ANARCHY IN GARSDALE

The official bit:

Firstly, apologies to those who have been looking for an update of Garsdale Parish Council activities recently and have 'missed' these articles but spare time has been as rare as rocking horse droppings recently due to an overload of personal work, elections and changes in the auditing procedures for small councils. On the evening of May 17th, three meetings occurred in succession, the Parish Meeting, the AGM, followed by an ordinary

meeting. At the Parish Meeting, chairman Annette recounted the events over the last year. At the elections in May, all 7 councillors were re-elected unopposed, and Annette welcomed Sheila Capstick. one of our new district councillors to the meeting. Most of the A684 had finally been resurfaced and some 'temporary' repairs had been done to minor roads. The lack of transport for our 16 to 18 year olds to colleges was still a vexed issue which council will continue to pursue. B4RN was inching ever closer and hope that all properties could be connected by the end of the year. Motorbikes continued to cause concerns and council was in contact with the police in their efforts to eliminate the few

who cause so much stress to our parishioners. Council had also been successful in preventing BT from removing our 2 public telephone kiosks although there has been a post box removed without consultation and, despite efforts to replace it, it looks lost forever. Many volunteer hours have been spent on renovating the village hall with the aid of 2 grants and council would like to thank all those involved. Council now hopes that the hall will be used more for local activities. There does appear to be a worsening problem with the hall roof and this may have to be addressed shortly. Finally, new legislation has been brought in for small councils, ie. those whose turnover is less than £25,000. The

annual returns plus lots of other documents must now be displayed on the council website, hence why there has not been time to write articles, so apologies again.

their purse strings are being pulled ever so more tightly. Not only do we have to put up with ridiculous council tax rates where our only benefit is an empty dustbin every 2 weeks, no public transport, hedge cutting, drain clearing, wall repairs now that's another gripe. We have had 2 sets of 'temporary' traffic lights in place since November with no sign of the promised repairs to the retaining walls along Clough River. Each set of disguiet in the dale? The price of lights cost £250 per week to rent, despite the fact that half the time they don't work and are often permanently red in both directions, resulting in queues of irate drivers at each end. wondering who's going to be brave enough to go through a red light first. So for 38 weeks, and at £500 per

week, we have had to endure delays and frustration. The bill to Cumbria County Council is presently £19,000 and rising. Garsdale PC has been pushing for the reinstatement of school transport but apparently this is not affordable. Which is more important, childrens' lives or temporary traffic lights? However, I digress from the tale of anarchy and uprising. So what is causing so much eggs! Until recent we have been able to buy free range eggs from the curb side at 3 different locations. One has moved away, 'the boys' on The Fell seem to have gone out of production, leaving just one source. Grasping profiteering by the scruff of it's neck, Ithis source has increased their prices

It has always been said that it is a lot easier to make good hay than bad and the excellent weather we have had this summer just proves it: what a difference from last year. I have never mowed as early and my dad never did either. There wasn't much of a crop except of the heaviest land so like everyone else I will be trying for a second cut. However with big bales all around we are on the other end of the spectrum from last year's

catastrophe.

I missed the first part of the hottest weather because like seven others I was on the history based trip to our twin town, Zreče. As always we were made extremely welcome by our hosts and we were left in no doubt once again as to how important our twinning links are for them, just as they are to us. This year they, rather than us, have had the rain and so the scenery was so much greener than I have seen it before.

Slovenia now is a very different place from the one I first visited twelve years ago. There is money around and you can see it being invested in the houses and the infrastructure. As someone who has been involved with "planning" for a



long time it is very striking to me how well this change has been assimilated into the landscape. One day three of us walked up into the lower mountains and we looked across at a small hamlet of perhaps thirty or so houses – some were existing houses refurbished, others were new houses built on the site of a demolished house and the rest were completely new build. It was hard to distinguish which was which. Mixed with them all were farm buildings and a saw mill and the whole effect was extremely pleasing to the eye. There can be no doubt that when it comes to "planning" we have a lot to learn from our twin town.

