SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL

This report covers items from the Parish Council meeting on the 12th October 2017. The next meeting is on Thursday 9th November at 7.30pm in the Committee Room. The People's Hall, Sedbergh.

MARYFELL PLAY PARK

A consultation document, relating to at ground level. Individuals, residents the proposal to refurbish the play park



at Maryfell, is due to be circulated during November. The document will be available online (and will be noted on social media and the Parish Council website when available). It is hoped there will also be paper copies to be distributed by Sedbergh Primary School. Collection points will be at The Information Centre, The Post Office, Sedbergh Mini Market and The Primary School.

FORMER UDALES PREMISES, MAIN STREET, SEDBERGH

Members discussed the ongoing concern and frustrations over the former butchers shop on Main Street. Sedbergh which has been predominantly vacant since trading ceased in the early 1990's. Members agreed to pursue the following initiatives in an attempt to drive things forward with the building i) invite Mr Udale (or a representative) to a future meeting of the Parish Council ii) request YDNPA to pursue powers available to them in regard to the condition of the property iii) contact SLDC's Community Led Housing Officer to investigate future possibilities for use as potential affordable housing (preserving the retail space).

SEDBERGH TOWNSCAPE PROJECT

The proposed resurfacing of the parking area at St Andrew's Church is scheduled for November. Further discussions will be taking place over plans to develop/resurface Joss Lane car park in the future.

OTHER MATTERS

Various other matters were discussed, including: grant applications for the Management Committee of the People's Hall for £500 which was rejected (as the Council is unable to award grant to cover money already spent); planning applications, including the former Baliol School; the proposal to make a formal enquiry to the Heritage Lottery Fund in regard to the Queen's Garden; the planned works to the culvert close to Guldrey; the repair of the boundary wall at the Bowling Club: the current and forthcoming year's budget proposals for the Council; the Royal Air Force centenary in 2018; the Wave of Light initiative to raise awareness of Baby Loss Awareness Week; the continued lack of consideration for pedestrians/ prams/wheelchairs/mobility scooters while parking vehicles on pavements/



double yellow lines at Main Street and Finkle Street; and the (apparently) abandoned vehicle parked at St Andrew's Church.

Please note that members of the public are invited to our monthly Meetings where, as always, they are able to comment or ask questions. Public Participation is now at the beginning of the Agenda and should anyone wish to speak, they would be welcome to attend from 7.30pm.

At the Parish Meeting in September,

the dale's road still raised concerns. Although the majority of the A684 had been resurfaced to a high standard, it did mean that there were numerous places where there the edge of the road fell away sharply and could be a potential cause of accidents to unwary walkers or cyclists, particularly as there were an increasing number of gaps in the retaining walls. Council was concerned that a near fatal accident that occurred a few years ago should not be replicated. CCC Highways had made a shoddy attempt at repairing a few of the remaining potholes. Also increduility was expressed that the Coal Road was being resurfaced where there were no residences but the Back Road was being left in its poor state, where there were residences.

There appeared to be an increase in the number of early morning bikers recklessly speeding through the dale, in their attempts on the 'circuit time

trial'. The police have promised to be more vigilant.

A post box near East Rakenthwaite has been removed without consultation and efforts will be made for its reinstatement.

The village hall has been granted nearly £10,000 for improvements in heating and water supplies. £5,000 was awarded by Sedbergh Community Fund and the rest by YDNP, council expressed their appreciation. Work is now well underway and the hall now has a completely smell-free water supply after new filter systems were installed, at long last banishing the 'bad egg smells' that had pervaded the hall for decades. New double

glazed windows have been installed along with a tariff free heating system. The internal walls have been painted in bright, airy, heat-reflecting paint and the room divider has been repaired. All this has transformed the hall and council hopes that it will now be used more extensively for functions and parties.

B4RN held a meeting on the 4th October to help instigate the start of laying ducting for its hyperfast broadband. All funding was in place and most wayleaves had been agreed although there were still a few landowners unwilling to participate in this hugely important community project, due to misguided personal issues. However, this will not stop

Garsdale having one of the fastest broadband supplies in the world as these properties will be bypassed. Any property seeking a connection after completion will face an enormously increased connection charge and council encourages any doubters to sign up their interest now, without delay.

Full minutes will be available shortly at www.garsdaleparishcouncil.com. The next meeting will be on Thursday 16th November in the village hall at 7.30pm. All are welcome to come along to see the improvements to the hall in a smell-free and warm environment and/or to participate in the meeting.

TIM FARRON MP

Well the Summer Recess is well and truly over. I know summer seems like a long time ago but, aside from a few days before the party conference season started, Parliament really did not get back to work after Summer until October the 9th!


However, I have taken advantage of being back in the House of Commons to get in touch with a lot of Government Ministers about the issues that people have been telling me they want sorting.

I have tabled 2 questions in Parliament asking ministers what progress is being made towards ensuring everyone has a minimum of

10 Mbps broadband speed by 2020. The most recent figures from Which say that in our part of the world a quarter of us have speeds below 4Mbps with is almost not worth having. As so many of us and our employers need good broadband to simply function we need to know what is going on to get us up to reasonable speeds quickly.

At health question time I asked the Secretary of State to look into the plans our local health authority had to remove overnight consultant psychiatric care in Cumbria. These would have meant that in effect no one could be sectioned under the mental health act between the hours of 8pm and 9am. With consequence that anyone unfortunate enough to need this kind of mental health care would have to be held in police cells or A&E until a psychiatrist gets into work the following day. The Minister said he would look into it and I am pleased to say that shortly after this the plans were put on hold until January. But that is simply a delay, what we need to be told is that the plan has been abandoned.

