The petition relating to parking raised concerns over safety/limited availability for residents etc. and District ClIr Mel Mackie advised he would like to take this issue forward and would liaise directly with ClIr Kevin Lancaster. In addition, Primary School Head teacher, Mr Matthew Towe/South Lakeland District Council/South Lakes Housing and CCC have all been made aware of the issues. The petition raised by | Donna Cowin (signed by some 170+) in regard to the current poor state of repair of the park was also discussed. It was noted that, along with Donna Cowin, the Clerk had been in touch with Cllr Nick Cotton and Mrs Deborah Clarke, Principal Community Spaces Officer and a meeting is planned (along with representation from the Community) to discuss a potential refurbishment. The District Council will support such a project but this will require fund raising. <u>COMMUNITY RESILIENCE PLAN</u> Consultation will now commence on a drafted Community Resilience Plan. Members to Sedbergh & District Chamber of Trade for their annual Late Night Opening event in Sedbergh on Wednesday 7th December 2016 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

A further request for free parking on December Saturdays was made by Prof Andy Cobb and Mrs Jacky Baines on behalf of the Sedbergh & District Chamber of Trade and town businesses. Members were advised that the Chamber was prepared to reimburse the Council for the estimated loss of income if free parking was allowed. However, following lengthy discussion it was proposed that Chamber representatives could pay individual fees directly to the ticket machines whilst engaging in a survey of visitors on the Saturdays in December. Members were happy to agree to this proposal.

Garth Steadman also attended to highlight his concern, along with others, over the again vacant property on Main Street (formally known as Udales Butchers) and requested that Sedbergh Parish Council contact SLDC with a view to establishing the current situation with the empty building.

OTHER MATTERS:

The Policy & Resource Committee will now meet monthly on the Monday evening of the Parish Council meeting week (previously Tuesday morning). Further noted was the planning application for repair works



at Millthrop Bridge; a scheme by Cumbria Constabulary to seek volunteers' assistance in surveillance operations to help target rural crime (details to follow); ongoing repairs to benches and the Playground at Havera Park; remedial works to trees along the footpath at New Bridge (toward the weir) and proposals to improve the toilets at Main Street.

Please note that members of the public are invited to our monthly Meetings where, as always, they are able to comment or ask questions. **Public Participation is now at the beginning of the Agenda and should anyone wish to speak, they would be welcome to attend from 7.30pm.**

TIM FARRON MP

I think that we might be getting to the bottom of the cause of the delays in the payments to farmers by the Rural Payments Agency. At the Northern Farming Conference last month the Farming Minister, George Eustice, apparently told everyone that as far as he knew all the payments had now been made. Whereas I know



for a fact from the conversations that I have had with farmers around here that this is simply not true. In fact a source at the RPA has let it be known that there are hundreds of farmers are still waiting for their payment.

So either the Minister has no clue what is going on in his own department or he was deliberately lying to the Conference. Let's be charitable and assume that he simply doesn't know what is going on. That is frankly unacceptable, farming is vitally important to us all even if we aren't farmers ourselves. These are the people who produce our food. Isn't it obvious to this man that he needs to treat them with respect, we simply cannot afford for any more of them to leave the industry, particularly at a time when we are about to leave the EU and so lose the easy access to food from the countries over the Channel, Rest assured I will be keeping the pressure on him and making sure that he works a lot





Outside farming health remains the issue that is taking much of my time at the moment. I had the opportunity, during a debate on cancer referral times, to tell the new Health Minister about the long journey times anyone needing radiotherapy treatment faces around here. He agreed that 2 hours. which is what it can easily take for people in Sedbergh or Dent to get to Preston, was a very long journey for anyone to make and he is going to look into the need to progress the plans for a radiotherapy treatment unit in Kendal. I look forward to hearing what he has to say. I have also been looking into our

ambulance service. Some figures we have uncovered recently show that waiting times for many ambulance services in the North West have doubled over the past 5 years. This increase has not been for the most urgent calls which have stayed at about the same levels. However, many of the calls where you would see an ambulance flashing its blue lights and playing its siren are affected. As I said this has been across the whole of the North West but I am sure that it is if anything worse for us in rural South Cumbria. This is why I have written to both the Government and the North West Ambulance Service to demand that they provide us with an extra ambulance based in this area. We

cannot afford the risk of having to wait any longer to be taken to hospital.