But I was contacted by the folk at West Coast Railways in Carnforth who said that if I could get the permissions to make it happen they would provide us with a train to run up and down the Lakes Line for the two weeks when Northern couldn't. So we rang all of the people whose agreement was needed, and trust me there are a lot of people who could say "no", and got approval to go ahead with our new service. For two weeks we ran 6 trains in each direction every day and as far as I know none of them were ever late. I even got to sit in the cab on the first run!

We are now back with Northern

running a service but I have no confidence in them or their commitment to rail services in Cumbria. I presented a petition to Number 10 which had the signatures of over 5000 people who agree with me and want Northern to be sacked from running our trains and have just tabled motion in Parliament calling for the same thing. When the situation on the railways gets to the point that your MP has to start running a train service then the situation has got to be pretty bad.

On another matter, a lot of farmers have been getting in touch with me about their increasing worries about the lack of commitment they are seeing from the Government to replacing the funds the EU provides them with to keep their farms profitable. I had the chance to challenge the Minister for Farming. George Eustace MP, on some of this support, the Entry Level and High Level Stewardship agreements which provide money to farmers to help them to look after the environment. Farmers are seeing these funding agreements coming to an end in the next few months with nothing replacing them after we leave the EU. Sadly but unsurprisingly given how chaotic our Government seems to be at the moment the Minister failed to make any commitment to what funding our farmers could expect beyond the New Year.

I've seen a new property advertised which I'd like to rent and am thinking about putting a holding deposit down. However, the rent is really cheap - should I be worried it's a scam?

You're right to be cautious if the rent is a lot cheaper than the market rate. Don't pay a deposit before you view the property and look at your tenancy agreement.

If the landlord refuses to let you view, beware. Even if you have seen the property, check your tenancy agreement for the name and address of the landlord, along with their contact details.


If you cannot get a contract and landlord details, do not pay a deposit. Also check if the landlord is a member of a professional association | registered charity, No: 1118656 and

The 50th Anniversary of the Fifteen
Guinea Special - marking the last
day of steam trains on British Rail in
1968 – is likely to trigger a number of
special anniversary excursions on the
Settle-Carlisle line in August.
However it will also be the occasion
for two rail-related events in Hawes,
both to be held at the Dales
Countryside Museum (DL8 3NT).

At 11.30am on Saturday August 11. Stephen Allen – who was appointed to carry out restoration and conservation of the historic Book of Bridges – will speak about his work. This project was grant-aided by more than 90 donors, including Sedbergh Parish Council and Sedbergh and District History Society, who are warmly thanked for their support. The book contains the original 1870's working drawings for structures (viaducts) on the Garsdale-Hawes branch line; the restored book will be on supervised display from 11am and also after the one hour meeting

At 3.00pm on the same day, there will be a public meeting to consider the feasibility of setting up a Steering Group to investigate possible restoration of the six mile Garsdale-Hawes branch line. This was built immediately after the 1876 opening of the Settle-Carlisle line, reaching Hawes two years later. When the line from Garsdale station met the newlycompleted line from Northallerton at Hawes in 1878, the full 40-mile railway through Wensleydale connected the Settle-Carlisle and East Coast main lines. This summer marks the 140th Anniversary of that significant Victorian achievement.

Browsholme Hall, Forest of Bowland, Lancashire Maggie B Dickinson

Finding the secretive Browsholme Hall from the Sedbergh area is an achievement in itself and members who braved the hairy and spectacular ancient packhorse route from Caton or Lancaster were especially rewarded by the scenery.

We all enjoyed an excellent guided tour on 21st June by knowledgeable volunteer Lesley around the magnificent home of the Parker family, traditional Bowkeepers of the deer park in the Royal Forest of Bowland. The nationally-important

Grade 1 historic house, in a glorious rural setting formerly within the Yorkshire boundary, has furniture, antiquities and paintings of museum quality and was built in 1507 by Edmund Parker, a descendant of the Parkers of Alcancotes Manor at Colne, Lancashire. They played an active and important role in the area and further afield, and married partners from noteworthy families like the Listers of Gisburn Park, the Parkers of Extwistle Hall, and the Tempests of Broughton Hall.

