The Official Bit: To mark the 100 vear commemorations of the end of World War 1. Garsdale Parish Council have donated a bench, engraved with the names of the 9 men from Garsdale who gave their lives in WW1, to the village hall. Councillor Hamish Wilson organised an evening on November 11th of music, poems and readings to unveil the bench, performed with some panache by Agnes Bracken. A heartwarming mixture of local residents and relatives of the fallen, some travelling long distances, attended, and enjoyed a wonderful, thought provoking evening followed by copious quantities of home baked cakes and tea. At one point there was concern that the village hall was not going to cope with the numbers turning up but eventually seats were

found for all of the 80 attendees. Garsdale Parish Council would like to thank Hamish and celloist. Rebecca. for the enormous amount of work undertaken in the research for the readings and music that lead to such a poignant evening. Thanks must also go to the 12 volunteer readers and the army of cake makers.

Other matters concerning the parish council include the ongoing roadworks which closed the A684 for 6 weeks. These works have proved to be much more extensive than originally envisaged and have been extended for an extra 4 weeks. However, much to the relief of our residents, the closure has now been lifted and the residual works are being controlled by traffic lights, allowing through traffic and the school buses to resume their normal routes. The other matter that is occupying councillors' minds is the building of the B4RN network through Garsdale. As at the time of writing this report, the main ducting has reached the village hall, completing 'Route 1', and is now progressing rapidly up the dale as 'Route 2'. The cabinet which will eventually bring everything live, is

presently being installed at the village hall. Grisedale, nicknamed 'The Dead Dale', is also having ducting laid and when connected, this dale will literally become 'live' once more. The irony is that one of the most unpopulated and isolated dales in the country will be blessed with the fastest domestic broadband in the world. Again, council would like to thank Tony, the ploughman, and his venerable league of volunteers for their relentless efforts.

and have made sure our lovely post lady, Tiff, has had access to the residences. Ditto with the bin lorries, although the lazy ones in the recycling lorry took advantage of the closure to turn around and head off home for an early finish, meaning that our recycling hasn't been collected for 8 weeks. One particularly thoughtful gesture was the help they gave to the B4RN volunteers. Taking advantage of the road closure, the volunteers were able to dig out the road verge between the burial ground and West Little Town, a distance of around 200 metres. The gaffer organised putting the stoppage signs past the B4RN works for the volunteers' safety and donated umpteen tons of road stone to fill in the verge after ducting was

laid. Without this help, B4RN would have had to organise their own road closure and used civils to undertake the work. An estimated £20,000 was saved thanks to Eric Wright's consideration. 'The Street' has now been cleared and although work is continuing around the culvert, peace and harmony has once again descended om Garsdale. However. CCC do not go unscathed, 2 more road culverts have been identified as in danger of collapsing, just a few hundred yards from the present works. Being the inflexible monolith that the council is, there was no effort made to conduct these repairs during the closure meaning the need of further road closures sometime in the future, surely a prime opportunity



lost? Although we are now down to just one set of 'temporary' traffic lights, the present cost is £28,000 and still rising.

opportunity to let you know about things that we are working on around here which get a drowned out in the clamour of national issues. So I can tell you that November was a bit of a health month. By now you should all have received a copy of my health survey. Please take a minute to complete it and send it back to us. It is an important way for me to gauge what is going on with healthcare in South Cumbria.

In the meantime, I know I have been going on about getting radiotherapy treatment at Kendal for what seems like a hundred years, but those of you who know me know I don't give up on things easily and I keep pushing on this. In fact we had some good news this month as, after I had a meeting

with bosses at NHS England and indeed the Health Minister, they have announced they are conducting a feasibility study into building a radiotherapy unit in our local hospital. So you never know.

At the other end of the spectrum but still a health related I was very worried to find out that the new contract with search and rescue helicopters does not include them bringing back mountain rescue teams when they complete a mission or, possibly even more upsetting, bringing back dead bodies when missions don't work out as they would wish. I have written to the Transport Minister, Chris Grayling, to ask that he meets with the teams involved to sort it out.

COUNCILLORS CORNER

Of all the community activities I have been involved with none has been more stimulating than B4RN, Broadband for the Rural North. Usually my involvement with a project ends once planning permission has been granted and the money allocated. With B4RN the planning was just the beginning. In Cautley and Dowbiggin we now have over 17 km of ducting in the ground and we are nearly there. Good progress has also been made in Frostrow and Garsdale.

