TOUR DE YORKSHIRE STAGE 3 RICHMOND TO SCARBOROUGH -**SATURDAY 5 MAY 2018**

On Saturday 5 May, Stage 3 of the Tour de Yorkshire runs from Richmond to Scarborough and passes through Leyburn, Bedale and Northallerton. Huge crowds are expected, as there were for the Tour de France when held in this region. A prime viewing place will be in Leyburn which, if the Tour de France day is anything to go by, will be extremely busy! The race will come through Leyburn at about 1.30pm.

For people coming from the Upper Dales - Hawes, Askrigg, Reeth, Sedbergh, etc – the Wensleydale Railway will be offering a FREE park and train ride from Redmire to Leyburn, with shuttle trains operating from 10am until 4.30pm (journey time about 15 minutes).

There is no need for passengers to book - just turn up on the day at Redmire Station (a little way to the East of the village - for Sat Nav DL8 4ES)to catch one of the 10.00, 1045, 11.30 or 12.15 trains to Leyburn Station, which is right on the course of the race in an excellent viewing position. Or you can Tour de 🌙 walk up into the town, Yorksh) re where there will be plenty of action!

Well we are in the final run up to the elections for South Lakeland District Council on May 3rd.

It is often said that you only see politicians around election time but. as I hope most of you have realised, you can rely on seeing me many more times than just around elections. Mind you given that everywhere in South Lakeland now has multi-member wards with at least one member up for election every year we are more or less in a continual election period. Something that has been the case for you in Sedbergh and Dent for quite some time now. With the result that there is no time when you can feel safe from the prospect of me knocking on your

door to ask you what issues you would like us to be working on over the coming months. Actually I do rather think that this is how it should be. You should feel that you can easily access the people who represent you as your MP or your councillors on SLDC or Cumbria County Council. Even on Sedbergh Parish council.

This past month I have been knocking on minister's as well as your doors. In a Parliamentary question session at the beginning of March I asked the Business Minister Andrew Griffiths if he would meet with me to discuss what the Government could do to support small businesses in this area. In particular what they could do to improve our broadband speeds,

our roads and our rail services. The figures I see from Government suggest that our economy is doing better than many but people tell me that this is despite Government

investment and support, not because of it. I had quite a constructive meeting with the Minister but I am hoping for a bit more than fine words. Let's see what happens.

I might sound a bit sceptical about Government figures, that is because I had a meeting with representatives from organisations involved in poverty across the whole of the constituency the other day. I was shocked to learn to that nearly 2,200 children in this area are now living below the poverty line. That is one in seven of our children. In an average primary school class that is about 4 children. The numbers of people using the food bank in Kendal has risen by over a third over the past 12 months. And

this is before the Government rolls out Universal Credit to our part of the world. Something which has almost always resulted even more problems for families who need this support.

I heard some of the heart breaking stories and as a result have put together a 5 point action plan. We are calling for things like bus passes for the under 25's and the end to the

sanctioning of people for missing appointments, something which leaves them with no money for food that week. We have to make progress on this as I just cannot live with the idea that as many children as that are living in poverty around here.



This month has our major fund raising effort of the year with Christian Aid Week taking place from the 13th to 19th May. This year the charity is focussing on its work in Haiti with local Haitian partner Koral (Konbit

pou ranfòse aksyon lokal, or Gathering for the strengthening of local actions) as an example of the kind of projects it is able to facilitate through the money it raises. A major target is to build more disaster-proof homes to protect Haitians from the damage of hurricanes. Following the terrible earthquake of 2010 Christian Aid built 700 houses and of these just one needed to be repaired after Hurricane Matthew struck in 2016. You'll find the stories of the impact of the earthquake and hurricanes on some of the local people affected by them online and in the other publicity materials during Christian Aid Week. However these are a few snippets of background of three of the people involved.

Vilia lost her mum and her home when the earthquake struck Port-au-Prince in 2010. Bereaved and Anne Pitt homeless, she went back to her home town with her husband and children. But life was a struggle, and they had nowhere safe to live. Christian Aid partner KORAL built her a new home that was strong enough to stand up to natural disasters.

On the terrifying night when Hurricane Matthew hit, Vilia's

neighbours fled to shelter with her. As the storm raged, she shared her home with more than 50 of her neighbours for several days. Despite the ferocity of the hurricane, which swept away surrounding homes, her house was barely damaged.

