The idea of these sessions is for me to take a couple of minutes to tell you what I have been up to but mainly they are to get anyone who comes along to tell me what they think about more or less anything they care





about. They are a bit like the Summer Tour I have been doing every year since I was first elected and that many of you have been kind enough to support by coming along to and saying "hi". As ever the Sedbergh one was an interesting evening and I really look forward to being up in in your part of the world again before too long.

I took the opportunity of being in your neck of the woods to also get out with our candidates for the district council elections in May and knock on a few doors to listen to people's views on the issues that matter to them. So even failing to make it along to the Town Hall session didn't mean you escaped as there was every chance



you had me knocking on your door and asking how things were going. It's been a bit of a successful month on the health care front. A couple of the campaigns we have been running have been successful. I think the most important success has been in the campaign I wrote about in Lookaround last month. You will be pleased to hear that the Health Bosses have buckled under our pressure and agreed to improve the mental health care provided to young people in this area. In particular they have agreed that young people will be able to access mental health care outside the limited 9 – 5, Monday to Friday time when it is available to them now. They have agreed to find

The other news on the health front has been the agreement to upgrade the Primary Care Assessment Service at the hospital in Kendal to an Urgent Care Centre. This is not such a massive move on in terms of the service provided but it is a definite step in the right direction and should mean that fewer of us need to travel all the way to the A&E service at the

hospital in Lancaster. This is great not just for those of us who use Kendal Hospital but also those who use Lancaster Hospital as that has been massively over stretched of late. ## **COUNCILLORS CORNER**

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On 27 February I had the honour of presenting the opposition response to the budget proposals for South Lakeland district. It might seem like a



thankless task but at least four of the proposals I made in 2017 had been silently incorporated in the controlling group's budget for this year. None of them denied that without these inclusions they would have been nowhere near presenting a lawful budget this year. In a less acrimonious budget meeting than some years they pushed through an increase of £5 per Band D property the going rate and very near the top of what was lawful. Sincerely as shadow Finance Portfolioholder I know we could have managed with a much smaller increase, and would have done. It is telling that Conservative controlled Eden produced a no increase budget and promised the same for the next two or those of us who have work in the real

three years.

There have been heavier snowfalls, longer snowfalls and later snowfalls but I guess we were all taken a little bit by surprise by "The Beast from the East". I knew I wouldn't get back up Fellgate Lane from the council budget meeting but I wasn't expecting not to make it up Dowbiggin Lane. The blowing from about 3 pm to 10pm on the Thursday was as bad as I have ever seen it – thank goodness it didn't last longer. However it was long enough to block the north south sections of my lane, Dowbiggin Lane and no doubt many others.

Today we have had our monthly South Lakeland Site Visits tour. Although it makes for a long day for



world I try not to miss them. Today we went from Kendal to Kirkby Lonsdale, Carmel, Cark, Grange, back to Kendal and several places in between – all for plans to be considered at next week's planning committee – that is going to be an even longer day. It is the heart of the work of a district councillor and of vital concern to those individuals and businesses affected. It helps that we have a South Lakeland local development plan that we are mainly content with. It was very different when I was first on Yorkshire Dales where many of us had real unease with the then local plan. It is significant that virtually all of our worries with that policy have been totally vindicated.

Cautley and Dowbiggin B4RN is proceeding rapidly and we now have some of the wayleave agreements written and a few even signed. After lambing time we will be in a position to begin on the physical work. I am really looking forward to this as my involvement with projects in the past has ended when the planning has ended. What progress we make will depend totally on the weather.

As you know there are all out elections for South Lakeland on May 3 and I will be standing for reelection. It has been a pleasure working with Mel Mackie over the last three years and I thank him for all his support. I wish Mel and May all the best for the future.

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

## SETTLEBECK NEWS

Juliet Proctor On 6th March over 60 of our local Senior Citizens were treated to dinner and entertainment provided by the students and staff of Settlebeck School.



The three-course meal was prepared by GCSE Catering students, aided by Mrs Waring and her husband who is a lecturer in Catering at Kendal College, and consisted of butternut squash soup with homemade parmesan bread, chicken with haggis bonbons, carrots, potato puree and pea puree and for dessert a choice of sticky toffee pudding or lemon mousse with shortbread biscuits. After the meal. entertainment was provided by drama students from across all years, the school band and the singing group. There was also a very popular free raffle

All who attended agreed that the food was restaurant quality standard,



and everybody agreed that this was one of the most successful events of this type at Settlebeck to date.

