MARYFELL PLAY PARK

South Lakeland District Council, in partnership with the Parish Council, proposes to refurbish the play park at Maryfell, and a consultation/survey document has been circulated to ensure that residents' views are taken into account in the design stage. The survey can be completed on line (www.southlakeland.gov.uk/maryfell). Paper copies have been distributed via Sedbergh Primary School and completed survey forms can be left at the Information Centre, the Post Office, Sedbergh Mini Market and the

Primary School. Responses are required by 8 December. SEDBERGH TOWNSCAPE PROJECT

The meeting was advised that work on the proposed resurfacing of the parking area at St Andrew's Church should commence within days and that the project had been awarded a grant of £2,500 by the YDNPA's Sustainable Development Fund.

Further discussions have taken place with the architect appointed by the Council to produce design options for the refurbishment of Joss Lane car park in order that consultation with residents and other interested parties might be undertaken.

MAIN STREET

Andi Chapple (CIC) presented a discussion paper on the possible extended use of Main Street for holding markets by securing a programme of temporary road closure orders for a number of days or

evenings each year. Members agreed, without any commitment, to seek guidance from the District Council on the procedures and costs of so doing.

JOSS LAÑE CAR PARK RECYCLING

The meeting discussed the unsightly appearance of a huge quantity of bottles that had recently been left around the glass recycling skip on the car park. Whilst the District Council had been approached regarding the frequency of collections, members also noted concerns that the recycling facilities were being improperly used for the deposit of trade and commercial waste - a matter which will require further discussion with other bodies. The possibility of clearer signage being displayed will also be considered to discourage abuse of the recycling facilities. **OTHER MATTERS**

Various other matters were discussed, including: further representations made to the YDNPA's Planning Officer regarding the former Baliol School site; the maintenance programme for Queen's

Garden; a response to SLDC's consultation on Public Space Protection Orders (for control of dogs); support for the Tennis Club's proposals for upgrading the Guldrey tennis courts; and a request from B4RN to lay cables across land





owned or leased by the Parish Council.

The rejuvenation of the hall is now well advanced and with the new filter system keeping the water clear and odourless, along with the new tariff free heating and paint scheme, the village hall has a much improved environment. Council would like to thank all those who have contributed their time freely but in particular Richard Dickinson and John Colton. without whom these improvements would not have happened. Thank you all.

Garsdale Design We provide architecture, planning,

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attended meetings recently where B4RN have enrolled volunteers to seek wayleaves from landowners, admin staff and general dog-bodies. There is a determination to start building the system shortly and intend completing as much as possible over the winter before lambing starts in earnest. Council urge any landowners who haven't signed up to this extremely valuable scheme, to do so without delay as supplying broadband at a later stage will incur huge costs as opposed to the very moderate connection fee presently charge by B4RN.

The Coal Road's resurfacing works are now complete but sadly, gaping holes in the retaining walls along The Street and numerous deep potholes

along The Back Road still exist. The next meeting will be on Thursday 18th January. Full minutes and agendas will be available on the website.

The Unofficial Bit: It was with great sadness to learn that Brenda Todd had passed away. Brenda was the wife of Thomas. local farmer and parish councillor, and had been a true matriarch of Garsdale. Personally, I was moved and staggered to see the sight of hundreds of people at her funeral. Cars were parked either side of St John's Church and stretched as far as the eve could see. The church was packed to the rafters with over a hundred people outside, standing uncomplaining in the bitter cold of the dav.



Seeing such support for Tom and his family, along with the presence of immense community spirit, put some things into perspective. The week before, my wife and I had been down in Nottingham, my birthplace, to be with our new granddaughter. We met up with some friends whom we had not seen since we moved here 4 years ago, despite protestations of them coming to visit. Their expressions of increduility were a sight to behold as we described life in the dale. "How could we possibly live with no mains water, gas or drainage?" they asked. "Ten miles to the nearest shop and no pub in walking distance!". 4 years ago we were the same as them, big house, posh car, trips to fancy restaurants

etc., running our own very busy business and generally wearing ourselves to the bone. Our only solace were the occasional trips to the dales, where we would breathe in the peace and quiet, marvel at the scenery and dream about 'one day' we could live here. Fate intervened and health issues meant that I could no longer practice as an optician and we had to sell up quickly, abandon all our patients and staff to the hands of others. When the dust began to settle, it occurred to us that our house was far too big for the 2 of us and we didn't need a posh car and a villa in Spain, what we wanted was the serenity of living in The Yorkshire Dales.