Vilia allowed her home to become an emergency shelter when Hurricane Matthew struck Haiti. She is incredibly grateful for the help she's received but worries about those without a secure home.

Jocelyne lost everything when Hurricane Matthew tore through Haiti, her home, animals and safety. She was forced to live 'in mud', with only a tarpaulin between her and the elements. When the tarpaulin shook

THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION in the wind, it sounded like another hurricane.

Even now, her new home – made of sheet metal, wood and tarpaulin – is not secure. Once, she says, a man told her that if he wanted to hurt her, he could just rip through the tarpaulin wall. It's hard not to feel threatened.

Jocelyne has shown incredible resilience, but her makeshift home would offer no protection in the event of another hurricane.

With hurricane season set to arrive in June, Jocelyne and thousands of other displaced people are in grave danger.

Marcelin lost his home and livelihood when Hurricane Matthew hit Haiti in September 2016. 'I lost

pigs, goats, everything in the house. I have nothing left,' he says.

He now lives in an old concrete shower block, a tiny space he shares with his teenage daughters. There are no windows or doors, and the only furniture is a single bed that the girls sleep on.

Every day he gets up at dawn to work the land but he's struggling to support his family. The changing weather frequently destroys the food he grows and his family often go hungry.

He can no longer afford to send all his children to school and is unable to save any money for a new home.

Will you #StandTogether with your global neighbours like Jocelyne and Marcelin and give a donation to help build a disaster-proof home in Haiti?



SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

History of Holme Mill On Wednesday 7th February an enthusiastic audience gathered in Settlebeck School Hall to hear Geoff Pegg deliver a highly interesting illustrated talk on the history of Holme Mill, from its first use as flax mill in the early 1800s through to its eventual closure in 1975.

It is generally believed that there had been a corn mill on or near to the site of Holme Mill for many centuries before, probably operated in association with the nearby Jolly's Farm. Then the site was purchased by Waithman & Co. who were a wealthy Quaker family from Yealand. Early plans for the proposed Mill show that the Waithman's had significant influence by arranging for the re-routing of the Lancaster Canal to pass by adjacent to the Mill site.

Waithman & Co. commenced operations as a flax mill in 1819 and Phil West were the first mill in the UK to introduce mechanised yarn spinning machinery.

> In addition to building the mill the Waithmans also built houses for their workforce to live in, thus establishing Holme Mills as a centre of population in itself, albeit connected to Holme by road.

In the ensuing years the workforce steadily increased, with a large number of Irish immigrants swelling the numbers, and eventually in 1859 the flax mill was sold to an Irish businessman for the grand sum of £775.

However, in 1862 a fire started at 2 separate locations within the mill complex, coincidentally at almost the exact same time, and despite the best efforts of the local firefighters of the day and the mill workers the mill was destroyed. Whilst it was strongly suspected that the fire had been deliberately started by an employee at the behest of the owner, and indeed a hearing was convened to investigate said employee's behaviour in the period leading up to the fire, insufficient evidence was provided to convict anybody of wrongdoing and consequently the mill owner received an insurance settlement of £19,000, quite a profit on his original investment less than 3 years earlier!

At this time the mill went out of business and remained empty for around 2 years, at which point it was then bought by Edward Shepherd & Sons.

Edward Shepherd had retired as prison governor at Wakefield Gaol

earlier in 1864 and purchased the mill for his son Francis to run on his behalf. Interestingly, a total of nine of Edward's relations were also prison governors in Yorkshire at some point, although the Shepherd family also had other interests including a mill situated in Dundee.

Edward & Francis converted the flax mill to one which made coir or coconut matting and there is a suggestion, albeit non-proven, that some of their workers were exprisoners brought from Yorkshire as they had made coconut matting whist in prison. However, there is evidence to show that there was a significant influx of skilled weavers from Yorkshire (Heckmondwyke, Liversedge, and Gomersal) in the 1890s although these may well have been carpet weavers as Shepherd & Sons did start a limited amount of carpet weaving around this time.

In 1916 William Goodacre Ltd, who had their headquarters at Victoria Dock in London, purchased the mill. Goodacres were at that time the biggest importers of coir matting in Europe, and possibly the world. Upon taking over the running of the mill

they retained the same workforce, including the managers at the time, whilst they kept a watching brief over the operations from their London HQ. The mill suffered another major fire during the 1960s which gutted the main building, but this was renovated and production was restarted.