Finally, I hope you have a great Christmas and wish you all the very best for 2017. My office closes on the 23rd December and will re-open on the 3rd January but if you leave a message over this period someone will pick it up and get back you. from David Lang who is on a contract with Cumbria County Council to help with the long backlog of repairs to bridges. It is great to hear a practical man who is clearly very knowledgeable about his subject. There is a fear which I sometimes share that the English model of local

government is incapable of handling these month to month structural issues – David Lang is proving this is not the case.

On a related issue I share the view of Dent parish council that dealing with the sand and grit banks which are building up in the Dee has been neglected for too long. It is the nature of the geology of the upper reaches of the Dee and Deepdale Beck that

this build-up occurs. Indeed I imagine the Dee is the primary source of grit in the Lune all the way down to Morecambe Bay. There is nothing new about this: when he was giving evidence in 1634 Philip Thistlethwaite cited the stone and sand which ran down the Dee as the cause of the leets and races belonging the mill at Barth Bridge being regularly destroyed and washed away.

It is also good to see Middleton Hall bridge being repaired. It turns out that it is not the ancient structure county council reports asserted, as they would have known if they had looked at their own early records. The present bridge was actually built



by Westmorland County Council in about 1890 to replace an earlier one destroyed by floods. This means the new repairs can concentrate upon crossing the beck rather than creating a facsimile of the earlier bridge.

I am also pleased that at Sedbergh parish we are making progress on our resilience planning. I have long been uneasy as to what such a plan could contain that would not be utterly useless when an emergency occurred. Because we have been thinking about the subject for a very long time the draft plan which we are now consulting on seems to me to be both helpful and realistic. It takes some getting your head around what emergency could occur and what help can be prepared.

Lets all hope this draft resilience plan doesn't have to be tried out before the next Look-around.

COUNCILLOR CORNER

I do not have a great deal of faith in long-term weather forecasts but I am





quite happy to accept explanations of past weather events and there is a convincing case for explaining last winter's storms by something called the Polar Vortex - the winds spinning in a circle around the North Pole. It seems that there was a strong Polar Vortex last winter, trapping all the cold air over the North Pole allowing warm, moisture-laden air to flow across the Atlantic in a series of storms, propelled by a vigorous jet stream. November and December last year were not only exceptionally wet but also exceptionally mild.

This year the Polar Vortex is much weaker, allowing cold air to escape from the confines of the North Pole and we have already experienced frosts and some snow on the fells. So it could well be that as we move from autumn into winter we should be just as worried about freezing temperatures as more flooding.

Cumbria County Council Highways are prepared for the cold with 24,000 tonnes of salt stockpiled and a 33strong fleet of gritters ready to roll. The council has a budget of £3.7million set aside to fund Highways winter maintenance and will be routinely treating around 1500 miles of roads.

The council is investing in an additional three new roadside weather stations in the west of the county this year, to further enhance weather assessments and decisionmaking on when to treat the network. Sat-nav technology is being trialled in some gritters, providing the service with increased resilience, flexibility and safety.

The council's gritting service operates night and day to ensure drivers and other road users can stay on the move throughout winter. Priority 1 routes, which include many main roads across the county, are treated in less than three hours during freezing conditions. Priority 2 routes, which include A, B and C roads, will be treated in five hours.

The council is continuing to recruit volunteer snow champions who help keep agreed lengths of footways clear of snow in local communities. Anyone interested in becoming a snow champion can call the Highways Hotline on 0300 303 2992.

LETTER FROM THE SURGERY

For the last six years I have worked one day a week as Cancer Lead GP for South Lakes Locality and more recently have taken on roles with Macmillan and Cancer Research as a Strategic Lead GP, working on ways to improve earlier diagnosis of cancer and the care of people living with and beyond cancer. I am not an expert, but my extended role has given me some understanding of the challenges and problems we are experiencing and some of the ways we can combat them. We thought it may be useful to highlight some of the issues around early diagnosis and so I am putting together a short series of articles for the Lookaround starting this month with the key signs

and symptoms of cancer. *Key signs and symptoms of cancer* Anyone can develop cancer, but it's more common as we get older – most cases are in people aged 50 or over

- Don't just put something new or different about your body down to things like getting older. If you notice any unusual or persistent changes, go and see your doctor
- The symptoms below are more likely to be caused by something far less serious than cancer, but they could be a sign of the disease
- Spotting cancer early means treatment is more likely to be successful
- It is important to know your body and to tell your doctor if you

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notice a change which isn't normal for you.

This list taken (from the Cancer Research Website) in no special order, highlights some of the key symptoms to be aware of. But if you spot something that isn't normal for you, get it checked out.

Breathlessness

It's not unusual to feel out of breath every now and then. But if you notice that you're feeling breathless more than usual or for a lot of the time, tell your doctor.