I have been in touch with the

Education Minister to ask her to abandon her plans to cut £2.6 million from education budgets in this area. This is the equivalent to losing 58 teachers. This at a time when our population is projected to remain the same and as far as I know there is no anticipated dramatic reduction in the numbers of children. We have already seen one school in the area close and others will undoubtedly come under pressure. Surely at this time the Government should be putting the education of our children before everything?

Finally, I have written to the Brexit Secretary to ask him to negotiate a deal that gives our farmers free access to European markets when we leave the EU. Currently 90% of



our beef and lamb exports go to countries in the European Union. If we fall back on World Trade Organisation Tarriffs (the so called "No Deal" option) then all of our beef and lamb would be subject to roughly a 50% tariff if it was imported into the EU. I know that our beef and lamb is some of the best in the world but even if it could sustain that kind of price premium over EU produced meat then our farmers would much rather that the extra money came to them than went to EU governments.

And these are just some of the contacts I had with ministers last month. I simply don't have space for all of them.

COUNCILLOR CORNER

Another wet day, another opportunity to stand in the rain talking about flooding problems and drainage issues around Sedbergh. On this occasion it was with a couple of officers from the Flood & **Development Management Team** from Cumbria County Council, a Rights of Way officer from Yorkshire Dales National Park and two concerned residents from Guldrey Terrace.

The issue to be discussed? Work on

installing the silt trap and inspection chamber above the culvert that was responsible for the flooding at Guldrey during Storm Desmond. This is the culvert that starts at the top end of the playing field above the People's Hall and runs west under the town to join Havera Beck near to Marthwaite. It has been decided that the best location for the inspection chamber is at the junction of the new section of culvert that runs under the Medical Centre and the Spar car park with the old culvert at the eastern end of Guldrey Terrace. The new section (so I am told) is large enough for a person to walk inside, although in a crouched position. The old section is a traditional square stone culvert and it's vital to be able to remove silt and

debris before it enters the old section so that its capacity is not reduced and there is less need to use a pressure hose to tackle any blockage, as this potentially weakens the stone culvert.

It is hoped that something called a 'Hydro Brake' can be installed at the same time that the work is carried out, to restrict the volume of water flowing from the large gauge pipe under the Spar car park to the smaller gauge culvert running alongside Guldrey Terrace. This will also have the effect of enabling water to be temporarily stored in the large pipe to even out the pressure on the stone culvert. After a relatively quiet winter last year (2016-17), the storm on 11th October this year when 200mm of rain fell at Honister has been a wake-



up call to proceed with all those schemes that need to be done to give us greater resilience in dealing with bouts of prolonged, heavy rainfall.

What can we do as residents to help? Scrape leaves off the top of gullies to let the water flow into the drains. Very satisfying! Or report gullies that are full of silt to CCC Highways via https://

Dales farmers primed to build region's flood defences Andrew Faga

A practical guidebook for farmers and land managers on natural flood management measures - which is the first of its kind, and could be adopted nationwide – has been published by the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA).

The free guide – a response to the devastation wreaked by Storm Desmond in December 2015 – sets out how Dales farmers can both protect their land from flood damage and contribute to the region's flood defence system.

It has been put together by the YDNPA. Yorkshire Dales Rivers Trust and North Yorkshire County Council. with support from the Environment Agency and Natural England.

"Farmers saw the severe impact of

flooding on cities such as Carlisle, Leeds and York and asked how they could help," said the YDNPA's Senior Farm Conservation officer, Helen Keep.

"If, after heavy rainfall, we can slow the flow of rivers that rise within the Yorkshire Dales through natural flood management measures, then a number of our region's towns and cities will be better protected. Our aim is for every farmer and land manager in the Yorkshire Dales National Park to have a copy of the guide.

"Some of the measures present a clear 'win-win' situation, benefitting both flood defences and agricultural production. Research in Bishopdale, for instance, has shown that soil compaction is more widespread than

previously thought. Reducing soil compaction would both decrease run off and improve grass and root growth.

"Other measures may need financial support to make them worthwhile. Grants may be available to fund some of the measures – so, please get in touch. In the longer term, we hope that managing land to reduce flooding will become a new source of income for farmers – helping to make their businesses more robust."

Natural flood management aims to reduce the downstream maximum water height of a flood. In the guide, the various measures that can be taken to achieve this have been grouped into three levels of intervention, according to their set up and maintenance costs:

Level 1 measures such as cross drains in farm tracks and planting hedgerows are low cost and easy to install, yet very effective. They require minimum or no consultation with authorities such as the YDNPA or the Environment Agency. Level 2 measures such as creating an earth bund or a 'leaky dam' may require consent and may need contractors' help to install them. Level 3 measures such as restoring the connection between a river and its floodplain need detailed planning and design and are usually high cost.

Rita Mercer of the Yorkshire Dales Rivers Trust said: "Natural flood management structures do not significantly impact on farming, are typically small in size, and can be considered to be an extension to the farm's land drainage system. It is a network of these structures, rather than individual features, which can make a difference. Research carried out by Leeds University in Coverdale indicated that a combination of simple measures over 10% of the catchment area could help slow down the flow of water during high rainfall events by up to 12%. That would be a significant positive effect."

'Keep our primary schools open'

The Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) has made a passionate appeal to local education chiefs to recognise the vital importance of primary schools to the life of rural communities.

