

Proposed Street Closures – Finkle Street

Shelagh Cobb attended the meeting on behalf of Sedbergh CIC (Information Centre and Artisan Markets) to seek support for examining the possibility of closing Finkle Street, on seven Saturdays a year, to enable an expansion of the existing popular Artisan Markets. Six would run from April to September and one in December. Previously. Sedbergh CIC had asked Members to consider the closure of Main Street for the markets but it was now considered that the road diversions required for this would be problematic. SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL Janey Hassam, Clerk to the Council Self-build housing - what is it and could it contribute to local housing needs?

There are various forms of self-build housing where an individual, a group of individuals, or persons working with or for individuals, build or complete houses to be occupied as homes by those individuals. The initial owner of the home always has a primary input into its final design and layout (and usually its



construction also).

For example, it might be a single dwelling where a builder completes the shell of the house and the internal fitting out, wiring, plumbing etc. is undertaken by the individual who is to occupy the unit. Alternatively, it might be a small number of units where the work is undertaken by a group of individuals with different skills working in partnership. The aim in all cases is to reduce the overall cost of the dwelling so as to make it affordable for the individual who is to occupy it.

Self-build initiatives are often associated with innovative designs for sustainable, energy –efficient homes and with 'co-housing' schemes (where independent living space combines with shared community

facilities). Government policy aims to increase the number of selfbuild homes. The Yorkshire Dales



National Park Authority would welcome such proposals being put forward for discussion.

Many people might not be aware that the Self-build and Custom Housebuilding Act 2015, as amended, requires 'relevant authorities' to keep a register of individuals and associations of individuals who are seeking to acquire serviced plots of land in the authority's area and to have regard to that register when carrying out their functions. The



Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority maintains such a register and individuals interested in selfbuild housing may apply to be included (full details available by contacting the Authority at Bainbridge or by visiting the YDNPA website).

Sedbergh Parish Council wishes to ascertain if there is enthusiasm locally for a self-build initiative and, if there is, the Council would be pleased to arrange an informal meeting of interested persons and to invite representatives of the housing and planning authorities to offer advice and exchange ideas. JANUARY WEATHER

As to be expected January was a cold month with a maximum recorded temperature of 48.7F (9.27C) and several days when it did not get

above freezing all day. The minimum recorded was 19.4F (-7C). Every night the wind chill took the temperature below freezing. Quite a breezy month overall with only 4 days when the maximum gust did not get into double figures. The maximum recorded gust was 28.0mph (45.06kph) from a North Westerly direction as was every other gust except on 6 days. We had 6.73 inches (171.6mm) of assorted precipitation. There were only 6 days on which we did not receive any rain, snow or whatever.

Another month battling with the elements as the mud continues to increase. Speaking to one retired farmer recently he reckons he has never seen everywhere so wet. The feeding station still gets plenty of visits requiring nearly daily refills. I trust you all did your garden survey at the end of the month. Ours was dominated by sparrows and blue tits but the brief visit of a family of long tailed tits was welcome. We seem to have had a kestrel fly through occasionally recently. The sparrow hawk hasn't put in an appearance. They don't seem to be around the same area together. It was good to see a goldcrest, if only briefly. Yet another couple of rabbits were seen around with myxomatosis. It seems strange to see it during the winter. The early snowdrops put in a bright appearance. Daffodils are well up and budding and crocuses have pushed leaves through. The rooks and jackdaws are showing signs of starting to nest as are the collared doves and woodpigeons. They are always early starters.

collective approach amongst local authorities to increase Council Tax on second homes in the National Park, while acknowledging the "hurt" it has caused some home owners.

The proposal – which the National Park Authority considered formally just before Christmas – has been revised following further talks between civic leaders this month.

Richmondshire District Council will now be the first of the constituent local authorities in the Park to take a formal vote on the final proposition, at a full council meeting on 27 February. That proposition is to "work alongside the other Councils and YDNPA to enter into discussions with Government on the options available



for increasing Council Tax for second homes within the boundary of the Yorkshire Dales National Park".

