama and family intrigue! I'll say no more than that to avoid giving away the plot, because we did enjoy the book and it scored about 7.5 on our scale, taking into account scores given by some absent members.

Sandra Kemp was due to lead the walking group on October 20th, on a walk she had originally planned earlier this summer but nobody else was available at that time.

Our next meeting, the Annual General Meeting, will take place on November 9th, and will be followed by a Jacob's Join and probably a Quiz. We look forward to seeing all our members there, back from foreign

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BIKING IN EUROPE

I turned into Pinfold Caravan Park to be met by some wet and bedraggled bunting which simply said 'Welcome Back Stuart', it hung from the site gate sadly limp and sodden, I knew just how it felt!

A hundred and three days earlier I had ridden my Kawasaki 800 through the same gate in the opposite direction heading for a road trip around Europe. I had previously toured France and Ireland with friends but only for two weeks at a time. I'd always liked the idea of touring alone so I could take my time, stop where and when I wanted and not be tied to an itinerary; probably watching films like 'Easy Rider' had

something to do with it too! So the idea for my journey was born; travel into Europe and let the trip develop itself. In my head were five places that I wanted to visit, other than that the trip had no plan, a jigsaw puzzle where all the corner pieces were decidedly missing. It's said by the armed forces that 'a plan lasts for approximately five minutes after first contact with the enemy', as it transpired there was no truer statement. Arriving in France at the beginning of a fuel strike does tend to undo any semblance of a travel plan which relies on regular petrol stops.

Five days later I was finally able to fuel up and head south through Belgium and eastern France to the

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Mediterranean eventually turning west along the French Riviera into Spain. Crossing Spain from east to west via Portugal, then back along the northern Spanish coast until I found myself in France once more and travelling north on the Atlantic coast. Riding inland to central France, then north west to Brittany, south once more to Limoge, north east to Calais, then Belgium once again, Holland, south through Germany and into Luxembourg and north back to Calais, a ferry to Dover, a very wet and busy M25 to High Wycombe and finally home.

Without Satnav and relying on an old road atlas I was often lost and on one occasion nearly ran out of fuel in a huge deserted forest on the Spanish/Portugese border. When I stopped for a rest it was so quiet that 'Duelling Banjos' immediately sprang to mind! It also became incredibly hot as I rode south so heat exhaustion was a very real concern and pulling a trailer with a motorcycle on roads which were full of potholes can be entertaining to say the least. However despite all of this, the places I visited more than made up for any coping with a difficult diagnosis irritable bowel syndrome menopausal symptoms morning sickness help in dealing with chronic pain (needs a GP referral) helping with grief tinnitus (a condition in which I have a special interest) mild skin problems eating healthily improving sleep replacing unhelpful habits

inconvenience or discomfort encountered while riding and the people I met along the way were incredible.

I've been asked what I will remember most about the trip and apart from beginning to talk to the bike, it is without question the people. Like the campsite owner in Le Pay who immediately gave me a cold beer when I arrived at his site soaked with sweat, or the couple who provided coffee and biscuits while I repaired my tent in Albert. The husband and wife in Avignon who came over to chat when they saw I was alone or a biker called Sam in Bussiere Poitvine talking with me till 2am in the morning and watching the sky for meteorites.





An artist called Kord who liked my sketchbook, in Bruges I met two brothers from New York and shared a drink with them and a young couple in Gray who were travelling round in a donkey drawn caravan and offered to share their meal with me. And 'Sausage Syd' a black and white cat who shared my tea with me when I was camping in Bressuire; he left as soon as the sausages ran out!! Ted Simon in 'Jupiters Travels' ended up in the Far East and when you read about his adventures travelling the world it's the people he met who provided the memory factor so with hindsight its come as no real surprise that my little expedition has also given me so many excellent experiences to remember and think about. Mind you, taking 3,700 pictures, producing a sketchbook, a journal, ninety odd Facebook posts and painting the trailer with my various stopping points also goes some way to jogging my memory!!

So on that wet Saturday has I turned the corner and saw Sedbergh for the first time in three and a half months it felt somehow quite fitting to arrive in pouring rain and soaked to the skin. Stopping briefly at the top of the hill to take in the view, I remembered a couple of lines I had once read, "That you can travel the world looking for something and return home to find it". I patted the petrol tank and

congratulated Blodwyn (the bike) for not missing a beat in 7200 miles, then letting the clutch out and pulling off for the final time we rode the last couple of miles through town, over the last bridge and home. P.S. Thank you to Ruth for encouraging me to do the trip, flying out to visit me twice, supporting me throughout the whole thing and for hanging the bedraggled bunting for my welcome home.




SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

Now that all our swifts are back in Africa, it is time to reflect and plan for their return next year. One most enjoyable activity is meeting with other enthusiasts to compare notes, what is happening in other areas, and to receive and offer advice.

Sedbergh Community Swifts plays an active part in the national swift scene. In 2015 we helped set up the Swift Local Network (SLN), a forum that helps and supports enthusiasts and swift groups around the country. We had the inaugural SLN meeting at Leighton Moss last year, and in November this year we'll be meeting again in Bristol. the swift conservation website www.swift-conservation.org.uk and at Action for Swifts (AfS) www.actionforswifts.blogspot.co.uk Both these websites have masses of information about swifts, and AfS has lots of extremely practical information. Our St Andrew's church tower project is featured in the 'churches' section. Last year Swift-Conservation, AfS and SLN had a stand for the first time at the annual Rutland Bird Fair. This is the most important event in the birding world that takes place over 3 days towards the end of August. It is a massive international event with not only bird and conservation organisations from all

We are listed as the local contact on over the world but with well over a





thousand other exhibitors, in 8 enormous marquees, ranging from optics, travel and art and with another three marquees for lectures.

