It has been an incredibly busy first month for Zero Waste Sedbergh:

There are now a number of food outlets in Sedbergh who have agreed to offer free water bottle refills. This is a scheme that has been very successful in other towns up and down the country, and I am confident it will work well in Sedbergh. A full list of participating establishments can be found on our Facebook and Twitter pages, and also at zerowastesedbergh.wordpress.com (please do visit these sites for all up to date news on ZWS).

If I look at the single-use plastic in our house, one of the repeat offenders is milk bottles. So it is welcome news that local milkman Liam Kelly is now offering doorstep delivery for Sedbergh residents, in glass bottles, for a trial period. If you would like to know more, or add your order to his round, do contact him ASAP on 07504223968 or email him at liam@lkcomputerservices.co.uk

I have also been in touch with Simply Repair South Lakes to discuss hosting a repair event in Sedbergh later on this year – more news on this

in coming weeks.

And you may well have seen in local news that Booths supermarket has made huge strides in tackling single use plastic head-on.

They have pledged to introduce a number of measures in their stores including: a new bag for life using 90% recycled plastic; cotton bags as a reusable solution for fresh produce; phasing out the 5p carrier bag; replacing plastic drinking straws with paper ones; and they are also testing a starch made, compostable veggie Suzie Pye bag to replace the plastic ones. I can't overstate the huge commitment from Booths on this, and I really hope other supermarkets follow suit. I have been in touch with

James Hall & Co. Ltd. who run Sedbergh Spar, but at the time of going to print am yet to receive a reply.

And finally, a date for your diary: Friday July 6th will see the Great Cumbrian Litter Pick taking place in all corners of the county – including Sedbergh! We meet in Joss Lane Car Park at 1pm, and will be finished by 3pm at the latest. Please do come along if you can, and help make Sedbergh cleaner, tidier, and safer for our wildlife.

and with the greatest reluctance. It is inevitable in these circumstances that the role of the police service will come into question. Back in the late 2000's there were the Police Committees and operational matters were very much under the control of the then Chief Constable. Until the injustice made it into the national press and a change of Chief Constable there was very little helpful intervention. Now we have Police and Crime Commissioners and I claim some prescience in being one of only five members of the 84 on Cumbria at the time who supported the change.

Our Commissioner, Peter McCall was going to visit Kirkby Lonsdale towards the end of June but because of the pressure from the community, led by Sheila Capstick that was brought forward so he saw for himself the issues in Sedbergh, Kirkby Stephen and Kirkby Lonsdale. His visit will not solve the problem for future years but it will make a contribution towards a solution.

For too long we have relied upon doing the same as in the previous year, with less vigour and less resource: it was inevitable there would come a reckoning time. For next year we need to reconsider our action plans from beginning to end and that must include an examination of the whole legal basis for the policing response to the fair. We will be failing our fellow residents if we do anything less.

Much of my time over the past months has been taken up trying to get Northern Rail to run a decent service on the Lakes Line. In fact the service is about as bad now as it can be as there simply isn't one. The Minister of Transport, Chris Grayling, allowed Northern to stop running a service on the Lakes Line at all until July. This as we enter into the peak season for tourists and just when school children need to be able to get to school on time for GCSE's and A' levels.

But you, the lucky people of Dent, Garsdale (and even Sedbergh at a push), have managed to get an improved service from Northern. I have no idea why Northern can be so rubbish in one part of the area and so helpful in another but they have been. Mind you perhaps saying that they have been "so helpful" is pushing it a bit. It took a lot of effort by the Dent Parish Council and lots of other local people, and I did what I could to help, but now you can catch a train to

Leeds or Carlisle from Dent or Garsdale that gets you into those cities in time for work (or early shopping). This is brilliant news, I doubt that it will turn Dent or Garsdale into "commuter villages" but it should make living and working in the area so much more manageable for everyone. The only problem is that as Dent Station is so far from Dent your day is going to start with a bit of a drive even with this new service.