And so we moved. We realised that we were 'the new people' and wondered how we would fit in. Garsdale is purely rural, populated by farms run by families who have been here for generation after generation but we were greeted with friendship and curtesy, with a nod and a smile wherever we went. What a contrast to the ultra-busy streets of cosmopolitan Nottingham where a greeting would be responded by a look of irritation having interrupted their mobile usage!

I asked a local resident once at how we were looked upon and he replied that as long as we were prepared to 'join in' and not hide behind the door, we would be very welcome. To that end, I took up the mantle of parish clerk, helped out at the village hall, volunteered for duty with B4RN and did a few odd jobs for people around the area.

We now live in a 300 year old cottage with stone walls as wide as

your arms could stretch. We have a piece of paper with "Deeds" written on the top stating that Bens Bridge End belongs to us, but it doesn't. I can close my eyes, touch the walls and feel the presence of all the generations of people who have lived here before, all kinds of people, from farmers to shoe makers to forestry men, people who have loved, lived and died here, whose blood and ancestry have seeped into the makeup of the dales. We don't own the cottage, we are it's custodians, looking after it as best we can, ready for the next generation when it's our turn to slip away, for our blood to seep into the dale.

I know I will never be a Dalesman like Thomas Todd, who breezes past



our cottage daily on his quad bike, dog perched on the back, giving me a cheery wave and a "ow do?" Leaving aside the lack of ancestry, I could never do what many do here, leave at first light, graft all day and return at sunset looking forward to a warm fire and a hearty meal at the kitchen table and to do that day after a day. "After all" they would say "the sheep don't know it's Christmas". So, when people ask us "how on earth can you live there?" I quote John, a plumber/electrician whom I occasionally work with. He's past retirement age, but had a position with ICI, where he oversaw hundreds of workers undergoing complex projects but now he loves to potter about doing a bit here and there. So

when asked that question he replies "look around you, take in the scenery, breathe in that fresh air and listen to the peace.....this is my office".

DENT PARISH COUNCIL Graham Dalton, Chair

ROADWAYS IN DENTDALE Users have found considerable improvement in the road conditions this autumn season, which everyone will benefit from.

The annual verge and hedge cutting has been in the hands of Cumbria County Council for many years, but dissatisfaction with its execution has grown increasingly with each one. Too little, too late with a light trim only, has been a summary of it. There has been a single cutting back of the



excessive summer growth at the end of September, work which has needed tackling in August when shoots have been almost meeting those coming from the other side of the carriageway. Vision ahead has been impeded and space to pass other users considerably narrowed.

The County Council has been relieved of its responsibilities in 2017 and the work has been undertaken by a local contractor at the instruction of, and cost of, the parish council.

An initial cut was undertaken in August to remove the longest growth, which brought an immediate improvement for road users. A second one has now been made to cut growth over the carriageway right back so that it does not hang over to impede traffic. There are some bare stems as a result, but they will soon green over again. Next year should need less radical treatment, but the growth does need restricting. Walkers and cyclists should not be pushed into the centre of the road and should be passed safely by vehicles with adequate freeboard. Two cars can now pass each other comfortably along most lengths.

12 farmers attended the last council meeting to praise the work done, and regular delivery vehicle drivers are also pleased. Inevitably, there have been one or two grumbles, but they are outweighed by those pleased to see the initiative. If anyone wishes to comment, please make your views known to any parish councillor.









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The cost falls on local taxation, but the county will refund the parish what the county could have spent on the cutting. nudges house builders Andrew Fagg The Yorkshire Dales National Park

Authority (YDNPA) has contacted

landowners, developers, builders, planning agents and Housing Associations to urge them to consider building new homes in the Park. In an email, the YDNPA stresses that its planning policies have recently changed, with one of the main objectives being to increase housing supply.

The new, more flexible Local Plan sets a target of getting 55 new homes built in the National Park each year (see *note*). Last year, 39 homes were built.

A lack of affordable housing in the Dales is thought to be one of the factors affecting the ability of local communities to retain and attract young people and families. "We want to nudge builders into



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action," said YDNPA Chairman, Carl Lis. "New build housing is now permitted in more towns and villages across the National Park than ever before.

"We have put together a long list of sites that have the benefit of an existing planning permission or housing allocation. Our message is simple: if you bring forward high quality schemes for these sites, we will approve them."

The YDNPA adopted the Local Plan in December last year. Since then, proposals have been approved for 79 new homes, with new policies on converting roadside barns and other buildings to local occupancy dwellings accounting for 50 of these permissions.