From 11th to 18th of February 2018. students from Settlebeck and the town of Zreče met for the tenth time. We enjoyed a great range of activities during our week in Slovenia. **MONDAY** We started with icebreaking and socialising games which helped us to get to know each other and remember everybody's names. We ended the day by talking about our hopes, fears and expectations.

**TUESDAY** We began by visiting the primary school in Zreče. We saw a traditional dance performed by the Kureti (as it was Shrove Tuesday); we even participated in a costume competition! Despite all 3 judges rejecting the bribe, we still won. After lunch at the school, everyone set out to explore Zreče. Later we went to the spa where many of the students went into the heated pool and freezing pool. 'It was so cold I could barely breath!' exclaimed Millie and it was certainly an experience never to forget.

**WEDNESDAY** We went skiing, many of us for the first time, whilst the Slovenians seemed to be professionals! We visited the Frankolovo Crime Museum, where




we learnt about the World War II history of Slovenia and the fight to keep the language and country during the invasion. We heard about the 99 people that were hung on apple trees and the one person shot in this place. THURSDAY Today we headed to Ljubljana. We visited Predjama Castle and learnt that Erasmus Prediamski, who was the first occupier of the castle, unfortunately died on the toilet during a siege. Following this, we went to Postonia Cave: we learned about some of the oldest stalagmites and stalactites. We also found out what it is like to be in total darkness in the cave for a few seconds, which some of us found very scary but managed to overcome our fears of the dark. To top it all off,

we went into Ljubljana (the capital) and bought presents for our families. refurbishment of the Bull which will resurrect as the Black Bull. It will have 20 bedrooms and will be run by James and Nina from the Three Hares. It is scheduled to open in July. If this project is to be a success it will need the wholehearted support of the local community and will be a major asset for the Town.

The Chairman of the Governors on behalf of Sedbergh School International Ltd signed a contract with the Rong Qiao Group in Fuzhou China in November to support the development and operation of the Rong Qiao Sedbergh School in Fuhou. In particular Sedbergh School International Ltd will provide guidance on the provision of boarding school education for children aged 6 onwards. There are vacancies for Kindergarten, Primary school, Music, Art and PE teachers, and Head Academics of Primary School (see http://amcteacher.co.uk). The prep school and kindergarten are due to open in September 2018 with a roll of 320, but when the senior school opens the total capacity will be 2,700 on a site of 12 hectares. It will be a full boarding school for ages 3 to 18

and will be divided into Houses of about 70 pupils which will carry the familiar names such as Winder, Cautley, Lupton and Hart. The pupils will also be taught rugby!

A team of four won the Plate competition in the North West regional round of the National Schools Quiz Challenge.

The School was visited on 19<sup>th</sup> February by UK Boarding Schools who reported "a true boarding school with a healthy competitive house system".

The Prep School years 6 and 7 gave two performances of *The Amazing Maurice and his Educated Rodents*.

The Archbishop of York visited the School and spoke about suffering. The Prep School are collecting ring pulls from soft drinks to support families in the slums of the Philippines.

### <u>Music</u>

Although strictly speaking it was nothing to do with the School except that it took place in the chapel, the concert given by Encore Opera was superb – and unfortunately very poorly attended.

There was a Teatime concert on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> March at which recordings were made of those sitting GCSE. It was also disappointingly not well attended, which was a pity as some of the School's future stars play at these concerts.

There was to have been a Choral Society performance at a concert in Lancaster Town Hall but the whole

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concert was cancelled.

Ed Gray from the Prep School won a music Scholarship to the Senior School.

Their letters were read by a sympathetic German censor and they were eventually allowed to marry in Besancon, in February 1941. They had to return to their camps and Bill remained in St Denis for sixteen months before some of those prisoners whose wives were in Besancon, including Bill, were allowed to join them. They were sent to married guarters at Vittel, a spa town. Having a room of their own, Bill was able to set about completing his doctoral thesis. Here, in July 1943, their baby son, Robin Hugh, was born

In March 1944, Bill was given permission to travel by train to Paris



for his final, verbal, examination. He told of the strangeness of sharing a waiting room at Nancy with German officers. When he reached Paris he was stopped in the street by a German in plain clothes and a French police agent, who were incredulous to discover that he was English. But his papers were in order and he was able to proceed to the University where, after a gruelling three hour verbal examination he was awarded the "Doctorat de l'Universite de Paris, avec Mention Tres Honorable".