Letters making the case for keeping open all the remaining primary schools in the national park are also to be sent to the five MPs in the park The following motion was approved unanimously by members of the YDNPA at a meeting on 26th September.

"In line with the current National Park Management Plan and the new emerging Plan, the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority calls upon the County Councils, Local Education Authorities, Multi-Academy Trusts (with remit over primary schools in the national park) and the schools' leadership and management, to

recognise the importance of primary schools, individually or networked with others, as a key contributor to the sustainability and future of rural communities and in particular the retention and attraction of young families within them."

The motion was proposed by one of the YDNPA's longest-serving members, the Independent North Yorkshire County Councillor, John Blackie. He told the meeting that up to 10 primary schools in the national park were "under threat" because of falling pupil numbers:

"When I was first elected to North Yorkshire County Council 20 years ago, Askrigg primary had 79 pupils, Bainbridge had 46 and West Burton had 44. Now the pupil numbers are, respectively, 40, 23 and 22. In 20 years the school populations have halved. The situation is even worse in Swaledale and Arkengarthdale.

"As a National Park Authority, we want to send a clarion call to those that have influence over the running and funding of primary schools – to remind them of the importance of protecting these vital community assets. The efforts we are making to retain and attract young families will be seriously undermined if schools are allowed to close because of short term financial issues.

"Recent history shows us that if a primary school closes, the local community is set on the road to becoming a retirement village. Keld had a thriving school in the 1960s.

The school was later closed and now there is not a single child in the village."

The YDNPA Chairman, Carl Lis, said it was important that the Authority spoke up:

"The recent closure of Horton-in-Ribblesdale primary school was a serious blow for the community, which we campaigned against.

"We do not run schools, or set schools policy, but we have a responsibility to speak on behalf of local communities. We want to make the case to those who manage primary schools in the national park that the schools should be retained. If they are not, young adults are likely to continue to leave the park, never to

return to live, and the chances of attracting young families to replace them will be further diminished."

YDNPA member Yvonne Peacock, who lives in Bainbridge and is the Conservative leader of Richmondshire District Council, seconded the motion.

She said: "I spoke particularly about West Burton, Bainbridge and Askrigg schools. It is vital that these schools do not close. The extra funding for schools announced by the government last month is welcome, but we need to ensure local education authorities take on board the importance of our local schools when making decisions.

"We need to encourage more young families to live and work in the Dales.

NOVEMBER GARDENING

Elaine Horne

Autumn colour on the trees in my garden has been very transient. Heavy rain and strong winds from mid September have seen off some of the coloured foliage almost before it began to colour up. The first trees to turn are always the two seed-raised Asian birches; "Gold" or "Erman's Birch" (Betula ermanii) and "Chinese White Birch" (Betula albosinensis). Both of these have relatively large leaves -7-10cm (3-4ins) long – much larger than the dainty leaves of the native "Silver Birch". Their autumn "show" generally lasts only 3 to 4 days but as with most other birches, they have decorative bark which provides a feature and focal point for the rest of the vear.

Native birch seed themselves around quite easily and some of my specimens have been rescued from roadsides or other gardens. Some have an upright habit whilst others have the graceful pendulous form which gives the species its botanical name Betula pendula. All have small leaves which cast a light shade through the summer. They make a wonderful backdrop to shade loving plants such as Rhododendrons and Azaleas and Witchhazels and for spring flowering bulbs. I grow yellow Winter Aconites, and blue Anemone blanda underneath, and mix these with Primula 'Wanda' (Dark purple/red flowers) and trailing, dark leaved Ajuga.

There are several cultivars of "Silver Birch". Betula pendula 'Youngii' is the

most pendulous, being top grafted on to a straight stalk to produce an umbrella shaped tree. I feel it lacks grace. It looks rather as though it received a severe biff on the head in its early years and after that everything grew downwards in an untidy heap – but it does stay small and so can be a useful tree for a small space.

Betula p. 'Tristis' is the elegant graceful alternative, forming a slender trunk with trailing branches and twigs, and Swedish Birch (the Swedish national tree) B. p. 'Dalecarlica' has deeply cut, almost feathery foliage on pendulous branches.

Variegation and coloured leaves are not commonly seen in Birch, but Betula p. 'Golden Beauty' is an attractive, yellow leaved form and B. p. 'Purpurea' has purple tinged bark and dark purple leaves.

Birch trees are never flamboyant. Their flowers are simple catkins, born in spring amongst the new foliage, but in my garden they provide a source constant, but ever changing beauty. They are, perhaps, my favourite trees.



Peter guided us through the sequence required to help the casualty, and stay safe ourselves. Checking the situation before rushing in came first, for example a possessive dog, even puddles, especially if you go on to use a defibrillator, because water and electricity do not mix!

Calling for help came next – mobile signals were discussed – then checking for a response, the airway, breathing and circulation, once these were done, it was on to the chest compressions. We were all surprised



at how tiring it was - quite a work out. Peter said having someone to help was really ideal as a person on their own would tire fairly quickly and we definitely agreed. The recommended rate of 30 compressions, then 2 rescue breaths using the mask, meant keeping count which seemed to be the hardest part, remembering to sing Nelly the Elephant or Staying Alive was the easy bit. Then it was time to test the accuracy of the "idiot proof" description given to a Defibrillator. Most of us had not seen one, only the weatherproof boxes they are housed in, and we were keen to have a go. Peter immediately asked for a volunteer and Rita stepped up to the plate and once opened, it was indeed easier than all

of us expected. You just do as you are told! Gill was next up and did a sterling job.