Carl Lis said there were other changes that builders would find attractive: "Policies now permit more open market housing than before, making it more financially viable for developers to build the affordable and local occupancy homes that are so badly needed by local communities. Affordable and local occupancy housing is also subject to more flexible criteria. The Authority will negotiate on the mix of housing provided on development sites."



The newly appointed Council Gardener, Paul Mitchell, has also made a significant impact on the gardens, clearing areas of unwanted vegetation, hedge trimming, grass cutting and the removal of garden waste.

A HLF (Heritage Lottery Fund) enquiry application has been submitted by the Council on 15th October and a response is expected in the near future. This is the initial enquiry which will hopefully be viewed favourably and subsequently a full application will be made for substantial works of restoration recommended in Hilary Taylor's report.

During the recent Friends meeting, various issues were explored,

including; contact with other special interest groups such as the Allotment, Orchard & Sedbergh in Bloom groups, local schools, Yorkshire Dales Young Rangers, open meetings/tours of the garden with historical information, musical events in the garden with the Town Band, Spellbound Theatre Group and so forth.

The meeting concluded with a raffle win for Joyce Cox and the competition for, "Something Red", being shared between Dilys Evans and Barbara Hollett.



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

This is not an easy option (the ATW doesn't glide over obstacles and can get stuck in mud and overbalance if not properly used), nor a cheap one (an ATW can cost up to £15,000!) but for Debbie and Andy it has been life-changing. Their aim is 'Making the Inaccessible Accessible' to transform the lives of others with limited mobility. They have worked in

conjunction with Julia Bradbury and "The Outdoor Guide" on testing out accessible routes, and also for the "Miles without Stiles" guides. Debbie's enthusiasm for her project was overwhelming and inspirational. What an amazing woman! No less amazing and inspirational is her husband Andy's support for her in so many ways. 

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LEST WE FORGET Settlebeck's Remembrance Sally Ingham

As the generation of men and women who served in or experienced the two world wars dies out, it would be easy for this generation and future generations to forget the loss and sacrifice of these two global events, and in turn to ignore the continuing loss and cost of war. Increasingly, there are no longer the mothers and fathers or granddads and grannies to tell us about this period in history as there were when I was young.

This week at Settlebeck we gave Remembrance a key focus. Our head of Design and Technology, Dave Jermy, delivered a whole school assembly on Tuesday on the 67 million lost in both wars, and also on the origin of poppies, from their appearance on the battlefields after the fighting, disturbed mud being ideal ground for them, as well as how the money collected from the sale of these supports injured soldiers and their families and how the factory producing them provides work for exservicemen.

Our Wednesday lower school assembly, taken by our head of drama, Gillian Rea, was planned with the help of lower school students studying "Private Peaceful". They informed students of the causes of the First World War, the conditions in the trenches, the use of pigeons as messengers, read out letters from soldiers killed and talked of the



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poignant moment where the two enemy sides played football on Christmas Day highlighting our common humanity and the tragedy of war.

In our Friday upper school assembly, our maths teacher, George King explained one of the derivations of the poppies being worn, the act of Moina Michael, who struck by the clinical feel of the area from where American servicemen were departing. decorated it with flowers – poppies – which the departing servicemen asked to take with them. This and the final lines from McCrae's poem "In Flanders Fields", which asks that we keep faith with the soldiers, inspired the idea of them becoming a permanent symbol to remember those lost in the war or suffering as a result of it.

The poppies, as was noted in the St. Andrew's Remembrance Service, actually use paper produced at Kendal's James Cropper; 150 miles of the red paper is apparently produced for this purpose.

Four of our students represented the school at the this Remembrance service, reading two poignant poems: "Futility" by Owen and "Memorial

Tablet" by Sassoon. Two others stood alongside our Headteacher, Sarah Campbell, to read the long roll call of men from Sedbergh and the surrounding areas who died in the two world wars. They also laid two wreaths of poppies at the war memorial along with other organisations.

Our students also visit the topic of war in history and in religious studies and study some of the war poets in English. I remember being taught "Dulce et Decorum Est" and now teach it myself, still moved by its images and message.

