SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL

This report covers items from the Parish Council meeting on the 8th June 2017. The next meeting is on Thursday 13th July 2017 at 7.30pm in the Committee Room, The People's Hall, Sedbergh.

GULDREY DRAINAGE CULVERT

Members agreed the proposed inspection chamber/sediment trap at Guldrey. This followed the severe flooding seen in Guldrey in 2015 (and surrounding area) following Storm Desmond. The inspection chamber and sediment trap are the final works to be completed in this area-following extensive gully/drain clearing. Cllr Nick Cotton was contributing substantially to these works from his

member's allowance, with SPC agreeing the monies required to complete.

PARKING TARIFFS

Members agreed new tariffs for the car parks in Sedbergh, subject to confirmation, if required, by a traffic order. This would follow the introduction of new machines at Loftus Hill and Joss Lane car parks that allow for all coins in current circulation to be accepted and, also, allow for card payments.

SEDBERGH TOWNSCAPE PROJECT

Members discussed the ongoing proposals for the planned refurbishment of Joss Lane car park in the future, including the need for

public consultation when draft plans were available. Further discussed was the state of repair of the parking area in front of St Andrew's Church. Members agreed to approach the YDNPA in respect of a potential improvement scheme which has been discussed with representatives of the Highway Authority and the Church. OTHER MATTERS

Various other matters were discussed, including: planning applications; current pay scales for contractors and employees: the bus shelter at Maryfell and the continuing discussions over parking and traffic flow in this area; the recent Pitch Improvement Report from The Football Association in connection with the playing field at Havera; a request from B4RN to allow ducting across land occupied by SPC; the request from YDNPA in regard to potential donors towards the rebuild of Fisherman's Bridge in Howgill/ Firbank: and the annual statement of income/expenditure in relation to Joss Lane car park (submitted to SLDC).

Also discussed was the concern over litter and dog fouling at Settlebeck following communication from the YDNPA Youth Ranger on behalf of the students at Settlebeck High School. Rachael Alderson advised that students spent 30 minutes every week litter picking around the site and that the behavior of irresponsible dog owners was getting worse. In particular, dog waste bags have been found in the compost heap, being a direct hazard to students wishing to become involved in gardening at the School.

Please note that members of the public are invited to our monthly Meetings where, as always, they are able to comment or ask questions. Public Participation is now at the beginning of the Agenda and should anyone wish to speak, they would be welcome to attend from 7.30pm.

FRIEND OR FOE? (Part 1)

B4RN is preparing to extend its network of fibre cable into the dale. possibly from both ends. Before cable -laying can commence, mutually agreed routes need to be surveyed and wayleaves signed. Previous wavleaves are unfortunately redundant and BT cables are prohibitively expensive at an annual rent of £10,000. Gavin Keeble, the Garsdale representative, is looking for volunteers to help with this community project and would ask anyone who is willing to give a hand, whether it be tea making or digging,

On the first day [Abbot Holme to White Moss, about 10.5 miles], we were joined by a friend from Scarborough, Ray Clarke]. That was Saturday 10 June, when it poured with rain all day, blew a gale, and the high fells were covered in mist. We were all saturated, but stayed in good

heart. The route took us over Long Bank and Great Coum.

On the Sunday afternoon we were joined by Thomas Gorst. [White Moss to Black Rake Road, about 7 miles] The weather was windy reaching gale force as we crossed Whernside and Blea Moor with occasional sharp but brief showers. Parts of the route were still quite wet underfoot from the previous day.

On Monday both Ray and Thomas joined us for the final and longest section. [Black Rake Road End to Abbot Holme, about 15 miles] The route took us around the east flank of Wold Fell, and over the summits of Great Knoutberry and Aye Gill Pike [Rise Hill]. Unfortunately it had rained

again overnight so conditions underfoot were very wet in some places, especially coming down Longstone Fell. On the whole the weather was cool and breezy with only the occasional short shower.

It took several days for us all to get our boots dry.

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

Dent Marbles

Sedbergh & District History Society's Visit to Upper Dentdale Members of the Society met William 'Bill' Fraser, a noted and enthusiastic geologist, at Stonehouse in Upper Dentdale on 17th May.

He took us back in time to the early C17th when polishing local limestone was a cottage industry.

In the C18th the watermill at Stonehouse was converted to cut and polish limestone to be made into fireplaces, chessboards and many other decorative items for sale locally and exporting round the country and later abroad; including a piece to the Czar's Winter Palace in St. Petersburg.