We helped man the stand last year and it was so successful that we repeated it this year too. What made it very exciting was a visit from naturalist Chris Packham. The picture shows him with some of us at our stand: Edward Mayer of swiftconservation is 3rd from left and Dick Newell of AfS is 4th from right, next to Chris Packham. We are the two on



the left wearing our special swift-adorned outfits, what else! It was also very gratifying that we were awarded 2nd place for the best stand, in the conservation category.

Not bad for an entirely voluntary organisation.

While our swifts are in Africa is the ideal time to make plans for their return at the beginning of May next year. We urge anyone who is planning building work before then to put up boxes, especially if you are using scaffolding. And mention this to friends and neighbours too. Even better, consider installing nest bricks into the wall as swifts seem to prefer these. The latter are especially appropriate if you are doing roof repairs, new builds or extensions. There are many examples of boxes and bricks installed around Sedbergh, which we would be happy to show you.

Most importantly, if you are one of the lucky people to have swifts nesting in your property but need to plan for some exterior work, please try and avoid the breeding season of May – August. It's vital not to disturb the nest entrance holes, and we can advise how this can be managed quite easily. We would be delighted to help in any way we can.

COMMUNITY ORCHARD GROUP



The community orchard is pleased to announce that two Scotch Bridget apples were picked from a tree that was only planted in March. Is this a sign of great things to come?

The Group has enjoyed a full programme of events over the last month. Firstly we were delighted to welcome Year 5 from Sedbergh Primary School for an afternoon at the Orchard. During their time with us they were shown various bugs, beetles and bees and the importance they play in pollination and plant life cycle. This was demonstrated by

Steve Smith who led a discussion with Year 5 pupils about the insects that would be helpful in an orchard. Bees would assist with pollination, and lacewings and ladybirds would eat greenfly. With luck, these helpful insects will come to live in the Bug Hotel.

The children were also taken around the orchard where the different types of trees were shown and explanations given about taste, what they could be used for and whether they will be good producers. From cookers to dessert to juice to cider. Some like George Cave are best eaten from the tree, while ones like Scotch Bridget will keep until March

Then it was time to get their hands on all the bits and pieces to make

Three children won prizes for the most inventive Bug Hotel designs, these designs were combined and followed as closely as possible. So feathers, pine cones, sheep wool, bamboo, string, acorns and many other things were stuffed, tied or stuck to make a cosy home for the bugs in the Orchard. Well done Year 5, you did a great job!

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SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

The first talk in this winter's programme was given by John Zant of Oxford Archaeology North. His topic was the archaeology of the A66 from Greta Bridge to Scotch Corner. In 2006/7 most of that section of the A66 was converted to dual carriageway. Under existing law the contractors had to finance an archaeological survey of the proposed route to record any sites of interest. John's talk described what that work involved and what was discovered.

Firstly research was done to read all the documentary evidence available on sites along the route and also aerial photographs were studied. This identified known sites to be investigated but left much to be discovered. The distance involved meant that it would be impossible to dig the whole length and so trial slit trenches were employed. When a site was identified the top soil was stripped off exposing the boulder clay underneath. Marks in this disclosed the outlines of enclosures, round houses and structures supported on four wooden posts. The purpose of the latter could have been to store grain away from rats or to lie out the bodies of the dead to allow their flesh to be eaten by birds. The soil removed was searched for pottery and associated seeds were later investigated to discover the environmental conditions existing at that time. Very little was found from the Bronze Age but there was an expansion of dwellings from c400 BC, the Middle Iron Age.

At one point the road was crossed by Scots Dyke an earthwork thought to stretch from the Swale at Richmond to the Tees although there is little evidence for it near the Tees. It was assumed to be a Dark Age boundary between two territories dating from the 6thand 7th century AD. However, when a small section crossing the A66 was dug it was proved to date from 900 to 100BC in the Iron Age. It probably was connected with Stanwick the site of the capital of the Brigantes tribe. This was a large area surrounded by defensive ditches which had seen a big rise in population in the 1st century AD, the period of the Roman invasion of Britain.

A small trench was also dug at Carkin Moor Roman fort which provided some 2nd century AD pottery but no trace of the Roman road was found. In the course of the whole A66 survey items that were discovered included Samian ware pottery, and from more recent times a silver spoon, some walls and boundaries, a culvert bridge and a water trough. The relative lack of finds probably reflected the lack of habitation due to the poor quality of the land and the



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effects of ploughing where the soil was under two feet deep on top of the boulder clay. The speaker answered several questions and was thanked for his talk which gave an insight into the rescue archaeology carried out on large engineering schemes.

damp in my flat, but I'm worried that if I complain my landlord will evict me. What should I do?"

Landlords used to be allowed to evict tenants without a reason, but for tenancies starting on or after 1 October 2015 it is illegal to evict tenants for reporting a problem, provided they use the right procedure.

Write to your landlord explaining what is wrong. If they don't respond within 14 days, or they issue an eviction notice, contact the Council, who will inspect the property. If the Council confirm that there is a health and safety issue, any eviction notice is invalid. They will also ensure that the landlord fixes the problem.

If your tenancy began earlier, don't despair – contact your local Citizens Advice for advice on the action to take.

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