Bill and his family were liberated on 10th July 1944 and travelled by train, which took twelve days to reach the Spanish border. At one station they heard an air-raid siren and were



ordered off the train, when allied planes bombed the station and sprayed the ground with machine gun fire. They hid at the side of a field, the corn set on fire by the bullets only a few yards away. Eventually they reached Lisbon and after a few days there they boarded a Swedish ship, painted white to signify neutrality. Exactly a month after leaving Vittel. and following four years of profound anxiety, they sailed into Liverpool harbour to the cheers of office workers on a ferry. They had learned from the local newspaper of the ship's imminent arrival.

Helen's brother-in-law, Kenneth Anderson, was teaching music at Sedbergh School, and through this connection, after a brief telephone interview with the Headmaster, Bill was appointed to join the staff in September. He taught French, German, Senior English Literature and Religious Studies. Among those pupils who were such a pleasure to teach, and kept in touch with Bill, were Tom Bingham, later Lord Chief Justice, and John Arden, playwright, who inscribed copies of their books to him, and Robert Rhodes James, M.P., biographer and historian, and Christopher Bland, later chairman of the BBC.

Early in 1947 Bill and Helen sought a change in their lives and Bill was appointed to a lectureship at Newcastle University, for the following Septemeber. But in July Robin Hugh was taken ill on his fourth birthday



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


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and died the following day. After an unhappy and unsettled year at Newcastle, Bill and Helen were welcomed back to Sedbergh School. In 1969 Bill changed to part-time teaching, and took on the post of stipendiary Lay Reader, assisting the Vicar, David Rogers, while considering ordination. Helen died in January 1972. After much thought and encouragement from many quarters, particularly from the Vicar, and Michael Thornely the Headmaster, Bill entered Lincoln Theological College. The principal, Alec Graham, later Bishop of Newcastle, became Bill's close friend. After two terms there, he was ordained Deacon at Sedbergh in 1973, and then as Priest (at Otley) in 1974. Bill chose to remain in the Sedbergh community, where he became a much loved and valued curate, fulfilling his deeply felt Christian vocation.

Canon Rogers encouraged him to become involved with local schools, and he became a Governor of Settlebeck High School for twelve

years. He is remembered by very many old pupils for his weekly Assemblies, when "you could have heard a pin drop" during the telling of his stories. And he was for a time a member of the Diocesan Synod. The diocese of Bradford, as it was then, was linked to the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia in the Episcopal Church of the United States, and in 1981 Bill made a month's exchange with a priest from Wythesville. During the 1980s and '90s he enjoyed travelling with friends, revisiting Paris, Chartres and Vittel, and discovering such places as Venice, Assisi, Crete and Prague. He gave his final sermon at the age of ninety-seven, at a service marking the Sedbergh Music Festival. His study of Christianity was profound, but he will be remembered by family, friends and parishioners as a loving and sympathetic man, one with a kind and sometimes humourous touch.

## **SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY**

Julie Leigh When Andy Lowe is the speaker we can be assured of a large audience. Over the years he has shared his extensive knowledge of the Lake District with us in a number of very interesting presentations. After obtaining a doctorate from Liverpool University and working as a planning officer with Cheshire County Council he was appointed as Building Conservation Officer for the Lake District National Park Authority, a post which he filled for nearly 32 years. During that time he has investigated a huge number of different buildings advising on their renovation and preservation.

On this occasion Andy's focus was industrial archaeology, a subject which has fascinated him since childhood. He approached the topic from a historical standpoint with illustrations of typical Lakeland scenes featuring the elements of rocks, woodland and water. This sort of landscape, he said, has developed over the last five million years through geologic changes and human activity. Evidence of the first farmers dates from 5.500BC and axe factories from that period have been discovered. Andy drew our attention to the rich and diverse rock deposits rocks in the region. Evidently slate has been used since the first men appeared on the scene, first from outcrops on the surface of the ground, later from open





quarries and eventually from underground mines. Although it has been in use over the centuries, it became especially important for roofing tiles when large numbers of terraced houses were built in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century.

Interestingly, in the 16<sup>th</sup> Century, Queen Elizabeth 1 was instrumental in arranging for copper miners from Germany (where mining techniques were more advanced) to settle in the Coniston area. Andy's slides included some fascinating German16<sup>th</sup> century woodcut illustrations by Georgius Agricola which showed extraction processes in mining. Copper mining developed on various Lakeland sites and many Cornish workers migrated to this region from Cornwall when deposits of Cornish copper dwindled there.

