DOORSTEP CALLERS

Cumbria Trading Standards are warning residents across the County about doorstep callers offering to carry out home improvements, including roofing and guttering, following an increase in complaints.

Residents should be extremely cautious when approached by any doorstep callers offering to sell goods or conduct work on their property. These types of callers often use persuasive or aggressive tactics to get people to agree to have work carried out and then charge far more than was quoted for poor quality work or goods.

They also often fail to provide a legally required cancellation notice which enables the householder to

cancel the work in certain circumstances.

Trading Standards advice is to always say 'NO' to any cold callers and we ask that you please look out for elderly or vulnerable family, friends and neighbours.

PETER YORKE

Sally, Susannah & Jessica Yorke, with contributions from numerous friends.

Peter was well known throughout the Lune Valley and beyond; easily recognisable in his quintessential tweed breeches, tattersall check shirt and cravat or, more often than not, to be found scaling the fells in a tatty rugby shirt, shorts and knee-length socks, with a border collie in tow.

Born in Eccles, Manchester on 12 September 1938, Peter came to the Lune Valley when his parents bought Casterton Grange in 1940. He spent the majority of his life in his beloved Westmorland, with the exception of his time studying history at Hertford College, Oxford University and several years teaching at Ardvreck School in Perthshire. Having been a pupil at Cressbrook School in Kirkby Lonsdale, he returned as a teacher in 1963 and later became Deputy Headmaster. After its closure in 1976 a small group of Cressbrook boys relocated to Sedbergh School, where Peter, an Old Sedberghian himself (Powell House, 1952-57), established Cressbrook House, and remained as Housemaster for seven years and a teacher for another eleven years after that. Combining his love of the outdoors and his passion for teaching, he influenced and shaped the lives of countless young people.

He loved the fells in and around Sedbergh. He would always, on the first day of the school year, take the

boys of Cressbrook House to the top of his beloved Winder, Later, when living at its foot, he climbed the hill every day making many hundred ascents. He regularly organised school camping trips in the local area and further afield to Loch Earn in the Scottish highlands and the island of Rùm, off the west coast of Scotland. He would even take boys ice-skating on the local tarns, occasionally in the dark illuminating the scene with his car headlights and providing flasks of warming hot chocolate. On all of these expeditions Peter seemed to know the land-owners and the local people, even on Rùm he was on first name terms with many of the inhabitants.

It is testament to Peter's loyalty to Sedbergh School that on retiring from teaching in 1994, he spent the next twelve years working tirelessly on fundraising for the school and was instrumental in establishing the Foundation, the Friends of Sedbergh School and the 1525 Society. He then put his acquired knowledge and expertise to further good use as an advisor to the Friends of Cumbria's Museum of Military Life, for whom he

was also treasurer since its inception in 2002.

In 1983, aged 45 and an apparently confirmed bachelor, Peter married Pat which resulted in his three beloved daughters; Sally, Susannah and Jessica. Having been a father figure to so many young Cressbrook boys for more than 20 years he probably wasn't entirely prepared for three daughters to come along! But we couldn't have asked for a better father or role model to look up to; to learn from, and to aspire to be like. His selfless encouragement and



support was endless, his only wish was for us to be happy and true to ourselves.

Peter upheld a great number of friendships; captivating everyone he met and transforming acquaintances into lifelong friends. His ability to care and to cherish relationships was enormous. He was an exceptionally loyal person; that loyalty borne out of his staunch principles of fairness and out of his interest in, and thoughtfulness about, others. He seemed to know just about everybody and how they were all connected. Certainly his knowledge of Sedbergh and Sedberghians was encyclopaedic.

A highly respected member of the local neighbourhood and

longstanding church warden at the Church of the Holy Ghost in Middleton, Peter was always keen to maintain a sense of community. His involvement with the church finances, the coffee mornings and exhibitions all helped to bring the people of Middleton together. He invested a lot of time organising the recent relocation of the Roman Milestone to the churchyard, including overseeing the move in the pouring rain. He was extremely honoured to be made president of the Barbon and District



Agricultural Society in 2017 and, as he said in his speech at the Barbon Sheep Dog Trials in August last year, he believed that the strength of the local community lies in the farming traditions which over very many years have influenced the way of life here.