I had a meeting with the campaign group the Campaign for National Parks the other day to discuss challenges faced by the Yorkshire Dales National Park, along with the Lake District. They are a great organisation who do a lot of work to help National Parks. They have been working hard on the issue of second homes which, as we all know, turns villages into ghost towns during the week, depriving local schools of children and local businesses of customers. To say nothing of pushing up the prices of homes in the area so young folk simply can't afford to live here. I wanted to press them to support my call for local authorities to be able to increase the council tax that they levy on second homes. This would have the dual benefit of discouraging people from buying second homes and providing some extra money for councils like South Lakeland, to build more affordable homes in the area. I was pleased with how positive they were.

Finally, I was really pleased to be elected the chair of the new, all party, Parliamentary Radiotherapy Group. We met for the first time the other day and agreed that the first issues we will campaign on will be getting the amount the NHS spends on radiotherapy treatment up from the current levels of about 5% and, importantly for us here, push the Government to ensure no-one has to travel for more than 45 minutes to get



treatment. As anyone in Sedbergh unfortunate enough to need radiotherapy treatment knows this is far from the case at the moment. As ever if I can help with anything please do get in touch. 
The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau has identified an increasing number of reports submitted to Action Fraud from the public concerning courier fraud.

Fraudsters are contacting victims by telephone and purporting to be a police officer or bank official. To substantiate this claim, the caller might be able to confirm some easily obtainable basic details about the victim such as their full name and address. They may also offer a telephone number for the victim to call to check that they are genuine; this number is not genuine and simply redirects to the fraudster who pretends to be a different person.

After some trust has been established, the fraudster will then, for example, suggest;

- Some money has been removed from a victim's bank account and staff at their local bank branch are responsible.
- Suspects have already been arrested but the "police" need money for evidence.
- A business such as a jewellers or currency exchange is operating fraudulently and they require assistance to help secure evidence.

Victims are then asked to cooperate in an investigation by attending their bank and withdrawing money, withdrawing foreign currency from an



exchange or purchasing an expensive item to hand over to a courier for examination who will also be a fraudster. Again, to reassure the victim, a safe word might be communicated to the victim so the courier appears genuine.

At the time of handover, unsuspecting victims are promised the money they've handed over or spent will be reimbursed but in reality there is no further contact and the money is never seen again.

Protect Yourself Your bank or the police will never:

- Phone and ask you for your PIN or full banking password.
- Ask you to withdraw money to hand over to them for safekeeping, or send someone to your home to collect cash, PIN, cards or cheque books if you are a victim of fraud.

Don't assume an email or phone

call is authentic

Just because someone knows your basic details (such as your name and address or even your mother's maiden name), it doesn't mean they are genuine. Be mindful of who you trust – criminals may try and trick you into their confidence by telling you that you've been a victim of fraud **Stay in control**

If something feels wrong then it is usually right to question it. Have the confidence to refuse unusual requests for personal or financial information.

The emails that have been sent out will look very authentic with the Cumbria Police crest, requesting £100 fixed penalty notice for speeding in your local area.



We now sing over a dozen songs in 4 part harmony - the narodni pesmi, the national folk songs of Slovenia which are well known by most Slovenians over a certain age (in the way that many of our national folk songs are well known by those who

The advantage of singing these songs is that everywhere we went complete strangers were able to join us in the singing, many of those we met not just knowing the tune, but also harmony parts from these well known arrangements. Walking up from Zreče to sing on the Brinjeva Gora with our friends, on trails to the


mountain lodges in the Triglav national park, in the church on the island of Bled, at concerts in Bohini and a wonderful train ride on the Soca valley



railway where all the passengers joined in as we sang Zdravljica as our train glided through this heavenly mountain scenery.

And then one night under these Slavic stars, after our concert in Bohinjska Cesnjica near Triglav, singing the Slovenian mountain song Planinska - an anthem to the joys of mountain walking - alongside 100 Slovenian singers from the different choirs who had performed.

If you would like to sing with us - or





even just listen - do please come and join us at the Black Bull Hotel in the centre of Sedbergh where we'll sing many of these songs on Tuesday evening July 17 - we'll be joined by visiting Slovenians, and can also give a hearty encouragement to this fabulous new venture in the centre of our town.