Sedbergh parish, working with members of the community, the district and South Lakes Housing is getting on with delivering much needed new car parking on Maryfell. I understand the annoyance of my parish colleagues when others send around leaflets claiming credit for things which they had very little involvement with. It was just the same with Maryfell play park, they are becoming serial offenders. Both are Sedbergh projects organised and run by the Sedbergh community.

I hope that now the river wall in Garsdale Street has been repaired the road though the dale is safe from erosion. It has taken a long time to deal with these major structural problems, about twenty years by my reckoning, beginning with Low Smithy and then continuing with Dandragarth. Of course there will always be problems. There is still the flooding at Badgerdub – why did they re-surface without re-building that

very minor culvert ? I am afraid the county highways still leave a lot to be desired. They concentrate upon reporting problems, you can do that in the middle of the night. The weakness is that some things are reported 17 times, other none. Also the reports are rarely complete or accurate. Structural problems, invisible from the carriageway are rarely reported and when they are they are hard to draw out from the plethora of multiply reported potholes. The model does not work.

I am pleased that once again Dent parish decided to trim back the road sides at the bottom of the dale even if the county opposed the idea. At Sedbergh we have been able to continue the work down to Millthrop bridge. It had become so overgrown that it was downright dangerous and the metalled footway was unusable. Last month, at very little notice Sheila Capstick and Pat Bell were able to organise an event at the People's Hall to highlight the remaining opportunities offered by LEADER for local rural businesses. I am delighted that as a result of that meeting at least one local business has made a successful application. Merry Christmas and a Happy New


according to Kate Cairns and we were each handed a financial statement.

Well, now we are going back to the beginning of our meeting! We really started off with our guest speaker/ demonstrator, Malcolm Smith from Lancaster whose title was, "Turning the Wood". Our member. Marion Wood, (who we trust is not turning) met Malcolm and his wife Janet. in the gardens of Sizergh Castle where they are all volunteers. Malcolm had inherited wood-turning equipment from his father, and in his retirement had enjoyed developing his skills. He found it most relaxing. He brought along a portable lathe although you would have to be pretty strong to transport it! He demonstrated how he

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turns a piece of wood into a jolly snowman. Today he was using maple wood though he showed us samples of about twenty other woods he might have used. The native timber has to dry out for a varying number of years, depending on its size. We watched the piece of timber become a snowman, plump body with a round head surmounted by a jaunty bowler hat. The growing snowman was sanded down using ever finer grades of sandpaper, oiled, sealed and finally given a polish. Then another piece of wood produced minute eyes, carrot-shaped nose, and tiny buttons. These bits and pieces were firmly fixed to the body and before our very eyes, Malcolms' chunk of wood had been turned into a high-end snowman. 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

In May it was the turn of the Town Band when Barney Proud band secretary organised a dance band night which meant that we all got up dressed up and took to the floor.



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DECEMBER GARDENING

Elaine Horne I am not sure who called Hellebores "Christmas Roses" and "Lenten Roses", because they are not roses. Neither, I suppose, are "Prim-roses" and "Rose of Sharon", so I have to assume that, in the olden days, anything with a noticeable and attractive flower might have been so named.

My "Christmas Roses" (Helleborus niger) are currently showing signs of new growth, with flower buds just beginning to emerge and very slowly unfold from below soil level. I keep them in pots – so that they escape the attentions of my resident slug population and so that I can put them

my kitchen window and enjoy their flowers through the most inclement winter weather. The pots live out of doors all year round, spending the summer in a lightly shaded spot, and they require very little care. I feed with a slow release fertiliser after flowering and water when things become very dry.

My "Christmas Roses" never make it into flower in time for Christmas. They are more often at their best in February and March, whereas my "Lenten Roses" (Helleborus x hybridus) are more adventurous and are usually opening their flowers amongst the snowdrops in January. I chop off all the tall, last-years leaves down to the base as the new flower on the broad stone windowsill outside stalks grow so that they can be more



easily seen.

"Christmas Roses" always have pure white, pink backed petals. "Lenten Roses" can vary in colour from white through cream (with or without crimson spots) to pale pink to dark dusky pink and on to darkest maroon and brownish black. The latter are interesting and unusual but they never seem to be as robust as their paler cousins, and they are best grown at the front edge of a border where the blooms can easily be seen. Otherwise, as with most "black" flowers, the dark flowers can become lost against the soil and amongst the shadows of leaves and stems.