The manufacture of iron and steel became a major industry in Cumbria but Andy pinpointed the numerous smaller sites where iron ore was smelted with charcoal as another factor in the development of the local landscape. There is early evidence of this activity and also of tree planting (in some cases involving abandoning arable land), to provide the necessary charcoal for the procedure. He also mentioned other uses of wood which depended on the cultivation of a variety of tree species including: peeling of bark, an ingredient in the tanning process; the crafts of brush and basket making and bobbin production.

After his whistle-stop tour of how industry has played a significant part in the evolution of the Lake District, Andy concluded his talk by showing us a slide of Coppermines Valley as

## **APRIL GARDENING**

*Elaine Horne* As the days warm (we hope) and shoots and roots begin to grow, it is a good time to do the repotting of your indoor, and outdoor potted plants.

Many container grown plants become pot bound and once this happens they start to look tired, pale and straggly. A dose of fertilizer, in the way of some new compost will give them a bit more root space and a new lease of life. If you are able to put the plant into a larger pot then choose one which is just a little larger – one or two sizes above the existing one. If you "overpot" into a pot which is too large then the new compost could sit like a cold wet blanket around the rootball, and the new root tips,



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instead of growing into it, will gradually die and rot away.

If your plant is already in a large pot then you can rejuvenate it by removing some of the old compost and replacing it with some new. Knock the plant out of the pot if possible and tease away some of the old compost from between the roots before adding some fresh compost. Otherwise, remove the top layer and add some more as a top dressing.

Plants will also respond to a good feed at this time of year. A look at the garden centre shelves will reveal an array of different products for different uses. I like to use a "continual release" fertiliser supplied in the form of small pellets. This gives fertiliser to the plant over several months in the growing season though in a wet year you might need to top up in late summer – especially if your plants are growing in peat/peat free rather than soil based (John Innes) compost. The continuous nature of the rainfall kept the mud levels high, especially in Temperatures were, as to be





gateways etc. It also meant we were keeping a close watch on the septic tank area in the paddock and sand bags at the ready near the doors! The mud has meant that feeding sheep has been a bit of a battle especially getting water across. I am taking 10 gallons every day and 20 on some. On only one day was it frozen hard enough for me to risk taking my small tractor across although it has wide grass tyres. I have another set of wheels I could bolt on but it seems such a faff for such little use. I am always surprised when you see sheep in fields with no apparent access to water.

Activity at the bird feeding station has step up. Blue tits, coal tits, great

tits and house sparrows are there daily with the occasional visit from what appears to be a pair of long tailed tits. The family party seems to have broken up. I had a rare glimpse of a gold crest working its way along the bushes down the driveway. The cock song thrush continues to sing his heart out from first light at the top of a 20+ foot Christmas tree. It is to be hoped that all his efforts result in him finding a mate. I am sure I have mentioned before that as kids, when we were birds nesting etc. thrushes were as numerous as blackbirds. Now it seems that the ratio is 10 to 1 in favour of blackbirds. There have been two or three robins about. Two were scrapping so I assume they



were both cocks but one seems to have left the scene and the other 2 are around the shippon so are probably looking for a nest sight. The box I put up in the shippon in the hope robins might nest has been taken over by sparrows this season!

# CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

Jackie Hooley The return of the otter by Jack Forrester. Many of us have a soft spot for otters, which is easily understood when you consider some of the behaviours that they show. 'Handholding' so as to not drift away from each other, keeping 'pet' rocks for life and childishly sliding in mud are undeniably heart-warming acts. It is therefore easy to fall in love with these animals.

The otters found in Cumbria belong to the species of European otter,

which is the furthest ranging in the subfamily. Their habitat ranges throughout Europe to North Africa and parts of Asia. However the otter has not always been as successful as it is now, especially in the UK. Certain pesticides such as dieldrin would run off into rivers, poisoning fish, which the otters relied on for food. Coupled with the increase in human activities such as a higher number of cars on the roads, this led to the population being on the brink of disappearing by the 1980s.