If you would like to sing with us on a regular basis you will be most welcome on Tuesday evenings - once you've joined I can send recordings of our Slovenian songs for you to practice over the summer so you can catch up. On the first weekend in October we are travelling down to London to sing at the Slovenian Embassy and other parts of the capitol alongside Gallus Aeternus, a choir made up of Slovenians living in London who sing many of the same songs as us. Their choir will be visiting Sedbergh next spring, but we first met them when we travelled



down to London in June, having been invited by the embassy to attend the Slovenia National Day celebration in Westminster - a wonderful occasion where we met many others who spoke very highly about our combined singing projects with Slovenian and English singers, and the Sedbergh town twinning in general.

Some of the singers in our choir





have also formed a Slovenian language group which you might like to join. Singing Slovenian songs gives a great introduction to the language and very quickly you find you know words and sentences which can be used in conversation. We're not alone in using songs as an aid to learning on our recent visit to Ljubljana we joined an English language class where they use English songs to teach the language. In our language group there is an opportunity to see how the sentences are formed, with more formal instruction in grammar and vocabulary.

Sedbergh and Zreče are now at the centre of a wide web of choirs which encompass a large area throughout Slovenia, Northern England and Scotland - in part because visitors to or from Zreče and Sedbergh like to travel further afield, and having choirs to host our visits in these other places allows us to have a more personal visit than just being tourists and sightseers. Although we are based in Sedbergh, our singers are drawn from those who love Slovenia from across South Lakeland - all are welcome equally, though perhaps those from Sedbergh even more equally!

As we sing in one of our songs: "Naj v srcu ni strahu, tujev ni tu,le prijatelji, ki him se ne poznas," which the Slovene scholars among you will instantly recognise as: "Let your heart feel no fear, for there's no strangers here, just friends that you never knew."

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

Julie Leigh Our first summer outing of 2018 was to Furness Abbey which is situated in the outskirts of Barrow- in- Furness. Its majestic towering ruins provided an interesting comparison with Rievaulx Abbey which had featured in our 2017 programme of visits. Like Rievaulx, Furness Abbey is surrounded by woodland (in this case called the 'vale of nightshade'). The layout of the two abbeys is similar. However, the main difference between the two abbeys is that the chief building material at Furness is striking red sandstone. The softness of the stone has led to considerable crumbling in some areas of the abbey and there are numerous examples of reparations to be seen. Other conservation work has been necessary following the discovery of serious cracks in some walls which could have resulted in parts of the building sinking into the soft ground. The Abbey was founded in 1124 by a group of French monks. Although it was originally built for the Order of Savigny, it later became second in importance only to Fountains Abbey as a Cistercian establishment. Over the next few centuries it became very wealthy and owned much of south Cumbria as well as territory in Ireland and the Isle of Man. It survived many raids by bands of marauding Scots until it became the first large abbey to be dissolved in the reign of Henry VIII. Soon after the current abbot Roger Pyke surrendered to the King's Agent the demolition of the buildings began.

We were lucky to be given a tour of



the site by Jill Jepson who is an excellent guide. She began by showing us some of the artefacts that had been discovered during some archaeological work which had taken place when emergency repairs were being carried out in 2012. Most importantly, the skeleton of an abbot had been unearthed. He had been buried with a very rare mediaeval gilded crosier and jewelled ring. Evidence about the abbot's health and lifestyle has been discovered from detailed examination of his bones.

Jill led us through the extensive ruins. identifying the different parts of the monastery. The great abbey church which still stands to its full soaring height in some places is very impressive. Other notable buildings are the ornately decorated chapter house and the large rectangular cloister. Dormitory, refectory, parlour, abbot's lodging and the living guarters of the lay brothers have also been identified. Jill's introduction to Furness Abbey which was very detailed and interesting kept us engrossed and provided us with a memorable

afternoon.