Most Hellebore plants are seed raised, and are very variable in colour, so unless you want (and are



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prepared to pay for) a particular colour or form, then it is best to wait until plants are in flower before you buy them. I leave the flowers to go to seed in my garden. They readily produce a crop of babies and although all of mine have so far proved to be dusky pink, who knows. Perhaps one day I will find something more unusual. Black with white spots?

CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

Trees come into houses at this time of year. As we celebrate Christmas it is good to celebrate trees as well. We have four native evergreens. Yew is the longest lived, some lasting



thousands of years, yet they grow slowly enough not to be out of place in even a small garden. Holly forms part of many Christmas decorations, but also makes a very good hedge. Juniper is our third native, best known for the use of the berries in flavouring gin. Our fourth native, Scots Pine, really does ned space to show its character.

Trees soak up carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, helping to check climate change. They also bind soil and help to reduce pollution. As deciduous trees enter their winter rest it is good to collect the fallen leaves. Stored damp, perhaps in bags, they will in time rot down to produce an excellent soil improver.

Tree fruits such as apples and nuts form part of our winter diet. Birds feed on berries and other seeds; pigs like acorns. Some trees also provide medicines- aspirin from willow and cancer treatments from yew, for instance. Oaks are another longlived species, supporting an abundance of wildlife.

Many fungi are associated with trees; some trees rely on root fungi to grow well.

Providing the ground is not too waterlogged or frosty now is a good time to plant a tree. Even a small garden will have room for a rowan or decorative maple. Given more space apple, holly, beech, yew, ash and oak can be grown from seeds or berries.



Plant one now for the next generation!

OCTOBER WEATHER

A fairly damp and breezy month on the whole, with over 4 inches of rain (135mm) and winds in double figures an all but 6 days. Furthermore we only had 3 dry days. Temperatures were reasonable, though we had our first frost of the season. A high of 71.2F (21.7C) and a low of 26.1F (-3.2C) shows we are into autumn. At the end of the month we had some really cold nights if you added on the wind chill factor. Some of my brown sheep were nearly as white as the whites with their covering of frost! Another mink attack has been



recorded at this end of Sedbergh, making 7 in all so far, to my knowledge. The first winter visitors have been seen in the shape of Fieldfares in small groups. The usual assortment of birds has been visiting the feeding station. I haven't seen anymore bats or rabbits about recently. Most of the leaves have come down leaving a mammoth clean up operation. The winter jasmine has flowered already and we have a single clump of blossom on the winter cherry we had to cut back hard as we though we had lost it during the summer drought. The rain has returned the feeding areas back to mud in the field. Starlings are starting to mass during the afternoon. You

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can hear them long before you see them. They are in flocks of hundreds if not thousands either in the fields or starting a roost in trees. They seem to fly of as it gets darker. I believe there is a major roost in Akay wood.

You will have all heard of **The Terrible Knitters of Dent**, they are still very much alive and knitting; they were called '**Terrible**' because they were terribly good and knit balaclavas, socks, finger-less gloves and scarves for the men fighting during the 1st World War. They became famous for their knitting and used a special Dent Knitting Stick.

Hundreds and hundreds of Poppies have been knit by Dent-dale W.I., the Knitters and Natters Group, and the congregations of both St. Andrew's Church Dent and St. John's Church in Cowgill, along with **parishioners** that lost their generation of young men during the First World War; we even had visitors sending them through the post! Dent school children have painted poppies on pebbles stones which have been used to hold down the cenotaph display of poppies outside the church. The displays of poppies in both Churches tie in with the stream of poppies through the St. Andrew's Church Yard in Sedbergh.

St Andrew's Church in Dent also has a display inside the Church along with photographs, kindly loaned by the **must never forget.** Services of

Sedbergh History Society; included with this display is a chasuble which belonged to Revd. Peter Bolye's grandfather Revd. Canon Leonard Wilcher Wright, who was a Padre on the Front Line during the First World War; we had so many poppies knitted that we added some to this display. Cluster poppies named with the men who died during this War are also included in this memorial. Without their sacrifices we would not have the freedom we enjoy today: <u>We Will</u> <u>Always Remember Them.</u>

One Hundred Years is an important date to remember just how, even the small villages and hamlets, were affected by the loss of sometimes nearly all of their young men. **We must never forget.** Services of






Remembrance were held in both churches on the 11th November, and church bells rung in Dent.