This continued in the next decade, with populations dwindling throughout Cumbria and the rest of England. However, during the 1990's a population of otters from the Scottish side of the Solway made their way

At this time there were bans on pesticides and hunting, as well as numerous conservation projects to re-establish loss of habitat, along with successful efforts to phase out many of the harmful chemicals in the waterways. As a consequence, populations have begun to recover. Now, as surveys indicate, otters throughout Cumbria are returning to their former habitats.

Recently a mother and her cubs have been spotted in Kendal town centre, on the River Kent. This conservation success story has not just been isolated to Cumbria, but has occurred nationally. For example, the species presence was confirmed in Kent during 2011, showing that otters

are inhabiting suitable bodies of water in every county throughout the UK.

There is still more work to be done to secure the otter's future, and there are numerous conservation projects taking place across the country to provide more habitats and build holts (the underground burrows where they have their cubs).

Otters can be seen throughout the year, but in spite of this, they remain elusive, even with the recent recovery in their population. An easily scared animal, the art of spotting them takes a great deal of patience, and requires a good deal of luck! For the best chance of seeing them, clean waterways with vegetated banks and a healthy supply of prey are a must.

**BUT** all is far from lost as there has been a significant increase in the areas where our adorable native Red squirrel has been reported and they are flourishing, with the help of some



# SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

Tanya & Edmund Hoare Only one month to go before our swifts return at the beginning of May! It is always an anxious time wondering whether our breeding swifts will return safely.



One of the common questions asked when we give lectures is how long do swifts live. Of course there is a difference between how long a swift *can* live and the life expectancy of swifts in general. Some people, but very few, live to 105 or more but this is not the normal expectation.

According to BTO records, the oldest known British swift was 19 years old. In Switzerland another bird that was ringed as a chick was still alive 21 years later. The longest lived swift known anywhere was one ringed as a yearling in Orleans, France, and retrapped 29 years later, thus making it almost 30 years old. However although swifts can be long lived, it is believed that the average adult swift lives for about 7-9 years. The loss in the first year for fledglings will clearly be the highest as such birds are inexperienced, having to learn how to feed and migrate independently from their parents.

Swifts are one of the most nest site faithful birds. Once they form a breeding pair they will return to exactly the same nest site year after year. We have had the privilege of sharing our cottage at Lowgill with a

colony of swifts since we moved there 17 years ago. Some of our nest sites in the eaves have been occupied every single summer since we arrived.

So are the swifts that return to each



one of our nest sites each year exactly the same pair from 17 years ago? It seems unlikely given what we know about swift survival. Over the years, eventually one of the pair fails to survive the hazards of migration, or simply dies of old age. In that case, the first bird back waits and waits as a singleton for its partner to also return, but in the end it goes out and tries to draw in a new mate - either another swift left similarly alone. or possibly a juvenile that is just old enough (3-4 years) to breed. The newly formed pair then breeds and remains faithful to that nest site, and so the cycle continues. We suspect this happened with one of our pairs last year, when the first swift returned on 8th May. But it wasn't until the 25th May that it was joined by another swift - which was probably a new mate as it would have been a verv late arrival for the member of an established pair.

One of the most incredible facts



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about breeding pairs, which has been established by the use of geolocators, is that although swift pairs are faithful to their nests and form faithful breeding pairs, they do not migrate together nor do they spend the winter together in Africa. Just how they can live separate lives for the 9 months of each year that they are away, including the travelling to and from Africa, yet return to their same nest site over here, remains a mystery to this day.

We will have a stall again at the Sedbergh Artisan market on Saturday April 28<sup>th</sup>. So do please stop and have a chat.

Does this matter? Do we actually need Walkers Are Welcome status? Do we need a Walking and Cycling Group? Do we need a website that visitors can use when they are out and about without access to Wi-Fi? Do we actually want more visitors? Do we need to work for improved access for walkers or safer routes for cyclists? How important are these things at a time of economic uncertainty, and when we all have so



# CITIZENS ADVICE

I live in a privately rented house and the damp is aggravating my threeyear-old daughter's asthma. I've told my landlord but she's not taking action. What can I do?

Resolving damp issues can be difficult, as the cause isn't always obvious and it's important to realise that your landlord could evict you.

First, make sure you're not doing anything to cause the damp. Then you could report the problem to the Environmental Health department at your local authority. They can issue an awareness notice, which tells your landlord what she needs to do to fix the problem, although it doesn't enforce it. They can also serve the more serious improvement notice, which requires your landlord to carry out the work and also offers you some protection from eviction.