Persistent cough

Coughs are common with colds. But if a cough continues for more than 3 weeks or gets worse, make sure you tell your doctor.


Coughing up blood

If you've coughed up blood, no matter how much or what colour, it's important to tell your doctor. It may be nothing to worry about, but it's important to get it checked out. Croaky voice or hoarseness

Having a croaky voice or feeling hoarse can be common with colds. But a croaky voice that hasn't gone away on its own after a few weeks should be checked out by your doctor.

Mouth or tongue ulcer that won't heal

It's common to get ulcers in the mouth when you're a bit run down. The lining of the mouth renews itself every 2 weeks or so, which is why ulcers usually heal within this time. But an ulcer that doesn't heal after 3



weeks should be reported to your doctor or dentist.

Difficulty swallowing

A number of medical conditions can make it difficult to swallow. But if you are having difficulty swallowing and the problem doesn't go away after a couple of weeks, it should be checked out.

Persistent heartburn or indigestion

It is normal to feel slight discomfort or pain sometimes after eating a large, fatty or spicy meal. But if you are experiencing heartburn or indigestion a lot, or if it is particularly painful, then you should see your doctor.

Persistent bloating

It's quite common for women to experience bloating of the abdomen

that comes and goes. But if you feel bloated, most days, for 3 weeks or more, make an appointment to see your doctor.

Looser/more frequent stools

Loose, frequent bowel motions are usually caused by stomach bugs or food poisoning, but if you have noticed a change to looser poo or pooing more often that has lasted 4-6 weeks or more, then it's important to tell your doctor.

Blood in your stools

The most common cause of blood in your poo (stools) is piles (haemorrhoids). But blood in your poo can sometimes be a sign of cancer. Your doctor wants to know if you spot blood when you go to the toilet. **Problems passing urine**

Problems peeing (urinating) can include needing to pee urgently, more frequently, being unable to go when you need to, or experiencing pain. These symptoms can all be caused by conditions other than cancer, but it's important to tell your doctor if you experience any of them.

Blood in your urine

Blood in your pee (urine) should always be reported to a doctor. Usually this is not caused by cancer and can be treated quickly and easily, but it could be a sign of cancer. Your doctor will be able to tell you what the cause is.

Unexplained vaginal bleeding

Bleeding or 'spotting' between periods is a fairly common side effect of the contraceptive pill. But bleeding from the vagina between periods, after sex or post-menopause should be checked out by your doctor.

Heavy night sweats

Sweating at night can be caused by infections or it can be a side effect of

certain medications. It's also often experienced by women around the time of the menopause. But very heavy, drenching night sweats can also be a sign of cancer and should be checked out by your doctor.

Unusual breast changes

Lumps are not the only breast changes that should be reported to a doctor. Also look out for any change in the size, shape or feel of a breast, a change to the skin texture, redness, pain in the breast, a nipple change or fluid leaking from the nipple in a woman who is not pregnant or breastfeeding. Make sure your doctor knows about any changes.

Unexplained weight loss Small weight changes over time are

quite normal, but if you lose a noticeable amount of weight without trying to, tell your doctor.

New mole or changes to a mole

Most moles remain harmless throughout our lives. But be aware of any new moles or existing moles that change in size, shape or colour, become crusty or bleed or ooze, and tell your doctor.

Sore that won't heal

The skin repairs itself very quickly and any damage usually heals within a week or so. When a spot, wart or sore doesn't heal after several weeks, even if it's painless, a doctor needs to check it.

Unexplained pain or ache

Pain is one way our bodies tell us that something is wrong. As we get

older, it's more common to experience aches and pains. But if you have unexplained, ongoing pain, or pain that comes and goes for more than 4 weeks, make an appointment to see your doctor.

Unusual lump or swelling anywhere

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

Our next meeting will be on the 13th December where we will hear about Christmas Crafts by Cynthia Fernhead followed by Carols and Mince Pies.





BEFORE ENDEAVOURS FADE High summer in the Sierra de Pandols is a furnace of dry air. Here the rising heat casts a mirage on the powdery blue while the song of the cicadas rises and falls in the sparse olive trees and twisted holly oaks. July in this part of Spain is a dusty brown streaked with a dull redness, like that of dried blood. The country, this sierra, is a mixture of small sharp hills and ragged valleys, bleak and bare. It is hot.

From a bluff overlooking the Ebro river as it crawls, brown and blind to the sea, a little to the north of the small town of Fayón the XV International Brigade, made up predominantly of British and German volunteers, on the night of 24th/25th of July 1938 set off to attack the Fascist forces of General Franco and his German and Italian allies.