St. Andrew's Dent continue to raise funds for the re-organisation of the South Aisle, also to sort out a new heating system to heat this Grade



The Methodist Chapel in Dent has had a great deal of alterations, a new roof, ceiling, decorating and now they are waiting for refurbishing. What a great space this will be when it is finished. In the meantime services have been held in the Methodist School Room which is warm and

Douglas Thomson It would seem that our community is very keen to see the URC used in the future by and for the community.

The Town Band is very interested in using it as its base but only if it can be part of a wider community initiative. The Band has been in contact with the URC synod and they are keen to see its future in community use.

The Band has submitted a 'Right to Bid' application to SLDC to nominate the URC building to the community asset register. If approved the building cannot be sold for six months that which now owns 72 Main Street giving time for the community to decide if it wants to, and can, make a



purchase of the building.

By the time you read this the Band's committee will have already met with a variety of community and group leaders in the Town and surrounding area to discuss the best way forward. One option being considered is the re -creation of Sedbergh White Knights. It was this short lived organisation which was invaluable in saving 72 Main Street for community use, enabling it to continue as a very important hub of communication for the town and surrounding parishes. It is also possible that a Charitable Incorporated Organisation similar to



could be created to run the building.

The Band is putting together a working group to come up with an imaginative plan for how the URC can best benefit the community while also meeting its own needs. Heywood-Byatt and his dad Stuart Byatt from Sedbergh set off to the World Karate Union World Championships in Athens.

Both fighters train with Cumbria Lau Gar Kung Fu and Kickboxing club, at Castle Street, Kendal where Kalum is presently the senior Kickboxing Instructor and Stuart oversees the Kung Fu.

They had both qualified to represent Team England. A successful tournament was had and Team England placed third on the medal table behind Germany and USA despite have a significantly smaller team.

Kalum, already a 4 time, World Champion had never yet competed as a senior at world level. He started his campaign at the Points Fighting discipline where (with probably with his best ever performance) he lost to a brilliant American who went on the win the competition. A bronze medal at the world championships was not a bad start.

In a tournament style competition after winning three fights', he went on the win a Gold Medal in his strongest discipline Continuous (like boxing but you can kick as well as punch) against an Englishman, returning





home World Champion LC Open Age (minus 80KG).

Stuart's aims simply not to make a fool of himself', as at 61 years he would always be giving age even in the veterans as the category which is 45 years plus. To his surprise he reached finals in both disciplines. He was over- powered in his Continuous Final by a very strong German achieving a creditable silver medal.

Having beaten a Malaysian and a German he reached the final against the reigning champion (also a German). The points discipline is 'scored' after each attack and everyone knows the score and the time remaining. It was also on a live feed so his family were watching back in the UK. Never in front until the last 10 seconds he shaved a win 13 points to 11 and also returns home as World Champion +45 year -70KG. Memories that money can't buy and superb father and son time.

LEST WE FORGET Old Sedberghian Pilgrimage Karen BL A hundred years ago over 1,260 Old Sedberghians, many only 19 or under, took part on active service in the War to end all Wars. They served in Europe, Africa, the Middle East, and the Far East including India and Russia. Of those 256 failed to return. This number does not, of course, include those who did return but had been wounded, many several times, or gassed (360), or who had been Prisoners of War (28), many again among the wounded, making a total number of casualties almost exactly half of those who went.

In 1914 the Old Sedberghian Club determined, as an act of

remembrance and pilgrimage, to try to visit every single one of the graves, and the memorials to those whose graves are "Known only to God". Accordingly a great deal of work was done tracing all the graves and memorials scattered around the world as far as Vladivostok or as near as country church yards in the United Kingdom. Information was also gathered to provide detailed biographies of each of the men. Soil was gathered from the top of Winder and placed in little bags, and little wooden crosses were prepared. At each burial or memorial a small service was held in memory and the biographies read out. A little of the soil from Winder was placed on the grave together with one of the

crosses.

Many of the graves in more remote places were visited by individual Old Sedberghians (including that in Vladivostok) either when they happened to be passing the area, or even on holidays specially arranged around such visits. But the major visits were done on an annual pilgrimage of between about 20 and 45 Old Sedberghians, Governors and former Governors, Staff and wives and friends. These were arranged by the Old Sedberghian Club and involved a great deal of organisation and time

The first pilgrimage took place between 22nd and 24th August 1914 and began the visits of that year by

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r to JOIN / donate at sedberghredsquirrels100@gmail.com www.sedberghredsquirrels.org.uk visiting the actual field where the first Old Sedberghian to die , Captain JE Knowles, fell on 23rd August 1914 as they were forced back from Mons, only 19 days after war had been declared. A young OS Marine who had studied the battle gave the party on the spot a detailed description of what happened on that day.