The mill continued to produce matting right up until its final closure in 1975, although it had also moved into the manufacture of plastic matting by that time. When it closed down the mill was only employing about 30people, compared to several hundred when it was a flax mill and between 200 and 300 at the height of coir matting production.

Upon closure the site was purchased by local garage owners

Eric and Dennis Towers, and it is currently a site containing a number of small businesses.

An interesting and entertaining evening had been enjoyed by all present, due in no small way to Geoff's knowledge and passion for all things to do with Holme.

CITIZENS ADVICE

I am over 25 and entitled to the National Living Wage, but I suspect I am being underpaid. How can I find out if I'm being paid the right amount. and claim what I am owed from my employer?

If you think you've been underpaid, act quickly, as it's harder to get your money back after three months. Check your payslip and ask your employer to explain anything you don't understand. Tell them why you think you have been underpaid. If there was a genuine mistake, you should be repaid immediately.

If your employer refuses to pay, you can formally raise a grievance, either

by writing a letter or following your Karen Evans company's grievance procedure.

If this still doesn't work, contact the Advisory, Conciliation and Arbitration Service (Acas), who will see if your employer will agree to a conciliation process, rather than go to court. Otherwise you can take your employer to a tribunal, but think carefully because a tribunal claim can be expensive and stressful.

CITIZEN'S ADVICE

I have a long-term health condition but I recently had my Personal Independence Payment (PIP) reduced after a re-assessment. I want to challenge the decision - where do I start?

The first stage is known as mandatory reconsideration. Write to the Department for Work and

Pensions (DWP) within a month to take a second look at your assessment decision.

List all the reasons why you don't think your PIP award should be reduced, with evidence such as practical examples, medical records and supporting letters from specialists who are treating you. You can submit evidence separately later if necessary.

You'll receive a Mandatory Reconsideration Notice which says if your request has been successful. If it is, your original award will be reinstated and your payment backdated.

If you're unsuccessful, you could choose to progress to the second challenge stage, where you take your case to appeal tribunal. For help filling in the tribunal form and preparing for your hearing, contact your nearest Citizens Advice or visit the website. How to reduce your risk of dementia – (and your risk of many other diseases!)

you can build it into your normal daily routine. Get your friends and family to support you – or better yet, join you.

Based on the latest research, here are our top tips to reduce your risk of dementia.

1. Keep physically active – for at least 30 minutes, five times a week. You'll need to be active enough to raise your heart rate and get a bit out of breath. You could walk, cycle, swim or join an exercise or dance group. Regular physical exercise in middle-aged or older adults reduces the risk of developing dementia. It's also good for your heart and mental wellbeing. Exercise like this brings health benefits even if you're not losing weight.

- 2. Don't smoke if you already do smoke, try to stop. By smoking you are at a greater risk of developing dementia and harming your lungs, heart and circulation.
- 3. Eat a healthy balanced diet A healthy diet has a high proportion of oily fish, fruit, vegetables, unrefined cereals and olive oil, and low levels of red meat and sugar. Such a diet will help reduce your risk of dementia and heart disease, stroke and type 2 diabetes. Try to cut down on

saturated fat (eg cakes, biscuits, most cheeses) and limit sugary treats. Keep an eye on your salt intake too, because salt raises your blood pressure and risk of stroke.

4. Keep your alcohol within recommended limits – They are now a maximum of 14 units each week for men and women, spread over 3 or more days. This is the same as four or five large glasses of wine, or seven pints of beer or lager

with a lower alcohol content. Regularly exceeding these weekly limits increases your dementia risk.

- 5. Take control of your health If you're invited for a regular mid-life health check at the doctor's, be sure to go. It's like an 'MOT' for your body and will include a check of your blood pressure, weight and maybe cholesterol level. These are linked to dementia and conditions that are strong risk factors for dementia (heart disease, stroke and diabetes). If you're already living with one of these long-term conditions, follow professional advice about medicines and lifestyle.
- **6. Keep to a healthy weight –** this will reduce your risk of type 2

diabetes, stroke and heart disease – and hence probably of dementia. A good place to start is to follow the advice on exercise and diet.