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Twenty-one, or so, miles from this jump off point lay the pretty little town of Gandesa which was their principal objective.

At first the attack was a great success, but with the assistance of the Kondor Legion, their modern aircraft and artillery, the Fascists poured troops into the breach and the attack was halted, tragically close to the town's capture. British losses were horrific, but for four months, against overwhelming odds, these magnificent men fought and died while Europe looked away and conciliated Hitler.

In July 1998, I was privileged to attend the inauguration of a monument to the fallen of the

International Brigades on the Ebro. The heat was intense and as the river oozed sightlessly by the elderly veterans who had come from all over Europe listened stoically while the Catalan First Minister praised them and their sacrifice before unveiling the small, but touching memorial bearing this simple legend in several languages; "We will not forget them." Then, fists raised in salute, we all sang with pride the 'Internationale' in Spanish.

It is eighty years now since the first British volunteers left for Spain in October/November 1936. Clutching their weekend passports, they pulled out of Waterloo station on the first leg of their journey with the voice of a

police inspector ringing in their ears; "If you lot aren't back here on Monday morning you'll be in real trouble!" Lest we forget.

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OCTOBER WEATHER

Once again a reasonably dry month in which the rain gauge wasn't troubled on half the days finishing with a total of 1.58 inches (40.13mm). Likewise it was fairly mild with maximum temperatures in the 50sF on all but the 4 days when it actually reached 60+F with a high of 65.3F (18.5C). On the minimum side only 6 nights dropped below 40F (4.5C) with a low of 34.3F (1.5C). Even with the wind chill only 2 nights dropped below freezing. The direction of the wind was rather unusual in that for half the month it was not from the usual North West. We had winds from round the compass from North East right round to the North West. The maximum gust, of 21 mph, came from South West.

The mild weather has kept autumn at bay. The trees are generally still green with few leaves fallen. The bees are still active and bringing in

pollen. Goodness knows what it is as some of mine are bringing in pale vellow pollen but there doesn't



seem to anything around locally which may be supplying it. I have seen a skein of geese flying in from an easterly direction, a suggestion autumn is on its way perhaps. I took some of our Burnot apples down to the juicing session at the Apple Day. The resulting juice is very pleasant indeed. We have several litres in the freezer as our grandchildren are great apple juice fans. It was obviously a good day with more support than originally expected. A well organised system of crushing, straining and pouring dealt with the demand. Whilst I was filling bottles there was a continuous queue of folk bring their apples. Many under estimated how much juice they would get, me included, so I had to buy a gallon container that the organisers had sensibly bought in. I am still filling up the feeders for the birds on a regular basis. The young sparrow hawk has been around but not as regularly. No doubt she has found an easier spot to



get a meal. I was hoping to have solved the rat problem but there appears to have some more young born so its back to trapping and baiting.

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DENT, SEDBERGH AND DISTRICT ORAL HISTORY SOCIETY

"Christmas was a big occasion. Well it is for any kid, isn't it? With hindsight now we didn't get much, but you didn't know much, did you? We used to get an apple and an orange and mebbe some plasticine and a book, and I know one year I got the very smallest size Meccano set, well that was fantastic, fantastic!


"New Year's morning I used to go round letting t' New Year in, and get sixpences. Just go in and wish 'em a happy and prosperous New Year. Mrs Haygarth at Banks Farm used to give me two and sixpence which was a lot of money then. I was expected to go, you know, there were reminders before. Some of 'em you had to take a bit of coal in, and you would get a mincepie and some ginger beer, 'appen a bit of Christmas cake." **Dick Harrison**, born 1934

One reason why Dick was in demand as a 'first footer' was probably because he was dark haired. Tradition holds that the first person to arrive at a threshold on New Year's Eve will bring the household good luck through the following year. The person should be a male, preferably tall and dark, and carry a piece of coal as a symbolic gift. I'm told that first footing went on in Dent until relatively recently and no doubt it continues in some form here and there.

The custom has obvious similarities to the Scottish Hogmanay. The roots



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in November 1918 by Thomas Mawson, a local wealthy militarist who had lost a son at Ypres, and Herbert Storey, a wealthy Congregationalist and philanthropist who was involved in the Port Sunlight development in Cheshire. It was Mawson who attempted to coordinate a National movement from the many regional initiatives (to support the servicemen), especially since little governmental funding was forthcoming, though this quickly divided into Northern and Southern branches, with the former becoming based in Lancaster. On his committee were such worthy institutions as Rowntrees and Selfridges. Interestingly, the Southern branch disbanded after 4 years to re-form as The British Legion!