Browsholme has seen many changes and additions, including a quirky red sandstone façade aimed at "beautifying" and modernising the front elevation. One man who left a notable mark was Thomas Lister

Parker who inherited the building in 1797. His alterations were impressively grand, including rebuilding the west wing and spending a fortune on improving the gardens. From his Grand Tour of Europe he brought back a wealth of drawings, including a selection by John Chessell Buckler. Ultimately he went bankrupt and passed the estate to a cousin.

In 1958, with the help of the Historic Buildings Council, the new owner - bachelor Colonel Robert Goulbourne Parker - repaired the hall to a degree. He also gave personal guided tours and I was privileged to be shown round by him in the early 1970s when, glass of whisky and cigarette in hand, he enthralled us with stories and historical facts about the great

hall that he was clearly struggling to maintain.

One fascinating item is a rare Lady Anne Clifford padlock dated 1672, complete with the key, which were given by the feisty lady to friends to grace the main entry of their properties. If she needed accommodation on her travels, and they were away, she could let herself in. I know of only six other such padlocks still in existence, all in Cumbria – Dacre, Dalemain, Collinfield in Kendal, Rose Castle, Hutton-in-the-Forest and Great Asby. This particular lock came to Browsholme as part of the inheritance of Barbara le Fleming of Rydal Hall near Ambleside who married Edmund Parker in 1854.

After Colonel Parker's death in 1975 the daunting responsibility of inheriting the estate, by now in desperate need of upgrading and repair, passed to his godson and

fourth cousin Robert Parker who had never seen the property. He and his wife Amanda, originally overwhelmed and in awe of the massive programme needed to overhaul the property and grounds, are to be admired for the amazing work they have put into their gorgeous historical pile.

fort outside the village, and the Roman Road from Burrow to Low Borough Bridge passes through the village. The village makes an appearance in the Domesday Book as "Brereburn". The turnpike road (A683) was constructed in 1774. There was some coal mining in the hills above, but the coming of the railway through the village brought and end to this as the coal was poor. It seems the hamlet of Beckfoot was probably more important in early years. The village really took its present form following the arrival of the railway. The village was absorbed into the Yorkshire Dales National Park in 2016. There are now 120 dwellings and about 260 residents. It had a parsonage, a corn mill, a doctor's surgery and a Grocer's shop (now the Cheese Mouse) and there is a C17 packhorse Bridge.

The church is the fourth to be build in the village. Two earlier churches were built at the back of the present one. The present one, St Bartholomew's, was built in 1872 in the time of Rev James Harrison whose initials appear in several places in the village, including on the Lych Gate. Until 1848 the church had been just a chapel of ease. The clock was added for Edward VII's coronation and two bells were added to the original four in 2003.

We stopped at an ordinary looking road junction about 50 yards from the Church and learnt that this was where the railway crossing had been with the station only a short distance down a street opposite which now contains a housing estate. The railway opened in 1861 and closed to passenger

traffic in 1954 apart from the "Boarding School Specials" which brought pupils from the main line to Sedbergh, Baliol, Casterton, Queen Elizabeth's and Cressbrook at the beginning and ends of term. At the corner of the junction is Dale End house where the first creamery in Westmorland stood until 1965

The Barbon Inn claims to have been a coaching inn but may just have been an ordinary house and was previously known at times as the Station Hotel and the Barbon Hotel.

The cross road in the middle of the village contains a sad war memorial to the unlucky Shuttleworth family. Two Lords Shuttleworth (brothers) died in WW1 and two in WW2 (again brothers). At least 5 other cousins

and an uncle also died in WW2.