Alternatively, you could take her to court. If your landlord is held responsible, the court can grant an injunction and possibly award compensation. Seek advice from us before doing this because the legal process can be complex.



Then it was time for our own speaker. Laura Rosenzweig, one of



Emotional problems, such as stress, anxiety, or depression, can make a person more forgetful and can be mistaken for dementia. For instance, someone who has recently retired or who is coping with the death of a spouse, relative, or friend may feel sad, lonely, worried, or bored. Trying to deal with these life changes leaves some people feeling confused or forgetful.

The confusion and forgetfulness caused by emotions usually are temporary and go away when the feelings fade. Emotional problems can be eased by supportive friends and family, but if these feelings last for more than 2 weeks, it is important to get help from a doctor or counselor. Treatment may include counseling, medication, or both. Being active and learning new skills can also help a person feel better and improve his or her memory.

### Gloria's Story

Gloria was feeling sad all the time. She just wanted to sleep all day and night. She was becoming really forgetful, too. Gloria's nephew Bob was afraid something was very wrong. He took her to see a doctor. The doctor said she had depression and needed to take medicine and see a counselor.

After 3 months, Bob could see the



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change in his aunt. She was eating and sleeping better. Gloria was spending more time with friends and doing volunteer work.

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
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not have been moved but that evening many people were by an inspiring memory making performance.

# SEDBERGH ORCHESTRA

Michael Leigh Beyond the Steppes of Central Asia into Armenia and Russia. St. Andrew's Church, Thursday 8 March. Peter Crompton and the Sedbergh Orchestra are to be heartily



congratulated. This was a bold, ambitious, courageous – and indeed, risky project. Khachaturian, Arutunyan, Mussorgsky, Borodin and Shostakovitch, in a single night would have challenged even the most experienced professional instrumentalists and most distinguished ensembles. However, nothing ventured, nothing gained. This was another important and testing milestone in the Sedbergh Orchestra's remarkable development. The musicians emerged triumphantly in the end.

Peter Crompton's dynamic contribution to the Sedbergh Orchestra is clearly immense. He inspires, energises, cajoles, leads and encourages in equal measure. He also holds the orchestra together



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and obviously gives them great selfbelief

On Thursday we were transported geographically across the Russian Steppes and beyond. Historically we were led through the Romanov dynasty, revolution, war, the soviet era, and perestroika. Musically the programme introduced us to a feast of lush harmonies, folksy melodies, pastoral interludes, crashing brass themes, haunting strings and woodwind sections and sleazy jazz motifs. What more could any audience wish for on a wet March night in the Howgill fells?

The evening opened with Khachaturian's *Masquerade Suite*. It was a great introduction to what would follow. The *Masquerade Suite* was composed between 1941 and 1944 as incidental music for a Lermontov play. A subtle nocturne follows a loud and lively march. An exuberant waltz theme lies at the heart of the Suite.

Alexander Arutunyan's Trumpet Concerto was the highlight of the evening. It is a very interesting piece in that it was a political high wire act. Arutunyan had to get the Concerto

past an array of Stalinist censors while at the same time seeking to achieve remarkable heights of virtuosity. His was a remarkable achievement as was Stella Crompton's. This is a demanding piece, and she gave an amazingly authoritative performance, handling the complex rhythms and soaring cadences with great charm and sophistication. The pure, clear sound of Ms. Crompton's trumpet reverberating around St Andrew's Church against the disciplined, but muted strains of the Sedbergh Orchestra strings was a joy to hear. The audience was privileged, for Stella Crompton gave a truly memorable performance, and is a charismatic performer.

Modest Mussorgsky's 'Dawn on the Moscow River' is a hauntingly atmospheric composition. It is the prelude to Khovanschina, a tragic opera set at the time of Peter the Great in seventeenth century Russia. By contrast to the dark, dramatic, often brutal scenes that unfold in the main work, Dawn on the Moscow River is a light, gentle, pastoral elegy, laden with tones and semi-tones evocative of the riverine landscapes of Mother Russia. The orchestra painted the scene with admirable



restraint and deftness. Alexander Borodin's Polovtsian Dances provided an ideal foil to the serenely gliding Moscow River. The dances are the exotic climax to Act II of the opera Prince Igor. The Polovtsian Dances achieved instant fame at the hands of Sergei Diaghilev and his groundbreaking balletic interpretations at *Ballet Russe*. The Sedbergh Orchestra also rose to the challenge of these firecracker episodes. It is not easy to achieve an appropriate balance between brass, woodwind and strings in the constricted and asymmetrical performance area in St Andrew's Church. Nevertheless at key moments in the dances the lilting melodies and sonorous brass and

woodwind themes managed to assert themselves excellently above the serried ranks of the strings. It was a fine performance.