For its first phase of development Mawson gave 15 acres of his Westfield Estate (close by the railway station) for the building of 13 cottages ,8 of which were bungalows. In order to be a greater attraction for the raising of funds its title was changed from 'Industrial Settlement' to 'War Memorial Village' and advertised thus: "£500 builds a



cottage; £70 provides a cubicle". Actually built by the Storey family firm (and not by public subscription), Lancaster council then promptly decided to erect their own rival war memorial in the town centre (Pictured). Incidentally, these first cottages were hardly 'user friendly' for amputees with their large gardens, high privets, narrow doorways and steps, both inside and out!



With further funding problematical, Phase 2 only came to fruition as a result of a meeting in London of Herbert Storey and one Hilda Level, aka 'The Golden Lady'. It was she who instigated the forerunner of the National Lottery by conceiving the idea of the 'Golden Ticket' with the proceeds handed on to charity. In spite of her being arrested (for dubious illegal funding) she contested the case and won: and from 1922, 22 more properties were built (all 2storey) at Westfield, including 'Level Terrace'. By the completion of Phase 2 in 1924 the Village was officially opened by General Haig, again reinforcing the military ethos of the enterprise.

In 1926 Herbert Storey added a

symbolic focal point by way of the Memorial Circle, a sculpture by Jennifer Lahunt depicting a wounded officer being aided by an able-bodied private.

By the mid-1930's, with extra funding now coming from the Local Authority, Phase 3 saw the construction of a further 50 cottages. Then, following the intervention of World War 2, a Mr Porritt from Grange, whose own son had been killed in battle, became an additional benefactor as Phase 4 witnessed the building of a further 30 or so homes. By the 1980's Mrs Thatcher's policy of 'the right to buy' had an impact with 20 cottages being sold off to willing tenants who had been paying a peppercorn rent, and at present there





are a total of 113 properties of which 22 are privately owned and around 90 available for rent. Occupants have to be disabled ex-servicemen (or, increasingly, women), with dependants, who have seen at least 3 years' active service in the regular, reservist or support services.

In conclusion, Martin Purdy emphasised the continuing militarist ethos: committee secretaries have invariably been officer class; the latest development, Ley Court (2013), was brought into line with all the previous dwellings by being accorded titles of more recent conflicts such as 'Korea', 'Aden', 'Malaya' and 'Balkans'... which led to some lively debate among the residents!

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

'Making a Grand Entrance' by Andrew Lowe

Our speaker was making a welcome return reminding an appreciative audience that he enjoyed visiting Sedbergh so much that it is 25 years since he first spoke to the Society. He treated the audience to a

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mesmerising sequence of slides depicting different styles of dated doorways in Cumbria throughout the ages. That he was able to do this with such authority was as a result of his many years' experience as a buildings conservation officer for the Lake District National Park. This enabled him to look at properties without having to actually knock at the door.

The doorway of a building is its focal point; simple or grand it makes a statement, reflects status and is out to impress.

Viewing the rapid succession of pictures was a passage through time from the defensive doorways of castles to those of grand country

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SHOWROOM: 34a Main Street, Staveley, Nr Kendal residences, fine Georgian mansions, typical rural farmhouses and the grandeur of those belonging to mill managers and Victorian industrialists.

Examples from different periods were taken to illustrate the different styles of build and dating.

These included 14c Dacre Castle with a very ecclesiastical 16c door and Askham Pele Tower with its 1574 date stone doorway to a medieval courtyard which was



chipped higher to allow access for horse drawn coaches. Yewthwaite Hall has a date stone of 1581 depicting a pair of shields, one upside down. Typical doorways of 1550s farmhouses were designed to keep



the weather out. One such depicted an entry porch with a wall on one side to keep the wind and rain out but no wall on the other side in order to let the sun in. Early Georgian doors from 1780 had six panels and were of

understated simplicity. In the 1660s there was no tongue and groove joinery so the vertical joints were overlaid with strips of wood. Square pegs in round holes helped to seal the

structure. In 17c the date symbols as seen in Caldbeck sometimes included concentric rings to keep out evil spirits. Another was surmounted with a caption in medieval French which translated as 'Do as you ought and never mind the consequences' and another inscribed 'ANO DOM - God be with us, who can be against'. The archeological detail related to the local geology. Good sandstone and limestone could be dressed. Slate also featured in porches. Materials had to be transported by road or water. The coming of the railways revolutionised movement of goods as well as bringing money and influence. The arrival of the postal service in 1839 created its own problems for the owners of an ancient finely structured door, none of which had a letter box, of course.