7. Give your brain a daily workout

- This could be reading, doing puzzles, word searches or crosswords, playing cards or learning something new - maybe another language. If you can keep your mind active you are likely to reduce your risk of dementia.

Risk factors you can't change Ageing

Age is the strongest known risk factor for dementia. Whilst it is possible to develop the condition earlier - the chances of developing dementia rise significantly as we get

older. Above the age of 65, a person's risk of developing Alzheimer's disease or vascular dementia doubles roughly every 5 years.

This may be due to factors associated with ageing, such as:

- higher blood pressure
- increased risk of cardiovascular diseases (eg heart disease and stroke)
- changes to nerve cells, DNA and cell structure
- loss of sex hormones after midlife changes
- the weakening of the body's natural repair systems
- changes in the immune system. Gender

Women are more likely to develop Alzheimer's disease than men. It has been suggested that Alzheimer's disease in women is linked to a lack of the hormone oestrogen after the menopause. However, controlled trials of hormone replacement therapy (HRT, which replaces female hormones) have not been shown to reduce the risk of developing Alzheimer's.

For most dementias other than Alzheimer's disease, men and women have much the same risk. For vascular dementia, men are actually at slightly higher risk than women. This is because men are more prone to stroke and heart disease, which can cause vascular and mixed dementia.

Ethnicity

There is some evidence that people from certain ethnic communities are at higher risk of dementia than others. For example, South Asian people (from countries such as India and Pakistan) seem to develop dementia - particularly vascular dementia - more often than white Europeans. South Asians are well known to be at a higher risk of stroke, heart disease and diabetes,





and this is thought to explain the higher dementia risk.

Similarly, people of African or African-Caribbean origin seem to develop dementia more often. They are known to be more prone to diabetes and stroke. All of these effects are probably down to a mix of differences in diet, smoking, exercise and genes.

Genetics

Scientists have known for some time that the genes we inherit from



our parents can affect whether or not we will develop certain diseases.

More than 20 genes have been found that do not directly cause dementia but affect a person's risk of developing it. Having a close relative (parent or sibling) with Alzheimer's disease increases your own chances of developing the disease very slightly compared to someone with no family history. However, it does not mean that dementia is inevitable for you.

Take action and help improve the lives of people with dementia.

This year, Dementia Awareness Week is changing to **Dementia Action Week (21 to 27 May).**Raising awareness and offering support will always be important, but

it's time we all act to make change happen for people affected by dementia.

In the UK, one person develops dementia every three minutes, yet too many people feel excluded and face the disease alone.

That's why, this Dementia Action Week, we will be asking people to unite and take actions big and small to make a difference to the everyday lives of people with dementia. It could be as simple as being more patient in queues or helping make your business dementia-friendly.

Francis Mason-Hornby, owner of the Dalton Hall Estate, introduced the woodland burial ground seven years ago in a bid to offer a greener

alternative to cremations. The 30 acre site is based in woodland at the foot of Dalton Crags, Burton-in-Kendal.

Francis said: "Over the years, we've found that people often aren't aware of the environmental impact of cremations. Personally, I found out about natural burial as a sustainable option through an article in a newspaper, it came as a surprise because I hadn't heard of it before. After reading the piece, the idea



stayed with me for a while. I did some research through the Natural Death Centre and looked at introducing it to the estate.

"The main reason why people might not be aware of natural burial as an option is probably because talking about death and letting your loved ones know your own funeral wishes is typically a taboo subject. If you go back 150 years, death was a constant companion. When a loved one died, the coffin would be there in the front room for three or four days. Death was simply accepted as a natural part of life and all the funeral arrangements would have been organised within family and you would have been buried locally."

Statistics reveal that nowadays at least 70% of the UK population opt for cremation. However, it has been estimated that a typical cremation

releases about 320kg of carbon dioxide equivalent into the atmosphere.

Francis is keen to spread awareness of natural burials as a greener, more environmentally friendly option.

He said: "Attitudes are changing and the word is spreading. It's the combination of people taking green issues much more seriously, coupled with the fact that more and more people are beginning to talk about

death generally, such as on the radio, on TV and the recent rise of the Death Café movement. The common misconception of a natural burial is

> that it's a much more 'hippy' alternative than it actually is."

Francis added: "Aside from the environmental aspect, we feel a natural burial can give families a more positive experience than a cremation. A cremation is a very industrial process; when the curtain closes you don't know what happens and you don't

really want to think about what happens.