Several houses were pointed out including the old Post Office (now served twice a week in the village hall by Sedbergh PO), the village smithy, and a grade 2 Listed farm house, Stocksgarth. The reading room, now a house, had been extended and a date stone oddly added hidden behind a wall and at ground level. The deserted Methodist chapel was a sad sight, having been bought some years ago and only just enough work having been done to preserve the planning permission. Nearby were two houses which had been ale houses. Another house was the large old vicarage built by James Harrison with beautiful views across a haha. Further down the same road was the

Not far away was the Iron Age fort up on a ridge near where the Roman road is thought to have passed. Also on a road junction below it was an interesting iron signpost, labeled No. 1 in Westmorland (No 2 being on the Barbondale road). We also passed Watery Lane possibly the old road to Dent.

The over all impression of the village was that its layout, houses and gardens, and intervening fields were. apart from the stone used, more typical of the Cotswolds than a North West village, perhaps because it only really developed after the railway came.

We did not have far to go to find several historic sites including the Old House at Skomarje, where our charter was signed in 2005 and the waterpowered forge nearby illustrating the early origins of metal

working in the area. It was our only wet and windy day and we we hastened on to the ancient church of St Laurence in Stranice which has been sympathetically restored by local benefactors. Much renovation work has been done on the murals here by Milan Lamovec, the artist whose work is displayed in the foyer of the People's Hall in Sedbergh. St Laurence was reputedly martyred by being grilled over hot coals on a aridiron. He seemed unfazed by this. requesting that he be turned over as he was done on one side. From this derives his patronage of cooks, chefs and comedians. An earlier church commemorates St Barbara, the patron saint of miners and explosives. She was beheaded by her father. There are Roman tombstones and a milestone set into the wall of the presbytery here. The memorials commemorate a son of Emperor Severus who died aged 20, probably murdered, all evidence of the Roman presence in this area. A main via ran through here to Celie in the south. Severus himself probably visited our own northern outposts of the empire in the early second century.

We concluded our first day with



visiting the 2nd World war atrocity site at Francolova. Many of our exchange students will remember visiting this sombre memorial to the murder of 100 local men in retribution for the attack on a local German official.

Our next day started with a visit to the nearby town of Slovenske Konjice (horsetown), a staging post at the crossing of routes. Most of the buildings in its ancient main street are conserved with plaques explaining their former functions. A stream runs down the middle, supposedly dribblings from a fearsome dragon living in the hills above until vanquished by the ubiquitous St George. The church here is dedicated to him. The town won the Entente Florale Europe competition in 2014

and Zreče hopes to succeed this year. Sustainability, environmental education, planning and conservation are some of the several aspects involved. The results come out in late September and we wish our twin town well. We took the opportunity to visit the Reimer gallery. A few years ago we could just pick up a key at the shoe shop and show ourselves around. Now the security is more sophisticated as there are examples of several Old and Newer Masters here including Klimt, Cezanne, Van Dyke, Modigliani and Velasquez. Some could be copies but they still looked very impressive to this amateur. From here we travelled the short distance to Ziče, site of a Carthusian Monastery founded in 1165. There is an upper and lower monastery and the countryside between the two remains as it was in the days of their founding. unpopulated. This represents a particular treasure as it is the only Charterhouse landscape still in its original form. The monastery was dissolved in 1782. There was much to see here, original and restored and we wandered at our own pace with individual audio guides in a beautiful tranquil setting.

Two full day excursions were included in our programme. The first was to the ancient city of Ptuj. The

castle slope was settled already around 4000BC. The Mediaeval stronghold was built in the 11th century. Between 1656 and 1802 the Counts Leslie, lived here. The Leslie family had Scottish roots and their motto, "Grip Fast", is illustrated by a belt buckle. Several museums are housed here, notably the collection of musical instruments including a very rare Roman Tibia flute and a collection of arms and armour. In the stables traditional carnival costumes are exhibited. In the town itself is much evidence of the Roman city. The Orpheus monument, later used as a pillory, stands in the town centre with many others set into the walls of surrounding buildings and those of the church of St George.