Peter died aged 79 on 12 April 2018 and his life was celebrated on 27 April by a packed congregation in St Mary's, Kirkby Lonsdale, after which he was laid to rest at Middleton.

Peter will be remembered for being a kind, modest and gentle man who cared for others and who made an indelible impression on those he met along the way. We shall not see his like again.

neighbourhoodalert

TV Providers Discount Fraud The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) have noticed an increase in Action Fraud reports where fraudsters are offering a discount on Television service provider subscriptions. Fraudsters are cold-calling victims, purporting to be from a Television (TV) provider offering a discount on their monthly subscription. Victims have been told the following: their subscription needs to be renewed; that part or all, of the TV equipment has expired and they are due an upgrade on the equipment/subscription. In order to falsely process the discount, the fraudster asks victims to confirm or provide their bank account details. The scammers may also request the victim's identification documents, such as scanned copies of passports.

The fraudsters are using the following telephone numbers: "08447111444", "02035190197" and "08001514141". The fraudster's voices are reported to sound feminine and have an Asian accent.

Later victims make enquiries and then discover that their TV service provider did not call them and that the fraudster has made transactions using the victim's bank account details.

This type of fraud is nationwide. Since the beginning of this year (2018), there have been 300 Action Fraud Reports relating to this fraud. From the reports received, victims aged over 66 seem to be the most targeted.

email is authentic: Just because someone knows your basic details (such as your name and address or even your mother's maiden name), it doesn't mean they are genuine. Criminals can exploit the names of well-known companies in order to make their scams appear genuine.

- Don't be rushed or pressured into making a decision: a genuine company won't force you to make a financial decisions on the spot. Always be wary if you're pressured to purchase a product or service quickly, and don't hesitate to question uninvited approaches in case it's a scam.
- Stay in control: Have the confidence to refuse unusual requests for personal or financial information. Always contact the company yourself using a known email or phone number, such as the one written on a bank statement or bill.

For those of us who really care about our area elections are always a daunting prospect. Thank you to everyone who delivered leaflets, helped us put up signs, ferried us around, rescued us when the clutch went on my car and generally made our lives worth living. But most of all thank you for taking the trouble to come out and vote for us.

No doubt because there were three candidates each for the three main

parties our votes were up somewhat on last years' county elections, reflecting the trend throughout South Lakeland. Thank you so much to Mel (and May) Mackie for his (their) tireless support over the last three years as my district council colleague, you have been a real advocate for our community, especially on economic development matters. The seat which you won with three votes is now safely held by Sheila by four votes!

As well as holding the two Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale seats, we made gains in both of the neighbouring wards. We now hold all three seats in the new Burton and Crooklands ward and Pat Bell topped the poll for us in the Kendal Rural ward which includes Killington and Firbank. The new council has 29 Lib Dems, 19 Conservatives and 3 Labour. Sadly, we are still in opposition but we are in the ascendant and from our point of view this is the best result in fourteen

candidates, whichever party they are from. And commiserations to all those candidates who worked really hard to get elected but sadly failed to get the votes needed. As I am sure many of you are aware the result was incredibly close this year (there were only 4 votes in it for the third councillor) which is of course very disappointing for some and a bit worrying for others. It will be interesting to see what happens in Sedbergh at next year's election.

On a personal note I was very pleased that across the district the Liberal Democrats remained in control of the council. It makes my job so much easier having a district council to work with who broadly

share my point of view on things. Several of my colleagues in Parliament have told me how hard it can be to make things happen when the councils they work with have a different view of the world.

Outside elections I really enjoyed getting a chance to drive the Western Dales Community Bus from Joss Lane Car Park in Sedbergh all the way to Morrisons in Kendal and back the other day. For those who don't know, that is the S1 route that the bus follows on a Saturday. For reasons partly to do with insurance but also partly to do with fear, I had no passengers. That said by the time I got back to Sedbergh I was driving fairly confidently. I was doing this as

they are short of volunteers to drive the buses around Kirkby Stephen, Dent and Sedbergh and the team wanted to show me how easy it is.