"At a natural burial, mourners will often tell me how it was the perfect option for them and their loved one. We've found that people want more control over their funerals and the way they say goodbye to their loved ones – they're planning ahead and making their wishes known.

"Natural burial is certainly not for everyone but if you love the countryside and care for the environment it offers a real choice to do something positive at the end of a life. We're all going to die, it's all part of life's rich tapestry. Death is a part of life, we couldn't have life without death."

DENTDALE, HEAD TO FOOT

Following the postponement of our March meeting due to the inclement weather from the so called "Beast from the East", when David Wright was to have given his talk on Icons (which he will now give at our September meeting), we had a most interesting talk from Jeff Clegg on the various types of mining that have occurred locally in the fairly recent past.

Jeff, who I first met when we arrived some seven years ago, I quickly realised was a colleague of one of my old work colleagues at the Hargreaves Group and they were not only both potholers but also interested in mining research in the Dales area. Indeed, Jeff is a member of two local mining research groups and it is mostly from these that his talk was constructed.

Naturally, the majority of the mining explored by the mining research groups was concerned with lead mining in the Dales and the reconstruction of the Sir Francis Level entrance, complete with a new keystone after the first had been misappropriated, showed the complexity and original skill of those early miners. In particular the quality of the underground stonework was of superb workmanship, which was incredible as every stone was laid using only candlelight.

They have come across some strange things left underground, particularly personal items such a boots and tools and many of these have been recently on view at their mining museum, which unfortunately has had to close due to staffing problems. However, many of these items are to be put on display this summer in the YDNP's Countryside

Museum in Hawes so they will be preserved for posterity. Strangely, one find many years ago was "Buckden Bill" who had for whatever reason met his end in the upper levels of the mine and was discovered by my work colleague, who is commonly known as "The Oracle" due to his vast knowledge of Dales mining. Suffice it to say he was eventually given a fitting end at Skipton crematorium and I remember a lunch time conversation at Hargreaves Group where "The Oracle" was recounting his find and one of the diners who was a particularly refined accountant type, turned a most peculiar shade of green and left the dining room!

The other types of mining in this area were coal and stone, coal mostly for personal use so the mines were small and often produced poor quality coal, but at least it did not have to be bought. Stone mining was specifically for flat, flag type stones and again was mostly for local consumption for roofing and flooring.

As in many other cases changes in technology and world economics caused the demise of these fascinating industries in the early part of the 20th century, but we were very fortunate to hear how a group of committed enthusiasts have continued to preserve this history for future generations.

Our next meeting is on May 4th, where we are having a rest from our series of talks and having an "At Home" to review the year to date and start to lay plans for 2019 and 2020! (plus probably start to plan for our Annual Christmas Over 60's lunch in

temperatures. Because of the inclement conditions we had to postpone two working parties during February and rescheduled them in March and April, luckily the weather was kind and we were able to undertake essential maintenance at the orchard.

South Lakeland Orchard Group (SLOG) kindly donated eleven Yorkshire apple trees, ten of which were planted using the cordon system. The trees are pruned to a single stem and grow at a 45 degree angle on a strong wire and metal support, this means you can grow trees in a smaller area and they still produce plenty of fruit to enjoy, in addition to this, the other 20 apple

trees and 6 damson trees were fed, pruned and weeded all ready for a great growing season. Our thanks goes to all our members for their help and ongoing support.

The next step to be taken is the filling of the raised beds with topsoil, we are waiting for the land to dry out a bit first though, as the loader may well sink at the time if writing! Once this has happened we can plant strawberries, raspberries, blueberries and rhubarb as well as a good selection of herbs and flowers for the bees and butterflies.

MARCH WEATHER

March "many weathers" for certain. Did it come in like a lion? I think it was more like a Siberian tiger!! The snow fall during the night of the first

followed by the wind we went from a white out back to green fields as all the snow was blown into the gateways and road. These drifts cut off many country roads around the area. Even the snowplough got stuck up Mallerstang apparently! Temperatures varied from a low of 18.5F (-7.5C) to a high of 68.4F (20.22C). On only one night did the wind chill stay above freezing. On some of the bitterly cold east winds the chill went down to single figure F (-10C) Now that is cold! During the colder early part of the month we had a large depression and strong winds. The maximum gust I recorded was 27.1mph (43.6kph). I often feel these figures are rather low judging by the way things are blown about so

perhaps my anemometer can't deal with it or is sheltered by trees in certain directions. Precipitation was certainly varied in type and colour but a total of 2.7 inches (67.8mm). So it was not the wettest month by a long way but enough to keep the mud going.