In addition, our annual French Trip with Year 8 students includes a visit to a war museum, La Coupole, which was developed to launch a V2 rocket at London (which fortunately never happened), and to one of the war cemeteries, usually Étaples, a large cemetery which overlooks and runs down to an estuary, its rows of white gravestones a concrete reminder of the terrible losses; here we stand in silence to remember the dead. Also, we look at the books recording those buried here, sometimes finding a relation of one of the students. This year the issue of war was





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particularly highlighted as our stay in the French town of Le Touquet was diverted to Belgium due some unexploded world war bombs having been swept up near this coastal town and it being put on lock down. As a result, we ended up in Ypres which brought the issue of the wars even more to the fore, this being the city that was totally destroyed in the First World War, now amazingly rebuilt as it once was with little evidence of how it was razed to the ground. It reminded me of Coventry, where I once taught, with its symbol of the phoenix rising out of the ashes after its severe bombing in the Second World War, a tribute to human nature's refusal to be cowed

Staying in Ypres also gave us the opportunity to see trenches, stand at the Menin Gate to hear the Last Post bugle call and view the names on the walls of this imposing war memorial. In a local church, St. George's, we saw the names of young men from Sedbergh School on one of the many memorial plaques there. We also witnessed the thousands of names at the nearby cemetery of Tyne Cot which looks over towards the fields where the massacre of Passchendaele occurred.

We believe all these experiences ensure that our students do not forget the serious cost of war and the sacrifices of those who have died in these and other conflicts since.



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NATIONAL ARBORETUM

Spider, Snack and Monkeyme. *Nick Cross*

Recently I attended a Poppy Coordinator's seminar held at the National Arboretum, Alrewas near Burton-On-Trent. When the seminar was over, I took the opportunity to visit the Memorial Wall, that forms the centrepiece of the Arboretum and bears the names of all the Servicemen and Women who have been killed on active service since 1945. The numbers are quite staggering and it took me some time to seek out five friends with whom I trained and who lost their young lives in violent circumstances.

The dead are listed alphabetically

under the year of their death and beneath the year 1972 I found one with whom I served in a now little remembered conflict in the Dhofar province of Oman. The circumstances that made him a casualty are painful to remember as was the fate of another of my comrades who died in 1998, the result of the severe wounds he sustained in the same engagement. It was in that same year that Snack's parents wrote to me to tell me of his death in a nursing home at the age of 47. Of course, since that day amongst the 'djebel' when he lost the use of both legs, his left arm and the sight in his left eye, Snack was utterly dependent upon others for his

welfare; a bitter fate for an ex Royal Marine.

He was a huge man and a great personality with a shock of the reddest hair, which in the Nottinghamshire dialect gave him his nickname, and hailed from Eastwood, the mining village that gave birth to D H Lawrence. His family were all miners and immensely proud that he had succeeded in the Marines.

'Spider' died instantly. A Para from Bloxwich, (somewhere in Walsall he said), and often told of a grandfather who played football for Walsall Swifts before the War. I found his name on the wall and now have a photograph of it. Spider was, at 23, the oldest of us.

When I heard of Snack's death I tried to write down my feelings which, in a much abridged form, I repeat here. It is neither poem nor prose, but a stream of consciousness that was a first reaction to the sad news. I offer it here in Remembrance of all Servicemen and Women who have lost their lives in the retreat from Empire 1948 to.....?

'We were young then, Spider, Snack and Monkeyme. Spider the Para; Snack, the Miner's son and me.

We, inseparable three, who ran the Beacons and yomped the Moor; who payday chased the Oswestry girls and shared our fags when skint.

Alive we were, we indestructible youth; cursing the Sergeants who trained us, who bawled at us and kept us sharp. Young in the sun, bronzed in our innocence we faced every challenge and together, much muddied, we came laughing through. "We think that you're ready", our Scaffolding

"Never heard of it." Said Snack.

"Arabs." Said Spider.

"Oman." I said.

"Clever *#@!~^." They said. From wet Wales to a heat that strikes and a light that burns is but a flight away.

Here were the painted wastes over which Thesiger walked and the Badu, driving goats and sheep, for centuries have sought life.

Mountains dry and high, roads rare and dusty then, looking for insurgents. When

A flash of light! A crack, a rattle! Get down! Take cover! Cock and aim, second nature now.

Then it was done, and Spider was dead while Snack lay bleeding on the sand.

It was a grey Birmingham day that laid him to rest. The last post sounded and, with wreath adorned, Spider was gone.

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His Mother asked me how he died. Too young I was to recollect what only long years have taught. "He was my mate." I said and through her tears, I hope, his Mother understood.'