I'm afraid that my schedule, what with all the travel down to London, does not allow me time to volunteer to drive the buses regularly but if you are at all interested I can promise that it is pretty easy, the buses aren't that big, and really enjoyable when you get the hang of it. If you are at all interested just Google "Western Dales Community Bus" and look for the volunteering tab. It is a brilliant service and deserves all of our support.

Western Dales Bus summer timetables will come into effect from June 18th, and there are a number of changes from the present ones.

The S4 Thursday service to Kirkby Stephen will now also go on to

Brough, but unfortunately the S3 Tuesday service to Hawes will not be running after June 12th. Over the last few years, we have tried various routes and timetables, but passenger numbers have remained very low in spite of this and so we have reluctantly concluded that we can no longer run it.

Other changes are as follows:

- 1) S1 Saturday service to Kendal:
 - Timings will change to maintain connections with the new train timetable.
 - The number of return journeys between Sedbergh and Kendal will increase from four to five
 - Some journeys will take a shorter route into or out of Kendal.
- 2) S4 Friday service between Sedbergh and Kirkby Stephen:
 - Timings will also change to maintain connections with the new train timetable
 - Three return journeys will be maintained
 - Owing to a lack of demand, the service will no longer go via Ravenstonedale, but instead will go to on to Brough.
- 3) S5 Thursday service to Kirkby Stephen and Kendal:
 - This will continue with a few minor amendments to timings

The courts are not locked, and they are open to anyone one who wants a game.


Club members have priority on Sunday afternoons and Thursday evenings, and we hope to have some coaching sessions for youngsters and maybe adults at some point during the summer.

communities.



APRIL WEATHER

It certainly lived up to its reputation as a showery month. Although the total rainfall was only 2.57 inches (65.4mm) there were only 8 days on which it did not rain. The longest dry spell was 5 days. Temperatures were variable with a low of 26.6F (-3C) to a high of 75.9F (24.4C). The wind chill took most nights below freezing with only 7 nights staying above zero. It was quite a breezy month with only 3 days when the maximum gust was in single figures. A maximum gust of 24.2mph (38.95kph) was recorded.

Lambing duly started and finished within the month, though a little assistance was brought about by pulling the tups out early. Too soon, as it turned out, as although marked 3 ended up being geld! Interestingly all my coloured ewes only produced singles. There were twins in the whites. I wonder if it's down to the new coloured tup or perhaps the ewes were not in tip top condition at tupping. I understand there were a lot of geld ewes this year.? The bonus was the best ever ration of tups to gimmers, 3 to 8 in the coloureds and 1 to 5 in the whites!! Being so many singles had a down side in that 4 were mal-presented and took some getting. One in particular had me struggling until 2 am! I thought I was not going to be physically strong enough to get it out. The biggest surprise was it was still alive. This

was 5 days after I thought I had finished. The birds have started nesting. Apart from the noisy rooks collecting sticks blackbirds, robins and sparrows are visiting the shippon and blue tits have started to use at least one nest box. The corn has not being going down quite as quick as usual as though some sparrows have gone elsewhere to nest. A cock song thrush has taken up the top of a Christmas tree as his song post and starts at first light and goes on for hours. He is back there again at dusk. The first swallow was seen on the 16th, a week later than usual. There are no signs of activity in the kennels yet. The odd peacock was seen on a decent day. Has anyone heard a cuckoo this year yet? 0

Laburnum trees which dangle their flowers to create a golden, fragrant ceiling of blooms.

I planted a small tree of *Laburnum* 'Vossii' in my garden 4 years ago. So far, due to adverse weather, mine has not flowered. Timely frosts have turned the emerging flower buds to something resembling boiled lettuce, but this year I have high hopes of a good display. I shall have to stand underneath and gaze up and imagine that it goes on and on, for a hundred yards or so, and I shall have my own Bodnant!

Laburnum is probably the most commonly grown tree in the Pea family, but there are others which are very attractive and worth including if you have the space.