After the super display of snowdrops last month it was a dazzling display of daffodils this month. Later in the month some early crocuses made an appearance. It is a mystery around our garden as to where our crocus corms go. We have planted hundreds as an early source of pollen, should we get any decent days, for the bees but most have disappeared. The yellow ones have their flowers pulled off by the sparrows. Perhaps small

rodents eat the corms. Forsythia and cornus mas also put on an early show of yellow and many shrubs started to show green buds and hazel catkins have lengthened. The blackthorn was starting to show early signs of its white blossom. I gather the early snow was costly to hill sheep farmers where sheep had taken shelter under walls only to be buried in the drifts. I had to dig my way into the field and use a child's plastic sledge to tow food and water to the sheep.

troughs.

The month of May is the time when many of these are in bloom, so a trip to a garden with a good rockery or Alpine area (Holehird near Windermere and Harlow Carr near Harrogate are good examples) and a search through a nursery or garden centre (Larch Cottage near Penrith has a good "rockery" section) will provide plenty of inspiration.

I grow most of my "Alpines" in concrete troughs and clay pots. They like a very free draining compost, so I mix John Innes no.2 with equal quantities of sharp grit, and make sure that the drainage holes at the base of the containers are kept open by the addition of some crocks or stones or a layer of large gravel.

In this medium you can grow a variety of things, from the early flowering, *Corydalis solida* 'George Baker' which has striking, coral/red flowers and the strange green

flowered *Haquetia epipactis*, to the vibrant blue Gentians – *G. acaulis* and *G. cruciata* with large trumpet shaped blooms and *G. verna*, the native Spring Gentian, whose upturned flowers are smaller, but no less attractive.

I also grow a variety of "Pinks" (*Dianthus*) in the same conditions. The tiny cushions of blue/ grey leaves of *D*. 'La Bourbrille' and *D*. 'Inshriach Dazzler' – both with bright pink flowers, and white flowered *D*. 'Arctic Snow' look well with the ferny foliage of "Storksbill" – *Erodium* 'Country Park' (pink flowers) and *E. guttatum* (white flowers with a dark red blotch).

For a contrast, grow one of the rosette forming, grey leaved

Saxifrages. Saxifraga 'Tumbling Waters' or Saxifraga 'Doctor Ramsey', Both bear impressive flower spikes of little white flowers which can reach 10 to 12 inches in height. They may be short lived – unless plants have managed to produce side rosettes they die after flowering, but they do make a wonderful and unusual display in the early summer.

NEW BRIDGE ON THE LUNE New Bridge on the Lune

Fisherman's Bridge on the upper Lune was destroyed in December 2015 during Storm Desmond, along with Birks Bridge on the Rawthey and a section of footpath, also on the Rawthey, near Brigflatts. As a result,





three footpaths needed diverting, including sections of the recently established Sedbergh Quaker Trail. However, as of the beginning of this year, the path network around Sedbergh is entire again.

On Friday the 23rd of February a small crowd watched as Cumbria County Councillor and Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority Member Nick Cotton cut the tape to officially open the new bridge. He said:-

"Fisherman's Bridge on the Lune near Goodies had stood for 60 years. A county surveyor's note stamped 16 July 1957 recorded that it cost £363 7s 10d (£363.39).

After Storm Desmond, only the stumps of the four piers on the riverbed remained of the old

The new bridge cost £110,000, with individuals and local groups donating £12,500 to the project – including WMB Trust, FoLD, Yorkshire Dales Society in memory of John Willson, John Hatt, Ramblers Lake District Area, Kendal Group and Lancaster Group, The Dales Way Association, Sedbergh Parish Council, Sedbergh Anglers, Sedbergh Walking and Cycling Group, and Richard & Dorcas Thomas.

The 35 metre long bridge was a year in the planning and took eight weeks to construct. The new bridge was designed with only one pier, to create less obstruction to flow during flood events. A total of 22 steel

beams, each weighing 130kg, were bolted together to span the river and support a wooden walkway.