MAY WEATHER

Generally May was a pleasant month giving us a bit of everything weather-wise. Temperatures varied from a high of 78.4F (25.78C) to a low of 34.3F (1.28C) and several nights the wind chill took the effective temperature below freezing. No doubt those of you who had seedlings unprotected would have noticed this. Rainfall totalled 40.2 inches (1021mm) for the month but we did have several dry spells, 2 of 5 days and 2 of 4 days. It was guite a breezy month with only 4 days when the gusts did not get into double figures. A maximum of 21.9mph(35.24kph) was recorded with all but 7 days coming from the North West. May is my favourite month for

several reasons. Generally winter is behind us and the burst of new growth is prodigious. I actually got to cast off my wellies in favour of boots!!! The lanes are bursting with growth and colour from bluebells early on to umbels and dandelions later with the reds of campion in the mix. The trees are in full leaf in varying shades of green from the pale whitebeam to the dark holly plus the lovely dark copper beech.. The lilac is fully out and smells gorgeous especially first thing in a morning. The birds are nesting, even the late arriving swallows got round to building a new nest. I destroyed last year's after the mite infection. Where they found their mud was a mystery. I haven't seen swifts or house martins



around us. The blue tits have eggs in the old nest box and a new one is being investigated even pecked around the hole so let's hope they use that as well. The ovstercatchers have been successful with an early brood down on the river. We are getting woodpeckers regularly feeding on nuts with occasional visits from siskins on the niger seed. My biggest surprise was to see a hedgehog on the drive. Unfortunately it was during the daytime, not a good sign. I moved it into the shade in the undergrowth and it had gone by morning so let's hope it was OK and just hungry. Ŷ

JULY GARDENING

Elaine Horne Over that last few years I have tried out a variety of different types of lily in the garden. Some are short lived and seem to best if grown in pots, whereas others are very robust and flower from year to year in the garden

borders.

The earliest into bloom here are the sturdy, hardy "Yellow Turk's Cap Lilies" (*Lilium pyrenaicum*). They have flowers with recurved petals of a clear yellow with maroon spots, and have an overpowering fragrance which is best sniffed from a distance of at least 6 feet away. (They are known affectionately, in our household, as "Stinking Lilies")

Following them into flower are the "Martagon Lillies" (*L. martagon*). The white flowered ones, which were planted many years ago, always flower here before the purple/pink species. Both are very hardy and robust, but can take a couple of years to settle in and flower from newly planted bulbs.

Yellow Turks Cap and Martagon Lilies are both Europaean species. My favourite American species – another turks cap -is the "Leopard Lily" (*L. pardalinum*). These crimson/ red/orange flowers with large maroon



spots, are born on tall stiff stems, 5 – 6 feet tall.

This year I am growing on some baby bulbils from the "Orange Lily" (*L. bulbiferum*). The bulbils are produced at the bases of the upper leaves and can easily be picked off and planted in trays of compost – just buried under the compost surface – and left to grow on – potting them on as they increase in size - until they reach flowering size. This usually takes at least 3 years but at the end of that time I should have some hardy plants with bright orange/red, cup shaped, upward facing flowers, which I can plant out into the border.

No garden is complete without at least one pot full of "Regal Lilies" (*L. regale*). The large, white, trumpet

shaped flowers of this Chinese species have one of the most intoxicating and delicious fragrances of any plant in the garden. I always place my potfulls beside the garden bench so that I can appreciate them to the full. Regale lilies do not persist for more than 3 or 4 years with me, but the bulbs are easily available and worth replacing from time to time.

All lilies are susceptible to attack from "Lily Beetle", an insect pest which has spread widely across the UK during the last few decades. It has not yet arrived in my garden, but I have seen it in some Lancashire gardens. Lily Beetles are beautiful, bright red insects, a little longer than a ladybird, which feed on lily leaves and flowers and lay their eggs on



stems and bulbs. Damage to plants is unsightly and the munching leads to lack of flowers and bulb rot. In a small garden, the best control is to pick the beetle off plants and jump on them! 1

DIGGING FOR BRITONS !

Community Excavations in the Lune Gorge *Graham Hooley* Lunesdale Archaeology Society (LAS) has been awarded a Heritage Lottery Fund grant to investigate a pre-historic settlement site just south of the known Roman fort at Low Borrowbridge in the Lune Gorge. The investigations will be conducted over the next two years and will offer an opportunity for volunteers to learn about archaeological techniques

while revealing something of the lives of ordinary people at the time of the Roman occupation. The site on farming land in the Lune Gorge was discovered through aerial photography in the 1970s, surveyed in the 1990s, but has not otherwise been examined before.