There are several species and cultivars of *Robinia* (False Acacia). *Robinia pseudoacacia* 'Frisia' has leaves which are bright yellow from spring to autumn and *R*.

'Decaisneana' has mid green leaves and long racemes of pink flowers. Similar in growth and habit are the "Honey Locusts" – cultivars of Gleditsia triacanthos. They are grown for their fern like foliage. G. triacanthos 'Sunburst' is a beautiful yellow leaved cultivar and 'Ruby Lace' has ruby red new foliage, which darkens to bronze green in summer. Perhaps the strangest small tree in this family is a graft hybrid (chimera) of Laburnum and Cytisus (Broom). Laburnocytisus adamii stems have a core of Laburnum wood and an outer laver of Cvtisus wood. Some branches produce yellow flowers, some pink broom flowers and, where the plant's stems are really muddled, they produce hybrid flowers which are

coppery pink. The mixing of the two types of plant makes for a tree of rather scruffy nature – but it does make an excellent talking point.

SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

Tanya & Edmund Hoare

We saw our first swifts in Sedbergh this year on May 4th, in Main St and Back lane, a beautiful warm day after a period of very cold weather, and shoppers at the Sedbergh market on Wed 9th would have seen them circling overhead. But on the whole it has been a very slow start to the 'swift season', with far fewer swifts than usual seen flying around, and it is a situation mirrored throughout the country.

However, we were astonished to



find that two of the swifts in the Settlebeck webcam boxes arrived back exceptionally early, one in each box on 28 & 30 April. This is the earliest record we have ever had of swifts returning here. One had to wait until 10th May for its mate to arrive and at the time of writing (15th May)

the other was still alone. Details again for accessing the webcams: www.settlebeckschool.org, click on the swift tab for instructions. We recommend scrolling down for instructions on downloading a free app to use with a phone or tablet.

What sets swifts apart is that we never see swifts still. We only ever see them in flight, and never perched or on the nest like other birds. What is so enjoyable on a warm summer's evening in June and July is watching then swooping and swirling, eventually spiralling higher and higher until they are out of sight, screaming as they go. They spend the night at over 1,000m high, descending again at dawn.

June and July are peak time for

enjoying watching our swifts. From mid-June onwards, when the eggs hatch, swifts will more active in feeding the chicks. The breeding adults always come into the nest at night, so just before it gets dark is a good time to spot nest sites. Swifts flying high on the sky are busy feeding and at this time of year will be a mixture of breeders and those that are not yet old enough, the non-breeders.

Terra Incognita – Antarctic Wildlife Dr Myles Ripley

"Below the 40th latitude there is no law; below the 50th no god; below the 60th no common sense and below the 70th no intelligence whatsoever." - Kim Stanley Robinson 1999 "Great God! this is an awful place." - Scott (1868—1912)

In 1820 – 1821 records show that 320,000 fur seals were killed for the fur trade in the South Shetlands, and it is estimated that a possible 100,000 further deaths resulted from pups left behind when their mothers were killed. By 1830 there was no significant fur seal population left to hunt. In the period 1929 – 1930 the Antarctic Whaling records show over

40,000 whales taken with the majority being Blue Whales. This carnage is over, partly due to there being no commercial sized population surviving and partly because the key product from these whales was the oil that was so vital for lubricants, fuel and other bye products replaced by the rise of petrochemical industry has at least the above as a justification.

Interesting both the fur seals and whales relied on the Krill as a main foodstock but the population of Krill didn't seem to mushroom as a result as other predators took over. One worry about climate change is that Salps (a planktonic tunicate) which also feed on plankton are favoured by increasing temperature and may outcompete the other species feeding on the plankton and this may reduce the numbers of whales and seals in the Antarctic.