Last month in Lookaround I wrote about the pressure I was putting on ministers to deliver on the issues that people have raised with me. Chasing them up on improving broadband speeds, asking them to look into the plans to stop the provision of 24 hour consultant psychiatric care in Cumbria, calling on ministers to abandon plans to cut our schools' budgets, the list goes on. To be honest I think this is going to be the key part of my job over the coming months and years as sadly ministers really don't seem to be that interested in anything other than fighting amongst themselves.

So I have been keeping up with the questioning, I asked one of the

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ministers in the Department for Exiting the European Union what reassurances he could give our hill sheep farmers to give them confidence and encouragement. I was really disappointed to learn that he could not give them any or at least all he was prepared to say was that the Government "wishes to have a deep and special partnership with the European Union". This when our local farmers face a 52% tariff on anything they sell to the EU if we move to World Trade Organisation rules which is a big worry when 90% of what they export goes to the EU at the moment. I can see I will need to keep up the pressure there.

My question to the Minister in the Justice Department about getting the court in Kendal re-opened gained a similarly poor and uncaring response.

But the thing that has been the key focus of my time has been re-starting our campaign to get a radiotherapy



unit built at our hospital in Kendal. Anyone who had read this column in Lookaround will be well aware of the success of our campaign to get the chemotherapy unit built but everyone knew at the time that we really could not say we had done the job until we also had a radiotherapy unit. Radiotherapy is a key element to any treatment of cancer, about 40% of people who get treated for cancer will have radiotherapy. This is why it is simply wrong that we currently have to travel to Preston to get this treatment. The National Radiotherapy Advisory Group recommends that noone should have to travel for more than 45 minutes to receive radiotherapy treatment. Just try getting to Preston from Sedbergh or Dent in 45 minutes without running the risk of being done for speeding! We have launched a petition calling

on NHS England to bring radiotherapy to the Westmorland General Hospital. If you haven't signed it already (several thousands have) then please go online to find it and sign. In addition I have held a drop-in session for people with experience of cancer treatment around here, I have asked the Health Minister to ensure that travel times are part of the criteria for delivering radiotherapy in this country. I even hosted a radiotherapy event in the Houses of Parliament to make MPs more aware of the benefits of radiotherapy treatment.



People ask the same question when it comes to Jesus Christ, "Why should I listen to you?" "What authority do you have to tell me what to do? What benefit would I get if I listened to vou?"

Prostitutes, fraudulent tax collectors. children, business men & women, the poor, the sick, those fighting for independence & some religious leaders came to Jesus, were loved by Jesus, were challenged by Jesus to live differently, & they were changed. They started living a life that is less selfish & they begin to think about & try & meet other people's needs.

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
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ROSE COMMUNITY THEATRE Sandra Gold-Wood

A highlight of the programme was the chance to see the book of original engineering drawings for structures on the Garsdale-Hawes Branch, opened in 1878. The book itself (which is a yard



wide, two yards when open, and two feet high) is old, fragile and in need of skilled professional conservation/ restoration to safeguard the drawings inside. However with modern techniques it has now been digitally scanned for permanent reference. If funds become available, replica copies can be made, to be used for research or exhibition purposes and, importantly, to ensure that a replica copy is kept elsewhere in case of loss or damage to the original drawings.

Formal consent has been granted for restoration to be undertaken and two experienced conservators appointed. I am convening a group to raise funds by launching an Appeal for the £3,100 required. Advice and support have been received in planning the project, from staff at the North Yorkshire County Record Office, the Dales Countryside Museum (DCM, Hawes), Network Rail Archives, the trustees of the Macfie-Calvert Collection (held at the DCM) and others – a tremendously encouraging start.

The reason for publicising this work is that the Garsdale-Hawes branch line at the head of Wensleydale was

built by the Midland Railway Company, and by contractors who also built many miles of the Settle-Carlisle line. If, because of this local connection, any readers would like to contribute to the costs of restoration and conservation of The Book of Bridges (as it has become known), donations would be greatly appreciated. The Friends of the Dales Countryside Museum (a registered charity, which can claim Gift Aid) have agreed to act as bankers for this appeal; cheques should be made out to them and sent to the treasurer of the FoDCM. Mr. Graeme Thompson c/o the DCM, Hawes, N.Yorkshire DL8 3NT.

others or ourselves.

We are all now very adept at celebrating Christmas, but how many of us take some quiet time beforehand to reflect on the dying year? To meditate on what has gone before? To sit in stillness and peace to connect with our own souls again? Or to consider what we may want to relinquish?

At the Meditation Centre we offer our Winter Solstice 'mini retreat'. In the beauty and peace of our candle-lit space, we provide a place for you to step aside from the busy-ness of the pre-Christmas period for a while. Together, we take time to sit, go inwards, enjoy the peace and prepare ourselves for the celebrations of the new year to come.