It was a most informative, educational and vital talk that included lighter moments especially those regarding hairy chests and piercings in the chestal region!

Sheila gave the vote of thanks and we all agreed that Peter had really helped us feel that we could indeed perform CPR if required to do so.

Tea and biscuits were most welcome, with the competition "My most unusual gift" (obviously set with gift wrapping in mind) won by Jean who had brought along a bamboo calendar from Bali, delicately inscribed, and looked more like a rather lovely wind chime – unusual



This would be formed of a group of volunteers coordinated by a central organiser who would be available to offer their various skills in the short term to assist people who suddenly find themselves with a problem. For example, somebody who is rushed off to hospital with little or no time to organise dogwalking, plant watering etc. Sedbergh has a fantastically helpful community and things like this

are often covered anyway but there are people who may not have links to that support network and it may take 24/48 hours before family and friends can step in. Those to whom I have broached this idea think that there are volunteers out there who would be willing to be "on the books" and that there would be a value to this idea. The purpose of this article is to try and find out from a wider range of people what they think about the project. My contact details are at the end of the article.

Factors to consider..... volunteers would need to obtain a DBS for mutual protection. At least one and probably 2 or 3 coordinators would need to be found who would share a common helpline phone number.

Some small scale finance would be needed to advertise the scheme so that all households were made aware of how to contact the scheme. I'm sure some of you can think of other issues that we would need to address – do get in touch.

Wearing my Dementia hat, if you would like a copy of the headline dementia questionnaire results that we ran, get in touch. Likewise if you attended the Dementia Hub in the Peoples' Hall in August and would like to give us any feedback on the event we would be very grateful to hear from you. In passing the Kendal Mountain Film Festival is hosting a Dementia friendly screening as part of their programme.

- 'Remember when...?' While it can be tempting to try and jog the memory of somebody living with dementia, this kind of question is often a reminder of memories lost. That's not to say you should avoid talking about the past, but it's better to lead the conversation and allow the person to join in. Try leading with 'I remember when...' instead.
- 2. 'I've just told you that' There is

- little benefit to passing on your frustration to somebody with dementia, and saying 'I've just told you that' only reminds the person of their condition. Try this instead: Try to be polite and as patient as possible.
- 3. Reminding them of a loved one's death can be painful, even causing them to relive the grief they've already experienced. Try this instead: It may be better to come up with another reason for somebody's absence, while at other times a gentle reminder is appropriate.
- 'What did you do this morning?' Avoid asking too many openended questions, as it could be stressful for a person with

The only absentees were Connie, Jean and Jim. We wish them well and hope to see them in November. Jean sent a message to say that at a recent hospital appointment she had received invaluable help from Sight Advice co-ordinator Margaret Mcclure.

We had one of our most well attended meetings and were fortunate to have a most interesting presentation by Colin Kendall of the "Blood Bikes" Service. The North West Blood Bikes Service covers Lancashire and the Lakes, a very wide area.

The riders transport blood, milk, medication and notes between hospitals as and when required. For example, they might be asked to

deliver notes from Kendal to Lancaster or blood from the Blood Bank at Lancaster to Preston. They are used in place of ambulances, which would otherwise be taken away from their normal duties. Courier services could be used but they are very expensive and taxis are expensive and not always reliable.

Colin gave us the example of a newborn baby who needed milk and whose mother needed blood, both of which had to be brought from some distance away. The service received a letter and photograph from the grateful mother when the little girl was a year old and doing well, thanks to the Blood Bikes Service.

The service was founded in 1962 in Surrey and is entirely voluntary. There

are presently 350 volunteers, riders, fundraisers, and back office staff. Controllers take calls from hospitals, nursing homes and hospices. The Kendal switchboard covers the whole of the Morecambe Bay area.

By December 2016, the riders had done around 40,000 runs. About 1.5 million miles, saving the NHS £4 million. It costs a lot to run the organisation, the bikes alone can cost as much is £16,000.

A recent run was from Dumfries to Porton Down in Wiltshire taking around six hours. The cost to the NHS? Nothing.

Colin was presented with a donation towards the cost of the service and thanked for a fascinating presentation. Thanks are also due to Elizabeth for suggesting and organising the event. We then all had a photograph taken alongside the impressive bike!

Amy then outlined some of the items and services available from Bradbury House.

We ended by deciding on the Fat Lamb once again as the venue for our Christmas Lunch on Tuesday 21st of November at 12:30. Something to look forward to.



Have you checked your loft recently?


I check ours' from time to time to see if we have been invaded by wasps or rodents, usually small but occasionally large and treat accordingly!!

THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION

History

The Royal British Legion was formed on 15th May 1921, bringing together four national organisations of ex-Servicemen that had established themselves after the First World War. The main purpose of the Legion was straightforward: to care for those who had suffered as a result of service in the Armed Forces during the war, whether through their own service or through that of a husband, father or son. The suffering took many forms: the effect of a war wound on a man's ability to earn a living and support his family, or a war widow's struggle to give her children an education. Even those who had come through the war relatively unscathed struggled with employment. As a result of the war, Britain's economy plummeted and in 1921 there were two million

unemployed. Over six million served in the war and 725,000 never returned Of those that came back 1.75 million had suffered some kind of disability and half of those were permanently disabled. Added to this figure were the families who depended on those who had gone to war, the wives and children, widows and orphans as well as the parents who had lost sons in the war, who often contributed to the household income. When the Legion's leaders looked around them, they saw the gigantic task of looking after those who had suffered and also the need to prevent further sacrifice by reminding the nation of the human cost of war and to work actively for peace. By the time of the Legion's

formation in 1921, the tradition of an annual Two Minute Silence in memory of the dead had been established. The first ever Poppy Appeal was held that year, with the first Poppy Day on 11th November 1921. The Legion was granted 'Royal' status in 1971 and extended its membership to serving members of Her Majesty's Armed Forces, as well as ex-Service personnel in 1981.