The final item in the evening's programme would have come as something of a surprise to anyone unfamiliar with the specific work. Waltz Number Two is unlike any of Shostakovitch's more monumental compositions. In this piece the composer weaves a tapestry of alluring jazz sounds. He intended that the pieces could be played in any order. Some sections have a sinister feel. some are almost erotic, some are sleazy, and others are humorous. They are always engaging, always deeply musical and completely of their time. The Sedbergh Orchestra

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clearly relished the task. They managed to capture the atmosphere of the 1950s jazz scene in a remarkable way. They provided a sense of perpetual motion and, although the strings performed magnificently, this was a work that brought the best out in all sections of the Orchestra.

Finally, it should be acknowledged that this was a very tough call for the Sedbergh Orchestra – just as it would have been for any orchestra.

However it was a risk worth taking. We, the audience, hope that the Orchestra will not shy away from new and even greater challenges in the future. Bravo!

# neighbourhoodalert

False claims of Telephone Preference Service:

Fraudsters are cold-calling victims, falsely stating that they are calling from one of the well-known UK telecommunication service providers. They call victims claiming to provide a 'Telephone Preference Service' - an enhanced call-barring service, which includes barring international call centres.

The fraudsters ask victims to confirm/provide their bank account details, informing them that there is a one-off charge for the service. Victims instead see monthly debits deducted from their accounts, which they have not authorised. The fraudsters often target elderly victims.

In all instances, direct debits are set up without following proper procedure. The victim is not sent written confirmation of the direct debit instruction, which is supposed to be sent within three days.

On occasions when victims attempted to call back, the telephone number provided by the fraudster was either unable to be reached or the victim's direct debit cancellation request was refused.

During 2017, there were 493 Action Fraud Reports relating to this fraud. **Protect yourself:** 

- There is only one Telephone Preference Service (TPS). The TPS is the only official UK 'do-notcall' register for opting out of live telesales calls. It is FREE to signup to the register. TPS never charge for registration. You can register for this service at http:// www.tpsonline.org.uk.
- You will receive postal confirmation of genuine direct debits. If you notice unauthorised payments leaving your account, you should contact your bank promptly.
- Always be wary of providing personal information, or

confirming that personal information the caller already claims to hold is correct. Always be **certain** that you know who you talking to. If in doubt hang up immediately.

If you have been affected by this, or any other type of fraud, report it to Action Fraud by visiting www.actionfraud.police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040.

#### neighbourhoodalert Doorstop Sellers

Cumbria Trading Standards are warning residents in the South Lakeland area to be wary about doorstep callers in the area offering home improvement services.

Consumers should be extremely cautious when approached by any doorstep callers offering to sell goods or conduct work on their property. These types of callers often use persuasive or aggressive tactics to get people to agree to have work



carried out and then charge far more than was quoted for poor quality work or goods. They often fail to provide a legally required cancellation notice which enables the householder to cancel the work in certain circumstances. Trading Standards advice is to always say 'NO' to any cold callers and we ask that you look out for elderly or vulnerable family, friends and neighbours. The report assesses the populations of a number of key upland raptor species nationally and in the Park and quantifies the confirmed incidents of persecution. It says, "The collation of breeding data, the number of confirmed persecution incidents and the absence of some species from large areas of potentially suitable habitat provide compelling evidence that illegal persecution is limiting the populations of peregrine and hen harrier in the National Park, and is preventing the colonisation of the area by red kites. "There has not been a successful Peregrine nesting attempt on any of the monitored grouse moor sites since 1997, with birds now absent

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"Despite large areas of potentially suitable nesting habitat, there has not been a successful hen harrier nesting attempt in the National Park since 2007. In addition, 11 (19%) of the 59 hen harriers that were satellite tagged by Natural England at sites across northern England and Scotland between 2002 and 2017 are classed as 'missing, fate unknown' in the Yorkshire Dales."

The report – which draws on a wide range of sources – was presented at a Wildlife Crime seminar organised by the YDNPA, which took place at Yoredale in Bainbridge on 21 Feb. More than 50 people attended the event, including police officers from the North Yorkshire, Cumbria and Lancashire forces.