In 2015 the Pilgrimage went to Gallipoli from 26th to 30th October. Fifty nine Sedberghians served in that campaign and 27 did not return – far

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surpassing the casualty rate on the Western Front. As well as visiting the various beach heads and the cemeteries, a service was held at the Helles Memorial to remember those Sedberghians without graves, and also to remember the eight men from Sedbergh town who fell there. The size of the area fought so bitterly for was a revelation being only 5 miles by 3 ½ miles. Another surprise was the small part the ANZACS played in the overall campaign – though as it involved the whole of their expeditionary force and incurred <u>very</u> heavy casualties it is hardly surprising it has such importance to those countries.

In 2016 the Pilgrimage went to the Somme – and many were surprised to find that the River Somme was not really involved: the fighting took place in the Somme district. Thirtythree Old Sedberghians were killed there or died of their wounds – thirty three are buried in France and one in Harrogate. There are 20 known graves and 12 names appear on the Thiepval Monument as their graves are unknown. Besides visiting some dozen Commonwealth cemeteries a visit was paid to one of the few

German cemeteries The 2017 Pilgrimage saw participants visiting 18 cemeteries remembering the 57 Old Sedberghians who were lost in 1917. The visit included the Paschendaele. scene of one of the most infamous battles not only for the scale of casualties but also for the mud. The Messines Ridge, scene of the great victory in June 1917, was then crossed for a stop in the Artois to examine battlefields of the Arras Spring Offensive. A tour of the extensive Arras tunnels complex followed by a visit through Doullens where the tide turned leading to the final 100 Days Offensive Between 18th and 21st October 2018

Between 18" and 21st October 2018 the last pilgrimage took place, once



again to Flanders to visit the graves of those who died in 1918. This time 9 cemeteries were visited, and in addition the horrifyingly enormous cemetery at Tyne Cot at Ypres which contains some 12,000 graves almost two thirds of which are for those whose names are "Known unto God". The surrounding memorial names about 35,000 men whose graves are unknown. Again the men of Sedberah Town were not forgotten. It was perhaps fitting that the final visit was to a cemetery about the size of a rugby pitch in which 55,000 German soldiers were buried. On the Saturday night three wreaths were laid by the party during the ceremony held every evening at the Menin Gate in Ypres. In the next

morning a private service was held in the St George's Memorial Church, where a plaque to the OSs who fell has been placed. An interesting visit was to the spot on a road not far from Mons where a plaque recorded the first shots of the War and on the other side of the road another commemorating the line reached by the Canadian soldiers on 11th November 2018.

There remained some seven graves scattered in Northern France and Germany and these have now been visited. In addition, there are seven men who died in Iraq and although it has not been possible to visit all these, a military ceremony in their memory has been held in Iraq. One final grave of a Belgian refugee who

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Finally, after the usual (very wet) service on the Cloisters on 11th November 2018, a canister holding soil gathered from the battlefields during the Pilgrimage was buried under the flagstaff in front of the Cloister with an engraved stone saying:

In Memoriam The Great War 1914-1918 Here lies consecrated soil from Mons, Gallipoli, Somme, Paschendaele and Le Cateau battlefields in proud and honoured memory of over 1,260 Old Sedberghians and Staff who served the Nation in the Great War, 258 of whom made the ultimate sacrifice



The last of the Old Sedberghian Pilgrimages to the graves of the 256 Old Sedberghians who fell in the First World War took place between 18th and 21st October (see separate article).



SINGING IN THE SEASON OF GOODWILL

David Burbidge What a fantastic year it's been for our singing, and next year looks to be even better with many of the best of this year being repeated.

First was our Slovenia/Scotland singing weekend at the beginning of the year celebrating the songs of the

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two national poets France Preseren and Rabbie Burns (whose national commemorative days are very close) and many other songs from both countries - next year over this weekend we'll be visited by the Slovenian Consul from Scotland who last came to Sedbergh 5 years ago when the Zreče firemen's choir was visitina.

Then after a few weekends of singing on walks through the hills and inside a Northumberland lighthouse, our choir took off for a week in Slovenia where we sand as we do each vear in our twin town Zreče, at the Wild Flower festival in Bohinj, in the capitol Ljubljana - and on a fabulous day singing on the Soca valley railway, with other passengers





joining in with our arrangements of well known Slovenian folk songs.