The Legion Today

The Royal British Legion is a British charity providing financial, social and emotional support to members and veterans of the British Armed Forces, their families and dependants all year round. The Legion also campaigns to improve their lives, organise the Poppy Appeal and remember the

visit to Arras & Vimy Ridge on the Sunday, I've subsequently become very interested in the World War I battlefields in France and Belgium. I've now been several times and usually stay in Ypres (Flanders) or in Albert (Somme). In 2012, Andrew (my brother) and I, were given a guided tour by the excellent locally based guide, Iain McHenry, who showed us the field near Plug Street (Ploegsteert) Wood where football was played on Christmas Day 1914. The site was marked by a wooden cross with footballs, small crosses and poppies around its base. Being Leeds United fans, we didn't like the Red football from a team called United from the city of Salford,

parading under the Manchester name - only one team in the city of Manchester - City!! However, as a mark of respect to all the men who lost their lives, we left the ball alone, managing to take photographs without the MUFC football in view.

We visited again November 2013 with a friend, Chris Buckham (Geordie Battalion) and planned for lain to take us to Arras to see where our Dad's, Uncle Richard, was killed, with 'no known grave' in 1917. Sadly, lain's Mum passed away just before our scheduled visit and so, we were left to our own devices during the trip.

On one of the days, we decided to visit Plugstreet again and we discussed and considered that, "If

that Man U football's there again, we should kick it into the German trenches". Well, there was no Man U football by the cross but our eye was caught by a Luton Town football and we took a photo. I know that a "friend of a friend" (James Green) is a Luton fan, as is Nick Owen (Luton Chairman) who, although I've never met, I've swapped emails via a very good mutual mate (First Class) Dave Ismay, who tragically passed away, very suddenly, last April. So, I thought I'd send them the photo of the Luton football at this famous site (Photo 278).

It was pouring with rain and for photographic purposes, I also placed my Leeds United cap on top of the cross and took a photo. My brother and friend, Chris, asked, "Are you going to leave it?" I replied, "No, it's my lucky cap" and then after thinking about, "two relegations, two lost playoff finals, administration and the tenure of Ken Bates", decided that perhaps it wasn't "lucky" ... and so, I said, "Yes" and left it there (Photos 279/280/282).

Subsequently, we spent an interesting two or three days touring the Ypres Salient and Arras Battlefield in the pouring rain in November.

Now to the real part of the story, The Daily Telegraph on November 18th (2016) ran a story 'Total Football' about the Germany v England matches in 1914 over the brief Christmas Truce period in Flanders. There are three photos

accompanying the article, including one of the cross showing my Leeds United cap on top! In 'column one' of the article, the writer comments: "Draped around the cross is a club scarf. On top, someone has placed a

Leeds United cap ".
Well, well — I am now "someone"!!
Or am I?

We visited the famous and very moving Tyne Cot Cemetery and on one of the panels commemorating the 'fallen' with no known grave, under the Worcester Regiment (I live near Bewdley, Worcestershire) was "Winn C".

THOMAS HANDLEY

Colin Cowperthwaite

Monday 27th November will mark the centenary of the death in action of Thomas Handley. Lance Corporal Handley was my great uncle, being the younger brother of my paternal grandmother, Betsy Ellen Cowperthwaite. Thomas was born and brought up in Garsdale, the son of John and Betsy Handley (nee Harper), both of whom were natives of the dale. The 1901 census shows

that the family lived at Knudmaning; by 1911 they had moved to Thwaite Head. Thomas left for war whilst they were living at Dandra Garth Cottages (see photo), which stood opposite Dandra Garth House. The cottages were demolished many years ago, their location now serving as a lay-by. Thomas Handley was killed in action aged 19, whilst fighting in the 3rd Battle of Ypres. He was serving in the Machine Gun Corps (Infantry), part of the 54th Batallion of the 18th (Eastern) Division. His service number being 86227, the official report of his death states that 'he was firing his gun when it received a direct hit, and he was killed instantaneously'. Although it is reported that he died in action in



France, Thomas is commemmorated in the Poelcapelle British Cemetery in Belgium, which is 5 miles north east of Ypres. The cemetery contains the remains of 7,500 soldiers, of which an amazing 6,321 remain unidentified. Most of these were casualties from the second half of 1917, some bodies having been transferred from other makeshift cemeteries. The actual Battle of





Poelcapelle was fought in Flanders on 9th October 1917. Back at home in Garsdale, a memorial service was held for Thomas Handley at the Primitive Methodist Chapel, later known as Low Smithy. Following the end of the war, a marble memorial plague was erected above the pulpit in Garsdale Street Methodist Chapel. As well as containing Thomas's name, this plague also commemorates 4 other sons of Garsdale who fell victim to the war: Rowland Harper, Richard Handley, Thomas Bracken and William Mason. The names of two more Garsdale lads (Miles Harper and Michael Aikrigg) were omitted, both being 'missing presumed dead'.