Graham Hooley of LAS commented: "It is fantastic to be able to examine this intriguing settlement site in detail over a two year period thanks to National Lottery players. We know that the Roman fort, half a mile to the north, was occupied throughout the Roman period (from around 70AD to at least 350AD) but we know little about how the soldiers stationed there interacted with the local population, where their food came from and how they spent their wages. And we know very little about the locals, how they lived, farmed and went about their daily lives. The study will enable local volunteers to get

involved in answering some of these questions. With the help of experts we will be running workshops in archaeological techniques, such as surveying, excavating and analysing/ dating finds so that those with no prior archaeological experience can play a part".

In true 'Time Team' style the work will begin with 'geophys' – geophysical surveys that allow us to identify remains below ground that may not be visible above but could be of archaeological significance. These surveys will help us to locate targets for excavation later this year and early next. LAS will be recruiting volunteers of all abilities to help with aspects of the study. Some may be keen to get down and dirty excavating in the trenches, while others may prefer to help with cleaning, sorting and identifying the finds. SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS Tanya & Edmund Hoare July is a great month for watching swifts, and often it's their screaming we hear even before we see them swooping around the sky. When flying high they are busy feeding, catching insects (such as midges, gnats, aphids) and tiny spiders that they collect in their throat pouches.

It has been a very strange year for swifts, with fewer than usual for the first 3 weeks of May. Then, the weekend of May 19th, suddenly there was a mass influx of swifts, and again this appeared to have happened in many other parts of the country. It almost seemed as if their late return. and the fine weather for several weeks, had made the screaming parties even more frequent and exuberant. The screaming parties remind us of bikers as they hurtle around at roof top level at speed, especially in Main St and Back Lane. And one resident of Bainbridge Rd called that area 'swift central'! Screaming parties are an indication





that there are breeding swifts nearby which is why we are especially keen to hear about places where you see them.

By July both the parents are kept busy feeding the chicks – on average an adult goes in and out of the nest about every 40 minutes. We are pleased to report that swifts are breeding again in the nest bricks at the People's Hall. So far we have confirmed that three pairs are in occupation, but are not yet sure about the fourth. The field at the Peoples Hall is a good place to watch swifts, one evening we counted more than 35 swifts.

It was a relief that at Settlebeck school the swifts that had arrived so early were finally reunited with their mates - although they had to wait for over two weeks before they returned. Three eggs have been laid in one box and two in the other, and we expect the chicks to be in the nests until around 27 – 29 July. As you read this you will be able to see, via the webcams, the chicks feeding and growing. One of the most exciting activities is when chicks, after about 20 days of age, do vigorous press-ups, pressing down on their wings and lifting their tails. These are wing-strengthening exercises to prepare them for the next few years of living entirely on the wing. Details again for accessing the webcams: at

www.settlebeckschool.org, click on the swift tab for instructions.

Most chicks will fledge and make that crucial maiden flight at the end of July or early August to join the adult swifts flying around. The chicks then do not return to the nest, are not fed by the parents, must be fully independent and only a couple of weeks later they will undertake their first long migration back to Africa. So let us make the most of next five

> weeks and enjoy these wonderful birds before they leave us at the beginning of August.

Our aim is to discover more new nest sites and also to monitor existing sites, so we

can get an idea of how they are doing. Would you like to volunteer and help us occasionally, maybe around where you live? You don't need to be an expert, do join us, it would be an enormous help. The events of the UK Swift

The Cumbria Wildlife Trust reserve at Foulshaw Moss is a wonderful. large, water-filled lowland bog and is home to a wide variety of birds and insects, worth a visit in any season. At this time of year visitors flock to the site to see the rare ospreys that have made the site their home for several years. There are only around 200-250 breeding pairs in the whole of the UK. with most in Scotland, so we are incredibly privileged to be able to see them here. They return from Africa in April to breed in the UK and are faithful to their partners and to their nest site. Each year we wait to see if the birds will return and hope that they will nest again on the remote platform provided for them. A visit to the reserve is always a joy, with plenty to see, including rare bog plants and the recently reintroduced white-faced darter dragonfly, but the highlight in the summer is a view of the osprey nest. However, even with

the telescope, manned by everhelpful volunteers on the viewing platform, it is difficult to make out the adult birds, never mind eggs and chicks. Now everyone can see the nest and its occupants in glorious detail on the CWT website thanks to live-streaming from a camera perched right on the side of the nest. By the beginning of June there were 3 delightful (OK very ugly) chicks and with luck and a good season they should be leaving the nest by the end of July, by which time they will be very beautiful, like their parents. Have a look at the website to see them live for yourself. You might see the adults bringing back fish from Morcambe Bay to feed their ever-hungry brood before they all leave for their long

migration back to Africa sometime in August.