In the open letter, Mr Lis said: "It has never been in doubt that you love the Yorkshire Dales and want the best for the community in which you have your second home. Many of you have deep roots here, and contribute to the local economy when you are here.

"It is also true that the high proportion of second homes in the National Park is only one of the factors contributing to the decline of some of our towns and villages.

"However, there is one further fact that we cannot shy away from, no matter how uncomfortable: too many second homes are bad for local communities. Plenty of studies have shown it to be the case. Those of us who have the honour to represent communities within the National Park – including the Leaders of Craven, Richmondshire and South Lakeland District Councils – see that impact with our own eyes every day.

"For every new home that we build in the National Park, two existing homes become second homes or holiday lets. That leaves us with only two options. We do something, or we shrug our shoulders and do nothing. If this generation of political leaders chooses the latter option, then the problems caused by too many second homes will only be passed to those that come after us.

"People have asked why the National Park Authority is getting involved in this issue. The answer is simple: the natural beauty, wildlife and cultural heritage of the Park cannot be effectively conserved and



enhanced without strong, viable local communities.

"In the past few years, we have seen some local services cut back or closed. We have, sadly, seen schools shut. To 'blame' the problem solely on the growing number of second homes would be absurd. But denying that second homes are part of the problem would be equally absurd."

He continued: "Building more houses; creating greater economic opportunities; extending broadband and mobile telecommunications; and better marketing the area all have to be part of the solution to the challenges we face. However, ignoring the impact of the ever increasing number of second homes is simply not to acknowledge 'the elephant in the room.'

"I have heard the objection that this is 'social engineering'. But as Craven District Council leader, Richard Foster, has said, cutting a local bus service is social engineering. Shutting a school is social engineering. Leaving a village centre home empty for much of the year is social engineering.

"You might have argued that the proposal could make everyone poorer, because it could bring down the value of everyone's home. I'd like to challenge the logic in that argument. We have a target to build 55 new homes in the Park each year. No one has yet provided any evidence that that policy will bring



down house prices. Indeed, the local authorities have plans to build approximately 5,000 new homes in total across their areas in the next five years and nobody ever argues that shouldn't happen because of the possible effect on house prices. In other words, why should having more homes available through the sale or letting of second homes have any greater impact on house prices than having more homes available through new builds? The number of second homes in the park – around 1500 – is high as a proportion of the total, but is not high enough to dramatically alter house prices should a number of them be put up for sale.

to my first point. I have listened to

your concerns - and I acknowledge that the proposal has caused some hurt, as it places the needs of the community above your own. The need to attract more people to live permanently in the Dales – and to retain those already here - is urgent. If the proposal results in some existing second homes being brought back into full-time occupancy, then everyone who loves the Dales will have cause to celebrate."

People are being asked to commit two or three days of their time each survey season over the coming years. Full training will be given.

Anyone with an interest in the environment – perhaps students, local families, existing Dales Volunteers or natural history groups – are invited to come forward.

"Volunteers are right at the heart of our conservation work," said lan Court, Wildlife Officer at the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority. "We want to give people the skills, confidence and opportunities to help the natural world. The more people that get involved the better. There are opportunities right across the National Park, so we will look to match people with the sites nearest to where they live."

In summary, volunteers are needed for the following areas of work:

- Wading Birds: people who can identify the common upland breeding waders like Curlew and Lapwing are needed to help with assessments, which will be used to support agri-environment scheme applications.
- Butterflies: people are needed to assist with counts of the Northern Brown Argus and Small Pearlbordered Fritillary.
- Plants: people are needed to assist with surveys of priority plant species.
- Habitat surveys: people are

needed to undertake general plant surveys that will be used to support the delivery of agrienvironment schemes and the Plantlife National Plant Monitoring Scheme.

Ian Court added: "Here is a chance to get up close to wildlife and do something positive by helping to monitor some of the really important bird, butterfly and plant populations in the Yorkshire Dales National Park. We cannot continue to conserve and enhance wildlife unless we know how the populations of these species are faring. Monitoring data will help us carry out and support targeted conservation management for the benefit of these species."