Why might a wildlife enthusiast visit the Antarctic – after all there is the unpleasant voyage across the Drake Passage which is one of the stormiest seas in the world - and the temperature must be really cold surely? But those who put up with those conditions are rewarded with a fantastic set of animals who are

largely unafraid of humans and therefor easy to approach. Of course all these animals are in an environment that is breathtakingly beautiful. Your guides will tell you not to get within 5 m of penguins, but nobody tells the penguins about that rule and they approach you on their travels! Since most visitors arrive in the penguin breeding season there are chicks to see and the parents are busy travelling to and fro to bring food to keep the chicks growing. Likewise if you visit a bit earlier then lactating seals need plenty of food to supply the 50% fat content of their milk (human milk is about 4%) which in turn allows a growth rate of 2kg a day!

Beaches covered with Penguins and seals; seas with plentiful whales, penguins and seals and if you are lucky sightings of killer whales. Various birds such as Antarctic Skuas, Yellow Sheathbills and Kelp Gulls are opportunist species that feed variously on carrion, guano, eggs and chicks. Vividly blue eyed Antarctic Shags will be nesting as well. Antarctic terns, confusingly similar to Arctic Terns (who will have migrated to the Antarctic for another summer harvest) will be busy fishing along the shores and defending their nests vigorous by dive bombing you with their lethal beaks. If you dragged yourself on deck in the Drake Passage, coping with seasickness, you will have been rewarded with views of some of the greatest flying seabirds in the world -The Albatrosses who remain aloft for years at a time using the air currents off the ocean swells to provide lift. The antics of the Cape and Storm petrels swooping across the ship will have set your camera shutters off.

What makes this apparently inhospitable environment so rich? The interaction of the cold waters

travelling north from the Antarctic and the warmer waters travelling south causes an upwelling of nutrients from the ocean floor along the circumference of the Antarctic at about 60 degrees North - it's called the Antarctic Convergence. As you travel South the sea temperature suddenly drops about 3 degrees but the productivity of the sea increases massively akin to plant growth after fertiliser is administered. This 60 degrees circle is where the Antarctic Treaty rules come into force. This treaty, signed originally by 12 nations and now 53, governs the continent and puts into abeyance any national claims to territory left over from Empire building days in earlier centuries. In effect it has established Antarctica as a scientific preserve, establishes freedom of scientific investigation and bans military activity on the continent.

What will become of the continent in future years as climate change and increasingly nationalistic nations home in on potential resources on and around the continent is anybody's guess. My recommendation is to go and visit soon – you won't be disappointed. O

Our response to farming consultation: "Yes, but..."

The government's "direction of travel" for food, farming and the environment post-Brexit is spot on, but the plans have serious "shortcomings", National Parks England (NPE) has said.

Acting on behalf of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) and England's other National Parks, NPE has submitted a 28-page response to Defra's major "Health and Harmony" command paper consultation.

NPE says there are omissions in the support wrong, rural poverty could

list of public goods that should attract payments in a new system of farm support, and describes the plans for rural development as "too weak". The response also makes clear that farmers' livelihoods – particularly in the uplands – are at stake, along with recent environmental gains.

The YDNPA has formally identified post-Brexit farming policy as being of "critical" importance.

YDNPA Chairman Carl Lis said: "It is hard to overstate the size of the opportunity at hand. Here is a chance to make upland farming pay again, while dramatically improving the state of the environment. Yet if we get the transition to a new system of farm support wrong, rural poverty could

increase and communities could be lost, as could environmental gains achieved over many years.

"Perhaps the most important point we have made is that the proposed new Environmental Land Management scheme (ELMs) must avoid a system of national prescription that prevents local flexibility. Broad parameters could be set nationally - and we are delighted with direction of travel towards an outcome-based scheme that makes 'public payments for public goods'. But it is absolutely vital that large amounts of discretion are granted to those who will implement the scheme with farmers and landowners at a local level. All the experience and the

knowledge of the land that farmers have must be utilised.

"As the paper says, we believe an outcome-based approach should be a fundamental underlying principle for the new ELMs. This means changing to a culture of positive reward for delivering environmental outcomes rather than compensation for loss of production."

The NPE response made several constructive criticisms of the command paper, including that:

Proposals to preserve rural resilience and traditional farming and landscapes were "too weak and underdeveloped". The response says that the ELMs should not be "divorced" from

rural development. "Supporting the continuity of active farming families and communities is critical to maintaining and delivering the full range of public goods and benefits outlined in the command paper," it argues.