Cumbria County Council
Contractors constructed the stone
clad piers and wooden steps. The
Yorkshire Dales National Park
Authority constructed the bridge itself.

The bridge was almost lost during a period of heavy rainfall on 22nd November last year when the river level rose in excess of 4 metres. This force of water pressed against the scaffold which was swept away, and bent the bridge sideways and downwards on the longest of the two spans (23m length). Fortunately this remained attached and the scaffold was salvaged. Luckily the project had

been insured by the YDNPA.

I should like to pay a special tribute to David Clare who craned the damaged bridge off the piers, repaired it in the adjoining field and then craned it back on to the piers, all within two weeks of the damage being done.

The bridge recreates the link between Firbank (part of the new extension to the YDNP) and Howgill. It is an important link as it is the only footbridge across the River Lune for miles in each direction, the nearest crossings being road bridges at Lincoln's Inn on the A684 and the Crook of Lune Bridge to the north along Howgill Lane. In fact it is the only publicly accessible footbridge

over the River Lune between Kirkby Lonsdale and Tebay, a distance of over 30km.

Finally, I'd like to thank the Capstick family of Hole House Farm for their support and co-operation in allowing access for our machinery over their land and for allowing us to park our cars and meet up here today."

The new bridge is on the route of the "Sedbergh Quaker Trail", which was devised by Dave Smith of the Sedbergh Area Walking and Cycling Group and supported by the Sustainable Development Fund. The trail is described in booklet available at the Sedbergh Information Centre on Main Street.

SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

Tanya & Edmund Hoare full house this year.

By the first week or so in May our swifts should be back- it's often their calls that first alert us to look up and welcome them once again: the poet Ted Hughes best expressed the elation he felt when the swifts return: They've made it again Which means the globe's still working, the Creation's Still waking refreshed. Our summer's Still all to come

The first swifts to arrive are the breeding birds, going straight back to the exact same site that they occupied for previous years, along with the swifts that were roosting in pairs for the first time last year (ie. just spending the night in their newly established sites). A few weeks later the non-breeders return, the birds that are not yet mature enough to breed. These are the swifts that we hope to attract to new nesting places.

Last summer, in the nest bricks we installed in the gable end of People's Hall Gym, the two lower nest bricks both had breeding swifts. The two upper nest bricks had roosting pairs so we are fervently hoping that they return safely to breed this year - it would be marvellous if it became a full house this year.

Swifts only have time to raise one brood in the 3 months they are here. Two, or sometimes three, eggs are generally laid by the 3rd or 4th week of May, with both swifts taking turns at incubation. Compare this with swallows and house martins, which have at least two broods with around 5 chicks in each. This low rate of reproduction shows how vulnerable swifts are. The eggs usually hatch

We are anxiously awaiting the safe return of the two pairs of Settlebeck School swifts, in the boxes facing Maryfell flats. Last year the pupils and staff could watch live activity on a TV screen in reception, and the webcams installed in the boxes streamed what's happening to anyone in the community who logged in. To do this, go to the school website www.settlebeckschool.org, click on the 'swifts' tab, and go to the link for the webcams. If you scroll down there are also instructions for watching via a smart phone or tablet, to watch because last year we had problems with the link buffering.

If you have nesting swifts – or see them at your neighbour - we would love to hear about them and also if

any new nest sites are established. If you had nesting swifts last year and they have sadly failed to return, please also let us know as it all helps us to keep track of our Sedbergh swifts.

If you spot any swifts flying close to the tower of St. Andrew's church, please contact us, we are hoping that this year they may be attracted to the boxes on the west side.

SEDBERGH ECONOMIC PARTNERSHIP

Professor Andy Cobb

Background: In 2017 an economic study of Sedbergh was initiated, cofunded by South Lakes District Council (SLDC), Yorkshire Dales National Park (YDNP), Sedbergh Parish Council (SPC), Chamber of Trade and Business (Chamber). Cumbria County Council (CCC) and Sedbergh School (SS). The final report of the consultant proposed a Sedbergh Economic Partnership, to deliver an economic plan, based on an agreed Action Plan of projects, as a basis for future investment decisions in Sedbergh over the next decade.

Aims: (1) To capture and help deliver business community, including

projects to help the economy of the town. (2) To work together to remove and overcome blockages which may be preventing projects being delivered.