"Mad March Hares" Fact or Fiction? Dr Myles Ripley

Mad? Who knows what madness is ... but people are often referred to as madly in love so we can use the term to describe some of the actions of the Brown Hare (*Lepus europaeus*) in its courtship/breeding season. Unlike most courtship with ritual fighting between male animals, in hares it is the over-amorous unwanted males being beaten off by



unreceptive females! The female is only receptive for a few hours in a 6 week reproductive cycle. During this time, she will allow copulation with the 'fittest' male present, usually tested by a chase across open land. The successful breeding results in a litter



of normally 2 to 4 leverets after a gestation period of 42 days. Birthing forms lined with fur are used for the first few weeks and after that the mother moves individual leverets to separate forms to reduce the overall risk to predators. "Despite the reduction in their numbers one of the most delightful signs of spring remains the sight of hares leaping in the air, apparently engaged in a boxing match. Once seen it is obvious why "Mad as a March hare" is an expression the British have used for 600 years." Brown Hares are a species that should have benefited from Higher Level Stewardship schemes by virtue of their habitat being protected. They live above ground and need sufficient shelter to allow them to shelter in their "forms" which are

shallow depressions amongst grasses. Their preferred habitat is an area where woodland edges and/or hedgerows exist alongside natural grassland. They feed on various plants and nibble on bark from young trees and bushes. They can be distinguished from rabbits not only by the fact that they do not go down burrows but their longer ears and hind legs.

In 2010 the Westmorland Gazette published an article suggesting that their numbers are beginning to recover since habitat protection has



been increased and coursing being made illegal. Tullie House in Carlisle coordinates records of Brown Hares in Cumbria. However, the mammal data collected by the British Trust for Ornithology shows a distinct decreasing trend over all of the UK and in the NW, though the Game and wildlife conservation trust (using data from game bags) shows a slight increase in the last ten years.



people come to pray. It is a splendid event, with hundreds of people, press and tourists celebrating the return once more of these wonderful birds back to their breeding places. There are about 88 pairs nesting in the wall and Israel is the most southern country where the common swift breeds. The picture shows the mayor of Jerusalem addressing the crowd.

Among the various outings we will also be visiting the tree of hope, an olive tree sculpture of swifts depicting peace, shown in the picture. Because swifts arrive a lot earlier in Israel we feel especially fortunate to have this additional chance to enjoy them, and visit some of the large colonies there.

We have also been to the previous international swift conferences in Berlin, Szcecin (Poland) and Cambridge. It was in Cambridge that we helped set up the UK swift local network (SLN) – an email forum where swift groups and individual enthusiasts from all over the UK can swap news, advice and ideas. It's a very useful network and Sedbergh

Community Swifts has been able to pass on our experience and details of the things that we have achieved here, as well as benefitting from advice in return.

We give a lot of talks about swifts, not just in the north-west but all over the country, illustrating the lives of swifts with film clips from our cameras in the nest sites. What is especially heartening is when people in the audience are sufficiently enthused to set up their own swift group. We hope that by describing the amazing life of swifts and the threats they face, and explaining what our group has been doing in Sedbergh, it will prove to be a stimulus for others to follow suit. Swifts are in trouble and urgently

Willows would be high on my list. Large trees such as the lovely "Golden Weeping Willow" Salix alba

For information contact Susan Stoddard – 01524 271077 manager@fairbanksociety.com ~ www.fairbanksociety.com 'Tristis') and "Crack Willow" (*Salix fragilis*) will be too big for the given space, but most willows are very tolerant of pruning, and cultivars such as *S. alba* 'Britzensis' (Scarlet Willow), which you might notice is parks and gardens at this time of year for its bright flame/orange twigs, *S.alba vitellina* (Golden Willow) and *S. daphnioides* (Violet Willow) can all be coppiced every two or three years to keep them good, small and colourful.

Smaller, shrubby willows will also be accommodated. *Salix fargesii* is most attractive in winter, when its leafless, red stems with large red buds are easily seen. In summer it bears large - five to six inch long, dark green, glossy, deeply veined leaves.