Limestone was transported from various parts of the county by mules and sledges and later on by the railway. Local farmers worked part-time as quarrymen – life was hard!.

Although there were seven different seams of limestone in Upper Dentdale, only four were suitable for cutting and polishing; two lowest seams were Hardraw Scar and

Simonstone Limestone. Both were dark and when polished were known as Black Marble.

The two highest seams, Underset and Main Limestones were grey and contained fossilised shellfish called *crinoids*.

Examples of these and other 'marbles' can be found in St. Andrew's Church.

We visited the site of High Mill and what had been Manager's house (now enlarged and modernised). Low Mill had disappeared but we were shown a picture of the Mill, a substantial building alongside the wheel pit and jutting out into the narrow road.

Sufficient water to turn the wheels was always an issue and Bill pointed out how water from the local becks had been diverted – sometimes underground - powering the mills to enable cutting and polishing the limestone. Quantities of sand was brought from Widdale to be used with wire cutters and later special fourbladed saws.

Taking us on a tour of Artengill and Dent Head viaducts Bill desribed how the heavy blocks of stone had been manhandled in place with large pincers. The insides were packed with rubble, which helped explain the lack of loose stone heaps in the area; (our dry-stone walls still use the same method).

This was a fascinating walk back through the centuries, allowing us to imagine how life would have been in this secret corner of Dentdale.

Over 30 of you have responded to our questionnaire for which many thanks. One question that showed a particular trend was a lack of knowledge about the "Side by Side" scheme run by Alzheimer's. Diane Armstrong, the local Side by Side

officer, was able to talk to many of you at the Coffee morning about the scheme and other matters of interest in Dementia. To those of you who don't know about the scheme it provides a one to one relationship between someone living with Dementia and a volunteer sharing a common interest. "From joining a local club, going to the football, or just going for a stroll in the park -Side by Side is a new Alzheimer's Society service which helps people with dementia to keep doing the things they love and get out and about with the support of a volunteer. This extra support can make it easier for people with dementia, who might sometimes feel isolated or find it difficult to leave their homes, to do

things we might take for granted and feel part of their local community. The service is highly flexible and built around the individual and their needs." More information can be found on the Alzheimer's website www.Alzheimers.org.uk Like so many things it requires volunteers -Would you like to consider that?? You will be able to find out more on August 14th at the Dementia Hub in the Peoples' Hall form 2-4pm or you can contact Alzheimers to find out more. Volunteers have to do some online training and have a current DBS clearance.

From the rest of the questionnaire results we have had some specific enquiries and we will contact those people to address their queries. Most respondents were "interested" in Dementia rather than supporting anyone with Dementia. Interestingly 96% did not need support to access any activities they enjoy doing, which ties in well with one comment which was that "Sedbergh is a very supportive community". Over 80% knew where to access support and services. Another comment about "services needed" by several (which is little to do with Dementia) was that we need a bank! Those concerned with "getting Dementia" were only just over half the respondents.

As part of the wider South Lakes
Dementia Alliance there is now a
Dementia Hub every second Monday
in the month from 2 till 4pm normally
at the Kendal Leisure Centre but on
four months of the year it will hold
outreach Hubs of which Sedbergh will
be hosting one on August 14th at the
Peoples' Hall. Like the Age Concern

event back in February there will be, importantly, tea and cakes (!) but various local services will be represented such as Age Concern, Alzheimers, Sedbergh Health Centre. 

SEDBERGH SWIMMING CLUB

As well as offering swimming lessons for the younger members of our community, Sedbergh Swimming club is now offering adult sessions - a front crawl technique course and a fitness session. The technique course is aimed at those swimmers who can already swim but perhaps struggle with aspects of front crawl - breathing being the most common issue. Over 6 weeks we focus on different aspects of the stroke an optional 'homework' is available and by the end of the 6 weeks swimmers should feel more confident with their stroke and as a additional benefit be more swim fit in the process.

The adult fitness session is currently

running as a separate session, in addition to our current swim sessions. This session is an hour long session and is an 8 week block of structured and planned sessions designed to challenge and improve swim fitness. It is a coached session and focuses on front crawl (as many of the exciting swimming and triathlon events in our beautiful part of the world focus on this stroke). In each session there is a warm up, some coached drills and a targeted fitness session. An additional session is available the group to further develop swim fitness.