Coincidentally, two other young men from Sedbergh were killed in action on the same day as Thomas, these being Thomas Birkett Stockdale of Loftus Hill and Stephen Atkinson of Cross Close. I have a silver teapot (photographed) which was presented in memory of my great uncle from Hawes Junction and Lunds, where he probably attended chapel and primary school. The teapot was used for many years until quite recently, at tea parties in most of the chapels in the dale. I have also inherited a large brass plague (photographed) which was presented to Thomas's grieving family following his death, which was the usual practice for victims during the First World War. Some of the above information must be credited to Sedbergh & District History Society, who last year compiled a book entitled "Sedbergh and District 1914-1918; But who shall return us the children ?". I believe that copies are still available from the History Society via the TIC.

The book includes a letter written to Thomas's parents following his tragic death, by one of his colleagues. It reads: "It is with the deepest sorrow and greatest regret that I write these

lines to inform you that your dear son, and my greatest chum, was unfortunately killed in action at 5.15 in the evening. I am glad to say his death was instantaneous, the result of a direct hit from a shell, so that he could not have suffered the slightest pain. His death was the greatest shock to all of us, especially to me. who was his No 2 in the team and his closest chum since we both came out together last April. We buried him as reverently as possible the same night, and the Company are having a cross made and erected on his grave. I know that no words of mine can possibly console you in your great loss, but at any rate you have the knowledge that he died in the greatest of causes and with his face to the enemy as a soldier should. I found two parcels from you on our return from the line, and I have done the usual thing and shared them amongst his teammates, which I feel sure vou would have had me do. Assuring you of the deepest sympathy of the company, by whom he was greatly loved. I remain, yours sincerely, F.Gorton.



LEST WE FORGET

Sedbergh School Year 10 Battlefields Trip Summer Term 2017 Philippa Prall

Sedbergh School's Year 10 Trip to the battlefields of the Somme and Ypres is now long-established; several generations of Sedberghians have finished their summer term this way. It's hard work; no worksheets are filled in, but the pupils are required to work their hearts and emotions in ways they will not have done before. The effects of the trip always surprise them and it's their unique responses, year on year, which keep the thing so fresh for the staff who accompany them.

Visiting Old Sedberghian casualties as part of the 'School's Battlefields Pilgrimage' is powerful stuff. Fraser Jones, a boy in Winder House writes of the moment his group found James **Hitchon** who died on 1 July 1916: 'After a short wander, we went to a small cemetery set in what was once



the battle's no-man's-land. It was here that we saw the grave of an old *Evanian. It truly hit home* with a lot of us, as he was essentially one of us. A boy who went to our school, its lessons, played in its matches yet perished at that place...'

We follow roughly the same itinerary each year, but tailor it to accommodate visits to the relatives of pupils. The poignancy of the trip is heightened when individual pupils discover their relatives – or even just their namesakes – in the cemeteries. Fraser was shocked to find over 600 men with his surname on the Thiepval Memorial.

Bedford House Cemetery, Ypres, holds the graves of two Old

A British Legion poppy wreath was laid at their graves alongside a sprinkling of soil from Winder fell – a special Sedberghian tribute to boys who would have run up and across the fells whilst at School. Nearby, Elizabeth Sloss's relative, was buried. She takes up the story: 'Finally we came to the headstone. John Cowie was carved neatly above a crest. I stopped. This was my great great grandfather. I had never heard anything about him but I knew how much it meant to my granny. As his obituary was being read out, I stared at the pristine grave. didn't get too emotional, the trip was overwhelming. The number of graves and relatives simply from our school made you realize how much the war affects us still.'

Perdie Blackhall (C), wrote that her 'experience of our trip made a huge impact on how I now interpret my life. I couldn't have wished for better people to share this with and I am so glad I went. I would repeat it all over again if I could.'

However with all the work that has been done in and around the PH over the past few years in would be a shame not to give the inside a makeover too. Grant applications are being prepared. Of course it is not going to happen overnight but RCT members remain undaunted.

There are two more fund raisers planned for the curtain project this year both are coffee morning's the first is on Wed Nov 22 and the second is on Wed Dec 6 10am as usual in the Cornerstone Community Church rooms. I very much hope to

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

Richard Cann

Despite the rain over forty members and visitors attended the first talk of the 2017/8 season. The subject was "The Shap Stones" and the speaker was Jean Scott-Smith of the Shap History Society.

She said that the original name for Shap was Heppe which probably meant a heap of stones. Shap was important because several tracks through the fells met there and also it was where two Ley Lines intersected. (Ley Lines originally were thought to be straight line tracks on which important prehistoric sites were situated but more recently some people think they are lines of energy that can be detected by dowsing.) There are several prominent landmarks and stone circles around Shap. The Shap Thorn on Wicker Fell can be seen for miles around and seems to have been used in aligning monuments. There are important stone circles at Oddendale and Gunnerkeld, the latter alongside the South carriageway of the M6. In these ancient monuments use is made of Shap Granite rock, a pink granite due to the presence of Feldspar crystals.