We had some visits to Sedbergh from Slovenia too - with the Waldorf school choir at the beginning of the year, and the Scouts in the summer, closely followed by a small singing group called Smir Papir (scrap of paper) who came with us to Scotland and the island of Jura, where we all sang together at the island's folk festival. Google them and you can see a video I made of their singing.

And we now have a connection with the London Slovenian choir Gallus Aeternus who we sang with in October at the Slovenian embassy - a very heartwarming weekend, where we sang our Slovenian songs with the choir and with other Slovenes living in London, and also sang many of our other songs on a walk through the

capitol, ending by singing Tennyson's Crossing the Bar at his grave, commemorating the anniversary of his death. We'll be back again next year to commemorate both our friendship with this choir, and Tennyson Day on October 6.

Our singing continues near Sedbergh with the Cowgill Folk Chorale preparing our seasonal songs which we'll sing at the Dent Folk Carols festival over the first weekend in December (where we have workshops teaching Slovenian carols, as well as many other songs from the UK.) We've had a lovely autumn singing round the fires in the homes of our singers - carols which you will often hear in the pubs of South Yorkshire and North Derbyshire such as Curly Hark (so called because of the twiddly bits in the singing,) Diadem and Shepherds Arise. We have plans to continue our own pub carol singing traditions when we sing them on the first Monday in December at the Sportsman's Inn at Cowgill - please let me know if you'd like to join us.

We're off to sing on the Settle Carlisle Railway on Saturday December 8 - and a little thing like all





the trains being cancelled due to strike action won't deter us - we're driving up to Ribblehead at lunchtime where we'll sing in the Station Inn and then after singing inside the station, we'll all join Janet Russell's Settle Voices and Silsden Singers in Settle for an evening round the fire of the Royal Oak.

And on Sunday December 16 we have our annual star lit walk through the winter landscape near Sedbergh singing at the doors of cottages cradled in the dale - do please let us know if you'd like us to call - we only sing at homes where there is a welcome, so if you usually hide behind the sofa when the carol singers come please don't get in touch - we practice for several weeks in advance to create the best music we can so don't want to waste our voices at homes where we're not welcome. We don't make a collection - but sing only to bring you all the

festive joy of the season. We will start with singing in the Black Bull hotel where we've been invited to sing at 4.30pm by the fire - do join us and join in if you fancy a good sing. Then we can come and visit your homes and sing for you there if you get in touch - a series of house concerts up the valley.

Isle in the 1780s a substantial house with its own chapel and boathouse was built.

By the late 18th and early 19th centuries the first tourists began to appear in the Lakes, latterly attracted by the growing reputation of 'Lake Poets' such as Wordsworth and Southey, A variety of weird and wonderful experiences were organised: echoes across the waters from the firing of cannons or the blowing of French horns; horse swimming races; mock naval encounters using model battleships (arranged by Lord Pocklington!); framing the landscape through a mirror; or popular rowing and sailing regattas (in 1860 the Windermere Yacht Club was founded).

1847 turned out to be a pivotal year for tourism with the opening of the first railway line and Windermere Station. This was guickly followed with the Lakeside and Haverthwaite stations on the Furness Railway. Keswick Station on the Cockermouth to Penrith line, and the branch line from Broughton to Coniston. Furthermore, with the advent of steam power the Lakes steamboats captured the tourists' imagination: no fewer than 5,000 passengers sailed on the 'Lord of the Isles' in its first year of operation; other renowned vessels such as 'Lady of the Lake', 'Swan' (built 1869, screw-driven as opposed to paddles), 'Tern', 'Swift' and 'Teal' (still chugging today) continued in the tide of popularity. On



Coniston Water after 1859 the Gondola became an attraction, whilst Ullswater had its first boat 'Raven' in 1855 and Derwentwater established its popular 'round the lake' steamer service from Keswick.

Diana Matthews' father founded the Windermere Steamboat Museum in 1977, later (in 2008) handing it to the Lakeland Arts Trust, Within a few weeks it is due to re-open its doors under its new name "The Jettv". This talk has certainly whetted the appetite! 53

COGS Community Orchard Group Sedbergh made about 400 litres of juice, three Apple Day 2018 Sedbergh's enthusiasm for fresh

local apple juice continues! Our 3rd annual Apple Day which took place in the People's Hall on Saturday 27th October, was really well supported, with local families attending as well as visitors from further afield. A great buzzy atmosphere was created by lots of enthusiastic people pressing apples as well as live music from Common Ground.