Another full day was spent at Celje. Firstly a visit to the 12th century castle. The overambitious counts of Celje eventually gave way to the Habsburgs. Many tales of intrique and connivance were involved. We have mention of the Counts of Celie in our own History Society archives. We toured the historic town centre. the church of St George and then its museums, firstly the Manor house

with an intriguing trompe l'oeil ceiling. This has been recently uncovered and looking up one can see towers and balconies and sky beyond with various curious persons gazing down at us. All this is represented in ingenious fashion on a flat surface. Our guide was the museums' curator Gabriella, our splendid guide from previous visits who also took us on a tour of the Princely Palace. There we could walk on glass surfaces over the original Roman foundations of the building. Other floors housed collections from Celie's history through the ages to the present day.

We were fortunate to have extremely knowledgeable guides wherever we went and the efficient organisation of these and the logistics by Aleksandra at the Zreče tourist office helped our visit to run smoothly. Once more we must thank Mayor Boris and our many friends in Zreče, especially Zdenka and Marinka and including the staff of the Hotel Zvon, for their warm welcome and hospitality throughout our visit. If any other Sedbergh groups would like to visit our Twin Town, please let me know.





SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS Tanya & Edmund Hoare

It has been a fantastic year for swifts, and throughout June and July they have delighted us with endless exuberant flying. The beautiful hot weather obviously suited them and after a particularly splendid evening one person contacted us to say that 'it was just how Sedbergh used to be'. The screaming parties too have been exciting to watch, with the swifts looking as if they are enjoying themselves, like aerial joyriders.

At our cottage in Lowgill we had several weeks of exceptional action from 'bangers', non-breeding swifts that fly up to eaves, fascia boards and gables, then dart away again, practising their technique for approaching nest sites in future years. The name derives from the sound of their wings slapping the woodwork. The swifts in the existing nest sites scream back at them, to encourage them to find a site in the vicinity, and in such a way a colony grows.





Although our swifts usually leave for Africa around 7th – 10th August, this year we expect that there will still be some around well into the month as we have witnessed some very late breeding. This was due to different sets of circumstances that we'll discuss in next month's issue.

During the first ever UK Swift Awareness Week (UKSAW from 16 – 23 June) over 90 events took place around the country. Our own Swift Celebration Evening in St Andrew's church was a great success, with an audience of around 60 people, with lots of questions and lively discussion. The displays in the church were full of information about swifts, made much more colourful by the work of the Sedbergh Primary School children to illustrate swift migration. They cut out swifts and coloured them in the colours of the flags of the African countries that they migrate through – so this was a geography lesson too. We grouped them around a large map of Africa, this can be seen on the back of this month's cover. There was plenty of time to admire this while refreshments were served, including delicious swift biscuits, kindly made and donated by Sarah M. We would



also like to thank the volunteers from Cumbria Wildlife Trust for serving. and Garsdale Design for posters.

During UKSAW the displays in Sedbergh shop windows, with swift bunting, looked terrific and we would like to thank all those who participated. The charity bookshop window had a host of books showing swifts, and the craft workshop

displayed some beautiful swiftthemed items, such as glass dishes, willow weaving, jewellery and cushions. Our special swift mugs are still available from them.

Let us make the most of the weeks that our swifts are with us, and just enjoy the antics of these masters of the skv.

CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST Eycott Hill Nature Reserve

Dorothy Thomson

Over 460 million years ago the area around Eycott Hill, north of the A66 near Hutton Roof, was shaped by a myriad of volcanic lava flows which

carved the landscape into a series of ridges and hollows. The swampy valleys between the ridges were a perfect habitat for wetland insects and plants. Since then there have been so many changes in vegetation through forests and more recently grassland but the lava has remained a major influence.

About fifteen years ago, Cumbria Wildlife Trust was able to buy the area to preserve it as an upland nature reserve. Eycott Hill, is now a mosaic of habitats from wetlands and flower rich meadows to moorland, hedgerows, scrub and woodland. What an amazingly rich wild life area it is.