Some willows are cultivated for their catkins. "Musk Willow" (*Salix aegyptiaca*) bears fragrant, conspicuous,bright yellow catkins on bare grey stems in February and March. "Black Willow" (*Salix gracilistyla* 'Melanostachys') has bare stems with small catkins which turn from jet black to crimson to yellow.

"Woolly Willow" (*Salix lanata*) has long been a favourite in my garden. It bears large, pale yellow catkins amongst the newly unfolding, grey, felted leaves. It is one of the slower growing shrubby willows and has an attractive, low, spreading habit.

The past month has been very much taken up with health matters.

The campaign to get a radiotherapy unit at the hospital in Kendal continues but there are also quite a few other issues that need dealing with urgently.

I was really upset to find out that the mental health facilities for young people in our part of the world are the worst in Cumbria. If you are young and need to access specialist mental health services in South Cumbria you can only do it on weekdays between 9 and 5. In the north of Cumbria young people can access the services they need between 9 and 8 and even at weekends. We all know that anyone experiencing a mental

health issue needs help there and then and it is even more important when the person is young. I have heard too many stories of parents struggling to cope with their children facing mental health issues when there is no help professional help available.

I have raised the issue with the various NHS bodies involved in this issue and have even raised it with the Health Secretary, Jeremy Hunt. So far everyone has agreed that it's a problem and we are letting our children down but I haven't seen enough progress. I have set up a petition to put some more pressure on them all to sort it out. It would be great if you could join the nearly 2000 people who have signed it. Just


search the internet for "Tim Farron Young People Mental Health Petition" and follow the links. We owe it to our kids to stop what is really discrimination against them.

I have also been doing what I can to help our local pharmacies. I had always assumed that when they make up your prescription they would get back from the NHS the cost of the drugs they give you. But amazingly this isn't the case, one pharmacist in the constituency told me that in a month they were receiving £5000 less from the NHS than they were having to pay out for the drugs they give to you. Over the past couple of years our pharmacies have seen their incomes from the NHS fall by 20%.



Many of the smaller local ones like those we have around here are really beginning to struggle and we simply cannot afford to see them close. I have tabled a motion in Parliament calling on the Government to do more to support essential local pharmacies but I can see that this is only the beginning of this fight.

Beyond health, amongst other things, I have been pressing the Government to make some proper commitments on broadband speeds, I have been supporting the YDNP in their plans to increase the council tax charged to second home owners and I have been meeting up with the nice folk from Dent Brewery when they came down set up a stall in

Kevin J. Lancaster & Mel Mackie On May 3 there will be all out elections for South Lakeland District

Council as opposed to election of one third of councillors. This will be the third set of boundary changes since I was elected in 1997 and the most difficult to justify. Here in the Lune Valley we have had a three member ward since 2008, now all South Lakeland is to put into three or two member wards. As councillors who had worked in a three member ward for some time Mel Mackie and I were asked by those promoting the change to explain the advantages. We replied that there were no advantages and we considered them to be a disaster for the council and electors alike. The officer did not get back to us.

The Boundary Commission gave the

district two options, either go to all out elections every four years on single member wards or else continue with election by thirds but have three member wards imposed. The controlling group chose the latter, under the absurd belief that three member wards would not be imposed. They have been. It is the position of my group that if it is in our power after May 3 to change this and go for all out elections we will. Sincerely we believe it is vital that as



Following a well-attended and enjoyable Annual Over 60's Christmas lunch on December 9th, our opening meeting of the year in January was a talk about the Cave Rescue Organisation by Roy Holmes, which I unfortunately missed, but I understand it was extremely well received by those who attended. We owe a lot to the volunteer rescue services, either underground or above ground (and CRO do both), who turn out in all weathers when a "shout" is received.

Our February meeting I whimsically called "Blacksmithery" and asked our resident Dent blacksmith, Lucy Sandys-Clarke, to come and talk to us about her work. Now I have always thought of the blacksmith in the traditional sense, but Lucy proved me wrong and the items she brought showed not only her artistry in metal, but the great delicacy of some of the things she has been commissioned to manufacture. From work for replacement ironmongery for the National Trust to the manufacture of a metal cape for a Burberry fashion show in London, we were entranced by the variety of jobs she has completed over the past twelve months.