We had about 280 Kg of donated apples, which gave 140 litres of juice for the community. The press takes 40Kg of apples and gives 25 litres of juice every 20 minutes, so we pressed at least 600 Kg of apples and times as much as last year! these Ann Parratt apples were grown locally, in town gardens and country orchards from



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Cowgill to Cautley, and from Millthrop to Loftus Hill. Some were brought on the day, while others had been gleaned by COGS members during the autumn.

Outside the Hall, a busy crew worked at the scratter – the noisy machine for chopping apples into pulp – and the hydropress, which used water pressure to squash the pulp. It is astonishing to see how much juice gushes out. The dry spent pulp was collected for pig food – lucky pigs!

Inside, there was plenty to see and do. Visitors could bring their apples to be identified by expert Andy Gilchrist from SLOG (South Lakeland Orchard Group) Hilary Wilson, another SLOG expert who is part of the team from

Acorn Bank and Phil Rainford from Lancashire.

Many people will recognise a Bramley, but who knew that Bloody Ploughman grew in Sedbergh? Enormous Howgate Wonder apples weighing between 400 and 500 grams each were brought in, Andy said he'd never seen such huge apples, another first for Sedbergh. The experts were kept busy giving advice and identifying apples, why not bring your apples next year, you never know, they might be a heritage variety too.

There was a wonderful array of plants to buy from the plant stall, and in the Children's Activity Corner there was a competition for the longest apple peel, as well as other creative



crafts, supported by the YDNP Young Rangers. The Sedbergh Beekeepers stall showed us that without bees and their pollinating work, there would be no apples, gorgeous honey from both Garsdale and Dent was sold in abundance.

Expert Composters on the Garden Organic stall showed us the importance of compost, and Cumbria Wildlife Trust reminded everyone of the beauty and richness of our natural surroundings. It was wonderful see the Red Squirrel Group there too, giving lots of information about the spread of the red squirrel community.

Delicious cakes and guiches, tea and coffee were produced by the tireless kitchen team, with cakes, chutneys and jams for sale as well as Winter Pruning Workshop: Sunday

FASCIA

So what is this "Fascia" she keeps going on about?

Pronounced 'fasha', "Fascia is more commonly known as the soft tissue component of the connective tissues that run through the entire body as a covering and connecting network" (Robert Schleip, leading expert in field of fascia research, 2017 Fascial Fitness).

Healthy fascia helps our muscles and bones to glide smoothly over each other, gives space, spring and suppleness to our whole body.

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However for many of us our lifestyle and environment (home & work) lead to habitual postures, repetitive strain and overloading, add in scar tissue from injuries and surgery and our 3D fascial body-stocking is pulled out of shape and shrinks leading to myofascial trigger points (knots in our muscles 'myo' and surrounding fascia), nerve compression (nerves are coated in fascia) and bones being pulled out of alignment, which can lead not only to stiffness and dysfunction but many chronic pain conditions. But don't despair! We are very lucky to live in an environment with beautiful surroundings to explore. Even if you are unable to hill walk, run, cycle, play sports keep yourself moving indoors and outdoors in as many directions as possible. My "Healthy-Steps" classes are already incorporating lots of movements to keep the fascia hydrated and moving but on Saturday 5th January at the People's Hall I will be running two introductory fascial classes. "Fascial Fitness", developed by Robert Schleip and his wife Divo, teaches us how improve our fascia with 4 principles which have emerged from

the scientific research. It is a complement to other styles of training. "FunKi Fascia" is my own creation for those who, like me, love music and dance. Let go of tension with some simple moves to loosen your fascia and have fun! Please come and join me for one or both classes.



The Sedbergh Gateway website was launched during the summer of 2014 as part of a cunning plan to bring more walkers and cyclists to Sedbergh and its shops and businesses. Unfortunately it seems that the Walking and Cycling Group no longer has the resources to fund the site and it will be closed down in January.

Looking on the bright side, the Walking page of the Sedbergh Gateway has been re-branded and transferred to Carole Nelson's Sleepy Elephant website, and I will be updating it as new walking guides, blogs and videos come on-line. And of course I personally will have more time to pursue other, recently neglected, interests of my own (This is a cliché, but true).