Membership: At a preliminary meeting in the Sedbergh School library on the 20th February, it was agreed that the Partnership would be steered by a Board and led by the private sector, with Andy Cobb (Chamber) in the Chair and Peter Marshall/ Nikki Millington (SS) as Vice-Chair. Other members will represent YDNP; County, District and Parish (SPC) Councils; the Community Interest Company (responsible for the TIC) and further representatives of the Sedbergh business community, including



Farfield Mill and the Black Bull hotel. Others may be co-opted to discuss specific projects. Supporting officers from SLDC, YDNP and the CCC will highlight any funding opportunities, as and when they become available.

Meetings: To be held in Sedbergh up to four times each year, with administrative support provided by SLDC. Notes of meetings and a regularly updated Action Plan will be published on www.Sedbergh.org.uk Progress will be formally reviewed every two years.

The Current Action Plan: This ambitious list, not in prioritised order, gives a brief title for each project, identifies a local lead body, or person, and a target date. Reports on progress will be updated at each meeting. The list will no doubt be amended in time!!

Some have told their victims that they can pay using iTunes vouchers, which can be bought from local supermarkets. There have been 21 reports of this type of incident in the last 12 months (01/03/2017 to 28/02/2017).

- Do not trust the caller display

In the past, we've had enough time to do everything we need to do because new rail timetables have been published well in advance. usually by early in the New Year at the latest. Unfortunately, however, this year the summer rail timetable was not finally confirmed by Northern Rail until April 6th, which means that we don't have the time to finalise our timetables in time to implement them when the rail timetable changes.

Instead, our summer timetable will start this year in June, not May, and our buses will continue to run on the present timetable until then. As a result, there is going be a short period in late May and June when we will be arriving at Dent, Garsdale and Kirkby Stephen stations at times that don't connect very well with trains.

Many thanks to Robin Davey who wrote the splendid article on Bill Long. I feel I was very lucky to have been taught French by him at Sedbergh School in the 1950's and to have kept in touch with him later in Sedbergh.

Reading about his wartime experiences reminded me about a German teacher at the school called A. E. Hammer (known of course as Jack), who taught me German and was a staffroom colleague of Bill's at that time. But Jack's wartime story was very different from Bill Long's!

Jack told us that smoking had saved his life! One night there was an RAF raid on his town area while he was out at the corner shop buying more cigarettes, and his apartment block had been destroyed. Jack now had nowhere to live and with no relatives to help, he decided to leave Germany and teach German in the UK as a 'native speaker'.

'So that, boys, is how I come to be standing here today' he told us. He was an excellent teacher and I am sure that his story inspired many others to work harder for him and do well in their exams. Many years later my son-in-law also studied German and used 'Hammer's Grammar' which Jack published after retirement and I now have a copy.

GOLF in SEDBERGH

A D Lord

We, that is Sedbergh Golf Club, may be older than we think!

SGC celebrated its Centenary back in 1996, having been founded, we believed, in 1896, by Masters of the Hostel of Sedbergh School.

BUT! it has come to light that "Sedbergh Grammar School GC" began in 1877, thanks to one Alexander Hamilton Doleman (1836-1914), an Assistant Master at Sedbergh School from 1876 to 1879,

who, having laid out a 9 hole course on The Riggs, organised the first competition for prizes, on Wednesday April 4th 1877. Ten players teed off and Thompson won with 60 strokes, followed by Toppin 64, Hinde 66 and Prescott 68.

Sedbergh School therefore probably became the first in England to introduce golf as one of the school games and the Masters, playing socially, led by Doleman, effectively formed Sedbergh Golf Club.

Doleman himself was no mean golfer, having previously won a Medal at Cambridge University GC, later becoming a member of both Royal Liverpool and Royal Musselburgh, having finished a wonderful 9 in The Open Championship in 1870 at

Prestwick! He was involved in 1886 in the founding of Lytham & St. Anne's GC, now also given Royal status.

Golf developed and was well taught at Sedbergh School, for in 1896 a former pupil by the name of H. J. (Harry) Whigham won no less a tournament than the American Amateur Championship and in that same year, another Old Sedberghian, the charismatic Freddie Tait (Evans House) won the much coveted English Amateur Championship, and repeated the feat in 1898. Both of course had played schoolboy golf on The Riggs.

The evidence of a golf club in Sedbergh in 1877 would make SGC the oldest or first golf club in Yorkshire! Further investigation is on-