- Paying only for environmental "enhancements" could unwittingly penalise farmers who have been good custodians of the land. The solution would be to create payments for environmental conservation as well as enhancement.
- Public access needed greater emphasis. The NPE response says farmers and landowners should be paid for providing a

- joined up and integrated access network including to areas of open access.
- Water management was omitted from the list of public benefits that might be delivered through the new ELMs. Water management payments would reward farmers for reducing flood and drought risk and increasing resilience to both.
- Too little recognition was given to the role the ELMs could play in the protection of the historic environment.
- Urgent action should be taken to extend existing Higher Level Stewardship schemes that are due to expire in order to protect

The SDF is available again this year, with the same budget, and applications are being invited now.


The largest recipient of funds in 2017/18 was Broadband for the Rural North, a Community Benefit Society that works with local communities to bring hyperfast broadband to remote places. It received £30,000 from the SDF to help pay for the connection cabinets needed to bring broadband to residents and businesses in Howgill, Firbank, Sedbergh and Cautley.

Projects do not have to be state-ofthe-art to win funding: two of the more recent awards have been for car parking. In Thornton Rust in

Wensleydale, the car park in the Outgang was upgraded with the help of a SDF grant of £3,740. In Sedbergh, the parking area to the north of St Andrew's Church was enhanced with the help of £2.500 from the SDF.

Grants typically were in the thousands of pounds, but several smaller requests were met, including £466 for the restoration of a historic cobbled road ford near Horton-in-Ribblesdale.

The Park Authority's SDF officer, Andrea Burden, said: "Uplifting stories lie behind each of the grants. Many of the applicants are working for the good of their community - and it has been rewarding to see how a

bit of help from the SDF can go a long way. I'd like to thank all the 2017/18 applicants and urge anyone with a new project idea to get in touch: the SDF might be able to assist getting the project off the around."

SEDBERGH NEEDS YOU

You will need to be over 18, with a clean driving license and be willing to give up a few hours a week, or more if it suits you.

You can choose when and for how long you are on duty and it need not be a regular time/day, ie: when it suits you.

All kit will be provided – and you will have a friendly team of fellow First Responders to support you.

You will be fully trained first with an online preliminary course and then a hands on two day course. There will be monthly training updates/team meetings and a yearly reassessment.

You will be trained to attend a patient to initiate first aid before the Ambulance arrives, such as:

- taking a history and assessing the situation to report back to Ambulance control:
- use of defibrillator (AED) and

CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation);

- oxygen therapy;
- dealing with wounds.

In most cases your major role is to calm and reassure both the patient and relatives/friends.

Then to prepare for a possible Ambulance evacuation to hospital, eg: collect together medication.

than its name would suggest.
Covering not only Morecambe Bay,
an area the size of Greater
Manchester with is tides, gullies and
quicksands, but also covering the
whole of Cumbria and North
Lancashire should the need arise.

All the 22 volunteer members of the team have day jobs and on the whole, understanding employers! Bay Search and Rescue is a charity totally relying on grants and donations to fund its £66,000 a year running costs. Two fairly recently opened charity shops also help enormously with the fund raising. The whole concept started in 1996 when a walker was caught in quicksands 4 miles out in the bay. Luckily his cries for help, were heard by a dog walker and he was safely rescued but it took 32 people and 8 hours to get him out.

In 1999 a specialist team was formed with a hovercraft, bought with

a donation and things have gone from strength to strength from there.

The team now use ex-army tracked vehicles along with Landrovers and other 4wd vehicles. The Haaglands are personnel carriers, capable of carrying 18 people or more and can travel over quicksands, deep snow and through floods..

The team have been involved in many rescues in and around Morecambe Bay but also the floods in Cockermouth, Carlisle and as a result of Storm Desmond. More recently they were helping the snowbound drivers and communities around Millom and Nenthead.

Volunteers undergo rigorous, regular training and many are trauma specialists, providing cover and