DIGGING FOR BRITONS

Community excavations in the Lune Gorge, Tebay *Graham Hoolev*

As reported in the last Lookaround, Lunesdale Archaeology Society (LAS) is undertaking a major investigation of a prehistoric enclosure site in the Lune Gorge near the known Roman Fort at Low Borrowbridge funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund. The excavations were carried out from 26th September to 12th October and

revealed a complex site that had been occupied and modified over many years or centuries.

The early core of the site appears to be Iron Age, possibly dating from as early as 500 or 400BC. Typical of other similar sites in the North West there were no ceramic finds in this part of the enclosure making it difficult to date more precisely. Pottery from the period does not survive well in our region so cannot help with dating. The form of the structures uncovered. however, including round house footings and boundary banks, is strongly suggestive of the period before the Roman occupation. Next year we will return to this part of the site to look for organic remains (such as charcoal from fires or hearths) that analysis but at first glance suggest



could help pin the date down more precisely. What we did find, however, was part of the base of a quernstone, used for grinding cereals. Querns such as this are typical of the Iron Age and continued to be used into the Roman period and later.

In an extension to the enclosure we uncovered the footings of a round house with the remains of a fire or hearth in situ. From this we were able to extract samples of charcoal that will now be sent for radio carbon dating at Durham University. This should tell us when the fire was last in use. Bevond the round house we discovered a cobbled surface with several fragments of broken pottery. These have also been sent for expert the vessels date from the first to third centuries AD. This raises the intriguing possibility that the later occupants of the site were there at the same time as Roman soldiers occupied the fort at Low Borrowbridge some half a mile to the north, and may have been trading with them.

We plan to return to the site in May/ June next year to extend our trenches and target other features that look as though they could give us more clues about the people living there two thousand years ago. The Authority's SDF officer, Andrea Burden, said: "The SDF is there to support projects that contribute in some way to helping conserve the natural beauty, wildlife or cultural heritage of the National Park, or promote opportunities for people to understand and enjoy those special qualities.	"It's a good time to apply to the fund. So far this financial year we have been able to allocate £85,907 to 15 projects. Progress has been steady and for some it may seem a tad slow. The ducting has had to be brought up all the way from Middleton avoiding the myriad of utility services that run to the south of Sedbergh. As I write permission is still awaited to cross the new gas pipe.

Birks. Abbot Holme and the Golf Club will be the first to be connected in Sedbergh as they are on the way up to the cabinet. The plan for the rest of the Town is to push out east and west from the cabinet to encircle it with fibre. It can then be fed into the various sectors of the Town - see http://www.b4sa.org.uk/volunteers . A challenging task but one we must achieve if Sedbergh is to thrive in this IT age. One town business is already moving from Sedbergh to Killington where the B4RN service is available. Others may soon follow if the service was not to come to the Town. Comcast, who have bought Sky, have confirmed that they intend to end the satellite service next year. This will further slow our BT service.

Interest by residents in Sedbergh in





having the B4RN service is increasing rapidly. Also estate agents report prospective house purchasers needing to know which houses have, or will have, B4RN's service before deciding to buy a house.

However, its development in Sedbergh much depends on you. So far two of us have done most of the field work supported by a few others carrying out essential tasks. For the Marthwaite project there is no deadline at present but we need considerably more investment to make the project worthwhile.

There are three investment options, any of which will help the projects to reach their goals:

Purchase ordinary shares in B4RN at £1.00 per share. A person purchasing 1500 shares and over will not be required to pay the £150.00 connection charge. All shares purchased are subject to a 30% tax rebate from HMRC. More information is available on the B4RN website. Commit to purchasing shares if the project reaches its goal. Complete a share application form and submit it to B4RN with a cheque for the required amount and a covering note indicating that the application is to go into the "Holding Pen" for either Howgill or Marthwaite. The application form and cheque will then be held at the B4RN Offices until

such time as the project has reached its target. Each potential investor will then be contacted by a B4RN representative to inform the investor that the cheque for shares is about to be submitted to the Bank for clearing. However if the project does not reach the required funding level all cheques will be returned.

Dig for shares. Those landowners who wish to carry out the work of laying core route ducting will receive payment in B4RN £1.00 shares at the rate of 1.5 shares per metre of laid ducting. You must have all required equipment yourself and the work must be to an adequate standard. The shares so received will be eligible for all the benefits described above. To register to dig for shares please contact the volunteer coordinators or B4RN directly.

There are no technical issues standing between us and a B4RN connection to every household in the area, it is simply a matter of investment. If we miss this opportunity now, the volunteer teams will disband, B4RN will move their focus elsewhere, and we will be stuck in the dark ages for ever.