The speaker was warmly thanked for such an excellent and authoritative presentation delivered with a sprinkling of humour. The audience left with a mind to be more observant of local doorways and to have a good look at their own!

The new Archimedes screw hydro turbine will not be taking up residence in Killington just yet!



Not very long ago the idea that Dentdale and Garsdale might one day soon make the giant leap from snail-pace broadband (around 1 or 2mb) to world-class hyperfast broadband (1000mb) could be dismissed with a scornful "Dream on!" But barely a year after our community project got started it is now a fact. November saw the completion of the fibre-optic link from Casterton, through the rocky terrain of Barbondale, to Gawthrop and on to Dent primary school. By mid-way through the month the first group of houses in Gawthrop had been connected and their lucky occupants were waving goodbye to yesterday's

copper-wire technology and its out of date, out of touch providers. And on November 17th the school went live too.

As we write, half way through November, we are preparing for our public meeting in Dent Memorial Hall on November 23rd. If you were there you will know that work has started to bring the connections up the dale, with ducting already laid under the tarmac on Church Bridge. With substantial funding in place by mid-January the next phase will see the line extended southwards towards the Sedbergh boundary, then up the north side of the Dee to Newby Head, then up the south side of the river to Deepdale and Cowgill, and finally



over the hill to Garsdale. It's likely to take another year or so to get the job done, but it will be done!

An increasing number of dales people run businesses from home, and hyperfast fibre broadband will transform their working lives. As Sally Proctor, manager at The Majik Company in Kirkby Lonsdale, writes: "British Telecom and Members of Parliament have stated that rural fibre was a mere fantasy; the idea was implausible and would simply not work. However, local initiatives are proving them wrong. The area now has some of the fastest broadband in the world, available through a community project, B4RN, with speeds up to 1000mb... This service

is now a necessity; the world of technological advancement is growing by the day. None of us want to see Cumbria being left in the technological dark ages. The future is coming much faster than we think."

If you do find a better offer, call or email the new supplier and ask to move to the tariff you've identified. They'll inform your old supplier and switch you over to their supply. This normally takes 17 days.

You should also look into improving your insulation. Your local Citizens Advice can advise you on this, and on whether you are eligible for financial assistance.

Slowing the Flow

Storm Desmond caused misery for many Cumbrians only twelve months ago. Much thought has been given since to how we can cope in the future with similar events. Global warming is bringing more extreme weather phenomena across the globe. Nobody doubts that there have been fluctuations of global temperatures in the past but these have been over millennia not decades. Can anything be done to reduce some of the effects?

Assistance through government and local authority agencies are very expensive exercises but some smaller settlements in the UK have taken it upon themselves to put practical common sense practices in place. Measures have to be taken to slow the flow after heavy storms before the floods hit built up areas and cause loss of livelihoods, homes and in some cases lives.

Few rivers still run in their natural courses. Look at a map of the Lune valley between Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale. The Parish boundaries follow wavy lines based on former positions of the river's flow. So much has changed over the years. Rivers have been straightened in some cases to help transport links or canalised to avoid divided fields and make it easier to use machinery. Drains have been put in to make the flow of water off the fields and into the rivers more efficient and woodland has been removed.

In Sedbergh, most flooding of the Rawthey spilled over into surrounding fields which made problems for livestock but once the water retreated there was relatively little lasting damage. There are no artificial levees built up on the river's banks which would have stopped the water



returning. Debris and vegetation lying in the various gills went some way to slowing the torrents and without these mostly natural obstructions there would have been an even greater concentration of flood

water pouring into our town.

Apart from checking and repairing ancient culverts and clearing drains of fallen leaves (as I write this I see huge accumulations of these efficient drain blockers already in place), we should try and implement various strategies to slow the flow. These have been recommended by a consortium of several official and other bodies and include the following:

- Plant more trees. Their roots slow groundwater which in turn is reduced by leaf evapotranspiration. Tree branches and leaves slow the rain as it falls reducing surface runoff. River banks are stabilised.
- Build "leaky" dams. Just a few branches and twigs can slow the river flow and reduce the volume that rushes down into built up

areas.

• Re wet upland peat moorland areas. Peatlands act as soggy sponges, holding water and storing carbon as well.


Millions of pounds have been spent building expensive flood control schemes in our towns but much of this could be saved if we paid more heed to river catchment areas. Dredging and straightening rivers just speeds the flow and causes greater problems downstream.

SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

While we are preparing for the festive season, spare a thought for our swifts now enjoying warmer weather in Africa and a feast of insects as they fly above the forests of the Congo.

'Our' swift, the Common Swift (*Apus apus* is its scientific name), is one of only four African swifts that migrate to



Europe to breed. The others are the Pallid Swift which breeds in southern Europe, the larger Alpine Swift found mainly in more mountainous regions of Europe, and the rare Whiterumped Swift in Southern Spain.

Altogether there are 22 species of African swift, the majority of which stay in Africa all year round. Our Common Swift is one of the 11 African swifts of the *Apus* classification(from the Greek meaning 'footless'- which is not strictly true as our swifts do have feet, but extremely short legs, which is why they cannot perch).

There are over 90 different species



of swifts in the world, and many of these migrate between continents. For example the Chimney Swift, widely distributed in eastern North America, migrates to the north-west of South

America. It gets its name from nesting in chimneys and airshafts. The Pacific Swift is common in the western Pacific, breeding in Asia and wintering in Australia.

The Common Swift has an enormous summer breeding range extending from Ireland in the west to China in the east, and north to Scandinavia. All Common Swifts, wherever they breed, migrate to various parts of Africa. Our UK swift's migration via Spain and West Africa seems pretty amazing, but this is dwarfed by that of the Common Swifts that breed in Beijing in China. They cross the snow-capped mountains and hot deserts of the vastnesses of Asia to reach their wintering grounds in Namibia in SW Africa.

Beijing has an active bird-watching society. To quote its president -"Swifts have a special place in our hearts and their screaming flights at dusk around many of our major landmarks are one of the most enchanting features of summer". A sentiment we heartily endorse.

When we next write in the February edition we will be looking forward to Spring, and the return of our swifts at the beginning of May. In the meantime it only remains to wish all our friends a Happy Christmas and prosperous New Year.

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

New home for lost treasure from the Roman M6

In its heyday – more than 1,900 years ago – it stood at the side of what was then a 'motorway' used to move soldiers between the Roman town of Carlisle (Luguvalium (correct)) and the Roman fort of Bremetennacum (correct) near the Lancashire village of Ribchester

Then it spent hundreds of years buried in a farmer's field at the side of the A683 south of Sedbergh – a rounded block of sandstone gradually being scarred time and time again by the blades of ploughs passing over it. Finally, in 1836, it was accidentally



dug up by the then landowner – a man called Moore – as he worked the field.

On closer examination he saw it carried an inscription – M.P. LIII – which he discovered stood for 'milia passuum 53', or '53 miles' and he realised he had uncovered a Roman milestone.

He decided it was important enough to see the light of day again and he had it re-sited at the top of a nearby hill over looking the Roman road. In the process, he hired the services of a historian to add a second inscription below the first –'SOLO ERVTVM RESTITVIT GVL MOORE AN MDCCCXXXVI' – which roughly translates as 'dug from the earth and

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75 MAIN STREET, SEDBERGH LAIO 5AB 015396 22123 or 07967 638503 patchandfettle.co.uk restored by Moore in 1836'. There the milestone stood – an ancient sentinel standing guard over the landscape - for another 180-odd years until the effects of weather and, finally, livestock took their toll and it fell over.

Playwright, screenwriter and actor Alan Bennett, who has a house nearby, was one of the people who alerted Cumbria County Council when it was knocked over.

Now the milestone, which was identified as a 'Scheduled Monument at Risk' by Historic England, has been moved to what will hopefully be its last resting place - the churchyard of the nearby Church of the Holy Ghost in Middleton. There it will be better protected and be more



accessible to members of the public.

The site of the milestone now lies within the extended area of the Yorkshire Dales National Park and the painstaking operation to lift it and then move it was co-ordinated by Historic England and the National Park Authority.

Senior Historic Environment Officer, said: "This is the first major piece of heritage work that the Authority has carried out in the new area of the National Park and it was a real challenge.

"The milestone is thought to have been built around 79AD and the 'M.P. LIII' inscription probably refers to the distance to Carlisle in Roman miles, which were each made up of 1,000 paces.

"It was a feature along what was a major trunk road that ran from Ribchester to Carlisle – a Roman version of the M6 – and some parts of the road survive under modern roads including the A683, while others are visible as an earthwork.



"The milestone is a curious piece of cultural heritage with an interesting story behind it – and it was hugely important that each step of its restoration was carefully thought out and planned with all the organisations involved."