As with most self-employed people, you never turn work down and I can well understand her reaction turning from elation to anxiety when the enormity of the Burberry job became apparent, but she pressed on and delivered their commission, albeit not



without the odd anxious moment during the manufacturing process. Being prisoner in your part-finished creation whilst working on your own, but fortunately having a Dent local passer-by to release you, was one of the more bizarre moments of the job!

By contrast the production of butterfly hinges showed the delicacy employed of what is basically a heating and hammering process as the hammers used were not particularly small and I neither do I think any of us realised how many regional types of latch there are, from Norfolk and Cumbrian to "snecklifters". All in all, a good afternoon and I never cease to admire the many and varied local artisans, artists and craftsmen and women of Dentdale.

Our next meeting is on March 2nd, where David Wright will be talking to us about his interest in Icons, which promises to be a very interesting meeting.

LYNN NEWCOMBE

Memorial to Lynn Newcombe: west side of Winder


A short distance above the gate at the head of the green lane on the west side of Winder, set amongst the tall grasses, is a memorial stone. Inscribed upon it are the words:

In loving memory of Lynn Newcombe. Who died here 15th September 1991 age 30 years. Forever in our hearts.

Along with Nick Brown I went to photograph this stone in January. I knew nothing of Lynn, nor did Nick. So who was Lynn and what happened to her on that fateful day? I would like to thank Elspeth Griffiths and Jeremy Prall for piecing together the elements of the mystery.

Lynn was not a local girl but she and her partner Rob were staying in the Sedbergh area to attend the wedding





of a university friend in Killington, the daughter of Mr and Mrs Mather. Lynn and Rob walked up Winder on the Sunday after the wedding. She had felt unwell and had turned back on her own but tragically she collapsed with heart failure on the western ridge of Winder, not far above the fell wall. When she was found, a doctor was called but it was too late to resuscitate her.

In Lynn's memory a bench was placed at the site of her collapse.

By 2009 the bench had perished from nearly 20 years of wind and rain. Jeremy got in touch with Gwen and Brian Newcombe, Lynn's parents, who were living at Lindfield in Sussex, to report that the bench had collapsed and to ask if he could help should the family decide if they would like the bench to be replaced by a new memorial. The family suggested having a modest stone. Consequently Edward Waller, of Able Memorials,



along with Jeremy found a suitable stone at Carlin Gill, on the edge of the beck near the bridge. Edward fixed the original memorial plate from the bench onto the stone which he then erected on the same site as the bench.

Sadly Lynn's parents were not well enough to travel to Sedbergh to see the new memorial. But they asked if it might be possible for the vicar to bless the stone. Elspeth arranged this with Canon Alan Fell. So on the 15th September 2011, a warm and sunny day, Canon Fell, Elspeth and Jeremy walked up to the newly installed memorial where Canon Fell conducted the following service of dedication:

The Invocation: We meet in the name of the Father, creator and sustainer of all things; in the name of the Son, who shared our human life and brought to us the knowledge and love of God; in the name of the Holy Spirit, who comes to our minds with every good thought and worthy inclination. Amen.

The sentence of our coming today: As Moses climbed the slopes of Sinai to meet Yahweh in the eternally

burning bush, to receive the divine law and the commission of God; as the apostles Peter, James and John were taken up a high mountain, there to see the Lord transfigured in His divinity before them, and as the crowds followed Jesus to hear Him teach the ways of the Kingdom on the Mount of the Beatitudes; so we come today, with our minds open, to this high place of encounter, companionship, beauty and fresh disclosure.

A Psalm Of David: I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help. My help cometh even from the Lord, who hath made heaven and earth. He will not suffer thy foot to be moved: and he that keepeth thee will not sleep. Behold. he that keepeth Israel shall neither slumber nor sleep. The Lord himself is thy keeper: the Lord is thy defence upon thy right hand: so that the sun shall not burn thee by day, neither the moon by night. The Lord shall preserve thee from all evil: yea it is even he that shall keep thy soul. The Lord shall preserve thy going out and thy coming in from this time forth, and even for evermore. Glorv be to the

Father, and to the Son and to the Holy Ghost, as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be: world without end. Amen

The beatitudes: A reading from the Gospel According to St Matthew, Chapter 5 verses 1 to 11: And seeing the multitudes, he went up into a mountain: and when he was set. his disciples came unto him: And he opened his mouth, and taught them, saying, blessed are the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are they that mourn: for they shall be comforted. Blessed are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth. Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled. Blessed are the merciful: for they shall obtain mercy. Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God. Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called the children of God. Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness' sake: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely, for my sake.