I'm sure you'll agree that this is a fantastic addition to the club and the community and we are hoping that these sessions will continue to grow. We are so lucky to have a fantastic facility on our doorstep, let's use it as much as we can!! SEDBERGH COMMUNITY RESILIENCE PLAN

Sedbergh Parish Council has prepared a Community Resilience Plan (sometimes referred to as an 'Emergency Plan') as part of Cumbria County Council's Community Resilience Network.

The purpose of the Plan is to increase resilience within the local community before, during and after emergencies, and to link into the County and District Councils', and emergency services' emergency response structures. The Plan details ways in which the community of Sedbergh would respond in an emergency situation, such as flooding, while awaiting the assistance of statutory authorities/emergency services, or in support of them.

The Plan identifies the risks to the community and the actions that may be taken in response, including the designation of places of safety to provide temporary shelter for residents and visitors who may be displaced as a result of an emergency event. The People's Hall is so designated with Sedbergh School's Queen's Hall and Settlebeck identified as reserve places of safety. Items of emergency equipment are stored at the People's Hall and a supply of sandbags for use in assisting with flood events have been

The Plan also seeks to identify vulnerable people/groups in the community and to provide information and contact details on available resources (such as pumps,

generators and towing vehicles) that could assist during an emergency. Such details would be of particular value to outside agencies.

The Plan has been submitted to the Environment Agency, local authorities and emergency services via the secure Cumbria Community
Messaging System and a copy will be placed on the Parish Council's section of the Sedbergh.org.uk website. The Plan will be subject to periodic review to ensure that its provisions are up to date and remain relevant.



CITIZENS ADVICE

I am about to apply for Universal Credit for the first time, but have been told that there is a six week wait before the first payment. I'm worried that I won't be able to pay my bills. Is this right, and is there anything I can do?

This is correct, but you can ask for help. When you attend your claim interview at the Jobcentre Plus, ask if you can apply for an "advance payment" - this is a loan that will be deducted from your future benefits.

You'll need to show how much money you need for essentials, and explain why the loan will protect you from serious financial problems. You can also apply through the Universal Credit helpline on 0345 600 0723. Apply as early as possible in your claim.

If you are refused, you can ask for a reconsideration. If you are still turned down, emergency assistance may be available - Jobcentre Plus or Citizens Advice can advise you.

YORKSHIRE DALES MILLENNIUM TRUST

Thinking of planting a wood?
The Yorkshire Dales Millennium
Trust (YDMT) can enable your
thoughts of creating a woodland to
become a reality. Funding is currently
available for landowners wanting to
extend or improve existing
woodlands, plant hedgerows or
create new woodlands.

The Yorkshire Dales has less woodland than any other National Park in the UK at 4.8% compared to 13% tree cover across the rest of the country. The Dales Woodland Restoration Programme is working to change this by creating and managing woodlands through a partnership including Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust, Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority and the Forestry Commission. Together the partners aim to double broadleaf woodland cover in the Yorkshire Dales by 2020.

The YDNPA's Senior Trees and Woodland Officer, Geoff Garrett, said: "We are very keen that landowners take maximum possible advantage of the financial support available to create new woodland in the National Park. Part of the shared vision of the National Park Management Plan is to make the Park resilient and responsive to the impacts of climate change and as part of that we have a goal to support farmers and landowners to create at least 400 hectares of new native woodland by 2020. New woodland will strengthen wildlife habitat networks, increase carbon storage and help to reduce flooding. And woodland looks great

too, adding to the scenic beauty of the Park."

YDMT have funding available thanks to support from The Fuelcard Company and their Ecopoint customers who raised £338,565 last year, enabling the charity to extend their woodland creation programme to areas outside the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

Hedgerow planting projects have also been funded. The Maunder family in West Scrafton, near Leyburn, received a grant to buy native trees and shrubs including hawthorn, holly, blackthorn, crab apple, elder and hazel. The whole family got involved in the planting and, together with help from friends, created 200 metres of hedgerow that will act as an important corridor for wildlife.

Carol Douglas, Woodland Officer at YDMT, said: "It has been fantastic to approve grants for 21 new woodlands that were planted this winter. We're very keen to support more landowners wishing to plant trees, and are now accepting applications for the next planting season. Whether you'd like to plant 100 trees, 1000 or

- How do you think the National Park could be improved?
- And, what do you think are the three most important issues for the National Park Management Plan to tackle over the next five vears?

The answers will be used to help update the National Park Management Plan for the period 2018 -2023. The Plan is the most important document for influencing what happens in the National Park. It sets out a long-term 'vision' for the Park and a list of specific objectives that the 13 organisations, and many others, will work together to achieve.