Steve Hastie, the Authority's Area Manager West, said: "We met with Historic England, residents, landowners and the Lunesdale Archaeology Society and came up with a plan to move it with help from the farmer.

"There was a very real risk we could damage or even destroy it while it was being lifted and moved down a slope and across two fields or when it was being installed in the churchyard.

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On top of that it was pouring with rain, which didn't help matters at all.

"We dug out the hole for its new site by hand and then we packed stone and earth around the base to securely pin the post and fill it in.

"It was a tricky job, and not without its hairy moments, but it's the first of many we will be doing in this new part of the National Park.

"Now that it's in the churchyard, we hope more people will come to see it and it will be a great attraction for schools and archaeology groups."

Historic England Heritage at Risk Project Officer Sarah Howard said: "The milestone is significant because it is one of only around 50 surviving examples within Britain.

"As Middleton is in the Yorkshire Dales National Park extension area. this offered a fantastic opportunity to work with the National Park Authority to move the milestone, utilising their Rangers' experience of working in remote and often difficult environments.

"The next step will be to work with the local community and the Authority to create an interpretation board and exhibition in the church so that visitors can find out about Romans in

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the Lune Valley as well as the recent history of the Middleton moving milestone."

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The Rev Richard Snow, the Rector of the Church of the Holy Ghost, said: "It's brilliant to see it there in the churchvard.

"It had been knocked down by some cows, I think, and it was going round the community that we ought to put it back up again.

"It's part of the heritage of the community so it felt appropriate to suggest it might be better to move it into the churchyard. It's close to where it was originally and it's a little more protected.'

Did you see the huge bright green banner on St Andrews railings last month advertising Sedbergh's first Apple Day? Many people did, and they brought loads of wonderful apples to press outside the People's Hall.



We started pressing at 930am and by 10am, when the doors opened, we had many litres ready for people to taste - all at no cost. During the day 400 litres were pressed, 80kg of the gleaned apples gave the community 40 litres of juice to share and enjoy.

Our sincere thanks go to local residents and Sedbergh School who allowed us to glean apples from their trees to use at the Apple Day, not just to make delicious juice for everyone to sample, but also for children's games. Hopefully many of you would have seen two of our younger visitors with the apple scarecrows they had



made on the front page of the Westmorland Gazette the day after the event.

In total we gleaned 160kg of apples, lots of different varieties in all conditions were picked by volunteers, washed then dried to ensure plenty of activity on the day. Orchards from Cautley to Frostrow were picked, and plenty of trees in Sedbergh too.

In the People's Hall there were games for the children, wonderful music from Common Ground, yummy cakes to buy and lunchtime refreshments. You could even buy plants and apple trees for your garden! The information board showed the progress of the community orchard so far, and we were delighted to display our first Apple - not bad, when you know that the trees only went in the ground last March!

DECEMBER GARDENING

There is something extremely satisfying about having a good tidy up in the garden at the beginning of December. The fashion in gardening in the last 15 or 20 years has been to leave all the cutting back of herbaceous perennials until early spring – the idea being that the stems and leaves, if left in situ, provide homes for wildlife. This does seem to work in the drier and milder south and east side of the country, but here, with the exception of the Siberian iris. whose long, strap- shaped leaves provide perhaps as much cover as a badly laid thatch, the rest of the vegetation collapses in brown, soggy heaps, and, on investigation in spring, seems only to be providing homes for slugs and their eggs. Too much dankness also provides the perfect conditions for moss which grows apace and covers everything (even escaped clothes pegs which pinged off the line during the summer) with a shaqqy green jacket.

My other good reason for an early tidy is that the borders here are crammed with snowdrop bulbs, and unless I get onto the soil before they begin to grow too much, it is very difficult to find a place to stand or kneel without squashing several hundred new shoots.

Snowdrops are amongst my favourite flowers. They are hardy and resilient ,and in a good year the earliest type here (*Galanthus* 'Sam Arnot') produce their cheerful flowers before the New Year begins. Once snowdrops are in bloom there will be an unbroken succession of other



flowering things until the last late blooms of summer bedding disappear with the year end, so whatever the weather in winter, spring and summer there will always be something in flower.

Snowdrops can be difficult to establish and the usual recommendation has been to plant them "in the green" ie in full leaf and just after flowering. Many garden centres also sell growing bulbs planted in pots of compost and these can be put in the ground straight away. If you are fortunate enough to be given clumps of bulbs from someone else's garden, try to bring a little bit of soil with them. Snowdrops. like many other plants, seem to establish much more successfully if they have the right soil, with its resident micro-organisms, around them.

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