Today it is very easy to draw the curtains on a winter's night, turn on the TV or computer and think very little about the significance of this time of year. DECEMBER GARDENING

During a mild spell in November, I was surprised to find a good number of winged blackfly sitting sunning themselves on one of my sheets. I had thought that the season for aphids was past but these had obviously been waiting for a fair day, before taking to the air for pastures new. They didn't get very far!

Generally, aphids – greenfly, blackfly (and sometimes brownfly and pinkfly and woolly white ones) do not hibernate as adults out of doors and, being poor fliers, they do not take flight and head for the sunny south to



avoid the cold. Many species overwinter as eggs on the host plants that they intend to attack when they emerge with the first signs of spring.

There are over 500 different kinds of aphid and many are specific to one, or often two, host plants. Waterlily aphids need plum or blackthorn trees on which to overwinter as eggs whereas Honeysuckle aphids need the roots of wild Hemlock (or another plant in the same family) on which to last out the winter.



Aphids have the potential to multiply at an alarming rate with new female babies being able to produce young parthenogenetically (without the aid of a mate) within a week of being born. Thankfully lots of things like to eat them, and other things take their toll, but they can still be a big, persistent problem on many plants. Where eggs may be overwintering on dormant buds of trees and bushes (fruit trees and Viburnum bushes are commonly affected), a Winter wash, sprayed over the twigs can be very effective. Do this sometime during the winter months, on a mild, calm day, and you will, at least eradicate most of the eggs which are waiting to hatch and feed on the newly emerging leaves in Spring. OCTOBER WEATHER

What a month weather-wise!! I have never recorded so much rain since moving here 22 years ago!! For the month I recorded 11.8inches (300mm) and of this 5.8" (133mm) fell on Wednesday 11th, a record in itself. The dial on the manual rain gauge went round and started again and the electronic gauge simply couldn't cope exists and so it goes into my

with the downfall. It was swamped. We also only had 5 days when we didn't measure any rainfall. Temperatures generally held up reasonably well but we did have our first frost. We had a maximum of 65.5F (18.5C) and a minimum of27.9F (-2.3C). Wind chill took the temperature below zero on 4 nights. Winds were generally from the North West with only 5 days from a more Southerly direction with a maximum gust of 25.7MPH (41.4kph).

The rain, of course, produced a few problems not only did it swamp our septic tank but it flooded the field vet again. The stream from the overflow of Oakdene's pond should flow under the road but I suspect this no longer



neighbour's field and thence into mine flooding a large part of the field marooning the sheep. The lake was deep enough to go over a welly and the stream was moving so quickly that an apple I dropped was washed away before I could bend down and pick it up!! The winter flowering jasmine has been in flower for some weeks now. There is still a daisy in flower. A few small flocks of fieldfares and redwings have passed through. The sparrowhawk keeps putting in an

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appearance. It is obvious that our neighbour's feeders are not in use judging by the visitations we are getting especially from sparrows. The redpolls haven't been about so perhaps they have moved on. The owls are calling as if setting up territories. The frost put an end to the flowering pots and baskets so they will need to be cleared and anything hardy salvaged. As mentioned previously it has been a poor year for



butterflies and the honeybees haven't faired too well as the stores they have collected one day they have eaten the next as the weather has prevented them flying regularly hence honey is in short supply apparently.

Sedbergh's enthusiasm for fresh local apple juice continues! On Saturday 28 October our splendid Town Cryer made sure everyone knew about the 2nd annual Apple Day, in the People's Hall. A record 400 kg of apples were turned into more 200 litres of delicious juice, and all these

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apples were grown locally, in town gardens and country orchards from Killington to Cautley, and from Millthrop to Loftus Hill. Some were brought on the day, while others had been gleaned by COGS members during the autumn. Outside the Hall, a busy crew worked at the scratter – the noisy machine for chopping apples into pulp – and the hydropress, which used water pressure to squash the pulp. It was astonishing to see how much juice gushed out! The dry spent pulp was collected for pig food – lucky pigs!