The presence of ceremonial stones at Shap was shown on early maps and described by travellers such as Camden in 1586. The first

representation of them was in a painting by Lady Lowther made in 1775 which shows two parallel rows of stones. The start of the Shap Stone Avenue was a stone circle at Heppeshaw also known as Kemp Howe. When the main railway line was built in the 1840s the track was laid through it but some stones still survive. They can be seen from the A6 in a field alongside the line near the limekilns. From the stone circle the avenue headed towards Shap for over a mile. The route is crossed by four springs but few of the stones still survive and these are mainly incorporated into walls. At Brackenber Farm tradition says that there was another circle with a large stone in the centre which eventually was split to make seven gate posts. One large stone that does survive is the Goggleby or Goblin Stone. This fell over in 1969 but was re-erected in 1975 and this gave archaeologists information on how it was originally erected. The Asper Stone and another small one close by have cup marks on them. The avenue seems to terminate at Skellaw Hill, a barrow which was found to contain cremated

Trust Structure and how it is managed

The Trust is responsible for the usage and maintenance of 72 Main Street which it owns and leases to various organisations, and the management of two charity shops which are the principal source of income. Profits from the charity shops are disbursed through grants to charitable causes. In addition the Trust is involved in projects for the benefit of the community. The trustees sit on five sub groups:

- Projects which initiates and develops projects for the benefit of the community.

Objectives and Activities

- The Objectives of the Trust are:
- To maintain two charity shops to raise funds for disbursement to charitable causes in Sedbergh and District.
- To maintain the premises at 72
 Main Street and ensure that they
 are used for the benefit of the
 community.
- To identify and bring into being projects which will benefit the community.

The principal activities during 2016 – 2017 have been the efficient management of the two charity shops and 72 Main Street, developing projects for the benefit of the community and the disbursement of funds arising from the charity shops to the community.

Achievements and Performance

The two charity shops have continued to thrive. During the year grants totalling £19,910 were disbursed to nineteen organisations in the community.

The repairs to the basement of the principal charity shop, caused by the Storm Desmond flooding, took rather longer than anticipated and it was not



until late summer that business as normal was resumed. Despite the inconveniences our volunteers rose to the challenge and continued to serve the community cheerfully and energetically.

72 Main Street continues to provide accommodation for the Police, the Parish Council, the Sedbergh Historical Society and the Information Centre,

The Trust continues to pursue its third Objective "to identify and bring into being projects which will benefit the community". It is well placed to develop innovative approaches in many respects of the provision of local services and facilities.

With the provision of a skateboarding park on hold, after a consultation to determine the need, the Project Group formed a youth club which had limited success but had to be disbanded because of the lack of suitably qualified leaders. We are now seeking to establish a youth forum to see whether we can revive the youth club or find some other activity which provides for the youth of the community. A proposal to build a "Pump Track" rather than a

skateboarding park is being investigated and the Trust is also involved in the refurbishment of a children's playpark.

The provision of social care through a Community Partnership is being investigated with specific reference to providing short term support to those who are in a crisis situation.

The Community Orchard Group has had a successful first year and is now seeking to become a Charitable Incorporated Organisation.

Although the Sedbergh First Responders is an autonomous body the Trust liaises with them and assists them whenever possible.

The Trust continues to be involved with the Parish Council and the Chamber of Trade and Business in the production of a Vision for Sedbergh and other initiatives, such as the creation of a dementia friendly society, which are of significance to the development of the community.

Financial Review including Reserves Policy

Total receipts during this reporting period were £54,920.

The Trustees agreed a Reserves Policy based upon the ability to cover three months running costs.

Risk Management

The major risks to which the Trust is exposed, as identified by the trustees, have been reviewed and systems have been established to mitigate those risks.

Public Benefit

The trustees have complied with their duty to have due regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant.

I've just started a new job with an auto-enrolment pension. Do I have to join the scheme? I'm worried about meeting my living costs if I do.

Even if retirement is a long way off, or you feel you can't afford it, it's still worth starting a pension. It can offer you financial security once you've stopped working and it's good value for money as your contribution gets topped up by both your employer and the government.

If you're worried that auto-enrolment will make it harder for you to keep up with your living costs, ask your employer how much your monthly contribution will be and work out whether you really can't manage to pay it. Also check if you can claim tax credits or benefits, like Universal Credit

If you do decide to opt out, you'll need to tell your employer, because you will be automatically signed up to auto-enrolment. Make sure you do this within one month to get a refund on the contribution you've made.

suitable for everyone and good to drop in to. They are specifically planned for people who would like to increase or maintain mobility, coordination, balance, strength, reduce stress and ease aching joints and muscles.

It is always good to see people come back after a time away and fit right in again. Classes are a great opportunity to get to know, or catch up with other people in the area. We often have tea and biscuits after class in the winter, and some people go for lunch afterwards in one of the local cafes. Either way it is a bit of a social event as well as good for all round health and wellbeing.

People usually sign up to a course through word of mouth. Sometimes people come from Sedbergh or Garsdale, quite often with friends or partners.

The occasional visitor, on holiday or visiting family, will come to a regular class where everyone knows each other - there is always a bit of chat about what they are doing. People on holiday or visiting get to see a different side of the village this way. Active yoga has a small committed

class and has been improving strength and flexibility week on week. The class gets a good level of individual attention and we practice a slow, deep, flowing class when more people attend. If you practice Astanga, dynamic or similar type of yoga you will enjoy the class. It is suitable to drop in if you already have a regular practice or are reasonably flexible and active.

The long standing Thursday general class is starting to work on yoga breathing techniques and mindful yoga practices. I have noticed improvements in strength and flexibility, ability to attain a deeper level of relaxation and particularly in balance, in people who attend regularly. Classes are constantly adapted to what the students need. SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

Tanya & Edmund Hoare

Why are we so concerned about our swifts? The most recent information published by the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) shows why: the latest BBS (Breeding Bird Survey), in 2015, reported that the UK swift population has now declined even further, by 51% since 1995 (20 years). There has been a continual steep decline year on year since records began.