Within the reserve is a Site of Special Scientific Interest where the





habitat gets much wetter underfoot. These wetlands that are made up of swamps and mires are very important for the site's wildlife. The botanical interest in this part of the site contributes to its SSI designation as it includes 20 sedge species and 18 species of Sphagnum moss. Interesting flowers such as grass-of-Parnassus or 'bog star' (not really a grass) and the carnivorous round-leaved sundew are also present.

Drier parts of the site are brightened by mountain pansy, wood anemone, and the unusual flowers of mountain everlasting.

Whilst the range of flora is amazing so too is the insect and bird life. Butterflies on the site include the small pearl-bordered fritillary, orange tip, small heath, meadow brown and ringlet species. From June to September look out for the golden ringed dragonfly in particular but there are other dragonfly species. For birds the migrating wheatear can be seen from March to September and curlew, snipe, short-eared owl, meadow pipit and skylark also breed in the site.

The Trust has restored hay

meadows encouraging an even wider variety of wild flowers, while replanted hedgerows provide more nesting places for birds.

The grassland land is being traditionally grazed by hardy Luing cattle which can stay out all year round. These are owned and managed by Newton Rigg agricultural college.

Well worth a visit at any time of the year as there is always something to see. Though when it starts raining again take sensible footware as parts of the reserve are very wet due to those lava flows which fashioned the landscape so many years ago.

There are no refreshments on the reserve but several pubs and cafes nearby. See www.cumbriawildlifetrust.org.uk for directions and more information.

JUNE WEATHER

What a start to "flaming June"!!!!!
During the morning of the 1st a 10-15 minute cloudburst put down 1.57 inches (40mm) then again in the afternoon a further inch (25mm) in a similar period making over 2 ½ inches (65mm) for the day. This was as much as for the whole month last

month. Did you spot the "deliberate" mistake? I got the mm and inches the wrong way round in May. Silly Me!!!! In spite of this phenomenal start to June we went on to record 5 inches (125mm) for the month and this included 14 dry days, but not altogether or that would have been an official drought. Temperatures soared and in the sun went off the scale on my electronic system. That is 284F (140+C). Not temperatures in which to be doing any heavy work!! A high of 81.9F (29.7C) was recorded. A low of 32.2F (0.1C), only just above freezing, was recorded. I once lost baby rabbits to frost in the first week in June some years ago. It was a pretty breezy month with a maximum gust of 24.4mph (39.26kph) but only

6 days with gusts not reaching double figures. In spite of the high temperatures there were 3 nights when the wind chill got below zero.

The increased temperatures and shortage of rain meant a shortage of grass growth but glorious hay timing weather, if you are not in some scheme which prevents cutting until 15th July. This year everything will be burnt off by then. There have been fires in crops, as well as the moors. Apparently just a spark from metal on stone has been enough to start a fire with several crops being burnt down. The crows have had a bumper breeding season. I regularly have 50 to 80 drop in at feeding time. The magpies have reared 4 young nearby and have terrorised the woodpigeons

I hold an enhanced DBS Certificate

and collared doves that nest around the garden. I have seen pieces of several eggs but no young hatched. We have had some bird of prev. probably a sparrow hawk, judging by the heaps of feathers around the garden. The two blue tit nests, in boxes, successfully fledged. One got 7 away. I didn't get to count the other box. I shall have to modify it for next season so I can inspect it more closely. The swallows have 5 healthy young at present. As I write this, early July, they are ready for off. We have an odd speckled robin about. You never seem to seen a group of them. Butterflies are still a rarity with the odd small white and occasional coloured, "Frenchies" as we called them as kids. I suppose that this comes from the fact that some of the coloureds e.g. Painted Ladies do come across from France. I was hopeful that the bats might have returned but the single night sighting must have been visitors. Nettles and thistles seem to have had a bumper season but I haven't seen any caterpillars as yet. \bigcirc

AUGUST GARDENING

Elaine Horne

I have been watching the sad decline of one of my garden's trees over the past 3 or 4 years, and am almost relieved to see that this serious drought, coupled with the hot sunshine have finally finished the whole thing off.