One of the organisations behind the survey is the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority. Its chairman, Carl Lis, said it provided a great opportunity for residents, businesses and visitors to shape the future of the Park.

"I hear people in the street saving that 'they' should be doing this or that. The 'they' is shorthand for organisations which are perceived to have power or influence. Well, this survey is a chance for you to speak directly to those organisations. Tell us what you think should be happening the National Park to make it a better place.

"Many great things have happened in the past five years in response to what people told us last time round, in 2012. A good example is the new rail siding at Arcow quarry. People said they wanted fewer lorries on the road. As a result, an objective was created

in the Management Plan to establish rail links at the three quarries in Ribblesdale."

Mr Lis added: "Whether you prefer to use modern technology, or pen and paper, or one of the postcards that are available from local information centres, putting forward your views couldn't be easier."

The survey closes on 3 July. The information and opinions gathered will be used to create a draft National Park Management Plan, which will go out for public consultation early next vear.

Yvonne Peacock, the leader of Richmondshire District Council another of the organisations in the group – said: "The Management Plan is a powerful influence on what happens in the National Park, and how we and others spend our budgets. It's really important that as many local people and businesses as possible take part in the survey, as well as visitors."

The 13 partner organisations conducting the survey represent landowners, business, local councils and government agencies. £50.000 for Dales Communities Grants totalling more than £50,000 have been awarded to support projects that will help bring communities together across the region, thanks to the Roger Stott Community Grants programme.

Run by Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust (YDMT), the programme provides small grants to support a diverse range of community initiatives that benefit local people across the Yorkshire Dales.

We hope to help improve health and well-being by getting more people active and riding their bikes. Working with British Cycling we'll be holding a cycling sportive, inter-school cycling competition and guided mountain biking, plus children's entertainment including a bouncy castle and competitions, music and live entertainment. The Roger Stott grant from YDMT has been essential in ensuring that this year's Festival will take place."

A community befriending service in Embsay and Eastby has also benefitted, and a group in Sedbergh have received funding to install nest boxes for swifts and a webcam to allow local people to take a closer look.

Tanya St. Pierre, YDMT Project Officer, said: "It is a pleasure to be able to support such a diverse range of initiatives. Thanks to a quick and easy application process we're able to support passionate local people across the region to continue or kick-start initiatives that make a real

difference in their local communities."

Funding can be used to cover revenue expenses such as staff costs, rent or training, or for capital investment in assets such as furniture, computers or catering equipment, to name just a few. Small voluntary organisations and community groups with an annual income of less than £30,000 can apply. No match-funding is required, so groups can request up to 100% of the total project costs.

The Roger Stott Community Grant programme is made possible thanks to support from players of People's Postcode Lottery, who have raised £1,226,332 for YDMT since 2009.

Clara Govier, Head of Charities at People's Postcode Lottery said: "These small grants are supporting projects that help bring communities together, making a big difference across the Yorkshire Dales. I'm delighted that players of People's Postcode Lottery are helping to make this possible."

JULY GARDENING

Many people do not "get on" with botanical plant names. Admittedly, some of them are difficult to read, let alone pronounce, but many hold a description (albeit in Latin or Greek) of the plant to which they are attached.

Botanical "rules" say that the first name ever given to a plant should be the one by which it is known. We might be familiar with a plant by a well known name for many years before some bright spark discovers the fact that it was found in the wild several years before that familiar name was given and the original collector called it something completely different. At this point, the plant has to be renamed with the first collector's choice of name.

Constant scrutiny also means that some plants turn out to be unrelated to others in their group. They obviously have to be called by something different – and so new names are produced.

All this renaming is very trying for horticulturalists!

Confusion is not confined to the use of botanical names. Several years ago I had an exasperated customer in a garden centre, who wanted to order a "Syringa" plant. Syringa used to be the commonly used name for a Philadelphus or "Mock Orange Blossom", but it is also the botanical name for Lilac. We, and the poor customer went round and round in circles, trying to establish which one it was to be, but, though we all came to the conclusion that the "whatever it was" should have single, white, very fragrant flowers, he stuck to his guns in that it was to be a "Syringa", and

we never did get to the bottom of it. Perhaps we should just have ordered both and let him choose when they arrived.

Philadelphus shrubs (named after the ancient Egyptian King Philadelphus – who was presumably both attractive and fragrant) are in full flower this month in my garden. The shrubs I have came from old bushes in my grandparent's garden. They are probably Philadelphus coronarius which is one of the larger, most strongly growing species. They produce hundreds of wonderfully fragrant flowers, but at a height and spread of 3 metres, are probably too large for most modern gardens. P. 'Belle Etoile', a neater shrub with large, very fragrant, open flowers

All cultivars make robust, trouble free shrubs which will grow in any type of soil, in sun or partial shade.

SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

July is peak time for watching swifts. We often hear their screaming before we see them swooping around the sky, such an evocative sound and sight of summer,.

When flying high they are busy feeding, catching insects and tiny spiders that they collect in their throat pouches. In July these birds are a combination of breeding swifts and juveniles that are not yet old enough to breed, but which migrate here and look for sites for future years.

Chicks will have hatched in mid-June so by now both the parents will be kept increasingly busy feeding them – on average an adult goes in and out of the nest about every 40 minutes. After they hatch, the chicks spend 40 days in the nest so most will fledge and make that crucial maiden flight by the end of July. This means we have barely four weeks to enjoy these wonderful birds before they migrate back to Africa at the beginning of August.

Screaming parties are unpredictable and appear at many times of day (although less so in afternoons). In these long summer evenings a good time to see swifts flying around is after 9pm, especially when it's warm and humid when the insects are lower. Both adults return to the nest at night, and many are not going back in until around 10pm, so the half hour before dusk is the best time to spot them darting into their nest sites.

tell us about swift sightings, it's really useful, and we'd like to hear from anyone who can tell us more. These are your – the community's – swifts, and our aim is to discover more new nest sites and also to monitor existing sites, so we can get an idea of how they are doing. Would you like to volunteer and help us occasionally, maybe around where you live? You don't need to be an expert, we'll show you what to look for so do please get in touch. If you would like to give it a go it would be an enormous help.

At Settlebeck school both pairs of swifts have been re-united in the two webcam boxes, which is excellent news. One of the pairs laid 2 eggs, on 26 & 28 May, and the other pair laid 3 eggs. Everyone can now watch live action in one of the boxes - here is the link http://www.settlebeck.org/ swifts/live.html (at the time of writing it sometimes buffers and this is being worked on. You may also need to refresh your screen). You can also watch live activity very clearly in both of the boxes via a smartphone or tablet by downloading a free app: instructions are on the above website,

scroll down below the video screen and follow what to do (and it doesn't buffer).

Unfortunately some of the eggs have been knocked out of the Settlebeck nests, leaving one pair incubating only one egg and the other with none. So far the latter parents are still coming in at night, and that is a good time to see the swifts nuzzling on their nest.

We expect that the chick will hatch about 17 June, and that by the time you read this you will be able to see it feeding and grow. One of the most exciting activities is when chicks, after about 20 days of age, do vigorous press-ups, pressing down on their

wings and lifting their tails. These are wing-strengthening exercises to prepare them for the maiden flight and for the next few years of living entirely on the wing.

Do join us for another session of evening swift-watching on Friday July 7th: meet at Joss Lane car park at 8.30pm. Everyone is most welcome.

News from the Practice

Last month Susan Blunt, Dispenser, Receptionist and Medicines Manager, retired after over 20 years of service to Sedbergh GP practices. She was our longest serving member of staff and is going to be sorely missed by us all. Before she left she kindly wrote an article for me about Admission Avoidance and Advance Care Planning - an area of work she was heavily involved with during the last few years at SMP.

Advance Care Planning

At Sedbergh Medical Practice we are part of the national move to encourage older people to consider their long-term care and needs, and to take measures to avoid admission to hospital wherever possible; if this is what they want. The Grave Talk session held in Sedbergh last autumn was considered by many to be helpful and useful.

Although we appreciate that not everyone will want to talk about this, we offer Admission Avoidance Care Planning appointments with a doctor. During these appointments the discussion will cover such subjects as 'preferred place of care' which is about where you would like to be looked after when the time comes; cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), and advance directives ('living wills'). Not everyone will have considered a Power of Attorney both for Finance and for Health & Welfare. Where appropriate we can make referrals to our Care Navigator who can discuss with you any adaptations that could help to keep you more independent in

your own home.

Once the discussion is complete you will receive a copy of the Care Plan to keep in your home somewhere that is accessible to those who might need to see it. We will review it with you every twelve months, updating if required. We have so far had these discussions with more than 145 people over the last two and a half years.

The Admission Avoidance Care Planning appointment with a doctor is generally a 'one off', and offers an opportunity to make choices and put plans in place for your future. You can then get on with your life! - knowing that at every stage we will support your independence as long as possible.