The Trust also has a live camera watching the beach on its South Walney reserve and last autumn saw seal pups being born there for the first time. Again this camera is streamed live to the website for everyone to see. Seals will haul out on the beach throughout the year and give birth in late autumn so it is worth keeping an eye on the comings and goings. More and more seals are using the beach and hopefully there will be pups again this autumn and winter.

In our own gardens we can also get a private peek at the lives of our own wildlife with cameras in nest boxes and trail cameras are also becoming more affordable. These are triggered by motion during the day and heat at night, to produce some tantalising pictures of the wild animals that share our spaces.



Celebrating (and helping) Sedbergh's swifts

The "Save Our Swifts" community project in Sedbergh – which is being supported by the National Park



since the project started in 2015. Four events took place in the National Park (or on its border) during Swift Awareness Week, including a Swift Celebration Evening at St Andrew's Church in Sedbergh.

Tanya Hoare from the Sedbergh Community Swift Group said: "This year the swifts were late. Usually they come in the first week of May, and we spotted the first swift in Sedbergh on the 5th of May. But it wasn't until the 19th of May when they came in any great number. We had a

mass influx coinciding with the nice weather – and they were very exuberant.

"Nationally swifts are fast disappearing from our skies. Numbers have fallen by 51 per cent in the past twenty years. The problem is that swifts are faithful to their nest sites and householders and developers aren't aware that swifts are nesting in nooks and crannies inside the eaves. Buildings are reroofed, refurbished or demolished and when pairs of swifts return to breed in May, they find their nesting places have disappeared.

"What the 'Save Our Swifts' project has shown is that with a little bit of help and awareness from local people, colonies can establish and thrive. These birds – and their 'screaming parties' – bring great pleasure."

Andrea Burden, Sustainable Development Fund officer at the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA), said: "It is very exciting to see the results of the 'Save Our Swifts' project. Seeing the swifts hurtle about has been one of the highlights of the spring. The nest

boxes and bricks, and all the awareness-raising activity such as the cameras at Settlebeck School, have made a huge difference to the swift conservation effort in the Sedbergh area.

The "Save Our Swifts' project received £4,760 from the Sustainable Development Fund. It has also received support from the Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust and the Sedberah Community Fund, SDF grants are on offer to individuals, businesses or community groups and projects can be wide-ranging. The fund has £175,000 to award this financial year and applications are being welcomed

Senior Wildlife Conservation Officer at the YDNPA, Tony Sergeant, added: "The Sedbergh Community Swift Group is doing a great job. It would be fantastic if their work could inspire other people, so that we might have swift groups forming across the National Park.

"I'd like to hear from people who have seen large parties of swifts feeding over Dales villages and towns. That could help us to identify areas where it would be worth putting up more swift boxes."

CITIZENS ADVICE

I do not think the company that sold me a doorstep loan carried out proper affordability checks and now I cannot afford to pay it back. What can I do?

The Financial Conduct Authority which regulates the doorstep loan market - says a loan is unaffordable if you cannot make repayments without borrowing again. Lenders must check your finances and situation to make sure you can pay back the loan.

First complain to your lender. List the ways you think their affordability checks were not properly done, the problems this has caused, and what



you would like to happen.

The lender must acknowledge your complaint promptly and has eight weeks to respond fully. They may agree to write off the balance or refund some of the interest you have paid.

If you are not happy with their response, or they don't respond at all, you can complain to the Financial Ombudsman Service using a form on its website.

If they uphold your complaint, they can force the lender to write off the interest or the remainder of the loan. and possibly order them to pay a small amount of compensation. The decision is binding.