I suspect that the root of the problem will be at the root, and under the lower bark of the tree. Whenever I dig in the borders anywhere at that end of the plot, I find the tell-tale



black "bootlaces" of Honey Fungus – the parasite which I have seen finish off many trees, shrubs, and even some herbaceous perennials in various places during my horticultural career.

Honey Fungus is commonly present in gardens where there are mature trees, and in land which has the remains of old stumps and roots buried in the soil. It can spread by spores, which are released by clumps of honey/beige toadstools when they appear at the base of tree trunks in early Autumn. These are carried by the wind and will germinate when they alight on the surfaces of old stumps and grow to produce a new colony. It's alternative method of

invasion is by those black "bootlaces" which are sent out from the parent plant and grow through the soil until they find a new woody plant to colonise.

Most plants will live with Honey Fungus for many years, and, as long as they have a good supply of water and food, brought to them by a healthy, large, root system, they might show few signs of the disease. Others, such as my ornamental Mountain Ash - Sorbus 'Joseph Rock', which should be showing vigorous growth, copious small leafletted leaves and cream flowers. and, by now, big bunches of yellow berries, are looking twiggy and bare with small clumps of this year's leaves at the ends of its twigs. Poor thing! Those leaves are now all crisp and brown. When winter comes I shall remove as much of it - roots and all – as possible, to make way for something new.

As I always seem to find myself buying, or growing from cuttings, too many plants for the available space in the garden, a new planting spot will be welcome. The decision is, shall it be Rose 'Scarlet Fire', or a new *Viburnum x bodnantense* 'Dawn' – to

2020 (SEPTIC TANK) VISION Dr Gina Barney

I was reminded recently of the 1 January 2020 deadline for obeying the Septic Tank Binding Rules. This might matter a lot if you are selling your property. Perhaps a reminder will help.

If you sell your property, you must tell the new operator (the owner or person responsible for the septic tank or small sewage treatment plant) in writing that a small sewage discharge is in place.

In most cases this information is included within property information forms that are completed as part of the conveyancing process. Information should include: a description of the treatment system and drainage system; the location of the main parts of the treatment system, drainage system and discharge point; details of any changes made to the treatment system and drainage system; details of how the treatment system and

drainage system should be maintained, and the maintenance manual (if you have one) and maintenance records (if you have them).

Discharges from septic tanks directly to a surface water are not allowed under the general binding rules.

(Surface water is any water that collects on the surface of the earth. This includes oceans, seas, lakes. rivers. or wetlands.)

If you have a septic tank that discharges directly to a surface water you will need to replace or upgrade your treatment system by 1 January 2020. Where properties with septic tanks that discharge directly to surface water are sold before 1 January 2020, responsibility for the replacement or upgrade of the existing treatment system should be addressed between the buyer and seller as a condition of sale.

You cannot use a soak away (designed for draining rainwater), well or borehole for discharging effluent to ground water. Instead you must either upgrade to a drainage field or apply for a permit so that the Environment Agency can assess the

risk of using this sort of system in your location.

(Ground water is water that flows or seeps downward and saturates soil or rock, supplying springs and wells.)

Remember the areas nearest to where drinking water is abstracted from ground water are known as Source Protection Zones 1s (SPZ1s). The minimum size for a groundwater SPZ1 for a drinking water supply is a 50m radius from the abstraction point.

The Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's annual general meeting has voted to permanently establish Parish Forums as a way of improving lines of communication between the Authority and local communities.

There are three Parish Forums – in the west, north and south of the National Park. They take place twice a year and are attended by parish councillors and senior Authority staff and Members.

The forums are designed to be 'parish-led'. Recent meetings have

seen debate on housing, planning and the new five-year programme of work set out in the draft National Park Management Plan 2019-2024.

Following a decision Taken in June, further forums will be organised for September; the dates will be published in due course.

Yorkshire Dales National Park
Authority Chief Executive, David

cemented permanently into the
Authority's work. It is essential that
our Members and officers are able to