Inside, there was plenty to see and do. Visitors could bring their apples to be identified by experts Andy Gilchrist and Hilary Wilson from SLOG: many people will recognise a Bramley, but who knew that Howgate Wonder, Lord Derby and Lane's Prince Albert grew in Sedbergh? There was a wonderful array of plants to buy from Chris Hollett's plant stall, and in the Children's Corner there was a



competition for the longest apple peel, as well as other creative crafts. The Sedbergh Beekeepers stall showed us that without bees and their pollinating work, there would be no apples and Expert Composters Susan Blunt and her colleague on the Garden Organic stall showed us the importance of compost. The Red Squirrel Group and Cumbria Wildlife Trust reminded everyone of the beauty and richness of our natural surroundings, and the Royal British

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Legion were on hand to sell poppies. Delicious cakes and quiches, tea and coffee were produced by the tireless kitchen team, and everyone enjoyed the music of Common Ground.

CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST Orchids in Cumbria *Emma Palmer, Sedbergh Group* Peter Bullard, Cumbria Wildlife Trust Director visited Sedbergh this autumn to talk about orchids in Cumbria. Peter is a renowned local botanist and spoke of a life long passion for orchids, something which many people in the audience shared.

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There are either 30 /33 [it's a long story...] species of orchids found in Cumbria; ranging from those which number in the thousands to several orchids who only just survive. Sadly,

some have already been lost including the wonderfully named Lady's Bed Slipper Orchid, which was very popular with Victorian amateur collectors. The primary threat to orchids now is intensive agriculture.

motorways junctions of Shap and Tebay are also excellent orchid spotting sites but do take care.

The most common orchids in Cumbria are the Early Purple (flowers in April) and prefers limestone and woodland areas. This is followed by the Northern Marsh Orchid which flowers in June and the Common and Heath Spotted Orchids. It is not unusual to come across large patches of these orchids. Slightly rarer orchids include the Dark Red Helleborine, the Fragrant Orchid(s), the Lesser Butterfly Orchid and the velvety Fly Orchid. These descriptive names capture the shape and colour of each species, which mimics its preferred pollinator. Finally there are some exceptionally rare orchids including the Small White Orchid and Autumn Ladies Tresses.

Apart from M6 junctions other good places to see orchids locally are in some of the Cumbria Wildlife Trust nature reserves:

- Waitby Greenriggs west of Kirby Stephen. Wide variety from June to August including some rarer species.
- Hutton Roof Crags an excellent but somewhat disorientating site for dark red helleborines in late July to August. See the excellent website by Brian Yorke for more details: https:// epipactisatrorubens.blogspot.co.u

- Latterbarrow close to Foulshaw Moss for up to 10 species.
- Humphrey Head for the rare Green Winged Orchid.

SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS Tanva Hoare

You have probably heard of Edward Jenner, the country doctor who, in 1796, began his work that led to the development of smallpox vaccination. In an experiment which would be frowned upon today, he injected the scrapings from a milkmaid's cowpox blisters into the arms of the 8 year old son of his gardener. When the lad was subsequently injected with infective material from a smallpox victim, he suffered no ill effects.

Why are we writing about Jenner in an article devoted to swifts? Because as well as being a doctor he was also an accomplished ornithologist who published pioneering studies on the cuckoo and on bird migration.

In 1788 he was elected to membership of the Royal Society, the pre-eminent scientific body of the day. not for his momentous work on vaccination, but for a study on the cuckoo. Up to then it had been thought that it was the adult cuckoo which pushed the eggs from the parasitized nest. Jenner established that it was the newly hatched cuckoo chick which did so using a special depression on its back, which filled out after 12 days, and in which the egas to be ejected could be lodged.

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At a time when migration was poorly understood, Jenner then turned to studying swifts. He was a pupil and friend of John Hunter, an eminent surgeon and anatomist and regarded as the father of scientific surgery. In a famous quote in a letter to Jenner he wrote "... but why think? Why not try the *experiment?*" Jenner did exactly that with swifts. He marked 12 swifts by clipping two claws from each and discovered that the same birds returned to the same nests over subsequent years, one swift being followed for 7 years. Only one person previously had marked birds for the study of migration (see below). Ringing did not start until 1899. In Jenner's time many naturalists



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swifts appeared in May they were plump and well nourished, surely not what would be expected of a bird which had just emerged from a period of torpor and prolonged starvation. A German, Johann Frisch was the first person to mark birds to discover what happened to them in winter. He tied red thread around the legs of swallows, and found the colour had not faded by the following year, thus making it unlikely that the bird had spent the winter submerged in water.

If birds did not spend the winter hidden in a torpid state where were they? Jenner knew from his nephew, a naval officer, that many healthy land birds occurred hundreds of miles out at sea. Jenner believed this clear ability for birds to fly long distances was evidence that birds migrated. He even went so far as to say that a bird's true home was elsewhere, and that birds such as the swift left home for three months solely for the purpose of breeding.