YDNPA Chief Executive David Butterworth said: "The wildlife crime seminar has trained staff to know how to assess and deal with incidents – and when to report them to the police. I need to be absolutely clear: bird of prey persecution is a criminal offence and is foremost a police matter. If you suspect it, or wish to report any information, you need to dial 101 or in an emergency 999. But it is also is a matter for us, as the Authority exists

to conserve and enhance the natural beauty and wildlife of the National Park.

"During the coming weeks, the training that staff have received will also be handed on to our Dales Volunteers. They will be briefed on how to spot and report suspected wildlife crime incidents."

He added: "North Yorkshire has gained an unenviable reputation as England's bird of prey persecution hotspot. The problems are well documented but, as yet, there are no widely accepted solutions to the conflict between some land management practices and bird of prey populations. People need to be clear that the National Park Authority does not own the land, and that there are no legislative powers to regulate game shooting.

"This does not mean that we are sitting idly by doing nothing. We are helping North Yorkshire Police with <u>Operation Owl</u> – a scheme to get people who are out and about enjoying the magnificent countryside to look out for and report suspected wildlife crime. With the help of residents and visitors we can make a difference. We want birds of prey

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK Have your say on National Park Management Plan An ambitious five-year programme of work in the Yorkshire Dales National Park has been published for public consultation. A year in the making, the 'National Park Management Plan 2019-2024' contains detailed objectives on farming and land management, economic regeneration and public rights of way. It has been shaped by an initial 'Your Dales, Your Views' public consultation last summer and by the Government's 8-point plan for England's National Parks. A steering group made up of 16 public, private and voluntary sector organisations (see below) is responsible for producing the Plan. The consultation will run for seven weeks until 30 April. Steering group member, Yvonne Peacock, who is the Leader of Richmondshire District Council, said: "We have listened carefully to the views of local people and all those with an interest in the Park, and we have come up with a management plan which – when carried out – will make the Yorkshire Dales National Park a better place to live and work and visit. "Last summer's public consultation was the start of the process to create the new plan. 'Community sustainability', the future of farming after Brexit and wildlife crime came out as the top three concerns of the	several objectives related to these issues. "It is entirely possible that something has been missed, or that the objectives that have emerged need to be tweaked. That's what this second consultation is about. We'd like to hear the views of individuals, businesses and other organisations before finalising the plan." The new plan is organised in the same way as the current plan (2013- 2018), with the objectives arranged under the six parts of the vision for the National Park. Steering group chairman Carl Lis added: "Quite a number of the objectives – for instance on peat bog restoration, tree planting and raising the standard of public rights of way – are designed to build on the successes of the past five years. "Other objectives – on farming, dark skies, attracting families, transport and broadband – are new and very ambitious. For instance, a date of 2021 has been set for the development of a 'fully-costed, locally -tailored, locally-delivered, outcome- focused environmental land management scheme' for the Park. "The County Councils will be leading on another new objective – to connect Grassington, Hawes, Reeth and Sedbergh, to hyperfast, fibre-to- the-premises broadband by 2023." Steering group member Dan Hudson, who is Development Strategy and Housing Manager at South Lakeland District Council, said: "The plan is the result of genuine partnership working and 'joined-up thinking' across public, private and

It is very encouraging that it uses the Wensleydale pilot as a case study to illustrate what future farm payment schemes could look like," said YDNPA chairman Carl Lis.

"The paper clearly says that Direct Payments are not going to be switched off overnight – which will come as a relief to many. It models scenarios for the payments to be phased out over 5, 7 or ten years, so it could be towards the end of the next decade before they disappear entirely. It is in farmers' interests to join in the consultation and give their view on how Direct Payments should end and over how many years.

"The paper is also clear in recognising that the uplands may find it more difficult than others to adapt. But it highlights the potential for upland farm businesses to benefit from new environmental land management schemes, given the nature of the landscapes and the many public goods that they deliver, such as biodiversity and flood risk mitigation.

"One of the vital questions the paper asks is how farming, land management and rural communities in the uplands should continue to be supported. It's important that we seize this opportunity to make the voices of local farmers and communities heard.

"The Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority will be responding to the consultation via National Parks England. Our views have been shaped through the Yorkshire Dales Farming and Land Management Forum and other local partnerships. A consensus has emerged that future payment schemes need to be locally tailored, locally delivered and outcome-focused."