Swifts are currently amber-listed Birds of Conservation Concern (red being the most endangered). This 51% population drop in 20 years is a more rapid rate of decline than the 50% in 25 years threshold that is a requirement for red-listing. But, unlike many other birds, we do not have records for swifts over that length of time. So it is likely that swift will only move to the red list at the next revision which will not be until 2021.

This 25-year criterion also explains why far commoner birds like house sparrows became placed on the red list, even though they are present in far greater numbers. House sparrow records go back further than 25 years, and as a result of a sharp decline from 1970 they were placed on the red-list, even though by 1990 the population had stabilised at around 5.5 million pairs. Swifts however number only about 80,000 pairs.

House martins, which share a migratory life pattern with swifts (although they are totally unrelated) were placed on the amber-list due to a big drop in numbers in the decades of 1980s and 90s, but now also

appear to have stabilised. They number around 500,000 pairs. One of the great unsolved mysteries of migration is that we still do not know where in Africa house martins spend the winter. They are too small to safely carry the type of geolocator devices used to discover the migration routes of swifts.

It is also interesting to compare the nesting habits and life styles of house martins and swifts. Swifts don't breed until they are 3-4 years old, have only one brood, and are one of the most nest site-faithful of all birds, returning to the exact same site every year. House martins breed after one year, have at least two broods and have a looser colonial nesting habit. As it takes around 1,000 beak-sized pellets of mud for martins to build their cup-shaped nests under the eaves of buildings, it's easy to see why they usually prefer to return to an existing nest. But they do move on to new locations and often pair up with a new partner each year. Nor are house martins entirely faithful to their mates: it's been estimated that three quarters of nests have chicks that were not fathered by the male partner. The

rearing of chicks differs too: unlike swifts, house martin chicks return to the nest after fledging and even help feed the next brood of chicks - which is a most unusual occurrence in birds.

Swallows (which belong to the same family as house martins) also tend to return to the same colony, with one study finding that around 40% of pairs re-occupied the same nest. The reason may be that the construction takes a lot of effort, requiring an average of 1,300 trips to gather enough pellets of nest material. The males typically undertake only about a quarter of the work, with the most attractive individuals – those with the longest tail streamers – being least helpful.

It is because swifts return to the exact same nest site year after year, and are not very adaptable, that they have declined so massively, due to the blocking up of entrance holes during house renovations. That is why we make a plea for everyone who is lucky enough to have them nesting to not interfere with the holes. Doing essential maintenance need not disturb nest sites if done carefully – the entrance holes are only tiny

crevices and under eaves they can usually be left undisturbed. We are happy to help and advise:

please pass this message on to your friends, neighbours and to landlords so that we can all help save Sedbergh's swifts.

MEMORIES OF DEBBIE WATLING

1948 to 2017 Colin Smith

Daughter of actor Jack Watling, I originally met Debbie at Essex University, in Colchester in August 1989 at a small "Doctor Who" event. She was one of only three guests, another being Richard Franklin who had featured in some episodes of the "Doctor Who" series from 1970 to 1974, alongside John Pertwee. He also featured in "Emmerdale Farm".

Debbie, however, was in the BBC1 television series in 1967/68 with Patrick Troughton and future "Emmerdale Farm" actor Fraser Hines. When she was 19 years old. The entire TV output of "Doctor Who" in the 1960's was black and white i.e. 405 lines Standard. Her character. Victoria Waterfield, was a 19th century English character from the 1860's, and as she had had a rather sheltered life in Victorian England, her encounter with Daleks, Yeti, Martian Ice Warriors and Cybermen were scary experiences for the girl, and Jamie and the 'Doctor'. Victoria ceased her travels by her own volition in the TARDIS in 1968 to leave on 20th century Earth.

Although some of Debbie's episode



of "Doctor Who" no longer reside in the BBC's archives, many of them are still available to view. We chatted at the University about her professional career and we agreed to meet up again in Sonning Berkshire three months later in November 1989, it was the month the Berlin Wall finally came down after 28 years. We went for walks around Sonning by the Thames and amongst the saffron hue, chatted about her time in "Doctor Who" made more than 20 years earlier in 19 6768. We shared food and a bottle of Muscadet out at the nearby Bistro, and recorded an interview with her at The Mill Theatre Restaurant in Sonning, where she was starring in a theatrical production of Bill Naughton's play "Spring and Port Wine", set in the 1950's.

The Mill was, and is, an intimate theatre and evokes an emotive feeling of history and warmth. Sonning is located today in Theresa May's Parliamentary constituency. Visits to her home by invitation in Essex followed: a charming cottage and a desirable place to live. In March 1990, we met up again and I met her parents, Jack and Patricia.

and meetings with her siblings followed: her sister Dilys and her brother Giles, who is now a Conservative member of Parliament in Essex

The last time I saw her was in March 1990 at Birmingham Rep Theatre where she was starring in Terence Rattigan's "Flare Path" alongside actress Kathy Staff. One afternoon, Debbie and I visited the nearby canal, and Gas Street in Birmingham, where she had filmed "Take me high" with Cliff Richard and Anthony Andrews around the year 1973. Billy Graham funded the movie.

After 1990, Debbie and I stayed in contact by letter & telephone. "Doctor Who" gradually changed her life vears after she had left the program. and change mine too.

Debbie gave me copies of many professional and private family photographs, and I still have those today. She died in the summer of 2017 at the age of just 69 years,