He was however puzzled as to how young birds found their way home on their first migration. He noticed that swallows and house martins collected together before migration and thus the fledglings might possibly learn by migrating with experienced birds. However he had no answer for the cuckoo, where the adults left before even the young had made their maiden flights. Thus he had to accept



that the departure of fledglings was due to an "unknown principle", one in fact that scientists are still trying to unravel in all its complexity to this day.

So when you have your flu vaccination this winter, give a thought to Edward Jenner, health pioneer and expert experimental ornithologist.

progress in and around Sedbergh <i>Douglas Thomson</i> This article reports on B4RN's progress in and around Sedbergh. Firbank <i>Alan Tallersall</i> Following our public meeting last December Firbank and Lowgill have made remarkable progress in gaining support from the communities for the introduction of broadband though out this area. There is a very high take up of people wanting to have the fantastic B4RN hyperspeed broadband and as community involvement has grown we have raised enough finance through residents investing in shares to make	October. We have begun by installing the ducts to bring the live broadband from Killington to the cabinet at Waterside. This cabinet, although based at Waterside in Firbank has been provided by the YDNP for the benefit of ourselves and the three neighbouring communities of Howgill, Marthwaite and Killington. We are particularly grateful for landowners who have granted us free wayleave over their property. Wherever possible local farmers are using their mole ploughs and diggers to install the system, backed up by a growing band of volunteers. The terrain is difficult so we welcome more volunteers to join us to get tasks done. Many of the tasks are simple and but we also take
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advantage of B4RN training courses for the more difficult tasks. Although winter is approaching we hope to continue pressing on when weather permits.

As well as working to take the broadband to all homes that want it in Firbank and Lowgill we are also working to install ducting from the cabinet to supply all our neighbouring parishes. We have already nearly completed the installation of a duct from our border with Killington to our cabinet. This is in readiness to receive and send out fibres to all the properties in our area and Killington and when other areas are ready we will also supply Howgill and Marthwaite and provide a connection to the Sedbergh cabinet to provide even more security.

After we have installed around our area we had planned to terminate at the motorway. However, as many other parishes have done, we will pass on a link to the adjoining properties in Grayrigg and others further north.



Though there is not much to see considerable progress is being made with bringing the hyperfast broadband to Sedbergh Town.

A small amount of ducting has been laid through Sedbergh School's estate which will connect to the service coming up from the south and run east to the cabinet on Winder Drive.

Planning is going well to build a ring of fibre around Sedbergh. From the ring spurs will supply the service into the town but only if your local sector





organises itself to install the ducting.

Sedbergh has been divided into sectors – see map. Each sector will need an individual or group to organise the installation. This will mainly be organising for the ducting to be buried in gardens and connected to properties. There will be plenty of support and training from local experienced volunteers and from B4RN staff but the work on the ground has to be done the local community – that means you!

A fellow volunteer forwarded a Times article last weekend headed "Hawes for thought" and it's worth a read. Hawes is described as a phenomenon - a case study of selfsufficiency, community spirit, bloody mindedness and the awesome power of bootstraps and it made me think how we would describe our own community. We tend to focus more on the failures than the successes but if we stand back and think of what is actually going on in our small community – we are collectively amazing!

We run a community bus service called the Western Dales – manned and managed by local volunteers, we have run an Information Centre for tourists and locals since the National Park abandoned us, we run a book shop and a charity shop with profits to the tune of thousands each year going to support local groups and organisations, we have raised almost half a million pounds to upgrade The People's Hall where amongst a host of events a local community group run a cinema, we have built and run a new Peoples Gym, we have a local history group which operate a history



room where people from all over the world come and research their roots, we host the local community police in the Information Centre and we run a first responders group. I'm sure there is more ...

And now there is a very large group of volunteers bringing high speed fibre broadband to us all. What has been so heart-warming is the breadth of support for this project from across the community. It seems to have no boundaries and no borders.

Team F is the area more or less from Peggleside on the Dent road, through Millthrop to Frostrow linking Hallbank and Farfield and onward to Longstone Common. We are currently planning the route with the help of the landowners. There are over 140 properties which will have the ability of a connection if this is wanted. The land owners have been almost unanimously agreeable to bringing ducting through their fields and gardens. Some of the landowners see no personal benefit yet have been generous enough to let their land be used to help others. This is true community spirit and something that we can be hugely proud of.

New volunteers are always needed – there is a lot of work to do when the digging starts.