The dedication of the memorial tablet and blessing: Calling to mind all our thoughts and recollections of Lynn, her virtues and her hopes, her strengths and aspirations; remembering her family, her relationships and all her friendships, recalling her times of joy and sadness, her childhood and her adult life, her work and recreation, all that she received and all that she gave to others: we now dedicate this tablet to her honour and in her continuing remembrance:

SLOVENIAN CHOIR

Praise in high circles for Sedbergh David Burbidge

Everyone in Sedbergh of course knows what a wonderful place it is to live here. But praise for the town also continues to ring out way beyond even the Greater Sedbergh area.

At the beginning of February Lep Pozdrav iz Sedbergha, a quartet made up of singers from the folk choir which I lead, Lakeland Voices, were invited to sing at a function in London attended by the Slovenian Ambassador His Excellency Tadej Rupel, and about 150 members of the British Slovene Association.

The Ambassador was extremely kind about our choir in his speech, praising it as the English choir which sings the most Slovenian songs of all British choirs. Our songs include four part arrangements of the Slovenian national anthem, Zdravljica, the mountain song Planinska ("Come brothers and sisters let's go to the mountains where we can be without worries!") and many other Slovenian folk songs and church songs.

Ambassador Rupel then went on to praise the town twinning arrangement between Zrece and Sedbergh, and our many school and choir exchanges - which included a choir visit just a few weeks ago over the new year to Sedbergh by a Ljubljana choir, and Lakeland Voices' many visits to Slovenia where we are always made extremely welcome in Zrece and other parts of the country Hire, Sales & Erection

As well as singing songs from Slovenia, our choir visits Scotland where I have family connections, and we sing a number of songs in Gaelic,



Telephone Preference Service Cumbria Trading Standards are warning local residents be aware of any unsolicited telephone callers asking for the banking details, following reports of residents being cold called by a company claiming to



be from the Telephone Preference Service (TPS).

The service/device they are offering is unlikely to exist and it is simply an attempt to obtain credit card, sort code and bank account details or other financial information from consumers.

Cumbria Trading Standards and Cumbria Police advice is simple; don't give personal or financial information to any cold callers. Often these sellers prey on the most vulnerable. For all your goods and services it is better to deal with reputable traders operating out of fixed premises who you know and trust.

Warning as man posing as a police officer on phone carries out fraud.

Two incidents which appear to be related took place in the Kendal area recently.

This is a scam resulting in the loss of money.

A male claiming to be a Detective Constable contacted two unrelated women at their home addresses, via their landline phones.

Both women were told to withdraw money from their banks and were given instructions on how to do this.

The caller then requested the serial numbers of the bank notes and then



stated that they were forged notes. A man then attended the victims' home addresses to collect the notes.

He is described as a young, black man, of very slight build. He was wearing headphones and dressed casually.

Members of the public are asked to be vigilant and to report any similar phone calls to the Police immediately on 101.



Cumbria Trading Standards are continuing to warn both the farming community and local residents to look out for doorstep callers after further reports have been received across the County.



Individuals are visiting farms and offering tarmac for sale stating that they have "left overs" after working on the local highway. Trading Standards advice is to always say 'NO' to any cold callers and we ask that you look out for elderly or vulnerable family, friends and neighbours.

Consumers should be extremely cautious when approached by any doorstep callers offering to sell goods or conduct work on their property. These types of callers often use



persuasive or aggressive tactics to get people to agree to have work carried out and then charge far more than was quoted for poor quality work or goods.

They often fail to provide a legally required cancellation notice which enables the householder to cancel the work within a statutory fourteen day cooling off period.
